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

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of New London in the County of Merrimack in said State qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

(L.S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at Whipple Memorial Hall in said New London on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To hear reports of Agents and Committees heretofore chosen and pass vote relating thereto.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$6,972.75 to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75.00 for the observance of Memorial Day.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,200.00 for the Town Library for the ensuing year.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,860.00 for street lighting for the ensuing year.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350.00 for cemetery purposes for the ensuing year.

- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,300.00 for the support of the New London Hospital for the ensuing year. This amount to include \$300.00 for care of Town Poor.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,000.00 for Summer maintenance and \$3,000.00 for Winter maintenance of highways, bridges and sidewalks for the ensuing year.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$650.00 for Hydrant service.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, together with other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 toward the maintenance of a Skating Rink.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to support United States membership in a general system of international cooperation such as that proposed at the Dumbarton Oaks Conference, having police power to maintain the peace of the world.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the use of the Planning Board.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to assist the Sunapee Lake Fish and Game Club in stocking Lake Sunapee in cooperation with surrounding towns.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for tarring Burpee Lane.

- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 towards the purchase of a tractor and snow plow and authorize the Selectmen to hire the balance on long term notes payable at the rate of \$2,000.00 per year with interest.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$509.46, the State to give \$2,037.85 for Town Road Aid.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the construction of Water Holes.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for legal expenses for the protection of the interests of the Town with respect to the Estate of Jane A. Tracy.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for Police protection and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$150.00 for use of the Historical Committee and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the erection of an Honor Roll Service Tablet.
- 24. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to appoint a committee to investigate an appropriate area for sliding purposes and authorize the Town to close this area for certain hours of the day during the winter time.
- 25. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to establish a curfew for minors under 15 years of age.

- 26. To see what action the Town will vote to take in regard to discount on taxes.
- 27. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes for the ensuing year.
- 28. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

All the officers and directors are citizens of New London, and most of them are closely related to men and women in the armed forces.

TRACY MEMORIAL BUILDING

Librarian's Report

January 31, 1944 to December 31, 1944

Eighteen years of library and community service have been completed at Tracy Memorial Building. With the death in Cleveland, Ohio, of Mrs. Jane A. Tracy on August 5, 1944, we are conscious of losing a donor and a friend who during her active years gave so generously of all she had. Appreciation of the great value of this library and community building to a town of this size has been constantly expressed throughout the year. Many summer visitors have looked with envy on our library, realizing that many a larger town library cannot compete with ours in its homey atmosphere.

In October we met with another serious loss in the death of Mrs. Ednah F. Kidder, who for nearly five years had served as a trustee. Mrs. Louise Shepard was appointed

to serve in her place.

During the summer months, we held two well-attended exhibits of paintings. The first, that of Mrs. Louise Apthorp, summer resident of George's Mills, included scenes in New Mexico, Oregon, Idaho, New York and New Hampshire. The second exhibit was that of Mrs. Dorothy Dey Howard, long time summer resident, who showed a collection of views of New England, New Mexico, and florals. Giving the finishing touch to the latter exhibit were beautiful hand-drawn rugs made by Mrs. Emma J. Howard, also a summer resident.

Free-hand drawings by three local young people were displayed and were of especial interest to those who saw in them untrained artistic ability. A large group filled our auditorium one evening to enjoy the piano recital of Mrs. Helen Colburn and her many pupils. In connection with the Woman's Club programs on our allies, we had exhibits on China, Russia, and Mexico.

Organizations have continued to meet in the building using the clubroom and the auditorium. The local group of American Education Fellowship and the New London Service Organization, Inc., were organized in our building and continue to hold their regular meetings there.

The work of the children has continued under the able guidance of the assistant librarian, Mrs. Helen Nelson. She was in charge of the library during the librarian's vacation, with the help of Miss Shirlie Nelson, who served as vaca-

tion assistant.

National Book Week with the theme "United Through Books" was observed during the week of November 12-18 with a used book sale, and a display of time-worn books and newspapers and the recent book additions, many of

which carry us to far off parts of the world.

Reference books have been much in demand and those which our library does not have have been borrowed if possible from other libraries. Library reference books added during the year are:—Children's Catalog, Basic Collection for Elementary Grades, and One Thousand Books for Hospital Libraries. An attempt has been made to replace well worn classics with copies more suitable for the use of our young people. Each year's addition of books makes the library more useful to the community and schools.

