TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Gilford in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Gilford Grade School in said Gilford on Tuesday, the 12th day of March, 1968, at 8 of the clock in the forenoon (Polls to be open from 8 a. m. to 6 p. m. at least) to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To see what action the Town will take on the following: "Do you favor adoption of the Town Manager Plan as provided in Chapter 37 of the Revised Statutes Annotated?" (by petition) (This question will appear on the official Town Ballot.)

Article 3. To see what action the Town will take on the following Proposed Amendment to Zoning Ordinance:

Amend the Gilford Zoning Ordinance by striking out Article VIII entitled "Industrial District" in its entirety and inserting in place thereof the following:

Article VIII Industrial District

A. Purpose and Intent

The Industrial District is intended to provide a central area for industrial development which, because of its location adjacent to the Airport, its proximity to the future extension of the Laconia By-Pass, the coming availability of utilities, and its nearness to Lake Winnipesaukee, requires a high standard of development to allow for an industrial development that will be compatible with existing and proposed future development in this portion of the Lakes Region.

B. Permitted Classes of Uses

The following classes of uses are permitted in the Industrial District provided that all resulting dust, flash, fumes, gases, odors, refuse matter, smoke, vapor, electro-magnetic transmission or radio-active emission shall be completely and effectively confined within a building, or so regulated as to prevent any nuisance or hazard to the public health or safety and further provided that no noise, vibration or other disturbance is perceptible, without the use of instruments, at the boundary of the parcel involved.

Class I: Manufacturing, research and testing uses including assembly, fabrication, processing and reprocessing of materials.

II: Warehouse, storage, wholesale establishments or transfer terminal provided all goods are stored within a completely enclosed structure.

III: Outdoor storage of materials provided all such storage areas shall be completely screened from view by a solid wall or comparable screen at least six feet in height. Such screen shall be in place prior to the operation of such storage area.

IV: Taxi, Bus or Truck terminal.

V: Commercial docks and other marine oriented facilities such as boat sales, etc.

VI: Office Buildings.

VII: Airport and facilities supplemental to the airport such as car rental, parking lot, restaurant or gift shop.

VIII: Research or scientific research laboratories.

IX: Accessory buildings and uses *customarily* incidental to any permitted uses including the following:

- a. Sign
 - 1. One (1) sign visible from the exterior of the building and designating only the permitted principal use of the premises, shall be allowed fronting each street, provided that:

a. The sign for each street frontage shall not exceed 50 sq. feet in area nor exceed onequarter $(\frac{1}{4})$ of a square foot for each linear foot of street frontage of the premises whichever is the smaller area, provided that the sign on any one street frontage need not be less than 20 square feet in area;

b. No sign attached to the face of a building shall project above the second story or thirty feet above grade, provided that in no event shall signs project above the parapet or eaves of said building.

c. No freestanding sign shall exceed a height of twenty (20) feet measured vertically from the base at ground level to the apex of said sign.

- One unlighted sign with a maximum area of twelve (12) square feet offering the premises for sale or rent. Such sign shall be located anywhere within the required frontyard, provided it does not exceed a height of six (6) feet measured vertically from the base at ground level to the apex.
- 3. No sign shall be illuminated by and/or contain changing or animated lights or parts. Any illumination employed shall be of nonglare nature.

C. Property Development Regulations

No building or portion thereof shall be erected, constructed, corrected, established, altered, enlarged or used in any lot in the industrial district unless the lot and building (s) shall comply with the following requirements and special regulations, and a Site Plan shall be submitted to the Gilford Planning Board for their review and approval in accordance with established site plan review procedure.

I: Minimum Lot Dimensions:

- a. Area Forty thousand (40,000) square feet.
- b. Street Frontage two hundred (200) feet; except that any lot that fronts on a turn around or curving street line having a radius of curvature of less than 150 feet, the minimum frontage shall be 150 feet provided the lot area meets the minimum standards.
- c. Width no less than 150 feet.
- d. Depth no less than 150 feet.

II: Minimum Yards:

Front — 50 feet from Public right-of-way. Side — The sum of the side yards shall be at least 50 feet provided however that no side yard shall be less than 10 feet. Rear — 25 feet.

III: Maximum Coverage:

No Building or structure shall cover more than thirty (30) per cent of the lot area.

IV: Off-Street Parking:

The developed parking area shall be paved with a durable all weather, dustless surface, and provide at least 1 space or three hundred (300) square feet for each two employees at the peak period of operation. Guest parking shall be provided in addition to the employees parking and be specifically designated as such. No offstreet parking shall be maintained within the required front yard.

V: Loading Docks:

No receiving and/or shipping platforms shall be installed on the front of any building or structure located on the premises. The actual size and location shall be submitted to the Planning Board as part of the Site Plan.

VI: Lighting:

No lighting shall be so situated as to create a glare across the property lines of the lot being developed.

VII: Landscaping:

Site landscaping must be submitted to the Planning Board as part of the Site Plan. The required front yard shall be landscaped and maintained with lawn, trees, shrubs, or kept in comparable condition.

D. Regulations of the Laconia Airport Authority and of the Federal Aviation Agency shall be adhered to where they are more restrictive than this ordinance.

(This question will appear on the official Town Ballot).

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Tax Collector, with the approval of the Selectmen, to appoint one or more deputies, who shall be sworn, have the powers of collectors, and give bond, and who may be removed at the pleasure of the collector, all as provided in R.S.A. 41:38.

