# TOWN WARRANT The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Gilford in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Gilford Elementary School in said Gilford on Tuesday, the 10th day of March, 1970, at 8 of the clock in the forenoon (Polls to be open from 8 a. m. to 6 p. m. at least) to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To see what action the Town will take on the following: Are you in favor of raising and appropriating the sum of \$80,000.00 for the purchase of the Alvah Wilson property in accordance with an option dated and recorded September 25, 1969, \$20,000.00 to be raised by current taxes and the balance by the issuance of fifteen serial notes in the amount of \$4,000.00 each, payable annually, and authorizing the Selectmen to determine the terms and conditions upon which the notes shall be issued including their sale and the time and place of payment of principal and interest?

(This question will appear on the official town ballot and requires a two-thirds vote.)

Article 3. To see what action the Town will take on the following proposed amendments to the Zoning Ordinance.

(1) Amend Article VII, Commercial District, subparagraph A, by adding at the end thereof the fol-

- lowing: "9. Recreational Camping Parks or Campgrounds," and by adding after subparagraph E a new subparagraph F setting forth certain definitions and providing requirements for supervision, location, space allocation, roads, water supply, garbage disposal, toilet and other facilities; restricting use as permanent residences; and licensing procedure with respect to "Recreational Camping Parks and Campgrounds."
- (2) Amend Article III Section C by adding after line 10 thereof certain provisions relating to gravel pits; providing for regrading abandoned entrance roads, or entrances to depleted deposits; restricting activity with respect to such pits during the hours between 8 p. m. and 7 a. m.; and restricting excavations within 100 feet of property lines, roads and shore lines.
- (3) Amend Article V, VI and VII for the purpose of prohibiting more than one dwelling and accessory buildings for each 22,500 square feet of land area in Residential Districts, and 30,000 square feet in Residential Agricultural Districts, such restriction to be inapplicable in Commercial District.
- (4) Amend Article VII, Commercial District, by adding after subparagraph F a new subparagraph providing for site plan approval by the planning board before construction, erection, alteration or use of buildings, roads, parking lots or other permanent improvements, except one or two family residences, in a commercial district, and providing guide lines therefor.
- (5) Amend Article XVI, Definitions, subparagraphs G, H and I by striking out such subparagraphs and inserting three new subparagraphs defining "Front Yard," "Side Yard" and "Rear Yard" for purposes of clarification.

(6) Amend Boundaries of Zones in Gilford, Comcercial Zone, to include a strip of land 300 feet in width on the easterly side of Blaisdell Avenue and extending from the present Commercial Zone southerly to Terrill Avenue.

(The above proposed amendments 1-6 inc. will appear in the form of questions on the official Town Ballot. Copies of the complete text will be on file in the office of the Town Clerk and at the place of the meeting on the day thereof.)

Article 4. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year, including charges for: Town Officers' Salaries, Administrative Expense, Election and Registration, Property Mapping, Town Buildings, Social Security and Retirement Payments, White Pine Blister Rust Control, Dutch Elm Disease Control, Insurance, Planning Board Operation, Dog Damages, Damages and Legal Expense, Civil Defense, Lakes Region General Hospital, Mental Health, Health Officer and Expense, Town Dump, Street Lighting, Welfare, Memorial Day, Water Works, Cemeteries, Glendale Wharves and Parking Lots, Lakes Region Association, Interest on Temporary Loans, Interest on Long Term Notes and Bonds, Payment of Notes and Bonds, Ambulance Service, Town Engineer and Land Purchase Costs.

Article 5. To see what action the Town will take on an Old Home Day observance or celebration of Town's anniversary and to raise and appropriate funds for the same.

Article 6. To see what sum of mony the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Public Library.

- Article 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the Fire Department.
- Article 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of Fire Equipment.
- Article 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the operation of the Highway Department.
- Article 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of a truck for the use of the Highway Department.
- Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,250.37 for the maintenance, construction, or reconstruction of Class V Highways.
- Article 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purposes of the Police Department.
- Article 13. To see if the Town will take the following action in order to provide for an additional full-time police officer during the summer months and purchase, equip, and maintain an additional police cruiser: Raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00, \$2,900.00 to be raised by current taxes and \$2,100.00 to be transferred from the regular police budget.

(Federal Highway Safety Funds in the amount of \$2,500.00 have been approved for payment to the Town upon the adoption of this article.)

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to establish a Conservation Fund.

- Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to restrict the use of the Town Beach including both the Varney Beach, so-called, and the Clement Beach, so-called, to all except residents and taxpayers of the Town of Gilford and their guests under such rules or regulations as may be defined by the Recreation Commission.
- Article 16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of Gilford Beach.
- Article 17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for capital improvements at Gilford Beach.
- Artcile 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Recreation Commission to sell or remove buildings at the town beach deemed obsolete by the Commission, and pay over to the town the proceeds of any such sale.
- Article 19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of the Village Field.
- Article 20. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for capital improvements at the Village Field.
- Article 21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for computer service.
- Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money on the credit of the Town in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell and transfer tax liens upon all real estate acquired by the Town at any tax sale, and title

to all real estate taken by the Town in default of redemption from any tax sale, to such persons and upon such conditions as they shall see fit.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to restrict the use of the Glendale Wharves and Parking Lots to Residents, landowners and their guests from May 30 through October 12 each year.

Article 25. To see what action the Town will take on the following ordinance:

# ORDINANCE Gilford, New Hampshire

An Ordinance Regulating Retail Business, Plays, Games, Sports, and Exhibitions on the Lord's Day.

Be it ordained by the Selectmen of the Town of Gilford, as follows:

Section 1. Retail business, plays, games, sports, and exhibitions are hereby permitted on the Lord's Day, EXCEPT as follows:

- (a) Public dancing after 1 a.m. on the Lord's Day is not permitted.
- (b) No games of baseball, hockey or football, and no games, sports, or exhibitions of physical skill at which admission is charged or donations accepted, shall be held earlier than one o'clock in the afternoon on the Lord's Day.
- (c) No theatrical or vaudeville performances or motion pictures shall be opened earlier than two o'clock in the afternoon on the Lord's Day.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to abandon that portion of the old road lying between Belknap Mountain Road and Hoyt Road extending approximately 300 feet from the Hoyt Road to property of Donald York.

Article 27. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to execute and deliver to Glendale Water System, Inc., without charge, the town's deed of an easement to maintain the corporation's water pipes across the town's land in Glendale where they are now located, and to relay, maintain and repair said pipelines, and to enter upon said land for the purpose, doing no unnecessary damage.

Article 28. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

In accordance with a resolution adopted at the 1957 Town Meeting a motion will be presented to adjourn to the Gilford School in said Gilford on Wednesday, the 11th day of March, 1970 at 7:30 o'clock in the evening to take up articles 4 through 28.

### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

Once again the past year has been a year of increasing activity for all town departments, volunteer boards and committees. Both the resident and the summer population are increasing rapidly and the Town now has more properties, houses, roads, cars, businesses, etc., to administer.

During the year Mr. H. Richard Howarth was hired to fill the newly created post of Town Engineer. He has done an excellent job for the town and has stayed very busy all year coping with existing problems and the new problems created by development of the Town. He has been particularly helpful to the Planning Board and regularly attends their weekly night meeting as well as that of the Selectmen.

The most important area in which Mr. Howarth has worked has been pollution control. The Town is making every effort to keep our streams, ponds and lakes as pure as possible. The primary focus of our attention in the past year was to make sure that the many new septic systems would not pollute or add to pollution. We will continue this effort in 1970 but will also try to remedy existing sources of pollution. Under Mr. Howarth's direction we intend to test every possible septic system along our waterways. We will do this by putting a bright red dye in toilets and flushing it into the septic system. If this dye appears in the stream, pond or lake, it is an indication that the system is faulty and in need of repair. This proposed program was discussed at summer town meeting and at various public hearings. In all cases it received very positive acceptance.

The Town Appraiser, Mr. Wilfred H. St. Laurent, experienced the same increase in work that the other town departments have seen. In 1968 there were approximately 300 property transfers while in 1969 there were 400 plus. Copies of every deed have to be read and checked over to determine if other adjacent property val-

ues have been affected. In 1969 there were 223 building permits issued and here also the appraiser has to visually check the building several times during its construction to determine the final value of the building and its effect on adjacent property values. This means that the Appraiser checks 1300 to 1400 extra properties a year as a result of transfers or new buildings. In addition to the increase in buildings and property transfers there has been an increase in the number of businesses in Town so that more "stock-in-trade" taxes have to be computed.

It is expected that the Appraiser's work will increase once again in 1970 as several large subdivisions are in the planning stage and because the islands are now being subdivided also.

The final town valuation for 1969 was \$44,223,100.00 an increase of  $5\frac{1}{2}$  million over 1968. We expect approximately the same increase for 1970.

We regret to report the retirement of Mr. S. Gilbert Emilio from the property mapping department to which he has contributed so much over the past several years. His labors have created a good base from which Mr. Philip Hodgkins can progress. Mr. Hodgkins is currently finishing up maps of the area abutting Laconia and much of the Winnipesaukee shore front. An assistant has been hired to help in researching deeds to speed Mr. Hodgkin's progress. Currently the Assistant's work is concentrated in the mountain areas at the request of the Conservation Commission. This work is necessary for the tax map and will assist the Conservation Commission to contact large landowners in hopes of keeping our mountains green.

