RESIDENCE OF BENJAMIN THOMPSON

The picture on the cover is that of the home of Benjamin Thompson, benefactor of the University of New Hampshire. It stood on the north-east corner of Main Street and Madbury Road. The house was owned by James Leighton, a soldier of the Revolution, who later served with distinction under John Paul Jones aboard the Ranger. In 1790 Leighton sold it to his brother-in-law, Benjamin Thompson, Senior. Benjamin Thompson, Junior was born here on April 22, 1806 and lived here all his life. At his death, January 30, 1890, he bequeathed the house to the State of New Hampshire for use of the new Agricultural College. The house was occupied by President C. S. Murkland and later as a girls' dormitory until destroyed by fire on December 12, 1897. The land is the site of the new federal building to be erected to house the United States Post Office and Federal Offices.

MINUTES OF THE 226TH TOWN MEETING
Durham, New Hampshire
March 12, 1957

The meeting was called to order at 9:00 A.M. by Arthur W. Johnson, Moderator and the warrant read by him. As directed by the Town Meeting of March 13, 1956 the polls were open for balloting on 1 and 6 but action on the Warrant was to be postponed until 7 o'clock in the evening. Polls were held open throughout the town meeting; discussion of Warrant was opened at 7 o'clock P.M. and Polls closed and meeting adjourned at 9 o'clock P.M.

Total number of votes cast 408.

Article 2 — Budget — Moved by J. C. Chamberlin and seconded by Leavitt that action on this article be postponed until action had been taken on Articles three through nine. Motion Carried.

Article 3 — County Tax — Moved by Henry Davis and seconded by Samuel Hoitt that the provisions of this article be adopted. Motion was carried.

Article 4 — Borrowing in Anticipation of Taxes — Moved by Theodore R. Myers and seconded by Mathias Richards that the provisions of this article be adopted. Motion carried.

Article 5 — Tax discount if paid on or before a certain date — Moved by William Wolf and seconded by Lawrence Slanetz that the provisions of this article be adopted. Motion carried.

Article 7 — Authority to negotiate for and acquire a right of way — Moved by Russell Skelton and seconded by Kenneth Barraclough that the

provisions of this article be adopted. Amendment offered by Richard Howard and seconded by William Wolfe that the words "and acquire" be stricken from the motion. Amendment lost. Amendment offered by William Wolfe that "and acquire by expenditure of a sum not to exceed \$100.00" there being no second to this amendment motion was lost. By vote on the original motion the Motion was carried.

Article 8 — Town Improvement near Newmarket Road Bridge by Old Landing road — Moved by Henry Davis and seconded by Russell Skelton that the provisions of this article be adopted. Amendment offered by Perley Fitts and seconded by Malcolm Chase that the sum of \$100.00 be stricken from the article and from the budget and that the Forrest Smith Improvement Fund be used to carry on this project. Amendment carried. Original motion as amended was carried.

Article 9 — Advertising in Seacoast Region — Moved by Sam Hoitt and seconded by Dan Ninde that no money be appropriated for the purpose of this article. Amendment offered by Perley Fitts and seconded by Wallace Chapin that the article be adopted with an appropriation of \$200.00. Amendment lost. The original motion as put was carried.

Article 2 — Town Budget — Moved by Henry Davis and seconded by Francis Robinson that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100,265.11 for the purposes of the Town Budget. Motion Carried.

Motion by John Holden and seconded by A. D. Van Allen that articles 10-11-12-13-14 be discussed simultaneously. Motion carried.

Articles 10-11-12-13-14 all pertaining to revisions of the Durham Zoning Ordinance proposed.

Moved by Russell Skelton and seconded by Lathrop Merrick that the provisions of Article 10 be adopted. Moved by Ursula Bowring seconded by Max Abell that all of articles 10 through 14 be tabled for one year or until the Town Meeting of March 1958. Motion declared carried. Doubt expressed, so a standing vote was called. Motion carried by a vote of 216 to 68.

Motion offered by Rhoda Hogan and seconded by Silas Weeks that the following recommendations be made to the Planning Board for procedure before the next Town Meeting — "I recommend that the Planning Board in connection with Zoning recommendations for the College Brook Area, submit a general development plan including proposed roads, area to be reserved for off street parking, etc. in order that the voters may have a better idea of the future development of the area." Signed by Silas Weeks.

"It is recommended to the Planning Board that proposed amendments to the zoning regulations shall be discussed at a public hearing no later than three (3) months prior to Town Meeting, with notice of such hearing

as well as the proposed amendments to be sent to each registered voter ten (10) days in advance of the hearing." signed by Rhoda Hogan.

Motion to carry the recommendations was adopted.

Article 15 — Establishment of a Fire District — Moved by Russell Skelton and seconded by Lathrop Merrick that the provisions of this article, sections 1 through 6 be adopted. Motion carried.

Under Article 16 — Any other business — Lawrence Slanetz, Health Officer acting in behalf of the New Hampshire Dental Society presented a Plaque to the Town of Durham in recognition of its contribution to better health through the fluoridation of its water supply.