Article 5. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year, including charges for: Town Officers Salaries, Administrative Expense, Election and Registration, Property Mapping, Repair and Maintenance of Town Buildings, Social Security and Retirement Payments, White Pine Blister Rust Control, Dutch Elm Disease Control, Insurance, Planning Board Operation, Dog Damage, Legal Expense, Civil Defense, Lakes Region General Hospital, Health Officer and Expense, Mental Health, Town Dump, Street Lighting, Town Poor and Old Age Assistance, Memorial Day, Water Works, Cemeteries, Glendale Wharfs and Parking Lot, Lakes Region Association, Interest on Temporary Loans, Interest on Long Term Notes and Bonds, Payment of Notes and Bonds, and Land Purchase Costs.

Article 6. To see what action the Town will take on an Old Home Day observance or celebration of Town's anniversary and to raise and appropriate funds for the same.

Article 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Public Library.

Article 8. To see what action the Town will take on abandoning a portion of the Henderson Road which is to be replaced by new construction.

Article 9. To see what action the Town will take on abandoning the Emerson Road.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money on the credit of the Town in anticipation of taxes.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,600.00 for the Town's share of the cost of the preparation of a Master Plan of an Industrial Park at the Laconia Airport. (The City of Laconia to contribute \$1,569.00).

Article 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the Fire Department.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to obtain by contract, for a reasonable price, and if this cannot be done, to take by eminent domain, land required for public dumping facilities, to wit, a sanitary land fill disposal site; and to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,500.00 to pay therefor.

Article 14. To see what action the Town will take on the following ordinance:

1. It shall be unlawful to park, store or leave, for a period in excess of seventy-two (72) hours, any unregistered motor vehicle, which is in a wrecked, junked, or partially dismantled condition, and no longer in condition for legal use on the highway, upon any public or private property within the Town of Gilford, unless in connection with a business enterprise operated in an appropriate zone, unless the same is completely enclosed within a building.

2. Penalty. 90 days after passage of this ordinance a maximum fine of \$10.00 shall be imposed upon a person for each twenty-four hours, or fraction thereof, in which he is in violation of this Ordinance.

3. This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

Article 15. To see if the Town of Gilford will vote to join with other communities bordering Lake Winnipesaukee in the formation of a Regional Planning Commission to be known as the Lakes Region Planning Commission. The purposes, membership and powers shall be as specified in Chapter 36, Sections 37-44 of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, pertaining to Regional Planning Commissions.

The initial goal of the Commission shall be to provide coordination and assistance between communities in all planning and development matters affecting the Region.

Article 16. To see what action the Town will take on the following: ORDINANCE WHEREAS, Chapter 106-C RSA Laws 1967, c. 431 entitled "Emergency Police Assistance" was enacted, and

WHEREAS, said Chapter 106-C provides that a municipality may by ordinance authorize that municipality's chief or head of its police department to extend assistance in time of emergency to any other county or municipality,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that the chief of police or if no chief the head of the Gilford, New Hampshire police department is hereby authorized to act pursuant to the provisions of RSA 106-C, as inserted by Laws 1967, c. 431, as now enacted and as may be amended;

AND without limiting the generality of the foregoing;

A. Is hereby authorized to extend assistance in time of emergency to any county or municipality in the State in accordance with the provisions of RSA 106-C, as inserted by Laws 1967, c. 431, and

B. Is hereby constituted the duly authorized representative of the police department for the purpose of making claims under Section 5 of said chapter.

PROVIDED NEVERTHELESS that the chief of police or other head of the police department may in his discretion donate said services to said county or municipality in accordance with the provisions of section 8 of said chapter, and

C. Is hereby authorized to enter into agreements with counties and municipalities within the State concerning the methods by which emergency police assistance will be rendered.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,097.17 for maintenance, construction, or reconstruction of Class V Highways (The State to contribute \$7,314.44). Article 18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of the Police Department.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$35,000.00 for the construction of a Highway Garage; \$5,000.00 to be raised by current taxes and the balance by the issuance of six serial notes in the amount of \$5,000.00 each, payable annually, and to authorize the Selectmen to determine the terms and conditions upon which the notes shall be issued including their sale and the time and place of payment of principal and interest.

(Requires a two-thirds vote by ballot).

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$24,955.00 for the purchase of the following: Truck (including trade) \$5,600.00, Payloader (including trade) \$15,710.00 and a 12 foot power wing \$3,645.00; \$955.00 to be raised by current taxes and the balance by the issuance of three serial notes in the amount of \$8,000.00 each, payable annually and to authorize the Selectmen to determine the terms and conditions upon which the notes shall be issued including their sale and the time and place of payment of principal and interest.

(Requires a two-thirds vote by ballot).

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,800.00 for the purchase of the following: 2 Body Sanders at \$3,000.00 each totaling \$6,000.00 and radio system and equipment for the highway trucks for \$4,800.00. \$2,800.00 to be raised by current taxes and the balance by the issuance of one serial note in the amount of \$8,000.00, and to authorize the Selectmen to determine the terms and conditions upon which the note shall be issued including its sale and the time and place of payment of principal and interest.

(Requires a two-thirds vote by ballot).

Article 22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of Parks, Playgrounds and Beaches.

