OLD JENKINS MILL AND DAM

Durham was settled early in the 17th century as a part of Dover and was known as the Oyster River Plantation until it was incorporated on May 15th, 1732.

Early history related a mill was built in 1631 at Durham Falls, it being one of various kinds in operation when shipbuilding was carried on in the area.

Chesley's Mill on the Oyster River just below the present B & M R R bridge was mentioned as early as June 6, 1701. This was a grist mill, not standing in 1903 but evidence of the dam remains and can be seen from Mill Road.

The cut of the old Jenkins Mill is from a water color painting, copied from an early photograph, shows the quaint old mill located at the Oyster River Falls and was probably built before the records of the Town were kept. Authentic history of this mill begins about 1800 when the property came into possession of a Quaker named William Jenkins familiarly called Friend Jenkins. Jenkins operated the mill as a tannery. On his death the property descended to his nephew Ephriam Jenkins who operated the mill as a machine shop. From Ephriam the mill descended to Fred Jenkins and later to his widow.

In 1913 the dam was rebuilt by the late Dan Chesley and the mill ceased operation about 1920. About 1949 the old mill was taken down.

The Jenkins family have had unbroken ownership of this historic property for more than 150 years.

The motion made by James Chamberlin to raise the pay of the Town Clerk \$100 was carried. It was also moved and seconded to increase Town Officers Expenses by \$200 to help cover the expense of printing for the zoning ordinances and the building code.

Moved by Edward Shanken was the following: "That the moderator appoint a committee of five residents of the Town of Durham to investigate the possibilities of securing light industries suitable to the atmosphere of the Town of Durham and the University. This committee to report at the Town Meeting." Motion carried.

Mr. Hartwell made a motion of appreciation for the planning board. The following motion made by James Chamberlin was carried:

"To see if the town will approve the use of TRA funds to assist the Oyster River School District in providing a road to the site, east of the present school, which the school district plans to develop."

The meeting adjourned at 9:20 and the results of the balloting were announced.

Then appeared Leon M. Crouch, newly elected Town Clerk and Tax Collector; Henry A. Davis, Selectman; and Daniel M. Ninde, Member of the Budget Committee before Arthur W. Johnson, Moderator and took their oath of office as prescribed by law.

WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

Tuesday, March 10, 1959 at 4:00 p.m. Oyster River Cooperative School Auditorium

Two Hundred and Twenty-Eighth Meeting

To the inhabitants of the Town of Durham, County of Strafford, State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Oyster River Cooperative School Auditorium, Durham, N. H., Tuesday the tenth day of March, 1959, A.D. at four o'clock in the afternoon to act on the following subjects: (NOTE — Voting on ballot items will begin at 4:00 p.m. Action on other articles in the warrant postponed until 7:00 p.m.)

1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for a term of three (3) years, a Town Treasurer, a Collector of Taxes, one Auditor for a term of three (3) years, one auditor for a term of two (2) years, one Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three (3) years, four members of the Budget Committee for a term of three (3) years, and all other elective officers for the ensuing year.

2. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the budget as submitted by the Budget Committee (see details following) and that the sum of one hundred fourteen thousand six hundred ten dollars and ninety-six cents (\$114,610.96) be raised and appropriated for the purpose of it.

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3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of approximately fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) to defray its share of the Strafford County Government.

4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow necessary money in anticipation of taxes.

5. To see if the Town will direct a discount of one percent (1%) to be made to those persons who shall pay their taxes within a period of six (6) weeks from the date the Tax Rate is approved by the State Tax Commission.

6. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 287 of the Revised Statutes Annotated of the State of New Hampshire relative to playing games of Beano (see ballot).

7. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell a parcel of land located on the northerly side of Garrison Avenue containing approximately 1665 square feet. This parcel was transferred to the Town as a part of the Pettee water system. Any monies that may be received from sale thereof will be placed in the Durham Water Department accounts.

8. To see whether the town will vote to pass an ordinance prohibiting hunting and shooting within the Town of Durham subject to a \$50.00 fine except in cases where written permission of the property owner has been obtained. (Petitioned by 47 legal voters)

9. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.



