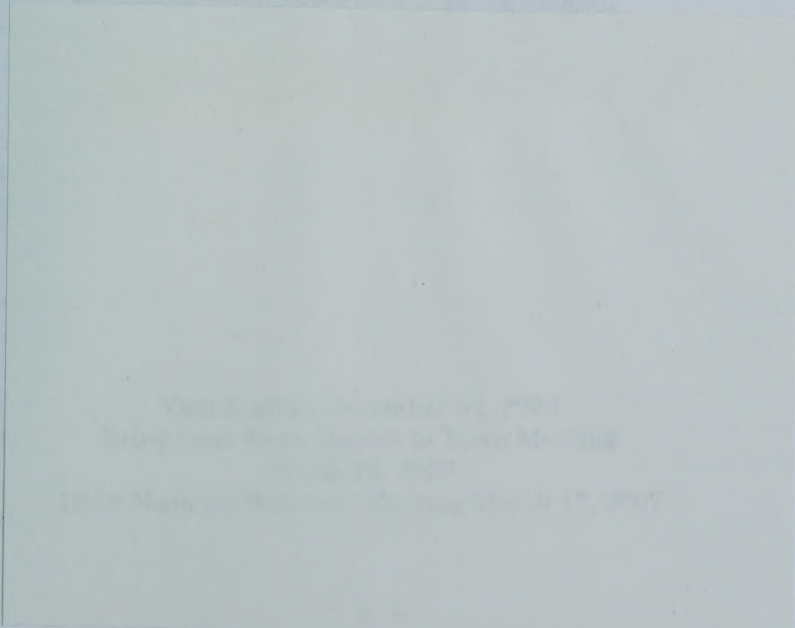

SELECTMEN'S REPORT TOWN OF UNITY 2006

As is always the case, the Board of Selectmen had a busy year. Again it was a year of many changes and many items we continue to get a handle on. The October '05 floods continued to occupy much of the Boards time along with the impending closure of our landfill. We sought and were unable to hire a Public Works Director to assist the Selectmen with the piles of paperwork involved in any sizable project. With the continued growth in regulations our part-time Board is getting stretched beyond our available hours to juggle all that the Town is finding need for.

New Faces as Town Employees and Officials:

- The Highway Department has two new employees; Dave Burden and Paul Thomas.
- The Selectmen's Office welcomed Laura Ryan, Unity native, as our Secretary and Joy Meadows of Unity as our Bookkeeper.
- Jason LeMere joined the Board of Selectmen bringing his knowledge of Unity and his skills in small town highway maintenance.
- The Conservation Commission grew to a seven member board bringing in first time political activities from Unity residents; John Bott and Gail Moeller.

Equipment of Note:

- A new bobcat was purchased for the Landfill/Recycling Center and will be able to be used by the Cemetery and Highway Departments.
- The Town purchased a "new" used dump truck for the Highway Department.

Major Projects Begun:

- **Twin Bridge Replacement** - The Board of Selectmen worked with John Byatt of CLD Engineers to run Hydrology studies to best determine what the Town would need at the site washed away by the October 05 floods. The results of the study revealed that the Town would need a full bridge to meet the possible amounts of water there. During the design and test stage, the Selectmen continued to work with the State of New Hampshire Department of Transportation Bridge Division, The State Department of Emergency Management, operating now under the Federal Department of Homeland Security and the Boston Division of FEMA to guarantee the Town could afford to rebuild. Coordinating between all these agencies proved difficult and we were fortunate to have received assistance from our State Senator, Bob Odell, to facilitate our meeting. A local bank has offered the Town an attractive loan package to meet the total projected costs of \$1,200,000 and the ultimate cost to the Town after all available monies come in will be \$125,000 plus the interest on the loans required to complete this project.
- **Landfill/Recycling Center Closure and New Facility** - The Board spent many hours working with local contractors and David Lewis of CLD, the Town engineers, to plan for the closure of our current landfill. As part of the testing that

was done, it was determined that the footprint of the landfill was larger than the Board originally believed and this dramatically changed the final plans. The slope covering the landfill will need to cover a larger area and effectively remove the remaining area originally intended to be utilized as our transfer/recycling space. With this knowledge the Board set about designing and planning a new facility on the neighboring property already owned by the Town. Bids and information were sought for environmental impacts, regulations, soil and slope requirements, costs for choice of buildings, electrical service, infrastructure internally required for trucking and containers, plus the additional costs associated with hauling our household waste, demolition debris and bulky waste, such as furniture. Estimated costs for the new facility, before calculating the upgrading of LeMere Road, were \$250,000.

After extensive research into the probable costs and paperwork associated with these projects the Board came to the realization, we were unable to adequately address two major projects in one year. This simple fact caused this Board to hold off for 2007 the landfill closure and opening of a new facility at the same time we were working toward a replacement bridge, forced by the time line attached to the Federal FEMA funds the Town needs. The Board believes the assistance of a committee for the Town's future Recycling and Waste will ultimately result in a better project than if the Board had continued to attempt doing the work alone.

