DEDICATION

In the world of academia, he was Dr. Sleeper, or Professor Sleeper. In Sanbornton, he was Ralph.

Though our contact with the Town goes back much further, Ralph and I did not get acquainted until 1972, when we became Sanbornton residents. We first met as members of the Budget Committee. Our lengthy relationship on the Budget Committee was sometimes spirited, always respectful.

Together with Earl Leighton, we represented the Town in the Lakes Region Solid Waste Management District, a district comprising 22 towns. Soon after the district was constituted, Ralph's abilities were recognized and he was elected President, a title Ralph avoided. He preferred being called Chairman. As the District Representative, he attended meetings throughout the state. At that time, the Sanbornton Landfill was the envy of the district, and several towns were pressing to share it. Ralph's priority was to preserve the status of our dump, and to avoid costly entanglements with other entities. We are still benefitting from this foresighted policy.

The ubiquitous Ralph also served on the Building Committee, the Planning Board, the Board of Selectmen, and until now, as Town Moderator. He was a factor in the Historic District, and Market Day wasn't the same without his expertise on the barbecue pits.

Ralph was a strong-willed personality. He first determined what in his judgement was best for the Town. Then, when he took a stand on an issue, he followed through tenaciously.

For two decades, Ralph gave unstintingly of himself to the Town. Sanbornton was his beneficiary during his lifetime. He was ever resolute and pragmatic, even when he made the decision on how to deal with his final illness. The traits that sometimes annoyed, were the very traits that endeared.

His wife Louise will miss him, his family will miss him, the Town will miss him, and I will miss the man I admired so much.

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REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

The 1993 revaluation of property was completed this Fall by the Department of Revenue Administration. The intent of the 1993 revaluation was to bring all property in Sanbornton to full market value as of April 1, 1993. The last revaluation was conducted in 1983, and taxes have been assessed on these values since that time. In performing the revaluation, state appraisers reviewed all recent sales in the Town of Sanbornton. By analyzing these sales they were able to determine the market value for the remainder of the town.

The 1993 tax rate was set on the new Net Assessed Valuation of \$168,415,689, up from \$87,716,639 in 1992. This allowed the rate to drop from \$34.21 per thousand to \$18.08 per thousand. While every parcel of property increased in value, the market determined that some areas of town, and certain types of property, saw greater increases in value over the past ten years. This realignment caused a shift in the tax burden for many property owners.

The disposal of solid waste is the next major issue for the town to address. By Fall we will need to have an alternative in place for solid waste disposal and it will be a radical change from the way we have always disposed of our waste. The Solid Waste Disposal Committee has been hard at work identifying alternatives and will offer their findings at this year's Town Meeting. As we make this transition, the cooperation of each and every one of us is essential.

Town employees, along with many volunteers, have contributed in so many ways to the smooth functioning of the Town of Sanbornton. We are thankful for these dedicated individuals.

The Board of Selectmen will deeply miss Ralph Sleeper, his wit and wisdom. We thank his wife, Louise, and his family for sharing him with us for so many years.

We will truly miss Warren Lake's insight and thoughtful perspective as he steps down after nine years of service on the Board of Selectmen. We thank him for his fairness, his dedication and his hard work.

MINUTES OF THE 1993 TOWN MEETING March 9, 1993 Town of Sanbornton State of New Hampshire

Under the direction of the Moderator, Ralph W. Sleeper, the polls remained open from 10:00 AM to 7:00 PM. Of the 1389 registered voters, 450 (32%) participated in the election. The results of the ballot count follows.

Re: Adjusted Elderly Exemption

Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:43-f for the adjusted elderly exemptions from Property tax? These statutes provide for the following exemptions, based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers: for a person 65 years of age up to 75 years, \$10,000; for a person 75 years of age up to 80 years, \$15,000; for a person 80 years of age or older, \$20,000. To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 5 years; own real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by his spouse, they must have been married for at least 5 years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of less that \$10,000 or if married, a combined net income of less than \$12,000, and own net assets of \$30,000 or less, excluding the value of the person's residence."

Amend the current Agricultural (A) zoning designation to General Residence (GR) for all land, and future sub-division thereof, identified on Tax Map 21, lots 51, 60, and 61-1, and including all land on the south side of Threshing Mill Brook identified on Tax Map 21, lot 31? (Disapproved by the Planning Board)

March 10, 1993 Life/Safety Building

The Moderator, Ralph Sleeper, called the meeting to order at 7:10 PM, led the Pledge of Allegiance, and then introduced Reverend Leslie Norman for the convocation. The Moderator introduced Daryl Woods, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, who recognized Anne Ingemundsen for her Certification by the New Hampshire Tax Collectors' Association. Selectman Woods next recognized Thomas Salatiello for his outstanding service to the Town of Sanbornton during his nine years (1984-1993) as Selectman.

The Moderator read the results of the preceding day's vote and directed those elected to appear to be sworn in after the recount period has expired.

Mr. Sleeper introduced Nina Gardner, Sanbornton School Board Representative, who urged all registered voters to be present at the Winnisquam Regional School District meeting on March 20, 1993 at which time the school costs formula would be addressed. Mr. Donald Foudriat, a member of the 1992-1993 Formula Study Committee, reiterated Mrs. Gardner's concerns and pointed out that the fiscal impact could be most significant.

The Moderator proceeded with the warrant, as a motion to waive the reading of the entire warrant, had been proposed and passed.

Article 1. Subject: General Business

To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to incur debt in anticipation of taxes in order to pay current maintenance and operation expenses and to insure a note or notes therefore; to administer any real estate acquired through Tax Collector's deeds; and to apply for, accept and expend such grants, funds, and gifts as may be available to the Town from private sources and from other governmental agencies; and to accept the dedication of any street shown on a subdivision plat approved by the planning board, provided that such street has been constructed to applicable town specifications as determined by the Board of Selectmen or their agent.

