TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of New London in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

(L. S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at Whipple Memorial Hall in said New London on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 95 of the Public Laws as amended and establish a Board of Sewer Commissioners, consisting of three members, to perform all the duties and possess all the powers in the Town otherwise by said chapter conferred upon the Selectmen.
- 3. To choose by ballot three Sewer Commissioners to hold office for three years, two years and one year, respectively.
- 4. To hear reports of agents or auditors and the budget committee heretofore chosen and pass vote relating thereto.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$9,170 to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the observance of Memorial Day.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$950.00 for the Town Library for the ensuing year.

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- 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,338.00 for street lighting for the ensuing year.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$450.00 for cemetery purposes for the ensuing year.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the support of the New London Hospital for the ensuing year.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$8,000 for summer maintenance and \$2,500 for winter maintenance of highways, bridges and sidewalks and make appropriation of the same.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$458.60 and the State to give \$1,834.40 to be expended on Class V highways and make appropriation of the same.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for Hydrant Service.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125.00 toward the expenses of a series of Band Concerts during the ensuing year.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to be paid as salary to the members of the New London Fire Company.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for the issuance and distribution of printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in cooperation with the other towns of the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$325.00 for Police Patrol for houses closed through the winter.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the purpose of collecting material, preparing copy and publishing a New London Town History.

- 19. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$200.00 for protection and care of shade trees in public grounds and highways.
- 20. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$50.00 to purchase tools for use in fighting forest fires, the State to give a like amount.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to be used for graveling the road from the William Mitchell Place in Low Plain, to the top of Page Hill, during mud time this coming Spring.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 to construct a new road from Main Street to the residence of Eugene Lorden.
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$175.00 for expense of Timber Salvage.
- 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$980.00 to pay for the new portable pumper bought for forest fire protection.
- 25. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$46,110.00 for the purpose of repairs and alterations to present sewer and that the Selectmen and Town Treasurer be authorized to issue bonds of the Town not to exceed the sum of \$46,110.00 upon such terms as they consider for the best interest of the Town and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for white pine blister rust control.
- 27. To see if the Town will vote to throw up and discontinue the road leading from Bog Road, so-called, to the State Road, opposite the residence of Fred and John Morgan.
- 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700.00 for the exchange of trucks and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 29. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to appoint a committee of seven to investigate and report at the next Town Meeting on the matter of zoning for New London.

- 30. To see what action the Town will vote to take in regard to discount on taxes.
- 31. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes for the ensuing year.
- 32. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

GRAVE FOREST SITUATION FOLLOWS SEPTEMBER HURRICANE

Woodland problems of timber salvage and fire control created in many towns by the September hurricane are of the greatest importance. Good citizenship calls for personal and widespread action!

The salvage of every thousand feet of logs which can be sold means money for landowners, wages for workers, employment for trucks, teams and machinery, as well as reduced forest fire hazard for all. If owners of windthrown timber have not yet acted, they should communicate with those who can help. Town chairmen are fully informed; State Advisory Agents can help to start logging by suggesting names of operators and giving other useful advice; Federal Agencies are increasing the number of log storage places as rapidly as possible. Individuals must now cooperate!

Forest fire danger for several years will be greater than usual. So much work must be done by public agencies to reduce hazard along roadsides, near improved and other exposed areas that many places will remain hazardous for some time to come. Individual landowners must take a personal interest! Aid in clean-up work through the Agricultural Conservation Program is available to any woodland owner at \$4.00 per acre on areas up to 15 acres. The County Agent should be consulted.

Support your local Forest Fire Wardens and Deputies.

They are planning, with State and Federal agencies, an intensive campaign to control fires. Help them by strict observance of the fire laws. Kindle no open fires without a permit from the Warden except when the ground is covered with snow. Cooperate by reporting fires you may see and in other ways. Fire fighting tool supplies are inadequate and should be reasonably increased by many towns.

You can help, and it will pay, to prevent Forest Fires!

TRACY MEMORIAL BUILDING

Librarian's Report

The record of Tracy Memorial Building for the year ending September 30, 1938 presents gratifying evidence of increase in service to the community. Although the number of visitors is close to the average of the twelve years since the opening of the library, the circulation has increased markedly in every item. The total circulation set a new record, being more than 3,000 larger than last year. Had eight more books been put in the hands of our readers our circulation would have been 20,000. This is more than 24½ books per capita, or more than two books per month for every man, woman and child in New London.

Besides the circulation of books, the other facilities of the building were enjoyed by many people. Nine of the organizations of the town have held regular meetings in the building. Committee meetings and rehearsals totaled 36. Town officers and police held hearings here, and the State Unemployment Officer used the Club Room as an office weekly for some time. In all, other-than-library uses of

the building during the year were 207.

