To the inhabitants of the Town of Amherst in the County of Hillsborough and State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Wilkins School on Boston Post Road, Amherst Village on Tuesday, March 10, 1998 at 7:00 a.m. for the choice of Town Officers elected by official ballot and such action required to be inserted on said official ballot.

The polls will be open on said date at 7:00 a.m. and will close not earlier than 7:00 p.m. in the evening.

You are hereby notified that the second session of the Annual Meeting of the Town of Amherst will be held at Souhegan Cooperative High School on Boston Post Road, Amherst on Saturday, March 14th at 10:00 o'clock in the morning to act on those matters not to be voted on by official ballot (Articles 6 through 24).

**Article 1.**

To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing terms.

**Article 2. (By Petition To Enact the Provisions of SB-2)**

Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 40:13 to allow official ballot voting on all issues before the Town?

**Article 3.**

Shall we modify the elderly exemptions from property tax in the Town of Amherst, based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers, to be as follows: For a person 65 years of age up to 75 years, **\$40,000**; for a person 75 years of age up to 80 years, **\$60,000**; for a person 80 years of age or older **\$80,000**. To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least five (5) years, own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by such person's spouse, they must have been married for at least five (5) years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of not more than **\$35,000** or, if married, a combined net income of less than **\$50,000** and own net assets not in

excess of **\$100,000** excluding the value of the person's residence. **(The Selectmen recommend a yes vote.)**

**Article 4. (By Petition)**

To see if the Town will vote to rescind the 1997 vote for an elected Planning Board pursuant to RSA 673:2, II (b) (1), and return to an appointed Planning Board pursuant to RSA 673:2, II (a). **(The Selectmen recommend a yes vote.)**

**Article 5.**

To see if the Town will vote to make the following changes in the Zoning Ordinance for the Town of Amherst:

**Amendment No. 1. (By Petition)**

To change Lot #112-000 on Map #002 of the Tax Maps of the Town of Amherst, presently owned by Roberge Investments, LLC, c/o Al Legro, Vestmoore Management, Inc., 168 South River Road, Bedford, New Hampshire and being situate on the southeast corner of the intersection of Route 101-A and 122 from a general office zone to a commercial zone.

**BALLOT QUESTION:**

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 as proposed by petitioners of the Town? **(The Planning Board recommends a yes vote.)**

**Amendment No. 2. (By Petition)**

To change Article IV, Section 4-8, Limited Commercial Zone, to add item A-13 Kennels, as an allowable use in the Limited Commercial Zone.

**BALLOT QUESTION:**

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by petitioners of the Town **(The Planning Board recommends a no vote.)**

**Amendment No. 3.**

To change Article IX, Section 9-1, Planned Residential Development to add:

**PRD Regulations**

“If bonuses, as explained below, are granted, the total number of bedrooms shall not exceed one and one-half the number of bedrooms calculated above. The number of bedrooms permitted in any PRD shall be determined by the Board to assure compliance with the purpose of PRD and shall not exceed the limit determined above.”

**Bonuses**

The Board shall review the proposed PRD and consider the extent to which it meets or addresses the objectives set forth in this ordinance and may, in its judgment, grant density bonuses not to exceed those indicated below.

Item	Maximum % Increase in Density
Recreation Facilities	5%
Phasing	5 Years - 10%
	10 Years - 20%
Conservation	5% for each 5% of net tract area places in conservation easement and/or set aside for trails to integrate with the Town trail system as determined by the Conservation Commission.
Low & Moderate Cost Housing	30% if between 20% and 40% of the total number of bedrooms which are located with dwelling units which are low to moderate cost housing.
Housing for Elderly Or "Empty Nester"	40% if the bedrooms in units of one or two bedrooms that are designated to be occupied by an individual or spouse who has reached the age of 45. Such age shall be a deed restriction for that unit.

**Amendment No. 4.**

To see if the Town will vote to add to Section IX, Article 9-1 "Conservation and Recreational Land Use".

**Applicability**

This ordinance is applicable only to residentially zoned parcels with greater than ten acres of undeveloped land.

**Purpose of the Alternative Conservation and Recreational Land Use Ordinance**

The purpose of this ordinance is to implement a mechanism that allows land owners to create definite term conservation or recreational easements on tracts of land that are greater than ten acres and to derive economic benefit from preserving conservation or recreational resources.

**General Regulation**

Any owner of an eligible tract of land may apply to the Planning Board for approval of a plan to create a conservation or recreation easement. Easements may be granted for a minimum of ten years, during which time the owner(s) shall retain use of the land in accordance with the approved plan. Each shall be approved by the Planning Board and must be filed with the County Registry of Deeds.



Approval of the plan and granting of the easement shall enable the owner to establish certain recreation and/or conservation uses that do not appreciably alter the characteristics of the land. The owner may allow use of the land for the approved conservation or recreational purposes by individuals or the general public or the owner may restrict use to another entity or to the Town or other governmental entity. The owner of the land may also form a conservation or recreation association, which would govern the approved conservation or recreational uses of the land. In all cases, use of the land is restricted to the approved conservation or recreation purposes.

The land owner may charge reasonable fees for the use of the land by the public, an association or other entities.

### **Application Procedures**

Applications shall be made in writing to the Zoning Administrator and shall contain all applicable information prior to submission to the Planning Board for consideration. At a minimum, the application shall contain:

1. Name of the land owner(s).
2. Map and Lot numbers of the parcel(s) to be covered by the easement.
3. A plan showing the parcel, abutters, existing development and planned improvements or alterations.
4. A detailed description of the conservation and/or recreational activities planned for the land.
5. A detailed description of the measures to be implemented to ensure that the planned uses do not appreciably alter the character of the land, including the identification of ecologically significant areas or wildlife.
6. The schedule and intensity of use of the land.
7. A description of any improvements or alterations to the land to support the conservation or recreational uses.
8. The intended users of the land (individuals, groups, associations, etc.).
9. Provisions for access to special populations if use is open to the general public.
10. A copy of the legal documents creating the easement and limiting the use of the land to the approved purpose for the period indicated.
11. A summary of public benefit to be gained by approval of the plan.

### **General Provisions**

1. Each tract of land must contain a minimum of ten acres of undeveloped land.
2. Conservation and recreation easements must be created for a minimum of ten years and shall be renewable for an unlimited number of ten year minimum periods.
3. No activities, other than approved by the Planning Board, may employ the use of hazardous or toxic substances as defined in 40 CFR Part 260, 261.
4. No structures may be supplied with utilities, except as approved by the Planning Board.

5. If the conservation or recreational activities entail use by groups, adequate on-site parking and sanitary facilities shall be provided.
6. Conservation and recreational uses shall be limited to non-motorized activities, except as required for maintenance, health and safety or access handicapped individuals.

**Amendment No. 5.**

To see if the Town will vote to replace Article V, Accessory Apartment Sections 5-4.4, 5-6.6, 5-7.7, 5-9.1, 5-10.7 with new definition to Sections 5-4.4, 5-6.6, 5-7.7, 5-9.1, 5-10.7.

**Accessory Apartment**

A second dwelling unit incorporated within a single family home which is structurally integrated with direct access between it and the main living unit. The total area of the accessory apartment shall not exceed 800 s.f. and shall consist of only one bedroom. Any changes to the total number of bedrooms per lot will require a new state approved septic plan to be placed of file with the Zoning Office prior to the issuance of a conversion/building permit.

**Amendment No. 7.**

To see if the Town will vote to delete Lots 13, 14 through 14-4 inclusive, 15, 16, 17 through 17-8 inclusive, 107 and 107-1 on Map 2 from the General Office Zone and add to Residential Zone on Map 2.

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 7 as proposed by the Planning Board?

