REPORT OF THE TOWN AUDITOR

For the Year Ending December 31, 1950

This is to certify that I have examined the accounts and records of the Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Road Agent, Treasurer, and Selectmen and find them correct and properly vouched according to the best of my knowledge and belief.

I should like to make the following notes and recommendations concerning my audit.

Tax Collector's Accounts

A list of abated taxes was in the hands of the selectmen and approved by them prior to the time of the audit. Also the amount collected on redeemed taxes was segregated from other tax collections as recommended last year.

I would recommend that steps be taken to collect taxes dating back to 1946 where there is a known ability to pay.

Road Agent's Accounts

Discounts have been deducted prior to submitting the road agents weekly statement to the selectmen as recommended last year.

I would make the same recommendation as last year that a performance bond be executed on the road agent.

Water Commission

I have made several recommendations to the Water Commission relative to the setting up of their accounts and the inauguration of a policy regarding the collection of overdue accounts.

I would make the same recommendation as last year that a performance bond be taken out covering the Water Commission and their collectors of water accounts.

General

There is still laxity in making payments to the town treasurer on a monthly basis as required by law. The report which I have to submit to the State Tax Commission requires that I inform them if this is not being done.

To the Water Commissioners:

I have examined the accounts and records of the Collector of Water Accounts and the Treasurer of the Board of Water Commissioners and find them correct and properly vouched according to the best of my knowledge and belief.

I should like to make the following recommendations.

Petty Cash Account

All expenditures of public funds should be made by check to provide the necessary information for conducting an audit and also to provide a permanent and complete record of all expenditures. The amount set aside for a petty cash fund should be immediately deposited in the checking account.

Cash on Hand

Cash or checks as such should not be held before being deposited long enough to require a separate account for "Cash On Hand." All money received by the treasurer should be deposited immediately in the checking account and should by all means be deposited prior to submitting the accounts and records for audit.

I find that all money collected by the Collectors is held by them in their office and paid over to the treasurer at the end of each quarter. All money and checks collected by the collectors should be deposited in a bank at least twice a week. An accounting of all money collected should be made each quarter to the treasurer and a check should be drawn on the collectors bank account for the amount collected during the quarter payable to the treasurer of the board of Water Commissioners. All money collected on accounts should be deposited in a separate bank account and not be combined with funds of any other concern or individual.

Fixed Assets

Nondepreciable assets (Springs and Water Rights) and depreciable assets (Aqueducts) have heretofore been combined in one account. I also find that the cost of constructing a pump house at the new well on School Street has been charged off as an expense this year whereas this pump house should last for a considerable number of years, and its cost be charged off over its expected life. I have separated the nondepreciable assets and set their value at \$10,000.00. To this I have added the cost of drilling the new well and the amount expended on improvements to the Quarry spring and set up an account entitled Springs and Water Rights at a book value of \$12,167.01, as of December 31, 1950. I have set up an account entitled Plant and Aqueducts which includes all depreciable assets such as pumping station and underground pipes and shut-offs. I have estimated the value of pipes, etc., as \$6,000.00, to which I have added the cost of constructing the pumping station of \$691.90, making a total of \$6,691.90. I have allowed depreciation to date of \$691.90 leaving a net value of Plant and Aqueducts of \$6,000.00 as of December 31, 1950.

In future years an amount should be set aside for depreciation of the assets contained in this account and this amount should be shown as an operating expense of the Water Works. The Plant and Aqueduct account after deducting the reserve for depreciation should reflect the actual value of the assets on the date for which the balance sheet is prepared.

Water Accounts in Arrears

Some policy should be inaugurated immediately regarding the discontinuance of service to those accounts that are in arrears. There are several accounts on which no payment has been made since the Water Works came into public ownership.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE FROST FREE LIBRARY 1950

The Annual Meeting of the Trustees of the Frost Free Library was held at the Library on Oct. 14th, 1950, with Mr. Rufus Frost, President, presiding. The meeting was opened with a prayer by Rev. Raymond Putnam.

The Treasurer's and Librarian's reports, as printed in this Town Report, were accepted as read.

During this year we have received the very generous sum of \$12,000.00 according to the will of the late Kate K. Davis. Two thousand dollars of this sum is to be invested and the income thereof to be used for the purchase of books. The remaining amount of \$10,000.00 is to be invested and the income to be used for general expenses. This money is to be invested by the Trustees of the Town of Marlboro. We are very grateful for this splendid gift.

