Warrant For Town Meeting of 1908.

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

[L. S.]

To the Inhabitants of the town of Wolfeboro qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Brewster Memorial Hall, in said town, on the second Tuesday of MARCH next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Town Clerk, three Selectmen, two Auditors, Treasurer and Collector of Taxes, for the ensuing year, and one Library Trustee for the ensuing three years.

ART. 2. To see if the town will vote to return to the Road Agency system.

ART. 3. To choose all other necessary town officers and agents.

ART. 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of money necessary to secure State Aid for the Permanent Improvement of Highways under the law passed January Session of the General Court of 1905.

ART. 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairing Highways, Bridges and Sidewalks in addition to that required by law.

ART. 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray town expenses.

ART. 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay on its indebtedness.

ART. 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay each Fireman, legally returned, for the year of 1908 in addition to that required by law.

ART. 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay James R. Newell Post No. 61, G. A. R. to defray expenses of Memorial Day 1908.

ART. 10. To see if the town will vote to buy a Steam Roller and Stone Crusher and raise and appropriate money for the same.

ART. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for concrete sidewalks.

ART. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the town Public Library in addition to that required by law.

ART. 13. To see what action the town will take in the matter of furnishing aid and assistance to the Huggins Hospital of Wolfeboro, and to raise and appropriate money, or pass any other vote relating to the granting of aid and assistance.

ART. 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate during the season of 1908 the sum of \$200, for the purpose of building a good gravel sidewalk at Wolfeboro Falls, beginning at the corner of Elm and Center Streets and continuing on the Southerly side of said Center Street to the residence of Fred Gould, or such part of said distance as the appropriation will admit of doing thoroughly.

ART. 15. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount of five per cent. from the taxes of those who settle their taxes on or before the first day of August; a discount of four per cent. from those who settle on or before the first day of September; a discount of three per cent. from those who settle on or before the first day of October; a discount of two per cent. from those who settle on or before the first day of November; a discount of one per cent. from those who settle on or before the first day of December and raise and appropriate money for the same.

ART. 16. To see if the town will vote to refund the town indebtedness by the issue of bonds to be redeemable in one year and payable in twenty years at a rate per cent. not to exceed three and one-half per annum.

ART. 17. To see if the town will vote to change the name of Sewall Street to Bay Shore Road agreeable to a petition signed by Walter C. Mitchell and others.

ART. 18. To see if the town will take any action relative to the will of Josiah W. Brown now deceased, who has willed the town of Wolfeboro a certain sum of money.

ART. 19. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

A Partial Record of the Doings of Town Meeting held March 12, 1907.

Under Article 2 it was voted to indefinitely postpone any action relative to returning to the Road Agency system.

Under Article 3 it was voted to leave the matter of other town officers to the Selectmen to appoint.

Under Article 4 it was voted to indefinitely postpone any action relative to levying an annual tax upon the hydrants of the water system.

Under Article 5 it was voted to indefinitely postpone any action relative to raising money to secure State Aid for Highways.

Under Article 6 it was voted to raise \$1000 for the repair of Highways, Bridges and Sidewalks.

Under Article 7 it was voted to raise \$5500, to defray town expenses.

Under Article 8 it was voted to raise \$2500 to pay on town indebtedness.

Under Article 9 it was voted to raise the sum of \$13 in addition to that required by law to pay the Firemen.

Under Article 10 it was voted to raise the sum of \$75, to pay to James R. Newell Post No 61, for Memorial Day expenses.

Under Article 11 it was voted to raise the sum of \$500, for concrete sidewalks.

Under Article 12 it was voted to adopt Chapter 79 of the Public Statutes and amendments thereto relating to sidewalks and sewers.

Under Article 13 it was voted to adopt the laws on the Statute relative to dealers in old metal.

Under Article 14, it was voted to raise the sum of \$100, to pay to the Town Public Library in addition to that required by law.

Under Article 15, it was voted that the moderator appoint a committee to report at the next annual meeting upon the matter of establishing an Electric Fire Alarm System. Carroll D. Piper, Obed S. Young and Henry B. Furber were appointed.