Accepted as read

Article 2. Subject: Library

To see if the town will vote to authorize the Sanbornton Public Library to apply for, accept, and expend without further action by the Town Meeting, money which may become available during the fiscal year from the state, federal or other governmental units and private sources. The article or item shall be used only for legal purposes for which a town may appropriate money; not require the expenditure of other town funds; and be exempt from all provisions of RSA 32, relative to limitations and expenditures of town funds.

Accepted as read

Article 3. Subject: Library Trustees To see if the town will vote to allow the Library Trustees to increase in number from three to five members.

Accepted as read

Article 4. Subject: Highways and Streets

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$302,339 for the maintenance of highways and streets, to be expended as follows: \$231,408 for general operations of the highway department; and \$11,000 for the purchase of a new road sander; and \$70,931 received from the highway block grant will be used to reclaim already paved sections of Perley Hill Road, Hunkins Pond Road and the Woodman Road.

This article was amended to read as follows: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$302,339 for the maintenance of highways and streets, to be expended as follows: \$220,408 for the general operation of the highway department; \$11,000 for the purchase of a new road sander; and \$70,931, received from the highway block grant, to be used to reclaim already paved sections of Perley Hill Road, Hunkins Pond Road and the Woodman Road. (Amendment corrected the amount for general operation of the Highway Department from \$231,408 to \$220,408)

Accepted as amended

Article 5. Subject: Fire Department To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$38,810 for the operation of the Sanbornton Fire Department.

Accepted as read

Article 6. Subject: Police Department To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$158,481 for the operation of the Sanbornton Police Department.

Accepted as read

Article 7. Subject: Police Department 4-Wheel Drive Vehicle To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,760 for the second and final payment on the Police Department 4-wheel drive vehicle. (The first lease payment was approved by the 1992 Town Meeting, Article #8.)

Accepted as read

Article 8. Subject: Police Department Cruiser To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,600 for the first year lease of a new Police Department cruiser. This will replace the oldest front line vehicle.

Accepted as read

Article 9. Subject: Capital Reserve Funds To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the following sums of money of which:

\$3,000 is to be placed in the Capital Reserve for Heavy Equipment; and

\$37,000 is to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for the Sanitary Landfill; and

\$2,000 is to be placed in the Town Bridges and Roads Capital Reserve Fund; and

\$30,000 to be placed in the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund; and

\$15,000 is to be placed in the Sanbornton Fire Department Repair and Refurbishing Capital Reserve Fund.

Article #9 was amended as follows:

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the following sums of money of which:

\$3,000 is to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for Heavy Equipment; and

\$37,000 is to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for the Sanitary Landfill; and

\$2,000 is to be placed in the Town Bridges and Roads Capital

Reserve Fund; and

\$30,000 to be placed in the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund; and

\$15,000 is to be placed in the Sanbornton Fire Department Repair and Refurbishing Capital Reserve Fund; and

\$5,000 is to be placed in the Winnisquam Fire Department Capital Reserve Fund.

Accepted as amended (the amendment added \$5,000 to the WFD CRF)

Article 10. Subject: Town Park Development

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000 to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for Development of a Town Recreation Park on town owned land located on Dr. True Road (Map 11, Lot 71).

Note: The moderator noted the receipt of a petition requiring a ballot vote on this article.

Article #10 failed with a ballot vote of 81 to 81

It was voted to reconsider the question (A hand count showed 90 for reconsideration - 66 against reconsideration.)

Article #10 failed a second time with a ballot vote of 85 to 81

Article 11. Subject: Solid Waste Disposal

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$43,758 for the disposal of solid waste, \$42,013 of which is for the operation of the Sanitary Landfill/Recycling Center, and \$1,745 for the annual Household Hazardous Waste Collection Program.

Discussion: Joel Anderson, Chairman of the Solid Waste Committee gave a brief report on the status of the landfill. Mr. Anderson reported that they expect that the Fall of 1994 will be the time when use of the landfill will cease, and December of 1995 as the time when the landfill will be capped. The Solid Waste Committee expects next year's Town Meeting will include a discussion of various means of disposing of our trash in the future.

Accepted as read

Article 12. Subject: Budget Committee Report To hear the report of the Budget Committee and to pass any vote in relation thereto.

Judith Rich reported the following: \$1,329,026 Budget Request <u>-495,231</u> Estimated Revenues \$ 833,795 To be raised by taxes A motion was made, seconded and approved to amend the budget to include \$25,000 for the Town Recreation Park Capital Reserve Fund. (A hand count yielded 83 Yes votes and 52 No votes.)

Though ruled out-of-order, during the discussion of the above amendment, an amendment to the above motion to amend the budget was made as follows: "Should the motion" [to include \$25,000 for the Recreation Capital Reserve Fund] "fail, Dr. True site be placed on market to be sold to a condo developer to have site placed back on tax rolls".

An additional motion was made, seconded and approved to amend the budget to include an additional \$5,281 for the Library. Judith Rich, Chairman of the Budget Committee, reported that the total budget request is now for \$1,359,307, the estimated revenue figure is \$495,231, and so the amount to be raised by taxes is \$864,076.

The report of the Budget Committee was accepted as amended.

An additional motion was made and seconded to reconsider Article #12. The maker of the motion wished to lower the amount to be raised by taxes by \$25,000.

This motion to reconsider Article #12 was defeated.

Article 13. Subject: Sale of Land To see if the town will vote to approve the sale of a 2.25 acre town lot (Lot 4, Map 26) on Pound Road, a class VI road, to an abutting land owner, Robert Williams. The sale price shall be the fair market value as determined by the town assessor at the time of sale plus all recording and transfer costs. Proceeds shall be deposited in the General Fund to reduce taxes. Recommended by the Selectmen.