Article 23. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Farmer Field improvements.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell and transfer tax liens upon all real estate acquired by the Town at any tax sale, and title to all real estate taken by the Town in default or redemption from any tax sale, to such persons and upon such conditions as they shall see fit.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to construct a high power rifle range, a large caliber pistol range, a skeet range, all conforming to NRS standards and an archery range conforming to Bowman Association specifications and to raise and appropriate funds for these purposes. (By petition).

Article 26. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the operation of the Highway Department.

Article 27. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for new Highway Construction.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the following equipment for use of the Fire Department: booster hose — \$500.00, aluminum ladders — \$350.00, power saw — \$450.00 and radio — \$700.00.

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to amend the 1st three sections of the Fire Department By-Laws (adopted March, 1964) as follows: Section 1. The Fire Department of the Town of Gilford, shall consist of a Board of Fire Engineers, permanent firemen, and volunteer firemen. The Board of Fire Enginers shall consist of three elected Fire Engineers and a Chief Engineer. The Board shall have at all times the control of all fire apparatus designed for the extinquishment of fire in the town, and the appointment and control of all permanent firemen and such volunteer firemen as shall be deemed necesary.

Section 2. At each annual election, there shall be elected one Fire Engineer to serve for a period of three years. Whenever a vacancy shall occur among the elected Fire Engineers, the remaining members of the Board of Fire Engineers shall fill the vacancy by appointment of a Fire Engineer to serve out the unexpired balance of the vacant term.

Section 3. The Chief Engineer shall be appointed by the elected members of the Board of Fire Engineers, to serve for an indefinite period of time, depending upon his good conduct and efficiency. He shall have the technical qualifications and the duties prescribed by statute. He may be removed by the elected members of the Board of Fire Engineers but only for just cause and after hearing with reasonable notice in writing of the charges against him.

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell a parcel of land located on Blaisdell Avenue.

Article 31. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

In accordance with a resolution adopted at the 1957 Town Meeting a motion will be presented to adjourn to the Gilford Grade School in said Gilford on Wednesday, the 13th day of March, 1968 at 7:30 o'clock in the evening to take up articles 4 through 31. Given under our hands and seal, this 26th day of February, in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and sixty-eight.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

It is our pleasure to review with you the activity of this past year. We believe it has been a very busy, yet a very fruitful year for Gilford.

The assessed valuation of Gilford increased approximately \$2,500,000.00 to the present valuation total of about \$35,400,000.00. The increase was less this year than the increase experienced in 1966, which amounted to approximately \$3,900,000.00. However, it still indicates that Gilford presents an attractive town for people to settle or to invest in. As long as we continue a sound tax structure coupled with sensible spending, we will continue to provide such an attraction.

As you are aware, a complete re-evaluation of property was performed by the New Hampshire State Tax Commission in 1962. At that time a rate of \$17.00 per thousand was set based on 100% valuation. In the five year period since the re-evaluation, the rate has increased but \$4.80 to its present rate of \$21.80.

The tax rate would be substantially higher were it not for the Town having foresight enough to hire an Appraiser. The Appraiser was added in 1965 after the Town had been notified by the Tax Commission that Gilford in this short period of time had dropped back 91%. Had this step not been taken, the decline would have continued, and in a short time the inequities would have crept back in and the \$17,000.00 investment made by the Town would have all been for naught.

This year we were notified by the Commission that Gilford had dropped to 89%. Your Selectmen did not agree with the Tax Commission and instructed the Appraiser to study the Commission's findings. Due to the Appraiser's excellent records, we felt that we had a good case to take to the Commission. One of the Selectmen, together with the Appraiser, journeyed to Concord and presented the Town's case to the Commission, and as a result they retracted the original 89% and found our rate to be 94%.

None of us like to pay taxes, but it is one of the necessary weights that we have to bear. Although some will attest to the contrary, we have the fairest system of appraising that there is. The Appraiser and Selectmen work very closely with the State Tax Commission and do not hesitate to seek their advice constantly. We operate under rules of the Tax Commission, and everyone, be he summer, winter, or year-round resident, is measured with the same yardstick.

The State Tax Commission keeps track of the sales of property in Gilford and each even year evaluates the sale values versus the assessed valuations, and this sets the percentage of valuation. They also send out questionnaires in connection with sales, and only one person in the Town of Gilford so questioned answered that he had paid too much for the property that he had purchased.

During the past year only five persons appealed their assessments to the Tax Commission. One appeal was disallowed, one was found in favor of the Town, and three were found in favor of the residents. Of the three found in favor of the residents, the Appraiser called to our attention errors and omissions by the Tax Commission. We protested the errors to the Commission, and again because of good records we were able to prove our point.

The Town of Gilford averages about 300 real estate transfers per year. This amounts to at least one each working day. Each transfer means that the appraisal card must be checked and adjusted. These adjustments lead to changes in land values in the area that also must be changed, and ultimately there are about 1,000 to 1,200 adjustments made each year.

The appraising and assessing job is not something to take lightly. It must be done faithfully and fairly if we are to keep pace with changes and to maintain a sound tax structure. The figure assessed against any given piece of property is the responsibility of the Selectmen and cannot be delegated to anyone. The statutes (RSA 75:1) state "Selectmen shall assess all taxable property at full and true value."

Gilford is assessed, under the State Tax Commission methods, using a value book issued by the State Tax Commission, and is supervised and checked constantly by the State Tax Commission. We have kept up with changes, and consequently each and everyone is paying his full and fair share on an equal basis.

