As they trimmed sheep hooves or filled the barns with hay, Mike made sure his kids also learned how to execute an elaborate prank, exercise the horses, navigate a hay maze, and take side trips to check on a newborn animal or see whether the fish were biting. Today, these capable young men and women return to Ridgehill Farm to trim sheep hooves and fill the barns with hay, to rebuild a chimney and the bull yard fence, to move livestock to winter quarters. The lower pasture fills with music and laughter as they celebrate jobs and marriages, and welcome the new littlest children—the next generation of Uncle Mike's farmhands.

Mike's phone rings, and a voice tight with anxiety describes the emergency. Soon, he arrives, bearing relief--a hastily gathered sack of supplies, light words, careful administra-

tion and now ease, as the cow gathers herself and stands, or the sheep finally gives birth. For a bit, conversation turns to the other livestock, the funny thing that happened to a mutual friend. Now the cow is steady, or the sheep is licking her newborn. Tension dissolves, as attention shifts to living. As we end the decade, town leaders continue their endeavor to transform the challenges facing our town into opportunities; to retain our "rural" community character and take the necessary steps to prepare for the future. The annual report provides an overview of the variety of functions, activities, challenges and opportunities of the past year faced by town officials, employees and the community. When reviewing the individual reports, we encourage readers to think about how they can participate in town life, either by serving on a board or committee (there are openings available) or by participating in an event-whether it be a roadside clean up or Old Home Day. Mark the town's web site, www.town.swanzey. nh.us as one of your favorites and keep in touch with events and opportunities happening in your town. It is the commitment of Swanzey's residents to the town that makes it a great place in which to live.

The Selectmen's Report seeks to briefly highlight the variety of activities that occurred during 2009 and some which we anticipate in 2010. While the character of the town development remains predominantly residential, we are wellpositioned to attract more diverse economic activity. Those economic activities will expand opportunities to work, live and shop in Swanzey. While not an inclusive list, those activities of note during 2009 include Moore Nanotechnology's move to its new facility constructed in the town's industrial park district, construction now underway of a retail complex to include a Market Basket along the Route 10 corridor, Fast Friends (greyhound rescue facility) and the Page Homestead Senior HousDeborah J. ing (off Route 12). Available municipal infrastructure and affordable commercial land are two key community assets bringing projects to Swanzey.

As part of our annual report, we take this opportunity to "report back" and highlight some of the projects and activities during 2009 deserving special attention.

Road reconstruction and rebabilitation Improvements to Carlton Road Extension (connecting South and Webber Hill Roads) were completed during 2009 with placement of the final coat of pavement on this section of road and Webber Hill Road (reclaimed and base paved in 2008). A top course of pavement was placed on West Street (west section reclaimed and base paved in 2008 as well). Funding for the Carlton Road Extension Project combined FEMA funds (which became available as a result of the April 2007 flooding) and funds in the town's expendable trust. The West Street and Webber Hill Road projects were also funded from the expendable trust. The town's multiyear road rehabilitation plan includes a portion of Old Richmond Road and Matthews Road in 2010.

Homestead Dam removal & Thompson Covered Bridge Through 2009, we continued to work in partnership to advance these projects, with the state, federal and non-profit agencies spearheading the dam removal project. Recognizing that there could be advantages to bidding, contracting and completing the projects together, the town agreed to serve as the contracting entity for both projects. These two projects were bid together during the summer. Unfortunately, bids received for the dam removal portion exceeded the dam partner's available funding. Re-bidding jointly was considered, but with the agencies spearheading the dam removal portion uncertain as to when they would be able to raise the funds for dam removal, town officials decided to move forward re-bidding the Thompson Bridge scour countermeasures and fire suppression measures separately, so that work could be completed in 2010. Dam removal partners continue to work to advance that project and hope it will occur in 2010 as well.

<u>Other town bridges</u> Closure of the Warmac Road bridge (following a finding by state bridge inspectors of critical deficiencies) in the fall of 2009 result-

ed in the decision to move this bridge project forward in conjunction with the Cobble Hill Road bridge. Engineering for these projects will move forward concurrently and joint bidding will be assessed.

Public safety services Emerging issues (such as H1N1) and pro-active planning related to events and facilities in town have improved unification and collaboration among the town's emergency responders. During the summer of 2009, public safety agencies in the town and region participated in a preplanned emergency response exercise at the Cheshire Fair. These departments, joined by DPW personnel, the town planner and school officials updated the town's Hazard Mitigation Plan. The town's Emergency Operations Plan, scheduled for an update this year, will keep these same entities focused toward being pro-active and prepared to respond to the unexpected. As we move forward with these planning efforts, we will miss the experience and guidance of town Health Officer Robert DeRocher. After more than 30 years of service to our Town, Bob's well deserved retirement and relocation to the North Country leaves a hole in our organization which will not be easy to fill.

Fire Department The hiring of the town's first full-time career firefighter in the fall of 2008 launched a series of changes, ranging from additional training opportunities for personnel, assessment of the town's equipment, revisions, reduction and re-assignment of apparatus and improvements to the town's fire stations. We want to recognize Chief Skantze and the department's personnel for their hard work and dedication toward advancing the

department, working in conjunction with other emergency responders and commitment to serving the community.

Culture, recreation and conservation Celebration of our community continues and in 2009 there was a lot to celebrate. The Open Space Committee's work, derived from the community's goal to preserve Swanzey's rural character, resulted in easements protecting the farmland and forest making up the Johnson family's Ridgehill Farm. The spring premiere of Swanzey Rural Character, the film celebrating Swanzey's special people, traditions and places, served to acquaint newcomers and remind old friends of our community qualities. We thank filmmaker Evan Barlow, a graduate of Monadnock Regional High School, for this gift to our town. Resident Wayne Young was recognized as the American Forest Foundation's National Tree Farm Inspector of the Year and Swanzey Conservation Commission member Michael Morrison received recognition from NH Fish & Game as its volunteer of the year. Congratulations to all!

During 2009, as the NH state government threatened to reduce revenues and funding historically shared with towns and cities, Selectmen directed department leaders to be cautious with spending and prepare to re-allocate resources. In the end, state revenue reductions (and cost shifting) were not as significant as feared. We would like to recognize town staff for the support they provided this board as we worked to be effective stewards of available resources. As the Town moves forward into 2010, financial challenges remain. Given current economic conditions, the

recommended budget and other funding requests included in this year's town meeting warrant focus on essential operations, necessary investments to preserve infrastructure, opportunities to maximize other funding sources, safety and opportunities to improve efficiency and organizational effectiveness. Voters will consider this budget at the polls on March 9th. As we have in the past, town leaders will strive to meet the increasing needs of our town, the largest in Cheshire County, within the limits of funding approved.

