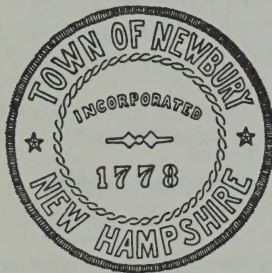

# TOWN WARRANT

## The State of New Hampshire

THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM 1:00 P.M. to 7:00 P.M.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Newbury in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said South Newbury on Tuesday, the tenth (10th) day of March, next at one of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To see if the Town will vote to recess the business meeting until Wednesday, March 11, 1981, at 7:00 P.M.
3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
5. To see if the Town will vote to accept the minutes of the 1980 Town Meeting as printed.
6. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell tax acquired properties to the highest bidder at a duly advertised auction.
7. To hear reports of the Town Officers, Agents and Committees heretofore chosen and pass any vote related thereto.
8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,086.53 for Town Road Assistance on Class IV and V Roads, the State to contribute the sum of \$7,243.51.
9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,927.19 for the Fire Dept. Equipment Reserve Fund and authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.
10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,854.39 for the Highway Dept. Equipment Reserve Fund and authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.
11. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500 for the Dock Repair Capital Reserve Fund.
12. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for the Town History Publication Reserve Fund.
13. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 for the Fire Department Equipment Reserve Fund.
14. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,000 for the Highway Department Equipment Reserve Fund.
15. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,030 for the replacement of 350' of fence at Lakeside Cemetery.

16. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$92,100 for the purchase of a new road grader for the Highway Department and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Highway Department Equipment Reserve Fund.

17. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,400 to reroof the Town Hall.

18. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$900 to repair and paint the ceiling in the Town Hall.

19. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500 to be used by the Planning Board in the development of a Master Plan for the Town of Newbury.

20. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000 to replace the Hydrant at Blodgett Landing.

## SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The year 1980 saw the retirement of Police Chief Arthur Jones after 20 years' service to the town, in which the Police Department grew with the town's population from a part-time position, to a full-time chief, with several special officers.

James F. Tinker Jr. was appointed our new Police Chief on Aug. 13, 1980, having held a similar position in Somersworth, N.H., for four years, and the town of Amherst, N.H., for five years, preceded by 10 years' experience in the Police Department of Washington, D.C. He served two years in the U.S. Marine Corps, and has taken many professional courses and seminars at various universities and colleges. Chief Tinker and his wife, Veronica, have four children aged 15, 13, 9 and 5. We wish him and his family success.

Inflation continues to make it just about impossible to lower town expenses. In the last decade cost for running the Police, Fire and Highway Departments has almost quadrupled. Our resident population was 509 in the 1970 Census. Our current population is 942, which in the summer increases to at least 5,000. We are the fastest growing town in Merrimack County. This growth brings with it problems in planning and demand for town services.

We were unable to successfully go into computerization of our tax records as planned. The data processing company had an error rate of 10% in the programming of our work. At the same time we were unable to make a satisfactory contract with this company.

The town is faced with the problem of a property revaluation. At the present time the Department of Revenue Administration computes our equalized valuation ratio at 41% (1980) of true value. Based on last year's figures it would mean an approximate \$40,000 increase in Newbury's share of the school tax. Last year it cost \$2,522 per pupil. This coming year, assuming \$40,000 increase and no change in the number of pupils or other factors, it would be \$2,670.

**SEWER COMMISSIONERS REPORT**

Maintenance work at the Blodgett-Croft Sewer continued in an orderly pace during 1980.

For some time the bearings in one of the large pumps in the silo at Blodgetts has been very noisy and before any major damage was done we thought it was time to fix it. This fall while the sewerage flow was at its lowest the pump was pulled and overhauled at very modest cost. Of interest, a large rock was found in the impeller that had been worn round with the motion of the pump and was still too large to be expelled.

This year the purchase of a rake to haul behind the tractor to rake the sand beds at the imhoff tank has reduced the number of man hours needed in raking the beds. This saving has amounted to more than the cost of the rake.

This year we didn't have the expense of \$5,170 of principal and interest because of the pay off last year of Blodgett Landing Sewer Bond. We hope next year will be as good, but we have to remember we are working with 18-year-old equipment.

## NEWBURY PUBLIC LIBRARY

## PLANNING BOARD REPORT

Planning Board activity increased during 1980, more in the subdivision area than in the building area, along with work in connection with the Town Master Plan.

Eleven meetings were held in addition to 11 hearings and two special meetings.

