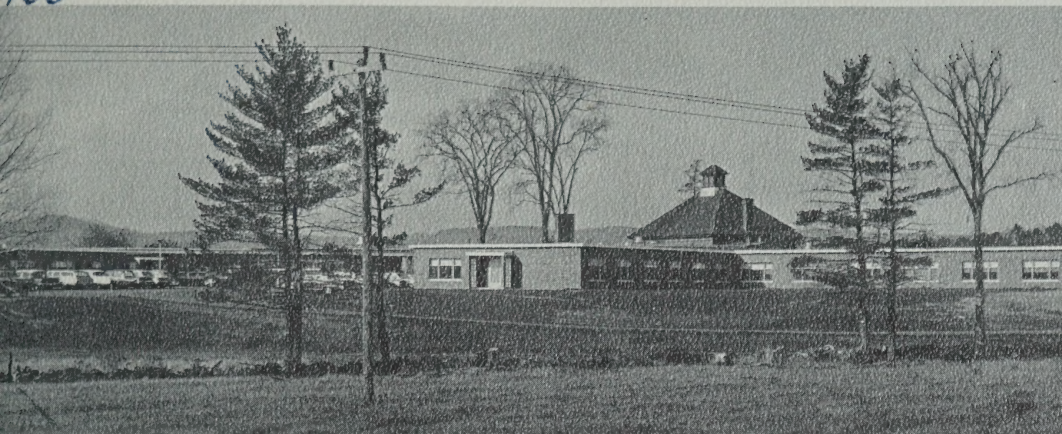

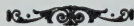

**RECORDS OF COUNTY DELEGATION  
BELKNAP COUNTY CONVENTION  
EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE  
COURT HOUSE - LACONIA, N. H.**

**February 4, 1966**

The Belknap County Convention Executive Committee met with Commissioners Ruel and Atwood (Commissioner Hubbard being absent) to review the proposed 1966 County Budget. The following members were present, Chairman Prescott, Vice-Chairman Normandin, Representatives Guild, O'Shan, Uhlenberg, Chamberlain, Allan and Hayner.

Chairman Prescott called on Commissioner Atwood, Clerk of the Board of Commissioners, to present the proposed budget.

The first items a-d-f, set by statute, e-g by the amount of work entailed.

Expenses of County Officers: Increased \$500.00 - 1965 overdraft explained

**Register of Deeds**

Increased \$105.76. 1965 overdraft \$271.15. Budget requests discussed. Increase in hourly rate for typist on 10 year index, maps same amount each year questioned, new equipment for Photostat copying considered a step towards efficiency.

**Register of Probate**

Increased \$325.00. Judge of Probate, request for clerical help \$250.00.

**Care and Supplies Court House**

Increased \$2,250.00. 1965 overdraft \$49.00. A special appropriation for repairs, extra help for the caretaker.

**Office Expense**

Increased \$1,000.00. Larger salary for manager and full time Welfare worker. The new bookkeeping system considered a saving over the old system.

**Superior Court**

Shows an increase due to extra session.

**Public Welfare**

**County Farm**

Extensive discussion in all phases of operation in both, Farm and Infirmary.

Commissioner Atwood reports, that as of January 1, 1966, rate increased to \$10.00 per day for private patients. Welfare cases starting at \$3.57, does not begin to meet the patient cost.

Superintendent Beach discussed employees, rates and hours worked. He stated an increase of 5c per hour was included in the budget. New equipment needed, for both Farm and Infirmary. Medicare re-



quirements to meet Federal set-up discussed. Representative Chamberlain not in favor of federal interference with County operation. Fewer Surplus Foods are received now, making the increasing food costs still higher.

Chairman Prescott questions the number of nurses as compared to patients. (40 nurses, 80 patients, stated by Supt. Beach) Seems too many nurses. Representative O'Shan states there are many more nurses than employed at V. A. hospital. Supt. Beach replies that all are not regulars, some are part time. Explains fringe benefiths, etc.

Commissioner Atwood cites benefits derived from being considered under the Civil Defense set up, should be of help in purchasing equipment needed. Repairs and Equipment for Jail and House of Correction discussed. New toilets, security windows included in the budget. The number of turnkeys and rate of pay discussed. Supt. Beach states 3 regular men, 2 part time. Four get \$1.75 per hour, Pelkey receives \$94.00 per week plus extra for record work.

**Support of Poor**

Increased \$1,000.00. 1965 overdraft \$422.45.

**Old Age Assistance**

Reduced \$5,000.00.

**Board and Care of Children**

Increased \$5,000.00. (rate and number).

**Veterans Aid**

Same as in 1965.

**Welfare Administration**

Increased \$1,000.00. (Full time worker)

Interest on Notes and Loans: Set amount.

New Construction and Equipment.

Sewer	\$12,500.00

**BELKNAP COUNTY CONVENTION  
EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE  
COURT HOUSE - LACONIA, N. H.**

**February 10, 1966**

The Executive Committee of the Belknap County Convention met on the above date to review further the 1966 proposed budget. The following members were present: Chairman Prescott, O'Shan, Uhlenberg, Chamberlain, Foster, Allan and Hayner. Rep. Normandin came late, due to other business.

Chairman Prescott opens meeting by stating that items a-f are set by law, and that e-g are determined by the amount of work entailed.

Expense of County Officers: Increased \$500.00. 1965 overdraft explained.

**Register of Deeds**

Representative Normandin reports her findings. She was appointed to look into types, prices etc. on copying machine. States she expected to have a full report at the next meeting. Consensus of opinion that the equipment should be procured as soon as possible. Greater efficiency, accuracy and speed of entry would be accomplished in this procurement.

**Register of Probate**

Increased \$325.00.

**Judge of Probate**

Clerical help \$250.00.

**Care & Supplies Court House**

Increased \$2,250.00. 1965 overdraft \$49.86. Special appropriation discussed for repairs \$7,253.40. Also a new rug, for which an estimate of some \$4,000.00 was given.

**Office Expense**

Increased \$1,000.00.

**Superior Court**

The County has no control over Court expenditures. This larger expenditure, due to extra session. Stenographers' increased salary noted.

**Public Welfare**

**County Farm**

Representative Chamberlain discusses extensive farm budget, number of employees, total payroll for all departments increased over 1965. Clerk inquires at to the amount of supplies, maintenance and equipment, amounting to \$37,400.00 included in each department.

At this time it was suggested that Supt. Beach be called down to the Court House to enlighten mem-

bers what constituted some items.

Supt. Beach arrives and proceeds to go through the Farm budget beginning with Administration. Mr. Beach stated that C.P.A. Beane aided with the drawing up of the budget.

Chairman Prescott inquires as to the reason every item is a straight dollar item, citing fact that State Appropriations do not use such procedure.

Supt. Beach replies that Mr. Beane assisted in drawing up budget and since they were unsure of exact amount of expenditures, a flat figure was submitted.

Representative Chamberlain questions size and amount of payrolls. Asks, "Can you afford to give a 5c raise, is it adequate?" Requests number of employees included in this raise.

**Jail & House of Correction:**

Illness and accidents of prisoners helped to increase medical costs.

Food of all types have increased in price, less Surplus Foods are received, most produce raised on the farm are nearly used by now.

Mr. Beach leaves at this time.

It was decided to continue this hearing at a later date since the hour was getting late.

A Public Hearing is to be held to air the 1966 budget on Tuesday, February 15, 1966.