The Selectmen are both proud and pleased to report that a State Supreme Court decision was passed down finding in favor of the Town of Gilford in a judgment against the Tax Commission.

The State of New Hampshire purchased land in 1963 for the expansion of Ellacoya State Park. In 1964 the Tax Commission refused to allow payment to the Town of taxes by the State for the land taken. State law specified that land taken for recreational purposes but not put into use was subject to full taxes and that after it was put to use the land was still subject to taxation for the following five years on a depreciated rate of 20% per year.

In 1965 the Board of Selectmen decided to seek legal advice. We were advised that the case would have to go through to the Supreme Court for a decision, that we had a 60-40 chance of losing and an estimated cost of \$1,000.00. As we did not feel that the odds were too bad in comparison to what the Town had to gain, we gave the O.K. to go ahead. Finally the decision was handed down in favor of Gilford.

We billed the State for the years 1964, 1965, and 1966, and received a check in the amount of \$7,471.14. We have billed an amount of \$3,012.76 for 1967, and as the property still has not been put to use we are guaranteed at least one more full payment and five reduced payments. New regulations were adopted this year for the protection of our residents and to further insure an orderly growth in Gilford.

"Minimum Roads Standards" were adopted by the Selectmen in order that roads would be constructed in such a manner, by developers, that they would not become burdens of maintenance for the Town. Specifications are available so that the developer knows what he must build into the road in order to have it accepted by the Town. The developer now has the responsibility of constructing the entire road including final grading, loaming, seeding and bituminous topping, all under the supervision of the Road Agent. Making the developer responsible for the complete road construction means that our Highway Department will be able to devote their time to the reconstruction of roads that have been somewhat neglected due to the increased growth that Gilford has been experiencing in recent years.

"An Ordinance Regulating the Use of Private Sewers and Drains and Private Sewage Disposal" was also adopted during the year. A town-wide sewer system with disposal plants is still someplace in the future. In order to insure the health and sanitation of our Town it was necessary to adopt regulations. It will also protect the property owner from possible unscrupulous workmen due to the fact that percolation tests, feet of drain field, and size of septic tanks are specified and an inspection is required by the Gilford Sanitation Inspector before the system can be covered. It also will provide your Selectmen with a tool to prevent pollution of our beautiful Town and the natural resources that are so important to our very existence.

"Subdivision Regulations" were adopted by the Planning Board. A developer now presents plans of his proposed sub-division to the Planning Board before any construction begins. The Planning Board works with the developer and offers advice that is both beneficial to the Town and to the developer. This regulation is one the most important that has been adopted because it tends to insure that subdivisions will be built in an orderly fashion and that they fit into a "Big Picture." Previously each developer built to his own particular liking with the result that with two adjacent developments, frequently the roads in each did not meet opposite one another, and "blocks" of any length with no set consideration to road patterns were constructed. The Town now has a say in the development of Gilford.

A set of regulations governing the "Gilford Water Works" was issued effective July 1, 1967. The water works that provides water to the Village has a complete set of standards, and along with it a revision and increase of the water rates. With the adjustment of rates it should put the water works on a self-sustaining basis.

The Town Hall, with its welcome remodeling and the addition to the Police Station, still is the focal point of the Town and is the busiest place in Town. The Tax Collector, Property Mapper, and Appraiser can attest to the rate of growth being experienced. With our present valuation being in excess of \$35,000,000, more and more is being required of all of our people in the Town Hall, and the Town Clerk and her staff are no exception. Along with our growth and added regulations we also receive more tax money, property transfers, changes and appraisals; new and additional permits including zoning, subdivisions, sewage; more registrations of cars, trucks, motorcycles and trailers, etc.; answering of inquiries from residents, contractors, lawyers, developers; assistance to commissions and boards in Town, and we could go on and on with the services performed within the walls of the Town Hall.

The Police and Fire Departments make their own report to you, but we also wish to expound a little about them.

Gilford can now boast of one of the finest, if not the finest, Police Departments that can be found. The Department now consists of five officers, including the Chief, as well as two female dispatchers. All of our personnel have been tested and have successfully passed examinations conducted by the State Department of Personnel. The department has adopted standard uniforms, both for duty and for dress. The addition and renovations done for the Department have made for more pleasant working conditions as well as for a more efficient operation. All officers have been through the State Police Academy, and some have had courses offered at St. Anselm's College. Your Chief was one of forty-two selected to attend a drug abuse school in Washington, D. C. conducted by the Federal Food and Drug Agency. You now have an efficient Police Department that you can be proud of and that is giving you a dollar's worth for the dollar spent.

Your Fire Department continues to stand out as one of the best also. The State Fire Marshall uses Gilford as an example in his travels throughout the State. The fire report will indicate a reduction in the number of fires during the year, and you can be assured that your Fire Department was largely responsible. They continually volunteer to burn hazardous structures, and I'm sure your children have come home from school and corrected some of your habits because "Smokey the Bear" said so. Your Department conducts such things as this for your safety.

In the Fire Department report last year you were told of the attempts by your Selectmen and Fire Department to get the Fire Underwriters to recognize the merits of the Gilford Fire Department and the volume of dollars appropriated each year to maintain our high Fire Department standards. We are extremely happy to report that these efforts have made it possible to have our preferential rate extended from two miles to three miles from the Central Station. All persons in the band between two and three miles from the Central Station will now pay less for their fire insurance.