Looking forward 2007:

The Board of Selectmen believes that 2007 should be the year that all remaining damages of the October 2005 flood should be completed. The damage that was done to our Town was substantial and most of the emergency work completed in a timely manner for the safety of Unity residents. But there are still many areas that need attention. The slope failure on Cold Pond Road, the two separate culverts on Copeland Brook Road are in need of final attention to bring the repairs up to State Department of Environmental Services and the Twin Bridges replacement. FEMA ultimately provided the Town approximately \$600,000 in aid for our damages. The initial emergency monies were approximately \$250,000 and the Bridge portion between the State OEM and FEMA will be approximately \$350,000.

Selectmen hold "open to the public" meeting every Monday at 4 pm and we hope you will join us some times during the year to watch your local government at work.

**TOWN OF UNITY
STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE
2007**

To the inhabitants of the Town of Unity in the County of Sullivan in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall on Tuesday, the 13th of March, 2007 at 10:00 in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year. The business meeting will reconvene at 12:00 Noon, March 17th at the Town Hall for the continuation of business. Motion to continue the meeting.

Article 2. To receive reports of Town Officers and take action thereon.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200,000 for the construction of a bridge on Stage Road formerly known as "Twin Bridges" and to authorize the issuance of not more than \$1,075,000 of bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA 33) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon and the balance of up to \$125,000 to come from the newly created Bridge Capital Reserve Fund created for this purpose. The amount of \$1,075,000 will be used to pay off the bond or note, if funds are received from Federal or State monies.

(This requires a 2/3 Ballot Vote. Polls to remain open for one hour)

SELECTMEN RECOMMEND A YES VOTE

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to dissolve the Capital Reserve Fund for Stage Road Bridge # 035/074 and said funds to be placed in the Town's General Fund.
SELECTMEN RECOMMEND A YES VOTE.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to create a new Bridge Capital Reserve Fund, and to raise and appropriate up to \$125,000 from Surplus to be placed in this fund. And furthermore to name the Selectmen as agents to expend this Fund. This amount represents the amount removed from the Stage Road Bridge # 035/074. This fund to be used on any bridge as becomes necessary.

SELECTMEN RECOMMEND A YES VOTE.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a long term Lease/Purchase agreement for a 2007 Tradition 1800 Gallon Tanker in the amount of One hundred and eighty thousand, eight hundred and forty dollars (\$180,840) payable over a term of seventy-two months (72) at a rate of eighteen thousand, eight hundred and seventy-three dollars (\$18,873) per year; to raise and appropriate the sum of \$81,000 for a down payment, with said funds to come from the Fire Department Emergency Vehicle Fund; and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$18,873 for the first year's lease payment of said tanker. (2/3 ballot vote required)

SELECTMEN RECOMMEND A YES VOTE.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50,000 to pay for the State of New Hampshire rental on the Bailey Bridge used on Neal Mine Road and to repair the Neal Mine Road Bridge.

SELECTMEN RECOMMEND A YES VOTE.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 to be added to the Capital Reserve Cemetery Land Trust already established.

SELECTMEN RECOMMEND A YES VOTE.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000 to be added to the Highway Vehicle Capital Reserve Fund already established.

SELECTMEN RECOMMEND A YES VOTE.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 to be added to the Revaluation Capital Reserve Fund already established.

SELECTMEN RECOMMEND A YES VOTE.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 to be added to the Insurance Casualty General Trust Fund, already established.

SELECTMEN RECOMMEND A YES VOTE.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50,000 for the purpose of repairing the slope and pavement damage on Cold Pond Road, and completion of culverts on Copeland Brook Road to meet NH DES Standards. All damages were caused by October 2005 Flooding.

SELECTMEN RECOMMEND A YES VOTE.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$48,000 to pay current expenses which are due for flood damage reimbursement, which were not reimbursed by State or Federal agencies.

SELECTMEN RECOMMEND A YES VOTE.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$95,000 to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund already established for North Shore Paving.

SELECTMEN RECOMMEND A NO VOTE.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$85,236.56 for the purpose of Capital Outlay Road Construction. This is offset by Highway Subsidy Funds.

SELECTMEN RECOMMEND A YES VOTE.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund already established for Landfill Equipment.

SELECTMEN RECOMMEND A YES VOTE.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 to be added to the Expendable Trust Fund already established for continued restoration of Vital Records and name the Selectmen agents to expend the fund.

SELECTMEN RECOMMEND A YES VOTE.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3500 to be added to the Town Hall Expendable Maintenance General Trust Fund already established for the purpose of long range repairs and maintenance to the old Town Hall.

SELECTMEN RECOMMEND A YES VOTE.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 to be added to the Well Monitoring Expendable Trust Fund already established and name the Selectmen agents to expend the fund.

SELECTMEN RECOMMEND A YES VOTE

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise the salary of the Trustees of the Trust Funds from \$50 each year to \$250 for the Chair, and \$100 each for the other trustees.

SELECTMEN RECOMMEND A YES VOTE.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums as stated in the **Posted Budget (MS6)** in the following categories for a total of \$1,188,351.

SELECTMEN RECOMMEND A YES VOTE.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts of personal property other than money, which may be offered to the Town for any public purpose.

