# State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the town of Haverhill qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in said town on Tuesday, the 13th day of March, 1928, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following matters:

Article 1. To choose a town clerk.

Article 2. To hear the reports of the selectmen, treasurer, cemetery commissioners, and any other town officers heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 3. To choose one selectman for the term of three years, a town treasurer, one or more highway agents, one or more auditors, one library trustee for the term of three years, one cemetery commissioner for the term of five years, one trustee of trust funds for the term of three years, and all other necessary town officers.

Article 4. To raise and appropriate money for the support of the poor.

Article 5. To raise and appropriate money for the maintenance of state trunk line roads.

Article 6. To raise and appropriate money for the construction of state aid roads.

Article 7. To raise and appropriate money for maintenance of state aid roads.

Article 8. To raise and appropriate money for removal of snow on trunk line and state aid roads.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to apply for state aid in construction and rebuilding of the highway bridge near the store of Henry O. True in the village of East Haverhill.

Article 10. To raise and appropriate money for laying out, building and repairing highways and bridges.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to discontinue as a public highway that part of the existing highway in the Oliverian Village, so called, extending from the dwelling house formerly occupied by William T. Slight to the site of the grist mill formerly operated by William T. Slight.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to discontinue as a public highway that part of the addition to Cherry Street, so called, in the village of Woodsville, as laid out by the selectmen in 1902, that lies southerly and westerly of the point where said highway enters land now owned by Fred S. Henry.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to purchase a roller for the use of the town and to raise and appropriate money to pay for the same.

Article 14. To raise and appropriate money to pay interest and principal of outstanding town notes.

Article 15. To authorize the selectmen to issue interest-bearing orders or notes to provide for current expenses in anticipation of taxes, and to see if the town will extend for another year the authority grated to the selectmen at the annual meeting of 1924 to issue notes or bonds covering the refunding of notes given in connection with rebuilding the Woodsville-Wells River bridge; and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 16. To authorize the selectmen to distribute the blank inventories at the time they examine and appraise taxable property.

Article 17. To raise and appropriate money for town libraries.

Article 18. To raise and appropriate money for Memorial Day.

Article 19. To raise and appropriate money for the cemeteries in said town, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 20. To raise and appropriate money for the support of the Cottage Hospital.

Article 21. To raise and appropriate money to exterminate white pine blister rust in said town.

Article 22. To raise and appropriate money for other town charges.

Article 23. To see if the town will vote in favor of granting permits to druggists for the sale of liquor in said town for medicinal, sacramental, scientific and mechanical purposes, under the provisions of chapter 144 of the Public Laws.

Article 24. To see if the town will vote to appoint a budget committee to supervise the appropriations of said town and to recommend to the next annual meeting the amounts to be raised for various purposes, such recommendations to be printed in the next annual report.

Article 25. To transact any other business proper to come before said meeting.

# Report of Selectmen

To the Citizens and Taxpayers of Haverhill The Selectmen, herewith, submit their report for the year ending January 31, 1928, and on the following pages will be found the detailed statements.

### WOODSVILLE-WELLS RIVER BRIDGE

The bridge case was taken to the Court of Appeals in October, 1927, and the verdict received by the town in the United States District Court was sustained. The United Construction Co. then applied to the Court of Appeals for a reargument of the case and that petition was denied. It is possible for the United Construction Co. to take the case to the U. S. Supreme Court, but this must be done before March first, 1928, as their time limit will then expire.

### STATE AID CONSTRUCTION

A piece of State Aid Construction road was started before the November flood, but owing to this the work was postponed. The unexpended fund will be available this year to continue the work.

#### HIGHWAYS

During the past year we have expended \$25,818. on the town highways, about \$17,000 of the amount was expended on damage due to the flood. We expect that a substancial amount of this extra expenditure will be refunded by the state.

# FINANCIAL

During the past year we have increased the net debt five thousand eighty-nine dollars and twenty-one cents, the reason for this increase is repairing damages caused by the flood.

**REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS** 

To the School Board and Citizens of Woodsville Union High School District:

The total enrollment for the current school year is practically the same as last year at this time, 450. There is a slight falling off in the senior high school and this loss is equalized by a gain in the grades. Grade II has 49 pupils but the other grades have an average registration of from 31 to 42.

There has been no change in the faculty of the high school but in the grades there are three new teachers, Hazel McIver in grade III, Alice B. Kennedy in grade IV, and Ruth Holt in grade VII. The full list of teachers follows.

Senior High School: Headmaster, G. Hampton McGaw, languages and history; Submaster, Henry P. Clough, science and economics; Henry E. Greeley, mathematics; Margaret G. Sheldrick, commercial subjects; Lillias R. Warren, English and Latin; Bertha C. Manchester, history and manual training; Phyllis E. Blake, French and English; Marian E. Fenerty, domestic arts.

Junior High School: Principal, Nettie W. McCoy, grade eight with music and mathematics in grade seven; Ruth Holt, grade seven with French and science in grade eight.

Elementary School: Helen A. Franklin, grade six; Mary Mitchell Mann, grade five; Alice D. Kennedy, grade four; Hazel McIver, grade three; Lida R. Caldon; grade two; Florence S. Lang, grade one.

Alice M. Brown is teacher of music in all grades and high school and Lottie M. B. Underhill is still school nurse.

For the school year ending June 30, 1927 the attendance in all schools was 96.7%. This is a high record for a system of schools. There were 261 tardy marks, seven days lost because of holidays and teacher's institutes, 554 visits by parents and others. Much credit is due the teachers for making possible this record of attendance and punctuality.

The following grade pupils had a perfect attendance record for the year ending Jue 30, 1927: Louise Adams, Blanche Adams, Kenneth Bailey, Marjorie Bailey, Viola Blodgett, Charlotte Boothroyd, Drusilla Brown, Elizabeth Brown, Dorothy Brown, Marjorie Brill, Luvia Butson, George Chase, Leona Clough, Harriet Davison, Russell Dow, George Emery, Neil Fullerton, Leo Grenier, Maxine Hood, Muriel Hoyt, Charles Irwin, Mary Knox, Bartlett Mann, Marjorie Millette, Marion Moulton, Dick Martin, George Pebbles, Elmer Rowden, George Rowden, Richard Sargent, Richard Stevens, Marion Webster, Dorothy Weeden.

The Junior High School prizes for general excellence in English awarded each year by the Woodsville Woman's Club were won last year by Marguerite Prescott and Irene Ferron. These prizes furnish a worthwhile stimulus to pupils and teachers and show a helpful interest on the part of the Woman's Club.

Mrs. John Evans has very generously given the grade library fourteen volumes of illustrated science reference books. This is an expensive collection and will be extremely valuable to teachers and pupils as a source of material for natural science. The school very much appreciates this gift.

The School Board of last year kindly donated their munificent salary to the grades for the purchase of a cabinet to house a collection of curios, some of them quite valuable, which have been accumulating since the building was built. A pupil of the seventh grade, Kenneth Bailey, carefully arranged the various articles in the case and it has been placed in the eighth grade room where it is available for any grade.

The grade schools were closed three weeks and the high school two weeks in October because of the infantile paralysis scare. One week was made up at Charistmas vacation and one more will be added at the end of the year in June. This will give the grades but thirty-seven weeks for the year. The flood in November also seriously affected the attendance at the high school of many tuition pupils. An added problem has been the unsatisfactory train service on the Vermont side of the river since the flood. It has been impossible to arrange a high school program which would give all pupils opportunity to recite without utilizing the noon hour. The high school teachers have shown a fine professional spirit by volunteering to use such part of the noon hour for this special work as was needed. The school authorities have had to face the query of how far they were justified in limiting the privileges of the local students to accommodate the out-of-town pupils. It must be remembered in this connection that the Woodsville High School has been greatly benefitted both financially and educationally by the number and quality of its tuition pupils. In the grades and high school there are more than one hundred tuition pupils and the tuition income itself is a very important factor in lessening the school tax rate.