The Selectmen wish to thank our town's volunteers; board, committee and commission members, firefighters, rescue and emergency management personnel and employees in all the Town's departments for their commitment to serve, as it is the key ingredient in our town's successes. Much of what happens in our town is dependent upon volunteer efforts. Town Meeting Warrant 2010



Town of Swanzey, State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Swanzey in the State of New Hampshire qualified to vote in Town affairs:

FIRST SESSION You are hereby notified to meet for the First (Deliberative) Session of the annual Town Meeting, to be held at the Monadnock Regional High School/ Middle School Auditorium, Swanzey, NH on Tuesday, the second day of February 2010 at seven in the evening (7:00 p.m.). The First Deliberative Session will consist of explanation, discussion, debate of articles and will afford those voters who are present the opportunity to propose, debate and adopt amendments to each warrant article, except election of officers and those whose wording is prescribed by state law.

SECOND SESSION You are also notified to meet for the Second Session of the annual Town Meeting on Tuesday, the ninth day of March 2010, at the Christian Life Fellowship Church, 211 Whitcomb Road, between the hours of 8 a.m. and 7 p.m. to vote by official ballot to elect town officers, to vote by official ballot on warrant articles as they may have been amended at the First Session and those other official ballot questions whose wording is prescribed by state law.

Article 1 To choose by ballot all necessary town officers including a Moderator, Selectman, a Supervisor of the Checklist, Trustee of the Trust Funds, Sewer Commissioner, Zoning Board of Adjustment member, 3 Planning Board members and a Library Trustee.

To see if the Town will Article 2 vote to raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant or as amended by vote of the first session, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling \$5,539,810? Should this article be defeated, the default budget shall be \$5,483,630, which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the town or by law; or the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and

XVI, to take up the issue of a revised

operating budget only. (RECOMMEND-

ED BY SELECTMEN)

Article 3 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 456,850 to be placed in the following expendable trust and capital reserve accounts of the Town:

Article 4 To see if the Town will vote to establish a Recycling Center Revolving Fund pursuant to RSA 31:95-h. The money received from the sale of recyclables marketed by the Center shall be allowed to accumulate from year to year and shall not be considered part of the town's general fund unreserved fund balance. The town treasurer shall have custody of all monies in the fund and shall pay out the same only upon order of the Board of Selectmen for purposes related to improving the town's re-

Article 5 To see if the Town will vote to authorize Selectmen to enter into a five year lease/purchase agreement in the amount of \$37,486 for the purpose of leasing two ALS "advance life support" monitors and raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,615 for the first year's payment for that purpose, or take any action thereon. If the lease/purchase agreement is authorized by voters, lease payments for years 2 through 5 will be included in the corresponding year's town operating and default budget. OMMENDED BY SELECTMEN)

Article 6 To see if the Town will vote to modify the tax credit provided eligible veterans, with a total and permanent service-connected disability, to adopt the optional provisions prescribed by RSA 72:35 I-a and increase the current \$700 annual tax credit to \$2,000?, or take any action thereon. (SUBMITTED BY PETITION)

Article 7 To see if the Town will vote to approve the following resolution to be forwarded to our State Representatives, our State Senator, the Speaker of the House, and the Senate President.

RESOLVED: The citizens of New Hampshire should be allowed

to vote on an amendment to the New Hampshire Constitution that defines "marriage", or take any action thereon. (SUBMITTED BY PETITION)

Article 8 To see if the Town will vote to approve the following resolution:

Shall New Hampshire's Congressional Delegation be instructed to pursue a new and independent investigation to address thoroughly all of the evidence and unanswered questions related to the events of September 11, 2001? The record of the vote on this article shall be transmitted by the Town of Swanzey to the New Hampshire's Congressional Delegation, or

take any action thereon. (SUBMITTED BY PETITION)







Update of assessed values This year's town-wide update completed our five-year assessment cycle, designed to maintain fair and equitable property values throughout the town. (The next town-wide update will take place in 2014.) As a single point of contact for assessments, exemptions and credits, the Town's new assessing coordinator now supports this important function.

<u>Updated maps</u> Historically, tight budgets and lack of equipment have stood in the way of easy access to the astonishing amount of information now available through statewide Geographic Information System databases.

Dan Zeh, Swanzey conservation biologist and cartographer, has volunteered his time and personal equipment to create maps to help discussions of the Planning Board, Conservation Commission, Stewards of Mt. Caesar Advisory Committee, and Open Space Committee. Dan's maps illustrated the necessity of improving town mapping and databases. Working under contract with the Land Use office, Dan has updated the Town's zoning map.

Beautification and communication Every year the Old Homestead Garden Club and the Girl Scouts raise our spirits with plantings and holiday decorations. Jim Vitous of Custom Designs donated his labor to build and install the new reader board sign. Town Hall staff thanks these thoughtful friends.

The Police Department responded to a broad variety of calls in 2009, some quite serious. Residential and commercial growth in Swanzey and Cheshire County clearly contributes to an increase in demands on our agency.

Staffing changes & challenges Officer Melissa Hetrick joined the Department in the fall, filling a vacancy created by the departure of John Melia. A four-year Navy veteran, Melissa has an associates degree in criminal justice. She recently completed the Police Standards and Training Council Academy, and likely will begin her patrol duties in March.

Robert J. O'Connor was hired as the Department's new School Resource Officer, filling a vacancy created by the departure of James Fisher. Already a full-time certified police officer with over fourteen years of experience, Rob has a bachelors degree in sociology and an associates degree in criminal justice. He is a Field Training officer, a Defensive Tactics instructor and a Taser and Firearms instructor.

A serious injury suffered in the line of duty by Corporal Rob Eccleston reminds us that no police call is routine. Rob's absence during his recovery created a big void in the Department. Rob returned to patrol duties in December.

A two-year program of department downsizing and restructuring has eliminated two positions, with reassignment of duties and responsibilities to remaining staff. On December 31st, the position of part-time detective was eliminated. For the past nine years Paul Bertolami has provided outstanding investigative excellence to our

Collaboration in emergency response Swanzey public safety staff worked together with Cheshire County agencies and Cheshire Fair management to draft a comprehensive plan for an emergency services response to the largest annual event in our community, the Cheshire Fair. During the Fair, collaborators gained valuable hands-on training while implementing the plan.

Airport disaster planning The Police Department is participating in review and update of the disaster plan for the Keene Dillant-Hopkins Airport and flight path areas. The airport has 50,000 takeoffs and landings yearly.