SELECTMEN RECOMMEND A YES VOTE.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen the authority to issue Tax Anticipation Notes. **SELECTMEN RECOMMEND A YES VOTE**

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote for a resolution to authorize the Selectmen to form a committee of five community members to work with the Selectmen seeking funds and an economic solution toward the creation of a new Recycling/Transfer Facility.
SELECTMEN RECOMMEND A YES VOTE.

Article 26. To see if the Town will go on record in support of effective actions by the president and Congress to address the issue of climate change which is increasingly harmful to the environment and economy of New Hampshire and to the future well being of the people of Unity.
These actions include:

1. Establishment of a national program requiring reductions of U.S. greenhouse gas emissions while protecting the U.S. economy.
2. Creation of a major national research initiative to foster rapid development of sustainable energy technologies thereby stimulating new jobs and investment.

In addition, the Town of Unity encourages New Hampshire citizens to work for emission reductions within their community, and we ask our Selectman to consider the appointment of a voluntary energy committee to recommend local steps to save energy and reduce emissions.

The record of the vote on this article shall be transmitted to the New Hampshire Congressional Delegation, to the President of the United States, and to declared candidates for those offices. Article by Petition.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to deposit 50 percent of the revenues collected pursuant to RSA 79-A (the land use change tax) in the conservation fund in accordance with RSA 36-A:5 III as authorized by RSA 79-a:25 II. Article by petition.

Article 28. To transact any other business as may come before said meeting.



People researching genealogy please contact the office in advance to determine if you need an appointment.


Motor vehicles 15 years old and newer require a title. Vehicles older than 15 years you need a bill of sale and registration from previous owner or TDMV 19A form.

Tax Collector's Report

Brandy Osgood has accepted the position of Deputy Tax Collector. She worked as the deputy before; she is getting back into the swing of things. It takes months of training until a person has the background, they can apply to the job.

Each year new laws are passed which amend current sections in the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated (RSA's), insert new sections, reenact sections or repeal sections. The printed and online versions of the RSA's do not immediately reflect these changes. The LSA identifies all changes made to the statutes during specific legislative sessions. RSA's (revised statutes annotated) under taxation are the statutes the tax collector must follow.

There have been questions about accepting prepayments for taxes. This is the RSA on prepayments and the process to accept this procedure.

80:1-a Prepayment of Resident Tax. – Any town or city may authorize prepayment of the resident tax, and acceptance of the prepayment. In a town, the decision shall be by vote at a town meeting under a proper article in the warrant. In a city, the decision shall be by vote of the governing body. If authorized, any person liable for resident tax may pay the tax at any time from April 1 until he receives notice of the assessed resident tax. The collector shall receive the payment, issue a receipt, and credit the amount paid toward the resident tax later assessed for the year. Each month, the tax collector shall submit a list of all prepayments received to the assessing officials. Once adopted, authority to make and receive prepayments shall continue until rescinded by the same method used for adoption.



In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements of Town of Unity as of and for the year ended December 31, 2006, in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, we considered the Town's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) as a basis for designing our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing opinions on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Town's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of Town of Unity's internal control.

A *control deficiency* exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent or detect misstatements on a timely basis. A *significant deficiency* is a control deficiency, or combination of control deficiencies, that adversely affects the entity's ability to initiate, authorize, record, process, or report financial data reliably in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles such that there is more than a remote likelihood that a misstatement of the entity's financial statements that is more than inconsequential will not be prevented or detected by the entity's internal control. A *material weakness* is a significant deficiency, or combination of significant deficiencies, that results in more than a remote likelihood that a material misstatement of the financial statements will not be prevented or detected by the entity's internal control. Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph and would not necessarily identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be significant deficiencies or material weaknesses.

In connection with our consideration of Town of Unity's internal control as described above, we are pleased to report that we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we considered to be material weaknesses, as defined above. Areas of opportunity for further consideration include:

- **Continued development of internal systems and training of personnel** ~ As with many small communities experiencing development and greater demands on informational resources, we encourage the community to continue developing its accounting resources. In light of changing accounting standards, it is essential that personnel have good analytical skills and be adaptive to changing situations. As always, we are happy to support that process and to provide accounting expertise as needed throughout the year.

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen
Town of Unity, New Hampshire

The Sullivan County Sheriff's Office has completed its third full year as the law enforcement agency for the Town of Unity.

Deputies that provide service to Unity are: Officer in Charge, Captain Denis J. O'Sullivan, III; Deputy Michael Batista; Deputy Justin Merrill; Deputy Donald Fontaine and Deputy William "Chip" Ball. All deputies working in the town are/were full time police officers, possessing years of experience.

Sullivan County deputies have provided more than thirty (30) hours per week patrolling the town and answering various calls. The dispatch center, Charlestown Police Department, received a total of 788 calls for service. Out of 788 calls, the Sullivan County Sheriff's Office handled 671 calls, with the remainder being handled by New Hampshire State Police.

The types of calls handled include alarms, criminal mischief, theft from vehicles, OHRV complaints, burglary investigations, motor vehicle accidents and animal complaints. The Sullivan County Sheriff's Office has also provided the service of house checks to many residents of Unity. We have also provided assistance to the Unity Fire Department and ambulance service.

