DEDICATION

Eleanor Morse, Winnie Leighton, Buster Laughy, Stella Hackney and Fred Hooper have all touched Sanbornton and its residents in different ways. This issue of the Annual Report is hereby dedicated to them.

Eleanor Morse moved to Sanbornton in 1918 when she was 21. She is remembered as the Square School teacher during the 1920's. Classes were in the now Sanbornton Public Library on Meetinghouse Hill Road. She taught briefly at the Brook School and the Route 127 School. During the 1950's and 1960's, Eleanor served the town as our Librarian. She married Nathan Morse in 1929 and lived in the Square.

A well-known and loved resident of Sanbornton will be remembered for her dedication and vigilant efforts on behalf of the Bay area. Winnie Leighton was the link for many of our seasonal residents, and a co-founder of the Sanbornton Bay Association. A registered nurse, Winnie worked actively in the health field. Along with her husband, Earl, Winnie was very helpful to many residents of our community.

With the election of Stella Hackney in 1973, Sanbornton residents elected its first Selectwoman. She served three years, through 1975. Stella was also our Town Clerk and Tax Collector in the late 1960's into the early 1970's. A Realtor, Stella was active in many groups and professional organizations. We appreciate and remember her efforts in behalf of the town.

A life-long resident of Sanbornton, Delacie "Buster" Laughy contributed to our community in many quiet ways. On his Saturday route, he would often stop to pick up a stray bag of trash, or a wayward tire beside the road and made sure the beach barrels were not overflowing. Buster always saw to it that veterans' gravesites were appropriately decorated for Memorial Day, and for many years, he served on the Sanbornton Fire Department. Buster loved Sanbornton and was a well-known local historian.

Many of us will remember Fred Hooper, a unique and interesting neighbor who gave much to Sanbornton. Fred seldom missed a Town Meeting, and always contributed to the discussion. Fred served many years as a Forest Fire Warden, and well over forty years helping to keep the town roads in good shape. We will miss Fred's "advice and consent."

Report of the Selectmen

Last year we reported three major issues of importance for 1992. They were installation of cable television in the town, revaluation of property and continuation of the solid waste facility.

We are pleased that progress has been made in all three areas. Installation of cable television is nearly complete on those roads originally designated for service. We will continue, in conjunction with the Cable Television Committee, to urge consideration of expansion lines.

The field work by the Department of Revenue Administration for the 1993 revaluation of all property in town is nearly complete. Sales will continue to be monitored until the first of April. Upon completion of the revaluation, property owners will be informed of the new values, and hearings will be scheduled to resolve any discrepancies.

The Solid Waste Committee has been hard at work developing a closure plan as required by the state. At the same time, the committee is considering options for future waste disposal. This will be the next major expense for the town.

The Selectmen wish to thank those townspeople who serve on our Fire Department and the various boards and committees. Special people like you contribute so much to the benefit of the town.

We would also like to thank the dedicated town employees who work all year long keeping the roads in good shape, managing waste disposal and recycling, performing the clerical tasks and keeping our town safe.

Finally, the board wishes to take this opportunity to thank Tom Salatiello for his nine years of service as Selectman. We will miss you, Tom.

MINUTES OF THE 1992 TOWN MEETING
MARCH 11, 1992
Town of Sanbornton
State of New Hampshire

The annual Town Meeting was called to order at 7:00 PM by Assistant Moderator, Warren Wilson. Mr. Wilson entertained a motion to waive the reading of the warrant. It was so voted.

Mr. Wilson then introduced the members of the Board of Selectmen, the Budget Committee, the Supervisors of the Checklist, the State Representatives and the Town Clerk.

The Pledge of Allegiance was led by a representative of the Boy Scouts.

Mr. Sleeper then introduced Mr. William Franks, Assistant Moderator who read the results of the tally of votes of the previous day's voting.

Mr. Sleeper then set rules of procedure for the ensuing meeting as follows:

Non-registered voters were asked to sit in a designated area.

Debate was to be directed through the moderator.

Amendments were to be in writing.

Rules set down by the Moderator could be overruled by the voting body.

The Moderator said he would not entertain any motion to reconsider any vote. He noted he could, however, be overruled by the voting body. He followed with an explanation of the recent adoption of RSA 40:10, Optional Restriction on Reconsideration.

Before beginning with the warrant articles, Mr. Sleeper introduced Donald Foudriat who stressed the importance of attending the School District Meeting on Saturday, March 21, 1992. Mr. Foudriat informed the voters that the formula for the apportionment of school costs would be deliberated at that meeting and could have a tremendous fiscal impact to the taxpayers of the Town of Sanbornton.

The Moderator then recognized the Chairman of the Budget Committee, Judith Burlingame-Rich, who made the following correction to the Budget as printed in the Annual Report. (Page 7, Pull out section) The total of the 1992 Budget Committee Not Recommended column was corrected from \$36,771 to \$58,944.

Article 1. Subject: General Business

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to incur debt in anticipation of taxes in order to pay current maintenance and operation expenses and to insure a note or notes therefore; to administer any real estate acquired through Tax Collector's deeds;

and to apply for, accept and expend such grants, funds, and gifts as may be available to the Town from private sources and from other governmental agencies; and to accept the dedication of any street shown on a subdivision plat approved by the planning board, provided that such street has been constructed to applicable town specifications as determined by the Board of Selectmen or their agent.

Article #1 was accepted as read.

Article 2. Subject: Revaluation

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$63,600, and to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw the sum of \$42,493, plus interest, from the Capital Reserve for Revaluation for the purpose of revaluation of property effective April 1, 1993 (total revaluation cost is estimated at \$106,100).

Article #2 was accepted as read.