Accepted as read

Article 14. Subject: Cable Television To hear a report from the Selectmen and the Cable Television Committee relative to installation of cable television in the town and the 5% franchise fee.

Report: Guy Giunta of the Cable committee reported that 99% of the cable is in place and the remaining 1% should be in place this Spring. Mr. Giunta encouraged cable users to bring any problems relating to the use of cable to the Committee, and assured their assistance. It was noted that the 5% franchise fee would result in an annual revenue of \$6,000 to \$8,000. Discussion led to a nonbinding vote regarding the continuation of the collection of this fee. The vote indicated that collection of a franchise fee was not favored.

Article 15. Subject: Emergency 911

To hear a report from the Fire Department relative to street numbering in Sanbornton in preparation for implementation of the Enhanced Emergency 911.

Report: Arthur Dowling, Fire Department Chief, reported that all roads have been mapped and numbered (except a short section of Rte 3 in Winnisquam) and each home will be numbered, so that each location can be quickly identified and appropriately serviced in the event of an emergency. There will be a small charge reflected on telephone bills when the service is implemented - Summer 1995.

Article 16. Subject: Other Business To transact such other business as may legally come before the Town Meeting.

Steve Maviglio expressed his concern over "town committee endorsement" of individual candidates for office and suggested that this body go on record as being opposed to "committee endorsement" of candidates.

After some discussion the following resolution was accepted.

Be it resolved that it is the sense of this meeting that committees and boards of the Town not endorse candidates for political office.

The Meeting was adjourned at 10:30 PM.

We have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements of the Town of Sanbornton as of and for the year ended December 31, 1993, as listed in the table of contents. These general purpose financial statements are the responsibility of the Town's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these general purpose financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the general purpose financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the general purpose financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall general purpose financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As described in Note 1B, the general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the General Fixed Assets Account Group, which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. The combining and individual fund financial statements listed in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Sanbornton. The Committee members are: Brian S. Gallagher (Chairperson), Judy Burlingame-Rich (Former Chair), Guy Giunta Jr. (Senior Member), Jeffrey Fillion (New Member), Betty Weiant (New Member), Normand Boudreau (New Member), Peter Hibberd (Secretary), and Daryl Woods (Selectmen's Representative).

During the past year, the Committee has met with many people. They included: taxpayers, department heads, town employees, boards and commissions, State Representative Robert Laflam, Belknap County Commissioner Mark Thurston, school board members, outside agencies requesting town funding, and others, in a strong effort to develop a clear profile for identifying the town's needs for all residents in 1994.

Our approach has been to keep Sanbornton citizens informed. The Committee's activities during the past year were reported in numerous newspaper articles, in concise minutes, and, for the first time, a video recording will occur of the February Public Hearing for subsequent broadcast on Cable TV to benefit taxpayers unable to travel to the hearing.

Mindful of the current economic conditions, as well as a keen awareness of how the recent revaluation of property has impacted many people, our Committee chose to present a recommended budget report for 1994 which best represents the town's population.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Sanbornton in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Sanbornton on Tuesday, the eighth (8th) day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

2. To choose all necessary District Officers for the Winnisquam Regional School District.

3. To vote on the following proposed amendments to the Town Zoning Ordinances:

Amendment #1

Amend Zoning Ordinance Article XII-B-(4) by adding a new paragraph (f):

"(f). The selectmen, or their appointed agents, shall be responsible for the enforcement of the conditions of any special exception and shall have all of the enforcement powers described in RSA 676:15, and RSA 676:17-a. In addition, any exception shall be subject to the fines and penalties set forth in RSA 676:17.

In instances where RSA 155-E:10 requires the "regulator" to enforce the terms of RSA 155-E, the zoning board of adjustment, as regulator, shall be responsible for any enforcement action for violations of RSA 155-E.

Amendment #2

Amend Zoning Ordinance Article III-E by deleting reference to "Article VII.B.5." and substituting "Article XII-B-(5)" in its place.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Sanbornton Life-Safety Building in said Sanbornton on Wednesday, the ninth (9th) day of March next, at seven of the clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. Acceptance of Grants

Shall the town accept the provisions of RSA 31:95-b providing that any town at an annual meeting may adopt an article authorizing indefinitely, until specific rescission of such authority, the selectmen to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the town meeting, unanticipated money from a state, federal, or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year?

Article 2. Acceptance of Personal Property

To see if the town will vote to authorize the board of selectmen to accept gifts of personal property which may be offered to the town for any public purpose, pursuant to RSA 31:95-e. The selectmen must hold a public hearing before accepting such gift, and the acceptance shall not bind the town to raise, appropriate, or expend any public funds for the operation, maintenance, repair or replacement of any such personal property.

Article 3. Tax Anticipation Notes

Shall the town accept the provisions of RSA 33:7 providing that any town at an annual meeting may adopt an article authorizing indefinitely, until specific rescission of such authority, the selectmen to issue tax anticipation notes?

Article 4. Transfer of Tax Liens and Sale of Tax Deeded Property Shall the town accept the provisions of RSA 80:42 and RSA 80:80 authorizing the selectmen, indefinitely, until specific rescission of such authority, to transfer tax liens and to sell tax deeded property by advertised sealed bid, public auction, or to otherwise dispose of said property as justice may require.

Article 5. Acceptance of Highways

Shall the town authorize the board of selectmen indefinitely, until specific rescission of such authority, to accept the dedication of any street or road shown on a subdivision plat approved by the planning board, provided that such street has been constructed to applicable town specifications as determined by the board of selectmen or its agent.