We are troubled by the appearance of the interior of our Library which has not been painted for several years. Due to lack of funds this condition cannot be remedied just now, but we hope our Library may be renovated before another report is due.

Our Librarian, Mrs. Inez Mahon, has had a busy and successful year. Mr. Cecil Nash has continued as our efficient and faithful Janitor. We are very grateful that we can have two such fine persons to carry on the work of our Library.

We realize that many Marlboro citizens are not patrons of our Library. We wish more of you might wish to use our facilities. However, we also wish, even though you may not wish to borrow reading material, that you would visit your Library from time to time. It is a busy place and an important part of our Community Life. Perhaps after spending an hour or so there you might have some very helpful suggestions for the Trustees, that they might make this Library even more useful and attractive. We would appreciate your patronage and interest.

It was voted to ask the Town to raise and appropriate \$800.00 for the continued maintenance during 1951.

LIBRARIAN'S ANNUAL REPORT

To the President and Trustees of Frost Free Library the librarian submits the following report for the year Oct. 1, 1949 to Oct. 1, 1950.

The library has been open 104 days. Total circulation of books has been 7,121. Of this number 170 were juvenile non-fiction; 629 adult non-fiction; 3,460 juvenile fiction; 2,862 adult fiction.

Circulation of magazines was 3,151.

200 new books have been added. Some of these were gifts from friends of the library. 36 magazines were subscribed for and many others were given.

Much use has been made of reference books, and the reading table.

In August we conducted a reading program for the children which included a story hour for the first grade. Two mothers of this group very generously gave their time to conduct this program. We hope next year it can fit in better with other worthwhile projects for children. 30 books were borrowed from the state library.

Some of the Girl Scouts have worked in the library and have been good help.

The Frost and Hale families, the trustees, the teachers, the custodian and the patrons of the library have all helped make our work pleasant.

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Marlboro qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 13th day of March 1951, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization funds together with other income, the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated income and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see whether the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000) to construct a home economics laboratory and equip it for junior and senior high school home economics courses.

10. To see whether the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four thousand dollars (\$4,000) or part thereof, for extensive repair work and interior painting in the high school building.

11. To see whether the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand four hundred eighty-two dollars (\$1,482) for extended fire insurance coverage on the two school buildings on a five year budget plan, annual cost \$590.

12. To see if the district will vote to continue a cooperative school study and plan with other towns a workable Mo-nadnock cooperative school system, and to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) for necessary expenses in connection therewith.

13. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200) to pay a cost of living bonus of \$100 per teacher on the 1950-51 salary scale.

14. To consider any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

The school year 1949-50 brought no great or sudden change to the educational program in Marlboro. A capable staff of teachers, supervised by an experienced and capable principal, has carried on classroom work with success. Increased emphasis has been placed on the use of film strip, motion pictures, bulletin boards and displays. A good start has been made toward a special reading program for those pupils who have difficulty in this area.

The problem of increased enrollment was solved at the start of the school year and is working out successfully. Census figures for the community show no influx of pupils beyond the capacity of the present buildings. The study of a community high school is continuing in this and other communities and may be the answer to high school education in this area in the future. Additional information on this project is available in a special report.

The plans for the school year of 1951-52 call for a marked increase in the courses offered in the high school. A regular shop program will be offered to junior and senior high school boys and a regular program of home economics will be available to junior and senior high school girls. An art teacher will be employed so that all pupils, both elementary and high school, will have an opportunity for training in this subject under a professional artist. The present program of high school and elementary music will continue. This broadened curriculum will provide an educational program better fitted to meet the needs and interests of all pupils.

The rearmament program will probably bring problems of shortages and increased costs in supplies and equipment and will increase the difficulty of obtaining good teachers. In order to retain those we now have it will be necessary to provide for increased salaries and cost of living adjustments.

In the past, the school and the teachers contributed greatly to war efforts. Already, we are being asked to offer increasingly such courses as science, aeronautics and mathematics and to train all teachers in first aid; so that this can be taught all children. To keep the schools ready for any emergency, we must be ready to provide increased financial support.

The best efforts of the school staff, its administrators, the school board members and all citizens, will be needed to meet the problems of the future.

REPORT OF PRINCIPAL OF HIGH SCHOOL

Mr. Charles L. Bowlby, Superintendent of Schools,
Marlboro, New Hampshire.

I herewith submit my eighth annual report as Principal of Marlboro High School.