* * * * * *

The Highway Department has had a very busy year. Spring came a month late, and winter started a month earlier, so plans got somewhat upset. In addition to maintenance, tarring, etc., the crews improved drainage on Cotton Hill Road, finished Saltmarsh Pond Road, reconstructed Bedford Avenue Extension, Breton Road, and Wild Acres Road, as well as a thousand and one other jobs. The tractor with back-hoe, bucket and cutter bar, was a welcome addition and has put at our disposal the means to grade embankments, install culverts as the road construction progresses, and cut grass and brush along the roadside.

Again, here is another group of people who all too often are given little credit. Just ride around other Towns and then really look around Gilford when you get back, and we believe that you will appreciate the excellent care given our road system. Notice, too, the amount of hard surface roads that we have in comparison to other towns. Remember on those snowy nights with the temperature near or below zero that the men of the highway department are riding your roads pushing the snow back to insure that emergency vehicles can get to you in case of trouble. They would rather be home in a nice warm bed, but instead they are out doing a job that most people take for granted.

* * * * * *

The Recreation Commission is starting to see some of the fruits of their extensive planning. The first phase of development of the Farmer Field was started. The loam from a large section was peeled back, the area graded, and the loam replaced. Also the entrance road and one of the two parking lots was constructed. The Commission has a well thought out plan for this facility, and when developed it will be a tremendous asset to the Town of Gilford. The program is being undertaken along with matching funds from State and Federal agencies.

The new sign machine has been a welcome addition to the Town since we lost our previous source of sign making. Including amortization of the machine, we realized a savings over the previous method and have a superior type of sign. You have probably noticed the new street signs that have been placed on previously unmarked streets. The new signs are completely reflectorized, and in addition to naming the street it warns of an approaching intersection because car lights cause the sign to shine long before the name can be read.

Again this year our wonderful young people of the Youth Fellowship of the Gilford Community Church continued with their project of rehabilitating some of our previously neglected cemeteries. We wish to express the gratitude of the Town to them as this was done on their own, and all too infrequently is credit given to our young people.

Gilford is very fortunate and should be very proud of the caliber of people running the various departments. You can be sure that they give untiringly of their time in your behalf. They are all cost-conscious and shop around to insure that you get the most for your invested dollars. The services of the State Purchasing Agent are used faithfully, and most transactions for services are done on a bid basis. We have progressed exceptionally well in the past couple of years in getting wages up to an attractive level where the Town is in a good position to compete with other cities and towns to insure maintaining the caliber of people that Gilford so justly deserves. Even though Selectmen change from election to election, you can be assured of a smooth transition with the department heads that we are so fortunate to have in Gilford.

Gilford is your Town and we should all work together to maintain its beauty. Towns do not take care of themselves by accident, but rather it takes a lot of work by a lot of people. We have been very successful in ridding Gilford of junk vehicles and controlling signs and building. With subdivision regulations we can grow in an orderly, planned fashion, and with new pollution regulations we have the tools to control pollution. Also with the completion of the Comprehensive Plan and Townwide Sewer Study we will have a plan for the future.

Become a part of the Town by taking the time to attend the School Meeting and Town Meeting. The votes at Town Meeting are the orders to your Town Officials as to what you want done during the year that follows. Sensible appropriations at Town Meeting will make for a stable tax structure with a reasonable rate and will keep Gilford financially sound.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF GILFORD PUBLIC LIBRARY

1967

Once again the trustees of the Gilford Public Library wish to extend a cordial welcome to new residents of Gilford and to invite all residents to make use of their town library.

We endeavor to maintain American Library Association Standards, both in the area of facilities and of books. The book collection is weeded and kept up to date for the use of our many local students. In the summertime, many summer residents bring in their booklists of required reading for they know that we have or will borrow the material they need.

We have four up to date encyclopedias, thirty magazines and often the newest fiction can be read sooner from our library than from a larger one, because of having fewer borrowers.

During this year the building was insulated and new hot water baseboard heating was installed, bringing heat also to the basement rooms so that more of the older or less frequently used books could be stored there.

Mr. Lord was on the Governor's Committee which studied and set up the plan for affiliated libraries. Mrs. Simonds, in addition to being librarian for Laconia High School has served on coordinating committees and is at present serving on a committee to form a school library policy for all the schools in the Laconia School District, which includes Gilford and Gilmanton elementary schools. Mrs. Pratt, our librarian, is now the vice chairman of the Central District Council. Mrs. Pratt and Mrs. Lindsay continue to attend meetings of the Council in order to keep up with the latest trends of better library service. One recent interesting meeting was held on the subject of censorship in the library.

For the new-comer to Gilford, we cordially invite you to use your library. It is located just across the bridge in the village. The library is open 24 hours a week, Monday through Friday. The hours are 2-6 p. m., with the exception of Tuesday and Wednesday, when we are open two extra hours. On Tuesday until 8 p. m. and Wednesday morning from 9:30 to 11:30.

The present library building was begun in October of 1924. The year before, the land had been given to the town, for a public library, by the Reverend and Mrs. W. F. Harding. Since that time, the town has maintained the library through appropriations at the March Town Meetings.

We now have approximately 7894 volumes. For the past several years, we have been building up the reference and children's section. The reference section has been brought up to date 4 new encyclopedias, in the past 8 years. The latest addition, is an up to date Science Encyclopedia. We are able to borrow books of any kind from the New Hampshire State Library in Concord. This service costs the Gilford Public Library only the postage to return the books borrowed.