**Amendment No. 8.**

To see if the Town will vote to replace the sign definition from Article III, Section 3-4 with new sign definition:

Any material, structure or device, or part thereof, composed of lettered or pictorial matter which is located out-of-doors, or on the exterior of any building, or indoors as a window sign, displaying an advertisement, announcement, notice or name, and shall include any declaration, demonstration, display, representation, illustration or insignia used to advertise or promote the interests of any person or business or cause when such is placed in view of the general public. Signs shall include: Any sign defined in this section or otherwise regulated under this ordinance; flags, banners, pennants, streamers, balloons, spinners or similar devices; and any other fixed or portable device or vehicle placed on a parcel of land and used as a sign to convey information to the public.

**Prohibited Signs**

No banners, pennants, ribbons, streamers, spinners of similar moving, fluttering or revolving devices shall be permissible for display as signs, except as exempted above as New Hampshire or U.S. flags.

If an existing dwelling is located on the site and sufficient evidence is presented to the Planning Board to show that the existing dwelling is affordable within the meaning of this ordinance, than No. 6 shall not apply to that existing dwelling.

To see if the Town will vote to add Article III, Section 3-15, III.E. Horse Riding Lessons, 1. Riding Lessons shall be limited to no more than ten (10) lessons per day.

**Amendment No. 18.**

To see if the Town will vote to add new Section 3-17 Equestrian Facilities and Events.

**Intent of the Ordinance**

The Town of Amherst recognizes that equestrian activities and facilities are an integral part of the history and rural character of the Town and, as such, can contribute to achieving the goals of the Master Plan. Through the preservation of open space and agricultural practices, the commercial elements of such ventures are of value to the entire community by providing recreational, competitive and other opportunities for public benefit.

The intent of this ordinance is to allow the development of private equestrian facilities and events in the residential zones of the Town of Amherst, while seeking to preserve the rural character of the Town. The provisions of this ordinance are further intended to limit the impact of these commercial ventures on public health, safety and welfare by the establishment of minimum standards and by requiring a review of the design, operating procedures and control of impacts. The ordinance seeks to promote the health, safety and welfare of rider and animal, as well as the public.

**1.0 DEFINITIONS**

- 1.1 Equestrian Facility:** A private facility with limited and/or occasional availability to the public; primarily for the boarding, training, breeding, sale, riding and maintenance of horses, ponies and other equids, with or without instruction for the rider.
- 1.2 Equestrian Events:** Any event of more than 30 participants per day involving horses and/or other animals which are on display or engaged in competition and organized and managed in accordance with the provision of a sanctioning state or national organization.
- 1.3 Riding Lessons:** Any lesson or activity with limited availability to the public involving the riding, training or care of horses, whether saddled or otherwise, and including the training or instruction of riders or drivers.

## 2.0 GENERAL PROVISIONS

- 2.1 **Applicability.** The provisions of this ordinance apply to all lessons or events involving horses that are open or available to the general public, regardless of whether there is a fee charged. Activities covered under this ordinance are allowed in all zones of the Town of Amherst. These provisions do not apply to the private ownership of horses or other farm animals not available for public use.

The ordinance shall be construed to cover and define uses permitted to equidae as a whole and not to limit permitted uses and activities to a size animal or species or sub-species.

Allowable uses and activities involve the interaction between horses and humans and can be instructional, competitive, recreational, therapeutic, training, exercise, conditioning, or as otherwise approved by the Planning Board.

- 2.2 **Prohibited Uses.** Activities, operations or events for the purpose of livestock auctions, commercial horse sales, the sale of transport equipment and vehicles, the manufacture or sale of feed and animal hospitals are not allowable uses permitted under this ordinance.

Outdoor lighting for night-time use of arenas, tracks and like training or competition areas is prohibited.

- 2.3 **Equestrian Event Management.** Equestrian events consist of horse shows, trials or competitions open to the general public. All events shall be conducted under the rules or other provision of an applicable sanctioning state or national organization. Prior to conducting such events, the owner of the property shall apply for and obtain approval under the Non-Residential Site Plan review regulations of the Town. At a minimum the application shall include:

1. Name of the land owner(s).
2. Map and Lot numbers of the parcel(s) to be used for equestrian events.
3. A plan showing the parcel, abutters, existing development and planned improvements or alterations, parking areas and traffic access and circulation.
4. A detailed description of the proposed equestrian events including activities, hours of operation, number of participants, bathroom facilities, water supply, etc.
5. A detailed description of the measures to be implemented to ensure that the proposed activities are compatible with the neighborhood, including but not limited to traffic management, dust and noise control, disposal of manure.

6. The annual schedule of equestrian events.
7. Provisions for access to special populations if events are open to the general public.
8. A copy of the sanctioning organization's requirements for event management.
9. A traffic and parking plan shall designate areas for parking horse trailers and other oversize vehicles and for individual vehicles for those attending the equestrian events. All event parking shall be restricted to the designated areas and limited to the available spaces. No on-street parking shall be allowed. Traffic circulation shall ensure access for emergency vehicles at all times.

**2.4 Riding Lessons.** Riding lessons are all activities involving instruction, training or participation in horse-back riding provided to the general public using horses not wholly owned by the individual receiving the instruction or training. Riding lessons to more than ten individuals per day may be offered only by facilities approved under this ordinance. Prior to offering riding lessons to the public, the owner of the property shall apply for and obtain approval under the provision of the Non-Residential Site Plan review regulations of the Town. At a minimum the application shall include:

1. Name of the land owner(s).
2. Map and Lot numbers of the parcel(s) to be used for riding lessons.
3. A plan showing the parcel, abutters, existing development and planned improvements or alterations, parking areas and traffic access and circulation.
4. A detailed description of the proposed riding lesson operations including activities, hours of operation, maximum number of hourly and daily participants, bathroom facilities, waiting/classroom areas, water supply, etc.
5. A detailed description of the measures to be implemented to ensure that the activities are compatible with the neighborhood, including but not limited to traffic management, dust and noise control, disposal of manure.
6. The schedule of operation of the riding center.
7. Provisions for access to special populations if lessons are open to the general public.
8. A copy of an emergency response plan to manage accidents and injuries.
9. A traffic management plan must be prepared for any riding center offering lessons to more than three riders per hour.

### **3.0 OTHER PROVISIONS**

- 3.1 Barns or other structures used to stable horses under this ordinance shall be limited to one animal per stall and one stall per 1.0 acres of pasture.

Animals covered under this ordinance smaller than standard horses (58 inches) must be provided adequate pasture area.

- 3.2 Barns used to stable five or more horses may contain up to 800 sq. ft. of living space for a stable manager provided such space meets all applicable BOCA requirements and is issued an occupancy permit by the Town.
- 3.3 The restrictions on riding lessons contained in Section 2.4 of this ordinance shall not apply to the owners of horses stabled or boarded at a facility not otherwise subject to this ordinance.
- 3.4 Nothing in this ordinance shall be construed to prohibit the private sale or maintenance of horses or farm livestock or to prohibit, or otherwise restrict, agricultural operations.

**BALLOT QUESTION:**

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 18 as proposed by the Planning Board?