Article 3. Subject: Library Trustees

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Sanbornton Public Library Trustees to apply for, accept, and expend without further action by the Town Meeting, money which may become available during the fiscal year from the state, federal or other governmental units. The article or item shall be used only for legal purposes for which a town may appropriate money; not require the expenditure of other town funds; and be exempt from all provisions of RSA 32, relative to limitations and expenditures of town funds.

Article #3 was amended to read as follows:

"To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Sanbornton Public Library Trustees to apply for, accept and expend without further action by the Town Meeting, money which may become available during the fiscal year from the state, federal other governmental units or private sources. The article or item shall be used only for legal purposes for which a town may appropriate money; not require the expenditure of other town funds; and be exempt from all provisions of RSA 32, relative to limitations and expenditures of town funds."

Article #3 was accepted as amended.

Article 4. Subject: Highway Maintenance

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$210,770 for the maintenance of highways and bridges, this sum to include \$1,000 to use for the repair of town bridges.

Article #4 was accepted as read.

Article 5. Subject: Highway Block Grant

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$62,126 to be received from the state highway block grant to pave portions of Osgood Road, and/or to reclaim already paved sections of

Perkins Road, Cram Road, and Perley Hill Road.

Mr. Curtis Beaupre proposed the following amendment:

"To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$62,126 to be received from the State Highway Block Grant to reclaim paved sections of Perkins Road, Cram Road and Perley Hill Road, and to upgrade Osgood Road by the use of geotextile support material beginning at the end of pavement on Weeks Road and continuing along Osgood Road for a distance of not less than one quarter of a mile and/or to reclaim already paved sections of Perkins Road, Cram Road and Perley Hill Road."

The above amendment failed.

Mr. Curtis Beaupre proposed a second amendment as follows:

"To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$62,126 to be received from the State Highway Block Grant to pave portions of Osgood Road, and/or to reclaim already paved sections of Perkins Road, Cram Road, and Perley Hill Road, providing however, that no section of Osgood Road be paved until such time as a twenty-five mile per hour speed limit be legally established and posted for the entire length of Osgood Road."

The above amendment was accepted.

This article was further amended to read as follows:

"To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$62,126 to be received from the State Highway Block Grant to pave portions of Osgood Road, and/or to reclaim already paved sections of Perkins Road, Cram Road, and Perley Hill Road and to establish, effective immediately, a twenty-five mile per hour speed limit for the entire length of Osgood Road."

Article #5 was accepted as amended above.

A further amendment was proposed by George Nowack of Perkins Road which would restrict expenditure of these funds to improving and/or up-grading only unpaved sections of these roads.

This final amendment was defeated.

Article 6. Subject: Fire Department

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$38,262 for the operation of the Fire Department.

Article #6 was accepted as read.

Article 7. Subject: Police Department

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$151,836 for the operation of the Police Department. Said appropriation to be offset by \$2,278 of drug forfeiture funds acquired by the Town.

John Maurath, Police Chief, noted that the \$2,278 of drug forfeiture funds may be used solely for the purpose of conducting of drug investigations and proposed to amend this article to read as follows:

"To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$151,836 for the operation of the Police Department."

The amendment was accepted.

Article #7 was accepted as amended.

Article 8. Subject: Police Department 4-Wheel Drive Vehicle
To see if the Town will vote to authorize the acquisition of a third vehicle, a 4-wheel drive, for use by the Police Department. (Action to acquire a vehicle in 1992 would require an amendment to Article 9.)

Article #8 was accepted as read.

Article 9. Subject: Police Department Cruiser
To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,700 for the lease of a new Police Department cruiser, this sum to be offset by the sale of the excess cruiser for \$2,500.

Police Chief, John Maurath proposed the following amendment:
"To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$11,858 for the lease of a new 4-wheel drive Police Department vehicle."

The above amendment was accepted.

Article #9 was accepted as amended.

Article 10. Subject: Capital Reserve Funds
To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the following sums of money of which:

\$10,000 is to be placed in the Capital Reserve for Heavy Equipment; and
\$37,000 is to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for the Sanitary Landfill; and
\$2,000 is to be placed in the Town Bridges and Roads Capital Reserve Fund; and
\$15,000 to be placed in the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund; and
\$2,000 is to be placed in the Sanbornton Fire Department Repair and Refurbishing Capital Reserve Fund; and
\$500 is to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for the Town Recreation Park.

Article #10 accepted as read.

Article 11. Subject: Sanitary Landfill

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$39,600 for the landfill operating budget, \$3,825 of which is to be withdrawn from the Landfill Non-Lapsing Fund, a fund established by vote of the Special Town Meeting on August 31, 1989.

Article #11 was accepted as read.

Article 12. Subject: Household Hazardous Waste Collection

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,905 to contribute to a regional Household Hazardous Collection Program. This program will allow for the proper disposal of hazardous household products, such as paint, thinners, solvents, pesticides and similar products.

The Chairman of the Budget Committee noted that although the warrant for this Town Meeting addressed the matter of the Household Hazardous Waste Program, the Budget Committee had not included a line item for this program and therefore felt that it would not be appropriate to vote on this article at this meeting.

The Budget Committee had understood that the Solid Waste Committee had recommended NOT participating in the program as they had recommended a zero dollar figure for this program in their budget as it was presented to the Budget Committee on October 30, 1991.

Dan Smith, a member of the Solid Waste Committee, responded that their recommendation was that the expense not be a part of the Solid Waste Committee's budget. They did not recommend that participation be discontinued.

Discussion followed regarding the merits of the program.

The Chairman of the Budget Committee once again pointed out that the program had not been included in the budget and therefore no action should be taken on this matter. She quoted RSA 32:5.

Warren Lake noted that the budget could be amended under Article #16, "Report of the Budget Committee", when the entire Budget would be considered. At that time, the Budget could be amended to include an increase in the funding for the Solid Waste Committee.