Article 6. Acceptance of Trust Funds

To see if the town will vote to authorize the board of selectmen indefinitely, until specific rescission of such authority, to accept on behalf of the town, gifts, legacies, and devises made to the town in trust for any public purpose, as permitted by RSA 31:19.

Article 7. Acceptance of Grants by Libraries

Shall the town accept the provisions of RSA 202-A:4-c providing that any town at an annual meeting may adopt an article authorizing indefinitely, until specific rescission of such authority, the public library trustees to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the town meeting, unanticipated money from a state, federal or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year?

Article 8. Pay Increase for Town Employees

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$21,603 to fund a 5% pay increase for town and library employees. The sum of \$15,311 has been calculated and recommended by the Budget Committee and is included in the proposed budget. The balance of \$6,292 includes \$1,535 for FICA. Recommended by the Selectmen. Not recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article 9. Bonus Payment in Lieu of Pay Increase

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the following sums of money for one time flat (bonus) payments to town and library employees in lieu of a percentage pay raise for 1994.

- \$3,562 Town Office (5 employees)
- \$4,125 Police Department (6 employees)
- \$4,313 Highway Department (6 employees)
- \$1,875 Landfill Operation (5 employees)
- \$1,436 Library (3 employees)
- \$15,311 Total Bonus Payments

Recommended by the Budget Committee. Not recommended by the Selectmen.

Article 10. Employee Health Insurance

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$76,600 to fund employee health insurance coverage. Recommended by the Selectmen. Not recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article 11. Highway Department Vehicle

To see if the town will vote raise and appropriate the sum of \$59,985 for the purchase of a Highway Department truck and complete plow and wing assembly, and to offset the appropriation by the withdrawal of \$20,000 from the Heavy Equipment Capital Reserve Fund. The remainder, \$39,985, is to be raised by taxation. Recommended by the Selectmen. Not recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article 12. Highway Maintenance

To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$70,347 to be received from the State of New Hampshire Highway Block Grant to reclaim and hot top the Woodman Road and upgrade and hot top the Taylor Road. Recommended by the Selectmen, recommended by the Road Agent and recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article 13. State Aid Reconstruction

To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to request the N. H. Department of Transportation to initiate two SAR (State Aid Reconstuction) projects. One project is to improve site distance problems at the intersection of NH Route 132 and Hermit Woods Road. The second project is safety improvements to the bridge over Hadley Brook on NH Route 132. Recommended by the Selectmen.

Article 14. Highway Maintenance Petition Article

To see if the town will vote to pave Johnson Barn Road from a point on Lower Bay Road to where existing pavement ends. By Petition.

Article 15. Fire Department Jaws of Life

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 for the purchase of a set of Jaws of Life Rescue Tool for the Sanbornton Fire Department, of which \$4,500 will be received from the State of New Hampshire Highway Safety Agency. The remainder of \$5,500 is to be raised by taxation. Recommended by the Selectmen and recommended by the the Budget Committee.

Article 16. Police Department Vehicle

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,283 for the second and final lease payment on the 1993 Police Department cruiser. Recommended by the Selectmen and recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article 17. Police Department Vehicle

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,315 for the first year lease payment on a 1994 cruiser for the Police Department. Recommended by the Selectmen and recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article 18. Capital Reserve Funds

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$22,000, of which:

\$2,000 is to be placed in the Town Bridges and Roads Capital Reserve Fund;

\$15,000 is to be placed in the Fire Department Capital Reserve Fund;

\$5,000 is to be placed in the Sanbornton Fire Department Repair and Refurbishing Capital Reserve Fund. Recommended by the Selectmen and recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article 19. Heavy Equipment Capital Reserve

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to be placed in the Capital Reserve for Heavy Equipment. Recommended by the Selectmen. Not recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article 20. Town Park Capital Reserve

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000 to be placed in the Capital Reserve for the Town Park. Recommended by the Budget Committee. Not recommended by the Selectmen.

Article 21. Solid Waste Transfer Station

To see if the town will vote to authorize the construction and operation of a solid waste transfer station and expanded recycling center at the landfill site on Shaw Hill Road. Recommended by the Selectmen and recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article 22. Sanitary Landfill Capital Reserve Account Amendment

To see if the town will vote to amend the purpose of the Sanitary Landfill Capital Reserve Account established in Article 12 of the 1987 town warrant, and amended in Article 5 of the 1988 town warrant, by repealing and reenacting it to read as follows: To see if the town will vote to establish a Solid Waste Capital Reserve Account for any of the following purposes: 1)closure of the landfill on Shaw Hill Road; 2)construction of a transfer station, recycling center and the purchase of associated equipment; and 3)engineering, planning and other consultant work associated with the above purposes; and to designate the selectmen as disbursing agents. (A 2/3 vote is necessary to change the purpose of a Capital Reserve Fund.) Recommended by the Selectmen, recommended by the Solid Waste Committee, and recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article 23. Fees for Solid Waste Disposal

To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to establish and administer a user fee system, such as a pay per bag program, to offset the cost of disposal of the town's solid waste. Recommended by the Solid Waste Committee.

Article 24. Development Rights Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the town will vote to close the Capital Reserve Fund for Development Rights and deposit the balance, \$6,122.54, plus any interest, to the general fund to reduce taxes. Recommended by the Selectmen and recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article 25. Emergency Management Expendable Trust

To see if the town will vote to create an Expendable Trust for Emergency Management, to authorize the selectmen as disbursing agents and to authorize the transfer of \$522 from the general fund surplus to said fund. Recommended by the Selectmen. Not recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article 26. Recreation Commission Non-Lapsing Fund

To see if the town will vote to authorize the establishment of a non-lapsing revolving fund to receive all donations and fees generated by the Recreation Commission and to expend funds as authorized by vote of the Recreation Commission, in accordance with RSA 35-B:2, 11, effective January 1, 1995. Recommended by the Selectmen. Not recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article 27. Reappraisal of Utility Property

To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to spend \$14,619 of encumbered funds for the purpose of reappraisal of utility property in the town. Recommended by the Selectmen. Not recommended by the Budget Commitee.