**Article 6.**

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500,000 for the purchase of such municipal land and/or buildings as the Selectmen deem appropriate and in the best interest of the Town and to authorize the issuance of not more than \$500,000 of bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA Chapter 33) and to authorize the municipal officials to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, provided, nevertheless, that the Selectmen shall not conclude any such purchase unless and until they have presented to either an annual or special town meeting, a warrant article asking the meeting to ratify the particular parcel chosen by the Selectmen for purchase, or take action relative thereto (2/3rds ballot vote required). **(The Selectmen recommend a yes vote.)**

**Article 7.**

To see if the Town will raise such monies as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same or take action relative thereto. Said sum is exclusive of all special warrant articles addressed separately. **(The Selectmen recommend a yes vote.)**

**Article 8.**

To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$27,358 to fund the deficit in the 1997-98 Souhegan Regional Landfill District budget appropriation or take action relative thereto. **(The Selectmen recommend a yes vote.)**



**Article 9.**

To see if the Town will vote to approve the cost items included in the collective bargaining agreement reached between the Board of Selectmen and the Amherst Police Union which calls for the following increases in salaries and benefits: 1998 - \$16,378, 1999 - \$16,850 (Est.) and 2000 (TBD). The 1998 costs are included in the appropriation requested under Article 7 or take action relative thereto. **(The Selectmen recommend a yes vote.)**

**Article 10.**

To see if the Town will vote to approve the cost items included in the collective bargaining agreement reached between the Board of Selectmen and the Department of Public Works Union which calls for the following increases in salaries and benefits: 1998 - \$1.00 (Est.), 1999 - \$1.00 (Est.) and 2000 - \$1.00 (Est.). The 1998 costs are to be included in the appropriation requested under Article 7 or take action relative thereto. **(The Selectmen recommend a yes vote.)**

**Article 11.**

To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000 for survey, design review and recommendations for the physical needs of Town Hall to update all of the electrical, plumbing, mechanical systems, HVAC and make the building ADA compliant or take action relative thereto. **(The Selectmen recommend a yes vote.)**

**Article 12.**

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$122,000 for the construction of a Salt Barn at the Department of Public Works Complex to be funded in the following manner:

Withdrawal From Capital Reserve	\$106,000
Raised by Taxation	\$ 16,000

or take action relative thereto. **(The Selectmen recommend a yes vote.)**

**Article 13.**

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$24,000 for the purchase of two defibrillators for the Rescue Squad or take action relative thereto. **(The Selectmen recommend a yes vote.)**

**Article 14.**

To see if the Town will vote to create, pursuant to RSA 31:19-a, a restricted expendable trust fund to be known as the Amherst Town Library Property Fund for the purpose of acquisition of land and any buildings thereon for future expansion of library space and to vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40,000 to be placed in the Amherst Town Library Property Fund or take action relative thereto. The trust will operate under the following rules:

1. The Trust Fund will be invested by the Town of Amherst Trustees of the Trust Fund as prescribed by State Statute.

2. The Trust Fund will have a separate Board of Directors established as follows:
- a. Two members of the Trustees of the Library elected by the Library Trustees.
  - b. One member of the Board of Selectmen appointed by the Board of Selectmen.
  - c. One member of the Representatives to the General Court elected by the Representatives among themselves.
  - d. One member of the Trustees of the Trust Funds elected from among themselves.
3. It is the intent that this trust fund will be added to by warrants put before the voters each year. Interest on the fund to accumulate. Expenditure of the fund to be authorized by a three-fifth vote of the above described Board of Directors. **(The Selectmen recommend a yes vote.)**

**Article 15.**

To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of installing a sprinkler system in the apparatus bay of the Central Fire Station and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,500 to be placed in this fund or take action relative thereto. **(The Selectmen recommend a yes vote.)**

**Article 16. (By Petition)**

To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to:

- a. Conduct a wireless telecommunication workshop open to Town Boards, interested Amherst citizens, and potential industry providers in order to provide access to the best information available for decision making by the Board of Selectmen, the Planning Board, and the Zoning Board as well as the citizens of the Town.
- b. Hire technical services as needed by the Selectmen, the Planning Board, and the Zoning Board in reviewing future applications from prospective providers.

Any monies so raised and appropriated that are not spent are to be applied to costs incurred in creating a wireless telecommunication facilities master plan or take action relative thereto. **(The Selectmen recommend a no vote.)**

**Article 17. (By Petition)**

To see if the Town will vote to create, pursuant to RSA 31:19-a, a restricted expendable trust fund to be known as the Amherst Steeple Fund for the purpose of maintenance and repairs to the Town steeple attached to the Congregational Church of Amherst and to vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 to be placed in the Amherst Steeple Fund or take action relative thereto. The trust will operate under the following rules:

1. The Trust Fund will be invested by the Town of Amherst Trustees of the Trust Fund as prescribed by State Statute.
2. The Trust Fund will have a separate Board of Directors established as follows:
  - a. Two members of the Congregational Church of Amherst appointed by the Congregational Church of Amherst.
  - b. One member of the Board of Selectmen appointed by the Board of Selectmen.
  - c. One member of the Representatives to the General Court elected by the Representatives among themselves.
  - d. One member of the Trustees of the Trust Funds elected from among themselves.
3. It is the intent that this trust fund will be added to by warrants put before the voters each year. Interest on the fund to accumulate. Expenditure of the fund to be authorized by a three-fifth vote of the above described Board of Directors. **(The Selectmen recommend a yes vote.)**

**Article 18. (By Petition)**

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50,000 to be transferred to and used by the Amherst Land Trust for the purpose of acquiring developable land, development rights or easements, to ensure the maintenance and preservation of the scenic and rural character of the Town and to minimize the tax impact of residential development. Such sum represents the amount of current use recovery fees collected by the Town during the current fiscal year, less the amount transferred to the Amherst Conservation Commission Land Fund or take action relative thereto. **(The Selectmen recommend a no vote.)**

**Article 19. (By Petition)**

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$14,867.40 to allow the conversion of the Fire Department's Department Assistant's position from a 28 hours per week part-time position to a 35 hours per week full-time position or take action relative thereto. **(The Selectmen recommend a no vote.)**

**Article 20. (By Petition)**

To see if the Town will vote to change the designation of Town Land known as Bragdon Farm, Amherst Tax Map 8, Lots 8-54, 8-54-1 and 8-56, and Bedford Tax Map 30, Lot 15 from category "Town Property" to category "Conservation Land" or take action relative thereto. **(The Selectmen recommend a no vote.)**

**Article 21. (By Petition)**

To designate Mack Hill Road from Manchester Road to its northern terminus at the town line as a scenic road pursuant to the provisions of RSA 231:157 or take action relative thereto.

**Article 22.**

To see whether the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to convey an easement to New England Telephone, D/B/A Bell Atlantic, to permit the placement of a telephone utility cabinet and related connects and appurtenances on land owned by the Town known as Map 8, Lot 77-10, on such terms and conditions as the Selectmen deem in the best interest of the Town or take action relative thereto. **(The Selectmen recommend a yes vote.)**

**Article 23.**

To see if the Town will vote to amend the purpose of the Highway Equipment Capital Reserve to include maintenance and refurbishing Highway Department equipment or take action relative thereto (2/3rds vote required). **(The Selectmen recommend a yes vote.)**

**Article 24.**

To see if the Town will vote to amend the purpose of the Highway Vehicle Capital Reserve to include maintenance and refurbishing Highway Department equipment or take action relative thereto (2/3rds vote required). **(The Selectmen recommend a yes vote.)**

## SELECTMEN'S REPORT

It was, in all, a good year. Much was accomplished, and new needs were identified. There were no true emergencies requiring large or unexpected expenditures.

### *Completed Projects*

The Conservation Commission proposed that two properties be purchased, and the purchases were approved by the Board. The first property is the Bacon property at the end of Brook Road, immediately adjacent to Joe English. The property consists of 7.6 acres, and includes the house and several small outbuildings. We have renamed the property "Peabody Mill Center".

The second property purchased by the Conservation Commission is a 70 acre portion of the property owned by David & Mary Dacquino, known as Jonny Cake Farm. The Dacquino's are leaving Town and have divided their land, after which they very kindly offered a portion of it to the Town at a price considerably below its value.

An effort to establish Charter Commissions under RSA 49-B:3, to consider various means of voting for budgets for Souhegan School and the Town was voted on and failed to pass.

Two projects modifying Town roads were completed during the summer. Both had been under discussion for several years. The hump on the east side of the Merrimack Road/Route 122 intersection was leveled, and Merrimack Road at that location was widened. This project was accomplished without State assistance.

A complete re-design of the intersection of Boston Post Road and Main Street in the center of the village was constructed. Additional landscaped areas were added on all sides of the intersection, and an island isolating the roads from the parking area across from the Village Green market was installed. The result is that the intersection has been greatly tightened, and the amount of green space increased.