Attorney Joseph Millimet was introduced by James C. Chamberlin and he briefed the assembly on the pending Boston and Maine Railroad accident case in which suits pending between the Town and the Boston and Maine R. R.; Mr. Bickford the injured engineer and James Pike, whose equipment was involved.

Moved by Mrs. Nielson and seconded by Wayne Koch that Town Meeting be held in 1958 as in 1957, with the polls being opened at 9:00 A.M. and discussion of the Warrant to take place beginning at 7:00 P.M. Amendment offered by Arthur Stewart and seconded That Polls be opened at 4:00 P.M. and action on warrant take place beginning at 7:00 P.M. Amendment carried. Original motion as amended was carried.

Because of the difficulty in hearing discussions both from the floor and from the chair it was suggested by Clayton Cross that a loud speaker be provided for the use of the Town Meeting. A motion was offered by Harold Leavitt and seconded by Wayne Koch that a loud speaker be hired for the use of the next Town Meeting with the expense being charged against election expenses. Motion was carried.

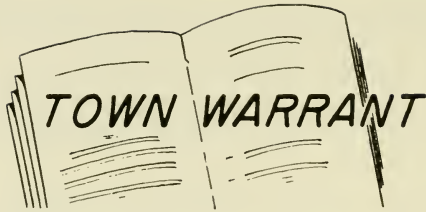
Mrs. Isabel Meyers suggested a standing vote of thanks for all of the Town Officials who had devoted so much of their time and energy for the benefit of the Town.

Oyster River Cooperative School Auditorium

Two Hundred and Twenty-Seventh Meeting

*To the inhabitants of the Town of Durham, County of Strafford,
State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Oyster River Cooperative School Auditorium, Durham, N. H., Tuesday the eleventh day of March, 1958, A.D. at four o'clock in the afternoon to act on the following subjects: (NOTE—Voting on ballot items will begin at 4:00 P.M. Action on other articles in the warrant postponed until 7:00 P.M. by vote of Town meeting of 1957.)

1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for a term of three (3) years, a Town Treasurer, a Collector of Taxes, one Auditor for a term of three (3) years, one Auditor for a term of two (2) years, one Auditor for a term of one (1) year, one Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three (3) years, four members of the Budget Committee for a term of three (3) years, and all other elective officers for the ensuing year.

2. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the budget as submitted by the Budget Committee (see details following) and that the sum of One hundred thirteen thousand one hundred forty one dollars and three cents (\$113,141.03) be raised and appropriated for the purposes of it.

3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of approximately Fourteen Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$14,500.00) to defray its share of the Strafford County Government.

4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow necessary money in anticipation of taxes.

5. To see if the Town will direct a discount of one percent (1%) to be made to those persons who shall pay their taxes within a period of six (6) weeks from the date the Tax Rate is approved by the State Tax Commission.

6. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 287 of the Revised Statutes Annotated of the State of New Hampshire relative to playing games of Beano. (See ballot)

7. To see if the Town will vote to adopt an amendment to Article 1, Section 2 of the Zoning Ordinance for the purpose of extending the Class A Business District southerly. The westerly boundary to be Mill Road, the easterly boundary to be the stone wall which is the westerly boundary of the Red Tower Apartments, the southerly boundary described as follows: — beginning on the east side of Mill Road, 100 feet north of the center of College Brook, thence running easterly and parallel to the southerly line of the Osgood property a distance of about 630 feet; thence southeasterly in a straight line to the center of Chesley Lane. All the land north of said line to be rezoned Business A, all the land south of said line to remain as presently zoned.

8. To see if the Town will vote to adopt an amendment to Article I, Section 2 of the Zoning Ordinance for the purpose of extending the present Residential District boundaries as follows: —

- (a) The existing Residential area lying generally north of Main Street and between the east side of the B. & M. R.R. to an easterly boundary 300 feet east of the Dover Road to be extended northerly to the Madbury Town Line.

- (b) The present Residential District lying generally south of Main Street to be extended southerly 600 feet from the south shore of Oyster River between the right-of-way of the B. & M. R.R. and the west shore of Mill Pond. In addition the present Residential zoned strip 300 feet wide on the westerly side of Newmarket Road to be extended westerly to Mill Pond and to the Longmarsh Brook on the south.

9. To see if the Town will vote to adopt an amendment to Article I, Section 2 of the Zoning Ordinance for the purpose of establishing a new Residential District to be defined as Class III Residential District. The boundaries of this district to be as follows: The Class III Residential District shall include all the land lying north of Oyster River and part of Little Bay to a line 200 feet north of and parallel to Piscataqua Road. The westerly boundary being the brook, approximately $\frac{1}{4}$ mile east of the intersection of Dover and Piscataqua Road. The easterly boundary of the 200 foot depth to be the Back River Road. The district to include all of the land east of Back River Road to the Town Line. This district shall also include all the land south and west of Oyster River, Little Bay, and Great Bay, from the said shore line to a line 200 feet south and west of the Durham Point Road and the Bay Road to the Newmarket Town Line, excepting that area along the Newmarket Road now zoned Residential (300 feet in depth), said 300 foot line shall be the westerly boundary of the Class III Residential District.