In July, a lengthy questionnaire was mailed to all taxpayers (1,250 in total) soliciting replies and comments. The responses (527 questionnaires were returned — 42%) were most gratifying and indicated a sincere interest in the town and its future. We extend our thanks to all who participated in this initial phase of the planning.

Over 100 individuals volunteered to serve with the board on the Master Plan Committee.

A summary of the replies to the questionnaires will appear as a two-part feature story in The Argus-Champion newspaper in early 1981.

Master Plan activity will require a significant increase in work load for all board members in 1981.

Some professional consulting assistance will be required to compile further data and complete work on this state-mandated Master Plan.

The board would again like to thank the people of the town for their continued support and cooperation.

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## REPORT OF NEWBURY POLICE DEPARTMENT

Burglaries, usually of seasonal cottages, are without a doubt the most often reported serious crimes in Newbury. Of the 15 burglaries reported to this department in the last quarter of 1980, we have been able to identify those responsible in five cases, all juveniles. None had reached his 18th birthday. The high degree of cooperation encountered with parents, witnesses and neighbors in Newbury is working to the advantage of the town. An alert neighbor, keeping his eye on your vacant property, is better protection against vandals and burglars than 10 police officers. Newbury's citizens make regular calls to the emergency dispatch center reporting suspicious activity and at least once it has paid off with information leading to the discovery of a break-in and the identity of the would-be thieves. The "I don't want to get involved" attitude seems not to exist in Newbury and we hope it never does.

Fatal automobile accidents have nearly doubled in New Hampshire in the last 10 years. The majority of car crashes in Newbury are limited to fender-benders and a few sudden trips from an icy road to the snow-bank. Compared to some of our neighbors, we are relatively fortunate.

A police office has been constructed in the town hall, directly across from the office of the tax collector. A central records and filing system has been established along with a place where members of the public may speak privately with police officers. We plan to have an officer on duty weekdays, at the office at 10 a.m. for routine business. For police service any time, call 526-2777.

We have established an increased, regular patrol hoping that higher visibility will lower the incidence of thefts, vandalism and burglaries. Anyone leaving his home empty for more than a weekend should give us a call so we can add the address to our vacant house security checklist. I am convinced that persons on this list are less often victims of crime than those who are not on the list. In the least we can discover broken windows and open doors before the elements do their damage.

#### **Communications and Training — Goals in 1981.**

An on-going training program has been launched within the Newbury Police Department. By late 1981 we expect to have all special officers certified by the New Hampshire Police Standards and Training Council. In addition we are conducting regular monthly training sessions on skills necessary to carry out the routine responsibilities of the rural police officer.

Every time the Legislature meets there are significant changes in the criminal law and in the motor vehicle law. Almost daily the Supreme Courts of New Hampshire and the United States make rulings that every enforcement officer must know about. Continued training is a must to insure effective prosecution by all Newbury officers who must appear and testify from time to time in the New London District Court and the Merrimack County Superior Court.

Until late 1980, the officer on duty in Newbury had to be near his cruiser radio or a telephone in order to be called in case of a request for police service. We have taken temporary steps to correct this communications gap by renting a radio/pager. Worn on the officer's belt, it can be immediately activated by the police dispatcher to call the officer when needed. This permits the patrolman to come and go unrestricted and still be available in a minimum of time.

Plans for 1981 include the purchase of two pagers, one for the duty officer and one to be with the Chief of Police at all times. A hand-held portable radio is also in the plans, similar to those used by the Fire Department. This will permit voice communications between an officer on foot, police cruisers and the police dispatcher; a much needed piece of equipment both for the efficiency of the department and for the safety of the individual officer.

Newbury is a small town of less than 1,000 people, swelling to over 5,000 and sometimes as many as 8,000 when the weather is just right for tourists to enjoy the attractive New Hampshire countryside. This population makeup does not permit our department to provide a police officer on duty on patrol 24 hours a day. To provide this service would require an unreasonably large increase in the police budget.

This year we have been working with the Emergency Medical Services (EMS) to incorporate the service of a Fast Squad into the Fire Department. We have at this time three state and nationally registered Emergency Medical Technicians (EMT's) as members of the department and expect to increase the number in the coming year. The Fast Squad will **not** take the place of, but will add to, the ambulance services in our area.

## REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST FIRE SERVICE

Forest Fire Prevention: Your Business, Our Business, Good Business. Forest fire prevention slogans have been seen in association with Smokey Bear since the late 1940's when a national effort to check the spread of forest fires was implemented.