A Committee was formed to consider means to improve the services of the Ambulance/Rescue Squad. Their recommendations were received at the beginning of February, and will be considered by the Selectmen.

A water line was extended from in front of the Police Station to the Fire Station. This provides potable water to the Station, allows for filling the trucks, and may

eventually be used to sprinker the equipment bay. Work was performed by three members of the Fire Department at no charge, except for materials.

A contract with the Union representing the Police was negotiated and approved.

### ***Unfinished Business***

There is always some unfinished business occupying the Town. This coming year, however, a major concern of the citizens will be considered and hopefully concluded. Almost every citizen is unhappy with the size, appearance and location of towers which have been proposed to support antennas to provide cellular phone service. Requests for such towers have been submitted and the necessary special exceptions and variances have been rejected by the Zoning Board of Adjustment. The matter is now in litigation.

In March, the Town will again be asked to decide if they wish to continue with the present form of Town Meeting or vote for financial matters, including the budget, by Ballot Vote at the polls.

Faced with the requirement to up-date the Master Plan, the Planning Board formed a Steering Committee, who, with the aid of the University of New Hampshire Extension Service, conducted an evening and a day-long meeting to determine the present and desired profiles of the Town. Update of the Master Plan will continue this coming year.

The employees of the Department of Public Works voted to form a union. Negotiations between the Town and the Union are underway and hopefully will be concluded in time for consideration at Town Meeting.

The Selectmen wish to thank all of the employees of the Town for the loyalty and dedication they have exhibited in providing outstanding service to the town and its citizens. In addition, the volunteers who staff our Commissions and Committees work long hours at no pay. They deserve the thanks of all Town citizens.

The community of Amherst faces some tough and important decisions in the years to come. Increased population, changing demographics, and rising costs have contributed to an acceleration in the tax rate. In addition, these factors have added considerable pressure on the ability of our Town to maintain the quality of life that we, as citizens, have come to expect. The residents of Amherst have always demanded the best, yet we must realize that having the best is not without cost. At some point in the not too distant future we, as a community, will be faced with the unenviable task of drawing the line between what we demand and what we, as taxpayers, can afford to pay.

The Ways & Means Committee encourages the active participation of all Amherst voters in the budget process. To that end, we recommend your presence at the various budget and bond hearings, the School District deliberative session, and the annual Town Meeting. We look forward to presenting our recommendations at these forums, and we hope that our opinions will help the citizens of Amherst to make informed and reasonable decisions.

**WELFARE OFFICER'S REPORT**

The Town of Amherst has been very fortunate that general assistance remains at a very manageable level. Rent and utility payments continue to highlight the welfare budget.

In 1992, the Selectmen adopted the Welfare Offset - Landlord Delinquent Municipal Payment Law. This allows the Welfare Officer to issue rental payments to the Town Tax Collector if the landlord is in arrears of paying his/her real estate taxes. This process is used on a regular basis when taxes are delinquent more than thirty days.

Once again, the Welfare Office has been the recipient of a discretionary grant from the Junior Women's Club. Funds from this grant are used for items and services which are outside the realm of the Welfare Officer's guidelines. People from 5 to 85 have been assisted by these funds. I can't thank the members enough for their hard work in fundraising that allowed this Office to receive the \$500 grant.

Thanks should also be given to Mrs. Darlene Smith's Middle School Class who adopted a family for Christmas. It was a wonderful experience to be part of these young folks gift of giving during this special time of year. The family was overwhelmed by what they received and were extremely grateful to the class for their thoughtfulness.

## TRUSTEES REPORT FOR THE AMHERST TOWN LIBRARY

It has been another year of exceptional growth in both traditional and electronic services. There was an increase of 9% in circulation of library materials while we have improved or added new electronic services. Our electronic card catalog is now available on the Internet World Wide Web as are two online information search databases. You can link to these services through the Library's home page on the Internet at [www.amherst.lib.nh.us](http://www.amherst.lib.nh.us) and send requests using electronic mail at "library@amherst.nh.us". If you would like to learn how to access information on the Internet from your home or the Library, you can join the over 200 other patrons who have taken one of our training classes.

With a new reciprocal lending agreement, you can use your library card to borrow from several surrounding libraries. If you want to go to a museum, the Library now has a pass for the Christa McAuliffe Planetarium courtesy of the Amherst Newcomers in addition to passes for the Museum of Fine Arts and the Museum of Science in Boston. In the children's Library, we now have CD-ROM based programs for young patrons to borrow and a mural of "Our Constellations" painted by Edith Aucoin and funded by the Friends of Library.

The Library, of course, is more than books, periodicals, CD-ROMs, and Internet access. This past year we have been excited by the popularity of the programs offered by the Library which included:

The Trustees want to acknowledge some of the donations especially from the Friends of Library, The Amherst Juniors, Amherst Lions Club, the Amherst Gardeners and contributions to the A. Thompson Warner Fund for mystery books. We also want to commend the librarians and staff for providing us with an outstanding community resource.

The number of building permits continue to rise, but new construction has dropped by 25% in number. The new homes, however, are larger. Existing homes continue to sell well. We have picked up over forty million dollars in new construction, additions, and renovations during the past two years.

Our equalization rates during the periods of 1989 through 1993 continued to rise. This resulted because of the drop in real estate values during this period. From 1994 through 1997, we are starting to see an upswing in values as our equalization rates are now dropping. As a result, we will be monitoring the need of an update in our assessments and will keep you informed. We have some adjustments that need to be made in our cost schedule in order to have a more equitable pricing schedule and to provide equity within neighborhoods and for different classes of property.

## AMHERST POLICE DEPARTMENT

The Amherst Police Department exists to serve the citizens of Amherst, and in partnership with the citizens, to enrich the quality of life in Amherst. The most obvious effect the Department has on the community is the safety of the people. The Department prides itself on maintaining a highly visible, active patrol force which discourages crime and encourages careful driving. In addition, solid relationships exist with the schools in Town, both to assist in providing safety education to children and to enforce laws dealing with drugs and violence. Beyond the obvious, the members of the Department are committed to providing service to the public, and working to solve problems that arise within families. This approach to law enforcement is referred to today as *community policing*, however this philosophy has been embodied in the Amherst Police Department since the 1970's.

In reviewing statistics for 1997, it is clear that a growing population and a healthy economy have played a part in the year being the busiest in Department history. Calls for service increased by 4.5 percent, while crime also increased for the second year. On a positive note, the number of burglaries remained low, actually decreasing by eleven percent. Contrasting the positive, the number of assaults, primarily simple assaults within families or among juveniles, rose dramatically. Adult arrest numbers dropped, but this decrease was more than offset by an increase in the number of juveniles detained. Although the number of motor vehicle accidents declined, the severity was substantially worse when measured by the number of injuries and deaths. A statistic which may relate to the accident rate is the number of motor vehicle stops initiated by the Department. That number dropped for the first time in several years, as a result of increasing calls for service which occupy officers' time.

To address the increasing workload, the Department requested two grants from the United States Department of Justice. The first was a request for funds to improve technology by linking laptop computers in the police cruisers with local, state and national computer bases. This was justified to the federal government by describing the proposed man hour savings by use of this technology, which allows officers to remain on patrol while accessing information vital to their jobs. The second request to the federal government was for funds to assist in hiring an additional patrol officer. The Department recently was notified that it was approved for \$75,000 to fund an officer for three years. Together, these two grants will significantly improve patrol coverage in the Town, while minimally impacting the local tax rate. This improved coverage should be of great assistance in maintaining the quality of life within the Town.

The Department would like to thank the townspeople for their continued support. In a year which saw great tragedy within the law enforcement family of

New Hampshire, it was gratifying that so many people in Amherst expressed their appreciation for the work the Department does. The Department will continue to strive to provide the best possible service at the least possible cost. As always, we invite your comments and suggestions as to how we may better serve the community.

## FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

The objective of the Amherst Fire Department is to protect/preserve individuals and property from and during such fires as may occur in the Town of Amherst and vicinity. The Amherst Fire Department's activities, however, are not limited to extinguishing fires. The AFD also deals with carbon monoxide, hazardous materials, oil spills, vehicle accidents and suspicious odor situations, just to name a few.

The Amherst Fire Department is managed by the three Fire Wards. The AFD is made up of approximately 50 paid on-call members, which operate nine pieces of apparatus housed at both Central Station (Amherst Street) and South Station (Stearns Road).

Central Station houses our Business Office. This is the location for obtaining burn permits, oil and propane installation permits, blasting permits, tank removal permits, etc. All fire prevention planning and inspection coordination also takes place at Central Station. The Business office hours are Monday - Friday 8:00 a.m. to 12:45 p.m. AFD's non-emergency business telephone number is 673-1545. In case of emergency, dial 673-3131 or 911.

In fiscal year 1996-1997, the Amherst Fire Department responded 360 times. Of these 360 responses, 248 were toned calls and 112 were service calls. The breakdown is as follows:

The Fire Wards would like to take this opportunity to congratulate and thank Christopher Whittaker and Walter Nelson who in 1997 reached 25 years of service to the Fire Department and to the Town of Amherst. Also, congratulations and thanks are extended to Lieutenant Dennis Wheeler and Chief Rick Crocker for accumulating 20 years of service in 1997.

We are pleased to report that the new Tower truck, which was approved at the 1996 Town Meeting, arrived at Central Station in February, 1997. This vehicle has proven to be every bit as versatile as we had hoped it would be. We now have the low angle reach capabilities that we need. In addition, the combined function of heavy rescue capabilities incorporated into the Tower during its design, have given us more versatility and efficiency on the scene of rescue incidents, such as motor vehicle accidents. Thank you for your support, Amherst.

The water main has now been extended into the Central Station apparatus bay. This project was possible thanks to the selfless donation of man hours and heavy equipment offered by Amherst Fire Department's Captain Jeffrey Manson, Lieutenant Dennis Wheeler and Lieutenant Kevin Grassett. The Department is very appreciative of their efforts.

The Amherst Fire Department would like to take this opportunity to thank the people of Amherst and surrounding towns for their continued support. We wish everyone a happy, healthy and safe upcoming year.

## RESCUE SQUAD

The Rescue Squad provides emergency medical services for Amherst and Mont Vernon, supplies additional hours of community service for such events as standbys at athletic events, parades, demonstrations, road races, blood pressure clinics, and CPR courses. The Squad is always in need of additional personnel, especially daytime. Anyone interested in joining the Amherst Rescue Squad is encouraged to contact any of our members for information regarding membership. We are also looking for townspeople who are at least 18 years of age and live in close proximity of the Police/Rescue Facility to be daytime drivers (6:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.). No medical training is required as a driver.

The Boy Scouts of America Post 2941 has continued to attract active members between the ages of 15 and 21, and remains involved in community service projects. The Post is supervised by Jean Miller. Teens are encouraged to become involved.

It is through the continued community support that we are able to provide quality, up-to-date medical and rescue services in the event of sudden illness or injury. Your generous donations continue to help augment the operating budget that is passed.

Membership this past year numbers 45, which includes 11 BSA Explorers, 15 EMT-Intermediates that are able to do IV therapy and administer certain drugs and 4 paramedics. In 1997 the Rescue Squad made 521 calls - 402 in Amherst, 102 to Mont Vernon, 1 mutual aid to Bedford, 1 to Merrimack and 15 to Milford.



## EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

Compared to the two years prior, 1997 was relatively quiet for emergency management. Much of the activity this year was focused on Sara Title III, also known as the "community right to know" law. These activities include maintaining our hazardous materials response plan, surveying businesses to identify hazards and assuring compliance and making information available to the general public. Several new publications related to emergency preparedness have been published by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). Copies of these are available to interested residents. A preparedness video geared to elementary school children was provided to the Amherst School District for review and subsequent use.

## SOUHEGAN REGIONAL LANDFILL DISTRICT

The Amherst Recycling and Transfer Station of the Souhegan Regional Landfill District (SRLD) is located off of Route 101 East, just east of the Meeting Place and west of the Basket Barn. It is open to all residents on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays. Hours vary from summer to winter, and are posted on the sign at the gate. Dump stickers are required in order to use the Amherst Station (the same is true for the other three towns of the SRLD). These stickers can be obtained at the Town Hall offices. Two of the best free offerings in Town can be had there: (1) Free driveway sand and (2) Free compost.

Some *important changes* have been made during the year 1997 with regard to items that are accepted at the facility for disposal. Since September 1997, mixed paper is no longer collected, however, magazines and newspapers continue to be collected separately (in loose form, no paper bags or string allowed). In addition, it is no longer acceptable to put fluorescent lamps or household batteries in the trash. Fluorescent lamps and household batteries, which contain heavy metals, are collected at the facility in special containers and sent to a recycling facility for reuse. These changes were dictated by our waste disposers as well as by environmental and economic concerns.

Items accepted include trash, which is transported to an incinerator, newspapers (loose), corrugated cardboard (flattened), commingled containers (glass, plastic and metal) and magazines (loose). The recyclable components are taken to various recycling facilities. Brush and untreated scrap wood is burned at the site in the burn pile. There is an area for wood/coal stove ashes; these do not go into the trash compactors due to the risk of fire. White goods such as refrigerators, stoves, air conditioners, etc. are accepted, but a fee for the disposal is charged for some items. A disposal fee is also charged for automotive tires. Also collected are waste oil and clean textiles along with footwear. Hazardous materials such as oil-based paints, solvents, cleaning fluids and pesticides are not handled by the Amherst Station, but are collected periodically in Nashua through a program with the Nashua Regional Planning Commission.

Although collected at the Amherst Station, the SRLD is not responsible for the disposition of tires, batteries, white goods, brush, oil, scrap metal, etc. The costs and revenue associated with these operations accrue to each town and are not part of the SRLD budget. The disposal of demolition materials such as treated lumber, asphalt, sheet rock, etc. has become an issue over the past years and under state regulations, may not be burned or landfilled at the town's facility. These materials are now being weighed at the Amherst Station and disposed of for a fee.

During the year 1997, it was discovered that apparently not all of the leachate from the closed landfill area was being properly pumped out. This has necessitated additional hauling and disposal costs as well as added expenses for engineering, testing and administration. Our 1998 budget includes a 160% increase for leachate disposal. Since the landfill is the responsibility of the SRLD, it must provide for proper disposal of the leachate as well as the monitoring of the groundwater quality at the site and at the borders of the property. Several efforts are currently ongoing to identify problem areas and implement corrective actions. On the positive side, the SRLD received a reimbursement check from the State of New Hampshire for costs incurred when closing our landfill in 1990. A check for \$48,000 was forwarded to the Town by the SRLD in August.

The entire SRLD budget for 1998 is \$772,330 up 18% from the previous year (1997 - \$654,967, 1996 - \$589,500, 1995 - \$683,100) of which \$350,000 (1997 - \$294,967, 1996 - \$180,658, 1995 - \$270,504) will be charged to the Town of Amherst, and collected as part of the tax bill. The remainder will be assessed to and paid by the other member towns of the SRLD - Hollis, Brookline and Mont Vernon. The assessments for Capital Spending are prorated based upon the total real estate valuation for each town, while those for the Operations Spending are prorated based upon the population of each town. The large increase in the 1998 budget is the result of the efforts that the SRLD is making to address the issue of leachate disposal as well as the groundwater quality improvement measures. This brings with it a host of related costs, as already mentioned. Many of these measures are required by the State of NH to reissue our Groundwater Permit. Other increases in the budget include a significant rise in trash (up 6% in the SRLD towns and up 10% in Amherst) accompanied by a decrease in the recyclables collected (down 6% in the SRLD towns and down 4% in Amherst) resulting in increased hauling and disposal expenses. Added to this is also a recent increase in the disposal cost per ton of trash. Along with the increases, the 1998 budget also includes reductions for equipment maintenance and for the disposal costs of recycled materials.