Serious and complex cases We continue to see effects of growing heroin use in Cheshire County. Now widespread, heroin use is at the root of many of our

most serious cases. Law enforcement shares the burden of this problem with families and crime victims.

Visible policing This year's reduced staffing has diminished the Department's ability to be a visible presence on town roads. In 2008, the last year the Department was fully staffed, there were 38% fewer accidents than in 2007, when the Department was understaffed. Investigated reportable accidents increased 35% in 2009.

Customer service We stand behind our core values of fairness, compassion and integrity. Officers attend professional development and advanced training programs to stay on the leading edge of law enforcement technology and concepts. As confirmed team players, we focus on working harmoniously with other town departments to improve the quality of life in Swanzey.

This year has been extremely productive for the Fire Department. We continue to improve the emergency services we provide to the community.

Training and certification To help responders safely and effectively meet the many challenges of Department work, we identified training as a top priority. Monthly fire, rescue and emergency medical training has yielded improved performance. This year five employees achieved Level I certification from the NH Fire Standards and Training Commission, and four employees completed Level II certification.

Emergency medical services Every two years, emergency medical technicians are required to complete a minimum of 24 hours of recertification training and 48 hours of continuing education. Each of the three levels of emergency medical certification (basic EMT, interme-

The Swanzey Fire Department is responsible for providing a professional response to the emergency needs of our community. The department's firefighters and emergency medical technicians are assigned to separate stations and ladder, engine and rescue companies. Each station is supervised by a station captain and three lieutenants who oversee personnel and

equipment to ensure readiness for all hazards requiring our response. The geographic orientation of the three stations provides a timely response to emergencies.

Our emergency response partners

Our emergency response partners include area mutual aid departments of Southwest Mutual Aid, Swanzey Police Department, DiLuzio Ambulance Service and the Swanzey Office of Emergency Management.

diate EMT, and paramedic) requires specific training to qualify personnel to practice emergency medical services in New Hampshire. Personnel also are required to take an extensive exam to be registered nationally as emergency medical services providers.

We are pleased to announce that this year the Fire Department obtained approval from the NH Bureau of Emergency Medical Service and Cheshire Medical Center to provide service at the Paramedic level. Currently the department has two Paramedics. In conjuction with DiLuzio Ambulance Service, we provide emergency medical services on a first responder basis.

Apparatus fleet management This year we worked with the Board of Selectmen to evaluate the Department's fleet, and developed a plan for each piece. Considerations included function, maintenance, safety and replacement cost. The age and condition of several pieces of apparatus led us to reduce the

overall number of vehicles owned and maintained by the town.

As part of the long range capital improvement plan, the Town ordered a new tanker. The tanker currently is under construction at M&W Fire Apparatus (Vinton, VA) and is due for delivery in June 2010. Built on a 2010 Mack Granite chassis, the tanker will have a 1250 gallons per minute pump and a 3000 gallon tank capacity. The new truck will replace the 1961 Mack now in service at the Center Station.

As part of the sale of the tanker, New England Fire Equipment and Apparatus (North Haven, CT), donated a pre-owned, 1978 100' Seagrave aerial truck to Swanzey. The aerial truck significantly improves the capability of firefighters, and improves safety for firefighters working at fire scenes. To accommodate the truck, we extended the rear of the West Fire Station with a modest addition. Town Public Works employees, firefighters, residents and Selectman Bruce Tatro, who donated

Under State law (RSA 227-L:17), a fire permit is required for all outside burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow. The NH Department of Environmental Services prohibits open burning of household waste.

Local forest fire wardens, fire departments, and the State of New Hampshire Division of Forests & Lands work collaboratively to reduce the risk and frequency of wildland fires in New Hampshire. Safe open burning requires diligence and responsibility. Help us to protect Swanzey's forest resources.

Emergency Management Department

This year, the Department has been busy with All Hazards Public Health Planning, in coordination with the Public Health Officer and other Cheshire County communities. We are setting up a Point of Dispensing site (known as a POD) in Swanzey to serve residents in the event of a major epidemic. Department staff participated in a table-top exercise at the Cheshire Medical Center with all the towns in the region. A time-consuming series of meetings has included a walk-through drill to test the plan.

Public flu vaccination clinics in early January 2010 gave the Department an opportunity to put training and drills to the test. We will continue to assist in 2010 with public H1N1 vaccination clinics around the region.

In 2010 we will be updating the town's Emergency Operations Plan, as well as the Radiological Plan by Swanzey Emergency Management and Homeland Security Emergency Management. Department staff also are participating in revision of the City of Keene Dillant-Hopkins Airport Emergency Plan.

Once again, this year started off with a bang, keeping the Department busy with winter maintenance. Only five storms required plowing in January, but small storms consumed 420 tons of road salt to keep roadways clear. Early March warming generated a true mud season on several gravel roads.

Culverts replaced, roads paved DPW staff replaced culverts on Carlton Road, Hackler Drive, West Shore Road and Christian Hill Road, and re-built catchbasins on North Winchester Street, Grove Street and Davis Avenue. The summer paving program included putting the final top coat on West Street and Webber Hill Road, shimming the rest of Carlton Road, and overlaying the old section of Woodland Heights. The new section of Woodland Heights and C L Lane received a top coat, paid for by the developer.

New signs The warning signs citizens may have noticed on several town roads are part of a Federal Highway Safety grant. The grant includes a study to see whether the accident rate goes down in the areas where new signs are installed.

Covered bridges, a source of pride Every year these symbols of a bygone era suffer at least minor damage from careless drivers. In 2009 several major accidents required extensive repairs to

the Cresson Bridge that involved both DPW divisions. Guard rails at the Slate Bridge were repainted.

<u>Dam inspections and repairs</u> Dams consumed much DPW staff time. These highly regulated structure require regular monitoring and maintenance, especially in years of wet weather.

Department staff spent several weeks clearing vegetation, and addressed many items required by the Dam Bureau. We will continue working down the list in 2010. Thanks to the whole DPW crew, longstanding damage to the lower gate at the Lower Wilson Pond dam finally has been repaired.

Cemeteries were opened on April 13th. Over the summer, Department staff rebuilt the roadway on the east side of Mt. Caesar Cemetery, as well as the back roadway in Mountain View Cemetery. Staff removed trees to prevent further damage to the Oak Hill Cemetery stone wall. The Department laid out a cremation section in Oak Hill Cemetery, and is developing a cremation section in the Westport Cemetery.

Numbers of full burials (23) and cremations (21) remained close to those of the past four years. Nine lots in Mountain View Cemetery were sold, as well as one lot in Oak Hill Cemetery.