Your Board of Selectmen is deeply concerned over the spiralling tax rate in the Town of Durham. In the preparation of the 1959 budget, as for the past several years, every effort has been made to hold down expenses. We believe that it would be extremely shortsighted to reduce any services now provided to the taxpayers and that to curtail our present conservative program of sidewalk construction, street lighting, and similar efforts to keep pace with community growth would be merely postponement.

It can be seen by referring to the budget that by far the most expensive item is Town Maintenance, which includes construction, maintenance and upkeep of all our streets and our few sidewalks. Town Road Aid funds this year were spent almost entirely in the removal of a large section of ledge on Bagdad Road as it approaches Dover Road. It is particularly gratifying that Mr. Ernest Wiggin, Superintendent of Public Works, was able to accomplish this difficult job at approximately 50% of the estimates received from contractors. Other major projects included a half-mile of construction on the easterly end of the Durham Point Road, the completion of 1957 TRA construction of the Newmarket end of Bay Road, and the tarring of over 17 miles of streets and roads.

Major repairs to the Austin-Weston grader resulted in an over-expenditure of the equipment maintenance item by a considerable amount. This extra expense was in part offset, however, through Mr. Wiggin's ingenuity and frugal planning with other items.

We were pleased to be able to assist the Oyster River Cooperative School District in the construction of the soccer field and the extension of Dennison Road from the school to Bagdad Road.

Snow removal in the early part of 1958 was expensive both from the standpoint of labor and equipment maintenance. In December of 1958 and thus far in 1959 there has been relatively little use of snow plows but nearly 21/2 carloads of salt have been used during extreme icing conditions and the expense has equalled if not exceeded the normal equipment and labor costs for heavy snow falls.

Our Public Works Department also has the rather unpleasant task of trash collection, now estimated at between 30 and 40 tons per week. We urge that containers be used which prevent scattering of rubbish before the trucks can reach that part of town. We appreciate the understanding shown by residents during inclement weather when it is frequently difficult to arrange a trash pickup schedule and plow snow during the same period.

It is worthwhile to note that Mr. Patriquin has done an excellent job as custodian of the Town Dump and that on only two occasions was it necessary for the Fire Dept. to answer a dump call, one of those being when a bolt of lightning struck the pump and eliminated the water supply.

It is hoped that during this year we can step up sidewalk construction, since the practice of the past several years of spending \$2,000 for this item has not kept up with the need. In the fall of 1958 the Board of Selectmen authorized the building of a sidewalk along Garrison Avenue from Madbury Road to the school due to the vastly increased pedestrian traffic in that area. We apologize for the fact that the construction on Mill Road had to be left unfinished. The early cold spell of December interrupted the work which we had planned to complete before severe winter weather. It is anticipated that in 1959 this Mill Road sidewalk can be extended to College Road. It is also our plan to construct a sidewalk along Madbury Road between the Durham Trust Company and the corner of Madbury Road and Main Street. If it is at all possible, there are other places in town where we hope to at least make a beginning toward providing safer pedestrian traffic conditions.

We were able within the finances of the Water Department to construct a 6-inch water main from Newmarket Road along Mill Pond Road to the Red Tower Development, thus providing a very important looping within the system. Two main lines now supply the area south of Main Street, heretofore served by a single 10-inch main. It was also thought advisable to provide additional fire protection in the vicinity of the Oyster River Cooperative School and an 8-inch extension was made from Madbury Road and Garrison Avenue to the corner of Garrison Avenue and Dennison Street.

It may be of interest to know that residents utilizing the Durham Water Department supply consumed in excess of 40 million gallons of water in 1958, approximately 25% of the total water consumed from the Durham-UNH system. While we are aware that Durham water rates are high, it is our opinion that for the time being, at least, we cannot reduce the rates due to the fact that the system is carrying a large bonded indebtedness.