Books have been loaned to Elkins school and grades I-II, III-IV, and VII-VIII for classroom reading and references. Our newest service has been the sending of books to the local hospital, which is much appreciated and which we are

very glad to be able to do.

The gardens in back of the building have been cared for with the help of the Garden Club who also made a gift of \$10 for the purchase of garden books for our shelves.

Figures for the 11-month period show that visitors numbered 13,317, showing an increase over last year. The circulation of books, magazines and pictures totaled 11,605, showing a slight decrease over the same months of last year.

Books added totaled 408 of which 80 were by gift. Mrs. Lindsay Wallace gave the library a 30-volume set of Encyclopedia Americana. Among other gifts were books, magazines, and newspapers the donors of which include: Miss Katherine English, J. Duane Squires, Miss Eleanor Lovett, Emerson Greenaway, Mrs. Winter Eastman, Mrs. Lindsay Wallace, New London Woman's Club, Mission Circle,

Mrs. F. W. Sladen, Mrs. Helen Blake, Colby Junior College Library, Miss Gertrude Jones, Mrs. W. W. Davies, Mrs. Christine Morey, Mrs. Mary B. Macomber, Col. Henry L. Hall, Miss Sallie Waite, Hon. Herbert D. Swift, Miss Elizabeth Nichols, Mrs. Mary Wright, Herman Messer, Harry Nelson, and John Pinard.

In discarding books which were still in good condition, but which we were unable to keep because of our crowded stackrooms, we were able to pass on many to the Newbury

Library.

Following Mr. Dexter's entrance into the armed services, our janitor service was taken over by Mr. John Shirley, who on leaving town was succeeded by Mr. Herbert Hayes. Finding the winter work too much with his other duties, Mr. Hayes has resigned and Mr. Willie Ray will take over. We are reconverting to oil which will greatly facilitate janitor service.

Vault rentals are still at a premium and with the increase of rentals and the sale of used books and old papers for

scrap, our book funds have been slightly increased.

With the post-war world growing hourly nearer let us strive to make our library the best of its kind that our young people may be prepared for the unknown future which is just ahead. Let us make this "one world" "united through books" that we may better know our "new" neighbor countries and their problems.

REPORT OF THE NEW LONDON HOSPITAL BOARD AND NURSING ASSOCIATION

Secretary's Report

Members of the New London Hospital Board have held regular monthly meetings under the able leadership of President Squires. The officers and members have been organized into working committees which have reported regularly on their activities. These include: Finance, Hospital Visiting, Nurses' Home, Liaison with the Summer Residents, Constitution, Audit, History, Future Planning, Fire Protection, and X-Ray.

The Finance Committee has accomplished a great deal under the chairmanship of Mr. Ervin P. Edmunds. Money from the endowment fund has been re-invested at a higher rate of interest. It is due to the work of this committee that the laundry and hot water equipment are now in such splendid condition. They have made a study of the salary scale and established a regular chart. The endowment record has also been brought up to date under their direction.

The Hospital Visiting Committee headed by Mrs. Stanley Little was extremely busy during the first part of the year investigating and interviewing nurse candidates. Miss McLeod's services as superintendent have been invaluable. She has carried on her work capably and cheerfully in spite of the many difficulties of securing nurses, etc. Mrs. John Bozek came to the Hospital in March as day nurse. Ellen Marran and Jane Titus have served as technicians. Without the continued assistance of local and summer people as nurses, nurse's aides, X-Ray workers, and members of the Hospital Aid Association, your hospital could not have continued to serve you.

The Nurses Home Committee has made an effort to make the rooms at the home more attractive and livable. Some pictures and furniture have been given for this purpose, At the recommendation of this committee, whose chairman is Mrs. LeRoy Marshall, the owner has had some papering and floor refinishing done. Other projects are under consideration.

Miss Eleanor Lovett is chairman of the Liaison with the Summer Residents' Committee. This committee has been responsible for the expenditure of funds turned over to them by the Summer Residents' Committee. Much of the purchase of new equipment and the redecorating of rooms has been done by them. Already this year they have purchased new linoleum, an electro-cardiograph, and new dining room table and chairs. They have also acted as an informational and liaison agency between the New London Hospital and the summer residents.

The committees on Constitution, Audit, History, Future Planning and Fire Protection are new, but have already started work on their projects.

