## SCHOOL REPORT.

---

Schools have been maintained in six of the nine districts of the town. The whole number of scholars attending not less than two weeks was 103,—boys 52, girls 61. Average attendance for the year, 70 $\frac{1}{4}$ . Amount of money appropriated for the support of schools, \$658. Literary fund, \$73.71. Other sources, \$16. Amount to each scholar, \$7.26. Length of summer terms in weeks, 8. Fall terms, 14, except one school, which was 11 $\frac{1}{2}$  weeks.

*Bashan.*—Miss Augusta H. Eaton, teacher. Summer term, wages a month including board, 26; number of scholars, 17; average attendance, 14. Fall term, wages \$28; number of scholars, 21; average, 16.

*Corser Hill.*—Miss Sarah E. Sawyer, teacher. Wages a month, \$24. Summer term, number of scholars, 20; average attendance, 18. Fall term, number of scholars, 22; average, 18.

*Little Hill.*—Miss Ellen K. Abbott, teacher. Wages a month, \$16. Summer term, number of scholars, 4; average attendance, 3.7. Fall term, number of scholars, 4; average attendance, 3.5. Length of fall term, 11 $\frac{1}{2}$  weeks.

*Putney.*—Miss Mary R. Webster, teacher. Wages a month, \$24. Summer term, number of scholars, 23; average attendance, 18. Fall term, number of scholars, 18; average attendance, 13.

*Sweatt's Mills.*—Summer term, Miss Lessie E. Thurston, teacher. Wages a month, \$20. Number of scholars, 13. Fall term, Miss Ida L. Sweatt, teacher. Wages a month, \$22; number of scholars, 16; average, 14.



*White Plain.*—Miss Lizzie M. Carpenter, teacher. Wages a month, \$18. Summer term, number of scholars, 6; average, 4. Fall term, number of scholars, 9; average, 6.

Of the four ladies whose names are first mentioned in this report, it is proper to observe that they are teachers of extensive experience, thorough qualifications, and mature judgment. Their schools were judiciously managed, correctly instructed, and exhibited evidence of improvement that appeared to be satisfactory to those most deeply interested. The teacher of the fall term at Sweatt's Mills may also rank in this class. The others entered their schools without previous experience, but each, in her capacity, did what she could for the boys and girls committed to her charge. The teacher at White Plain retained her situation during the year, and her efforts and attainments were such as to merit encouragement to persevere in the honorable and responsible occupation of a teacher.

An examination of the books in use at the commencement of the year revealed the fact that many of the readers were in a dilapidated condition, some of them having broken loose from their bindings and gone to pieces like the "one hoss shay." As a mere matter of economy, it was thought best to exchange them for a new series. The result was an increased interest in the reading classes of nearly every school in town.

Most of the school-houses are in a comfortable state of preservation. Perhaps the five per cent. allowed for temporary repairs may answer for a year or two before a larger appropriation will be needed for more extensive improvements. The house at Sweatt's Mills, however, furnishes an exception. For twenty-five years this old building has been reported unfit for its purpose. The heavy burden of taxation necessary for the payment of the public debt, together with the exemption for a time of certain real estate in the vicinity from taxes, affords a reasonable excuse for the apparent negligence. But these conditions are now practically removed. By a system of purchase and equalization, the school-houses have become town property, and every citizen must take his share of responsibility for their condition. A prudent regard for our own reputation would seem to suggest the propriety of furnishing a new and commodious school-house at the business centre of the town.

We must act conscientiously with reference to our educational interests. A word or a ballot employed in a worthy cause may seem a trifling thing, but who can estimate, in its beneficent results, "how far that little candle shall throw its beams." "The mightiest works of human hands live but an age before they fall," but the words we speak and the efforts we put forth for the benefit of the young, will be repeated and reflected along the generations when our voices are silent and our work is done.

With these suggestions the foregoing report is respectfully submitted.