Under Article 16, it was voted to indefinitely postpone any action relative to the building of a drinking trough at "Goose Corner."

Under Article 17, it was voted to indefinitely postpone any action relative to laying out a road to the house of Eli Davis.

Under Article 18, it was voted to indefinitely postpone any action relative to money raised for Old Home Day, 1905, and not expended.

Report of the Board of Health.

TO THE HONORABLE BOARD OF SELECTMEN OF THE TOWN
OF WOLFEBORO :

We herewith submit a report of the work done by the Board of Health during the year 1907.

Early in the year, the State Board of Health requested that samples of food products be collected for analysis. Samples of vinegar, molasses, sausage, etc., were submitted, and the results have been published in the "Sanitary Bulletin." In practical ly every case the samples conformed to the standards required.

The Rules for Sanitary Management of Barber Shops, promulgated by the State Board of Health have been provided.

The Regulations of the State Board of Health for the Protection of the purity of the waters of Lake Winnepesaukee and Lake Paugus, were posted in different parts of the town and published in the "Granite State News." They are as follows :

1. No sewerage from any town or village system of sewerage, or from any private sewer, or from any cottage, hotel, farmhouse, boarding-house, camp, or other abode, or from any privy, stable or outbuilding, shall be allowed to enter Lakes Winnepesaukee or Paugus.

2. Nothing from any closet or toilet room upon any boat or structure of any kind shall be allowed to enter Winnepesaukee Lake within one-half mile of any wharf or landing, or any public water intake.

3. Nothing from any closet or toilet room from any boat or structure of any kind shall be allowed to enter the waters of Lake Paugus.

4. No sewerage or drainage of any kind from any public building or buildings, and no animal or vegetable matter, or vehicle containing or having contained the same, and no deleterious matter of any kind shall be deposited in the waters of said lakes, or upon the banks of said lakes where it may contaminate the waters of the same.

5. Any town or city bordering upon the said lakes shall construct such sewerage systems as may be necessary to relieve

any village or congested sections so that the inhabitants thereof may comply with these regulations.

6. The local Boards of Health of towns and cities bordering on the shores of these lakes shall cause printed copies of these regulations to be posted conspicuously in different parts of the said towns and cities, and also cause them to be published in such newspapers as are issued in the said towns and cities bordering on said lakes, and they shall take such measures as may be deemed necessary to advise all owners or occupiers of estates, the drainage from which may enter said lakes, and all owners of boats upon said lakes, so that full notice of the provisions of these regulations shall be had by individuals and the public before the date on which they take effect.

7. It is the duty of the local Boards of Health of such towns and cities as border on the said lakes to enforce these regulations.

8. The foregoing regulations shall not in any manner affect the rules and regulations of the State Board of Health for the protection of the waters of Alton Bay promulgated July 17, 1906.

9. These regulations shall take effect and be in force on and after January 1, 1909.

During the Summer several complaints were made regarding odors from the "Back Bay." The matter was investigated, the decaying rubbish along the shores removed, and drainage re-established. Further trouble will surely result, if refuse is allowed to be left along the shore. A considerable amount of sewage flows into this small body of water; where, at best the drainage is inadequate, so no organic matter should be permitted to stay on the banks.

But two cases of typhoid fever were reported during the year. One case was brought from Massachusetts, the other developed in a farm house where the Sanitary conditions were very good. The patient in the latter case had been out of town and there is a strong possibility that the disease was contracted at that time.

Two cases of diphtheria were reported, one at Wolfeboro Falls, and one in the village. There was no mortality.

During July and August an Epidemic of Measles appeared. Thirty-seven cases were reported; no fatal case occurred. Nearly every case was traced to an undiagnosed case from Massachusetts.

The law regarding the vaccination of school children has been enforced as directed by the State Board.

Samples of Beech Pond Water have been submitted during the year. The report in each case has been very satisfactory.

Radical changes in the drainage of some houses in town is necessary before the Sanitary conditions can become permanently good. In practically every case investigated we have received the hearty co-operation of the parties interested.