New Hampshire residents recognized that forest fire prevention and suppression was the responsibility of every citizen, a half century before this national campaign, when our Legislature established our first forest fire laws in 1903. Since that date, the state has appointed a town/city forest fire warden who is responsible for forest fire law enforcement in his municipality.

All fires kindled out of doors when there is no snow on the ground must be approved in writing by the forest fire warden before being kindled. All forest fires must be suppressed by the warden and his deputies as soon as they are reported. The cost of fire suppression is shared jointly by the town/city and the State of New Hampshire, as are forest fire prevention and forest fire training costs.

This state and local municipality cooperative forest fire program has given New Hampshire one of the best forest fire records in the United States.

## REPORT OF THE HEALTH OFFICER

The state has come up with new regulations concerning the installation and repair of septic systems. These combined with our town regulations establish the following:

1. Unsuitable land may not be subdivided.
2. The Planning Board may require percolation tests and state approved sewage disposal plans and lots in a subdivision.
3. No subdivision will be approved by the state unless a test hole has been dug and the lot approved by the Health Officer.
4. The owner of a lot must sign his approval of a septic system design, as must the Health Officer, before it goes to Concord.
5. Absolutely no changes from approved plans may be made without permission from Concord.
6. Any changes in old systems must be approved by Concord.

## NEWPORT AREA HOME HEALTH AGENCY

1980 has been a year of moderate growth in most areas of service for the Agency. Skilled nursing visits have increased except in the area of maternal child care. The number of physical and occupational therapy visits has increased considerably. Hypertension (high blood pressure) screening, Well-Child, Women, Infants and Children, and Dental Clinics have all been well attended.

The Newport Area Home Health Agency is funded by third-party payers for those who have coverage, by the State of New Hampshire for Maternal Child Health Clients, by the United Way for services in the area of child abuse and neglect, by town appropriations and by private individuals who can afford to pay for services.

The Agency's philosophy is to provide needed home health care services to all citizens in the area regardless of their ability to pay. The Agency depends heavily on the towns to support those who are not able to pay, to do health promotion and education and to support clinics.

1981 finds the Agency with 10 employees, mostly part time, ready and able to provide a wide range of home health care services to the seven towns it serves.

## SCHOOL BOARD MEMBER REPORT

The year 1980 has been a very demanding year for the Kearsarge Regional School Board. It would not be inaccurate to describe the economic conditions as perhaps the worst since the depression of the 1930's. The spiraling inflation and rising prices for basic consumer needs seem never ending and have a drastic effect upon the school budget. The school board is very sensitive to employee benefits and utility rates which rise during a school year after a budget has been introduced and adopted by the school district. The long and short of it is that the school board will have to be flexible so that it can change programs and priorities to conform to the economic pressures.

This past year saw the retirement of Gordon Flint after many many years as superintendent of the school district. With his retiring, John Sokul was appointed as the new superintendent and two assistant superintendents were also appointed: Paul Linehan and Douglas McDonald. When Paul Linehan accepted the assistant superintendent position, a vacancy occurred for the high school principal position and this was filled by one of the teachers from our own school district, Edward Johnson. We wish all of the above persons success in their new positions and know that our students will benefit from the experience.

I am happy to report that our students again have had success in their achievement tests during the past year; the Kearsarge Regional High School district compares with the top school districts of the state.

I urge each and every one of the residents of Newbury to attend the annual meeting of the Kearsarge Regional High School District. As you know, there are serious matters to be discussed, such as the necessity for a new roof on the high school and other budget matters. These matters have a direct bearing on your tax bills and your input is necessary to reflect the community's thinking.

I have enjoyed serving the Town of Newbury as your representative on the Kearsarge Regional High School Board and I am available to discuss any school board issues with you at any time. I will be looking forward to seeing all of you at the school board's annual meeting.

## DARTMOUTH-LAKE SUNAPEE REGION ASSN.

The officers and board of directors of the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Assn. (DLSRA) wish to thank the townspeople and officials of Newbury for their generous appropriation at the 1980 Town Meeting.

DLSRA, a non-profit organization, worked hard to make this area a vacation destination during 1980. Our 120 business members and volunteer board members believe that all businesses, not only inns and restaurants, benefit from a healthy vacation travel economy. We applied for and received over \$7,000 in N.H. State Matching Funds to produce and distribute 75,000 copies of our new color-covered vacation brochure. This was the first time our region had a selling piece that was competitive with other sections of the state and New England. Exactly \$7,332 in private funds were matched by a like amount of state dollars in November 1980 so that DLSRA could organize and carry out an important advertising campaign to promote mid-week skiing in our region. All major downhill and cross-country centers participated along with over 25 lodging and dining establishments. DLSRA also funded a seven-day-a-week live ski information phone during the winter of 1979-80.