Our fiction and non-fiction sections are supplemented by regular visits from The State Library Bookmobile. We also borrow for our children's room and young adult section.

REPORT OF THE RECREATION COMMISSION

I. GILFORD BEACH

In spite of poor weather, Gilford residents and taxpayers visited their beach 27,990 times during the summer of 1967. However, due to a contrary Mother Nature, overall attendance dropped. House guest admissions totaled 2,927 while motel and hotel guests using the beach numbered 1,113. In addition, public admissions came to 2,837, bringing total attendance to 35,467. Major additions to the beach in 1967 included a new, larger raft, improved roadways and an attractive entrance sign.

Personnel procurement and pay scales continue to rank as major challenges in operating the beach. In the past, the Commission has attempted to offer salaries to beach employees on a par with those offered in Laconia and other nearby communities, but competition for responsible help is keen. Salary scales have been revised and job responsibilities clarified in an effort to attract mature and competent personnel. Applications for employment in 1968 are now being accepted and the Commission will welcome all assistance in its efforts to see that the positions are filled by people who will help make the beach pleasant and safe.

II. THE VILLAGE FIELD

Nearly three years of planning have now begun to pay off. On January 24, 1968, the Commission received approval of its application for Federal Aid from the Land and Water Conservation Fund. Town funds for developing the Field in five annual steps will be matched dollar for dollar by the Federal Government. Stage I, already complete, saw a large portion of the field leveled, graded and reseeded, and parking facilities constructed. Stage II, proposed for 1968, calls for construction of tennis courts, skating pond and an additional parking area. Future stages involve a shelter-rest room building, landscaping and nature walks, among other items. The Boy Scouts have undertaken planning and construction of the nature walks as a contribution to the Town. Development of the field for full use will not be cheap, but with Federal Aid cutting the Town's costs in half, the field will truly be a sound investment.

GILFORD PLANNING BOARD

Annual Report To The Town of Gilford

During the past year the Planning Board of the Town of Gilford has met regularly to deal with a wide range of planning business. Following the adoption of Subdivision Regulations in January 1967 the Board has met with many Gilford subdividers to discuss and approve subdivision plans.

In May 1967 the Board received the final reports of the Soil Survey that was done by the U. S. Soil Conservation Service. The maps and interpretations cover the following subjects: homesite location, septic tank sewage effluent disposal, road location and slope grouping for community planning.

Also in May, the Planning Board with the organizational help of Mrs. Leo Sanfacon and the enthusiastic work of 70 Gilford residents, conducted a townwide interview planning survey. A preliminary report of this survey was compiled by Mr. Scott and published in the local newspaper. A detailed final evaluation is now being done by the Planning Consultant, Mr. John Atwood of Community Planning Services in Boston. The survey will be used in the preparation of the Comprehensive Plan. As of February 1, 1968, the Town of Gilford has received a Planning Grant under the Housing and Urban Development 701 program. This means the long awaited Comprehensive Plan is now underway.

The Board continues to review site plans of nonresidential development as designated to it by Town Meeting in 1967.

The Planning Board has submitted for the approval of the voters an amendment to the Zoning ordinance. This proposal involves only Article IX, the Industrial District. In accordance with the state regulations there were notices and two public hearings for discussion of the amendment.

In addition, the Board has started compiling information for the drafting of a Building Code. Also, with the help of Mr. Philip Hodgkins, the Town Housing Map has been brought up to date.

The Planning Board meets on the first Monday of each month. There are usually one or two additional meetings each month. The meetings are open and the Board would like to encourage the townspeople to either bring their planning related questions or comments to any meeting or contact any of the following members of the Gilford Planning Board.

REPORT OF OVERSEER OF PUBLIC WELFARE

This has been a good year. Twenty-five families, eighty-four persons, have been served. Fifteen families, a lesser number than last year, required financial assistance. An equal number of families, although an increase over last year, were counseled and/or referred to appropriate resources. Four of them accepted donated clothing and food baskets from generous neighbors.

State and Federal programs are continually expanding to provide more substantial and comprehensive coverage for those not able to adequately meet their own needs. Social and rehabilitation administration at the federal level now combines rehabilitation with financial assistance. Social Security benefits have again been increased. Medicaid is a reality, sponsoring complete medical care for the needy. Categorical assistance programs have budgeted increases in grants.

A broad base group is now eligible for surplus foods through the County office. Foster care rates have been slightly raised but are yet sadly lacking, as is the number of willing foster parents. Fine cooperation and support has continued from the trustees of our trust funds.

We are a prosperous, progressive community in the most affluent country the world has known. Let us continue to share our blessings by supporting the less fortunate directly and indirectly with sound social legislation whenever possible.

POLICE DEPARTMENT GILFORD, NEW HAMPSHIRE

Annual Report 1967



In 1967 the police of our nation were faced with challenges created by our complex society that were greater in magnitude then had ever before been faced by any municipal agency or service. Lawlessness increased 16 percent over 1966 across the nation and 18 percent in the New England area; youthful criminality became common place; drugs and narcotics came into extensive use; and organized crime continued to creep into society, legitimate business, and government, sometimes becoming so powerful that it was government itself. The nation grew smaller with many families owning two automobiles, construction of new super highways, and improved air travel. New businesses and industries came into being, and established enterprises expanded at a phenomonal rate in a rich and flourishing nation. Police Departments in nearly every town and city in the nation were faced with these challenges and as you will observe from the following report, your police department was no exception.