During the reconstruction period following the flood many Woodsville people volunteered to give a home to such students as could find no means of transportation to and from their homes. Such action was a benefit to both pupil and school and showed a willingness to help that is worthy of hearty commendation.

I call your attention again to the need of some source of revenue on which the school nurse could draw for remedying physical defects which are preventing school children from reaping the full benefit of school training. There are constantly cases of poor eyesight in school children whose parents are financially unable to furnish glasses. The same is true of other defects. Any suggestions or assistance would be much appreciated by Miss Underhill.

A detailed report on the high school is appended. The importance of the Woodsville High School in this vicinity as a civic as well as an educational institution is not fully appreciated. A visit or two to see the plant in operation would, I am sure, create favorable impressions and dispel a lot of unfounded criticisms.

### **REPORT OF THE HEADMASTER**

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I offer herewith my tenth annual report of the Woodsville High School, covering the year from January thirtieth 1927 to the present date.

Registration has fallen off a little, due to the large graduating class, several removals from town, and a smaller local entering class. There are at present one hundred fifty-one names on the list, sixty-two boys and eighty-nine girls.

The tuition list remains about the same as last year, seventy-four pupils coming from seven towns. Disruption of train service during the flood period last fall caused many pupils to be absent for two weeks or more, and recent changes of railway schedules have made it increasingly difficult to fit all classes into the shorter day. However, some groups of pupils have met for instruction at the noon hour or at other times, and the effort is made to give pupils all the regular work of each class.

A circular of courses of study is issued, and will be gladly furnished to any one interested in the school. Numerous pupils appear to have no definite objective ahead, and with such it is quite difficult to make the work effective. It is particularly necessary that pupils intending to go to college or to some special school should plan studies so as to meet the entrance requirements of the institution chosen. Otherwise, when too late, the pupil discovers that he has not the credits required for admission.

At present fifty-nine recent graduates are attending other schools; thirty are in standard colleges, fourteen in normal schools, ten in business and nursig schools, and five in miscellaneous institutions.

Keyser, Elmore S. Kimball, Clarence S. Knox, Charlotte E. Lakin, Queenie M. Longmore, Hilda M. McIntire, John B. McLellan, Elmer M. Nelson, Lincoln R. Page, Alba R. Rosa, William J. Roy, Kenneth E. Rutledge, Paul W. Scruggs, Franklin E. Spear, Jr., Robert M. Spinney, Frank E. Twombly, Geraldine S. Uttin, Ruth E. Ware, C. Ruth Weeks, Francis W. Wescott, Ethel M. Woodbury, Alba T. Zambon, John M. Zambon.

First place in scholarship was taken by Lillian Derby and second place by Alba Zambon. The Alumni Attainment medal was awarded to John Zambon, presentation being made by Hon. H. K. Davison, of the class of 1911. This was the thirty-first class to graduate, and the total number of graduates is now four hundred and seventeen. To Edward P. Strobridge, who had completed all required courses during the past year, a diploma was awarded, as of the class of 1926.

In contrast with former years the regular sessions ended on Wednesday of the last school week in June; class day exercises were held on Thursday afternoon and the reception on Thursday evening. The graduation exercises took place on Friday evening. This arrangement afforded a better opportunity to conclude the work of the year and gave general satisfaction to all concerned.

Prize Speaking occupied two evenings at the end of May. Nineteen pupils took part. First prizes were awarded to Nando Bozzini, Evelyn Bullard, Thomas Nicol, and Leona Weston; and second prizes to Secondo Garbati, Burnell Norris, Joanna Tewksbury, and Frances White. The orchestra and the Cycle have continued their good work under efficient leadership. Athletic and lyceum activities have gone on as usual, a large number of pupils participating. The problem is to afford a gently compelling opportunity to those pupils who otherwise would shirk. The February meeting of the lyceum gave a performance of the popular play "Come Out of the Kitchen." The presentation was repeated in South Ryegate a few days later.

Many details of the school activities, such as, Lincoln essays, patriotic essays, chemical essays, outing club events, ball games, state inspections, assembly speakers, junior promenade, etc., appear in the local newspapers, and are preserved for record in the official scrap book.