**BELKNAP COUNTY CONVENTION  
PUBLIC HEARING - 1966 BUDGET  
COURT HOUSE - LACONIA, N. H.**

**February 15, 1966**

A meeting of the Belknap County Convention was held on the above date for the purpose of a Public Hearing on the Belknap County Budget as presented by the Commissioners. (copy attached to minutes) The following were present: Representatives Allan, Chairman; Chamberlain, Watson, Matheson, Guild, Uhlenberg, deBlois, Dearborn, Head, Prescott, O'Shan, Foster, Stafford, Urie, Joslyn, Randall and Clerk Hayner. Also present were Commissioners Atwood and Hubbard, County Attorney Brouillard, Extension Service representatives, Supt. Beach, Mrs. Hayes, Director of Nursing, Sheriff Crockett and deputies, also interested spectators.

Chairman Allan opens meeting by stating that the Rules of the House of Representatives would apply to the meeting, however, questions may be asked by addressing the Chair and making self known.

Commissioner Atwood, Clerk of the Board of Commissioners presents the tentative Budget as follows:

First items (a, b, c, d, f) set by statute. Medical Referee and Autopsies (e, g) appropriation based on amount of work entailed as of last years expenditures.

Commissioner Atwood explained the increased costs of Court, over which the County has no jurisdiction, and the fact that for a period there were two judges presiding at two sessions for a number of weeks.

Sheriff Crockett said there was an increase in Court attendance this year, by his staff, because of two Courts and

two judges. The radio was budgeted last year and has given very efficient service in communicating with the small towns. A plan to insure men serving with his office, in connection with riot work, was explained and questions answered as to the feasibility of such insurance, since there was a possibility of serious accident. Representative Stafford commends Sheriff Crockett on the efficient operation of his department.

#### Public Welfare

This Jail & House of Correction increase questioned by Representative Stafford who requests he be recorded in all inquiries.

Supt. Beach replies increase is due to the fact that more subjects are being committed to both the Jail and House of Correction also most are of a fractious type and require more supervision. Three shifts are needed.

All phases of County Home and Infirmary operation was discussed. Supt. Beach was asked by members several questions as to number of help etc. Mrs. Hayes, Director of Nurses, spoke briefly stating that at least 15c per hour increase was not too large, as the fringe benefits were few in competition with the State School who pay a starting rate of \$1.67 1/2 per hour and have insurance. It was also reported that the aides, employed by the County, were now asking for an insurance coverage such as the State plan.

Rep. Prescott asked to have fringe benefits enumerated and also whether vacation or sick leave was accumulative.

Supt. Beach replies in the negative pertaining to the accumulative time. He states that one week of vacation is granted after one year of employment and two weeks after completion of two years work. There are also seven paid holidays.

Rep. Stafford inquires as to competition from the State School. Inquires if the training program had been carried out at the Home.

Supt. Beach replies that nothing could be done as the pay at the School was higher and the benefits greater. The training program had been carried out last year.

Rep. Chamberlain inquires as to the number of nurses as it was stated previously that 40 nurses were employed.

Supt. Beach replies that all are not regular nurses and that some work part time. This is necessary due to illness, vacations and other incidents.

Rep. Chamberlain requests that Maintenance, Supplies, and Equipment, in each department, be explained. It was such a large amount, in all \$37,400.00. It would seem that with a new set of buildings and mostly new equipment that this was a very extensive amount for such operation.

Supt. Beach replies it was a tentative amount or esti-

mate. However, there was a need for some new equipment which should be replaced before long.

Rep. Urie inquires as to the item for postage. He is informed that all mailing was handled at the Commissioners office previously. Mr. Urie inquires further as to how payroll tax was arrived at. He is informed that CPA Beane arrived at this figure on the basis of last years tax. Previously tax had been included in the Court House account.

Rep. Watson asks what effect the Medicare program would have on County operation.

Supt. Beach replies that the anticipation is that Medicare will lighten expenses. This remains to be seen, since many requirements are on the Medicare list, such as a full time pharmacist. Also no aides can administrate medicine. The Laconia Hospital request that five rooms be reserved for care of patients who are convalescing after they leave the hospital and need further care.

At this time Rep. Urie inquires as to whether the County is obliged to take patients from the Laconia Hospital when we have a waiting list for admission to the Infirmary. Rep. Urie is informed that no action has been taken on this request and that Mr. Smith made a personal application to the Commissioners on this request.

Rep. Stafford asks about competition from Laconia Hospital in employment problems.

Supt. Beach replies that we have no competition from them.

Rep. Prescott asks to have a breakdown on the three men employed on Plant etc. After discussion by members, the consensus being that one experienced man would save money and eliminate calling outside firms to make minor repairs to plumbing etc.

Supt. Beach agrees such would be an excellent arrangement, as present two employees are not very experienced.

Rep. Stafford inquires as to whether the sewer is hooked up or not. Commissioner Hubbard replies that the job has been started, however, due to cold weather, had not been completed. Rep. Stafford inquiries why a budget item for sewer was carried. Commissioner Atwood states that this was a nebulous item, but since it was very probable the sewer would be hooked up before too long and that 80% of the water bill was how the sewerage rental was arrived at.

Rep. Stafford inquires as to items under Jail and House of Correction for repairs.

Supt. Beach says that both places are in poor condition and in need of repairs and replacements. Rep. Stafford asks would it not be cheaper to build a new jail.

Rep. Watson asks where the majority of prisoners come from, is informed, mostly from Laconia.



Rep. Guild inquires as to whether the carpet for the Court Room is included in the budget request for Court House repairs. Commissioner Hubbard replies it was not, that this was simply an estimate which was received.

Rep. Randall recommended that a light be installed outside of the front of the Court House.

Rep. deBlois states he has not been able to meet with the Commissioners in order to bring his recommendations as Chairman of the Court House committee. The money appropriated for paint etc. last year has not been expended for this work. He recommends that some of the people receiving aid from the County be engaged to do some of this work. Mr. deBlois is informed by Commissioner Hubbard there are no people capable of doing this type of work on welfare rolls at present.

Rep. deBlois states this is a good budget as set up. Rep. Stafford concurs, but not on the Jail and House of Correction budget.

Commissioner Hubbard reports that after paying all bills, some \$21,000.00 was on hand from the new addition at the County Home. This is to be used, at a later date, to build a home for the superintendent, as previously recommended by the Delegation.

Rep. Guild inquires as to copying machine for Register of Deeds office. Commissioner Atwood replies that this item is on budget, and that she has been informed by other County Registers that a saving was made by having a salary paid the Register instead of fees.

Rep. Guild, Watson and others state this equipment should be procured as soon as possible to make more efficient, accurate recording. Rep. Normandin, who was appointed at a previous meeting to do research as to type, price etc., being absent the matter could not be brought up to date. The clerk had been informed that Miss Normandin would have all the data at the next meeting.

Rep. deBlois stated that he had some other items which he wished to bring before the Convention. Rep. Prescott suggested he bring them before the next meeting since several items were still on the agenda.

Rep. Urie inquires as to how medical supplies are purchased, whether locally or from drug houses. Supt. Beach replies that supplies were bought from several drug houses and some purchased locally. Most patients prescriptions were purchased locally.

Rep. Stafford inquires as to quality of supplies purchased outside, as to how they compared with local houses. Supt. Beach states that they are all standard merchandise.

**Extension Service:**

Mrs. Esther Weeks, Treasurer, presents budget, explaining the many new phases of operation and coverage given the County by the Agents. A small increase of \$1,250.00 included in this budget.

Rep. deBlois asks to be enlightened as to what the purpose of the Service is and the need for same. He is given a very concise resume of the field covered by the agents in Forestry, Farm and Home Economics, Arts and Crafts, and 4-H which is a big asset to the juvenile population in the towns of the County as well as in the City of Laconia. It was brought out that the Belknap County Extension workers are in the low paid group of the State.