Entertainments given by the library included a lecture on music entitled "The Sword and the Pen" by Arthur Edgar French; a Musicale by Miss Mildred Messer, Miss Patience Thompson and Mr. Herbert Williams; a showing of local colored movies in the garden by Mr. George O. Draper; a Garden Party with music by Mrs. Alice Todd Drew, Mrs. Grafton B. Perkins, Miss Mildred Messer and Miss Barbara Bool; and exhibits of paintings by Mr. Gustave Wiegand, Mr. George O. Draper, Mr. William Holst, Mr. Francis S. Merritt, and Mr. Hollis H. Holbrook; a display of the artistic photographs of Mr. George F. Slade and his sons Wesley and Irvin Slade; and a showing of

prints from the American Artists Group. During the celebration of the Sesquicentennial of the New London Baptist Church an exhibit of articles pertaining to the history of this church was held in our Hall. At this time note books on the church history prepared by some of the children of the parish were also on display.

The New London Forum in its fifth season presented fifteen instructive and entertaining evenings. The program was more varied than in other seasons, offering a debate, a science symposium, a high school forum, out-of-town speakers and talks on various subjects by members of the

college and high school faculties and others.

The children have been entertained on Saturday afternoons with story hour and handiwork and several parties have been given for them. The fifth and sixth grades held a Prize Speaking Contest in our Hall; the children of the lower grades entertained their parents with a Folk-Dance Program; and the fourth and fifth grades gave a Puppet Show. Exhibits of the work of the schools included posters and leaf collections made by the children, besides the Good Book Week exhibits. Several Radio Parties were given for the high school pupils. These featured mock-broadcasts of interviews with famous people. The library basement was used on several occasions for the showing of motion pictures to the school children.

Music instruction by Mrs. Alice Todd Drew was terminated at the close of the school year in June. Up to that time 298 private piano lessons were given in the library hall and class singing instruction was given in the schools. Four recitals were enjoyed during the year: one by the younger pupils of Mrs. Drew; a two-piano recital by the Misses Marion Smith and Ollive Morey, also pupils of Mrs. Drew; a debut recital by Rosina Digilio, a pupil of Mrs. Helen Colburn; and a recital on the Minipiano by Mr. Al-

fred E. Plumpton of Manchester.

Good Book Week was observed by a display "Child's Reading Corner" in a store window, a showing of many new books for juveniles from the Traveling Library and by

a poster contest for the school children.

At Christmas time we had a lighted tree in the garden and a lighted garland at the front door. Within the building we had garlands, candles, a lighted silhouette, a Christmas creche, a display of photographs of Madonnas by Old Masters and a "Holy Night" picture bulletin. Members of the Garden Club helped in making the garlands for our decorations. Christmas books for old and young were made easily accessible. A tree with gifts was ready in the children's room for Saturday. The processional and other singing by the Children's Choir helped to make our Christmas Candle-light Service impressive.

Throughout the year many bulletins, desk, and other displays have honored birthdays of famous people, special days and timely subjects. At the time of the showing of some of the best moving pictures we have had displays of pictures and books to stimulate reading along the lines of

the pictures.

The library has received gifts of books, magazines, historic and genealogical material from many of its patrons. Mr. and Mrs. Herbert D. Swift presented to the library a beautiful Constitution Shrine which preserves and makes accessible to all exact copies of the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution of the United States as well as portraits of the signers of the latter document.

We have given duplicate and other surplus books to li-

braries in some of the nearby towns.

REPORT OF THE NEW LONDON HOSPITAL AND NURSING ASSOCIATION

Secretary's Report

During the fiscal year beginning September 1, 1937 and ending August 31, 1938, the hospital board has held 12 regular and three special meetings; these latter three being in preparation for Tag Day.

Much has been done in the way of improvements: By insulating the roof and remodeling the attic, livable quarters were made available for the nurses and housekeeper. A medicine closet was built which allows medicines and opiates to be properly housed. Two new bath rooms were added, one of them on the third floor.

On the street floor a doctor's room and a room for minor injuries or out patient department, replaces two rooms formerly occupied by nurses.

Much of this was made possible by the contributions of our summer residents.

During the winter a small electric refrigerator was bought for the diet kitchen and a new sink put in, in place of the old metal one.

It was necessary to invest in a new hot water heater this summer and in June a new washing machine was bought for the laundry.

Awnings were put on all windows facing the street and two on the back. They add much to the comfort of the interior as well as considerably improve the appearance of the exterior.

Tag Day, held on August 16th netted over \$1,273.00. Camps and hotels with their donations from entertainments aided us materially. A group of summer residents solicited a total of over \$1,200.00.