10. To see if the Town will vote to adopt as an amendment to the Zoning Ordinances, the changes, revisions and additions recommended by the Planning Board as included in the mimeographed material entitled Amendments to the Zoning Ordinances, dated Feb. 6, 1958.

11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a building inspector who shall hold office for a term of one year, and by their vote fix and regulate his salary as authorized by Section 1, Chapter 156, N. H. Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955.

12. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Building Regulations contained in the mimeographed material entitled Building Regulations for the Town of Durham, dated Feb. 6, 1958.

13. To see if the Town will vote to transfer Article XII the "Fire District" and "Fire District Regulations," adopted on March 12, 1957, from the Zoning Ordinances to the Building Regulations.

14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Planning Board to re-number the Articles and Sections of the existing and amended Zoning Ordinance so that the arrangement will be in proper sequence.

15. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to acquire a Hough "Pay-Loader" (list price \$14,230.00). The funds to be obtained by trading in the presently owned Case "Loader" and the Caterpillar tractor, use of Capital Reserve funds earmarked for Highway Equipment presently in the hands of the Trustees of Trust Funds, to be transferred to the Town Account and the balance from the amount listed in the "New Equipment" budget item. (\$7,500.00) (See budget)

16. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

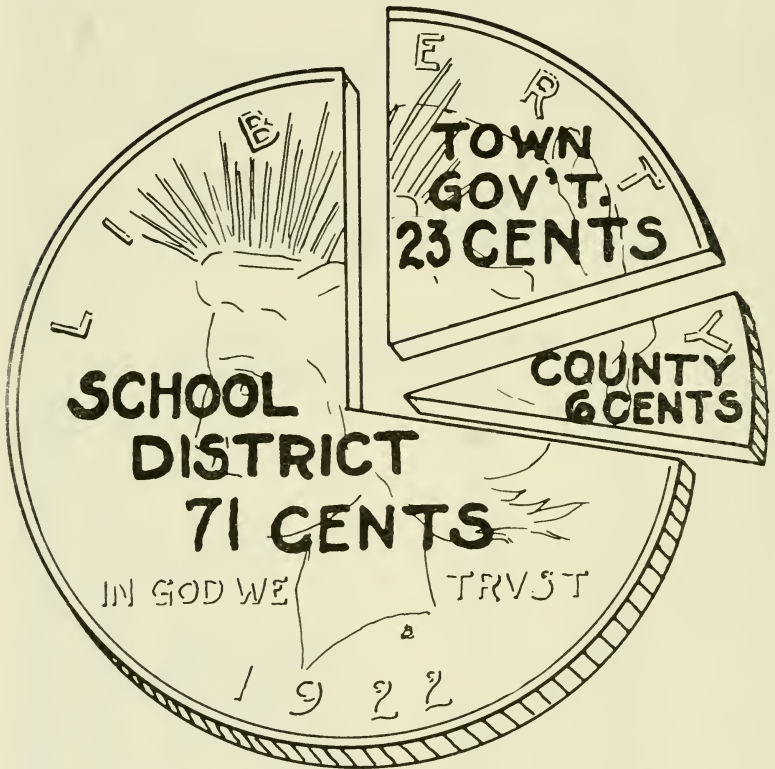

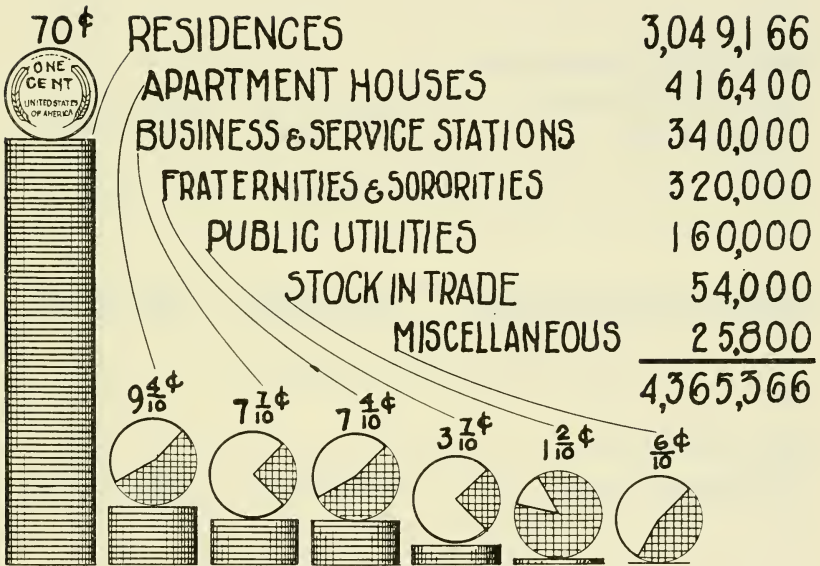

SOURCES OF DURHAM'S TAX DOLLARS

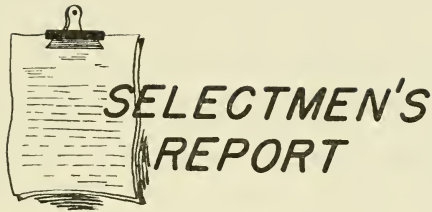

Durham continues to have growing pains. Demands for improvements, facilities and services required for day-to-day living continue to make necessary increasing assessments on you, the citizens, who, we hope, find Durham a pleasant place in which to live.