During the summer of 2006, the Sullivan County Sheriff's Office applied for and was awarded an ATV grant through New Hampshire Fish and Game. This grant allows specially trained deputies to patrol OHRV trails in Sullivan County, to include the Town of Unity.

The deputies and I have enjoyed a good working relationship with the Board of Selectmen, the Fire Chief and other town officials, and we are grateful for their assistance. We are pleased to have the opportunity to serve the citizens of the Town of Unity, and we hope they are pleased with the job we are providing.

The fire department still relies on fund raising and donations for nearly all of our new equipment. I would like to thank each and every person who has contributed to the department. I assure you that your contributions are being put to good use in acquiring and maintaining valuable and costly equipment necessary to provide quality emergency protection to our community.

In 2006 we were able to add some very useful equipment to inventory. We now have a thermal imaging camera. This is a valuable tool used in the search for lost or missing people. It will also assist us in our search for fire extension while we are extinguishing fires. We also purchased some gas detection equipment that will assist in providing added safety to our citizens and our firefighters and rescue responders during emergencies.

The Unity Volunteer Fire Department is in need of new members. The number of members we have who can respond to daytime calls decreases each year. The department will provide training and personal protective clothing to eligible applicants. If you are interested and have the time, please apply at the station. We meet every Wednesday evening at 7:00 p.m. and on the second Monday of each month at 7:00 p.m.

As always, I would like to thank the members of Unity Fire for their continued support and service to the Town of Unity. Your time and contributions are priceless.

**UNITY PLANNING BOARD
2006 ANNUAL REPORT**

In the year 2006, the Planning Board approved 6 applications for minor subdivision, 2 lot line adjustments, 8 driveway permits and 1 Permit to Excavate. The Planning Board continued to work with the Upper Valley Lake Sunapee Regional Planning Commission and attended area wide meetings on regional issues in order to anticipate and meet ongoing changes and challenges to our community.

As Unity has many areas of shallow soiled steep slopes, and as storm water run-off and frequency of flooding has increased, the Planning Board began implementing Steep Slope Regulation for Site Plans and Subdivisions to protect our residences and our roads from destructive water run-off due to new development.

Last year just one older poorly designed driveway cost the Town more than \$10,000 in road repair. Our remaining undeveloped land is often uphill, current Unity residents are at risk if there is future unregulated construction. Some possible problems resulting from excavation, deforestation, and ensuing run-off range from contamination of wells, flooding of septic systems and leach field failure with potential illness resulting, to basement and other structural damage and road failure which could result in injury as well as heavy financial burdens.

The Planning Board, with the safety and well being of residents in mind and to implement the results of your Town Survey, is working in conjunction with the Conservation Commission to determine a Steep Slope Conservation District which will help maintain our open spaces, recreational and wildlife areas, and protect our homes from easily avoidable steep slope storm water run-off problems.

All meetings of the Planning Board are open to the public, your participation is welcome.

UNITY CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT FOR 2006

The Unity Conservation Commission underwent some changes in '06. We went from a 5-member to a 7-member board. At present: Bardy Flanders, chairman; Ernie Bridge, vice chairman; Jenny Wright, secretary; Stan Rastallis. New members are Randy Bragdon, John Bott and Gail Moeller. We appreciate Ethel Jarvis' many years of service and were sorry to see her go.

This year has seen progress on our long-term project to acquire for the Town an easement on the 280 acre county-owned Judkins Lot. More work is still necessary to raise from private sources the funds for the value of the easement and for the costs of monitoring the easement.

As always the Conservation Commission was presented with various proposals that might impact wetlands: driveway permits, road work, trails work, shore land activities on Crescent Lake, etc. We are asked to review these, also we are sometimes notified of possible wetland violations. Conservation Commissions are advisory, not regulatory. If we find a problem, we notify the N.H. Department of Environmental Services.

We continue to monitor the water quality in Crescent Lake, sharing the cost with Acworth for 3 or 4 tests a year. The weed-watching program continues with support from Acworth, Unity, the Crescent Lake Association and grants from the State of N.H. The public acres is manned 40 hours a week all summer, offering information to all boaters arriving at the lake. Divers are also hired to inspect the lake, which has remained free of invasive exotic water plants.

We are working toward providing a National Resource Inventory which would help the Town plan for appropriate development and prioritize and conservation of Unity's national resources.

At present the Town holds easements on 3 properties: 42 acres in Quaker City, 2 acres around Marshall Pond and 18 acres on Coon Brook Road.

CRESCENT LAKE ASSOCIATION MILFOIL COMMITTEE

The 2006 Lake Host Program at the Crescent Lake boat ramp started on Memorial Day weekend and ended on Labor Day, for a total of 87 days. As in the past, we had staff on duty 10 hrs/day on week days and 12 hr/day on weekends.

A total of 480 boats were inspected, with no invasive species found. Statewide, 54 boats/trailers were found to be carrying an exotic weed. No new lake has become infested since the Milfoil Prevention Program was started by the state.