Gifts to the hospital during the past year have included \$1,000.00 from the Hospital Aid Association, new laundry equipment, a set of dishes for the Nurses' dining room, a toaster, rubber sheeting, money gifts, and Christmas decorations.

New curtains and window shades have been installed throughout the building; Room 11 has been redecorated as a model room; the new X-Ray machine has been purchased and will be delivered in the spring; a complete audit of the hospital books was made by the firm of Peisch, Angell & Company; many of the rooms have been newly painted; and new hot water equipment has been installed. Other developments during the year have included the continued success of the Blue Cross program in New London, the printing of a hospital information card, the establishment of a tonsil clinic, and the checking of the fire extinguishers.

The receipts for the annual Hospital Day on August 15 reached an all-time high with earnings of \$3,568.48. In addition to this figure the Summer Residents' Committee have collected over \$1,200.00.

An informal reception to medical and nursing personnel was given in August.

Fifty persons were present at the annual meeting on Monday, September 25 at the Whipple Memorial Hall. Reports of the secretary, treasurer, and auditor were read and accepted.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Last year we had a chance to fight what we thought was going to be a real good forest fire in our neighboring town of Springfield. However, with good equipment and the fine spirit of the men who voluntarily offered their time and effort, we soon had the fire under control.

We are very glad to see two fine water holes which were built last year. These may prove their worth some day by saving nearby houses and possibly stopping a forest fire. I, myself, should like to see the town raise a little money every year to build a few more of these water holes, for this is certainly money well spent.

We have had fine cooperation from our State Forester and District Chief, Mr. Richardson, who is always ready to help in any way he can.

There are a lot of fields which were not cut last year and may prove to be a fire hazard this spring. These should be burnt over very early in the spring to prevent any danger a little later on when the forests and fields begin to get very dry, since grass fires spread very fast at times.

May I express my thanks and appreciation to all who have cooperated in the past at forest fires, and may I look forward to your continued interest and support.

ANOTHER ENEMY TO CONQUER

Here is a home front fight that everyone can get into. Last year in this State 558 brush and forest fires burned over 4,648 acres of land, of which 2,788 acres were valuable timber and young growth. With available manpower the lowest of any year since the war started, you can help to keep this loss down by preventing these fires from starting.

Keep in mind these simple rules:

- 1. Always get a permit from your forest fire warden before starting any fires in the open. Burning under certain conditions is permitted.
- 2. Never burn unless you have enough help to control your fire—a permit does not excuse you of negligence in case it gets away.
- 3. Always report any uncontrolled fire promptly to your forest fire warden. Minutes lost are acres lost.
- 4. Be especially careful with cigarettes, matches and pipes. Smokers caused most of our fires.
- 5. Never leave a fire unless it is dead out. You can't feel safe while there is a spark left.

REPORT OF PLANNING BOARD

1944-1945

Fiscal Year Ended August 31, 1944

Your Planning Board has held meetings monthly during the year and semi-monthly in January and February of 1945.

They have devoted much time to the problem of making a map of the town and to the accumulation of data. The State Planning Board in several interviews has given helpful advice and information. Through them we have obtained copies of the Pine Blister Rust Maps which are of great value to us. Work is now in progress on drawing a map which will be about 36 in. x 48 in., and we believe will be serviceable in the administration of town affairs. The tremendous value of constructive future planning by the aid of maps was discussed in a public meeting with Dr. Albert Carlson of Hanover, N. H., presiding.

Traffic on Main Street and parking at several points has been studied.

An ordinance for regulation and equipment of buildings has been formulated and discussed in a public meeting to inform citizens of its purposes and provisions.

Your board wishes to express its appreciation to the State Planning Board and to the New London Civic Association in sponsoring public meetings and to our citizens in supporting them.

- 10. To see if the district will give further instruction to the School Board regarding disposition of the old school building known as the Colby Hill School, and pass any vote in relation thereto.
- 11. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for establishing a domestic arts course in the New London High School, including a teacher and necessary equipment.
- 12. To see if the district will vote to adopt medical inspection for the local schools according to Chapter 142, Sections 15-25, of the Public Laws of the State of New Hampshire and pass any vote in relation thereto.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board:

I herewith submit my eleventh annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

Fortunately most of our teachers remained with us for another year. So far this year we have escaped changes in the staff. This is a cause for great satisfaction.