Article 28. Tax Payment Discount

To see if the town will vote to authorize a discount on any portion of 1994 property taxes paid after April 1, 1994 and by August 15, 1994 (RSA 80:52). The discount percentage shall be equal to the interest percentage on borrowing for tax anticipation notes. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article 29. Report of the Budget Committee To hear the report of the Budget Committee and to pass any vote in relation thereto.

Article 30. Easement

To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to grant a quitclaim easement to the owner of lot 63 on Sanbornton Tax Map 11, Black Brook Road, for the purpose of constructing residential subsurface disposal system. Easement will be granted upon notification of agreement between owners of lots 63 and 64. Recommended by the Selectmen.

Article 31. Other Business

To transact such other business as may legally come before the Town Meeting.

CABLE TV COMMITTEE REPORT

The Town of Sanbornton is now in its third year of a fifteen year contract, with all the contracted roads completely cable-wired. 1993 has been a very difficult one for the Cable TV Committee, especially due to the new Federal Communication Commission (FCC) rulings which have baffled many communities throughout the country. Rates have either increased or decreased, cable options have changed, the scrambling of channels, and the addition of cable boxes, have all contributed to confusing customers, communities and companies. Congress and the cable industry are responsible for all the confusion, and both are now in the process of revising their own regulations!

All things considered, the residents of Sanbornton seem pleased with the services they receive from Community Cable. The only complaints the Committee hears about, are from homeowners who haven't received cable yet. The cable franchise fee, voted to be removed from monthly cable bills at the Town Meeting in March of 1993, was removed on July 1, 1993. The intent of this Committee has always been to assist our residents in resolving any problems they may encounter involving cable issues. The Committee's number one concern is to have cable television available to as many residents as possible. Hopefully, expansion of the original contract can occur once the FCC regulations are straightened out.

In closing, the Cable Committee voted to have both the Budget Committee Public Hearing and the Annual Town Meeting video taped, and to have this tape broadcast over our local cable system as well as having it available at the library for any residents who, for some reason, are not able to attend these meetings.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT

The Commission has the responsibility of viewing properties when dredge and fill applications have been made to the Wetland's Board. Several on-site inspections were made by members and the appropriate recommendations forwarded.

The Forestry Subcommittee carefully monitored cutting on Town owned land. The cutting on the Eastman Hill lot was completed in February. Later in the year, Doug Bean was hired to do an improvement cut on the Dr. True Road lot. Bean will use a farm tractor rather than a skidder to keep disturbance of the forest to a minimum.

Work has been completed on the first loop of the trail on the Eastman Hill lot, and it has officially been named the Virginia Hutton lot, with a sign so stating being posted. Several arrows marking the trail will be installed when the ground thaws. Hal Graham of Trailwrights has joined the Commission as an alternate, and if enough interest is shown in this trail system, a Trail Subcommittee will be formed to develop and maintain new nature trails.

The Commission reviewed several requests from citizens wishing to purchase Town owned land. After physically viewing each parcel, it was the opinion of the members that land with any future potential use to the Town be retained, and any parcel without potential use should be disposed of at public auction.

The Commission continues to monitor conservation easements.

The Commission sponsored Ana Wells of Sanbornton to the Conservation Camp, and she reported on her intense and informative week at Bear Brook State Park.

In checking State and Federal listings of wildlife in different areas, it was noted that many of our bird and animal friends frequently sighted in Sanbornton were not credited to our area. In order to correct this, a Wildlife Subcommittee was formed and its members have been approved to document wildlife.

Faith Tobin came up with another great float for the Market Day parade.

Wayne Smart asked to be relieved of the duties of Chairman of the Commission, and he was replaced by Co-Chairman Wayne Elliott and

Curtis Beaupre. Later in the year, Curtis resigned and was replaced by Faith Tobin. Curtis has worked long and hard for this Commission and he will be sorely missed. He has, however, agreed to remain in an advisory position. We also welcome Skip Laughy as a new member.

Members of the Sanbornton Fire Department spent a total of 1,871 hours answering calls, and 1,585 hours at training and equipment checks, for a total of 3,456 hours spent on Fire Department activities.

Due to the ever increasing number of motor vehicle accidents, and the severity of those accidents, the Sanbornton Fire Department is trying to purchase a set of Jaws of Life. This rescue tool will enable the Department to provide faster extrication for trapped motorists, and therefore, quicker care for those needing hospitalization. If a set of Jaws are needed in Sanbornton presently, we have to depend on another department, and this delay in extrication could cost a life.

Our Fire Department has been awarded a grant from the N.H. Highway Safety Agency, with matching funds, to purchase a set of Jaws, if approved by the town.

FOREST FIRE WARDEN REPORT

During Calendar Year 1993, the State of New Hampshire experienced an average number of wildfires. The three leading causes of these wildfires were campfires left unattended, unsupervised children and debris fires that escaped control. All of these fires are preventable, but ONLY with your help!

Please help your town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. New Hampshire State Law (RSA 224:27 11) requires that, "No person, firm or corporation shall kindle or cause to be kindled any fire or burn or cause to be burned any material in the open, except when the ground is covered with snow, without first obtaining a written fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden of the town where the burning is to be done."