Facility repairs and improvements Preparations for upgrading the Carpenter Home heating system included an energy audit, and construction of a utility room in the existing barn. Staff painted the Center fire station's concrete retaining walls, and began building a 10' x 30' addition on the West station for the new ladder truck. Landscaping work enhanced the Police Station and Town Hall.

By summer's end, structures at the South Road and Brown ball fields had been repaired, rebuilt, and painted, and the fields themselves had been repaired. Department employees are grateful to volunteers from the baseball association for their collaboration and hard work.

Swanzey Recycling Center 97 Pine Street 357-3808

It has been said that opportunities sometimes are sent cleverly disguised as problems. If this is true, we have had a year of great opportunity.

Recycling Center staff believe we have weathered the worst of the economic downturn in the recyclables market. Thanks to a combination of increasing storage capability, contract re-negotiation, moderate market recovery, and old-fashioned hustle, the Center's income in 2009 was over \$76,000 (\$40,518 from the sale of recyclables, and \$35,705 from drop-off fees). This is less than 2008, but more than we had anticipated.

For these reasons, and because Swanzey citizens reduced non-recyclable trash by fifty tons, the Recycling Cen-

Sewer Commission

The Sewer Commission dealt with a wide range of issues in 2009.

Leak traced and repaired Early in the year, records at the Route 32 pump station recorded an unexplained spike in flow pumped to the Keene plant. After an extensive investigation, we discovered that a test well drilled on Page Court had pierced a sewer main, allowing groundwater to infiltrate into the sewer collection system. The leak has been repaired, and the town has been reimbursed for repair costs.

Sewer extensions on Winchester Street and Route 12 have been constructed to accommodate the new Market Basket supermarket and the Page Homestead Senior Housing project. The extensions provide sewer connections to several parcels on Route 10 and multiple commercial lots on Route 12. The exensions have been accomplished at no cost to the town.

Ordinance update The sewer ordinance has been updated to comply with new state standards, and awaits approval from NH-DES.

System rebabilitation We have instituted a program to rehabilitate sewer manholes in the system. Some manholes date back to the early 1980s. This year's rehabilitation included manholes on Eaton Road, Perry Lane and Brown Field. We are continuing a systematic cleaning and inspecting of lines and manholes, currently in West Swanzey. As the North Swanzey system ages, the program will expand to include that area.

The Sewer Commission is responsible for operation of the West Swanzey sewer treatment plant and collection system, and the North Swanzey sewer collection system. These systems include two pump stations and approximately five miles of sewer lines in North Swanzey, and one pump station and approximately five miles of sewer lines in West Swanzey. The Commission maintains ensures that these systems are in compliance with State and Federal regulations. Sewer Commission employee Scott Self operates the West Swanzey treatment plant.

During 2009, all eleven zoning amendments proposed by the Planning Board were supported by town voters. The amendments included the adoption of an accessory dwelling unit ordinance, the expansion of the town's Industrial Park District, as well as various housekeeping items.

On-going zoning updates A planning workgroup focused on the land use along the northerly part of Route 10 has developed a conceptual master plan for the area. Concepts under consideration include development of an industrial park zone (similar to that along Route 32, where Carlisle Wide Plank Floors and Moore Nanotechnology Systems LLC are located). The group also has discussed a new district, tentatively called a Forest Conservation District. In coming months, the Planning Board will conduct public meetings to solicit ideas and opinions regarding these possible updates.

Steady and manageable growth Commercial and residential sectors of Swanzey continue to grow. At this time, the increased needs of development generally are being met through prudent planning, especially with respect to capital improvements. However, the Town will need to carefully monitor land uses and development during the upcoming years to meet the needs of the community.

The Planning Board's work is divided between reviewing proposals for development, such as subdivisions and site plans, and preparing recommendations for how best to use land in Swanzey These recommendations are formalized in the Town's zoning ordinance, subdivision regulations, and in the master plan.

Zoning Board of Adjustment

Swanzey's zoning ordinance was adopted by and is amended by the voters of the town. When zoning amendments are proposed, the Planning Board holds public hearings to solicit input. The ZBA encourages residents to take an active role in developing the regulations that affect each and every one of you.

The powers and actions of zoning boards are strictly controlled by New Hampshire law. For example, the criteria for granting variances is established by RSA 674:33,I(b). All towns must use those criteria. If an applicant meets all the criteria, the ZBA must grant the variance.

Town Planner Sara Carbonneau is available to answer questions regarding the ZBA or the Town's zoning ordinance. In addition, the NH Office of Energy and Planning (www.nh.gov/oep/) has on-line resources to help citizens understand the roles and responsibilities of zoning boards of adjustment.

The Zoning Board's work is to evaluate the requests of property owners who want to use their land in ways that deviate from Swanzey's zoning ordinance. Examples include requests for variances or special exceptions, appeals from administrative decisions and requests for equitable waivers from dimensional requirements.

Stewards of Mount Caesar Advisory Committee

The 230 acres surrounding the Carpenter Home were left to the Town by Lucy Carpenter, to be held in trust for the benefit of the Carpenter Home. The Reverend Ezra Carpenter of Hull, Massachusetts arrived in Swanzey in 1753. With the Reverend, his wife and eight children came a freed slave, Freeman Caesar. According to town legend, Caesar was buried on the Carpenter land. Over time the hill behind the Carpenter home came to be known as Mt. Caesar.

The land contains a network of popular hiking trials leading to the summit and a vista of central Swanzey and, in the distance, Swanzey Lake with its surrounding hills. An airport beacon at the summit is owned and maintained by the City of Keene.

Some uses, however, appeared to be damaging the trails. Ruts from ATVs have created the potential for significant erosion on some trails, as has trail widening to accommodate ATVs on trails formerly used only by pedestrians.

On April 28 the Committee held an informational meeting, inviting members of the public to share their ideas

various entry points onto the property. The signs prohibit use of all unauthorized motorized wheeled vehicles (snowmobiles are not excluded by the signs). With financial assistance from the Selectmen and the Swanzey Conservation Commission, and volunteer labor, members installed a gate behind the Carpenter Home to control access by motorized wheeled vehicles.

In August, Committee members submitted a report to the Board of Selectmen outlining the results of their inventory, assessment, and consideration of impacts of recreational uses. Recommendations included specific uses, locations for access management, techniques of enforcement, and other techniques to protect Mt. Caesar.

Our community treasures the Carpenter Home land and the peak of Mt. Caesar. Committee members highly recommend that most of the acreage be kept forever as a special, undeveloped place to enjoy and experience nature, now and for all future generations.



Recreational assets Committee members determined that recreational assets of the property include its central location (in close proximity to schools, a perfect outdoor classroom), historic stone walls (most in good condition), the summit vista, the presence of existing trails, and the property's potential for multiple use.