ENROLLMENT

Our registration on opening day in September showed a total of 115 in grades 7-12. This is practically the same as last year and has remained nearly constant up to this date. Two boys have left school, one to work and the other to join the armed forces.

Prospects of maintaining the above figures appear to be excellent. I do not anticipate that any further losses to the armed forces will occur nor do I expect further drop-outs.

ATTENDANCE AND SCHOLARSHIP

The student body as a whole has an excellent attendance record. It is well above the state average. Practically all of our questionable cases of absence are chargeable against a few students. There is a definite correlation between the attendance record and the quality of work done by the pupils in most cases. Every effort has been made to reduce tardiness and general improvement has been noted over previous years.

Our pupils with very few exceptions are working near to their capacity. The few whose work is not as good as it should be appear to have poor home study habits and in some cases are asked to come back for afternoon study sessions. Practically all members of the senior class have definite plans for next year. The teachers are all ready and anxious to help the pupils with their problems and to aid them in their selections of post-secondary schools.

PERSONNEL

We are most fortunate to have retained so large a portion of our staff of teachers. All of our regular high school teachers have had at least four years teaching experience and I feel that this is a bit unusual for a school of our size. This is certainly an advantage to our operations as all teachers are now familiar with our pupil problems. Our only replacements have been Mr. Cecil Nash, who succeeded Mrs. Wilson as music supervisor and Mr. Corridon Trask, replacing Francis Wilson as shop teacher. These two young men are doing very good work. Cadets from Keene Teachers College have been used one or two at a time and have been a very definite help to us. This has made it possible to give pupils much more individual help than would otherwise be possible. I hope this program may be continued indefinitely.

LUNCH PROGRAM

Our lunch program is regarded by state supervisors as comparing very favorably with any in the state. Mrs. Cecil

Nash is doing an outstanding job as lunch room manager and has done the work alone much of the time. She is assisted by Mrs. Granville Clark during part of the year when the number of pupils participating in the program is largest.

In spite of decreased federal reimbursement we have been able to continue serving meals at the usual price of twenty cents but with a further reduction effective now I fear that the per meal price may have to be advanced a few cents. Several needy pupils are served free meals and we are continuing the long standing practice of giving vitamins to our underweight pupils.

SPECIAL ACTIVITIES

The various classes of the school have sponsored a variety of events and affairs during the year. We attempt in every instance where possible to make the fund raising projects have same educational value and in some cases derive revenue from events which are educational in nature.

Some events such as the Junior Prom have much value in teaching the pupils to be at ease in an atmosphere which tends to be slightly formal. This event usually does not show much financial profit.

This year representatives of every class met with the faculty advisors and drew up a calendar of events which has worked very satisfactorily. Its use avoids having more than one group wishing to sponsor something on the same night.

CLASS OF 1950

The record of this class was excellent and is continuing to be unusual. It was a very good group scholastically and participated widely in extra-curricular activities. Proof of the ability of the members of this group is borne out by the fact that ten of the eighteen members are securing higher education and all have satisfactory records at the schools they are attending. I believe this record of more than half the graduates attending college will stand for a considerable time. Other members of the class are gainfully employed, some in responsible positions with definite promise of advancement.

I feel quite confident that our school met the needs of this group of pupils in a very satisfactory manner.

The usual schedule of events were held during Commencement Week, beginning with the Baccalaureate Service on Sunday, June 11.

ATHLETICS

Last year's boys' basketball team closed the season with a record of ten wins and eight losses against very strong competition. This is a good record when a comparison of sizes of schools is noted. All teams on our schedule with one exception represent schools with larger enrollments and better athletic facilities than ours. The same situation applies of course in baseball.

Four regular members of last year's team were graduated and their loss has been felt this season as it was necessary to replace them either with boys who had not played much basketball or with players small in stature. We are at present further handicapped by the scholastic ineligibility of three of these boys who have been playing regularly this season. As a result of this, prospects for the remaining five games are not bright but we have no choice other than to eliminate those boys who fail to do the satisfactory work of which they are very capable. Prospects for a good team in a year or two appear to be excellent.

Some neighboring schools continue to follow the policy of de-emphasizing girls basketball and are holding their games in the afternoon. We have not considered this because of added expense involved.

