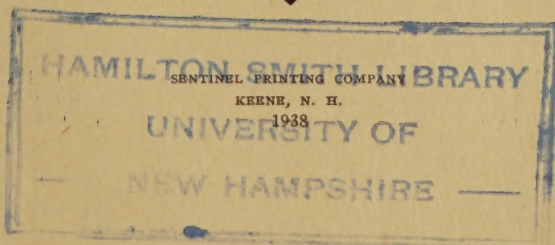

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Sullivan in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Sullivan on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see what sums of money the town will raise in addition to that required by law for building and repairing highways and bridges, or take any action relating thereto.

4. To see if the town will accept state aid construction of Class II road known as Beaver Brook Road and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$292.50 or will accept state aid for construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$276.00.

5. To see if the town will vote to raise or appropriate money for the repairing of the Spaulding Brook Bridge, or take any action relating thereto.

6. To see if the town will vote to raise or appropriate money to build a new Bridge or Culvert on the North Road over the Meeting House Brook, or take any action relating thereto.

7. To elect a Delegate to the Constitutional Convention.

8. To see if the town will vote to pay for digging graves and going with the hearse for residents.

9. To see what sum or money the town will raise in addition to that required by law for the support of the public library.

10. To see if the town will vote to raise money for Memorial Day or take any action relating thereto.

11. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to borrow money on the credit of the town in anticipation of taxes.

12. To see if the town will vote to raise \$500.00 or more toward the payment of the tractor notes, or take any action relating thereto.

13. To see what sum of money the town will raise or appropriate for Old Age Assistance, or take any action relating thereto.

14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$18.41 to The Monadnock Region Association of Scenic New Hampshire for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, calling attention to the resource and natural advantages of the town, in cooperation with the other thirty-seven towns in the Monadnock Region.

15. To see if the town will vote to help stamp out the white pine blister disease and raise money for the same, or take any action thereto.

16. To see what sum of money the town will raise for removal of snow from the highway.

17. To see if the town will vote to purchase some snow fence and raise money for the same.

18. To see if the town will vote to raise or appropriate money for Old Home Day or take any action relating thereto.

19. To hear the reports of agents, auditors or committees heretofore chosen, or take any action thereon.

20. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.