The Durham Sewer Department, as most people realize, is jointly operated with the University of New Hampshire under a 1947 agreement. It is important to realize that this system may well be insufficient for Durham's and UNH's needs in the relatively near future. The agreement with UNH was for joint operations of the two main sewer trunk lines and the sewerage disposal plant. In 1949 the Town applied a sum of \$25,000 for additional expansion of the disposal plant and other than this neither the University nor the Town has made any effort to enlarge the system during the rapid growth of the past 10 years. The Planning Board and the Board of Selectmen are concerned over the possible future need for sewer extensions in the area north of Edgewood Road on both sides of Madbury Road and have, therefore, included an item in the current budget for engineering services to investigate the feasibility of providing additional sewer services in this area.

Again in 1958 we saw a considerable increase in residential and some commercial building in Durham. A total of 37 permits have been issued during the year, representing an estimated cost of some \$676,000. In April, 1958, Harry Fitz was appointed building inspector and has been of tremendous assistance in thoroughly inspecting building sites and arranging for all details before permits are issued as well as following up and making sure that builders comply with the new building code. Lacking experience as to what financial arrangements should be made with Mr. Fitz, it was established that he would be paid 90% of the building fees collected and the remaining 10% would be returned to the general funds for the purchase of necessary forms and for whatever clerical work developed.

We regret that the development of the Red Tower Development has proceeded slowly. Due to complications arising out of the developer's failure to comply with the standard practices with respect to street, sewer, and water construction, the Board of Selectmen found it necessary to temporarily stop all construction of homes in this area until the developer carried out his agreement with respect to construction of above services.

The largest single bit of construction is the new Federal Building which, we understand, will be open for occupation early in the summer of 1959.

The Board of Selectmen continues to maintain its schedule of weekly meetings each Saturday morning. We welcome your visits with constructive criticism.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON INDUSTRIES

Pursuant to the following motion passed at the 227th Meeting of the Town of Durham on March 11, 1958: "That the moderator appoint a committee of five residents of the Town of Durham to investigate the possibilities of securing light industries suitable to the atmosphere of the Town of Durham and the University; this committee to report at the 1959 Town Meeting," a committee was appointed, consisting of James Chamberlin, Hugh Hamilton, Edward Howe, Edward Peal and Edward Shanken. At their first meeting, the committee elected Mr. Shanken as chairman.

The committee carried out its assignment by investigating the type of industry that would be suitable, should the town desire any industrial development, and the type of industry that would be interested in and could take advantage of the town's assets. It also attempted to ascertain the sentiments of representative citizens regarding industrial development in Durham. As a result of this survey, various premises were adopted by the committee:

- 1 Nothing should be done to change the essential character of the town.
- 2 Types of desirable industry would be those of a research and development nature, engineering services, emphasis on science and light electronic assembly.
- 3 Such industry should be located outside the residential area, preferably on land that is presently pastures or fields.
- 4 A planned program, carried out and backed by the town, would be necessary in order to attract industry. This program would have to make available a definite location, estimated construction costs and financing terms. Without this program it is not possible to attract industry.

As part of its program of gathering data, the committee was fortunate in having Mr. Vincent R. Dahlfred, Assistant Industrial Director of the New Hampshire State Planning & Development Commission, speak to a meeting of interested citizens as well as answer questions.

Since no burning desire seems evident for any immediate action to actively solicit industry, the committee would like to clarify the position of the Town regarding its desire for industrial development. This should be clearly decided by a vote at the 1959 Town Meeting to determine what action, if any, should be taken.

If the Town is not in favor of industrial development, then the matter should be dropped.

If the town is in favor of industrial development then the committee recommends:

- 1 The creation of an industrial committee which should include the Chairman of the Planning Committee and at least one Selectman.
- 2 That the Planning Committee be requested to consider where light industry might be located, giving consideration to necessary water and sewerage facilities.
- 3 That the Planning & Development Commission be requested to keep this committee informed of any outstanding prospects suitable for location in Durham.
- 4 That any citizens having comments, criticisms or suggestions be requested to indicate same to the committee.

The committee would like to thank all those who assisted it by giving us the benefit of their opinions and ideas.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF TRUST FUNDS FOR 1958

31 December 1958

No new Trust Funds were created during the year. There has been no change in the investment policies of the Trustees. Funds are invested either in U. S. Bonds or in Savings Accounts in the Durham Trust Co., with one exception where funds are invested in New York Central Railroad Bonds.