Inquiries from Representatives Guild and Foster as to State and Federal participation in salary support.

Rep. deBlois asks who can benefit from the services given only farm families. Mr. Ballard replies anyone who is interested can benefit from the program, cited benefits in production, farm and other for the past year. Also gives organization acceptance by Belknap County of the first Service.

On motion of Rep. Stafford, seconded by Rep. Uhlenberg, meeting adjourned.

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**BELKNAP COUNTY CONVENTION  
EXECUTIVE SESSION**

**February 15, 1966**

After a short recess following the Public Hearing, Chairman Allan called the Executive session to order. Sixteen members were present.

Chairman asks members what is the feeling of the Convention in regard to the Budget as presented. Several members discussed items in the Budget, general opinion being that much work needs to be done on this extensive Budget.

Rep. Urie states that some items can be eliminated entirely.

Rep. Guild states more time should be given to get this Budget in shape. Mr. Guild discusses Itex equipment, changing models \$10,000.00 a large amount invested. Rental discussed, thought feasible, possibility to charge on a fee basis. Towns would be glad to pay so much per copy. Fifty cents was mentioned.

Rep. Urie inquires as to the advisability of renting machine to Register of Deeds. Several ideas offered which would be renumerative for the County in machine expense. Rep. Normandin, detained on business in Boston, was unable to attend meeting. However, she informed Clerk she would give data of research she has done as to type, price etc. most suitable for this Deeds office at next meeting.

Rep. Guild states equipment must be acquired, as soon as possible, in order to have more accurate deeds. Rep. Watson, deBlois and Guild report incorrect copying of deeds causing considerable work and expense in real estate transactions.

A date for another meeting on the budget was discussed. Since Budget must be in order for presentation in the next 30 days, Friday, March 11, 1966 at 1:30 P. M. at the Court House, was the date set for the next meeting.

Meeting adjourned at 10:41 P. M.

**BELKNAP COUNTY CONVENTION  
COURT HOUSE - LACONIA, N. H.**

**March 11, 1966**

The Executive Committee of the Belknap County Delegation met at the above place, time and date to review the 1966 Budget. All members, including the ex-officio members, were present.

Chairman Prescott called the session to order stating he had made a survey for three years past of County Home labor appropriation and expenditures, a copy given members, showing very decided increases in all departments. Budget for 1966 request of \$14,600.00 Administration giving all employees a 5c raise plus vacation etc. Chairman Prescott arrives at \$13,768.00, showing a difference of \$831.00. Several members discussing same, proceeds to further items; Operation and Maintenance and Equipment discussed, consensus of opinion being that Budget is too large.

Rep. Allan states to give the County Home the full amount.

Rep. Urie replies there would still be an overdraft and a request to make up the deficit next December.

Rep. Chamberlain states I do not agree with this Budget. I want to know what we are doing here if the Commissioners spend as they please without any concern for the taxpayer. In the Towns, we give a Budget and instruct our officials to stay within it.

Rep. Allan states that we have no control over the Commissioners' expenditures, all we, the Delegation, can do is recommend.

Rep. O'Shan explains the RSA on overspending, but states this Board of Commissioners' have never heard of that statute or have no regard for it.

Rep. Guild calls attention to the escalation of the payroll over the 3 year period. Since the number of patients has not increased, and with a new building, it would seem less help would be needed, further, he is of the opinion that the Jail should be separate, keeping costs of both impossible to figure, poor management; a trained business administrator needed. The County would save half the salary and certainly the tax burden would be relieved to some extent.

Rep. Chamberlain inquires as to what Mr. Beach's status is?

Rep. Guild replies, "In my opinion, he is a caretaker. This is not to reflect on his ability, I am sure private business would not operate in such a slipshod manner. He has to take orders from the Commissioners', I assume."

Rep. Chamberlain thinks the County should have a train-

ed, qualified Administrator. They would save more than half his salary and have some efficient operation. The make-up of this Budget alone, certainly reflects lack of knowledge as set up.

Rep. Normandin inquires as to who OK's and pays bills. The mounting costs each year, over and above the expected increase in cost of living shows the definite need for a qualified person to administer.

Rep. O'Shan cites several facets where money could be saved with corrective operation.

Rep. Urie states, "This is not a personal matter against the Superintendent. The operation of the Commissioners' disturbs this Delegation year after year, the same thing."

Rep. Guild states we are wasting our time coming here and not doing our jobs by the electorate. The ever increasing tax rate by overspending by inexperienced persons. Again, I state and cite the Area operation, the need of an experienced administrator for that business.

Rep. Normandin presents Mr. Donahoe of the Zerox Copying Co. who explains the approximate cost, per month, on rental basis as \$95.00 for 200 instruments. Discussion as to possibility of charging for copy to persons requesting same. Such moneys to be allocated towards payment for rental.

Rep. Allan states he is sure the towns would be glad to pay for such a service. All copy acceptable to Courts as permanent records, a metered service for 2000 instruments per month, extra copy may be procured, if needed at 3½c per copy.

Rep. Urie states Register of Deeds now on fees, other than some understanding was reached with the Register, as to allocation of fees for rental or some percentage of same, it would not be necessary for him to return fees under the law.

Rep. Uhlenberg moves that Rep. Normandin be appointed to make further survey as to type best suited for Belknap County. This vote was unanimous.

Rep. Guild presents Mr. Gilbert and Mr. Hayes of the Itex Co. who in turn explain procedures, cost and use of Micro Filming, Projection recording by camera exposure. The Laboratory being in Syracuse, N. Y., more and smaller binders and since space was at a minimum, in most vaults, this is a definite saving aspect. Both sides of paper properly filmed will last 500 years. The larger Universal Camera costs \$3,500.00, smaller \$1,800.00. Five thousand instruments per year @ 46c per sheet, 35c per week mailing approximated cost \$2,300.00, plus purchase of equipment. Indexing discussed, thought more advisable to make a five year index

than ten. A sulphate paper used for fusing, also the smaller binders used. Discussion and several questions by members answered. Ended with suggestion consideration would be given at a later meeting since such a large amount of money was entailed.

Rep. deBlois gave a concise cost report of Court House repairs and replacements, which was accepted by the Committee, with thanks for the time and work put into this report, on motion of Rep. Uhlenberg, seconded by Rep. Chamberlain and carried unanimously.

Discussion reverts to the copying machines and further to the Budget requests of the Register of Deeds office as to increase of hourly rate to typist, map procedure, and supervisor salary. It was reported a new typewriter had been bought for that office and the budget not passed yet.

Rep. Guild states definite action should be taken to improve the efficiency of that office as well as the accuracy. Four members present state problems with deeds improperly copied, not correctly typed, which could cause serious legal problems.

Rep. deBlois calls attention to the fact that the County had not put a bid in to the Urban Renewal for land back of the Court House. Mr. deBlois requests the Commissioners be notified if other bids are received, as the County should have the land.

Meeting adjourned at 5:29 P. M. on motion of Rep. Uhlenberg, seconded by Rep. O'Shan.

The Executive Committee met at Belknap County Court House with the following members present: Chairman Prescott, Vice-Chairman Normandin, Representatives Guild, Uhlenberg, Chamberlain, also present were Representatives Allan, Chairman of Convention, Vice-Chairman Urie and Representative deBlois, Chairman of Court House Committee, who presented his report of findings on the Court House Budget, for which no break-down was included in the 1966 Budget.