For the various gifts of money and useful articles which have been given during the year by friends of the hospital, we wish to express our heartiest appreciation.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the New London School Board:

I herewith submit my fifth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

The present enrollment in our schools has reached the record number of 192. This is an increase of 18 over the average membership of last year. The increase is mainly in Miss Fleming's room (Grades 1 and 2) and in the High School. Miss Fleming's room has 38 pupils and is quite crowded, considering the size of the room.

The number of tuition pupils in high school has not varied materially in the last five years, the average being 11

per year.

The number of tardinesses during 1937-38 was less than in any recent year. Elkins School again had the smallest number of tardinesses, followed closely by the rooms of Mrs. Nickerson and Miss Doe. The rooms of Miss Doe (97.36%), Mrs. Nickerson (97.29%), and Miss Brown (97.24%) are to be commended for a high per cent of attendance.

Faculty Changes

Mr. Harold A. Truell, who served successfully as head-master of the high school for the past three years, resigned to take a similar position in Milford, N. H. He was succeeded by Mr. Albert I. Oliver, Bates 1934, recently head of the Mathematics Department of Dover High School, Dover, N. H.

Miss Jane F. Abbott, Middlebury 1938, has replaced Miss Hazel A. Brown, who was married last summer, to Mr.

Edward Stefaniak.

Miss Katherine E. Lynch, Keene 1938, took the place of Miss Ruth Mary Doe who was married to Mr. William G. Stergios last summer.

The commercial subjects, (typewriting, bookkeeping, and general business), now in their second year, continue to attract a goodly number of pupils. This indicates that they fill a real need. We cannot, however, expand along this line (or any other, for that matter) with our present limited accommodations and corps of teachers. Whether a small high school should even consider offering more courses is a question because if a small group of pupils is distributed over a large number of courses, each class is so

small that the per pupil cost is rather high.

Instruction in music without a supervisor is always somewhat of a problem, since regular classroom teachers naturally differ in musical ability. Since we could not have the services this year of a special teacher of music, we reverted to the practice of having one of our regular teachers handle music in the high school. It fortunately happens that all three elementary teachers can teach music in their own rooms. Miss Helen Fleming, after her primary children have gone home, conducts the music in grades 7-12. This year the singing is on a glee club basis, participation being voluntary. This plan seems to be working out well. About 24 pupils are willingly and actively cooperating in this part of the school program.

The emphasis this year in the elementary teachers' professional study has been put on instruction in reading. The teachers' meetings instead of being general for the entire staff have consisted of groups of teachers interested in

particular phases in reading instruction.

Pupils in the first grade who are shown by two standard, non-verbal tests, as well as by the teacher's judgment after a fair period of trial, to be too immature for the regular first grade work, are placed in a pre-primary group and given definite preparation for reading instruction. This procedure has proved to be very sound and helpful, being successful in practically every case. In this way an immature child is saved the discouragement of failure, because he does successfully the easy preparatory tasks and eventually starts reading with real joy. This takes more time, of course, and may require two years, but progress is continuous even though slow. This reading-readiness program, so-called, is one of the noteworthy developments in modern education.

We are doing more in grouping pupils according to ability in reading and adapting reading materials to individual

ability. Improved textbooks make this possible.

Two of our teachers attended summer school last summer. Mr. Oliver was at the University of New Hampshire and Miss Upton at the Bread Loaf School of English, Middlebury College, Vt. Mr. Stergios is attending Saturday courses this year at Harvard University. When teachers spend their free time in such professional study it shows a commendable attitude.

Health

Our school nurse, Mrs. Della C. Spiller, has rendered very valuable and efficient service in looking out for the health of the school children and, in her follow-up work, securing proper treatment for defects which were found. Especially noteworthy has been the correction of defects in teeth, tonsils, and vision.

Pupils in high school who take part in the active sports are given a complete physical examination by a physician, since certain parts of such a complete examination (such as heart and lungs) are outside the field of a nurse.

We appreciate the improvement in the school grounds by the planting of shrubs and trees by the New London Garden Club. The plant boxes in the summer season also

add to the neat appearance of the school.

In order to encourage and reward public speaking Mr. Herbert D. Swift has generously started a fund, to be known as the Heidelberg Prize Speaking Fund, the income of which is to be used for prizes at an annual prize speaking contest. This gift of a public-spirited citizen is very much appreciated.

The Low Plain School was sold, under authorization of the School District by vote two years ago, to the local post

of the American Legion for the sum of \$100.00.

Finances

The proposed budget for 1939-40 is a little larger than last year's chiefly in the item for teachers' salaries. A good corps of teachers is the backbone of a school system. Without such a corps no school system can stand. We have excellent teachers and it is felt that we should recognize their worth by paying good salaries.

The estimated income for next year is more than the estimate of last March. Therefore the appropriation needed is practically the same as last year's appropriation.