School officials and parents owe a debt of deep gratitude to those who have remained in the teaching profession during these trying times. They could have easily taken other positions with larger salaries and less work. The burdens placed upon teachers have greatly increased. Besides the regular class-room duties and outside preparation they have assumed many extra duties which have been assigned to the schools. War time conditions have had an unfortunate influence on the attitude and conduct of children so that school-room management is much more difficult than in other years. Without the loyal cooperation of the teachers our schools could not operate at all. New London is indeed fortunate in being able to have a corps of teachers of such high calibre.

We are sorry to note a big drop in the number of tuition pupils in the High School. There are six this year, compared with 14 last year. Nine of those attending last year either graduated or left school and only one new tuition pupil entered last September.

We are continuing our special activities in connection with the war effort. The stamp and bond sales for last year (1943-1944) were:

 \$4,891.90

 \$456.00

It is noteworthy that practically all pupils participated in this campaign. The total amount of sales is very impressive and is a distinct credit to the pupils, being more than twice the sales last year.

The Central School during the year collected 19,200 pounds of scrap paper and rags.

We added a new project last fall, the collection of milkweed pods for use in making life preservers. Milkweed floss is a satisfactory substitute for kapok, the supply of which is now largely in the hands of the Japanese. New London pupils (both schools) collected 40 bushel bags of pods. The Government paid twenty cents a bag. The money was used for school projects.

Again we wish to express our thanks to Mr. Edwin Edmunds for coaching the boys' basketball team. He has been a devoted and successful coach.

The Annual Heidelberg Prize Speaking Contest was held in the school auditorium May 12, 1944. The winners were: First prize, Winifred Shirley who delivered "The Creation" by James Weldon Johnson; second prize, Fay Kristl, whose selection was "Tim's Vacation", Anonymous; third prize, Arrolyn Hayes, whose piece was "Bobby Shaftoe" by Homer Green. The judges awarded honorable mention to Robert Dowd, who spoke "Don't Die on Third", adapted from the Detroit News.

The Heidelberg Prize Speaking Fund now amounts to \$529.03.

The Junior High School Prize Speaking Contest was held in the auditorium May 19, 1944. The first prize (\$3.00) was awarded to Mary Lue Barton; second (\$2.00) to Sylvia Woodward; and third (\$1.00) to Earl Pardy. Joan Crane earned an honorable mention.

The home nursing course was given again last year by Mrs. Della Spiller, school nurse. Four girls were awarded Red Cross Home Nursing Certificates. The annual citizenship medal granted by the Sons of the American Revolution to the most outstanding pupil in the eighth grade was presented to Sumner Woodward.

The Class of 1944 presented to the school a large Honor Roll which will contain the names of all in the service who are alumni of the New London High School or received the War Emergency Certificate. Forty-four names appear now on the plaque, which is located on the wall of the corridor near the main entrance.

Of the graduates in the Class of 1944 four entered the University of New Hampshire, three entered Colby Junior College, one is in the Air Corps Reserve, three joined the Navy and one joined the Army.

The tuberculin patch test was given last April to 60 pupils. The audiometer test was given to 135 pupils. Last May a dental clinic was held in the nurse's room by Dr. E. F. Keane of Newport. Members of the basketball team (21) were given a thorough medical examination by Dr. W. P. Clough, Sr., and Dr. W. P. Clough, Jr.

We acknowledge with thanks a gift of books by Mrs. Hazel F. Adams: consisting of a set of "American Statesmen", John Fisk's "Historical Writings" (12 vols.), and a copy of March's "History of the World". Mrs. Adams included a subscription for the school library of "Read" magazine.

We are grateful to the science department of Colby Junior College for a gift of reference books in science.

Students of physical education at Colby Junior College directed classes in gymnastics and games at the Central School during the past year. This assistance is greatly appreciated.

A pre-induction course, "Fundamentals of Machines", was given by Mr. Wechter to several junior boys. A pre-flight course in Aeronautics was given for a second year by Mr. Bolster to boys and girls in the two upper classes.

The impossibility of adequately heating the gymnasium has curtailed our physical exercise program in the winter especially in the grades. Thus the purpose of a gymnasium is not realized fully. Moreover the room cannot comfortably be used for dramatics, either the actual performance or the rehearsals. I trust that the annual district meeting will provide funds for installing a ceiling.

The walls and ceiling at the Elkins School have been cleaned and repainted.

The cooperation of the School Board, teachers, janitors and others is much appreciated and made the work of the year pleasanter and more effective. I especially appreciate the kind consideration shown me during the time of my enforced absence.




