School Report.

Seven schools of two terms each have been taught the past year.

Spring term of nine weeks, fall term of twelve weeks. The whole number of pupils attending school was 87. Average attendance, 70. The amount received for the support of the schools was \$774.63. The average cost per scholar has been for the year, \$8.92.

COURSER HILL.

Miss Lillian I. Jackman, teacher for the year. Wages of teacher per month including board, \$20. Whole number of scholars, 17; average daily attendance, 11 1-2. This was Miss Jackman's first school and was as successful as could be expected. Sickness of teacher and pupils interfered with the last term somewhat. D.

PUTNEY HILL.

Mrs. Rosette R. Sanborn, teacher for the year. Wages per month including board, \$22. Whole number of scholars, 15; average attendance, 11. Mrs. Sanborn's school was a success. D.

WHITE PLAIN.

Spring term. Miss Louise Austin, teacher. Wages per month including board, \$18. Whole number of scholars, 5; average attendance, 3. Your committee were unable to attend the closing examination, but in their judgment, the school made good progress. D.

Fall term, Miss Susanne S. Baker, teacher. Wages same as spring term. Whole number of scholars, 9; average attendance, 6. Miss Baker's work in this school was beyond the expectation of the committee, and they were well satisfied with the progress made. D.

PLEASANT STREET.

Spring term, Miss Edna M. Flanders, teacher. Wages per month including board, \$18. Whole number of scholars, 9; average attendance, 7. Miss Flanders is very well fitted for the duties of the district school, and this term was very successful under her instruction. We should have gladly continued her work during the fall term.

Fall term, Miss May R. Webster, teacher. Wages per month including board, \$18. Whole number of scholars, 9; average attendance, 7. For many years, Miss Webster has been classed as one of our very best teachers, and in the management of this school, has fully sustained her former well earned reputation. H.

BASHAN.

Miss Effa A. Burbank, teacher for the year. Wages per month including board, \$20. Whole number of scholars, 19; average attendance, 15. This is one of the largest schools which under Miss Burbank's careful management and thorough instruction may rank as one of the best in town. H.

LITTLE HILL.

Miss Florence S. Jackman, Webster, teacher for the year. Wages per month including board, \$18. Whole number of scholars, 8; average attendance, 6. C.

The spring was Miss Jackman's first term. We found at the close that good work had been done. During the vacation she changed her name, but notwithstanding, the fall term was equally successful. H.

SWEATT'S MILLS.

Miss Emma Fitz, teacher for the year. Wages per month including board, \$22. Whole number of scholars, 10; average attendance 9.45. Miss Fitz did a great amount of work and the result was a very successful school year for Sweatt's Mills.

We indorse our recommendations of one year ago for an additional appropriation for the support of schools. C.

There remains unexpended of the money raised for the repairs of school houses, \$53.02. If the district wish the houses painted and papered as was suggested at the last annual meeting, it would be necessary to raise an additional sum.