This year the cost to run our local program was \$9,990, plus 129 volunteer hours, and was made possible by the following contributions:

\$3,000 grant from Department of Environmental Services

\$2,000 from the Town of Acworth

\$1,000 from the Town of Unity

The remainder of funds came from dues paid to the Crescent Lake Association by its members.

The Crescent Lake Association Milfoil Committee would like to thank the Town of Unity for its continued support of this vital project.

RECYCLING CENTER REPORT

In the year 2006 the Town of Unity again achieved impressive results in recycling.

We made 53 bales of cardboard, 44 bales of mixed paper, 11 bales of #2 plastic, 11 bales of # 1 plastic, 12 bales of aluminum cans, and 23 bales of tin cans, for a total estimated weight of over 67 tons. This does not include the glass that is collected and used for fill, the scrap metal that is hauled by a private hauler, the approximately 200 bags of clothes collected for re-use, or the countless useful things residents find in our "put and take" area.

In 2006 our recycling efforts generated nearly \$10,000 in revenue, including \$1720.20 from redeemable bottles alone.

It is important not to lose sight of the environmental benefits of recycling. The 49 tons of paper and cardboard we recycled saved over 800 trees. The 5 tons of plastic we recycled conserved 7,500 gallons of gasoline. The steel cans we recycled conserved enough energy to light a 60 watt light bulb for 279,942 hours. And the aluminum cans we recycled conserved enough energy to run a TV for 285,946 hours.

In April we received a grant through the Antioch New England Institute to purchase another storage container so that we could implement recycling of TVs, VCRs, computers, etc. This program is coordinated by the Northeast Resource Recovery Association (NRRRA). All computers and other items are disassembled for recycling in this country.

As we look to the future the Town of Unity is at a crossroads as to how we manage recycling and solid waste. Our landfill will be closing in 2008. We will not have enough space at the current location to continue our operation there.

The proposal to build a new facility off Lemere Road (just beyond the present landfill) will be before the voters at Town Meeting next year. This will of course require a significant initial expense but in the long run it is the cheapest and best option for managing solid waste and will enable us to increase our recycling rate above the already impressive 33%. With the recycling rate for Sullivan County as a whole at only 13%, we can be especially proud of our efforts and accomplishments.

We appreciate your continued support and look forward to seeing you soon at the Recycling Center.

We are grateful for this appropriation that enabled us to provide \$21,985 of free or reduced cost mental and behavioral health services to residents of Unity who are uninsured or underinsured. We are committed to making quality mental health services available regardless of ability to pay to all communities in our service area, and are asking the cities and towns we serve to help us sustain that commitment to many of our most vulnerable neighbors. In order to achieve this goal we are requesting a FY 2007 appropriation of \$742.


West Central Behavioral Health is the NH designated Community Mental Health Center for Unity, as well as Sullivan and Southern Grafton Counties. Our mission is: "to promote, preserve, and strengthen the mental health and quality of life for individuals and their communities through the delivery of integrated, comprehensive services." Our consumers suffer from a range of disorders and illnesses: life threatening severe, chronic mental illness such as psychosis, schizophrenia, and bipolar disorder; all forms of addiction; as well as anxiety, depression, divorce or relationship related stress, and other impairing, but highly treatable, conditions. We work with all ages in outpatient clinics, homes, nursing homes, schools, and residential supported living programs, offering a broad variety of counseling, psychiatric services, case management, and emergency consultations.

Some of the services provided to residents of Unity this year include:

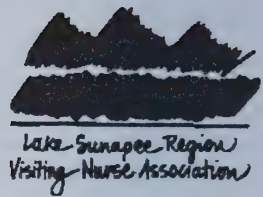
- 4 Children and their families received 165 therapy sessions at our outpatient clinics in Newport, Lebanon, and Claremont.
- 102 Adult residents received 304 sessions of outpatient counseling for depression, anxiety, addictions, family issues, and other critical issues.
- 6 Residents contacted our Emergency Services, available 24 hours, 7 days a week.
- 9 Residents received 607 sessions of other services such as case management, medication management, child respite, and vocational supports.

We hope you will help us provide quality mental health care to all who need it.

When you speak to patients' families, no matter what the age, the desire to have the family unit together with the support of community friends and neighbors is key to their sense of well-being. The number one need/concern of seniors according to a 2003 AARP study is how to live in their own home and their own community for as long as possible. Eighty-three percent want to stay in their existing home as long as possible and recognize that they may need to make some changes in order to do so.

The population in New Hampshire is expected to grow 29% between now and 2020. The NH population 65 years and over will grow 177% from 163,615 to 332, 178 during that time. Friends and family members provide eighty percent of all long term care at home.

All of these changes will have substantial impact on our community in terms of needed social and economic resources. A vital community depends on a variety of resources to meet the needs of its residents. Town leadership depends on the quality and commitment of community-based organizations to support physical, emotional, social and financial "health" in the town.

The Lake Sunapee Region VNA volunteer Board of Trustees and staff plans for the future using information gathered from all of you in the community. As we look to that future, we are grateful for the support of our member towns, businesses, service organizations and individuals who value our work and our mission. Our planning focuses on achieving operating efficiencies, expanding revenues sources, and collaborating with local and regional organizations to implement programs and services that will support town residents; in short, to help strengthen the rich tapestry of services and support that makes your community special to you.