The 1957 census counted 2921 persons in Durham, exclusive of University students. By including students, Durham's population during a large part of the year exceeds 6,000. This fact requires close cooperation between the Town and University. Cordial relationships exist and Town officials are always willing to discuss and help solve mutual problems with University authorities.

The following table summarizes the building permits issued in 1955, 1956, and 1957. A steady growth is indicated.

The selectmen wish to point out that sincere and unselfish service have been evident during the past year by all employees and officials of the Town. Without this cooperation the performance of our respective duties would have been more difficult. We will not attempt to list all services rendered since a complete listing is impossible. The selectmen hereby acknowledge and

thank one and all for whatever their contribution may have been during a year full of activity. Reports of various officers and committees are detailed on other pages.

We should note the retirement on January 1, 1958, from the regular town crew of William Patriquin after over 30 years of continuous service. "Pat" is continuing on a part-time basis by taking care of rubbish disposal at the dump. "Pat" has been a loyal and respected employee of the town.

The Superintendent of Public Works, Mr. Ernest Wiggin, renders excellent service to the Town in his quiet, effective way. It should be noted that on January 1, 1957 only one of the town trucks was in top condition. The town meeting in March, 1957, authorized the purchase of a new truck and a new jeep truck. One old truck and the old jeep were traded in. Repairs were made to other trucks and December 1, 1957, found the Public Works Department ready for the winter with three trucks in good condition and one truck and the jeep truck in excellent condition. The grader is in fair condition. The large tractor, of ancient vintage, is in "uncertain" condition and the Case loader is far from being in good shape. The Case loader is not designed to do all the work it has been asked to perform. It is planned to trade the large tractor and the Case loader toward the purchase of a new loader which will be better suited for our needs if the budget committee and the voters approve of the plan to be presented.

While the winter in the first few months of 1957 was quite demanding on men and equipment, the last months of 1957 have been very kind. No snow in any amount appeared in Durham during this time for which we are thankful. We again urge that individuals wanting driveways plowed make arrangements with local contractors to have that work done whenever possible.

Due to the fact that the crew is of minimum size and that all public roads must be opened before any private work can be done, it is difficult to provide satisfactory service for the added chore of plowing snow for individuals in town. For this reason we do not feel that the Town should be in the private work business. It might be pointed out that work done on private property during the year amounted to \$2,937.40. This was mostly

tarring and plowing driveways. Other miscellaneous services are included in this amount.

A number of roads were improved. Portions of Bagdad Road and Wiswell Road were tarred for the first time. Hoitt Drive was accepted and surfaced by the Town. The tarring program was quite extensive and was one item overexpended in the budget. However, this treatment will result in lower maintenance costs in the future. Two applications of tar were given Mill Pond Road, parts of Bagdad Road, Hoitt Drive, Wiswell Road, Dame Road and Davis Road. One application was given all or parts of Durham Point Road, Cowell Drive, Sauer Terrace, Glassford Lane, Bagdad Road, Garden Lane, Oyster River Road, Thompson Lane, Valentine Hill Road, Back River Road, Cedar Point, Bay View Road and Strafford Avenue.

New road construction was Mill Pond Road from Newmarket Road to the Red Tower Development near the Durham Laundry. Part of the land for this road was purchased from Mrs. Lindsay Surette and part was donated by Mr. Lewis Ellison and Mr. Philip Thibeault, owner of the Durham Laundry. This fact is hereby acknowledged by the selectmen.

Considerable work has been done by the owners of the Red Tower Development in that area. It was possible for the selectmen to accept a considerable section of roads after they were brought to subgrade by the developers in this area. The streets accepted up to December 31, 1957, were Faculty Road Extension to Mill Pond Road, Thompson Lane Extension to Oyster River Road Extension, Burnham Avenue which connects Faculty Road with Oyster River Road Extension and Chesley Drive which is a branch off of Mill Pond Road. Considerable reconstruction of Bay Road starting at the Newmarket Line was accomplished with TRA funds. In 1958 it is hoped to continue improvements of several of the "dirt" roads as well as resurface many of the roads not treated in 1957.