During the past ten years the present administration has sought to impress upon the lives of pupils punctuality and scholarly accuracy, a widening vision of world affairs, a love for work and a desire to render service. I gratefully express appreciation for the efforts of many persons who have contributed toward the realization of these ideals.

# REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD OF HAVERHILL

The undersigned members of the Haverhill School Board beg to submit the following report. First of all we wish to call the attention of the Voters and Tax Payers to the reports of our Superintendent and of the Headmaster of Haverhill Academy with regard to the general progress in the several departments of school work.

By virtue of the vote taken at the last District Meeting, the Board engaged the services of Messrs. Wells & Hudson. Architects, of Hanover, to submit the necessary plans for the remodelling of Pearson Hall into grade rooms, and upon putting the plans out for bids, the successful bidders were the Rowe Construction Co. for the general work and Taylor and Mann for the plumbing and heating job. The work was started in the early part of July and was hardly under way when an unexpected and serious problem presented itself. It was found that the timbers under the first floor had all very badly rotted, indeed to such an extent that the Architects declined to assume any responsibility for new construction over the existing condition of the framing, and there was nothing for the School Board left to do but to act upon the recommendation of the Architects and have new girders and beams put in. In order that the Voters and Tax-Payers may fully appreciate the situation with which the School Board was confronted, we give hereby the full text of the letter received from the Architects concerning the matter:

"When the timbers under the first floor were exposed to view they were found to be very badly dry rotted, in fact rotted to an extent that was dangerous. We do not care to assume any responsibility for new construction placed over such a framing and in our opinion your Committee can not, with justice to the tax payers of Haverhill, allow new work to be placed over such a decayed foundation.

"Your committee should authorize the removal of the present framing and install new girders and beams. If this is not done the present remodelling will be badly damaged in the course of a few years by the absolute failure of the old supporting framing.

"It is a fact that the serious condition of the old framing was unknown to anyone concerned until it was exposed to view by the present remodelling. It seems to us that you are not left any discretion in the matter, but that you must go ahead and build 'right,' even though you have no voted appropriation for this extra work. One look at conditions as they now stand should convince even the most doubtful as to what constitutes the proper method of procedure.

"We trust that you will authorize new framing under the first floor at once."

Naturally this extra work—outside of the regular contract—together with the most essential repairs and changes made at the Academy Building, caused the School Board to exceed the appropriation voted for repairs at the last District Meeting by about \$1,200.00. It is, however, very gratifying to be able to report that the former Pearson Hall now consists of three very fine and large grade rooms, toilets, supply closets and wardrobes, and the School Board was thereby enabled to transfer the pupils of the Ladd Street School to the Corner. At the present time those pupils are being transported by Mr. Sawyer and Mr. Fred C. Lee.

Upon the completion of the alterations in Pearson Hall the District is left with a dining room, kitchen and the former laboratory room on the second floor.

During the past summer and early fall there was a fair prospect of leasing the entire second floor of this building, either with or without alterations. Had the Town School Board felt that they were legally empowered to do so they might have arranged for a lease and the lessor would have made the improvements and applied the rental against their investment. At the conclusion of the lease the Town School District would have become possessed of a rentable property and without investment. The Town School Board felt, however, that they were not within their legal rights in making this or similar arrangement.

An expression is desired from the School District as to whether or not the Town School Board should negotiate a similar lease if opportunity afforded itself or whether the Town School District should raise the sum sufficient to make such alterations as will afford the Town School District some revenue from this part of the building.

On such negotiations as were discussed the past summer with a prospective lessor, it was established that the second floor with proper alterations would command a monthly rental of \$25.00.

The transportation of the High School Students is again in the hands of Mr. George White for the North-End of the town and Mr. Fred White for the South-End and East-End. In order to acquaint the Tax Payers with the financial condition of the District at the present time, we desire to call attention to the financial statement published in the report. From same it will be noted that there will be a deficit of about \$2,500.00 on June 30, 1928 and by statutory requirements, this deficit will have to be raised at the coming District Meeting.