As of 1997, the SRLD no longer used its own vehicle to haul trash and other commodities. Instead we have contracted with D.C. Slocomb company of Hollis to have all such services performed on a per haul basis without the need for an SRLD owned vehicle. Our truck was sold during the first half of 1997.

By far the largest portion of the budget of the SRLD is comprised of Operations Spending, and within Operations, the biggest costs are those for the transportation and disposal of trash. Partly due to the improving economy and the increase in population, the 1994 trash tonnage for the SRLD hit an all-time high of 7360 tons of which Amherst generated 3246 tons. As the result of significant removal of demolition and building materials, as well as continuing recycling efforts the trash amounts have been lower since that time (1996 - SRLD 7195 / Amherst 2868, 1995 - SRLD 5226 / Amherst 2115). However, with



the strong rise in the trash quantities, 1997 is likely to generate over 7400 tons, setting a new record high. In fact, the contribution of Amherst trash to that collected overall by the SRLD has continued to decline from 45% in 1991 to only 40% in 1996 rising to an estimated 41% in 1997. As the result of not collecting mixed paper and increasing trash quantities, the overall recycling rate for the SRLD in 1997 will be approximately 19% (21.5% in 1996, 20.7% in 1995) while the Amherst rate will be closer to 21% (24% in 1996, 23.2% in 1995).

Since 1995, the SRLD has been a member of the Northeast Resource Recovery Association and has been working with this group to help identify markets and to find the most beneficial pricing and hauling arrangements for our area residents, while at the same time remaining firmly committed to an aggressive recycling effort.



## **PLANNING BOARD**

In 1997, the number of new residential subdivisions approved by the Planning Board was ten. This is the same as 1996, however, the number of new lots created was 19 verses 64 in 1996, a drop of 70%. The number of new site plan reviews for commercial - industrial development was 12. This also is the same as 1996. The total number of residential building permits in 1997 was 83. This represents a drop of 26% from 1996.

The above statistics appear to show a leveling off of residential building construction and perhaps the beginning of a down-ward trend.

The Town this fall became embroiled in the wireless communications facilities siting and approval process. Due to the fact of continuing litigation, I will make no comments except to say that the Planning Board should be commended for their foresight in setting up zoning regulations for wireless communications facilities in 1996.

This is the last year for the Planning Board as presently constituted. In March, the citizens of the Town voted for an elected Planning Board. In my opinion, this is not a good thing. I believe it opens the planning process to tremendous pressure from those who have specific agendas to influence the Board's decisions. I firmly believe that the Amherst Planning Board has always worked to the best interest of the Town first and foremost. When the new elected Board is seated, I hope that they will continue that tradition.

## **NASHUA REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION**

The end of the 1997 year marked my arrival as the Executive director of the Nashua Regional Planning Commission. Having grown up in the Nashua region, and having lived in other states, it is a pleasure to be back in New Hampshire. If any one has any issues of concerns regarding local planning, do not hesitate to contact me at the NRPC. We at the NRPC are grateful for the participation of Amherst's NRPC Commissioners: Michael Lambert, Martin Michaelis, Marilyn Peterman and Paul Wenger.

### **Transportation Improvement Program**

The NRPC assisted the Town of Amherst in submitting an ISTEA Enhancement project application for the 1997 round of TIP development. All applications were reviewed and ranked by the NRPC and a public participation process was conducted in conjunction with the FY 1999-2008 TIP update.

### **TravelNet Information System**

The NRPC completed the development of a computer based system of transportation related information, such as ridematching availability, transit schedules, airline information, transportation project status reports, currently planned projects and other information. The system will soon be available at public kiosk locations in the region and on the Internet.

### **Truck Route Study**

NRPC conducted a study of truck travel through the town center of Amherst and submitted a report with recommendations to Town Officials.

### **Amherst Master Plan**

The NRPC met with town officials to discuss a process for developing a master plan update for the town with the Planning Board. This contract has since been executed and the work is in the beginning stages.

## HISTORIC DISTRICT COMMISSION

The Historic District Commission consists of seven members and five alternates, all of whom are appointed by the Board of Selectmen. The Commission meets the third Thursday of every month. Applications to be reviewed by the Commission are due in the Zoning Office at the close of business on the second Thursday of each month. The Commission is charged by ordinance with the responsibility of reviewing all applications for building permits as well as for exterior renovations within the District.

In early 1991, Historic District Commission "Guidelines" were completed, reviewed by Town Counsel and placed in the Town Library along with the reference material the Commission used in drawing up the guidelines. This reference material includes the Secretary of the Interior's "Standards for Rehabilitation - Guidelines for Rehabilitating Historic Buildings" as well as "Preserving Community Character" which is published by the New Hampshire Association of Historic District Commissions. Both manuals are excellent sources of information and are especially important if one contemplates making changes to an historic house. Copies of the Commission's Guidelines are also on file in the Town Hall Zoning Office.

This past year the Commission has reviewed a wide variety of applications which resulted in approval for fences, changes to doors and windows, additions to existing structures, restoration of properties and new structures. In each instance we try to balance the needs of the applicant with necessity of maintaining the character of the Historic District. We also reviewed plans for the portable classrooms at Clark School and plans for an additional four classrooms at the same site. The Commission denied an application to place a communications tower at the Safety Complex and is currently working on an addition to our regulations dealing with this topic.

The Commission was pleased to see the completion of the beautification project at the corner of Main, Carriage Road and Boston Post Road. We feel that maintaining the green openness and rural character of the Village is of utmost importance. To help us in this, the Commission constantly strives to improve its procedures and knowledge so that the character of the Historic District may be maintained.

## RECREATION COMMISSION

In 1997, the Amherst Recreation Commission provided a diversified program of recreational activities for people of all ages. Participation rates increased by nine percent from the previous year and program registrations continue to climb. The citizens of Amherst have a wide range of activities to choose from and once again it is our aim to contribute significantly to the well being of the community.

The philosophy of the Recreation Commission remains constant, with emphasis on quality programs and enjoyment of what we have to offer. Important elements such as safety, sportsmanship, camaraderie, skill development and physical wellness remain an integral part of each and every program.

In our attempt to meet the interests and needs of the community, a few residents were unfortunately placed on a waiting list and we are truly sorry for any inconvenience that this may have caused. It is our hope that more recreational space will be available for community use in the near future and will help to alleviate some of our growing pains.

The Amherst Recreation Commission would like to take this opportunity to thank the many members of the community who have offered their service and assistance in 1997. The 500 plus volunteer coaches, assistants, referees, field laborers, and other helping hands that donated so much of their time and effort. We appreciate you. And, to assure we touched the heart of every little person, we also brought in a beautiful show horse, a horse and buggy, some exotic Llamas and great and gentle Newfoundlands who were guaranteed to steal the show.

Our Village Green was delightfully transformed by twenty-six town organizations who set up booths and sold a variety of items not the least of which was the exuberance of their own community spirit.

Our Governor, Jeanne Shaheen, mingled with folks on the Green as did Representative Charles Bass who came along with his family. Our Board of Selectmen were in attendance as well as many other town dignitaries. Also with us were a number of past "Citizens of the Year" and this year, longtime community leader Douglas Kirkwood, was chosen to join that illustrious group.

As we surveyed the Green, we marveled at the professionalism of the Art Show, the music of the Yankee Strummers and the perfection of the a capella singers. We loved, too, the generosity of the young face painters who worked hour after hour to ensure that every little face went home with a smile. The devotion of parents and teachers was also evident as they demonstrated the games they had set up for children and the magician who traveled to our Green for the very first time literally held the audience in the palm of his hand. Everywhere we looked, there was evidence of joy and friendship and though our celebration was dedicated to children, it clearly spoke volumes about the spirit of this small New Hampshire town ...