Richard and Barbara Pullen protected 149 acres surrounding their family home, located within over 4,000 acres of forestland in southwestern Swanzey. Protected land includes acres of wetlands, a large vernal pool, and approimately 2,200 feet of Indian Brook (a tributary of the Ashuelot River) as well as 25 acres of high-quality agricultural soils, and 55 acres of high-quality forest soils.

The Johnson family protected 93 acres of farmland and forestland in eastern Swanzey. Protected land includes a rare floodplain forest with frontage on the South Branch of the Ashuelot River, hay fields, and pasture once occupied by Abenacki Indians.

Easements celebrated The Keene State College Camp at Wilson Pond was the setting for the annual April festivities. Volunteers Tiffany Mannion and Michael Day designed, prepared and served a feast of local foods. Celebrated guests Richard and Barbara Pullen and Moore Nanotechnology Systems LLC executives Len Chaloux and Tom Dupell received the OSC's signature locally-woven gift baskets filled with Swanzey products.

Easements in process Robert and Lois Domina have initiated conservation of Tippin' Rock Farm and Hewes Hill Conservation Area. The land includes a hayfield, a popular hiking trail, sheer cliff faces and a small pond, well-managed forests, views of pristine hillsides and forests, and an enormous boulder that a child can rock. OSC members supported the Monadnock Conservancy's application to the State Land Conservation & Heritage Investment Program for financial assistance with

protecting this historic property. OSC members also have been in communication with representatives of the Nature Conservancy regarding protection of a rare habitat along the Ashuelot River.

Sharing what we've learned In January, members brought Swanzey's open space protection story to over 200 participants at the Monadnock Conservancy's regional Land Summit. The OSC slideshow, depicting treasured places and approaches to protection, closed the day's events. OSC members also were invited to speak to representatives from towns participating in the Monadnock Conservancy's Community Conservation Partnership, to the Friends of Open Space in Keene, and to present a workshop at Saving Special Places, the annual conference of the Society for the Protection of NH Forests.

<u>Swanzey Rural Character</u> Over a year in the making, Evan Barlow's film in celebration of Swanzey's people, places and traditions premiered in May to a

combined audience of 1,000 at Monadnock Regional High School. Generous donations from the Orton Family Foundation and local businesses made the premiere possible. *Swanzey Rural Character* has won awards from three national film festivals, and has been aired regularly on Cheshire TV.

Reading the forested landscape In April, college professor and author Tom Wessels donated over two hours of his expertise to members of the OSC and Conservation Commission. Hiking on land volunteered by a Swanzey property owner, Wessels led participants to discoveries including a rare oak-hickory savannah and a 200+ year-old black birch tree. Participants learned how to recognize land with a history of agricultural use and clues of the influence of the 1938 hurricane.

Branching out OSC members were active participants in a Planning Board workgroup established to examine zoning along the Route 10 corridor. The group's conclusions may lead to recommendations for protection of certain

Yale Forest properties and the establishment of an appropriate location for a future industrial park. When an OSC member approached the Board of Selectmen with concerns about degredation of public trails on Mount Caesar, Selectmen created the Stewards

of Mount Caesar Advisory Group to explore options. The group's simple solutions will help protect the trails from further deterioriation.

Taking advantage of knowledge gleaned from owners of conserved land, another OSC member has conducted groundbreaking research on the natural history of the rare wood turtle.

Buck and Ike With a little help from their OSC friends, Swanzey's ambassadors of open space protection championed their cause during a busy season of public events.

Buck and Ike

Buck and Ike, bovine ambassadors of open space protection, are the biggest rural characters in Swanzey. Since 2007, the six thousand-pound team of Simmental oxen has been working on behalf of the Open Space Committee. The oxen are owned by Swanzey farmer Mike Johnson, who makes them available for their community service. The team lives in oxen paradise on conserved land in central Swanzey. Loving friends of Buck and Ike contribute to the team's winter hay fund.

Annual birthday party Buck and Ikecelebrated their eleventh birthdays in May with a party at the Potash Bowl. Young friends brought best wishes, shared cake and lemonade, and received a reverse birthday present from the oxen.

The Old Homestead Buck and Ike consider their week at the Potash Bowl to be summer camp for oxen. Activities include frequent meals of hand-delivered hay, strolls around Swanzey Center, and rehearsals leading up to the three performances of the play. This year Buck and Ike added spa treatment to their camp experience: young actors discovered the team's fondness for endless grooming. Visits from friends make the week complete. Thundering applause at curtain call is a bonus.

Walk for Animals Buck and Ike visited with animal lovers at the annual Monadncock Humane Society event. The team led a parade of animals and their

people through the woods.

Old Home Day Buck and Ike were on hand to visit with friends throughout the day. Many happened to be holding cups of "Buck'n'Ike Delight" ice cream. Paul Thomas of Twinkletown supplied the Open Space Committee's Old Home Day booth with a seemingly endless supply of free ice cream, and donated a tub for a hay-fundraising raffle. Chelsea Kruse took up the ox goad for only the third time in her sixteen years to demonstrate how to drive oxen. Buck, who is sweet on Chelsea, purred as he complied with her capable commands. The team reviewed the Old Home Day parade, then fell in after the final entry to march back to their bachelor paddock at the Potash Bowl.

A celebration of life Buck and Ike spent the Fourth of July at the Swanzey Lake Camping Area to celebrate the life of their good friend Beth Basel. The oxen were honored to be present for the party, and were grateful for generous donations towards their winter hay.

A celebration of conservation Decked out in red burlap ribbons, Buck and Ike led the late September procession to the party that marked permanent protection of the Johnson Ridgehill Farm.

Old friends, and new Buck and Ike appreciated receiving correspondence from their Cutler School friends in Lynn Speckman's class. Lorraine S.

Merrill, NH Commissioner of Agriculture, Markets & Food, came to Swanzey to meet the team in person. Along with the Swanzey Lake Camping Area, Swanzey businesses including Gomarlo's Supermarket, 24 Carrots Farmstand, Cheshire Horse and Jeanne M. Thieme Fine Art found creative ways to keep their favorite oxen supplied with winter hay.

<u>Sad news</u> In December, veterinarians Steve Major and Debbie Stepp removed squamous cell tumors from Buck's eyes. Sadly, this condition is not unusual in white-faced breeds, and the tumors aggressively re-grew. We all have to help Swanzey children say goodbye to this gentle soul.