In addition to these major achievements DLSRA mailed nearly 4,000 vacation kits to people who wrote our office, handled several hundred phone inquiries, prepared several news releases and feature stories for over 90 travel editors throughout the East and established a unique theatre/lodging/dining discount program for summer arts enthusiasts.

This year promises to be busier than last and we would sincerely appreciate your continued support! Thank you.

**COMMUNITY ACTION PROGRAM  
BELKNAP-MERRIMACK COUNTIES, INC.**

The Kearsarge Valley Community Action Program located in the Old Graded School, Main Street, Warner, serves eight towns in Merrimack County: Bradford, Henniker, New London, Newbury, Sutton, Warner, Webster and Wilmot. This year we were able to double the dollar amount of services to the Elderly and low-income families of this area. That translates to \$354,463.63 in services.

Services to the Elderly include Meals-on-Wheels and the Senior Companion Program for shut-ins; Congregate Meal Sites in Henniker, New London-Wilmot and Warner, and a Rural Transportation Bus that gets Senior Citizens into Concord. Our fuel assistance program last year reached 220 families in the eight towns. We expect that this year even more people can be helped. We are again offering an Adult Basic Education Course teaching basic skills in the areas of parenting, family health, money management and nutrition. In addition, this year we are going on 24-hour call for emergency situations. There will be a phone number published when the program gets into full operation.

The money your town appropriates for Community Action goes to run the Area Center in Warner. The Center's budget goes for salaries, travel expenses, office supplies and the cost of heat and maintenance for the Community Action Neighborhood Center. The Federal government provides the bulk of monies for the 1981 budget. What we ask from each town is a percentage of program participants from each town.

**Zoning Amendments:**

Are you in favor of the adoption of the Zoning Amendments to the existing Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board?

1. The location and size of the site and its use, the size and design of the structure, the nature and intensity of the operation involved and the relation of the site with respect to existing or planned public highways and rights of way giving access to it, shall be such that it will be in harmony with the surrounding area.

2. The location, nature, design and height of the structure and its appurtenances, its scale with reference to its surroundings, and the nature and intensity of the use, shall not have an adverse effect on the environment nor discourage the appropriate and orderly development and use of land and buildings in the neighborhood, impair the value thereof, or otherwise be detrimental or injurious to the neighborhood by reason of a tendency to produce noise, vibration, light, dust, smoke, fumes, odor, unsightliness, refuse matter or other detrimental conditions.

3. There is a reasonable need for the proposed use in the location proposed.

4. Adequate and lawful facilities or arrangements for sewage disposal, water supply, utilities, drainage and other necessary public or private services, are approved or assured, to the end that the use will be capable of proper operation.

5. The use will not be detrimental to vehicular and pedestrian traffic movement in the neighborhood nor cause traffic congestion.

6. The proposed structure and/or use shall be compatible with the spirit and intent of this Zoning Ordinance including its density standards.

In granting any special exception the Board may prescribe reasonable conditions and safeguards deemed necessary to prevent nuisance and promote harmony with the neighborhood, and the disregard of any condition or safeguard when made part of the terms under which a special exception is granted shall be a violation of this Ordinance. In the case of a special exception involving a large construction project, which would be a blight on the neighborhood if not completed as represented to the Board, a condition may be imposed requiring the applicant to demonstrate reasonable financial ability or financial responsibility to carry the project to completion, as represented, and in compliance with other conditions imposed by the Board, prior to the issuance of a building permit.

ARTICLE 3: To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.

ARTICLE 5: To see if the Town will vote to accept the minutes of the 1979 Town Meeting as printed.

Georgette Gagnon made motion to accept Article 5 as read. George Beal seconded motion. Article was carried by show of hands vote. So voted.

ARTICLE 6: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell tax acquired property to the highest bidder at a duly advertised auction.

Frank Veazie made motion to accept Article 6 as read. Motion was seconded by Evelyn Davis. Article was carried by show of hands vote. So voted.

ARTICLE 7: To hear reports of the Town Officers, Agents and Committees heretofore chosen and pass any vote related thereto.

George Beal made motion to accept reports which were included in Town Report. Motion seconded. Article 7 carried by show of hands vote. So voted.

ARTICLE 8: To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,084.55 for Town Road Assistance on Class IV and V Roads, the State to contribute the sum of \$7,230.32.