Violations of RSA 224:27 II and the other burning laws of the State of New Hamoshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$1,000 and/or a year in jail, and you are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

The State of New Hampshire, Division of Forests and Lands, assisted many towns in wildland fire suppression during 1993 and participated in many fire prevention programs. This year, the nation is celebrating Smokey The Bear's 50th anniversary. The State of New Hampshire's Forest Protection Bureau will be working with many communities to spread the fire prevention message - "Remember...Only YOU can prevent Forest Fires". Fire prevention is the most cost effective fire suppression tool. Please be careful around fires and help us and our communities have a fire safe year.

HISTORIC DISTRICT COMMISSION REPORT

In September of 1993, two new members and Selectmen Representative Bill Tobin met with one former member and discussed plans for a more active Commission for 1994.

A thank-you note was sent to Barbara Prokosch for her many years of service to the Town on this Commission. Her studies of the homes and buildings in the area, which was written into the publication <u>Sanbornton Architecture and History</u>, will be of lasting value to the Town.

The Commission found there is a great amount of concern about the two recent septic "mounds" placed in front yards of two of the oldest homes in the Historic District. Landscaping was discussed, which will help somewhat, but the character of the sites are definitely affected.

The Commission met with Don Foudriat of the Sewer Committee, and received an estimate of the cost involved to tie the Historic District into the septic line from Rte. 3, coming up Rte. 132. The Commission is researching the possibility of grants, Federal money, or any other funds to help the Town with this cost.

A public meeting for residents in the District, and any other interested Town residents, is being planned for this Spring. At that meeting the general regulations and the concerns about the septic situation will be discussed.

OFFICE OF EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT REPORT

The year 1993 proved to be a very interesting and busy year for Emergency Management for the Town of Sanbornton.

In March, with the possibility of a blizzard headed our way, action was taken to prepare for the worst. In the late morning of March 12th, a meeting was held at the Life Safety Building of all town department heads to preplan for "the big one". By 5:00 pm, the Emergency Operations Center and the Fire Department were staffed with a minimum of six personnel who spent the night ready to respond to any emergency situation. Snowmobiles were provided by the Mohawk Snowmobile Club and Officer Roy of our Police Department for emergency use if needed, and I again thank them. The Police Department and Highway Department provided the Emergency Operations Center with continuous updates of road conditions. The Emergency Evacuation Center at the Winnisguam Fire Station was opened, but was not needed by any Sanbornton residents. As it turned out, the storm did not materialize as predicted, and no calls for emergency assistance were rendered. Two service calls were answered and investigated by the Police Department. Again, I would like to thank everyone who volunteered their time and assistance.

Yearly radiological and hazardous materials training was conducted, with several members of the Fire Department taking "Haz-Mat" courses to better familiarize themselves with this ever-impending possibility.

This office is also involved with the implementation of the Enhanced 911 system for the Town of Sanbornton.

1994 poses to be another busy year with continuous training and preplanning of both natural and man-made emergencies. I hope to be able to purchase an emergency generator of at least 18,000 kilowatts to power the Life Safety Building and Emergency Operations Center, in the event of power failure. This item is imperative to the operation of the Emergency Center.

POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT



RECREATION COMMISSION REPORT

As we reflect back upon 1993, we recall another busy year, aided by the time and energy of many town volunteers. During 1993, the Recreation Commission organized, coordinated, and/or sponsored fifteen recreation programs. The community enthusiastically participated in the wide range of programs that were offered this year. Ann Littlefield was hired into a part-time Recreation Coordinator position to assist with clerical tasks, overseeing the operation of the beaches, and assisting the Commission members with coordination of town sponsored programs.

BEACH PROGRAM. A major task of the Commission is to coordinate and implement the Beach Program. The Beach Program involved three components:

1. BEACHES. Preparation of Hermit Lake and Winnisquam Lake Town Beaches for summer usage included the following: cleaning debris away; applying new sand; repairing rafts and anchoring to the lake bottom; putting out safety buoys; arranging for telephone service, garbage pickup, water testing, and toilet facilities; and repair of the vandalized beach houses. Throughout the summer, Commission members continued to monitor the proper usage and maintenance of the beaches. At the end of the season, the beaches were cleaned and equipment properly stored for next summer. A "carry in/carry out" method of trash removal was continued for the second year, which was fairly successful.

2. LIFEGUARDS. The Commission interviewed, hired, and supervised three Red Cross certified lifeguards to maintain safety at both beaches, seven days a week, throughout the summer. Our lifeguards for the 1993 season were: Head Lifeguard James Knowlton, Bethany Clark, and Christine Longo.

3. WATER SAFETY INSTRUCTION. Lessons were provided to 88 Sanbornton children, by instructor Bethany Clark, at Hermit and Winnisquam Lakes.

SOCCER. This was the eighth successful year of the Sanbornton Youth Soccer Program. 146 children, from grades kindergarten though eighth grade, participated. Thirty-five local parents and community members volunteered their time to coach, prepare the fields, referee, and provide refreshments. The practice and games were played on Saturday

mornings and Thursday evenings, September 12th through October 24th. Sanbornton Central and Sant Bani Schools provided the playing fields. Games were played against Tilton/Northfield teams this year. An Awards Ceremony, held at the Winnisquam Middle School was enjoyed by soccer participants and their families.

TENNIS. An adult round robin of singles and doubles ran throughout the summer, in which 39 adult players participated. Thirty-five children and adults took tennis lessons which were taught by tennis pro Peter Fagan, at the Winnisquam High School courts.

COED SOFTBALL. For the fourth year, coed adult softball was played weekly at the Baptist Church Bay Field throughout the summer months.

LASSIE LEAGUE. Girls softball was new in 1993, for ages nine to twelve. Our team played against other teams from local towns. Thirteen girls participated in this successful program.

HALLOWEEN PARTY. A fun-filled Halloween Party was held at our Town Hall, which included a haunted walk, refreshments, and games.