Understudies Now two years old, Star and Bright are halfway to physical maturity and the right to call themselves oxen. The red Milking Shorthorn working steers weigh close to a thousand pounds each, and are proud of their handsome horns. Mount Caesar Elementary students have met the team's namesakes in Farmer Boy, Laura Ingalls Wilder's story of her husband's childhood. (Every year, Bruce Barlow reads the book to third grade students of Pam Loney, Sue Glimenkas, and Mrs. Martin.) Under Kellie Gordon's tutelage, they also have been practicing wearing a saddle. Star and Bright plan to pull the hay wagon in The Old Homestead this summer, and look forward to making new friends.

Coordination with other committees. The SCC continues to work closely with the Swanzey Open Space Committee to help preserve special places in town. As often as possible, members attend meetings and hearings of the Planning Board, Zoning Board of Adjustment, and Board of Selectmen where environmental matters are involved. SCC members also serve on the SWRPC Natural Resources Ad-

visory Committee and Ashuelot River Local Advisory Committee.

Permits and projects Members reviewed proposals for development, in some cases walking the property. We strive to make reasonable recommendations to minimize environmental damage associated with development.

Investigations Members investigated several complaints of alleged environmental violations and, where appropriate, reported to town and state officials. Illegal dumping of trash, appliances, and tires along unpaved town roads continues to be a problem.

<u>Feel free to ask</u> We endeavor to answer environment-related questions and concerns throughout the year.



The Carpenter Home is licensed for up to sixteen residents, and has a staff of eleven. The Home is located on 230 acres near Swanzey Town Hall.

Al and Charlotte Chamberlain purchased and donated a seven-passenger van to the Home. Flora Chamberlain lived at the Carpenter Home for five years, passing away on October 9, 2008 at the age of ninety-eight.

Economic Development Advisory Committee

The Committee held its organizational meeting in October 2008.

Getting established Members spent the first half of 2009 collecting information about the status of local and regional economic development, considered possible impediments, and solicited opinions on Swanzey's attributes and deficits. Members met with representatives from Monadnock Economic Development Corporation, North Swanzey Water and Fire Precinct, Swanzey Sewer Commission, Swanzey Planning Board, Southwest Region Planning Commission, and Hannah Grimes Center, and received a report from the Open Space Committee.

Bridging tradition and change One of the Committee's first priorities has been to enhance the Swanzey web site and its presentation of information useful to businesses. With the Committee's support, a complete make-over of the Town web site now is underway. The new version will include a separate business page, containing items such as demographic data, infrastructure service areas, and information on town regulations and our tax increment finance district. Summaries of recent Planning Board and Zoning Board of Adjustment approvals will be available, as well as links to state agencies that support economic development.

Listing local businesses The Committee contracted with a consultant to produce a list of businesses in Swanzey. Members anticipate using the list to determine what kinds of support business owners desire, and how the Town can improve its climate for economic development.

Swanzey Revenue Development District Advisory Board

The Swanzey Revenue Development District Advisory Board continues to monitor development within the district. Activity within the district is necessary to provide financial support for continuing to extend Safford Drive and other district infrastructure eastward to Route 12. During the summer of 2009, work was completed on a water line extension along the east side of Route 32 (in partnership with the North Swanzey Water and Fire Precinct) to a point just south of Safford Drive.

Development creating additional increment to put toward the purposes of the district got an additional boost in 2009, in part due to construction of a 36,000 square foot facility for Moore

Nanotechnology Systems, LLC. With completion of this facility in December 2009, the business relocated from Keene to Swanzey. The attractive facility enhances the gateway of our district. The Warner Tool Company renovations of the former Cheshire Sign Shop (the old water power facility associated with the Wilson Pond Dam) add to the area's aesthetics.

Due to increment gains to date and using funds remaining from the Phase 1 bond issue, planning for the next phase of infrastructure work will be accelerated in 2010. As plans are developed, meetings will be held to keep the town and district property owners informed. Working with Selectmen, planners, Economic Development Advisory

Board members are appointed to three-year terms.

he volunteer Ashuelot River water quality monitoring program in conjunction with the Department of Environmental Services Volunteer River Assesment Program continued for its ninth season. Twelve sites were sampled along the Ashuelot River's 64-mile length from Washington to Hinsdale, and two sites along the South Branch. Samples were analyzed for temperature, pH, total phosphorus, dissolved oxygen, turbidity, chloride, and conductivity. This year Conservation Commissions along the river donated funding to support E. coli testing. A spring training program prepared members and community volunteers for five months of water sampling. An initial review of the data indicates that E. coli levels were lower than in previous years, with few spikes of elevated values. This data may reflect more consistent river levels due to the regularity of rainfall, diluting bacteria and keeping levels even. The pH values continue to decline in the headwaters, indicating a more acidic water column. Data can be viewed online at http://www. des.state.nh.us/wmb/VRAP/.



Review and comment on state permit applications to conduct work within the River corridor This year we submitted comments on projects proposed in Washington, Marlow, Surry, Keene, Swanzey, and Winchester. Projects re-

The Ashuelot River Local Advisory Committe was established in 1994, one year after the Ashuelot River was enrolled into the State Rivers Management and Protection Program. Members are nominated by local municipal officials and appointed by the Commissioner of the Department of Environmental Services. Educated in a broad array of issues associated with the River and its watershed, members serve as an intermediary between the interests and concerns of the citizens in the watershed and State authorities.

viewed included Alteration of Terrain, Wetland Dredge and Fill, and Shoreland, as well as review of disposal of state-owned lands. Committee members visited four sites. Members continued to follow NH legislation and rulemaking, commenting on the proposed stream crossing rules and supporting efforts to improve notification of permits to Local Advisory Committees.

Review of hydroelectric projects We reviewed an application for Low Impact Hydroelectric Institute certification on two of the lower Ashuelot dams, as well as a Federal Energy Regulatory Commission preliminary permit for hydroelectric development in Keene.

Dam removal and bridge replacement We continued participation as a member of the NH River Restoration Task Force, and continue to support removal of the Homestead dam, advocating for public access after construction. Concerns regarding the stability of the Thompson Covered Bridge are being addressed. We also continue to participate in discussion of plans for replacement of the Route 10 bridge near the Swanzey-Winchester line.

ARLAC Corridor Management Plan continues to gain support, and moves towards implementation. This year the Hinsdale Planning Board voted to accept the Ashuelot River Corridor Management Plan as part of their Master Plan. The Keene City Council voted final approval of the plan. With the assistance of the Southwest Region Planning Commission, Committee members began to set priorites for implementing the Plan:

- 1. Public education and outreach.
- 2. Water quality.
- 3. Protect, preserve and conserve flood plains riparian /wetland buffers /animal habitat.
- 4. Preservation of historical, archaeological and cultural features.
- 5. Promote public access.
- 6. Restoration of fish populations.