We also desire to call the Voters' and Tax Payers' attention to the budget for the fiscal year from July 1, 1928 to June 30, 1929.

The retiring member on the Board is Mr. Daniel Carr.

### REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Haverhill School District:

It is my pleasure to submit for your consideration my seventeenth annual report on the schools of the district.

The total registration for the current year is 407, somewhat larger than last year. Included in the above number are five pupils from Benton Flats in the school at East Haverhill and fourteen tuition pupils in the Academy. In addition to the above number there are six high school students from Brier Hill and the Four Corners attending Woodsville High School, eight in Woodsville Junior High, and ten in the Woodsville grades.

The total registration in each school with the name of the teacher is given below. The actual registration February 1 will be slightly different. Haverhill Academy, 92 pupils, Friend Holmes Jenkins, headmaster; Lewis Foote, Edith Morrill, Ruth Jenkins, Doris Howard, assistants; Haverhill Grammar, Minnie Morris, 29 pupils; Haverhill Intermediate, Rosie Russell, 21 pupils: Haverhill Primary, Maxine Anderson, 37 pupils; Pike Grammar, Hazel Hardy, 21 pupils; Pike Primary, Mabel Tragansa, 20 pupils; East Haverhill Grammar, Marjorie Deming, 22 pupils; East Haverhill Primary. Dorothy Carter, 17 pupils: Number Six, Elma Howard, 16 pupils; Number Ten, Grace Winchester, 14 pupils; The Center, Josephine Astle, 19 pupils; Brier Hill, Mae Slack, 19 pupils; North Haverhill Grammar, Elsie Darling, 19 pupils; North Haverhill Intermediate, Thelma Nichols and Helen Colby, 28 pupils: North Haverhill Primary, Sadie Carr, 33 pupils; manual arts and domestic science at East Haverhill, Pike and North Haverhill, Bertha Wheelock.

It is worthy of note that there are but four names of teachers in the above list not found in last year's report and one of these is substituting while the regular teacher, Thelma Nichols, finishes her course at Plymouth Normal School. This permanency in teaching positions is due principally to better salaries and to the fact that there are plenty of trained teachers available. Familiarity with a school and its environment enables a teacher to give more efficient service each year.

The record of attendance for the year 1926-27 was only passably good. The per cent of attendance of all schools was 93.4 with 564 tardy marks and 5.7 days lost on account of school holidays, bad weather and teachers' institutes. As I said in last year's report, the loss of one week out of thirty-six, whatever the reason, seriously detracts from the efficiency of the school year. Many school districts are so arranging the school terms as to eliminate school holidays and are contracting for 180 days of actual school. In this way the district gets what it pays for and teachers, pupils and janitors give full service. The Intermediate School at North Haverhill made an unusual record for attendance last year which deserves special comment. This room of 32 pupils taught by Thelma Nichols did not have a tardy mark during the year. This shows what can be done when teacher, pupils and parents work together.

The following pupils were neither absent nor tardy during the year 1926-27: Phineas Chamberlin, Benjamin Cook, William Fortier, Eleanor Irish, Irene Keith, Helen Kimball, Floyd Lane, John Lange, Bernard Lavoie, Quentin Lavoie, Mae Lavoie, Rita Leonard, Harriet Merrill, Fred Robinson, Lucia Willard, Kenneth Wilson, Gertrude Wright, Sarah Wright.

Eighteen pupils completed the work of grade eight in June; George Applebee, Wyman Blake, Bertha Boardman, Albert Cady, Ida Dargie, Earl Derosia, Margaret Fowler, Cora Hillsgrove, Romina Howard, Bertha Hobbs, Henry Kelley, Maurice Kimball, Mae Lavoie, Madeline Lavoice, Eda Moses, Charles Perry, Frances Reed, Ivan Wright.

The seventeen graduates from the Academy were: Almond Atkins, Virginia Douglass, Arthur Ellsworth, Lydia Fillian, Cora Fortier, Kathleen Keith, Katherine Keyes, Carol Lavoie, Edna Mann, Mary Morrill, Herman Morrill, Russell McAulay, Edith Nelson, Lawrence Smith, Edith Stevens, Marion White, Haines Winn.