## REPORT OF STATE FOREST RANGER

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Ranger, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required. Violations of RSA 227-L:17, the fire permit law and the other burning laws of the State are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

There are ten Forest Rangers who work for the NH Division of Forests and Lands, Forest Protection Bureau. State Forest Rangers are available to assist communities with forest fire suppression, prevention and training programs as well as the enforcement of forest fire and timber harvest laws. If you have any questions regarding forest fire or timber harvest laws, please call our office at 271-2217.

There are 2,400 Forest Fire Wardens and Deputy Forest Fire Wardens throughout the State. Each town has a Forest Fire Warden and several Deputy Wardens who assist the Forest Rangers with forest fire suppression, prevention, and law enforcement. The 1997 fire season was a safe period for wildland firefighters with no major injuries reported. The drought conditions experienced during the early summer months was a significant factor resulting in the total number of fires reported during the season. The State of New Hampshire operates 15 fire towers, two mobile patrols and three contract aircraft patrols. This early detection and reports from citizens aid in the quick response from local fire departments. This is a critical factor in controlling the size of wildland fires and keeping the loss of property and suppression costs as low as possible.

## CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Town was graced this year with two excellent acquisitions of an enduring conservation nature. First is the land and buildings now known as Peabody Mill, formerly the Bacon residence, at the trailhead to Joe English Reservation, purchased through a warrant voted at last year's Town Meeting. The property is managed by the Recreation Commission with responsibilities shared with the Conservation Commission. It is strategically located to provide many family oriented services to our citizens seeking passive recreation. The other acquisition comes from David and Mary Dacquino of a 70 acre parcel fronting Highway 101 back to Austin Road. The woods are reasonably mature, there are a few wetlands, and both the Bicentennial Trail and an old logging road run through it. The property is in close proximity to other lands managed for conservation and holds promise for maintaining a good wildlife habitat. Our many thanks once again to Dave and Mary's generosity.

The change in regulatory procedures for managing the change of use penalty payments, voted by the Town last year, are working well - providing funds during the year instead of only at the end made all the difference with the Dacquino purchase above. Another improvement is allowing the funds to be used for land management.

We have embarked on the road to implementing our Forest Management plan. This plan was written last year by a consulting forester and contains species data and recommendations for stands improvement in five major forests we manage. We decided to proceed cautiously with a selected stand improvement in the Caesar's Brook forest. This area is characterized by numerous juvenile, low-grade trees whose removal will allow light to fall on trees of better use to wildlife and future thinnings. The result should be a better balance of species and age. We encourage owners of woodlot acreage to walk the Caesar's Brook area and contact us if you need more information.

Other conservation efforts continued on a broad front. We instituted a Trail Steward's program of outdoor-minded volunteers who 'adopt' an established trail; removing windfalls and performing other initiatives promoting its use. Four trails are now adopted - many more are available by contacting the ACC through Town Hall. Amherst Eagle Scouts projects this year worked at Pond Parish on an information kiosk and improvements to the entrances to the Bicentennial and Orange trails at Joe English. We began meeting quarterly with the Conservation Commissions of abutting towns. These joint meetings have been very successful at swapping methods and ideas for local conservation efforts.

**MARCH 13, 1997**

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 p.m. by Robert Schaumann Moderator at the Souhegan High School. 246 voters attended. The Pledge of Allegiance was followed by the invocation by Rev. Hans Arnesen of the Messiah Lutheran Church.

Chairman Robert Jackson introduced the Board of Selectmen: Richard Sherwood, Marilyn Peterman, Richard Verrochi and William Overholt. Town Administrator Dana Crowell introduced the Department Heads: Director of Public Works John Starkey, Zoning Administrator Karin Elmer, Assessor Ed Elcik, Chief of Police Gary MacGuire; Library Director Mary Ann List; Fire Chief Richard E. Crocker, Recreation Director James Doane and Rescue Chief Marcia Houck.. Also present was Town Clerk Nancy Demers, Town Counsel William Drescher and Secretary Sharon Frydlo.

The rules of the meeting were addressed by Moderator Schaumann as follows: (1) Yellow cards would be displayed by the voter during a vote. (2) No amendment to an amendment would be accepted. (3) Speakers would be allowed three minutes. (4) No one speaks a second time until others have spoken. (5) Two microphones were set up - one in favor of a particular article and one against. (6) At the mike, the speaker would announce his name and address. (7) Should anyone move the question, those at the microphone would be allowed to speak. (8) No new business would be conducted after 10:45 p.m. unless the remaining voters so desired. A vote to restrict reconsideration, according to RSA 40:10 was also passed.

There were seventeen warrant articles, No. 23 would be voted by ballot according to law. Articles 1-6 were voted on by ballot on March 11th.

**Article 7.**

To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 202-A:4-d authorizing the Library Trustees to accept gifts of personal property, other than money, which may be offered to the Library for any public purpose; provided, however, that no acceptance of personal property by the Library Trustees shall be deemed to bind the Town or the Library Trustees to raise, appropriate or expend any public funds for the operation, maintenance, repair or replacement of such

personal property and such authorization shall remain in effect until rescinded by a vote of Town Meeting or take action relative thereto. **(The Selectmen recommend a yes vote.)**

Motion was made by Selectman Richard Verrochi to adopt Article 7 and was seconded. This was a housekeeping article. State law provides that Town Meeting may authorize the public library trustees to accept gifts of personal property other than money, which may be offered to the library for any public purpose and shall remain in effect until rescinded by a vote at Town Meeting.

Article No. 7 passed. A motion to restrict reconsideration was also passed.

#### **Article 8.**

To see if the Town will raise such monies as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same or take action relative thereto. Said sum is exclusive of all special warrant articles addressed separately. **(The Selectmen recommend a yes vote.)**

Selectman Verrochi moved to adopt this article and was seconded. Question was asked regarding recreation, specifically cemetery fields. Two fields have been approved by the Planning Board. Some work is funded through grants. The Recreation Association will be asking for bids on the project in the spring. The Recreation Association has been raising funds around town and about \$7,000 has been collected.

Selectman Robert Jackson moved the question to adopt the budget of \$4,852,958. Ways & Means approved the amount.

Selectman Overholt moved to adopt an amendment on the budget because of expected revenue from the Amherst Rescue Squad for billing procedures. The amendment was as follows: Shall we reduce the ambulance revenue line from \$63,000 to \$13,000. This does not reflect the bottom line of the budget. It relates only to the anticipated revenue section of the budget which is not part of the appropriations section. A vote on the amendment passed. The budget was then voted on and passed. Motion to restrict reconsideration was passed.

#### **Article 9.**

To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$224 to support the Big Brother/Big Sister Program or take action relative thereto. **(The Selectmen recommend a no vote.)**

Selectman Marilyn Peterman moved for adoption and was seconded. She advised that Amherst residents were assisted by this program. Article passed. Motion to restrict reconsideration was also passed.

**Article 10.**

To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 to support the Greater Nashua/Souhegan Valley Chapter of the American Red Cross or take action relative thereto. **(The Selectmen recommend a no vote.)**

Selectman Peterman moved for adoption and was seconded. Ways & Means approved the article. Passed. Motion to restrict reconsideration was passed.

**Article 11.**

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$111,302 for the purchase of a Champion 740A Grader to be funded in the following manner:

Withdrawal from Capital Reserve	\$109,991
Raised by Taxation	1,311

or take action relative thereto. **(The Selectmen recommend a yes vote.)**

Selectman Richard Sherwood moved for adoption and was seconded. Passed with little discussion. Motion to restrict reconsideration was passed.

**Article 12.**

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$70,000 for the reconstruction of Merrimack Road at the intersection of State Route 122 or take action relative thereto. **(The Selectmen recommend a yes vote.)**

Selectman Sherwood moved for adoption and was seconded. He referred to accident statistics at this intersection. At earlier Town Meetings, we have voted \$17,000 at each meeting. The State had said that it would pay 2/3rds of the construction amount of \$150,000. The new figure proposed was \$350,000. The town could do it for less. Although we have \$42,000 in hand, we need to raise the whole amount since the earlier money was raised for the state project. The other money shown as income item. Further discussion followed regarding sidewalks. Mr. Jackson responded that they will not be added.