Wayne Elliott raised a point of order noting that we had already voted on the Solid Waste Budget. The Moderator noted, in response, "We are not adding anything to the Sanitary Landfill Budget as far as I understand the matter." Wayne Elliott challenged Moderator's understanding, however, the majority of the voting body concurred with the Moderator.

The moderator reiterated that this article has nothing to do with the Sanitary Landfill budget.

Mark Thurston, member of the Budget Committee, re-read RSA 32:5.

Mr. Lake said that the body could vote to raise the "bottom line" of the Budget to include the funds for the Household Hazardous Waste program without addressing a specific line item.

Article #12 was accepted as read by a standing vote of 111 voting "yes" and 35 voting "no".

The meeting recessed from 9:05 PM to 9:20 PM.

Article 13. Subject: Surplus

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate from the December 31, 1991 General Fund surplus the sum of \$6,316 to be added to the Road Bridge Reconstruction Capital Reserve Fund, previously established.

Article #13 was accepted as read.

Article 14. Subject: Capital Reserve for Town Office Computer

To see if the Town will vote to close the Capital Reserve Fund established for the Town Office Computer and to authorize the Selectmen to expend the balance (\$948, plus interest) for the purchase of a desktop computer for use in the Town Offices.

Article #14 was accepted as read.

Article 15. Subject: Timber Revenue

To see if the Town will vote to authorize sales of timber and wood products from Town-owned lands and the revenue from such sales to be placed in the general fund. Such sales to be administered by the Conservation Commission. (This is to modify action taken on Article 8 of the 1988 Warrant).

Roger Shelton proposed the following amendment:

"To see if the Town will vote to authorize sales of wood and timber products from Town-owned lands and the revenue from such sales to be placed in the Town Bridges and Roads Capital Reserve Fund. Such sales to be administered by the Conservation Commission."

The above amendment was defeated.

Warren Lake, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, noted that the reason for including this article in the warrant was to clarify how the funds generated by the sale of timber and wood products from Town-owned lands are to be managed.

Article #15 was accepted as read.

Article 16. Subject: Budget Committee Report

To hear the report of the Budget Committee and to pass any vote in relation thereto.

This article was deferred until after Article #20.

Article 17. Subject: Sale of Land

To see if the Town will vote to approve the sale of a Town lot along Route 132, known as Lot 10 of Map 8, to abutting land owners, Donald and Patricia Kelly and to grant an easement to allow the Kellys to install septic system piping under and across the Class VI public road separating the Town lot from the Kellys' land. The sale price shall be at fair market value as determined by the town assessor for the time of sale. Proceeds shall be deposited in the General Fund to offset taxes. Recommended by the Selectmen.

Mr. Robert White of the Conservation Commission noted the Commission's opposition to the acceptance of this article as this property affords public parking and public access to the lake. He recommended that the Kellys consider a trade of land at a different location.

Warren Lake explained that this article carries the recommendation of the Selectmen because they felt that if the land was to be sold, it should be sold to the abutting owner rather than a third party.

Mr. Kelly explained that, although some years ago he had an approved septic design which did not encroach on the Town's lot, today's more stringent septic regulations would not accommodate an approved septic design.

Mr. Bodwell pointed out that the Town has other parking and public access to the lake through the Hermit Lake Beach lot.

Robert Laflam pointed out that the Kellys and the public access issue could be accommodated by granting an easement.

Article #17 was accepted as read.

Article 18. Subject: Easement

To see if the Town will vote to grant an easement to benefit land of Donald and Patricia Kelly for the purpose of installing an approved septic system on a Town lot, known as Lot 10 of Map 8. Said easement to include the right to place septic system piping under the Class VI public road separating the town lot from the Kelly land.

Article #18 was withdrawn with the unanimous consent of the voting body.

Article 19. Subject: Petition Article

"To sell to William K. Foster and Roseamond R. Foster for one dollar or other valuable considerations a certain parcel of property belonging to the Town of Sanbornton. Lot location approximately 1/4 mile south of the Conestoga Lodge on Route 132. Formerly Eastman property on Route 132, approximately 339 ft. on highway, elongate in shape, approximately 400 ft on abandoned road bordering land of Kelly, map 8 lot 4." Submitted by Petition.

Article #19 was dismissed with unanimous consent of the voting body.

Article 20. Subject: Other Business

To transact such other business as may legally come before the Town Meeting.

Warren Lake referred to the School District Meeting of March 21, 1992 noting that any vote passed in relation to the formula used for apportioning school costs would remain in effect for a five year period.

Article 16. Subject: Budget Committee Report

To hear the report of the Budget Committee and to pass any vote in relation thereto.

Judith Burlingame-Rich reported that based on the changes made at this meeting in Articles #7, 9#, #12, and #13, the total appropriations for the Town were \$1,337,044; that amount, less the estimated revenues of \$436,394, determined that the estimated amount to be raised by taxes was \$900,650.

The Budget Committee then accepted a friendly amendment from the Chairman of the Board of Selectmen to add \$1062 to Budget line #45 for insurance costs for the additional police vehicle voted in Article #9. The assembly voted to accept a total budget figure of \$1,338,106, of which an estimated \$901,712 is to be raised by taxes.

Article #20 The Budget Committee report was accepted.

Town Clerk's note: After reviewing the figures on the audio tape in Article #16, it appears that there was a transposed figure (\$1620 replaced \$1062) used in compiling the final figures of "Total of Appropriations" and "Estimated Amount to be Raised by Taxes" and that the Budget Committee had already included \$1062 for insurance costs.

The Moderator, Ralph Sleeper brought the meeting to order at 7:00 PM.

Article #1. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen as disbursing agents for the Capital Reserve Fund for the Development of a Town Recreation Park.

The first article having been moved and seconded, was opened for discussion.

Mr. Andy Prokosch asked for an explanation.