The most notable school event of the year is undoubtedly the remodeling of the lower floor of Pearson

Hall into three modern grade rooms and the transference of the grades from the high school building. This change has given the grades better accommodations and has enabled the high school to conduct its business independent of the grades. In this way the frictio which invariably results when high school and grades are housed together in close quarters has been obviated and each could regulate its daily program according to its need. The pupils of the high school have been very appreciative of the better class rooms and their accessibility without a journey out of doors. Only slight alterations were made on the Academy building. A partition between the old library and the girls dressing room was removed to make a recitation room, the library transferred to the small room at the opposite end of the hall, and more shelf and closet room made in the science recitation room to house the apparatus. The kitchen in Pearson Hall is still in use for the cooking classes for both the grades and high school. If the upper floor of Pearson Hall is remodeled as suggested, the kitchen will have to be transferred to the Academy building and the grade girls will then have to pass between the buildings for their cooking lessons.

The closing of the Ladd Street school and the transportation of the pupils to the Haverhill school has been a decided advance educationally. The transportation has been satisfactory, the children have had the advantage of better lighted, heated and more attractive schoolroom and of three teachers instead of one. As long as the district receives state aid, all reasonable charges for transportation outside the two mile limit will be allowed and any extra expense to the district will be offset by lessened cost of fuel, janitor and upkeep in general. The division of eight grades among three teachers in Pearson Hall has been based on the size of the grades and the size of the rooms. At best in any one year some room will get larger than the others but perhaps in a period of years there will be an equalization of grades and numbers among the teachers.

Failure to have children vaccinated before entering school causes more or less friction and loss of time when vaccination takes place in term time. That people may fully understand the requirement and have children vaccinated during the summer vacation I give below the law in full. "No child shall attend a public or private school in this state unless he has been vaccinated; or has had smallpox; or has submitted not less than three times to the process of vaccination; or holds a certificate of the local board of health that he is an unfit subject for vaccination. The local board of health shall issue such certificate on the advice of a registered physician approved by it.

"The parent, guardin or other person having the custody of a child who is affected with or who has been exposed to a communicable disease shall not permit him to attend either a public or a private school.

"Any person who violates any provision of the two preceeding sections shall be fined ten dollars.

The fact that there were last year 874 visits to schools in town by parents and other citizens seems to indicate an increasing interest in the schools on the part of the public. An active interest on the part of the community is a stimulus to teacher and pupil. One of the most helpful things a parent can do is to visit school and talk over any school problem with the teacher. When this is done in the right spirit only good can result.

The appended report of Headmaster Jenkins gives specific information about the high school. The general spirit of the school continues excellent; a higher grade of scholarship is required; there is a willingness to do the thing that needs to be done without coercion; students are learning lessons in social and civic relationships and responsibilities no less than in history or science. Education is not merely an acquisition of facts from books or other sources but is fundamentally the development of those attitudes, habits and ideals which make for good character.

#### **REPORT OF HEADMASTER**

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I am herewith submitting my fourth annual report of Haverhill Academy and High School for the year ending January 31, 1928.

The total enrollment for the year was 92. Seniors 17; Juniors 26; Sophomores 21; Freshmen 28; The enrollment by curricula was as follows: Academic 25; English 47; Domestic Arts 28.

No change has been made in the program of studies, which stands as follows:

Academic: four years of English, four years of Latin, three years of French with the third year elective, two years of History, three years of mathematics with the third year elective, one year of Physics, one year of Chemistry which is elective.

English: The English Curriculum differs from the Academic in that Latin is omitted and Biology and Geology, Economics and Business Practices, and a third year of History is substituted.

Domestic Arts: This curriculum substitutes a course in Textiles and Clothing for Botany and Geology,Foods and Nutrition for Geometry, the Home, Its Care and Management for French or Physics, anr The Family and Its Members for Math. Review, French or Chemistry. Ot the three curricula the English is the most general. The Academic is designed especially for college preparation, although a diploma in any one of the three will admit the holder to any college which is a member of the New England College Board provided the holder has attained the required average, while the Domestic Arts is more specialized.