The principal overage in the expense being the increased number of Court days, two sessions since the fall term of Court. Also large electric light bills, longer working hours for the janitor, an assistant has been added who receives \$15 to \$20 per week, extra labor, more snow plowing, continued use of florescent lights causing bulb replacement. The greater part of stated expense all due to Court session over which the County has no control.

Representative deBlois discussed insurance coverage with Commissioner Hubbard, who stated 80% of value coverage on County insurance, an increase of \$500.00 placed on property, in order to get cheaper rate. A rebate of \$800.00 expected from buildings demolished, this would revert to general fund. Next year a line item Budget will be presented.

Office Expense shows increase with only one person employed in Commissioner's office. Later discussion. Representative Urie inquires as to why increase when only one employed. Rep. deBlois replies Bookkeeper receives \$100 per week plus extra help for typing when needed, included in Budget. Also Auditors' payment for work included.

Representative Normandin reports on copying machine for Register of Deeds office. She discussed machine with Mr. Raymond who stated he did not want machine in his small office, was of opinion all fees should go to him regardless of who paid for machine. Various types, prices and work turned out by machine is discussed, those most efficient and least expensive for County to operate. Who would pay person to operate machine, several operators could be destructive, a person experienced or one person should have knowledge of operation, matter should be handled amicably with all concerned. Further investigation necessary.

Discussion as to Court House and Office Expense ensued. On motion of Rep. Guild and seconded by Rep. Urie and carried, that the 1967 Budget for Court House and Office Expense be submitted as a line item.

Chairman Allan asks if it would be possible to add \$500.00 to County Officers Expense to pay for Committee on eminent domain for sanitary fill. Rep. Prescott replies a special appropriation could be inserted in Budget. This will be brought before the whole Convention at the later meeting. Executive Committee in favor of appropriating \$500.00.

Meeting adjourned at 7:35 P. M.

Representative Guild inquires as to County Officers overspending, Clerk states items charged to this expense as recorded at previous meeting.

Representative Prescott, on Register of Deeds appropriation.

Representative Normandin reports findings on Copying Machine. Itex type expensive, not out on rental basis. Not enough money in Budget to procure same this year. Zerox machine can be rented, and if not satisfactory or does not answer purpose required, can be returned at any time. Rental approximately \$95.00 per month for 2,000 instruments plus some material. \$1,500.00 would cover expense for balance of year. In discussion with Register of Deeds, he wishes to retain fees since, under the law, he is not on salary. Discussion as to who would pay person to operate machine. One person could operate machine and do other work in Deeds office. On motion of Rep. Normandin, seconded by Rep. Uhlenberg and



voted in the affirmative, that the sum of \$1,500.00 be appropriated in the Budget to procure this machine as soon as possible.

Several members stated that towns would be willing to pay for copies of deeds and other instruments which could be used to defray expenses of copying machine. Rep. Guild states Probate office could use such a machine. Copying or microfilming wills etc. should be made permanent records. Also state Legislature should take action to have Register of Deeds put on salary next session.

Discussion as to Ten Year Index. Consensus of opinion being that time and expense could be saved by compiling a five year index 1955 to 1960. Possibility of using copying machine and eliminating cost of Supervisor and typist, which entails a sizeable amount of money. Action should be taken to reduce this expense. A motion by Rep. Normandin, seconded by Rep. Prescott and voted unanimously

"That the 1966 Budget for Ten Year Index be approved as submitted, providing that a Five Year Index 1955 - 1960 be completed separately."

Care & Supplies, Court House. Rep. deBlois reports his investigation of all items. Gave a complete report of repairs etc.

Rep. Prescott states all items should be for a specific purpose and so state non-transferable. He so moves, seconded by Rep. Urie and carried. That a line item Budget be submitted in 1967. This 1966 appropriation not transferable, any moneys not expended for items named must remain in General Fund.

#### **Office Expense:**

Discussion as to increase, since only one person employed this year, payment for Auditor work included, also some extra typing, when necessary.

#### **Superior Court:**

Shows definite increase, due primarily to extended Court session; more Jurors needed, increase of stenographer's salary, new typewriter, etc.

#### **Sheriff & Deputies:**

Increased number of days Court attendance, increase in salary for Deputy Sheriffs.

Sheriff's request in the amount of \$180.00 for men engaged in Riot duty or other emergencies insurance coverage. On motion of Rep. Guild, seconded by Rep. Stafford and carried that this amount be included in the Budget.

#### **Public Welfare: County Farm**

Lengthy discussion on several items, labor, maintenance, repairs, miscellaneous etc.

Reductions were made in several items, amounting to \$5,375.00.

**Jail & House of Correction:**

Several items of repairs & replacements were requested and on recommendation of Rep. deBlois, who made a survey of needed repairs and replacements \$3,500.00 was deleted from appropriation requested.

**Support of Poor:**

Based on last year's expenditure.

**Old Age Assistance:**

Reduced from previous year.

**Board & Care of Children:**

Increased due to number of children in custody of County and the increased cost of living.

**Veteran's Aid:**

Based on last year's expenditure.

**Welfare Administration:**

Increase due to full time worker.

**Interest:**

Reduced as per payment schedule.

**Indebtedness:**

Set amount.

**Surplus Foods:**

Same amount as last year.

**Extension Service:**

Discussion as to need for increase in appropriation. Rep. Uhlenberg states staff next to lowest paid in State, Budget request very low.

**Airport Authority:**

Rep. Urie of opinion budget should be reduced, as service not good.

Rep. deBlois replies, airport is an asset to all of the County, Laconia carries the major expense, county share very minimal.

**Retirement & Social Security:**

The greater number of employees at County Home reduced amount shown in Budget, included in County Home Budget.

Rep. Normandin spoke on the new Mental Health Clinic, stating need for financial backing.

Rep. Urie replies that this is not a County proposition as all towns are being asked for donations, are also taxpayers in the County. We should consider our constituents giving twice.

Rep. Guild replies this is a good set-up for Belknap County.

Rep. Urie: The necessity or value of Mental Health Clinic not the question. Many worthy causes need money. Motion by Rep. Uhlenberg, seconded by Rep. Guild and voted in the negative, by show of hands, that a sum of money to be included in the Budget for this purpose. Motion lost.

Rep. deBlois: States that Appro. \$500.00 is needed for monthly cable service. Cost is \$60.00 per month. Private donations will take care of balance. On motion of Rep. deBlois, seconded by Rep. Guild and voted unanimously, that the sum of \$500.00 be inserted in the Budget to pay for this T.V. cable.

On motion of Rep. Uhlenberg, seconded by Rep. Chamberlain, the sum of \$500.00 be included in Budget to pay for Investigating Committee for sanitary fill. Vote, Yeas & Nays, 15 of 16 members present voting, one not voting.

On motion of Rep. Uhlenberg, seconded by Rep. Guild and voted unanimously that the 1966 Budget be accepted, and passed as presented.

A meeting of the Executive Committee of the Belknap County Convention was held at the Commissioners' office, on above date, at the request of the Commissioners' with the following present: Representatives Prescott, Chairman; Normandin, Vice Chairman; Guild, O'Shan, Uhlenberg, Chamberlain, Foster, Allan and Hayner ex-officio. Also present were the three Commissioners and Certified Public Accountant Dana Beane.

Chairman Prescott opens the meeting by reading a



letter from the Commissioners relative to borrowing money in anticipation of taxes, further stating that Mr. Beane was present and the expenditures for the quarter January, February and March would be reviewed and the new accounting system explained.

On motion of Rep. Allan, seconded by Rep. Uhlenberg, and voted unanimously that:

“The Commissioners of Belknap County be authorized to borrow the sum of **Seventy Five Thousand Dollars** (\$75,000.00) in anticipation of taxes for the year 1966.”