Further progress has been made in enlarging Durham's sidewalk system. Survey and layout work was done along the west side of Main Street from O'Neil's to Mill Road and continuing along the east side of Mill Road to a point opposite the College Road entrance. Since Mill Road carries a heavy pedestrian traffic

it seemed most desirable to provide a sidewalk for that area. With funds available it was possible to construct about 465 feet of "hot top" type of sidewalk with a cast in place curbing. It is hoped that more sidewalk can be constructed along Mill Road next year. However, possible construction of a Federal Building in Durham may make it necessary to consider sidewalk construction in that area.

The Town Garage lot being developed off of School Street has been further improved by grading and installation of a drainage system. A salt storage shed has been erected and since the walls on three sides are of stone to a height of some 8 feet and then covered with a wooden structure it should be very durable. The storage and handling of salt has been made much more satisfactory by this addition. It is expected that a start in construction of more storage buildings on this area will be made in the next year. We are hopeful that by the time the lease on the area presently used as a Town Garage runs out, in three years, satisfactory facilities will be installed on the town lot for keeping the town equipment under cover.

Little or no progress has been made during the year in finding a means of increasing Durham's water supply. The University is interested in this problem and cooperative efforts between the University and the Town in regard to this problem are continuing.

We would like to call your attention to the table showing a comparative inventory of property valuation for recent years. Growth has been steady, increasing approximately \$100,000 each year. This, however, has not been enough to prevent a soaring tax rate. Veterans exemptions have nearly doubled since 1952. The costs of all services and materials continues to rise.

It is of interest to note from information just available that the average tax rate for the 234 towns and cities in New Hampshire for 1957 was \$5.13 for each \$100 of assessed valuation. The average tax rate in Strafford County was \$5.46 and in Durham the tax rate was \$5.60 for each \$100 of assessed valuation.

The selectmen are considerably disturbed to be faced with a deficit for the year 1957. A critical study of the budget compared with actual expenses indicates that the recommendations of a

year ago were perhaps somewhat too conservative in certain cases, especially in the maintenance items. As mentioned before the tarring program was more extensive than first figured on and as all costs are up, this fact is emphasized in the actual expenditures of 1957. A study of the Budget Detail will show you where expenses have exceeded budgeted amounts.

Under Town Officers' Expenses the budget was exceeded since it was necessary to hire extra help at the Town Office. For several years various members of Mr. Crouch's family have helped him with various work in the office and no bill to properly pay for this service has been submitted. This year Mrs. Marion Fogg has been employed on an hourly, part-time basis and has proved a very valuable assistant in the office. Provision for payment for this work is included in next year's budget.

In Town Maintenance, little or no allowance was made in the payroll budget for overtime pay. The winter weather in the early months of 1957 spoiled our hopes of keeping within the budgeted figure. Then, too, it was no more than right that some increases in wages be made during the year. This was necessary from a cost of living standpoint. No item in the budget was underspent in any appreciable amount to help balance necessary overexpenditures for other items. You will note in the Table of Comparative Revenues that we list for the first time a figure for accounts receivable in the amount of \$2,154.64. A great part of this figure represents unpaid railroad tax that comes to the town through the state. This figure is included in the expected revenues for 1958 since we have every reason to believe that it will all be collected. If this sum had been collected in 1957 it would have materially reduced the deficit figure.

The selectmen also face the unpleasant fact that in the 1958 budget many items are increased over last year. These increases are necessary to insure you the minimum services apparently demanded by the community. We regret to point out that these increases together with the necessity of making up the 1957 deficit will increase the tax rate a little over \$3.00 per thousand. Perhaps more realistic estimating last year would have prevented a deficit but it would have resulted in a higher tax rate for 1957 and probably a smaller increase, if any, for 1958 so far

as Town operation is concerned. Town operation still receives a relatively small part of the tax dollar (approximately 25%).

The suit involving the town, the B and M Railroad and Mr. James Pike that was started in 1956 and commented on briefly in our report for 1956 has not developed to the point where there is more information to report. The matter is still in the hands of counsel.

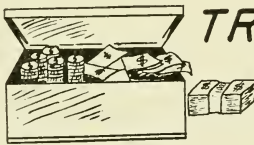
Trash and rubbish picked up in town continues to increase in volume. We urge that you use covered containers for trash put out to be picked up. Considerable time is lost when the crew has to stop to pick up rubbish that has been scattered because containers have been tipped over or are not solid enough to hold their contents, for example, poor and overloaded cardboard boxes. In general we have had very few complaints of overloaded containers. There are two conditions when the crew may intentionally *not* pick up your rubbish — (1) If the container is overloaded, weight excessive for one man to lift into a truck; and (2) If garbage is included in your trash. The garbage man wants all the garbage and we do not want the rats at the dump that would certainly appear if garbage is included in the trash.

An extension of approximately 272 feet of 6" water main and one hydrant has been installed on Pendexter Road. A part of the water main installation in the Red Tower Development has been accepted. A part of the sewer installation in Red Tower Development is in use but final acceptance has not been approved.