Daryl Woods, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen responded that the Town Recreation Park Committee, a sub-committee of the Recreation Commission is ready to take a step forward in the development of a Town Park. They wish to withdraw funds from this Capital Reserve Fund to pay for a survey of a Town-owned lot. He noted that a disbursing agent was not designated when the Capital Reserve Fund was originated.

Mr. Andy Prokosch inquired whether a site had been chosen. Mr. Donald Foudriat responded that after consulting with the Soil Conservation Service it was concluded that of the parcels owned by the Town, only the Dr. True Road Parcel was found to be suitable for a Recreation Park. They have determined the type of survey that would be necessary to enable the Department of Resources and Economic Development to lay out the park. The DRED would do this at no charge. However, expenses would be incurred for the survey. Mr. Foudriat also noted that they plan to apply for grants, including one from DRED for refurbishing the park. The committee would like to bring a proposal to Town Meeting in March; but in order formulate that proposal, expenses would be incurred.

Mr. Foudriat further noted that though this parcel is not in the geographical center of Town, the Community Survey conducted in 1990 indicated that the Dr. True Road site was favored.

Article #1 was accepted as read

Article #2. To transact such other business as may legally come before the meeting.

There being no other business, the meeting was adjourned.

TRUSTEES OF TRUST FUNDS REPORT

One of the pleasant duties of the Trustees of Trust Funds is that of disbursing money for scholarships to deserving young people who are going to college. The trustees administer two John Doe Taylor Scholarships. The Firemen's Memorial Scholarship Fund is held in trust by the trustees and is distributed by the firemen. Another, more recently established scholarship, the Douglass Prescott Scholarship Fund is in the growth stage.

One John Doe Taylor Fund is available for any college the student may choose. The other fund is restricted to students attending the University of New Hampshire. The Firemen's Memorial Fund is for relatives of firemen in the Sanbornton Volunteer Fire Department. There are no restrictions regarding the choice of college. The Prescott Fund is for students especially interested in architecture and related fields. Interested people may add to the principal of any of these funds by contacting the Trustees of Trust Funds.

Six scholarships were awarded for the 1992-93 academic year. Two John Doe Taylor Scholarships of \$1,000 each were awarded to students attending UNH. The students were Susan Cegelski and Jason John Jenkins. Two John Doe Taylor Scholarships of \$200 each were awarded to students attending colleges other than UNH. They were to Andrea Nicholls at Johnson and Wales University, Providence, RI, and Krista Jacques at Concord Tech.

Two other students were also awarded scholarships. Jennifer Moody at N.H. Technical Institute, and Paul Barnes at Daniel Webster College received \$500 each from the Firemen's Memorial Fund.

Students planning to apply for scholarships for the 1993-94 academic year should do so by April 15th. Application forms for the John Doe Taylor Scholarships are available at the Selectmen's Office and at the Winnisquam Regional High School counselor's office. Application forms for the Firemen's Memorial Fund Scholarships may be obtained from the firemen.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT ON FINANCIAL PRESENTATION

To the Members of
the Board of Selectmen
Town of Sanbornton
Sanbornton, New Hampshire

We have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements of the Town of Sanbornton as of and for the year ended December 31, 1992, as listed in the table of contents. These general purpose financial statements are the responsibility of the Town's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the general purpose financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the general purpose financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As described in Note 1B, the general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the General Fixed Assets Account Group, which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. The amount that should be recorded in the General Fixed Assets Account Group is not known.

In our opinion, except for the effect on the financial statements of the omission described in the preceding paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Town of Sanbornton as of December 31, 1992, and the results of its operations (and cash flows of its nonexpendable trust funds) for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole. The combining and individual fund financial statements listed in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Sanbornton. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the general purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly presented in all material respects in relation to the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Sanbornton in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Sanbornton, on Tuesday, the ninth (9th) day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
2. To vote on the following proposed elderly exemption:

Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:43-f for the adjusted elderly exemptions from property tax? These statutes provide for the following exemptions, based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers: for a person 65 years of age up to 75 years, \$10,000; for a person 75 years of age up to 80 years, \$15,000; for a person 80 years of age or older, \$20,000. To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 5 years; own real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by his spouse, they must have been married for at least 5 years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of less than \$10,000 or if married, a combined net income of less than \$12,000, and own net assets of \$30,000 or less, excluding the value of the person's residence."

3. To choose all necessary District Officers for the Winnisquam Regional School District.
4. To vote on the following proposed amendments to the Town Zoning Ordinances:

Amendment #1

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the planning board for the town zoning ordinance as follows:

Amend Article III General Provisions by adding new Section N. and existing Article XVII.S. (the definition of Lot) to define the town's practice regarding the merger of non-conforming lots under the same ownership to apply only to sub-standard lots?

Amendment #2

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the planning board for the town zoning ordinance as follows:

Amend Article III General Provisions Section E. to allow the Selectmen power to grant temporary housing permits for emergency situations?

Amendment #3

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 3 as proposed by the planning board for the town zoning ordinance as follows:

Amend Article III General Provisions by adding new Section O. to allow for the exemption of unoccupied utility structures of 200 sf or less from setback requirements of this ordinance?

Amendment #4

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 4 as proposed by petition for the town zoning ordinance as follows:

Amend the current Agricultural (A) zoning designation to General Residence (GR) for all land, and future sub-division thereof, identified on Tax Map 21, lots 51, 60, and 61-1, and including all land on the south side of Threshing Mill Brook identified on Tax Map 21, lot 31? (Disapproved by the Planning Board)

You are hereby notified to meet at the Sanbornton Life-Safety Building in said Sanbornton on Wednesday, the tenth (10th) day of March next, at seven of the clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. Subject: General Business

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to incur debt in anticipation of taxes in order to pay current maintenance and operation expenses and to insure a note or notes therefore; to administer any real estate acquired through Tax Collector's deeds; and to apply for, accept and expend such grants, funds, and gifts as may be available to the Town from private sources and from other governmental agencies; and to accept the dedication of any street shown on a subdivision plat approved by the planning board, provided that such street has been constructed to applicable town specifications as determined by the Board of Selectmen or their agent.