SUMMER DAY CAMP AND YOUTH SPORTS. In its fifth year, the summer program was expanded to offer an all day, two day a week program for ages 5 to 12. Suzanne Ketchem and Betty Laux were hired to operate the program. The program included arts and crafts, beach activities, theater, sports, and fun learning experiences. Thirty children participated. A baseball program for 7 to 10 year olds was offered at the Sanbornton Central School Field. Chuck Wyman coached soccer skills to approximately 40 youths.

YOUTH BASKETBALL. This was the first year the Commission offered youth basketball to grades 2nd through 6th, held in the Winnisquam Middle School gym. The Program was a success thanks to the volunteer coaches. Forty youths participated.

The Commission also sponsored and/or assisted with several town recreation programs. These included skating lessons and family skating at the Tilton School Rink, support for the Sanbornton Youth Baseball League, and a youth skiing program at Highlands Ski Area.

Commission goals for 1993 were fulfilled. A wide range of safe and quality leisure and recreation programs were offered to community members of all ages and abilities. Our goals for 1994 include the following:

1. To continue to promote safe and quality leisure and recreation programs at a minimal cost to the town.

2. To support and offer assistance to the Town Park Development $\ensuremath{\mathsf{Committee}}$.

3. To expand and seek new members for the Commission.

4. To broaden programs offered to the Sanbornton adult population, especially the senior citizens.

5. To offer a yearly town recreation event. In 1994, plans are to hold an ice skating social at the Tilton School Rink.

The Commission would like to thank the many community members who volunteered their time, energy and creative ideas to this year's programs.

As each town agency struggles to maintain good service within budgetary limitations, your public library is doing its part. Our association with the Sanbornton Central School continues to thrive, encouraging our children to learn the importance of good reading and research habits. We also provide adult borrowers with reference and recreational materials of quality.

The State Library, with its computer network, links us to other library holdings throughout New Hampshire and beyond. It also provides educational courses, seminars and consulting services...all of which are invaluable. To receive this assistance, we continue to meet the required library standards.

The makeup of the Board of Library Trustees has now increased to five. We regret the resignation of the Rev. James Maynard, who has moved from Sanbornton. There has been a change in personnel too. The Children's Librarian, Debbie Clement, resigned due to personal commitments which took her from this community. With the addition of Library Aide Patricia Kraft, our staff remains at three.

For those who have yet to visit us, be reminded that your free library card entitles you to borrow a variety of materials, including offerings from our expanding video collection. Copier service is also available.

SEWER COMMITTEE REPORT

During 1993, the Committee met only twice to deal with local issues. The Committee reviewed and recommended action to the Selectmen on several sewer use charge abatement requests. The 1994 sewer budget was prepared and forwarded to the Budget Committee. Based on estimates from the state (Winnipesaukee River Basin Project) treatment facility, sewer rates are adequate to cover projected expenses, hence, no rate increase was proposed. The Committee also responded to a Selectmen's request for a "ballpark" cost estimate to route sewer lines to Sanbornton Square.

The Committee Chairman and Secretary attended WRBP advisory council meetings and participated in the state's review of private contractor operation of the sewage treatment plant. The original list of nine candidates was reduced to four qualified bidders, whose bids were reviewed in detail. In January 1994 the advisory council, after due consideration, recommended that the state continue to operate the treatment plant with the present staff.

SOLID WASTE DISPOSAL COMMITTEE REPORT

The landfill is scheduled to cease accepting waste as of October of this year. This is the result of a long process of evaluation beginning in 1988 when monitoring wells were installed around the landfill. The wells revealed that the landfill was contaminating the groundwater. The state originally pressured the town to close the landfill in a short period of time. Further discussion led to an agreement whereby the landfill could continue to be used until the present area of trash disposal was filled. This will occur in October of this year, at which time landfilling must cease. The landfill will later be capped with an impermeable synthetic liner in the Summer of 1995.

During this past year, the Solid Waste Disposal Committee has studied various future disposal options available to the town. Building a transfer station at the present landfill site appears to be the most feasible and economical option. A transfer station compacts non-recyclable trash in a roll-off container for hauling to a modern, less polluting, disposal site. Residents and private haulers alike would still bring their trash to the present landfill as they have for the past 15 years. Many other New Hampshire communities have chosen to adopt this disposal method.

Recycling will continue to play an important part in managing our trash responsibly and in a cost effective manner. Once the landfill closes, costs for trash disposal will increase dramatically due to the considerable expense associated with hauling and disposing of our trash elsewhere. Recycling will help to offset this cost. Along with building a new transfer station, it is planned that the present recycling facilities will be expanded to handle increased amounts and types of recyclable materials.

Funding in 1994 for building the transfer station and the expanded recycling center, will come from the Landfill Capital Reserve Fund (assuming the warrant article authorizing this is passed). The Solid Waste Disposal Committee is proposing that the new operating costs associated with remote disposal of non-recyclables (approximately \$50,000 per year) be funded by a "Pay Per Bag" system. With this system, trash brought to the Transfer Station by residents or private haulers and put in the compactor, would need to be in specially identified plastic trash bags. These bags would be sold at local stores, and perhaps the Transfer Station, for up to \$1.00 per 30 gallon bag. There would still be no fees associated with bringing recyclables to the Recycling Center.

Such a system has the following three primary advantages:

1) Prevents the new transfer disposal costs from becoming an added burden to the property tax base;

2) Creates an equitable means of allocating these costs (ie, the more trash you generate, the more you pay); and

3) Encourages people to reduce, recycle, reuse and compost their waste materials.

In the upcoming year, we will chart a new direction in trash disposal for our town. As with any major change, there will be a period of adjustment for all of us. By working together we can make this as smooth of a transition as possible with a result that we can feel proud of as a community.