Mr. Trask has worked faithfully with the junior high boys and they have played quite a full schedule of games. Results of this early training are bound to be seen later.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Conditions at the Town Hall which we use more and more for our activities have been greatly improved by the installation of modern toilet facilities. It may be wishful thinking but the improvement program there should be extended to include heat and shower facilities. I hope that some consideration may be given this suggestion in the near future by our townspeople.

Our tentative plan for offering home economics and shop work to high school pupils met with hearty response in a preliminary survey I made among the pupils. I strongly recommend to the voters that they provide the necessary funds.

Some thought must be given in the near future to the possibility of separating the coaching and the administration. In the present situation where the administrator has nearly a full teaching load along with responsibility of the lunch program and many other details the hours required for coaching become a burden. The combination of the three phases of the work has been eliminated in practically all the high schools in our state.

CONCLUSION

In closing I wish to say that the past year has been among the most pleasant I have spent in teaching. Cooperation of the staff has been excellent and we have enjoyed our usual loyal support from the townspeople. I appreciate the confidence placed in me by you and the members of the School Board and will make every effort to continue to direct the activities of the school to the best of my ability.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(TOWN WARRANT)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Marlboro in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Marlboro on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

3. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for repairs and construction of sidewalks or act in any manner relating thereto.

4. To see if the Town will raise a sum of money for repairs, water storage, equipment, supplies and other expenses of the Fire Department.

5. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for Electric Lights.

6. To see if the Town will raise the sum of \$1,800.00 to aid the Community Nursing Association or act in any manner relating thereto.

7. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for Memorial Day.

8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote for the purchase of tar for highways or act in any manner relating thereto.

9. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid or Class V roads, raise and appropriate the sum of \$518.46, the State to give \$2,073.85.

10. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,400.00, the State to contribute \$3,600.00 for the construction of a new concrete bridge near the site of the old power station on the road leading to the residence of Fred H. Hunt.

11. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,250.00 for painting the inside of the Town Hall, and other necessary repairs, or act in any other manner.

12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Moderator to appoint a committee of three to act with the Selectmen to investigate the advisability of installing central heat and shower facilities in the Town Hall, said committee to bring in its recommendations to be acted upon at the next annual meeting.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$159.00 (1/100th of 1% of the valuation of the Town) to the Monadnock Region Association of Southern New Hampshire for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, and by other means calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in cooperation with the other thirty-seven towns of the Monadnock Region.

14. To see if the Town of Marlboro will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to be paid to the Federated Church of Marlboro for the cost of heating and janitor service for the Youth Center when utilized by the following youth groups of our community under adult supervision: Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Cub Scouts, Brownies, Catholic Youth Organization, and 4-H groups.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$800.00 to help maintain the Frost Free Library or act in any manner relating thereto.

16. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to dredge Robbins Brook, beginning near the residence of John Allen, and continuing to the main river.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$837.00 to aid the Elliot Community Hospital.

18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to support the program sponsored by the Recreation Commission.

19. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for the support of the Civil Defense Program.

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$400.00 to repair and resurface with tar, the roads in the Pine Grove Cemetery.

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,300.00 to recondition and tar the old White road, which begins at the Dublin Highway and continues to the Old Marlboro-Chesham Road opposite the residence of Marshall Harris.

22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 to resurface and tar as far as possible the Webb Depot road, beginning near the residence of Henry Mattson.

23. To see if the Town will vote to resurface and tar Knowlton Street, beginning at or near the residence of Alphonse Boucher and ending at the Knowlton Street Bridge, raise money for the same or act in any manner in relation thereto.

24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to dredge the river from the old Knowlton dam site for a distance of 400 feet or act in any matter relating thereto.

25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$120,000.00 for the purpose of improving and enlarging the water system of the Town by providing

gravel-packed wells, a reservoir, hydrants for fire protection, and extending the present distribution system, and the funding and payment of the present water system note of the Town of \$20,000.00 voted at the last Town Meeting and to instruct its Selectmen to borrow said sum not to exceed \$120,000.00 on the credit of the Town and issue the Town's notes therefor maturing annually to be paid within thirty years from their date.

26. To see if the Town will vote to accept the legacies given to it by the 22nd, 25th, 26th, 44th and 45th clauses of the will of Mrs. Kate K. Davis.

27. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sums for perpetual care of Cemetery lots received since January 1, 1950.

28. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the Town in anticipation of taxes.

29. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any Real Estate acquired by the Town through Collector's deeds.

30. To hear reports of Town Agents or Committees or other officers heretofore chosen or appointed and pass any vote relating thereto.

31. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.