Article 2. Subject: Library

To see if the town will vote to authorize the Sanbornton Public Library to apply for, accept, and expend without further action by the Town Meeting, money which may become available during the fiscal year from the state, federal or other governmental units and private sources. The article or item shall be used only for legal purposes for which a town may appropriate money; not require the expenditure of other town funds; and be exempt from all provisions of RSA 32, relative to limitations and expenditures of town funds.

Article 3. Subject: Library Trustees

To see if the town will vote to allow the Library Trustees to increase in number from three to five members.

Article 4. Subject: Highways and Streets

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$302,339 for the maintenance of highways and streets, to be expended as follows: \$231,408 for general operations of the highway department; and \$11,000 for the purchase of a new road sander; and \$70,931 received from the highway block grant will be used to reclaim already paved sections of Perley Hill Road, Hunkins Pond Road and the Woodman Road.

Article 5. Subject: Fire Department

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$38,810 for the operation of the Sanbornton Fire Department.

Article 6. Subject: Police Department

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$158,481 for the operation of the Sanbornton Police Department.

Article 7. Subject: Police Department 4-Wheel Drive Vehicle

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,760 for the second and final payment on the Police Department 4-wheel drive vehicle. (The first lease payment was approved by the 1992 Town Meeting, Article #8.)

Article 8. Subject: Police Department Cruiser

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,600 for the first year lease of a new Police Department cruiser. This will replace the oldest front line vehicle.

Article 9. Subject: Capital Reserve Funds

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the following sums of money of which:

\$3,000 is to be placed in the Capital Reserve for Heavy Equipment; and

\$37,000 is to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for the Sanitary Landfill; and

\$2,000 is to be placed in the Town Bridges and Roads Capital Reserve Fund; and

\$30,000 to be placed in the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund; and

\$15,000 is to be placed in the Sanbornton Fire Department Repair and Refurbishing Capital Reserve Fund.

Article 10. Subject: Town Park Development

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000 to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for Development of a Town Recreation Park on town owned land located on Dr. True Road (Map 11, Lot 71).

Article 11. Subject: Solid Waste Disposal

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$43,758 for the disposal of solid waste, \$42,013 of which is for the operation of the sanitary landfill/recycling center, and \$1,745 for the annual Household Hazardous Waste Collection Program.

Article 12. Subject: Budget Committee Report

To hear the report of the Budget Committee and to pass any vote in relation thereto.

Article 13. Subject: Sale of Land

To see if the town will vote to approve the sale of a 2.25 acre town lot (Lot 4, Map 26) on Pound Road, a class VI road, to an abutting land owner, Robert Williams. The sale price shall be the fair market value as determined by the town assessor at the time of sale plus all recording and transfer costs. Proceeds shall be deposited in the general fund to reduce taxes. Recommended by the Selectmen.

Article 14. Subject: Cable Television

To hear a report from the Selectmen and the Cable Television Committee relative to installation of cable television in the town and the 5% franchise fee.

Article 15. Subject: Emergency 911

To hear a report from the Fire Department relative to street numbering in Sanbornton in preparation for implementation of Enhanced Emergency 911.

Article 16. Subject: Other Business

To transact such other business as may legally come before the Town Meeting.

The Town entered into a lease-purchase option agreement for a police cruiser. The final payment of \$8,122 will be paid in 1993.

All debt is general obligation debt of the Town, which is backed by its full faith and credit.

The lease-purchase agreement contains non-appropriation funding clauses whereby, in the event no funds or insufficient funds are appropriated by the Town, the lease shall terminate without penalty or expense to the Town.

Legal Debt Margin

The amount of long-term debt that can be incurred by the Town is limited by State law. Except as otherwise provided, Town borrowing in general may not exceed one and seventy-five hundredths percent (1.75%) of the valuation of property based upon the applicable locally assessed valuation of the municipality as last equalized by the Commissioner of Revenue Administration under RSA 21-3:3 XIII. At December 31, 1992, the Town of Sanbornton is using an equalized value of \$148,684,386 and a legal debt margin of \$2,601,977.

NOTE 5 - SHORT-TERM DEBT**A. Tax Anticipation Notes Payable**

State Statutes allow the Town to incur debt up to the amount of the current property tax levy, or the amount of the prior-year levy if the tax amount has not been determined for the current year at the time of borrowing, in anticipation of the taxes in order to pay current maintenance and operation expenses. Notes issued in accordance with these statutes are general obligations of the Town.

FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

The Sanbornton Fire Department responded to 216 calls for the year. Since emergency medical calls headed the list for assistance from the department, new priorities are being developed to better handle these calls. Department-wide training is now being conducted in the EMS field, in conjunction with the standard fire training, with EMS and Fire cross training being mandatory for new members. This will provide for faster and better patient assessment and care, as well as fire fighting functions.

Fire suppression programs are still on-going progressively. New and younger people in the department are aggressively entering programs to further their knowledge in the fire fighting field.

A new emergency calling program is being implemented state-wide. This program is E911, and will be on line in 1995. At the present time, the SFD is in the process of gathering the information and mapping the town for this program. We are well into the process and should be completed within a year with the data for the 911 computer. This program will benefit all, and will be a valuable tool in the system.