The Board of Selectmen have for some time urged that steps be taken to bring the Zoning Ordinance up to date in order to more adequately meet the requirements of a growing community. The Planning Board presented some plans at the last Town Meeting. These were laid on the table with recommendations that further study be given the problem and that more public hearings be held to inform the public and receive their comments. The Planning Board has spent much time and effort during the past year in preparing the revisions of the ordinances upon which you will be asked to vote at the 1958 Town Meeting. Public hearings have been held. The Board of Selectmen enthusiastically concur with the revisions being proposed and

urge their approval. In considering these revisions we sincerely urge that each voter will consider the needs of the Town as a whole as he casts his vote.

We would again point out that your Board of Selectmen meets each Saturday morning in the Town Office and urge you to bring your town problems and suggestions to our attention during these meetings, 10-12:00 a.m. A letter or phone call can arrange for special conferences when necessary. Your complaints, constructive criticisms, suggestions and comments are welcome and will receive consideration. To have and maintain good town government requires the interest and constructive support of every citizen.

The report of The Trust Funds Trustees will be very brief.

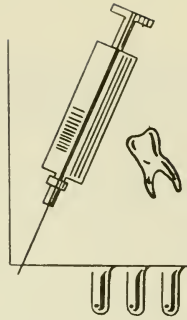
Private cemeteries were taken care of to the extent of available funds. Much more care is needed to several of the lots if the money could be found.

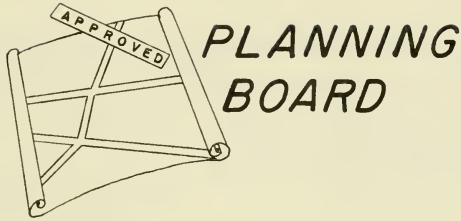

A Poliomyelitis Immunization Clinic was held on May 27 at the Oyster River School. First, second and third polio vaccine injections were given to school and preschool children and to pregnant women of the towns of Durham, Madbury and Lee. The "Polio Pioneers" of 1954 were also given booster injections at the Clinic. Arrangements for the Clinic were made by Miss Ruth E. Allen, Public Health Nurse, State Department of Health with the assistance of a local physician, nurses, teachers, volunteers and the Health Officer.

The town continued to be provided with water and milk of good sanitary quality. Restaurants, stores and barber shops were inspected periodically to maintain satisfactory sanitary conditions and practices. Plans for sewage disposal systems for all new houses in Durham in areas not serviced by the town sewerage system were inspected and approved. Attention was given to various nuisances and health problems that developed during the year.

Organization:

At the regular April meeting the Board re-elected Mr. Russell R. Skelton as Chairman. Mr. Lathrop B. Merrick was elected Secretary. Mr. John T. Holden was appointed to the Board to take the place of Mr. George R. Thomas whose term expired. Mr. Henry A. Davis has represented the Selectmen as ex-officio member of the Board.

Program:

In addition to the four regular meetings, the Board has held twelve special meetings, two public hearings, relating to subdivisions and two other public hearings, one relating to Zoning Ordinance Amendments, the other relating to the Proposed Building Regulations.

The Board granted final approval to Seth W. Sherbourne for a partial sub-division of his land on Mast Road.

Mr. Benjamin Orcutt was granted final approval on a sub-division located on the west side of Madbury Road.

The Board has devoted considerable time and study to the planning and zoning needs of Durham. The results of these studies indicated that some revision of the existing ordinance was desirable and that some of the Districts should be extended to provide for future development.

The Board has also prepared a set of Building Regulations for the consideration of the voters. The Regulations are considered to be the minimum to give the protection needed in Durham.

The members of the Planning Board deeply appreciate the valuable assistance given them by the Selectmen, organizations and many citizens of the town.

REPORT OF DURHAM-UNH FIRE COMMISSIONERS

During the year 1957 your Fire Department answered 128 calls for aid. Twenty-three of these were "Mutual Aid" calls to surrounding communities and ninety-eight were still alarms. The splendid cooperation of the students and townspeople was directly responsible for keeping brush and grass fires at a minimum during an extremely dry year. Our sincere thanks and congratulations to you all — with the added wish that 1958 will see a continuation of your fine fire prevention efforts.

Our station short wave radio is now in perfect operation and through the Office of Civil Defense we will shortly have (probably by the time you are reading this report) mobile radio units installed on two fire trucks. Two pumpers have been overhauled and modernized mechanically. As in all cases, this work has been done by members of the Fire Department — with no charge being made except for the cost of material.

Our budget this year calls for the establishment of a Sinking Fund earmarked for the purchase of a new fire truck. Our 1931 Seagrave Pumper and our 1938 Chevrolet Tank Truck must soon be retired in favor of more dependable and efficient equipment. We feel that a small annual appropriation will help ease the tax burden at purchase time.

Your Board of Fire Commissioners feel that the time is fast approaching when the installation of a Fire Alarm Call Box System for Durham and the University must be made. In line with the continued rapid growth of both population and buildings — we still feel the day is coming when the establishment of a Durham-UNH Protective Dept. combining Fire, Police, Watchman Service and Civil Defense will provide our most efficient and economical means of public protection.