Article passed. Motion to restrict reconsideration was passed.

**Article 13.**

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$58,000 for the paving of: Hickory Drive, Maple Street, Douglas Drive and Meadow Lane or take action relative thereto. **(The Selectmen recommend a yes vote.)**

Selectman Sherwood moved to adopt this article and was seconded. He advised that this was in the schedule for road maintenance. Article passed. Motion to restrict reconsideration was passed.

**Article 14.**

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75,000 for the purchase of two parcels of land totaling 6.6 acres and the buildings thereon

known as Map 10 Lots 7 & 8 to be funded by a \$75,000 transfer from the Conservation Land Fund Account or take action relative thereto. **(The Selectmen recommend a yes vote.)**

Selectman Overholt moved for passage and was seconded. He explained that there was 7.5 acres of land. The assessment of the property was set at \$111,000. The house would be used by organizations such as the scouts. The Selectmen wanted to offer \$115,000. Ways & Means voted 7-1 against with the opinion that it would set a bad precedent to pay more than the assessed value.

Selectman Overholt proposed the following amendment: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$115,000 for the purchase of two parcels of land totaling 7.5 acres and the buildings thereon known as Map 10, Lots 7 and 8, to be funded by \$85,000 transfer from the Conservation Land Fund account and \$30,000 from the Bean Foundation with \$0 from taxes. Selectman Sherwood asked that this amendment be defeated so that the Conservation Commission proposal by Jan Woodbury could be proposed. The amendment was defeated.

Jan Woodbury then proposed the following amendment: To delete \$75,000 and insert \$116,750, to delete 6.6 and insert 7.5 funded by \$85,000 from conservation, \$30,000 from Bean Foundation, \$1,750 in donations. There would be no tax impact to the Town. Private donations would be raised by July 1, 1997.

Questions followed regarding annual operating expenses. User fees would offset some expenses. Debate ended and the amendment passed.

Selectman Verrochi offered an additional amendment of \$7,500 for maintenance of the property and adding expenses to upgrade to a public facility. A vote was then taken. The results were 87 for and 96 against. The amendment was defeated.

A vote was then taken on the amendment with the addendum of "on such terms and conditions as the Selectmen deem appropriate". The article was then passed. Motion to restrict reconsideration was passed.

#### **Article 15.**

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a lease/purchase agreement for the purpose of lease/purchasing a tractor/mower for the Recreation Department and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,935 for the FY '97-98 lease/purchase payment (first of five) or take action relative thereto. **(The Selectmen recommend a yes vote.)**

Motion was made by Selectman Jackson to pass the article. Passed with little discussion. Motion to restrict reconsideration was passed.



**Article 16.**

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$18,000 to refurbish Fire Engine IE3 or take action relative thereto. **(The Selectmen recommend a yes vote.)**

Motion was made by Selectman Verrochi and seconded. This was a maintenance item. Passed with little discussion. Motion to restrict reconsideration was passed.

**Article 17. (By Petition)**

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,001 to extend the water main (6" minimum pipe size) from its present terminus to the Fire Station for purposes to fill trucks and provide water for a sprinkler system in the future or take action relative thereto. **(The Selectmen recommend a yes vote.)**

Selectman Jackson moved to adopt and was seconded. Passed. Motion to restrict reconsideration was passed.

**Article 18.**

To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$56,616 to fund the deficit in the 1996-97 Souhegan Regional Landfill District budget appropriation or take action relative thereto. **(The Selectmen recommend a yes vote.)**

Motion was made by Selectman Peterman and was seconded. Passed. Motion to restrict reconsideration was passed.

**Article 20. (By Petition)**

To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 79-A:25 (Disposition of Revenue) and vote to place fifty percent (50%) of the revenues of all future payments collected pursuant to RSA 79-A:25, II, in the Conservation Fund in accordance with RSA 36-A:5, III. The revenue transfer shall be at the time of collection or take action relative thereto. **(The Selectmen recommend a no vote.)**

This article was taken out of order. Selectman Verrochi moved to adopt and was seconded. The Selectmen wanted this article defeated because they want to look at it each year and goes from April to July of next year. Article 19, which they favor, will limit the recovery for the period of March 1, 1997 to July 1, 1997. However, this article passed. Motion to restrict reconsideration was passed.

**Article 19.**

To see if the Town will vote to transfer a sum of money equal to 50% of the current use recovery money paid by March 1, 1997 and place the sum in a special fund for the purpose of land purchase by the Conservation Commission

with the concurrence of the Board of Selectmen or take action relative thereto.  
**(The Selectmen recommend a yes vote.)**

Selectman Verrochi moved for adoption and was seconded. The following amendment was proposed by Mr. Verrochi. To insert "raise and appropriate up to the sum of \$80,000 but not to exceed 50% of the land use change tax collected by March 31, 1997 and place the sum in a special fund for the purpose of land purchase by the Conservation Commission with the concurrence of the Board of Selectmen. Amendment passed.

Hani Durzy then proposed another amendment: To delete \$80,000, insert \$120,000, delete 50% and insert 75%. This article as amended passed with 68 for and 54 against. Motion to restrict reconsideration passed.

**Article 21.**

To see if the Town will vote to rescind the unused bonding authority granted in March 1995 for the purchase of the Bragdon Farm or take action relative thereto.  
**(The Selectmen recommend a yes vote.)**

Motion was made by Selectman Verrochi and passed. Voted to restrict reconsideration.

**Article 22.**

To see if the Town will vote, pursuant to RSA 41:11-a to authorize the Selectmen to negotiate and enter into a long term lease with Bell Atlantic NYNEX Mobile for the construction and lease of a cellular communications tower and compound on Town-owned land or take action relative thereto. **(The Selectmen recommend a yes vote.)**

Selectman Peterman moved for adoption and seconded. Ways & Means Committee opposed this article. Mrs. Peterman advised that under federal law cellular towers could go anywhere. They cannot be zoned out of the town. It was suggested that a tower could be placed at the police station and industrial park so as to access both corridors. Mr. Verrochi advised that approval of the article only gives approve to the Board of Selectmen to enter into a deal. He proposed that the article be amended to delete "Bell Atlantic NYNEX Mobile" - amendment passed.

Trudy Loy of Willow Lane moved to amend that no tower be erected on land that was purchased with Conservation Commission money. After some discussion, this amendment was defeated.

The article was passed as amended. Motion to restrict reconsideration was passed.

**Article 23.**

Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:23-n, allowing for otherwise tax-exempt charitable properties to enter into an agreement with the Town to make payments in lieu of taxes or take action relative thereto? **(The Selectmen recommend a yes vote.) Ballot vote required.**

Selectman Jackson moved for passage and was seconded. There was no discussion. Vote was by ballot. Results: 107 Yes, 13 No.

The gross budget approved was \$5,422,286.

Meeting was adjourned at midnight.

### *The Cover*

The Amherst Railroad Station once stood on the north side of Thornton's Ferry Road I, just east of the Courthouse Road intersection.

Ground was broken in 1899 for the Milford Manchester line by the Boston and Maine Railroad. It took a thousand men to build this line of 18 miles and 29 curves. It finally opened December 31, 1900.

The railroad did not actually go to either Manchester or Milford. It left the Wilton tracks at East Milford, ran parallel to Route 122, and passed to the east of Courthouse Road to the Amherst depot. Its next stop was at the northern end of Baboosic Lake, and then continued on until connecting with the Goffstown Line near Route 114 and Mast Road.

It was built by the Boston and Maine to prevent a competing railroad from building a similar line. It was intentionally made to be slow, circuitous, and undependable. It took two hours to go the 18 miles, and cost 59 cents.

In this 1910 picture, the station was decorated for Amherst's 150th anniversary.

The railroad was abandoned in 1925.