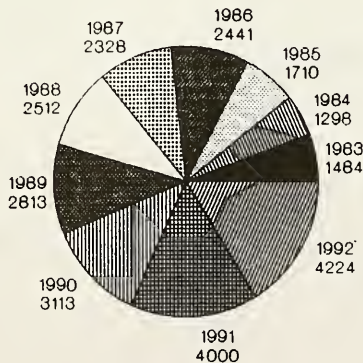

SOLID WASTE COMMITTEE REPORT

The time is approaching when our landfill will need to be closed. Modern methods of disposal no longer allow for dumping of trash on the earth without a means of controlling possible groundwater pollution. Our landfill does not have a bottom liner to catch the pollutants and, therefore, must be closed in the not too distant future. An impermeable cap will be constructed over the landfill area so water will not be able to run through the trash and carry contaminants into the groundwater. Unfortunately, household trash is no longer composed entirely of environmentally benign materials, but has become, to a certain degree, toxic.

As the closure of our landfill becomes more imminent, it becomes important that we plan for our town's future method of trash disposal. We probably will be sending our trash elsewhere, as on-site disposal methods (i.e. modern double-lined landfill, incineration) appear too costly. Constructing a transfer station at the present landfill/recycling facility is a viable option. Joining with another town or towns in the area to build a centralized transfer station is another option.

In the next 2 years, we as a town will need to make some important decisions about how we want to dispose of our trash. This will involve both environmental and economic considerations. For example, our operating budget for trash disposal could easily quadruple in the coming years. It is, therefore, important that we carefully examine our options.

If you are interested in being involved in this planning process, please consider becoming a member of the Solid Waste Committee. We need all the help we can get!

SEWER COMMITTEE REPORT

The Sewer Committee continued in its role of advising the Board of Selectmen relative to Sanbornton's participation in the Winnepesaukee River Basin Project (WRBP). Committee members are: Donald Foudriat (Chairman), Andy D'Angelo (Secretary), Tom Salatiello (Selectmen's Representative), Everett Joslyn (Health Officer), and Stephen Goodwin. Earl Leighton, Sr. continued to serve as Alternate.

During 1992, the Committee reviewed problems and recommended adjustments on abatements where applicable. The recommended billing rate for 1993 was the same as the 1992 rate, which adequately covered the WRBP billings and town administrative costs.

Committee interest in the WRBP Advisory Council heightened as a result of project interest in evaluating outside contractor operation of the sewage treatment plant and interceptor system. We participated with other Council members and plant staff in evaluating the qualifications of eight outside contractors, and selected the four best qualified for requests for proposals to operate the plant and/or system. This initiative is now ongoing. Eventually, a decision to engage an outside contractor or continue with the state operation, will need to be made. The Committee plans to follow and participate in this decision.

RECREATION COMMISSION REPORT

As we reflect back upon 1992, we recall a very busy year aided by the time and energy of many town volunteers. During 1992, the Recreation Commission organized and coordinated 15 programs, and sponsored and/or assisted with 3 other town programs. The community enthusiastically participated in the wide range of programs offered.

BEACH PROGRAM. A major task of the Commission is to coordinate and implement the Beach Program. Joanna Hoffman was hired to supervise the operation of the beaches, to coordinate summer programming and to teach swim lessons. The Beach Program involved three components:

1. **BEACHES:** Preparation of town beaches at Hermit Lake and Winnisquam Lake for summer usage included the following: cleaning debris away; applying new sand; repairing and anchoring rafts; putting out safety buoys; arranging for telephone service, garbage pickup, water testing and toilet facilities; and repair of vandalized beach houses. Throughout the summer, Commission members continued to monitor proper usage and maintenance of the beaches. At the end of the season, the beaches were cleaned and equipment properly stored away. A "carry in/carry out" method of trash removal was attempted this year. Initially, several problems were encountered which were resolved during the summer. We anticipate the "carry in/carry out" approach will be effective, thus will utilize it again next summer.

2. **LIFEGUARDS:** The Commission advertised, interviewed, hired and supervised three Red Cross certified lifeguards to maintain safety at both beaches, seven days a week, throughout the summer. Our lifeguards were James Knowlton, Bethany Clark and Leah Mason.

3. **WATER SAFETY INSTRUCTION:** Lessons were provided at both lakes, to over 111 Sanbornton children, by instructor Joanna Hoffman.

SOCCER. This was the seventh successful year of the Sanbornton Youth Soccer Program. We had 130 children, grades K - 8, who participated. Thirty-five local parents and community members volunteered their time to coach, prepare the fields, referee and provide refreshments. The practice and games were played on Saturday mornings and Thursday evenings, September 12th through October 24th. Sanbornton Central and Sant Bani Schools provided the playing fields. This year, games were played against Tilton/Northfield teams and Franklin teams. An awards ceremony, held at the Sanbornton Central Field was enjoyed by soccer participants and their families.

TENNIS. An adult round robin of singles and doubles ran throughout the summer, in which 34 adult players participated. Thirty-three children and adults took tennis lessons which were taught by tennis pro Peter Fagan at the Winnisquam High School courts.

COED SOFTBALL. For the third year, coed softball was played weekly at the Baptist Church bay field throughout the summer months.

HALLOWEEN PARTY. A Halloween haunted house was held at the Sanbornton Town Hall, which included a haunted walk, refreshments, games and entertainment.

ARTS AND CRAFTS, SPORTS, THEATER, AND WATER CARNIVAL. In its fourth year, the summer program offered many activities. Joanna Hoffman, along with assistant Any McDougal, conducted arts and crafts and sports (192 participants), theater (18), a water carnival at Hermit Lake beach (76), a scavenger hunt (24), and a junior olympics (30) at Old Home Day. Will Ellis conducted a baseball program for thirty-five 7 to 10 year olds at the Sanbornton Central Field. Chuck Wyman coached soccer skills to approximately 40 youths.

AEROBICS. Sanbornton aerobic instructors, Elaine DeMello, Lynn Abraham, Bert Whetstone, Edythe Grant and Ken Randall volunteered their time to provide an adult coed aerobics program, offered twice a week at the Town Hall.

