TOWN WARRANT

State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Windsor, County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the North School House in said town, on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon to act on the following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose one Selectman for three years, Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, Tax Collector, Highway Surveyor and two Constables for one year, one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, and all other necessary town officers or agents for the ensuing year.
- Article 2. To hear and act upon the reports of town officers or other committees.
- Article 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to meet the current expenses of the Town for the ensuing year.
- Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for the permanent improvement of highways.
- Article 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the repair of highways and bridges.
- Article 6. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for breaking roads.
- Article 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the purpose of cooperating with the State and Federal governments in the control of the white pine blister rust, or act in relation thereto.

Article 8. To see whether beer or other lawful alcoholic beverages shall be manufactured or sold locally as permitted under the laws of 1933, Chapter 99, section 22.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to accept ordinances permitting and regulating retail business, sports and amusements on Sundays, in accordance with amendments to Chapter 385, Section 5, of the Public Laws of New Hampshire or take any vote relating thereto.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to meet current expenses of the Town in anticipation of taxes.

Article 11. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to give a discount on taxes, if paid before July 1st, or pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board of Windsor, N. H.:

Herewith is respectfully submitted the report of the Superintendent of Schools, for the fifteenth year of his superintendency, and for the school year 1932-1933.

We had nine children in schools as indicated below: Hillsboro High School—Mary Chapman, Norman Chapman.

Hillsboro Lower Village—Mae H. Bruso, 8th grade; Emma Hoyt, 7th grade; Marion E. Bruso, 6th grade; Helen A. Hoyt, 5th grade; Carl E. Hoyt, 4th grade; Ernest R. Duefield, 1st grade; Foster I. Hoyt, 1st grade.

They had an average attendance of 95.5%, which is very good considering the distance they had to go to school, and the condition of the roads at times. Helen and Carl Hoyt are on the Honor Roll of perfect attendance, having been neither absent nor tardy for the whole year.

The Superintendent made 116 visits to the schools attended by our children, while parents and friends from Windsor made 18 visits, most of these being credited to members of the Chapman family.

At the Lower Village graduation Mae Helen Bruso was one of the graduates and was a credit to Windsor.

Milk was distributed to children wanting it, for a part of the year, and our children benefited by medical inspection and special instruction in music and drawing.