More than 75 residents of Unity utilized home care services and programs through Lake Sunapee Region VNA during the past year. Two hundred home care visits were provided. Five residents and their families received 251 days of hospice, volunteer support and bereavement care. Long-term care and personal care support services helped 3 patients remain at home. Lifeline and home telemedicine services monitored 15 residents during the year to keep them safe at home. More than 49 residents used our many community health services including support groups for adults and children, foot care, blood pressure and immunization clinics. Thank you for the opportunity to care for residents of the Unity community. We renew our commitment to you to provide the quality home health and hospice services you expect with the caring, respect and compassion you deserve.

On behalf of Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) of New Hampshire, I respectfully submit this request for your municipal consideration. Your support will allow us to better serve the abused and neglected children in your own area.

CASA of NH is a statewide, private non-profit organization created to provide advocacy for the state's abused and neglected children. Our organization recruits, trains and supervises volunteers from communities throughout the state who are, then, appointed to cases by New Hampshire's District and Family Court Judges. Under NH state law, children who come to the attention of the courts as a result of abuse or neglect are required to have a guardian ad litem (GAL) appointed to represent their *best interests*. Historically, attorneys have filled the role of guardian ad litem in these cases at a significant cost to our state and with large caseloads. Unfortunately, this limits the time these individuals can spend on any one case or with any one child. For the past 18 years, CASA volunteers have effectively served in this capacity and have become a powerful voice for over 6,200 New Hampshire children. CASA/GALs are generally limited to one or two cases at any given time and have the infrastructure of CASA's professional staff to guide them through the complexities of these cases.

In the county of Sullivan, there are 20 child abuse and neglect cases currently open, involving 36 abused and neglected children. CASA volunteers have donated thousands of hours of their time to help ensure that these children's needs are being met and services provided to help facilitate the safe reunification with their biological family. In cases where reunification cannot take place, the CASA volunteer works diligently to ensure that another permanent home can be found for these children so they have an opportunity to grow up in safe, permanent homes.

We respectfully request consideration for inclusion in your 2007 budget in the amount of \$500. This tangible support will directly impact the children of your town by allowing CASA of NH to recruit, train and supervise local citizens to advocate for them. The by-product is that the community is strengthened and the most vulnerable and fragile citizens of your area have the promise for a more hopeful and productive future. Article 22. Voted to authorize Selectmen to apply, accept and expend unanticipated money from the state, federal government or private source. RSA 31:95-b.



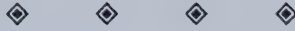

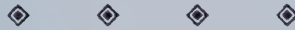

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

I have completed vision and hearing screenings on all students and have sent referral letters to parents of those children who failed screening. I am in the process of doing, re-screens on those students who failed the initial screenings. I also have just completed Height, Weight, and Blood Pressure measurements on all students. I have also calculated their BMI based on these findings. I will follow up with parents/guardians as appropriate with these results, too. I hope all parents will follow up with doctors as appropriate. Anyone who needs assistance with this should call me at school.

I joined with the guidance counselor in October 2006 during "Red Ribbon Week" to do drug and alcohol education for all grades. I am discussing plans with Mr. Baldwin on what health topics he would like me to cover in the classrooms. I will work with the teachers to see when this will be fit into the class schedule.

In the Spring of 2007 I will be doing the scoliosis screening for students in grades 5-7.

As required, I keep a running log of students who come to the office. On Fridays, 46 students in K-5 participate in the fluoride program. Thank you for the opportunity to be Unity's school nurse.

**Minutes of Annual School District Meeting
Unity Town Hall
Saturday, March 25, 2006**

At 12:04 p.m. the meeting was called to order by Moderator Fred Bellimer with the Pledge of Allegiance. Registered voters were directed to sign in and receive a card that would be needed to vote. The Moderator explained how the meeting would be conducted. Mr. Bellimer announced the election results from March 14, 2006. Mr. Bellimer introduced members of the School Board and the SAU. School Board members Chris Eaton-Chairman, and Prudence McCormick. Shawn Randall was not here since he had a death in the family. Cheri LeMere, Tyyne Cox, Mary Ellen Bellimer, Maggie Hall, Lois Palmer, Donna Sweetser are the ballot clerks. Mike Cirre, Principal of Unity Elementary, and for the SAU, Allen Damren, Assistant Superintendent of Schools; Maren Ardell, Director of Special Education; Wendy Siebrands, Curriculum Director; Jacqueline Guillette, Superintendent; and Mike Fuerst, Legal Department. The Seventh grade class is raising money with a bake sale.

Article I(Hearing of Reports)

To hear reports of Agents, Committee or Officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto. Motion was made by Chris Eaton and seconded by Laura Love. Discussion began. Jacqueline Guillette addressed two issues. One was concerning school parties. Six hundred surveys were sent out from the registered voter list. Sixty two surveys were received back. Mike Cirre handed the results out to the voters present. The first committee meeting will be Wednesday, March 29th at 6pm at the school. The committee consists of 4 staff members, 7 parents, Prudence McCormick, and Mike Cirre. Agendas will be published.

