TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Sullivan in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Sullivan on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To bring in your votes for the election of Delegates-at-Large, Alternate Delegates-at-Large, District Delegates, Alternate District Delegates to the National Conventions of the Democratic and Republican parties, to be held for the purpose of nominating party candidates for President and Vice President of the United States.
- 4. To see what sums of money the town will raise in addition to that required by law for building and repairing highways and bridges, or take any action relating thereto.
- 5. To see if the town will accept state-aid construction of Class II road known as Beaver Brook Road and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$256.50 or will accept state-aid for construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$256.50.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to pay for digging graves and going with the town hearse for residents.

- 7. To see what sum of money the town will raise in addition to that required by law for the support of the public library.
- 8. To see if the town will vote to raise money for Memorial Day or take any action relating thereto.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to raise or appropriate money for Old Home Day, or take any action relating thereto.
- 10. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to borrow money on the credit of the town in anticipation of taxes.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to raise or appropriate \$500 for the payment of the tractor note, or take any action thereto.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to raise or appropriate the sum of \$20 for the Monadnock Region Association, or take any action relating thereto.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to help stamp out the white pine blister disease and raise money for the same, or take any action thereto.
- 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for removal of snow from the highways.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to purchase a new snow plow, and raise money for the same, or take any action relating thereto.
- 16. To see if the town will vote to purchase some snow fence and raise money for the same.
- 17. To see if the town will vote to petition the state tax commission to have an audit made by the municipal accounting division and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.
- 18. To see if the town will vote to have electric lights in the town hall if electricity is available this year and to raise money for the same, or take any action relating thereto.

- 19. To see if the town will vote to have street lights and raise money for the same or take any action relating thereto.
- 20. To see if the town will vote to give the Sullivan Ladies Aid Society the privilege of making improvements in the town hall kitchen.
- 21. To hear the reports of agents, auditors or committees heretofore chosen, or take any action thereon.
- 22. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Sullivan:

I herein submit my seventeenth annual report as superintendent of schools.

The American system of public schools is today facing the greatest challenge of a century in the scholastic training of its youth during the formative period of life.

For half a century, to my knowledge, we have heard echoing down the stream of education the slogan "Back to the Fundamentals."

Admitting that this slogan has laid a firm foundation for our educational structure and also that it is highly essential today, yet we note in the rapidly changing conditions of the world greater emphases must be placed on the preservation of American institutions.

Indeed, our pupils must drink more deeply and more freely from the fountain heads of Liberty and Freedom, viz., the Bill of Rights and the Magna Charta of English history and from our own Constitution.

It may be true that the pupils under a dictatorship are as well trained in the so-called fundamentals but they do lack the major part of that education which is needed for citizenship under our form of government. Democracy's slogan is onward to the most helpful conditions of living for the masses and of opportunity for participation in a democratic society. The founders of our republic believed education essential to the success of democracy. The experience of a century and a half in representative government confirms that belief so strongly that we may say without fear of contradiction that "Our public schools are our first line

of defense"; "Our education is the bulwark of the citadel of Liberty."

When the cataclysm of arms in Europe has spent itself and we approach the world-wide renaissance of modern living, we must have our leaders prepared. They must be endowed with the highest type of citizenry, a type which implies the closest cooperation, supplementation and coordination of three vital elements of society, viz., the school, the home and the church.

History tells us that in all great emergencies the great bulk of leaders come from rural sections of the country. Let us hope Sullivan may furnish its quota.