Of the seventeen pupils who graduated in June two are attending the State University; two Plymouth Normal, two Concord Business College and one is in training at the Haover hospital.

There are at the present time twenty-three recent graduates attending post-secondary or special training institutions.

The annual senior play and junior prom were held on March 18 and May 28 respectively.

The Entertainment Committee has furnished the general assemblies with programs consisting of short plays, editorials, music etc.

News items have been supplied to both local newspepers.

The "School Fund," treasurer's books show a cash balance of \$214.24, \$91.00 of which is to be applied on a new piano. This amount has been raised by magazine subscription sales, Xmas cards sales and candy sales. At the present rate of receipts the Piano Fund Committee will be in a position to purchase, in the near future, the much needed piano.

Baseball and basket ball have been maintained as usual. It has been the policy of the coaches to maintain the athletics for the benefit of as many of the pupils as wish to avail themselves of the opportunity instead of adopting a policy for winning games only. The result has bee that over fifty per cent of the pupils are now on the three squads.

The most singular improvement of the past year has been the remodeling of Pearson's Hall. The three

new grade rooms now on the first floor are a credit to any community. The workmanship is excellent, the sanitary conditions perfect and the efficiency of instruction and administration more than doubled. The combining of the Ladd Street School has made it possible to divide the eight grades among the three teachers in such a way that there are only three grades at the most to one teacher while these same pupils had under the old plan one teacher for six grades. The result is that the Ladd Street pupils now have the equivalent of two teachers. This means longer class periods and more individual attention. Practically the same benefits have accrued to the grades previously housed in the Academy building, while the benefits accruing to the high school can hardly be enumerated. The removal of the grades have given us three large class rooms and one extra coat room. It has removed the dangers, difficulties and time lost in passing classes between the two buildings. It has made it possible to have the recess periods at different times thus removing the difficulties arising from older and younger pupils playing together. It has made it possible to arrange the daily time-table so as to reduce conflicts to a minimum. It has done away with the unavoidable disturbance caused to the one group by the movements of the other. It has developed a keener sense of pride and ownership on the part of the pupils, and finally it has displayed the progressive spirit and unselfish attitude of the citizens of this community.

#### AUDITOR'S REPORT

I have, this day, examined the accounts of the School Board and Treasurer of the Haverhill Town School District for the period from July 1, 1926 to June 30, 1927 and find them correct.

There was a cash balance at the Woodsville National Bank on June 30, 1927 of \$3,079.54, but inasmuch as there are outstanding vouchers Nos. 464, 551, 569 and 576 totaling \$731.07 it leaves an actual cash balance in the hands of the Treasurer of \$2,348.47. Two temporary notes, one of \$3,000.00 and one of \$2,500.00, have been paid and the notes I burned in the presence of two members of the School Board.

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# Annual Report of Water and Light Commissioners

#### **WOODSVILLE PRECINCT**

In regard to development of the water supply, your commissioners believe after a careful and diligent research, after consultation with various engineers and officials, that the best solution is an iron removal and filtration plant in connection with the supply on the island.

The character of the water is very satisfactory, except for the presence of iron which can be easily isomoved. We realize a proper iron removal plant and proper filtration and clear water reservoir will cost from \$40,000 to \$50,000, according to various estimates from various engineers. While this seems like quite a sum with the work already done, the total cost will give us a very inexpensive and adequate water supply in comparison with any other system obtainable. We believe the cost compares favorably with expenditures of any similar village. We recommend this for your consideration.

We hope that the voters all realize that their plant was hard hit in the flood of November and the bulk of the expense will have to be paid from our 1928 earnings. We have paid some of this from our 1927 earnings and hope that we can handle our flood damage without any outside help, and also take care of our bond issue. A conservative estimate of our loss of use of equipment and repairs on equipment is from \$6,000 to \$7.000.