Gilford continued to be the largest and fastest growing town in Belknap County and one of the fastest growing towns in New Hampshire. The latest statistics from the State Department of Resources and Economic Development reflected a population increase from 2043 in 1960 to 2770 in 1966 with a prediction of an increase to approximately 3500 in 1972. Recreational activity continued to flourish both during the summer and winter months bringing thousands of people to our town to take advantage of these facilities. Several new businesses opened during the year and more are expected to open in 1968.

Calls for police service continued to increase, reaching an all time high in 1967 of 2420 — an increase of 674 over 1966.

Criminal offenses numbered 312 in 1967 reflecting a DECREASE from 1966 of 38 offenses. It was necessary however, to expend a tremendous amount of time in the area of criminal investigation due to the very nature of the offenses, the arrival of the drug problem in the area, the possibility of other serious criminal activity, and decisions handed down by The United States Supreme Court.

Traffic law enforcement remained an integral part of our responsibility and your police department recorded 318 motor vehicle offenses, investigated 105 accidents (which was a slight decrease from 1966), issued 137 defective equipment tags, and 403 motor vehicle violation warnings. One of the most significant achievements in the area of traffic law enforcement was the purchase of a radar unit which assisted us greatly in carrying out our responsibilities in this area. Not only did this result in decreased accidents due to a general decrease in speed, but generally made our highways safer with a minimum amount of time expended. The radar unit was put into use in December of 1967 and in the short time that it was in use we made 497 radar checks and it was only necessary to issue two summonses.

Our motor vehicle and criminal activity resulted in 465 prosecutions in court and the recovery of \$19,572.52 in stolen property. Through these efforts \$31,572.52 was ultimately returned to tax payers.

General patrol of our more then 95 miles of highways and roads continued to be a responsibility of your department and we traveled 107,120 miles in order to carry out this function. In addition to the criminal and motor vehicle activity, police officers secured 166 doors to businesses, assisted 215 motorists, made 653 routine checkups, gave out 152 parking tags, checked 539 residences either regularly or periodically, reported 76 business lights on or off, and conducted 576 money escorts.

Your police department also became involved in reorganization, training, personnel testing, planning and research, and many other areas directed towards discovering the needs of the future and expanding our present capabilities. In the area of Organization, additional personnel were added to the department, organizational charts were introduced and a definite program instituted with reference to unity of command and span of control. Department regulations were completely revised and codified and made available to all personnel in order to assist in the efficient management of the department. All department personnel were given examinations for their respective positions by the New Hampshire Department of Personnel and a program of proficiency examinations was begun.

Our training program begun in 1966 was continued with a great deal of time and effort directed in this area. Training is recognized as a necessity of the modern day police officer in order that he may be able to act in the professional manner demanded of him by society. I am proud and happy to report that we were highly active and successful in this area and can report significant and note worthy activity. All of our police personnel have attended and graduated from the New Hampshire State Police Training School in Concord. Two men also attended St. Anselm's College for 15 weeks in a special introductory law enforcement course. All regular personnel attended specialized seminars on Drug Abuse Control and Narcotics given by the Federal Bureau of Drug Abuse Control and the Federal Narcotics Bureau and your Chief attended a week long school on Drug Abuse Control in Washington D. C. One department clerk-dispatcher graduated from an FBI Fingerprint School as a qualified fingerprint technician. A significant achievement was accomplished in training with the construction of a department firing range on which the Federal Bureau of Investigation conducted a firearms training school for all of our regular and special personnel as well as men from several surrounding towns.

In the area of Planning and Research time has been and is constantly being expended in order that we may find ways to meet our challenges in 1968 and in future years. Research is especially being directed towards ways to improve our capability without the necessity of increasing manpower. Study is being conducted in the area of record systems, police equipment, police procedure, police management, and many other areas.



In summation, I would like to take this opportunity to express my personal appreciation to the Board of Selectmen, other town departments, and most of all to the citizens of this town who have been so helpful and have supported their Police Department. Your support and co-operation has been overwhelming and we in the Police Department shall endeavor to continue to give you the type of police department that you desire and deserve. Only with your support and by working together will we be able to say that we have met the challenge in 1967, 1968, and in future years.

REPORT OF THE GILFORD FIRE DEPARTMENT 1967



There has been quite a drop in the number of fire calls during the past year. Your Fire Department members feel that this is rewarding and that the comparatively small loss in property is largely due to the amount of time spent talking Fire Safety to the people of Gilford. We feel that the Safety instructions given to the 1st grades at the Fire Station each year and the Smokey Bear Campaigns have proven their worth.

The 100% cooperation of our townspeople is needed to continue our excellent fire record. As individual firefighters, we cannot cover the whole town during peak fire season. This year we were favored by a cold, wet spring and unusual fall weather conditions which took away the seasonal outdoor fire danger; however, past experience shows that we cannot expect this to happen again this year. By obtaining a permit at the Central Fire Station for outdoor burning, you can expect us to function much more efficiently.

The installation of a monitor at the Police Station has provided wonderful cooperation between that department and ours during fire emergencies, resulting in better service to the town.

We want to send our permanent and volunteer firefighters to as many fire schools as possible. There is a bonus in doing this because those who go to school come back and teach more men. We believe that the training which our men have received, plus the high standard of equipment which the townspeople have provided, make us a firefighting unit which is second to none when compared to other New Hampshire towns of our size.