Mr. Beane was then called upon to explain the new system of bookkeeping and the budgetary set-up. Item by item from all departments showed expenditures well within the amount budgeted. All statements are on a monthly basis.

Commissioner Hubbard discussed Court House repairs. Rep. deBlois to be consulted as to bids etc. It was asked whether one or two coats of paint was included in bid, also other items needing explanation and those persons receiving bids to perform work.

Commissioner Atwood discusses Medicare with information from a recent meeting attended at Hanover. As yet, not a very workable program with much to be adjusted.

Commissioner Hubbard is of the opinion that \$75,000.00 is not enough to carry business through until taxes are received. Chairman Prescott replies that should an emergency arise a meeting could be called at a later date.

Discussion follows as to the increase in number and expense of Dependent Children. Since the Courts remove the children from negligent parents and recommend foster care, the greater number of dependent children are from non-settled parents. This reverts to the County for care and placement, and is an ever increasing problem.

Rep. Guild inquires as to the date for tax payment to the County. Commissioner Hubbard explains the apportionate town share. Commissioner Atwood reads the apportionate share of all the towns in Belknap County for the current year.

Discussion followed as to communications, inter-com etc. with Laconia police in case of help being needed. Commissioner Hubbard replies that no action is needed at this time as this can be worked out under the present system.

A Public Hearing was held at the Court House on the above date with the following present: Representatives Allan, Chairman; Watson, Matheson, Guild, Uhlenberg, deBlois, McCarthy, Dearborn, Head, Prescott, O'Shan, Foster, Stafford, Joslyn, Randall and Clerk Hayner. Also present were Area Commissioners Baker, Noreen, Millham and Randall, Area Manager Warner, County Attorney Brouillard and members of the press.

Chairman Allan opened the meeting stating purpose and recognizing Dr. Baker, Chairman of the Area Commission, for the current quarter, who outlined the need for replacement of the Constam facility which is now obsolete and no longer manufactured. The upkeep and replacement of parts is also too expensive in comparison to the Doppelmayr.

The gross price of the new lift is approximately \$40,000.00, a firm bid, and deposit of more than \$12,000.00 has been placed for all of the old equipment except the motor and electric controls which are usable and in good condition.

The Doppelmayr firm guarantees installation before December 1, 1966 should the order be placed immediately. Dr. Baker stresses the necessity of a new T-Bar in view of the National Eastern Junior Alpine Championship coming to the Area next winter. Credit was given the Winnepesaukee Ski Club and the Gilford Outing Club as being instrumental in bringing this big event to the Area.

Commissioners Noreen and Randall outlined the anticipated revenue and expenditures for the coming year. The 1965-66 winter season was not a particularly good snow year, however, receipts were within \$25,000.00 of 1964, which was a banner year. The record revenue of 1964 was achieved with only one double chair lift, whereas, there are two such double chair lifts in operation now.

The original \$40,000.00, as set up in the by-laws to be held in abeyance, should be nearer \$80,000.00 since the facilities have increased over the years, it was stated.

Dr. Baker states that to insure the Area of continued patronage by out-of-staters, early attention should be given to improving Route 3 leading from Route 93 to Laconia. Emphasis was placed on this, or else skiers may come to bypass the Area in favor of those Areas more accessible over good highways.

The percentage of skiers coming into New Hampshire is 64.2% from Massachusetts, 19.9% are from New Hampshire and a three plus percent from New York, Connecticut and Rhode Island.

The Convention was reminded that a new Commissioner, or re-appointment of an existing member of the present board, would take place before September 15, 1966. Commissioner Millham is slated to become Chairman.

Meeting adjourned, executive session to follow.

The Executive Committee of the Belknap County Convention held a meeting at the Commissioners' office to review the quarterly expenditures for Belknap County. The following members were present: Representatives Prescott, Chairman; Guild, O'Shan, Uhlenberg, Chamberlain, Foster and Clerk Hayner. Also present were Commissioners Ruel, Atwood and Belknap County Home Superintendent Beach.

Item by Item, as submitted by Certified Public Accountant Beane, was discussed.

- 211-265 All within the amount budgeted.
- 271-276 Court House - shows an increased expenditure over the six month period, fuel payment, given as the reason for increase.
- 281-293 Court within amount budgeted, however, current bills received in July not included in statement.
- 301-308 With the exception of 304, Board and Care of Children, the number which had been increased since the budget was passed also the rates for care had been increased.
- 321-323 Was discussed, primarily the labor and the staff at the County Home. Superinten-

dent Beach of the opinion that 7:00 to 3:00 shift overstaffed, 15 being employed. The 3:00 to 11:00 and 11:00 to 7:00 need more help.

Commissioner Atwood gives comparative rates of pay at the Lakes Region Hospital and the Belknap County Home, stating that since the 1966 budget had been set it was impossible to give increases requested by employees, consequently, some had found other employment, with higher pay, elsewhere.

Items 331-335 Interest and payment set by agreement with bank proposals.

341-358 Miscellaneous items. Social Security shows overdraft of \$62.00, explained as a carry over from 1965 of combined Court House and County Home.

Commissioner Ruel reported on Court House repairs which are nearly completed.

Commissioner Atwood reported the Dump Committee did not expend \$500.00 appropriated, a balance of \$222.02 unexpended.

Commissioner Ruel reports of a saving in purchase of jail equipment.

Rep. Guild discusses equipment for Register of Deeds office.

The first installment of County Taxes paid by all towns except Tilton and Gilford.

Commissioner Ruel suggests the possible incentive of 1% allowance for payment previous to due date (July 1 or December 1) This suggestion considered favorable.

Superintendent Beach states that he has been unable to hire a maintenance man, as included in the budget, with one salary to replace two current employees.

General discussion as to Medicare. Discussed was cost per patient day, private patients, patients under the categories of welfare etc. Consensus of opinion being that not enough reimbursement for the type and amount of care given. Suggested next legislature request larger payment for welfare cases.

Belknap County Delegation met September 15, 1966, at 7:30 p.m. at the Belknap County Court House for the purpose of electing a Belknap Recreation Area Commission.

Eighteen members were present: Stuart B. Allan, H. Tom Urie, Olin Joslyn, Earle F. Randall, George Stafford, Claude Foster, David O'Shan, Oscar C. Prescott, George Head, Margaret E. Normandin, Ann Dearborn, Walter McCarthy, Romeo deBlois, Frank Uhlenberg, Lawrence Guild, Keith Matheson, Lyle Watson, Kenneth Chamberlain, Sr.

Two members were absent: Eda St. John and Helen Hayner. Best wishes and a speedy recovery was expressed from the delegation to the Clerk, Helen Hayner.

Chairman, Stuart Allan read a letter from Commissioner Harold Noreen asking for a second term on the Area Commission. Harold Noreen was nominated for a five-year term as commissioner for the Belknap Area Commission by Representative George Stafford. Nomination was seconded and Representative Urie moved that nominations be closed and the Clerk cast one ballot for Harold Noreen. The vote was unanimous.

Representative deBlois discussed the repairs of the Court House and asked permission that the money not used for a specific item be used for other repairs which are necessary.

At this time \$5,843.40 has been spent and the budget was \$7,723.35. Representative Stafford stated that the delegation had not the authority to delegate the money, that this is the responsibility and job of the County Commissioners, that no member has the authority to supersede the Commission's authority.

Representative Urie stated that we do have the authority to vote that the money left over be carried over to the next year as a capital building fund and not refunded to the Commissioners.

