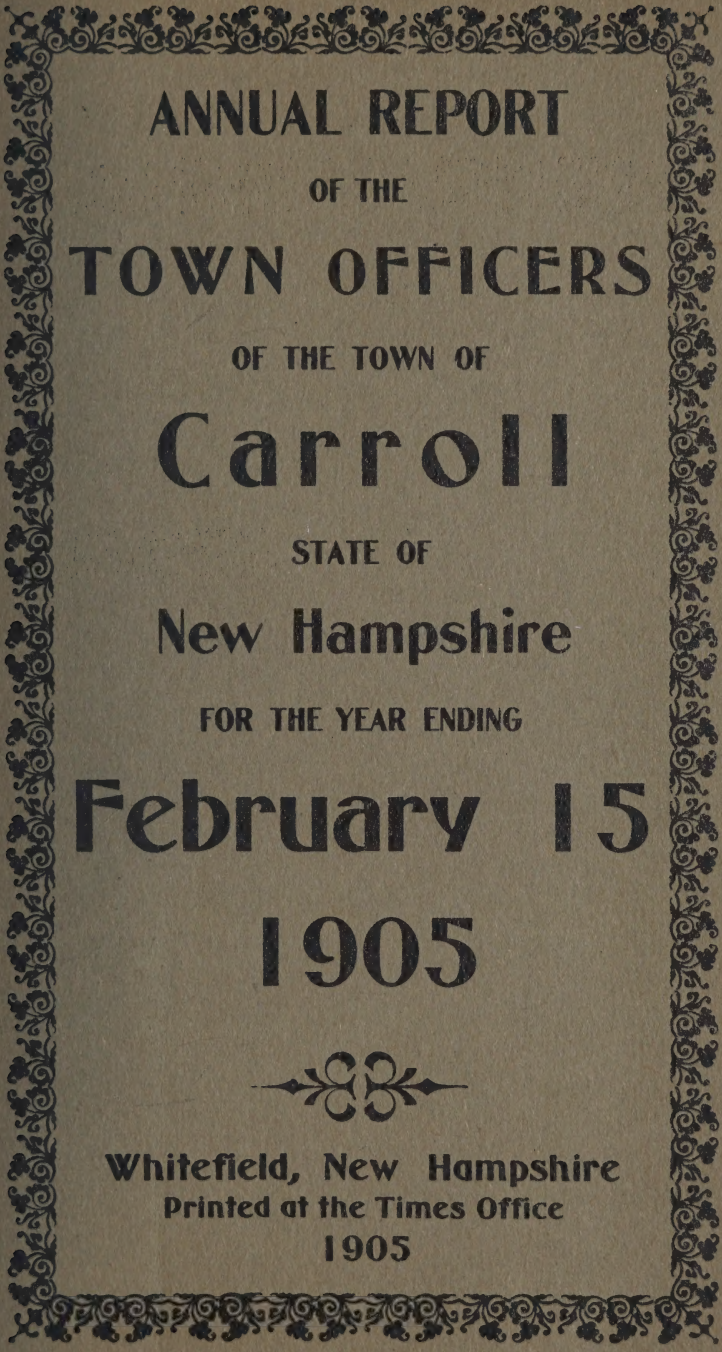



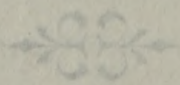

If "By their fruits ye shall know them," then are we fully justified in our statement. Three pupils entered the high school of neighboring towns in the fall, fully equipped for their work and others were ready to do so, thanks to their efficient teachers as well as to their own individual efforts. Very little change of teachers was made and to this fact in a great measure we ascribe the success of our schools, for we believe in "holding fast to that which is good."

Pine Grove school and Cherry Mountain were taught the entire year by Miss Bessie Allard and Miss Nina Stillings respectively. Both teachers accomplished thorough, effective work. Ethel Hudson, a pupil of Miss Stillings, entered the High school at Whitefield in September. Miss Allard is also very ambitious for her pupils.

Miss Gertrude Hickey in the Town House school proved herself the same progressive, hard working instructor as in the previous year. Two of her pupils, Effie Howe and Mamie Whalan, entered High school and others in her room will undoubtedly be ready in one term more.

The Applebee school was taught two terms by Miss Jennie Brown and one term by Miss Ella F. Leavitt, both young teachers of this town but with up-to-date methods and most satisfactory results. Miss Leavitt will probably resume the work there next term.

The Fabyan school was taught two terms by Miss Jennie O'Connell who there completed two years of most excellent services. She was urged by the board to return but declined. Her place was ably filled by Miss Pearl Davis of Island Pond, Vt. There is a unanimous call in the district for Miss Davis' return. Lizzie Monohan is fitted for High school and three others are nearly so.

The Twin Mountain grammar and primary rooms were again in charge of Misses Ray and Hickey both of whom love their work and spare no pains to make both room and study attractive. Roy Brown, John Kelley and Elworth McMillan were fitted to enter High school last September.

We found no lack of instruction in temperance and patriotism. The Memorial day exercises, given the past year by the pupils of the public schools were decidedly the very best ever given in town and that is "saying a good deal."

We would again urge parents to visit the schools as often as possible and above all to insist upon the constant attendance of their children. This town is most generous in its appropriations for school purposes. No pupil is "pinched" or "scrimped" for text-books or instruction. If the pupil stays out, if only for a few days, he, or the entire class must be put back, and a judicious teacher is not likely to do the latter.

No one school has all the good things that are of interest to a visitor. In one small school we heard the best grammar lesson we ever listened to.