The Commission also sponsored and/or assisted with several Town recreation programs. These included skating lessons and family skating at the Tilton School Rink, support for the Sanbornton Youth Baseball League, and a youth skiing program at Highlands Ski Area.

Commission goals for 1992 were fulfilled. A wide range of safe and quality leisure and recreation programs were offered to community members of all ages and abilities. Goals for 1993 include:

1. To continue to promote safe and quality leisure and recreation programs at a minimal cost to the town.
2. To support and offer assistance to the Town Park Development Committee.
3. To expand and seek new members for the Commission.
4. To broaden programs offered to the Sanbornton adult population, especially the senior citizens. To offer youth basketball.
5. To conduct a survey of summer program needs.

The Commission would like to thank the many community members who volunteered their time, energy and creative ideas to this year's programs. We would especially like to thank Alison Pancoe and Judee Wood for the many years of devoted service they have given to the Recreation Commission.

TOWN PARK DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE REPORT

Nineteen ninety-two was an active and rewarding year for the Town Park Committee. Community members and volunteers have worked many hours to develop a plan with a recommendation to Town Meeting in 1993 for a Town Park location.

A Town-owned piece of land on Dr. True Road, close to the Town Beach on Lake Winnisquam is being proposed as the site to be developed to initially meet the Town's immediate recreational needs. The recreation area suggested would be limited to six acres on the sixty acre property. The remaining land will be managed by the Conservation Commission as forest land. Initially, baseball and soccer fields, along with a parking area is being planned. Future ideas include ice skating, a picnic pavilion/covered shelter, along with playground equipment and multipurpose tennis/basketball courts.

A property survey and soil sample analyses were conducted this past Fall to identify a suitable location for the project. Valuable assistance from the Town Planner helped in formulating practical solutions for best use of the Dr. True Road property.

The Committee worked with the State Department of Resources and Economic Development to design a conceptual plan, which was unveiled at a public informational hearing on February 2, 1993. Members of the park group represent a diversified cross section of Town volunteers, including representation from the Board of Selectmen, Budget Committee, Planning Board, Recreation Commission, Conservation Commission, and Forestry Committee.

Various funding sources were investigated. The Town submitted a detailed request to the State Division of Parks and Recreation for federal funding assistance. Unfortunately, in January of 1993, our request for \$25,000 in matching funds was not approved. With 39 cities and towns applying this year, Sanbornton scored very well with 51 points, which was only 8 points below the funding cut off level. We hope to try again next year.

A Friends for Recreation group, a non-profit organization is being formed to raise funds for the park. Financial support from the Town will help to initiate the project. Continued volunteer efforts will also be extremely important and necessary to achieve success.

The Committee thanks the residents of Sanbornton who have supported the Town Park vision. In 1993, this vision may at last become a reality.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT

The Commission had an active year. The Forestry Subcommittee continues to monitor the improvement cutting on Town-owned land. The cutting on the Eastman Hill (Schoolhouse Hill) lot has ceased and all of the members became involved in the trail planning and clearing under the invaluable direction of Hal & Peggy Graham of Trailwrights, Inc. The first loop of the trail is cut and marked and ready to be enjoyed. If interest in this project is shown by townspeople, the system will be extended. Volunteers will be needed to maintain the present trail and help in clearing for expansion. Because of the diversity of this property, it is hoped that the area will be used as a teaching ground for agricultural and forest practices.

A local student, Tim Wood, was sponsored for Conservation Camp at Bear Brook State Park. Students interested in this camp should contact Faith Tobin.

Several on-site inspections were made for dredge and fill applications, and recommendations were made to the Wetlands Board. Conservation Easements continue to be monitored by our members. On the lighter side, members of the Commission joined in the fun of Market Day with a float in the parade.

Requests from individuals wishing to purchase Town-owned land were reviewed with recommendations to the Selectmen. It is the feeling of the Commission that no Town-owned land should be disposed of without a thorough investigation into its present and future value to the Town. If such land is judged to be of no potential use to the Town, it should be disposed of by public auction.

Virginia Hutton, a valued member of the Commission until moving from Sanbornton, was honored at a small ceremony at which she was made an Honorary Member of the Commission, and the first loop of the Eastman Hill Trail was named the "Virginia Hutton Trail" in her honor.

SANBORNTON PUBLIC LIBRARY REPORT

It has been a challenging year, as we endeavor to answer the increasing demands for library services, while keeping in mind fiscal responsibility. We are fortunate in having help from volunteers who assist during our busiest hours, helping staff members to respond more efficiently to our readership.

As the Town grows, new residents find their way to the library door. Along with the many offerings of TV with all its attractions, many of our townspeople are avid readers. Circulation figures reflect this, as does the increase in registration of borrowers.

The working relationship between the Sanbornton Central School and the library continues, to the benefit of students and their teachers, and to the library. Children are introduced to the joy of reading and the library becomes, to them, a familiar and home-like place. From these beginnings come the patrons of tomorrow. To maintain this relationship with the children, story hours and summer programs are ongoing events.

There has been a change of personnel, beginning in September, 1992, when Mary Ahlgren, after five years as an assistant to the librarian, resigned in order to accept a full time position as Children's Librarian in Franklin. We were sorry to lose her, but are proud that her special talents have been recognized.

Retired librarian, Jean Wright, filled in efficiently for us for part of the Fall, and special thanks are due to her. We are happy to report that we have engaged the services of Debbie Clement, a local resident with library experience, as Children's Librarian. Her position starts in January, 1993.

Because of state and local demands for better library service, the trustees have voted to increase their number, keeping within state RSAs. They will be enlarged to five trustees instead of three, always keeping an odd number as mandated by town and state rules. This added number will spread the work of library needs, staff needs, and building's needs among the larger number of people. All the trustees are volunteers and are to be commended for faithful and continuous work given to the library.