Gordon Langill, who has served in several capacities in our Fire Department including engineer for many years until his resignation in August, has now moved to a year-round home in Florida. Ronald Hook was appointed to fill out the term which expires this year.

The inside of the Central Station has been done over from beginning to end including: a complete paint job, sealing the cement working floor, and tiling the meeting and dispatch rooms and the platform.

We are very happy that Gilford has finally received recognition of its Fire Fighting facilities by the New Hampshire Board of Fire Underwriters. The Board has notified all insurance companies that the reduced insurance rates are to be extended from two miles to within three miles of the Village Station. Your Fire Chief, Board of Fire Engineers and Selectmen have held several meetings with, and have written letters to, the Board of Underwriters to try and secure this additional recognition so that fire insurance rates could be reduced. The detailed explanation, by letter, of the twelve reasons why this recognition should be given finally convinced the Underwriters. (These twelve reasons were printed under this Section of the 1966 Gilford Town Report).

We still feel, as we did last year, that the entire Town of Gilford should be given the same insurance rates as those within the new three mile limit from the Village Station. With your support we will strive to continue to improve our firefighting facilities, the knowledge of our men, and our fire prevention program. We firmly believe that this is the only way to keep fire damage to a minimum and to make lower insurance rates available to more people.

You are invited to stop in at the Fire Station and pay us a visit. We are always glad to hear your feelings about how your Fire Department is being operated. Let's all work towards an even more effective fire control and prevention program in years to come.

The fires for 1967 total as follows:

House — 25; Car — 11; Grass — 18; Mutual-Aid — 5; Accidents — 4; Resuscitator — 2; Boat — 1; Misc. — 4.

We responded to Mutual Aid 5 times and received Mutual Aid 3 times.

SCHOOL WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the School District in the town of Gilford qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Gilford Grade School in said district on the fourteenth day of March 1968, at 8:00 P. M. in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.

2. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

3. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

4. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

5. To see if the district will create an AREA school district planning committee and to elect the members thereof or determine that they shall be appointed by the moderator.

6. To see if the District will vote to authorize the appointment of a building committee to advise the school board in the construction of additional facilities — if and when needed — the power of the committee to be subject to the provisions of R.S.A. Ch. 199 and any amendments thereto.

7. To see if the District will vote that at each Annual School District Meeting hereafter the place designated for such meeting shall have an area set aside for the seating of those persons qualified to vote in District affairs, and that the official check list of voters of the Town of Gilford be used to so seat the qualified voters, and that those persons not qualified to vote in District affairs shall be seated in a visitors' section apart from the voters' section.

8. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Members of the School Board, Parents and Voters:

Following is my second report to you as your superintendent of Schools. The items that are reported in the following paragraphs are those which we feel should be brought to your attention.

Maintenance

Much work was done during the summer months including the painting of the corridor, kitchen and three classrooms. It should also be noted that the lettering on the front of the school has been completed. Visitors will have no trouble recognizing the building as being the Gilford Grade School.

Pupil Enrollment

Enrollment has increased this year by approximately thirty pupils. This means that some classes have increased in size. Both the third and fifth grades now average 26 in number while the others range from 21 to 25. This increase points up the fact that in the not too distant future Gilford will want to consider either an addition to the present elementary school or the building of a second unit to prevent the overcrowding of classes. Increases in enrollment would appear to be gradual with no emergency anticipated in the need for additional classrooms.

Music

Mrs. Coupal now spends three days each week at the Gilford Grade School which allows time for added in-

struction in instrumental music. The school has acquired two trombones to augment the newly instituted music program. The results of this program have become evident in the fine musicals which were presented at Thanksgiving and Christmas.

Library

Many fine books have been added to the School Library. Although the number of books available have not reached the state's standards, the school library is well on its way to becoming one of the finest in the area. Additional personnel for the next school year should include a reading teacher — librarian with part time devoted to each area.

Remedial Reading Teacher

While Gilford is receiving the services of a remedial reading teacher on a part time basis under the Title I project, the number of pupils needing help exceeds the number who are receiving it from the teacher in her limited schedule. An additional teacher has been hired for the remainder of the school year on a part time basis to work with the pupils who have been unable to receive the help needed. This service will become part of the program of the reading teacher-librarian to be added to the staff for next year.

Teacher Salaries

This year there was a marked improvement in the teacher's salary scale adopted two years ago. Although Gilford salaries are still below comparative towns in this area, the present salary scale recently adopted by the School Board should rectify this situation. It will also assure Gilford of being able to compete with other towns in obtaining teachers.

Team Teaching

Much thought and research has gone into the possibility of instituting a program of team teaching with an ungraded situation at the primary level. Further investigation and study will be necessary before formal steps are taken to institute such a program.

I wish to express my appreciation for the fine cooperation of the Gilford School Board members namely, Chairman Rowland Keith, Mrs. Esther Nighswander and Mr. John O. Richards. I also wish to thank the School Principal, Mr. Gene Stearns, as well as the teachers for their fine work in carrying on the school program. The services of the cafeteria workers, the custodians, the school nurse as well as Mr. Fred Shurbert and his bus drivers is much appreciated. It is my intention to continue to obtain the very best teachers when additions or replacements become necessary. The people who are trained to instruct the boys and girls have a great responsibility and must be of the highest caliber. The continued financial support of the citizens of the community is needed to fulfill these requirements.