Private cemeteries were cared for within the capabilities of the earning of the various Trust Funds. Each Cemetery was mowed at least once during the year.

The earnings from the Moses G. Woodman Trust are such that in another year, we will be unable to continue the annual mowing. In several cases the earnings from the Trusts are not sufficient to pay for the work needed to bring the cemeteries up to a desirable level of appearance and care. Perhaps some of our local civic organizations might be willing to organize work projects to help out in this respect.

A recapitulation of the financial standings of the various Funds will be found elsewhere in the Town Report.



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REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

At the regular April organizational meeting, Mr. Norman W. Stiles joined the Board as the new appointee to replace Mr. L. Phelps Latimer. The Board wishes to express their appreciation and thanks to Mr. Latimer for the long and faithful service he has rendered as a former member of the Durham Planning Board.

In addition to the regular meetings, the Board held four special meetings and called two Public Hearings.

The Board granted final approval to Mr. Forrest S. Emery for the development of Section I and II of his Oyster River subdivision on the Piscataqua Road.

A request by W. P. Davis and W. E. Davis for the approval of a revision of the layout of lots and an additional street on the west side of Edgewood Road was denied.

In the continuous study of problems incident to the development of Durham, the Board is seriously concerned about the feasibility of permitting future concentrated residential expansion in areas not presently served by trunk line sewers. The soil in Durham generally is not suitable or adaptable to adequate drainage, consequently the concentration of septic tanks in many compact areas can only lead to more expensive installations at a later date. The Board is taking this opportunity of acquainting the citizens of this problem.

The Board wishes to express their appreciation to the many citizens and the Board of Selectmen for their cooperation throughout the year.

REPORT OF THE DURHAM-UNH BOARD OF FIRE COMMISSIONERS

The Board of Fire Commissioners of the Durham-UNH Fire Department are happy to report that the year 1958 was uneventful, from the standpoint of fires. We are most thankful for this, as prevention is our most efficient piece of fire equipment.

The new two-way mobile radio setup, in its first full year of operation more than paid its way. Older residents have probably noticed the absence of fire alarms, especially during the brush fire season. While the department answered 99 calls in 1958, the majority of these, through the use of radio, were still alarms. This largely eliminates spectators who constitute a major traffic hazard to emergency fire fighting equipment.

With the nationwide urge for bigger and better schools, community centers, new public buildings, etc., all of which are expensive, let us not forget that the protection of health and property are basic to the above needs. New public buildings of any type should be sprinkler equipped, fire drills and fire prevention should be both practiced and preached, if we are to fully enjoy the fruits of our advanced civilization. The Board of Fire Commissioners stands ready at all times to advise and recommend, not only regarding public buildings, but to the private citizen as well.

As in the past, we are endeavoring to give the community the best fire protection for your tax dollar that you can afford. Less than 1/6 of 1% of your property valuation is allocated to the fire department. The university's share which is twice this amount is based on the ratio of their property valuation to that of the town. The total amount from both sources in itself is small, but the value received is large. You can all help keep the tax rate down by continuing your good fire prevention habits. Let us all strive to make 1959 a NO FIRE year.

Traffic control remains the most time-consuming activity of the Durham Police Department. Off campus parking of increased numbers of student cars is a constant problem and they contribute largely to the rush hour congestion downtown. However, two important improvements have been made this year. The widening of Main Street has helped a great deal in speeding the flow of traffic and new regulations affecting the use of the parking lot have proved effective and workable.

"No Parking" signs in support of Town Ordinances are replaced as frequently as possible. Regulations remain in effect, however, when signs have been removed temporarily.

Traffic control is provided, as regularly as possible with a two man force, at Mill Road and Main Street and at Madbury Road and Garrison Avenue during the hours of heavy school traffic, and at two points on Main Street at noon and early evening during the periods of heavy vehicular traffic. Consideration is being given to increasing the size of the Police Force. Meanwhile we continue to cover the rural areas regularly and maintain a 9-12 patrol in the evenings. Although there are hours when police protection is not available by direct phoned request, the Chief has radio communication with the State Police and can be reached through them in case of emergency.