Representative Prescott stated that the footnote in the budget (that the money not used, go to the general fund) should be left as is. There is no reason at this time to change the footnote.

Representative deBlois made a motion to amend the footnote, that repairs that are found to be necessary will be done in the Court House as long as the budget is not exceeded. Motion was seconded by Representative George

Stafford and the vote was unanimous.

Representative Stafford stated that Representative deBlois has saved money by watching the repairs of the Court House and taking an interest beyond the requirements of his office and a vote of thanks was due Representative deBlois.

Representative Chamberlain brought up the problem of the Gilford property adjoining the Gunstock Recreation Area. The Chairman of the Area Subcommittee stated that action is being taken; that a meeting of the Subcommittee with the Area Commission was had and a survey is being made by Sanitary Engineers and at this time the Delegation could do nothing. The Area Commission and the State Board are working together to study the problem. At a future date the Delegation will be informed of the progress.

Motion to adjourn was made at 8:25. It was duly seconded and the vote was unanimous.

The quarterly meeting of the Executive Committee was held at the Commissioner's office on Wednesday, November 9, 1966. Chairman Prescott opened the meeting at 2:17 P. M. with the following members present: Representatives Guild, O'Shan, Chamberlain, Foster, Allan, Clerk Hayner. Also Commissioners Ruel, Atwood, and Farm Superintendent Beach.

Reviewing the County expenditures to date, the first seven items are all within the amount budgeted. Several other categories and departments appear to have adequate funds to end the year unless some unforeseen emergency should arise.

The major problems seem to involve the categories of Welfare, especially the Board and Care of Children, which is ever increasing due to neglected children being placed in foster homes. There are some disturbed children which need special care. Most placements are made by court order.

Discussion ensued. Several opinions from members are given. It is noted that the cost per month had increased. The month of September showing that \$2,867.45 had been paid

for care. Commissioner Ruel states that at least \$5,000.00 would be needed to pay for the next two months, however, he was of the opinion that adequate funds were unexpended in other budget items and could be transferred to take care of this added expense. Commissioner Atwood states that more Old Age Assistance cases had been taken on and also that Direct Relief had increased due to the House of Correction committal of fathers. Commissioner Atwood states permission is not necessary to transfer from one department to another, that it is within the power of the Commissioners' to do so. Mrs. Atwood also stated that since, at this time, there seems to be adequate funds to finish the year the Convention would be called in at a later date to review the expenditures.

Rep. Guild states he has had a letter from Dr. Harris in regard to the Mental Health Clinic which is in need of financial support. The sum of \$5,000.00 was mentioned.

Rep. O'Shan inquires as to reimbursement for children from parents. Commissioner Atwood says that the County Attorney collects all that is possible.

Meeting adjourned at 3:35. No date was set for the next meeting.

## BELKNAP COUNTY CONVENTION

LACONIA, NEW HAMPSHIRE

COURT HOUSE

November 30, 1966

The Belknap County Convention met at the Court House to hear the annual report of the Area Commission with the following members present: Representatives Watson, Matheson, Guild, Uhlenberg, McCarthy, deBlois, Dearborn, Normandin, Head, Prescott, O'Shan, Foster, Stafford, Joslyn, Randall, Hayner. In the absence of the Chairman, Vice-Chairman Urie presided. Also present from the Area Commission was Ide, Randall, Noreen, and Area Manager Warren Warner.

The report, as presented, was most encouraging with a projected increase of more than \$70,000.00 in gross business seen feasible in the new fiscal year.

Reporting for the past fiscal year, December 1, 1965 to November 30, 1966, the Commissioners explained the Area



has overcome the disastrous year of 1964-1965, when gross income fell to \$184,827.00 as compared to \$312,934.00 for the year just ending, or a loss in potential gross income of about \$128,000.00.

At the present time, Commissioners said the Area is operating in the black, and it is foreseen that with good skiing conditions, as forecast, it could realize a gross income of \$385,000.00 by this time next year. It was also reported that in spite of the bad snow business of 1964-65 the Area did not cost Belknap County taxpayers extra, although all cash savings had been used in making up for income loss.

Chairman Urie pointed out that the New Hampshire Recreation business had suffered a business loss of an estimated nine million during the same period.

The loan authorized by the delegation for the installation of a new T-Bar on Tiger Trail had been utilized and that the installation of the lift was about 90% complete, that the cable for the operation had been spliced and the T-Bar would be hung today.

It was also reported it had not been necessary to use any of the \$40,000.00 authorized for operation and maintenance.

Lengthy discussion ensued as to the need for better highway facilities leading to the Area, and for better road signs directing traffic to the Area.

Discussion as to leasing the restaurant and concession to private parties did not seem feasible, as this had been considered at a previous time but that all proposals received indicated no increase in revenue through private operation.

Mr. Ide stated the Area Commission is most anxious to encourage, in the Area vicinity, building motels and hotels not only as a tax benefit to the town but to increase the number of people using the Area.

Better signs were discussed. It was pointed out that not many areas for location are available along the State highways and the costs are very high. The one sign on Route 93 now costs \$110.00 per month.

Purchasing locally as much merchandise as possible to help local manufacturers and wholesalers was advised. It was agreed that the Area was a day, family operated Area and would remain so until better roads and more restaurants were developed in the immediate area.

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**REPORT OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS**

To the Residents of Belknap County :

On June 25, the Belknap County Home was dedicated with appropriate exercises. When a few minor details are corrected, the building will be accepted from the contractor.

Many residents have contributed their time and given gifts to make the Home more effective. It is impossible to name them individually, but we do wish to extend our sincere appreciation to all who have had any part in running this county enterprise.

Early in the year, Representative deBlois spent many hours in securing funds for Cable T. V. The donors did not wish to be thanked publicly, but we want them to know that their contributions were gratefully received. The improved T. V. reception is very welcomed by the residents of the Home.

We have had an increase of eleven children this past year, making a total of fifty-five children. Most of the Homes operated by Catholic Charities, in which we have nine children, have had to raise their board and care rate. We also pay for clothing and medical care of all foster children.

In 1966, we distributed margarine, cornmeal, all-purpose flour, whole wheat flour, dry milk, rice, shortening, rolled wheat, peanut butter, canned meat, peas, corn grits, raisins and rolled oats. We served 7,826 persons. The City of Laconia handles and distributes the food to all eligible State, City and County cases living in Laconia. The County makes deliveries to the other towns in the County once a month. We wish to thank the newspapers and radio stations for printing and broadcasting the delivery dates of the Surplus Foods.

We are grateful to all organizations who contributed Christmas food baskets for the needy families.

We wish to thank all personnel at the Home and Court House for their continuing loyal service, and our fellow County Officers for their cooperation. County Attorney Richard Brouillard and Register of Deeds Charles Raymond retired this year. We shall miss their assistance, but welcome their capable successors.

While many County residents are familiar with the services of the County, we will try to encourage more cooperation between County and Town officials. We are ready to meet with any interested groups, and visitors are welcome at the County Home up to 8 p. m. and at the Court House from 9 to 4 five days a week.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the Honorable Board of Commissioners of Belknap County:

I hereby submit a report of activities at the Belknap County Home for the year ending December 31, 1966.

This past year has been a very successful one as we have had an average of 96% occupancy in the Infirmary.

Through the cooperation of the ministerial members and Mr. Earl Anderson, we have been able to fix a prayer room where the ambulatory patients are able to go to pray and meditate. We have also added a protestant pulpit and a catholic altar.

Our occupational therapy class, conducted by Mrs. Caswell, has increased over the past year with enthusiastic interest and results.

