TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF RUMNEY IN THE COUNTY OF GRAFTON, IN SAID STATE, QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN TOWN AFFAIRS.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said Rumpey, on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- I. To choose a Town Clerk.
- II. To choose three Selectmen.
- III. To choose all other necessary Officers.
- IV. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.
- V. To vote how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for the support of Schools, in addition to the amount required to be raised by law.
- VI. To see if the town will vote to exempt from taxation for a period of five years, the Baker's River Creamery building and machinery.
- VII. To see if the town will vote to paint and make necessary repairs on the Town House, and make appropriation to pay for the same.
- VIII. To see if the voters of said town will vote to pay Charles Spaulding, the expenses in defending the suit of said town vs. Charles Spaulding, after the legal agent of town withdrew said suit.
- IX. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate twenty-five dollars for decoration of soldier's graves.
- X. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for support of the Town Library,

XI. To see if the town will vote to raise five hundred dollars each year to be deposited as a sinking fund to pay the notes now existing against the town.

XII. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the highway leading from Charles Watt's house, to the old John Watt's place.

XIII. To see if the town will vote to have the inventory Blanks delivered at time of taking apprisal of property.

XIV. To transact any other business properly coming before said meeting.

LIBRARY REPORT.

The legislature of 1891, recognizing the great educational value of free public libraries, passed a law designed to encourage every town in the state not already provided with one which was not owned and controlled by the town to establish such a library and by so doing supplement the free text books with which the public schools of every town are now provided, by a collection of good literature free for every citizen to read.

Our town wisely took advantage of the provisions of this law by taking the action necessary to comply with its requirements and a board of three library trustees were elected to manage the library affairs and make such arrangements as were necessary for the town to obtain the books and establish a free public library.

Your trustees have performed these duties and the result is that we now have one of the best public libraries in northern New Hampshire free to all citizens of the town.

We have received from the state nearly 100 volumes and have also renewed the former lease of the Library Association books for a further term of five years and thus have a library of over 2000 volumes. We have received assistance from several persons by contributions and labor and we feel sure that the library will prove

a great and lasting benefit to the community.

The amount of money voted by the town while enough to comply with the requirements of the law is not sufficient to put the library in good condition. One of the most urgent needs is a good catalogue which would add very materially to the value of the library and your trustees have taken such measures as they could to arrange for this. We have listed the books and done all the preliminary work free of expense to the town and we would respectfully suggest that the trustees be authorized to expend a small sum not to exceed \$25 for this purpose.

The State Board of Library Commissioners recommend that each town vote a few dollars each year to be applied to adding new books to the ones already supplied by the state. The small sum of \$15 would add fifty standard volumes to our library.

However we leave this recommendation to your consideration.

SCHOOL REPORT FOR YEAR ENDING FEBRUARY 1st, 1893.

TO THE CITIZENS AND PARENTS OF THE TOWN OF RUMNEY:-

In presenting to you our annual report we can give you but a brief outline of what we have done, and make some suggestions as to the future. We take pleasure in saying we have been favored with a corps of good teachers. Believing a teacher should have a normal school training or a successful experience to secure the best results, we selected those to fill positions for which they were qualified and gave such compensations as the work demanded. The amount of money at our disposal, however, has not allowed us to pay the teachers as much as in the surrounding towns, and it has therefore been difficult to retain them beyond one or two terms. Believing, however, that a good school, though brief, is preferable and affords better results, we hired the best we could and in view of satisfactory work, have engaged some of them by offering still higher wages to return and serve you for the ensuing year.

We were greatly interrupted in the spring and fall terms by sickness. The law requiring children to be vaccinated was enforced, and, while some were wisely kept at home because of this, many were allowed to roam the fields and highways when they might have been attending to their studies. While it is necessary to have a competent teacher, it is no less essential, for the best results, that the pupils should be regular in their attendance. And just here, parents and guardians, we ask your attention, for above all others it is your duty to have your children attend regularly. A glance at our school registers will reveal the fact that tardy and absent marks occupy a very conspicuous place. As a stimulus to the pupil we offered Badges of Honor to those who were neither tardy or absent any half day during the term, and the plan has worked admirably as the Roll of Honor page will show you. Another method adopted in all the schools was the introduction of a

report card, giving the rank and general deportment of each pupil. We are happy to say that this as well as the Roll of Honor badge has stimulated the pupils to greater refinement in their conduct and language about the play-ground. Besides this, which by no means should be overlooked in the child's education, you who are parents and guardians are informed each week of your child's rank and deportment. Will you see to it in the future that your child has such a card from the teacher and that you sign and return it each week; we began the work last spring by opening seven schools.

The pupils from No. 8 were conveyed to No. 7, and those from No. 3 attended No. 2.

By vote of the town Districts Nos. 4 and 5 were united; but owing to dissatisfaction to some in the immediate vicinity of No. 4, the children were removed from the union school and sent to a private one held in No. 4. Permission having been granted by request of the board at a special town meeting, No. 4 was re-opened and a successful school taught during the fall and winter terms, although the highest number registered was only sixteen. By request of the teachers four of the scholars were visited for the purpose of maintaining the good reputation of the school. In two instances the difficulty was traceable to the pupil, while in the other cases the difficulty arose on account of the parents listening to the gossip of the children without visiting the school to ascertain from the teacher the exact cause of the trouble. We do not believe any teacher is free from error, but if you have reason to think one lacking just talk with them instead of the child and the chances are more than even that all difficulty can be adjusted to the satisfaction of all concerned.

We are sorry to inform you that your school buildings are in a dilapidated condition owing to the fact that the five per cent. which is allowed for repairs, is insufficient to meet the demands. One of them, No. 2, is in a bad condition in general, besides needing a new out-building. Four of them need plastering overhead, one needs to be shingled, two reseated and all of them repainting both inside and out. Nos. 4 and 5 are in need of a new house,

conveniently located, to give better accommodation to the scholars. Will you not consider these needs and make a special appropriation both for the repairs and the new house?

We have supplied each school with a complete set of charts, and the teachers tell us that they are a great help in explaining the different branches taught. We have also furnished book-cases for the schools which had none, where the books and other supplies may be kept when the school is not in session. No. 7 has been presented with a fine large map of the United States and of the world by Miss Carrie Baker of Concord, a former teacher, while the play ground has been greatly enlarged by the generosity of Messrs. Keyes and Baker. The fence around it was erected by the enterprising men of that vicinity, the town furnishing the lumber. On the houses of Nos. 1, 2 and 7 wave the stars and strips placed there by the efforts of the school children. And now in closing allow us to add that our schools for the year just closed have been fully up to the average of those in former years, and in some particulars there has been a marked improvement, that of regular attendance being the most noticeable, there being twelve on the roll of perfect attendance for the entire year in the place of five last year. As your servants, we have tried to perform the work intrusted to us, conscious of its importance and desirous of its success. We regret that we have not had the ability to serve you better; but in every transaction there has been a knowledge and consent of the entire board. And now, with the experience of the past and your co-operation in the future, we assure you a careful consideration of all that pertains to the best interests of your schools.

Taught during the Spring term by Mary A. Lorden, the Fall term by Gertie B. Loveland, and the Winter by Lura H. A. Burleigh. Highest number registered, Spring 21, Fall 17, Winter 17. Average daily attendance respectively 16, 12, 15. Yearly average 14.

NO. 6.

Taught during the Spring term by Annie E. Gillett, and during the Fall and Winter terms by Harriet L. Waring. Highest number registered Spring 18, Fall 20, Winter 15. Average daily attendance 13, 13, 10. Yearly average 12.

NO. 7.
