## STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

[L. S.] *To the Inhabitants of the Town of Lancaster, qualified to vote in town affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said town, on the second Tuesday of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.
2. To choose three selectmen, a treasurer and all other necessary officers.
3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to meet the current expenses of the town, and apply on the principal and interest of the town debt.
4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for building and repairing highways and bridges, and direct how the same shall be laid out.
5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for building sidewalks, and direct how the same shall be expended.
6. To see if the town will choose a board of sewer commissioners, and authorize them to have the village surveyed, and a system of sewage laid out, and furnish the town maps, plans and specifications of the same, and receive bids and make arrangements for constructing and putting in sewers throughout the village, and make any necessary appropriations therefor.
7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for breaking rock and building macadam roads or streets, and direct how the same shall be expended.
8. To see what action the town will take in connection with the towns of Lunenburg and Guildhall, Vermont, or other parties, toward making the Lancaster toll bridge on Bridge street a free bridge, and to provide means for carrying any vote relative thereto into effect.
9. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to purchase or lease land for a rock ledge and borrowing pit.
10. To see if the town will vote to purchase a safe for the use of the town and raise money for the same.
11. To see what action the town will take in regard to putting more electric lights in portions of the village not now lighted.

12. To see what amount of money the town will vote to raise for lighting streets.

13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the observance of Memorial Day.

14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for school books and supplies.

15. To direct how the school money shall be divided.

16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the reading rooms.

17. To see what action the town will take relative to the procurement of snow rollers as per vote of 1891, and as to the erection and replacement of guide posts and signs at all roads and street crossings in town.

18. To see what action the town will take relative to the preparation and publication of the town history, and to make any necessary appropriations therefor.

19. To see if the town will vote to extend the time of payment of town bonds now overdue.

20. To see if the town will vote to disannex so much of the territory of the town district as is comprised by the land lying and being between No. Main street and the tracks of the Concord & Montreal railroad, that was once a part of the farm of Fenner M. Rhodes, deceased, in former school district No. 3, and annex the same to Union school district for purposes of schooling only, and to authorize the necessary steps to perfect such change and union.

21. To see what action the town will take in the matter of constructing a dyke or embankment across that low portion of the Israels river bank in the rear of George Hayes' house on Mechanic street, with a view of protecting the property located on Mechanic street, and the streets and other property belonging to the town.

22. To see what action the town will take in regard to paying for a part of sidewalks put in at the expense of the abutters in 1891 and 1892.

Out of this money I have built six new bridges; one at J. G. Merrow's, one near the William Horn place, one at the Great Rock schoolhouse, one near S. A. Way's, one near Edward Spaulding's and one at A. L. and J. M. Clark's. The one at Clark's is on a new piece of road laid out this last summer with new stone abutments costing \$250.80. There has been 586 loads of gravel put on the road this last year. The road between Edward and Elden Farnham's has been raised 18 inches and the bridge across the brook enlarged. There has been a fill made at the Great Rock schoolhouse 17 rods long and 20 feet wide, raising the road two and one-half feet, and a railing put on the brook road between Patrick Holland's and the bridge. The road has been raised with stone and gravel a distance of 23 rods, 20 feet wide and three feet high and a railing put on the same.

With this I have constructed on Middle and Bunker Hill streets 4,923 yards rock road, on Water street 2,200 yards rock road; making 7,123 yards. During the year I have furnished to the agents of the town on roads and sewers 61 1-2 pounds of Hecla powder costing \$12.30; on Sept. 2nd I turned over to Hopkinson, Road Agent, 172 pounds, \$34.40, and fuse \$3.49; making a total of \$50.19.

I have expended on sewers, by order of selectmen, in labor, \$25.48; team work \$9.55, making a total of \$35.03; expended for tools and permanent repairs \$44.42; expended on roads, including agent's services, \$1,684.77; making cost of rock road 23 3-4cts per yard, a reduction from cost of former years, that was accomplished by the use of a steam drill on the ledge and by the letting of the team work by competitive bids.

I think a still farther saving of cost can be made in these ways, as well as by increasing the amount to be expended at one time. It costs as much to fit up machinery, etc., for a short, as for a longer period of work. I would also suggest that a saving may be made by combining the sidewalk, with the road work, as the dust and fine rock can be saved for the walks, avoiding the extra expense of crushing for these especially.

There has been paid for team work on roads, \$470; and for labor, \$1,046. Price paid for labor, \$1.50 per day of 10 hours.

The rock crusher and engine were, in September last when I gave them into the charge of the Road Agent, in first-class condition, showing but little wear in bearings, etc., and seemed good for many years' work. The crushing plates I turned the first of the season, and, as the wear of these is severe, it will probably require a set of new plates the coming year. This, with some repairs and changes in the elevator, is all the expense that, at that time, seemed to be required. As the present lease of the ledge expires in April next, it will be necessary to provide for the future supply of stone.

## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH.

To the Selectmen: The Board of Health has a short report to make this year. The sanitary condition of the town is first-class, as far as is possible, with the present sewerage, consequently the general health of our people is good.

No contagious diseases have been reported to us (typhoid fever excepted) and we think there has been none. Only two cases of fever have been reported, although we believe there have been more. This is a gratifying result, owing, we believe, in part to our endeavors during the summer of 1892, when typhoid was quite prevalent. We only emphasize the old maxim "cleanliness is next to Godliness," and if you wish to enjoy good health, escape doctors' bills, keep your premises clean. More sewerage is needed, and we trust that the town may see fit to do something in this direction next year; something definite and permanent.

During the spring and summer we made a general inspection of the village, and made suggestions to many about their premises. In nearly every case our advice was cheerfully accepted and acted upon. Apparently, this fact is recognized among our people, that the Board of Health is seeking to promote the general health of the community, rather than enforcing obnoxious rules and regulations. Our efforts seem to have been appreciated, and we are happy in announcing that the town is cleaner and healthier than for a number of years past.