The ever-increasing number of motor vehicles using the streets of Durham presents a real problem to Durham's Police Department. Every effort has been made in 1957 to cope with this increased traffic; however, the limited amount of off-street parking facilities has made it most difficult to provide adequate parking spaces in the center of town. We have urged and continue to urge the use of our enlarged parking lot between Madbury Road and Jenkins Court. An additional parking lot to serve the business area of Durham would be of considerable help in an ever-increasing problem. We have urged the University to provide off-street parking areas for the large number of vehicles which the students are permitted to have on campus and in the Town. It is particularly important that adequate parking places be provided for out-of-town visitors to attend the various University functions. We do wish to commend the fraternities and sororities who have expanded their parking facilities; their cooperation in this matter has been most gratifying.

Your Police Department continues to provide day and night periodic patrols of all streets in town and also in the rural areas of Durham. We believe these efforts have been an important factor in relieving the possibility of lawlessness.

We wish to take this opportunity to extend our sincere thanks to the State Police Department for their continuing fine cooperation and assistance. Chief Reginald Amazeen of the University Police Department has also been most helpful with his assistance.

A summary of the cases handled by your Police Department is printed in this report for your information. This year's report also includes a complete list of the Traffic Regulations as set down by the Board of Selectmen.

TRAFFIC REGULATIONS
Town of Durham, New Hampshire

January 1, 1958

The following regulations supercede any and all previous Traffic Regulations for the Town of Durham. Violators of these regulations will be subject to fine.

1. Speed limited to 25 miles per hour unless otherwise posted.
2. All State laws relative to the use of streets and highways will be enforced. Speed, Stop Signs, etc.
3. Driving and parking on the right-hand side only.
4. Parking as indicated by yellow lines.
5. No parking within 10 feet on either side of any fire hydrant.
6. There shall be no parking on the south side of Main Street from Nesmith Hall to Commons Road. One hour parking will be permitted on the south side of Main Street from the Commons Road, so called, to the Runlett House at No. 27 Main Street. One hour parking will be permitted on the north side of Main Street from New Hampshire Hall easterly to the Brown House at No. 20 Main Street.
7. No parking at any time on either side of Main Street from Runlett House east to the Town Hall. Exception — parking will be permitted on both sides of the street during church services.
8. No parking on either side of Garrison Road from Main Street to Madbury Road.
9. There shall be no parking on the east side of Madbury Road from Garrison Avenue to Bagdad Road.
10. One hour parking will be permitted on the north side of Depot Street from Main Street to the Boston and Maine Property line.
11. No parking on the south side of Depot Street.
12. One hour parking will be permitted on the westerly side of Mill Road from Main Street to College Brook. No parking

on the east side of Mill Road from Main Street to a point opposite the entry of College Road.

13. No parking on either side of Mast Road from the Concord Turnpike opposite the Lewis Field House and extending to the entrance of the University Horse Barn as posted.
14. No parking on the easterly side of Ballard Street.
15. One hour parking permitted on northerly side of Main Street from Madbury Road to Ballard Street.
16. No parking in other areas which are so posted.
17. To reduce congestion on Main Street between the hours of 6:00 a.m. and 12:00 midnight, a free parking area has been provided off Madbury Road adjacent to the Ideal Food Store. Parking in this area between the hours of 12:00 midnight and 6:00 a.m. will be permitted *only* with written permit from the Board of Selectmen. Those persons wishing to use this parking lot for overnight parking will please apply at the Town Hall for the necessary permit. All persons using this lot at any time will respect the official signs posted within the lot.
18. Parking on Main Street is prohibited between the hours of 12:00 midnight and 6:00 a.m. Parking on all other streets is prohibited between the hours of 12:00 midnight and 6:00 a.m. from December first to April first. Any vehicle so parked during the prohibited dates shall be subject to being towed away, in which case the owner shall be required to pay the towing charge before delivery to him, in addition to any fines or fine levied.
19. Jenkins Court is designated as a one-way street, with traffic moving off Main Street in a northerly direction through the parking lot to Madbury Road.

PENALTY

Any violation of these traffic regulations shall be punishable by a fine of not less than fifty cents nor more than \$5.00 for the first offense, and not less than \$1.00 nor more than \$10.00 for each additional offense.

Board of Selectmen



1957 has seen a slight increase in circulation of books for children. Oyster River teachers have continued to encourage reading among their pupils. Classroom collections from the library are the habit, with a few teachers bringing their classes in to make the selection of books, and incidentally to learn the feel of a library. The librarians welcome such visits, as they have welcomed the twelve groups who were, on request, given instruction by the reference staff on the use of the library. How long the pressure of University work will permit the practice to continue of giving such instruction, however, is unpredictable.

The University Library will move into its new building in 1958. A children's room has been provided, which will continue to be known as the Charlotte Thompson Room.