Annual River clean-up The Committee co-sponsored the annual cleanup of the Ashuelot River from north of Ashuelot Park to West Swanzey as part of the Source to the Sea cleanup. A total of 130 volunteers picked up 2,847 pounds of trash and 31 shopping carts during this October event.

This past year the Precinct boundaries were extended to include the Safford Drive industrial park and the senior housing at the Page property. Water mains were also extended to the Market Basket development on Route 10. The developers paid the majority of the expenses, including the addition of three hydrants, and four private hydrants.

The Precinct recently updated our contract with the City of Keene to purchase water with an interim agreement to be finalized in the next two years. In 2010 we hope to create a water ordinance and back flow prevention policy, as well as "as built" plans of the mains and service connections to comply with new State requirements.

We are diligently working to keep our costs down, while providing safe quality water. Maintenance of the mains, hydrants and valves continues with good relations and cooperation with town staff and Department of Public Works.

<u>Article 4.</u> The Precinct voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 3,000 to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for equipment.

Article 5. The Precinct voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 15,000 to be placed in an Expendable Trust pursuant to RSA 31:19-a to be used for the purchase of water meters, meter reading devices and their upgrades, and to appoint the Commissioners as agents to expend the fund.

Article 6. The Precinct voted to ratify the expansion of the Precinct boundaries in a southerly direction on New Hampshire State Route 12, in the area of Safford Drive and the Tax Increment Finance District, as approved by the Town of Swanzey Board of Selectmen March 25, 2009, taking effect for the Tax Year beginning April 1, 2009.

<u>Article 7.</u> There was a short discusion on general matters concerning the Precinct.

There being no further business to come before the Meeting, on a motion duly made and seconded, the Meeting adjourned at 7:27 p.m.

Minutes of Deliberative Session 2009 Warrant

ANNUAL REPORT

Town of Swanzey, State of New Hampshire

Forty-five registered voters from the Town of Swanzey, in the State of New Hampshire qualified to vote in Town affairs, met on Tuesday, February 3rd 2009 to hear the articles presented by the Board of Selectmen to appear on the official ballot.

Due to the absence of Moderator Gus Lerandeau, Assistant Moderator Patricia Haselton led the meeting in the discussions, explanations, and debate of each article. She called the meeting to order at 7:00 PM.

The meeting opened with Police Chief Richard Busick leading those assembled in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Assistant Moderator Haselton recognized Selectman Nancy Carlson who presented Swanzey resident Walter Calkins with a Proclamation naming him as Swanzey's Troubadour Laureate and adopting a song that Mr. Calkins had written as the Official Song of Swanzey.

Assistant Moderator Haselton then read the warrant as follows:

FIRST SESSION

You are hereby notified to meet for the First (Deliberative) Session of the annual Town Meeting, to be held at the Monadnock Regional High School/ Middle School Auditorium, Swanzey, NH on Tuesday, the third day of February 2009 at seven in the evening (7:00 p.m.). The First Deliberative Session will consist of explanation, discussion, debate of articles and will afford those voters who are present the opportunity to propose, debate and adopt amendments to each warrant article, except election of officers and those whose wording is prescribed by state law (Articles 1 and 9).

SECOND SESSION

You are also notified to meet for the Second Session of the annual Town Meeting on Tuesday, the tenth day of March 2009, at the Christian Life Fellowship Church, 211 Whitcomb Road, between the hours of 8 a.m. and 7 p.m. to vote by official ballot to elect town officers, to vote by official ballot on warrant articles as they may have been amended at the First Session and those other official ballot questions whose wording is prescribed by state law (Articles 1 and 9).

Article 1 To choose by ballot all necessary town officers including a Selectman, a Town Clerk, a Trustee of the Trust Funds, 2 Zoning Board of Adjustment members, 2 Planning Board members, a Library Trustee and a Sewer Commissioner.

Article 2 Shall the Town vote to raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant or as amended by vote of the first session, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling \$5,405,375? Should this article be defeated, the default budget shall be \$5,280,528, which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the town or by law; or the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only.

After a lengthy discussion, it was voted in favor of including this article on the official ballot in question form as written. Article 3 Shall the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$493,750 to be placed in the following expendable trust and capital reserve accounts of the Town:

It was voted in favor of including this article on the official ballot in question form as written.

Article 4 Shall the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to be placed in an expendable trust pursuant to RSA 31:19-a to be used for purchase of computer hardware, software, information management systems (IMS) and their upgrades for the Police Department, and to appoint Selectmen as agents to expend from the fund?

After a brief discussion on this article it was voted in favor of including this article on the official ballot in question form as written.

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Article 5 Shall the Town vote to modify the elderly exemptions from property tax based on assessed value for qualified taxpayers in the Town of Swanzey, provided by RSA 72:39, to be as follows:

For person 65 years of age up to 75 years: \$ 25,000

For person 75 years of age up to 80 years: \$35,000

For person 80 years of age or older: \$ 40,000

In addition to other requirements of RSA 72:39, to qualify, taxpayers must have a net income of not more than \$24,000 if single, or if married a combined net income of not more than \$32,000, and own assets not in excess of \$50,000, excluding the value of a person's residence?

It was voted in favor of including this article on the official ballot in question form as written.

Article 6 Shall the Town vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 36-A:4-a, I(b) to authorize the Conservation Commission to expend funds for contributions to 'qualified organizations' for the purchase of property interests, or facilitating transactions related thereto, where the property interest is to be held by the qualified organization and the Town will retain no interest in the property?

After several questions and explanation of this article, it was voted in favor of including this article on the official ballot in question form as written.

Article 7 Shall the Town vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 36-A:4-a,I(a) to authorize the Conservation Commission to expend funds to purchase interests in land outside the boundaries of our municipality, subject

to the approval of the local governing body?

It was voted in favor of including this article on the official ballot in question form as written.

Article 8 Shall the Town vote to approve the following resolution to be forwarded to our State Representatives, our State Senator and our Governor:

"Resolved: We the citizens of Swanzey, N.H. believe in a New Hampshire that is just and fair. The property tax has become unjust and unfair. State leaders who take a pledge for no new taxes perpetuate higher and higher property taxes. We call on our State Representatives, our State Senator and our Governor to reject the "Pledge", have an open discussion covering all options, and adopt a revenue system that is just and fair." (SUBMITTED BY PETITION)

Representative Jane Johnson explained this article and it was then voted in favor of including this article on the official ballot as written.

The following Article will be on the official ballot as prescribed by State Law.