TOWN PARK COMMITTEE REPORT

The members of the Sanbornton Town Park Committee had a busy year in 1993, with some membership changes and much groundwork being covered.

Beginning with the March 1993 Town Meeting, a proposal was presented to the community to fund \$25,000 for the development of a town-owned tract of land on Dr. True Road. At that meeting the proposal was defeated; not by one clear majority, but rather by a three-way split. One faction opposed the concept because it was on one side of the Town, requiring travel to reach the site. Another group opposed the location feeling a Town Park would detract from the value of their adjacent personal properties. And the final third of the opposition came from voters concerned about the financial impact of such a project. In a motion from the floor, however, the money was approved for addition to the Park Capital Reserve Fund.

The Committee took such important sentiments, and those gathered at an informational hearing held prior to the 1993 Town Meeting, and went back to work. The vast majority of input we received focused on the wishes of the citizens to locate a park near the center of the community, so that existing resources such as the Town Hall; school and playground could be incorporated and utilized. Additionally, the Square is perceived as the crossroads of our community, so travel to such a facility would be easier.

As the only town-owned property deemed suitable for park development was the Dr. True Road site, private landholdings were investigated. A plea was sent out in the Town Newsletter asking anyone with 6 to 10 acres (the absolute minimum size determined to be necessary), that they might be interested in parting with, to let us know. No responses were received. Members then scanned tax maps and sent letters to all landowners with suitable acreage and geographic features within a radius of the Square. These letters were followed up with phone calls to the recipients. Several of those surveyed did graciously accept our invitation for a meeting to discuss Park plans. Much insight from these residents was received as to the value of prime agricultural land, a vital part of Sanbornton's historic past and a necessity for the future. It became evident that the acquisition of privately-held property would be very expensive, easily into the 6-figure range!

With this information gathered, the Committee again is asking the community for its financial support to continue building the Capital Reserve Fund for a Town Park. Such will be necessary if the wishes of the citizens for a centrally located facility are to become a reality.

At the 1993 hearing and Town Meeting, many voters expressed interest in assisting the Committee to find suitable locations or alternative means of financing a Park. The Committee welcomes and encourages such support, but to date, still has not had anyone come forward.

The creation of a Town Park is a very large and important undertaking for our community for years to come. Its importance to us and future generations cannot be underscored enough. The Committee thanks all the members of the community for their continued support, interest, and input.

TRUSTEES OF TRUST FUNDS REPORT

The most pleasant duty of the Trustees of Trust Funds is that of awarding college tuition scholarships to deserving Sanbornton students. In 1993 there were nine applicants for scholarship, which was a record number. Unfortunately, only four scholarships were available. Each John Doe Taylor Fund is set up for two scholarships. One fund is available for two students admitted to the University of New Hampshire. The other fund is for two students admitted to any college of their choice.

The two students who are at UNH are Susan Cegelski, daughter of Kenneth and Mary Cegelski of Brook Road, and Veronica Thibodeau, daughter of Lawrence and Diane Thibodeau of Beechwood Avenue.

Dianna Driscoll, daughter of George and Dorothy Driscoll of Weeks Road, is attending Plymouth State College; and Krista Jacques, daughter of Wayne and Deb Jacques of Eastman Hill Road, is attending Concord Technical Institute.

Like people on fixed incomes, the trusts are suffering from the low interest rates. Scholarships will be awarded again this year, however they will not be as generous as in previous years. Sanbornton residents who are Winnisquam Regional High School graduates are eligible to apply. Applications are available at the Town Office and from the guidance counselor at WRHS. They are due by April 15.

WELFARE DEPARTMENT REPORT

It has been a busy year for the Welfare Department. Until the economy improves drastically, there will continue to be many families needing help.

The Department has supplied help in many forms to some thirtytwo households comprising about forty-seven children. Assistance has been in the categories of groceries, fuel, rent, electricity, etc., mostly to individuals who fall through the cracks of our State and Federal programs.

As a barometer of the times, we have gone from 56 vouchers written in 1989 for approximately \$10,000, to 205 vouchers written in 1993 for roughly \$35,000!

We have sought the assistance of other entities, such as Medicaid, dental assistance, and the Crisis Reserve Fund, as well as working with the TNS Santa Fund, the Boy Scout Food Drive, etc.

Through the generosity of one of our citizens, Christmas trees were made available to several families who would have had difficulty procuring one for themselves. Thank you so much.

We have been able to return to the town \$540 in reimbursements this year, and hopefully will get some more in the future.

YOUTH ASSISTANCE PROGRAM REPORT

Our volunteers, Board of Directors, and staff members have worked hard to help solve problems facing young people, families, and concerned citizens in our communities. We are all aware of incidences that threaten the peace of this rural area. We are concentrating on trying to stop major problems from entering our communities. Larger cities and towns have already experienced tragedy from the growing "gang" problems among young people. The participants in the Youth Assistance Program are dedicated to help bring together the schools, police, businesses, and other agencies affecting the lives of our youth so that we can work together to try to prevent the rise of dangerous youthful activity.

While this major effort is now going on, we have seen a rise in activity in our court diversion program for first time youthful offenders. It is important for young people to take responsibility for their actions, to learn to make positive choices, and for victims to be compensated.

To help parents learn good parenting skills we began an Active Parenting Class in addition to our Parent's Support Group, family mediation, and parent-child counseling. We continue to see many young people on an informal basis, individually and in groups. We have planned healthy activities for young people.

Our substance abuse training program had five different groups in 1993. This is a useful tool in the effort to slow down the use of dangerous and illegal substances among our young people. Referrals for this program come from the police, the schools, families, and sometimes the young people themselves.