LAKES REGION PLANNING COMMISSION REPORT

The LRPC - Lakes Region Planning Commission - is a voluntary, non-profit corporation enabled by state legislation to address regional issues and to provide services to member towns in the region. The LRPC continued to provide basic services to the Town of Sanbornton during 1992. These services are provided to the Town through the annual membership fee. Typically, these services take the form of providing assistance to various Town offices as well as the Planning Board, Zoning Board of Adjustment, Town Landfill Committee, Conservation Committee, Hazardous Waste Committee and other organizations.

The Town's support enables the LRPC to undertake comprehensive regional planning, and to carry out various projects and programs of regional benefit. Technical assistance has been provided to Sanbornton through its contract with LRPC to provide a professional planner on a part-time basis. This person is called a Circuit Rider Planner. The planner devotes most of his time to Planning Board issues, problems and ordinances. He does have full access to the services and tools of the LRPC, which is headquartered in Meredith, NH.

The LRPC has enhanced its geographic information systems capability. Two trained staff people now provide advice regarding this system. The LRPC sponsored such events as Legislative Night, where state legislators addressed water quality, ground water legislation and solid waste legislation. It also sponsored the Regional Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day. In addition, the LRPC produced a Regional Transportation Plan and held four public hearings in the Lakes Region.

Each town's dues are the source of basic funding to the Lakes Region Planning Commission. As this funding continues, the LRPC's ability to request funds from other sources is enhanced. The LRPC fosters the orderly development of the region through cooperative and coordinated actions in the areas of land use planning, transportation planning, environmental planning, economic development, and use of its geographic information system.

The LRPC is composed of 32 Lakes Region communities, most of which have representation as Commissioners to the LRPC. The basic concept here is to share information, avoid costly duplication, and where possible, to standardize forms, plans, documentation, and systems.

YOUTH ASSISTANCE PROGRAM REPORT

This year marks the 17th anniversary of the Youth Assistance Program, the first court diversion program in the State of New Hampshire. The present staff of two, Dawn Shimberg and Martha Douglass have worked for the program for seven years. Volunteers help young people on review boards, companion programs, and on the Board of Directors. Major financial support comes from the three towns that are served: Northfield, Sanbornton and Tilton. For the past three years, the towns have received financial assistance from Belknap and Merrimack Counties. Funding from the counties, however, may diminish during the next year, and may be unavailable for 1994. The Challenge Program, sponsored by the Winnisquam Regional School System and the Youth Assistance Program, is a substance abuse training program for youth, independently funded with a grant from the Governor's Drug Free Schools Program.

The Youth Assistance Program was founded to serve youths and their families within their communities. The belief that young people in need can be served by people in the place where they live was important from the beginning. Although many diversion programs have developed throughout the state, the majority of them are community based and dedicated to the belief that "communities taking care of their own" is still a sensible New Hampshire tradition. Facility and staff are more accessible. Volunteers help friends and neighbors, as well as themselves, by serving to improve their towns. Direction comes from people closer to the needs at hand than could be possible if these diversion and prevention programs were controlled by county or state. The Youth Assistance Program remains independent; always aware of and addressing the needs of the neighborhoods. This area is noted throughout the country for a high rate of alcoholism, teen pregnancy and school dropouts. Drug related problems and AIDS are frightening to everyone--and on the rise. The Youth Assistance Program works to address these problems and others that are being faced by our families and young people.

STATE REPRESENTATIVE ROBERT LAFLAM'S REPORT

STATE BUDGET: In his budget address to the Legislature, Governor Merrill affirmed his pledge of NO broad-based sales tax or income tax in this biennial budget. Other highlights:

1. Additional \$8 million for repair of municipal bridges.
2. Direct aid of \$350 million, including \$122 million in revenue sharing.
3. \$21 million, instead of bonding, to pay for local sewer grants.
4. Surplus Rainy Day Fund distributed to cities and towns.
5. Increasing Medicaid eligibility of needy children from age 1-9.
6. School based low-cost health insurance for uninsured children.
7. Reduce business profits tax and eliminate "small" business filing requirement.
8. Reduce real estate transfer tax and telecommunications tax.
9. \$2.3 million for Post Secondary Technical Education.

Governor Merrill concluded with the remark that "this budget will provide a tax structure that will be even more beneficial to our citizens; it will protect our environment; it will educate our children."

CLEAN AIR ACT AND EMISSIONS TESTING: The 1990 Clean Air Act directs the requirement to significantly reduce smog-forming emissions by 1999. Presently, four southern counties, including Merrimack, do not meet air quality standards. With 1995 testing implementation on the horizon, the Legislature is currently embroiled in public debate as to how to implement a vehicle emissions testing program. The scenario, which envisions \$17-25 test costs prior to registration, is compounded by the problems of retesting and repair of failed vehicles, costs, and enforcement depending on whether or not vehicle testing is implemented in four counties or state-wide.

SAFE DRINKING WATER ACT: Compliance with this act requires state monitoring of some 2300 water systems serving more than 25 persons. More specifically, the Surface Water Treatment Rule requires some 34 public water systems, including Tilton and New Hampton to either build a filtration system or locate an underground source. House Bill 435 requires the state to pay 20% of annual cost of servicing debt of public-owned systems.

As a freshman legislator, I sit on the Resources, Recreation and Development Committee. I have quickly learned that the laws of New Hampshire are made in the committee trenches and that it is a full time job being heard in my own committee, as well as the others. Representing local constituents and concerns, I have testified on a number of issues, including water rights; the revocation of the 1927 Tilton-Northfield School District legislation; wetlands protection; golf course fee-tax; oil spill clean up; Laconia State Prison; and others.