Incidents in 1958 have included minor thefts, the first traffic fatality in ten years, and the investigation of 87 accidents. Durham should be proud in the knowledge that again this year no Durham youth was involved in any court proceedings.

Durham police officers continued their education this year through a course in how to find, preserve and present evidence. This course was conducted in Durham by the Strafford County

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Law Enforcement Association. Chief Thomas serves as Chairman of the Education Committee and it is hoped that another school can be held in 1959.

Cooperation with the State Police, the Motor Vehicle Department and the FBI during the past year have been most helpful.

Following the Town Meeting convened March 11, 1958, I was appointed the Town of Durham's first Building Inspector.

THE DURHAM PUBLIC LIBRARY

1958 was a significant year for book-minded Durham. The late fall and early winter saw a move from the Hamilton Smith Library to the new University Library building. The old building had been made possible fifty years ago by pooling funds from the then New Hampshire College, the Carnegie Corporation, and a \$10,000.00 legacy from Hamilton Smith; the new building is entirely state-financed, at a cost of some \$1,300,000.00. The dual function of the Library — town and gown — was taken into consideration in the planning, so that townspeople will find the building as convenient to use as do University folk.

Newspapers are as near the entrance as possible. Good reading, made up largely of the newer books, is in a browsing area opposite the loan desk. Books received during the current week are on display near the card catalog. Reference books and current magazines also are near the card catalog.

The children's room, a third again as large as the former children's room, has carried with it the Charlotte Thompson Room designation. Miss Thompson's friends are responsible for handsome new curtains, for refinishing the maple furniture, and for a beautiful panel painted especially for the children's room by Elizabeth Orton Jones, Mason, New Hampshire artist beloved by all children who know her or her work. The new yellow steel stacks in the room were paid for by the University, and replace the maple stacks that would have been too great an expense to match. Both children and adults have expressed delight in the new quarters.

Pressure of work has made it necessary to limit the number of school groups that can be shown how to use the library. Plans made between the Reference Librarian and the School insure that all children will receive instruction at certain levels. But it is no longer possible to take any grade on request. Teachers, of course, may bring groups to the Charlotte Thompson Room at any time to familiarize them with its contents.

The newness of the building doubtless prompted requests for tours from outside the Oyster River District. Portsmouth and Newmarket High Schools and Coe-Brown Academy were among those from which groups came.

Much could be done in Durham to encourage reading among the children. It is unfortunate that in a community where adults have so rich a collection at their command, the children must be denied what many communities consider essential services. Children inclined to read do have a good collection of books from which to choose; but the many ways in which a library could entice other children into reading are perforce neglected in Durham for lack of a children's librarian.

During 1958 more than 19,000 books were added to the collection, making a total of nearly 265,000 books available. The Town itself provided funds for 262 purchases. Forty Town books were discarded, leaving in the Durham Public Library collection 5,563 books.

AUDITORS' REPORT

To the Town of Durham, N. H.

We have examined the financial records of the Town of Durham for the year ending December 31, 1958. This audit covered the books of accounts and records of the following town officials: Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Trustees of the Trust Funds, and Justice of the Municipal Court.

All checking accounts and savings accounts were verified and reconciled to bank statements or savings pass books. The bonds listed in the report of Trust Funds were examined and proved to the Statement of Trust Funds. The total amount of bonded indebtedness was verified by examination of the records of the Strafford National Bank.

The record of uncollected taxes was verified with the books of the Tax Collector. Uncollected property taxes were confirmed by contact with the debtors. Uncollected Poll and Head taxes were not confirmed due to the impracticability of contacting the number of individuals involved and since it is normal for payments of these taxes to extend beyond December 31 up to the deadline for the following year's auto registrations.

Accounts Receivable of \$2,693.50 were not confirmed by contact with individuals. This amount is owing for rent of space in Town Hall Building, for tarring, plowing and rental of town tools. Of the total amount due, \$536 was outstanding for over 90 days.