Harold Folsom moved Article 8 be accepted as read. Motion seconded. Article 8 carried by show of hands vote. So voted.

ARTICLE 9: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,308.98 for the Fire Department Equipment Reserve Fund and authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Henry Thomas motioned to have Article 9 be accepted as read. David Smith seconded the motion. Article 9 was carried by show of hands vote. So voted.

ARTICLE 10: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,617.97 for the Highway Department Equipment Reserve Fund and authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Harold Folsom made motion to accept Article 10 as read. Seconded by George Klotz. Article 10 was carried by show of hands vote. So voted.

ARTICLE 11: To see if the Town will vote to provide workmen's compensation coverage for eligible employees by participating in New Hampshire Municipal Association Self-funded Workers' Compensation Program, and to authorize the selectmen to take such action in furtherance of this vote as may be necessary.

George Beal made motion to accept Article 11 as read. Frank Veazie seconded. Article was carried by show of hands vote. So voted.

ARTICLE 12: To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500 for the Dock Repair Capital Reserve Fund.

George Beal made motion to accept Article as read. Georgette Gagnon seconded. Article 12 was carried by show of hands vote. So voted.

ARTICLE 13: To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the Town History Publication Fund.

Thomas Leach made motion to accept Article 13 as read. Paul Diekmann seconded the motion. Article 13 carried by show of hands vote. So voted.

ARTICLE 14: To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for the Fire Department Equipment Reserve Fund.

Joseph Digilio made motion to table Article 14 as read. Motion to table Article 14 was defeated by show of hands vote. David Smith made motion to accept Article 14 as read. Seconded by George Johnson. Article 14 was carried by show of hands vote. So voted.

ARTICLE 15: To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,000.00 for the Highway Department Reserve Equipment Fund.

Harold Folsom made motion to postpone Article 15 to another year. Motion seconded by Thomas Leach. It was voted by show of hands vote not to adopt Article 15.



ARTICLE 16: To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$36,000.00 for the purchase of a new dump truck for the Highway Department and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Highway Department Equipment Reserve Fund.

Harold Folsom made motion to accept Article 16 as read. George Beal seconded the motion. Article was carried by show of hands vote. So voted.

ARTICLE 17: To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,600.00 for the purchase of a new sander for the Highway Department and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Highway Department Equipment Reserve Fund.

Harold Folsom made motion to accept Article 17 as read. Norman Smith seconded motion. Article 17 was carried by show of hands vote. So voted.

ARTICLE 18: To see what action the Town wishes to take regarding building a 30'x42' addition to the Town Shed and raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$19,000.00 for same.

Harold Folsom made motion to accept Article 18 as read. George Klotz seconded motion. Article 18 carried by show of hands vote. So voted.

ARTICLE 19: To see what action the Town wishes to take regarding replacing the heating system at Newbury Center Firehouse and raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$3,000.00 for same.

Scott Wheeler made motion to accept Article 19 as read. Norman Smith seconded motion. Article 19 carried by show of hands vote. So voted.

ARTICLE 20: To see what action the Town wishes to take in regards to replacing the Hydrant at Blodgett Landing and raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$3,000.00 for same.

Thomas Leach made motion to table Article 20. Carl Christiansen seconded the motion. Motion to table Article 20 defeated. Scott Wheeler made motion to pass over indefinitely. Arthur Jones seconded motion. It was voted by show of hands vote to postpone indefinitely Article 20. Not adopted.

ARTICLE 21: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to dispose of the 1949 Chevrolet Fire Truck at a duly advertised auction.

Georgette Gagnon made motion to accept Article 21 as read. Motion seconded. Article 21 carried by show of hands vote. So voted.

ARTICLE 22: To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,600 to buy a 1980 4-Door Sedan Police Cruiser as a replacement for 1974 cruiser.

Arthur Jones made motion to accept Article 22 as read. Norman Smith seconded motion. Moderator Vincent Iacopino asked for paper ballots. Results of the voting are as follows.

Yes 52                      No 26

ARTICLE 22 carried by paper ballots. So voted.

ARTICLE 23: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to enter into contract with the Granite State Data Service of South Weare, N.H., to maintain fiscal and other records as provided in RSA 8-C:11 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500 to cover first year's costs.

Georgette Gagnon made motion Article 23 be accepted as read. George Beal seconded motion. Article 23 carried by show of hands vote. So voted.

ARTICLE 24: To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 to be used by the Planning Board in the development of a Master Plan for the Town of Newbury.