The operation of the Jail dropped a little in admissions, but the House of Correction increased a few.

The gardening, our main outside project, yielded us 700 bushels of potatoes; 75 bushels of carrots; 50 bushels of beets; also 50 bushels of turnips, plus freezing, for winter use, 2 tons of string beans, 4 tons of squash and 20,000 ears of corn, besides providing seasonal fresh vegetables.

I wish to thank all who have helped me to make things more pleasant at the County Home.

**COUNTY ATTORNEY'S REPORT**

Belknap County Commissioners  
Belknap County Court House  
Laconia, N. H.

Gentlemen:

I submit herewith my report as Belknap County Attorney for 1966:

**Civil Matters**

There are no civil actions pending at this time by or against the County.

There are three actions for personal injuries and one action for alleged breach of contract pending against the Belknap Recreational Area Commission. These actions of course, are not directly against the County.

**Criminal Matters**

A total of 30 indictments against 20 persons were returned by the two grand juries convened in 1966 for the commission of the following felonies: breaking and entering and committing assault (2); breaking and entering and committing larceny (3); breaking and entering with intent to commit larceny (6); embezzlement (2); forgery (4); grand larceny (11), including five fraudulent checks over \$100.00; and passing forged instruments (2).

In addition, 13 persons bound over for grand jury action waived indictment and had the charges against them disposed of in the Superior Court.

A number of appeals to the Superior Court from district and municipal court convictions on misdemeanors and motor vehicle offenses were disposed of during the year, eight by trial, the larger number by pleas of guilty or with-

drawal of appeals, and others by dismissal or **nolle prosequi**.

Consistent with the policy I adopted some years ago, I requested examinations under the Sexual Psychopath Law of several persons charged with the commission of sexual offenses. It is becoming increasingly evident from the results of such examinations that a legislative review of the sexual psychopath law is needed to correct a very narrow interpretation of the statute by the New Hampshire Hospital and to provide adequate facilities to treat not only sexual psychopaths, but sexual deviates who may not be psychopaths.

A large number of persons charged with the commission of felonies were examined at the State Hospital, prior to trial of their cases, and in two instances, they were found to be incompetent at the time of the commission of the offenses charged.

An increasing number of persons charged with both misdemeanors and felonies were found to be suffering from problems connected with alcoholism. Efforts to have two of these individuals committed to the Division of Public Health Services of the Department of Health and Welfare were frustrated because of the unavailability of facilities at the state hospital for their care and treatment. While Revised Statutes Annotated, Chapter 172 provides for the committal of inebriates, there are no adequate facilities for their care and treatment. This is a matter which should be rectified by legislation at an early date.

### Report of the Protestant Chaplain

To the Commissioners of Belknap County:

I hereby submit my report as Protestant Chaplain of Belknap County Home and Infirmary for the year 1966. The purposes in Chaplain service is ministering to the needs of the religious life. The activities and means may be varied.

Religious services are held in the Auditorium, regularly, on the first and third Sundays of each month, in the afternoon. The Chaplain conducts some of these and Leaders are provided for all. Ministers, lay preachers, young people's and other church groups provide the program. There is reading of the Scriptures, prayer, a religious talk or sermon and hymn singing, and other religious music. Groups of singers have come from the music department of the Laconia State School under the leadership of the Supervisor, who presents solo and choral members by the group, himself, coming for the message and providing for the service. This is much appreciated.

The choir of a nearby church presented a Christmas Cantata in December. This brought inspiration and was much enjoyed. All these are appreciated.

Visits to the Home are an important part of the Chaplain's work. These are regularly made on two afternoons of each week. Calls are made in rooms of residents of the Home, and give opportunity for counsel as desired, cheer and encouragement, a sharing of problems, and the expression and strengthening of religious faith. Religion and health go along closely together. Hospital calls have been made. There have been contacts with the Jail and House of Correction.

The Interfaith Chapel at the rear of the Auditorium is always available to those who wish for reading, meditation, and prayer.

A social and activity program contributes to the well being of persons at the Home, this is not directly a part of the Chaplain's service. Individuals or groups, though not officially related, have had a part in providing for the happiness and contentment of residents in the Home and Infirmary.

To all we extend thanks. We express appreciation to workers and staff, to the Superintendent and Commissioners for great work well done.

**REPORT OF THE BELKNAP COUNTY PHYSICIAN**

To the Commissioners of Belknap County:

The number of residents in the County Home who are financial charges to the Belknap County are relatively few. It is my obligation to care for these individuals.

The larger group, made up of inmates of the House of Correction and the Jail, present an ever constant problem to the administrators of these institutions. I have been called upon often to render medical advice regarding these inmates. Sometimes they are agitated and need a little sedation for a few days; sometimes depressed, they need medication to improve their moods. At times depression has expressed itself in attempts at suicide which must be thwarted. Several times we have advised that the Court remand an inmate to the State Hospital for psychiatric evaluation.

Then there have been headaches, sore throats, ear infections, coughs and colds to be checked and treated. There have been backaches and bellyaches, both real and imaginary.

There was one case of kidney colic.

In the surgical field, a hernia, which developed while the patient was an inmate, was repaired at no cost to the County for the surgeon's fee.

Because I visit the County Home three to five times each week, I am easily contacted for the acute traumatic emergencies. This holds for the inmates and also for the rather large staff of employees. For the latter group, I render emergency treatment and if the employee wishes, refer him to his own physician.

For the past three years the County Commissioners have favored and paid for the giving of influenza vaccine to all the employees who wished to have it, this at cost.

The Nursing Service has been well ordered and good. We have the most difficult nursing cases to care for and yet we have very few bed or pressure sores. This speaks highly for careful nursing care given the patients.

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**REPORT OF BELKNAP COUNTY  
COOPERATIVE EXTENSION SERVICE**

**1966**

To the Commissioners of Belknap County:

County Extension Agents in New Hampshire are employed jointly by the U.S.D.A., the University of New Hampshire and the County Extension Service. It is an "off-campus" educational and informational arm of the University of New Hampshire and U.S.D.A. in fields of Agriculture - Home Economics - 4-H Youth Development - and - Forestry.

**Agriculture**

The County Agricultural Agent has direct responsibility for Extension's educational and information programs relating to agriculture's two million dollar business in the county and other non-farm activities. Dairy Herd Improvement, milk quality, soil and crops problems, business management, tax information, and insect control are examples of farm and home assistance provided. Other activities include agricultural program activities with service clubs and organizations, providing information in the field of Rural Defense and providing leadership in the general area of resource development.

Assisting the agricultural agent, on a coordinated basis, as needed, is a corps of specialists from the University in many fields of work, both farm and non-farm.

**Recent Figures on Belknap Agriculture:**

226 farm families, including 153 commercial farms; on 50,000 acres; average investment per farm \$50,000. Farm output valued at more than \$2,000,000 (14,000,000 pounds milk, 875,000 eggs, poultry meat 282,000 pounds, low bush blueberry sales \$200,000, apples \$75,000, nursery and greenhouse products \$57,000.)

Farms in the county are good year-round buyers: Feeds \$643,000; hired labor \$228,000, replacement livestock and poultry \$89,000, gasolines and fuels \$85,000, machine hire and custom work \$17,000. (these purchases alone are greater than \$1,000,000).

Some examples of activities and accomplishments this year include:

**Corn trials**

For the second year New Hampshire corn trials were



established and harvested on two farms in Belknap County. Fourteen (14) varieties on the Laconia State School farm and seventeen (17) at Royal Mark Dairy in Belmont. The trial data indicate that trials and demonstrations of this sort certainly help to "localize" research work throughout the state and at the same time indicating local performance of these hybrids under routine farm conditions.

