## REPORT.

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### FELLOW CITIZENS :

In presenting my second annual report, I regret to say that the past year has not been one of exampled prosperity to our schools. The teachers, during the past year, have not *all* been what our needs require. The most of them are of superior class, unsurpassed in qualifications and in aptness to teach. The responsibility in this regard does not all, or mainly, rest upon your Town Committee, but upon the prudential Committees. There are good teachers who will serve you. Wait until you find such before employing. The teachers position is one of supreme importance: they should be able to cultivate manners as well as minds, so that their example may be worthy of imitation. Unrefined manners, uncouth expressions, undignified and trifling conduct, untidy and negligent habits cannot be compensated for by any knowledge of the sciences, "Culture is more valuable than money. and a well disciplined mind more precious, than gold or silver." Secure good teachers and pay for them.

### *Supervision.*

Thorough, systematic supervision is an indispensable aid to efficient schools. Few have any adequate idea of the amount of time wasted for want of it. Scholars are eager to make rapid advancement in their studies, often to the sacrifice of thoroughness. They should not be permitted to pass hurriedly over fundamental

principles, with little or no understanding of them, thereby acquiring but little knowledge which can be of any profit to them in the active duties of life, or which they can ever retain in memory to the end of the term. School privileges thus improved are of little consequence. Pupils are thus disqualified for making progress in more advanced rules and studies, for want of a proper knowledge of first principles. These they must turn back to, and go over again. A faithful, competent supervisor, by devoting more time and attention than has been spent, would be able to learn the qualifications of all the scholars in town, and to give directions to teachers when to keep them upon first principles and when to advance them. I hope that my success will do something to elevate our schools in this direction.

### *Parents.*

We hope that parents feel that a great duty rests upon them in connection with our schools. They should realize the evil of misjudging and condemning teachers from hearsay evidence. It is alike unjust to the teachers and detrimental to the school. Excellent teachers will fall far short of full success if parents manifest only indifference to their labors. Teachers cannot furnish brains for our children; They cannot compel them to attend school; They cannot always know, when they are absent, whether they are playing truant or away by permission; neither had it ought it to be expected that they can restrain them from evil practises which are allowed to pass with impunity when at their homes. Never discuss school grievances, or express opinions derogatory to a teacher, in the presence of your children, unless you wish in after years to reap the bitter fruits of your own sowing. We should realize that teachers are fellow-laborers with us in the cause of education fellow-builders in rearing the framework of our children's characters.

### *Text Books.*

During the past year the Franklin Readers have been introduced in all the schools; also Swinton's Geographies, where they were not last year. During the winter term your committee purchased

four sets "Mitchell's new wall Maps," at an expense of about forty dollars, which are now in the several school-rooms for the benefit of the schools. Immediately there will be given, at the Town Hall, an exhibition by the scholars of all the schools. The proceeds of which will be taken to defray the expense of the Maps.

### *High School.*

It is encouraging to know that we are favored with a school at the Town Hall. This opportunity should be improved by those who desire to pursue the higher branches of study than what can be comfortably taught in our district schools. I think all are not attending this school that should. Mr. Goss is an able teacher and should be well patronized.

### *Teachers and Management of Schools.*

In the West district, the Spring term was taught by Miss Belinda S. Bunker, of Rye. Miss Bunker has had large experience and success in teaching. She is too well known as a teacher to need special commendation.

The Winter term was taught by Mr. Nathan R. Goss, of Rye, who has taught this school successfully before. We think that the prudential committee was fortunate to secure the services of so competent a teacher, and if such a thing is possible, his services should be retained.

In the South district, the school, throughout the year has been taught by Miss Elzada M. Goss, of Rye. The fact that she has taught this school, with success, for two years in succession, should impress upon the minds of future committees that the services of such teachers should be secured at any reasonable price. The exercises on the closing day reflected credit to both teacher and scholars.

In the Centre district, the Spring term was taught by Miss Abbie S. Clarke, of Rye. Miss Clarke's reputation as a teacher is too well known by you all for me but to mention her name. I consider her one of our best teachers. The Winter term was opened by Mr. Charles F. Larrabee of Portsmouth. Mr. Larrabee lacked the



most vital points of a good teacher, the principle of which was the faculty of governing himself, both in words and actions. At the end of the seventh week, I deemed it advisable to remove him. The remaining part of the term was taught by Mr. Arthur G. Hoyt of Newington. Mr. Hoyt is a good scholar and a gentleman, but the school was quite disorderly compared with the previous schools in the district that I have had the pleasure of visiting. The condition of the school, at the time he entered, was such that it would be most impossible for any teacher to make it a complete success.

In the East district, the Spring and Fall terms were taught by Miss Sarah A. Goss, of Rye. Miss Goss is an energetic teacher—one who imparts instruction thoroughly. We hope that her services may be retained for the benefit of our own schools.

The Winter term was taught by Mr. C. E. T. Yeaton, of Portsmouth, who is quite an experienced teacher and gave good satisfaction so far as I know. I think that a younger teacher is more desirable for our schools.

My thanks are due to all who have been willing to aid in the cause of education.