George Beal made motion to amend Article 24, to read, to see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be used by the Planning Board in the development of a Master Plan for the Town of Newbury.

Article 24 was carried as amended by a show of hands vote. So voted.

ARTICLE 25: To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$494.00 for membership in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association.

Carl Christiansen made motion to postpone indefinitely. Motion seconded. Motion to postpone Article 25 was defeated by show of hands vote.

Arthur Jones made motion to accept Article 25 as read. Motion seconded. Article 25 carried by show of hands vote. So voted.

ARTICLE 26: To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$975.00 to construct ramps for access to the town hall by handicapped individuals as mandated by the Architectural Barrier Free Design Code for the State of N.H. adopted in accordance with RSA 275C, August 30, 1978.

George Beal made motion to accept Article 26 as read. Motion seconded. Article 26 carried by show of hands vote. So voted.

ARTICLE 27: To see if the Town wishes to establish the legal names of the following:

a) The Pond originally Otter Pond to be called Gillingham Pond to honor the Gillingham family.

b) That the road, originally Plains Road, sometimes called Pleasant View Road, in the telephone book South Road, be named Newell Road to honor the late Milford Newell. (That section of the road running from Sherman's corner to Brown Road.)

c) That road from South Road west, now Morse Road, to Morse Lane to stop confusion with Morse Hill Road.

Ernest Sherman made motion that Article 27 be accepted as printed. Motion seconded. Article 27 sections a, b, c, carried by show of hands vote. So voted.

ARTICLE 28: To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Ernest Sherman: RE: School meeting. Would urge more taxpayers to be represented at annual School Meeting. In the past a large percent of those voting on the School Budget are employees of the school. This influences our School Tax Rate.

George Beal: RE: Tax Rate. Urged taxpayers to take the time to go to the School Meeting and vote. If all articles in School Budget were passed our tax rate could be \$31.10 per thousand. The Town of Newbury's share of costs relating to the School Budget are 12%, which has a very pronounced effect on our tax rate. The Bicentennial quilt which was framed by Harold Miles has been very successfully displayed in the Town Hall. A committee to be formed to study the Sewer System at Blodgett Landing and to submit recommendations and/or other equitable ways of sharing costs of Sewer. Joseph Digilio to be named chairman, others to be named at a later date, by the Selectmen.

George Beal: RE: James Wright who had been a Selectman for many years. Milford Newell who had been in charge of the heating system in the Town Hall and a ballot clerk for many years. Merton Perkins who had been Road Agent for 25 years. As citizens and friends in the community we remember each individual for the valuable service each gave to Town of Newbury.

Ernest Sherman made motion that we send Moses Bly a special birthday greeting in honor of his 100th birthday, March 20, 1980. Motion seconded. Carried by show of hands vote.

Paul Diekmann mentioned we should also honor other Senior Citizens.

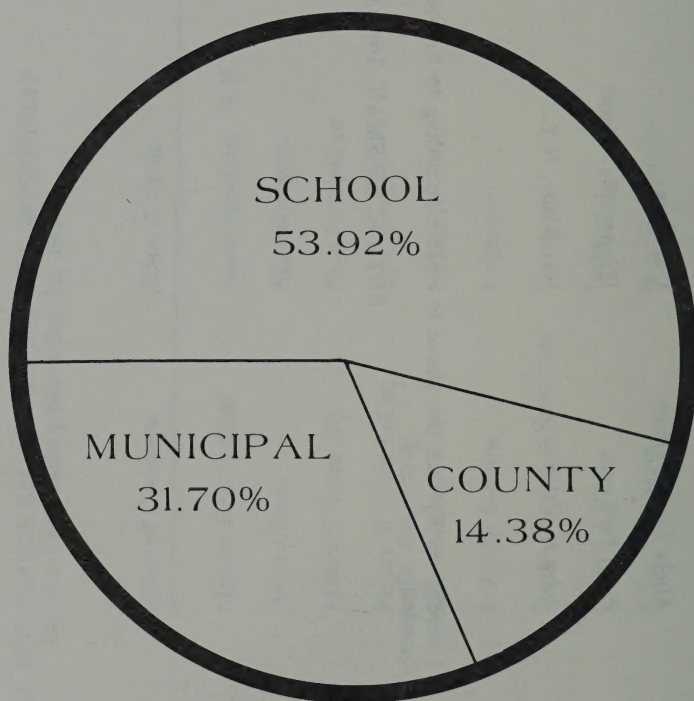