The difference in expenditures of \$73.10 between the Treasurer's report and that of the Town Clerk results from cancellation of a check. Expenditures were reduced by \$73.10 by the Town Clerk whereas the Treasurer treated the cancelled check as income.

In our opinion, and subject to the above comments, the financial reports as printed in the Town Report for 1958 present a true record of the financial status of the Town of Durham as of December 31, 1958.



REPORT OF THE DURHAM CEMETERY COMMITTEE FOR 1958

The present Durham Cemetery Committee was established by the Town Meeting on March 11, 1930 when it voted to "authorize the temporary cemetery committee, (consisting of the three Selectmen and the three Trustees of Trust Funds), to serve as a permanent committee to administer and supervise the business and affairs of the Durham Cemetery." The cemetery property consisting of 6 acres was purchased from Karl W. Woodward for \$1200.00 in 1926.

In the 1928 Town Report we find the cemetery lots listed as 20 feet by 20 feet and selling for \$150.00, also the following statement, "all lots are sold with a guarantee of perpetual care, which means their maintenance in sod and mowing during the summer season. On March 11, 1930 the Town Meeting voted, "to accept \$100.00 or such part as the Cemetery Committee may deem reasonable of the purchase price of the lots in the Durham Cemetery as an endowment fund for the perpetual care of said lots." For many years the entire purchase price has been deposited in the perpetual care fund which is listed elsewhere in this Town Report as the Principal Fund.

On June 2, 1958 the Cemetery Committee voted to raise the price of cemetery lots as shown below and to set aside one-half of the purchase price for perpetual care:

REPORT OF TREE WARDEN

Dutch Elm Disease has been the primary concern of the tree warden during 1958. The sum of \$300.00 was appropriated for care of shade trees, and it was used to spray the elm trees along the roads and streets of the town.

The New Hampshire Department of Agriculture cooperated in making a survey of the town for Dutch Elm Disease. A total of 105 infected trees were located, and the owners were notified. Two trees were on U. S. government property, 2 were on lots owned by sororities, 7 were on town property, 23 were on University land, and 71 were on private property belonging to 28 different home owners. The owners were advised to remove infected trees and properly dispose of them.

If we want to obtain effective control of Dutch Elm Disease, we must destroy the diseased trees and apply another spray early in the season.

The warden has received numerous requests for assistance from home owners with other shade tree problems. He has gladly provided this help whenever possible.

REPORT OF DURHAM CIVIL DEFENSE FOR 1958

We had our first opportunity to test ourselves in the National Test Alert of May 6, 1958. The evacuation traffic plan which had been worked out jointly by the University Civil Defense Committee, the Durham Civil Defense Unit, and the Durham Police was the result of initial work by Prof. Gordon Shaw, Col. Starbuck and others on a sub-committee. The execution of the plan was successful except on two points. The first point was that during the first few minutes of a Warning Alert, traffic should be allowed to proceed normally so that people could take the shortest route to their homes. The second point was, that even later in the period of a Warning Alert, traffic to homes on dead-end residential side streets should be allowed to proceed against the traffic pattern on those streets.

The May 6th Alert also brought to light a second and more difficult problem. The Fire Whistle used as a warning device could not be heard in several sections of town even by the Warden-Police. Coe's Corner Warden-Police were kept in touch with Local Headquarters at the Fire Station by means of Walkie-Talkie radio units furnished and manned through the courtesy of the Army Reserve Officer Training Corps. The problem of the Fire Whistle was complicated by the fact that during the summer months there is not sufficient steam to sustain the signal for the indicated length of time. This brought to light our basic problem for Durham Civil Defense — AN ADEQUATE WARNING SYSTEM.

Early in September, in an effort to improve the warning system with a minimum of cost to all concerned, Civil Defense, with the assistance of the University committee and Prof. Alden Winn, experimented with the Thompson Hall Carillon as a possible auxiliary warning device. We found that this was not as loud and penetrating a source as we had hoped. At present we are in the process of obtaining information on sirens and horns, their coverage, their usefulness in augmenting the present Fire Whistle for fire alarms as well as Civil Defense Warnings, and their costs on Federal Matching Funds available through Civil Defense. We are cooperating with Henry Corrow, Director of Madbury Civil Defense. During the next year we should be able to present a plan for the progressive extension of our present warning system.