The second issue Jacqui talked about was NECAP, a new three-state test (VT, RI, and NH). These test result scores are a baseline to improve on. Over the last four years we have moved forward. We are a good school district. We see where we need to improve and where we need to focus. Jacqui asked parents to help with these changes by reading to the children. She encouraged parents to have children participate in the summer reading program and have students work on Math facts-every night with flash cards. Ten years ago Unity scores went way up. We will do it again.

Article I Passed. Vote was affirmative.

Article II (Withdrawal from High School Tuition Capital Reserve Fund)

To see if the school district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of TWENTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$25,000) to offset the increased cost, in the 2006-07 budget, of high school tuition and authorize the withdrawal of TWENTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$25,000) from capital reserve fund created for that purpose. The motion was presented by Chris Eaton and seconded by Ken Hall. Open for discussion. A petition was submitted to have this article voted on by paper ballot. Chris Eaton said this year we have 11 more 8th graders moving up to high school compared to the graduating seniors. High School tuition is 10 to 12,000 dollars. Last year we had a surplus. We set \$25,000 in a capital reserve fund for high school tuition. This capital reserve will decrease our tax rate by 31 cents. After this year we will put money back into the capital reserve fund to build it back up. Currently the capital reserve fund has \$500.00 to keep the account open.

Article II Passed by paper ballot, 45 yes votes, 3 no votes.

Article III (Main Budget)

To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of TWO MILLION FORTY-SIX THOUSAND TWENTY-THREE DOLLARS (\$2,046,023) for the support of school, for the salaries of District officials, agents, and employees, for payment of statutory obligations, the School Board to certify to the selectmen the balance between estimated revenue and appropriations, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town. The above amount includes \$2,004.829 for the general fund and \$41,194 for the federal projects fund.

A motion was made to submit an amendment to Article III by Chris Eaton and seconded by Prudence McCormick.

Amendment to Article III (Main Budget)

To see if the School District will vote to amend Article III to raise and appropriate the sum of TWO MILLION FIVE THOUSAND-SIX HUNDRED EIGHTY THREE DOLLARS (\$2,005,683) for the support of schools, for the salaries of District Officials, agents, and employees, for payment of statutory obligations, the School Board to certify to the selectmen the balance between estimated revenue and appropriations, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the Town. The above amount includes \$1,964,489 for the general fund and \$41,194 for the federal projects fund. Moderator recognized Allen Damren to discuss the changes. Allen gave a summary the entire budget and then discussed the changes. Reference pages 85-91 of the December 31, 2005 Annual Report. The decrease was a result of savings in Special Education costs, an accounting error and tuition costs to Newport with 3 students moving out of the area. The tax rate change will be a 6,8% increase over last year's tax rate. The Amendment to Article II Passed by paper ballot, 45-yes, 4-no.

Article IV (District Officer Compensation)

To determine and fix the salaries of school district officers as follows: school board members at \$500 per member per year; school district treasurer at \$300 per year; school district moderator at \$50 per meeting; and school district clerk at \$75 per meeting. A motion was made by Chris Eaton and seconded by Prudence McCormick. Discussion followed. Vote was taken. Article IV Passed.

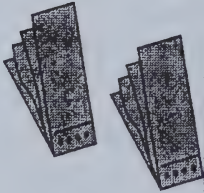
Article V: (Other Business)

To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting. Mr. Romer announced a road side clean up Saturday April 15 on Cold Pond Road. Cheri LeMere said she heard a child was told by a teacher that if parents come to vote the students would get free sodas on Monday. Jacqui said it is not illegal to offer incentives to have parents come to vote but will make sure this does not happen again. John Callum asked that the soda machine be taken out of the school. Mike Cirre pointed out that the machine only has water and 100% fruit juices in it. Motion to adjourn the meeting was made and seconded. Meeting adjourned 1:50pm.

Unity teachers provide a major contribution to the school environment. They are kind and fair to the students and give help when needed. It is obvious that they enjoy teaching and interaction with students. The teachers are a major asset to the school.

The classes offered at U.E.S. prepare students for the future. They are enjoyable as well as challenging. Students receive a fair amount of homework which increases learning. Science and social studies provide interesting projects and experiments. Math and language arts help students improve their skills. Unity students will be well-prepared for high school.

Extra school activities provide many opportunities for students to learn and grow. K-Kids is an after-school club that involves student in the school and community. The soccer team allows the students to compete against other teams. At the end of the year, field day is a time for students to let loose and participate with the whole school in physical activities. These and other activities help make U.E.S a better place.

The educational program offered at Unity is characterized by interesting classes, friendly teachers, and exciting activities. It is a great school where students learn a lot about life."

Unity School Board Annual Report 2006

During 2005-2006 year the school needed to deal with the aftermath of the summer flooding. The school struggled to find transportation for those students isolated by the loss of Twin Bridges. The school did finally develop a patchwork of transportation which allowed us to make it through the year. Fortunately, FEMA did pick up the cost for this and our bus company can provide a bus in the future.