Article 9 To vote by ballot on the following eleven (11) amendments to the Town of Swanzey Zoning Ordinance:

Amendment No. 1: Are you in favor of Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance:

Amend Section II.A. and X-A.A. to include as follows: Amend the zoning map of the Town of Swanzey dated September 1, 1947, as amended, to

show the portions of the properties currently shown as Tax Map 19, Lots 97, 97-2, 98, 99, 100, 101 and 102 that are currently located in the Business District as being in the Industrial Park District and amend the description of the Industrial Park District to include the same.

Amendment No. 2: Are you in favor of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance:

Amend Section II.A. and X-A.A. to include as follows: Amend the zoning map of the Town of Swanzey dated September 1, 1947, as amended, to show the portion of the property currently shown as Tax Map 19, Lot 97-5 that is currently located in the Residence District as being in the Industrial Park District and amend the description of the Industrial Park District to include the same.

Amendment No. 3: Are you in favor of Amendment No. 3 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance:

Amend Section V.B.1. (uses permitted in the Business District) to include the following:

Function halls and add the following definition to Section XIII (Definitions)

"Function Hall: A building or part thereof used primarily for conducting activities such as suppers, banquets, receptions, meetings and other functions attended by large groups of people for a single event. Function halls may or may not include kitchen facilities."

B. TOWN OF SWANZEY SHORE-LAND PROTECTION DISTRICT includes all those lands defined as "Protected shoreland" in RSA 483-B, XV and as may be amended and any related administrative rules or regulations. As of July 1, 2008 the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services "Consolidated List of Water Bodies Subject to RSA 483-B, the Comprehensive Shoreland Protection Act" included the following:

4th order streams & designated rivers: Ashuelot River – Designated Segment; Ashuelot River – 4th Order; South Branch Ashuelot River; Ash Swamp Brook; Martin Brook; Lakes & Ponds:
Ashuelot River Dam;
California Brook;
Swanzey Lake;
Upper Wilson Pond; and
Wilson Pond.

C. PRIMARY BUILDING LINE/ SETBACK: No primary structure as defined by RSA 483-B, shall be built, placed or erected within one hundred twenty-five feet from the reference line as defined by RSA 483-B:4,XVII as may be amended."

And delete existing Section II.A.6. and replace with:

"6. Shoreland Protection District. The Shoreland Protection District is hereby established as an overlay district which is superimposed over the conventional existing zoning. The uses permitted in the underlying districts shall be allowed only if they meet the minimum standards promulgated by the State of New Hampshire Comprehensive Shoreland Protection Act, RSA 483-B (as amended). Pursuant to authority granted by RSA 674:14, this Shoreland Protection District is adopted by the Town of Swanzey to further protect the public waters of the Town.

Amendment No. 6: Are you in favor of Amendment No. 6 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance:

Delete Section III.P. in its entirety.

Amend Section III. to include new section III.AA. Accessory Dwelling Unit

"III.AA. ACCESSORY DWELL-ING UNIT ORDINANCE

Purpose

For the purpose of providing expanded housing opportunities and flexibility in household arrangements to accommodate family members or non-related people of a permitted, owner occupied, one family dwelling, while maintaining aesthetics and residential use compatible with homes in the neighborhood. Accessory Dwelling Units (ADU) shall be permitted by Special Exception granted by the Zoning Board of Adjustment in the Residence, Rural/Agricultural, and Village Business Districts.

Requirements/Limitations

- 1. ADUs shall be secondary and accessory to a one family dwelling unit.
- 2. In granting a Special Exception, the Board of Adjustment must find that the ADU is developed in a manner which does not alter the character or appearance of the principal dwelling unit as a one family residence.
- 3. Only one ADU shall be allowed per lot
- 4. An ADU shall only be permitted in a principal dwelling unit in which the owner of record of the dwelling personally resides: except for bona fide temporary absences.

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- 5. Any necessary additional entrances or exits shall be located to the side or rear of the building whenever possible.
 6. Attached ADUs shall be designed to allow for possible reincorporating into the principal dwelling unit.
- 7. At least one (1) common, interior access between the principal dwelling structure and the ADU shall be maintained. A second means of egress from the ADU shall be provided.
- 8. The gross living area of an ADU shall not be less than 300 square feet or be greater than 25% of the total floor area of the principal dwelling and ADU.
- 9. A building permit for an ADU must be approved and issued prior to its construction. An ADU shall have an interconnected fire alarm system and shall meet all life safety and building codes.
- 10. Adequate off-street parking shall be provided to serve the combined needs of the principal dwelling unit and the ADU, minimum three (3) parking spaces to serve both the one family dwelling and the ADU.
- 11. Adequate provision must exist or be made for motor vehicle ingress or egress and turning of vehicles within the site.
- 12. The existing or proposed septic system must be certified by a licensed septic designer or engineer as adequate to support the ADU and principal dwelling unit in accordance with New Hampshire RSA 485-A:38.

Accessory Dwelling Unit Certificate of Occupancy

If a property containing an approved ADU is conveyed and the new owner wishes to maintain the accessory unit, the new owner shall apply for a Certificate of Occupancy for the ADU. The purpose of this section is to ensure that one of the two dwelling units is owner-occupied.

Procedural Requirements

An application for Special Exception approval under the auspices of this Section shall require that all plans submitted with any application for an ADU building permit denote, describe and/or identify the intended ADU area within the principal dwelling unit as such.

Amendment No. 10: Are you in favor of Amendment No. 10 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance:

Delete Section XI.B. Non-conforming Building/Non-conforming Structure in its entirety and replace with the following:

- "B. Non-conforming Building/Non-conforming Structure: A non-conforming building or non-conforming structure may be continued indefinitely and may be repaired or remodeled subject to the following limitations:
- 1. Restoration, reconstruction, alteration and/or replacement of non-conforming buildings/structures are allowed, provided that the cubic contents and the footprint of the original building/structure stays the same or smaller; any nonconforming buildings/structures that have been destroyed in whole or in part by fire, by other natural disaster, or by voluntary demolition may be replaced within one year of the damage or demolition in the same or smaller footprint and with the same or smaller cubic contents.
- 2. The relocation on a lot of a structure that does not comply with the setback provisions is allowed provided the new location complies with the setback provisions.

Amendment No. 11: Are you in favor of Amendment No. 11 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning

Ordinance:

Amend Section III.U.6. Home Occupations to read as follows:

"6. Home Occupations may occur within the dwelling unit and/or within an accessory structure subject to the condition that the home occupation does not result in the use of any area greater than 300 square feet."

Article 10 To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting, or take any action thereon.

As there was no other business to come before the meeting, Assistant Moderator Haselton adjourned the meeting at 8:30 PM.