During the year Durham's library allotment of \$500.00 paid for 167 books. In all 10,562 were added to the library. With 34 of the Durham Public Library collection discarded, the town's books now number 5,341. On December 31 the University Library contained 251, 918 books.

AUDITOR'S REPORT

To The Town Of Durham, N. H.

We have examined the financial records of the Town of Durham for the year ending December 31, 1957. This audit covered the books of accounts and records of the following town officials: Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Trustees of Trust Funds, and Justice of the Municipal Court.

All checking accounts and savings accounts were verified and reconciled to bank statements or savings pass books. The bonds listed in the report of Trust Funds were examined and proved to the Statement of Trust Funds. The total amount of bonded indebtedness was verified by examination of the records of the Strafford National Bank.

The record of uncollected taxes was verified with the books of the Tax Collector. Uncollected property taxes were confirmed by contact with the debtors. Uncollected Poll (239) and Head (340) taxes were not confirmed to the debtors since current payments on these will continue up to the deadline for 1958 auto registrations.

In the accounts of the Treasurer there are accounts receivable due in the amount of \$2,154.64, and accounts payable in the amount of \$10,169.82. Since the Treasurer's records are on a cash basis these accounts were not verified. However, these will have to be considered by the town in the 1958 Budget.

In our opinion, and subject to the above comments, the financial reports as printed in the Town Report for 1957 present a true record of the financial status of the Town of Durham as of December 31, 1957.

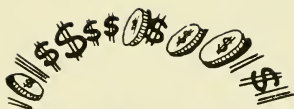

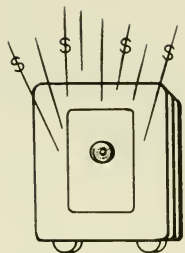

REPORT OF CIVIL DEFENSE DIRECTOR

The purposes of Durham Civil Defense are:

1. To cooperate with National and State Civil Defense Agencies by providing local information which they need for overall plans and by giving mutual aid to nearby communities in emergencies;
2. To help the people of Durham prepare, psychologically and practically, for self-help and disciplined, organized effort in the event of natural disaster, i.e. forest fires, hurricane, epidemic, etc., and in the event of enemy attack.

During the past year, Durham Civil Defense has worked in cooperation with the local chapter of the American Red Cross, the State Civil Defense authorities, the National Survival Project and the University of New Hampshire to set up an adequate Civil Defense plan and to implement this plan within the limits of budget and the changing aspects of National Civil Defense picture. During the coming year we hope to implement our plans to an even greater degree. The problems of volunteer time, public interest and the changing National program will be our main limiting factors.

With the American Red Cross, Durham Civil Defense participated in First Aid Courses, Beginning and Advanced, with an enrollment of approximately twenty people in each course. Three new instructors in First Aid were the results of an Instructor's course in First Aid. Two new instructors in Home Nursing were secured through Durham women attending an instructor's course in Dover. With these new teachers available, the problem in training more people in First Aid and Home Nursing should be lessened. Civil Defense assisted in publicizing the Blood Bank last fall for the Red Cross. Prof. Hitchcock of the local Red Cross has provided us with needed maps of Durham showing all streets and houses on a reasonable scale.

This fall a course in Radiological Monitoring was held and attended by many members of the Durham Fire Department as well as other townspeople. One Radiological Team was established and another team is being prepared. The State Civil Defense authority has given us the use of four meters, dosimeters and chargers for these dosimeters. In this way a start has been

made at some self-sufficiency in detecting radioactive fall-out and the degree to which it may be present.

In the near future we hope to have a training course for the Warden-police unit and possibly a Basic Rescue course.

The University of New Hampshire has established a Civil Defense Committee which is functioning in close cooperation with Durham Civil Defense and is helping to solve our mutual problems.

The Warden-Police unit is the basic unit of Civil Defense. In Durham, this unit is undergoing some re-organization so that each Warden has a smaller area for responsibility. There are still a few areas which need personnel but the gap is being closed gradually. The Wardens have tried to gain a true picture of the situation with regard to the persons in each housing unit (adults, children, and invalids), transportation and communications facilities, and other pertinent details from which we can assess our problems in the case of any emergency. Alert information and general self-help pamphlets are being distributed.

Through the cooperation of school officials and teachers, Durham took part in a state-wide test evacuation of the public schools in December. The results of this test with regard to methods of transportation, the time involved, etc., have given us much greater knowledge of the problem.

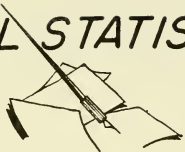
Local Civil Defense Officers have made several trips to Concord to confer with state officials and National Survival Project representatives. On January 23rd, the local officers and Town and University representatives attended the Regional meeting at Barrington, N. H. to complete plans for this area in case of enemy attack.

With the cooperation of the townspeople of Durham, we look forward to a year in which their knowledge and self-sufficiency will be increased so that any emergency, from natural causes or enemy attack, will be met with greater preparedness and personal discipline.