Last spring the Oyster River Parent-Teacher's Association kindly gave us time for an evening program.

During the fall and winter months, there were two National Communications Test Alerts for the purpose of testing communications between the National, State and Local levels. Both of these alerts were received and reports of the time that the warning was actually received by phone and radio were filed with the State and National offices. Chief Thomas' mobile state police radio and the monitor of the Mutual Aid Band of the Fire Department radio gave us a time lead of four or five minutes over the telephone alert in both cases. This additional warning time is possible because of the far-sightedness of the town fathers and the Fire Department in obtaining these radios in past years.

Our Radiological Unit under the vigorous and capable leadership of Mrs. Alling has been most active. There are twenty-nine trained monitors including five from Lee and Madbury which are cooperating in the Radiological Unit. This allows for two teams, headquarters staff, and a ready reserve. On October 5th this unit acted as hosts and safety officers for the All-State Instrument Calibration Session held in Durham. Fifty instruments of all sizes were calibrated to insure their relative accuracy of readings. Representatives from eleven townships and four area officers were present.

At the time of this writing, we have been informed that our Radiological Teams are the only ones in the state which are completely outfitted with protective clothing. The coveralls needed were bought second-hand and repaired by the Durham Girl Scouts, Troup No. 7, as a civic project. The Girl Scouts also stenciled the Civil Defense insignia on the back of the coveralls. Through Federal Matching funds and surplus items provided at cost through the New Hampshire Distributing Agency, additional equipment was purchased.

Mrs. Alling's work was recognized by the State and she was sent to the OCDM Radiological Defense School in Boston from Nov. 17 to 21, 1958, by the State of New Hampshire. She is now State Instructor in Radiological Defense. Other towns in which she has conducted courses are Newmarket, Kensington, Danville and Portsmouth.

Dr. Albert Frost, a member of the Radiological Unit has done much of the maintenance and repair of monitoring instruments for Durham and for the state. A set of radiological monitoring instruments was recently assigned for educational purposes to the Oyster River High School by the OCDM.

Through Federal Matching Funds Durham Civil Defense also purchased white plastic helmets for Civil Defense personnel as protective and identifying devices.

Warden-Police coverage has been gradually extended during the year to include Main Street, Strafford Avenue, College Road and the Dunfey development. A fall meeting of the Warden-Police Unit was held to explain the problems of working out the traffic pattern in evacuation noted above, to study the problems of blast and fall-out and to explain our local responsibilities with relation to any airplane crash within the Durham township limits. Further plans for training of this unit in traffic control, etc., are now in the scheduling phase. A course is being set up on a county basis by the New Hampshire State Police in cooperation with other towns in the county.

The University of New Hampshire Civil Defense Committee, under Dean Robb Gardiner, is a subordinate unit of Durham Civil Defense. They have held six or seven meetings, made a survey of transportation and other problems and been most helpful to the Durham Civil Defense. Since the ice storm last spring, auxiliary electrical power has been installed to run the pumps of the Durham water supply in an emergency situation.

Among the liaison and informational activities of the staff of the Durham Civil Defense unit have been talks to various local groups on aspects of Civil Defense. We have also conferred in Concord with State Agencies and in Rochester with Area personnel. Note should be made that part way through the year Mrs. Plaisted also assumed the responsibility of County Co-Chairman in addition to carrying on her work in Durham.

During the year, a system of chain of command was worked

out so that at no time was the Town of Durham without a notified staff representative who could assume direction of Civil Defense in case of an emergency. The telephone switchboards of the Town and University, the Fire Station and the Town Office as well as the Chief of Police were informed of the absence of the Directors from town at any time as well as who would be in charge during the interim. This is one step in the distribution of responsibility which must be carried even further during the ensuing year. This year has served to make us more realistic and give us a greater appreciation of the problems involved. With the continuing friendly and cooperative guidance of the Selectmen and the assistance and cooperation of the townspeople, we look forward to 1959.