### **Engineering**

Assistance was provided to several farms undergoing modernization or new construction. Individual projects involved from \$10,000 to \$100,000 capital investments. Such work includes both dairy and poultry operations. Farm decisions of these proportions need adequate counsel and Extension's assistance.

### **Herd Improvement**

500 cows are enrolled in this work; average gains the past year, over the previous one, include 40 pounds of butter fat and 2,600 pounds of milk per cow.

### **Milk Quality**

Partly as a result of Extension's three-year milk-quality improvement program, two dairy processing plants have adopted producer-milk-quality-control programs.

### **"Horticultural-Round-Table"**

Staged in December for all citizens re culture of fruit, vegetables and specialty crops.

### **Lawns**

Through Extension's public information media an increasing number of homeowners and building contractors seek assistance on the maintaining of established lawns and/or constructing new lawns.

Public libraries, cemetery associations, and private landowners as well, share in this Extension service. The Laconia Public Library has utilized over the years these and other grounds informational services offered by the Cooperative Extension Service.

### **Resource Development**

The Agricultural Agent has been active relative to this segment of responsibility to the University of New Hampshire and to the U.S.D.A.

**Grape Study** - Extension's leadership through RAD's



Agriculture and Forestry sub-committee has helped to establish a "Study on the feasibility of growing grapes commercially in Belknap County."

**Special Soils Project** - a special RAD committee under Extension's leadership has designed a special soils project involving soils around the circumference of Lake Winnepesaukee. This is a two-county venture with cooperating assistance from the Soil Conservation Service at State and County levels. Project is aimed at helping to guide future near-shore developments.

**Beautification** - Extension leadership influence has been considerable toward the success of the recent two-day, second-in-the-nation, Conference on Beautification.

### **The Agricultural Future**

Farm problems ahead include high-land-values and taxes; the scarcity of quality replacement animals; the increasing costs of farm labor (if available) and other cost items and the extensive encroachment of public highways and home developments on productive farmlands.

Farm people will require greater management and technical assistance than ever before!

### **Home Economics**

Today's homemaker faces constant decisions - what to buy?, how to budget the family income?, care for the children and how to stretch her time and energy to cover everything that must be done.

The modern homemaker also searches beyond the home horizons. She wants to understand the problems of her community, her Nation and the world.

When she seeks reliable, unbiased information to help her with her job, the Home Economics Extension Service gives her sound facts and learning opportunities that make her a wiser homemaker, as well as a better citizen.

Extension Home Economics is an adult education program for the homemaker. It reflects the needs of contemporary living with emphasis on consumer education, management and family economics. Understandably, there are many facets to this job that cannot be done in one training period. Each year, however, we try to include the kinds of informa-

tion and skills in our program for which the homemaker has the greatest need.

On this basis, during the year 1966, meetings and/or workshops were held to help Belknap County homemakers

- increase knowledge in the areas of nutrition, food purchasing and preparation.
- become aware of newer foods, their conveniences and limitations.
- gain insight into family life in Brazil.
- understand needs, behaviors, attitudes, and values of family members.
- acquire skills in decision making in family affairs.
- increase knowledge of basic techniques of inside wall construction.
- gain some knowledge of care of the injured or disabled persons.
- learn specific construction skills for making clothing from simple garments and hats to tailoring.
- learn specific construction skills of upholstery, rug braiding, leathercraft, and furniture refinishing.
- more fully appreciate the importance of looking her best.

By means of meetings, workshops, educational bulletins, individual help, newsletters, T.V. classes, newspaper columns, and radio information, Extension fulfills an important function.

Much has been accomplished by reaching young homemakers, and while work with disadvantaged families continues, progress is slow. Hopefully, more can be done in these areas.

#### 4-H Youth Development

It's Big! That's one way to describe 4-H. The Youth Program of the Cooperative Extension Service is a national

organization boasting 22 million Alumni. Over 21¼ million boys and girls are presently enrolled in every state in the U.S.

The 4 "H's" stand for Head, Heart, Hands, and Health. Any boy or girl from 9 through 18 may become a 4-H member by selecting and starting a project. The other main requirement is a willingness to learn by doing. Most members belong to a local or county-wide 4-H Club. As a co-educational organization, 4-H has always recognized that boys and girls should learn to work and play together.

The goals of 4-H are similar to those of the school . . . to help youth to grow into useful and mature citizens . . . to help them use science and the arts to improve their daily living . . . and to help them select and prepare for satisfying jobs.

Your 4-H agent's main objective is to make the County 4-H program available to as many youngsters as possible. Assisting with this responsibility in 1966 were 102 adult volunteers who served as club leaders, project leaders and advisors to the agent. They were helped by 49 older 4-H members who served as Junior Leaders.

Receiving recognition this year for completing milestones in their 4-H leadership careers were: 5 years - Mrs. Ruth Annis, Mrs. Dona White, Belmont; Mrs. Madelaine Decato, Gilford; Mrs. Jane Hughes, Center Harbor; Mrs. Betty Weeks, Barnstead; Mrs. Elaine Smith, Tilton. 15 years - Mrs. Cassie Smith, Gilford; Mrs. Wini Talbot, Belmont; Mrs. June Rand, Tilton. 35 years - Mrs. Gladys Whitcher, Sanbornton.

This year there were 444 4-H members in the county located in all ten towns and Laconia. Most members enrolled in several projects which covered a broad area. 384 enrolled in general interest projects such as Crafts, Careers, Citizenship, Horsemanship, Dog Care, and Safety. 271 took part in Home Economics projects including Foods, Child Care, and Sewing; 125 worked on Agricultural projects - Gardening, Dairy and Poultry.

Most 4-H'ers also took part in activities such as Fairs, Camps, Cooky Sale, Demonstrations, Youth Institute at U.N.H., and Awards Night.

In the early years of 4-H, most members lived on farms. Eventually many rural non-farm youth joined. There has been a recent trend toward more city youngsters taking part. In Belknap County in 1966 there were 97 farm members, 234 rural non-farm 4-H'ers and 113 youngsters from urban areas.



4-H will continue to be available to all children regardless of place of residence.

### Forestry

Why do we need a Belknap County Forester Program? If this question has ever occurred to you, a drive over any one of our myriad of country roads will readily provide the answer. Growing on land that once supported a thriving agrarian society, we now have over 200,000 acres of forest trees in Belknap County. The majority of this land is in small parcels, and is owned by thousands of individuals. A surprisingly large number of these owners seek technical assistance and are encouraged to manage their woodlands wisely by the County Forester Program.

Your County Forester handled 447 requests from woodland owners during the fiscal year of 1966. The resulting accomplishments include: 581 acres of timber stand improvement, 40 acres of tree planting, 61 acres of pruning, 239 MBF of timber marking, and 14 Management plans.

While the County Forester Program can assist woodland owners in forest management, Christmas tree culture, wildlife improvement, maple syrup production, etc., obviously, it cannot provide as much assistance to urban residents who do not own woodland. However, the County Forester Program does include considerable effort concerning shade trees, writing informative news releases, teaching conservation to our youth, and answering requests of an amazingly varied nature.

We must look at the over-all picture and see the obvious values that our forest resources provide now and must provide in the future. The County Forester Program continually changes in order to promote and support the wise use of our forest resources for the greatest number of people and for the longest time possible. How this is to be accomplished is decided by many capable individuals who remain open to any suggestions you may have.

Yes, we need a Belknap County Forester Program. Although its accomplishments are not obvious today, they will play a leading role in making Belknap County a better place in which to live.