Inside the school, the year was one of stability. The staff has transitioned from a relatively new group to a more seasoned one. The school should reap the benefit of this more experienced staff over the coming years. Teacher average salaries continue to be the lowest in the state and this is an issue the school needs to address in order to keep and hire good people.

The school did poorly in the new state testing which has been mandated by the Federal "No Child Left Behind Law". Much of this was due to our lack of familiarity with the way the test would be presented. The school has since developed a strategy for improving our scores and we hope to do better next year.

Many thanks to all who donated their time to the school, the positive impact you have made can never be underestimated.

Unity Elementary School Report of the Principal

It is with pleasure that I offer the residents of Unity my first impressions regarding education within our community. I came to the district, having been a Principal, Director of Curriculum, Instruction, and Assessment, and most recently Superintendent of Schools. These previous administrative positions have given me a unique advantage in being able to take the reins of the Unity Elementary School, which, by all indications is a well-functioning school.

The reasons for the success are clear: hard working board members; competent and caring faculty and staff, and most importantly, wonderful children.

There are several issues that are enormous in terms of complexity and implications for our school. I will try to highlight some of these issues and will continue to gather information so that we make decisions that are child-centered, focused on improved teaching and learning, and balance the needs of our taxpayers. Schools need to reflect the values of the communities that they serve. To that end, I am driven by the belief that all children will learn well, to the best of their ability.

No Child Left Behind Act (NCLB)

The reauthorization of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, now known as the No Child Left Behind Act, is having major ramifications for not only our district, but education in New Hampshire and across the country. Issues such as teacher and paraprofessional qualifications, adequate yearly progress of all children including the disaggregation of data by subgroups, and annual testing in grades three through eight and high school have resulted in continuing school improvement efforts and some confusion as clarification is sought from the U.S. Department of Education. With the size of legislation such as NCLB, there are sure to be some growing pains and continuing adjustments to be made.

Measures of Academic Progress

Students in grades 5-8 will be taking an assessment (test), called Measures of Academic Progress (MAP) three times per year, beginning with February 2007. The tests help to determine students' instructional level and to measure academic growth throughout the school year, and from year to year in the areas of Reading, Language Arts, and Mathematics. The tests will be taken on the computer. MAP tests are unique in that they adapt to be appropriate for the student's level of learning. As a result, each student has the same opportunity to succeed and maintain a positive attitude toward testing. And with MAP tests, we can administer shorter tests and use less class time while still receiving detailed, accurate information about students' growth.

New England Common Assessment Program

During the first three weeks of October 2006, students in grades 3 through 8 participated in the New England Common Assessment Program (NECAP). Students were tested in reading and mathematics. In addition, students in grades 5 and 8 were tested in writing.

The NECAP tests were designed to measure students' progress in meeting New Hampshire's Grade Level Expectations, or GLEs. The GLEs define the knowledge and skills a student should have mastered by the end of each school year. The reading test includes short and long reading passages with related multiple choice and constructed response questions. The mathematics test includes multiple choice, short answer, and constructed response questions. The writing test includes multiple choice and constructed response questions, and a single extended writing prompt. A constructed response question requires students to show their work and/or explain their reasoning.

The New England Common Assessment Program is one of the important tools available to parents and educators to determine how well our schools are helping students meet standards and grade level expectations. In every assessment, scores are only as meaningful as the effort students put into the tests.

UES Facility Issues

I am pleased to report that at its November meeting, the school board established a Facilities Committee to help address one of their primary goals: "To have a safe, instructionally supportive facility."

I am convinced that the Town has taken a great amount of pride in the restoration of the old tavern into a modern building with offices and library, the care and preservation of a beautiful town hall, and the support of excellent facilities for the town's volunteer fire/rescue operations, and highways. It is this pride and momentum on which we need to address the Unity Elementary School.

I am very proud of the work of your staff and hope that some of the highlights I have presented have been not only informative, but heightened your opinion of the combined efforts and talents of the people working with your children. My office remains open for you to come in and express your ideas, comments, or concerns. Working together as "Partners in Education" we can improve our school, leave no child behind, and prepare our students for the 21st century now upon us.

In closing, I would like to again thank the board, staff, students, and community for their continued support. The collaborative efforts of all will allow us to see the fruits of our labors.

Article I (Hearing of Reports)

To hear reports of Agents, Committees or Officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article II (Withdrawal from Special Education Capital Reserve Fund)

To see if the school district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of TWENTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$25,000) to offset the increased cost, in the 2007-08 budget, of special education and authorize the withdrawal of TWENTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$25,000) from the capital reserve fund created for that purpose.

(The School Board Recommends This Article.)

Article III (Main Budget)

To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of TWO MILLION TWO HUNDRED THIRTEEN THOUSAND EIGHT HUNDRED FORTY-SIX DOLLARS (\$2,213,846) for the support of schools, for the salaries of District officials, agents, and employees, for payment of statutory obligations, the

School Board to certify to the selectmen the balance between estimated revenue and appropriations, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the Town. The above amount includes \$2,172,652 for the general fund and \$41,194 for the federal projects fund.