We heartily commend the Road Agent, Mr. Philip Bryant, and his staff for their work during 1969, particularly their handling of the heavy snowfalls of last winter. In addition to the regular maintenance of highways, erecting of signs, and labor on the new salt storage building they completed the work started in 1968 on

the Henderson Road and the new approach to Kimball Road, constructed and completed Hazelnut Road and installed drainage, asphalted Northview Drive and the extension of Liberty Hill Road, regraded and asphalted the Dump Road, and, using T.R.A. funds, started work on the Gunstock Hill Road.

Due to telephone poles in the work area on Heights Road on Varney Point this work could not be completed in 1969 as planned. Our present schedule calls for completion in 1970.

The highway equipment is in good condition at present with the exception of a one-and-one-half ton dump truck scheduled to be traded in 1970. We recommend this vehicle be replaced by a three-quarter ton, four-wheel drive pickup. The pickup would do much of the plowing now done by the Hough Payloader as well as being a very useful year-round piece of equipment.

A salt storage shed has been constructed back of the Village fire station at a cost of \$3,200.00 and one week of the Highway Department's labor. These figures compare very favorably with the projected \$4,500.00 cost. Inside storage of our salt has enabled the Town to buy a less costly grade of salt thereby helping to hold down our Highway Budget.

The ability and integrity of our Police Chief, Charles Reynolds, has resulted in his appointment to the Governor's Crime Commission Training Council by Supreme Court Judge William Grimes, the only town police chief to receive this appointment. Judge Grimes also appointed him to serve on the Belknap County Area Crime Commission.

Requests for police services have increased approximately 18% during the year. A complete report of the activities of the department is published elsewhere in this town report, but we would like to take this opportunity to thank the entire department for a job well done.

In addition to the increase in motor vehicle and certificate of title processing the Town Clerk's office has felt the increased activities of other departments, boards and commissions for whom they do clerical work. There is a steadily increasing demand for research of records, notices of hearings, financial reports, typing, phone calls, photo-copying, mimeographing attendance at meetings and mail service.

Increased population has resulted in continually larger mailing lists for newsletters, tax assessment books, inventories, tax bills, etc. Most such mailings contain 2500 or more pieces and all have to be sorted, stapled, stamped, metered, sealed (or some combination of these) involving many hours of labor.

We are recommending the use of a computer service to prepare tax bills, tax warrants and inventory records. This service will alleviate overloading of the current staff. We are also recommending the hiring of a part-time girl to work under the supervision of the Town Clerk. This girl will concentrate on helping Boards and Commissions of the Town and will attend night meetings of the Planning Board.

Old Home Day was quite successful. The day started with a parade and there were activities thereafter to interest everyone. A quartet from the Barbershoppers entertained before and during the dinner which was held at the Gilford Grade School. Senior citizens were honored and a plaque was presented to Mr. S. Gilbert Emilio in appreciation of his many years of service to the Town. Savings bonds were awarded to Michael Clifford winner of the Town Seal contest, childrens division, and Mrs. Betty Trask winner in the adult division. Dancing and fireworks ended the day's program.

Representatives from the various organizations in town and members of Boards, Commissions and Departments of the town assisted us in making this a most enjoyable day. We sincerely thank them for their time, interest and efforts.

We have requested a larger appropriation for the 1970 observance and Mr. Allan Posnak has accepted the chairmanship. We are sure he will welcome any suggestions, ideas and offers of help.

Memorial Day is customarily observed on May 29th in the early evening in Gilford. This year the program was conducted by Selectman Rowland Keith and was held at the monument in front of the town hall. The Reverend Floyd Kinsley of the Gilford Community Church offered prayers, Mrs. Lawrence Guild, Sr. gave several readings appropriate to the occasion, the Belknap County 4-H Drum and Bugle Corps played "America" and Selectman Edward Needham was the speaker.

Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts and Sea Scouts took part in raising the flag, pledge of allegiance and placing of flowers at the monument, and, later in the evening, at the Pine Grove and McCoy cemeteries.

Flags were placed prior to Memorial Day on the graves of soldiers and sailors in the Hoyt and Grant Cemeteries and near the Carl Richardson and Villie Grant residences.

Our sincere thanks to all who participated in this observance.

A series of consultations was held with representatives from insurance companies covering town property and the School Board. The net result being a combining of the Town insurance with the school insurance. There is no change in the individuality of the coverage and checks will be made out solely to the School District or the Town of Gilford in case of loss. By this combination we have been able to provide increased coverage for buildings etc. at a reduced rate and very slight cost increase.

A summer Town Meeting was held in late August with a considerable attendance. There were many questions about roads, Glendale docks, and town services for summer residents. It was a pleasant meeting and the Selectmen felt that it created more understanding of our mutual problems for the summer residents and for the Selectmen.

One result of the meeting was that the Selectmen requested a boat for use by the Town Engineer, Appraiser and Police Department. The summer residents suggested this boat because they felt that their properties should be checked between ice out and the summer season and again after the season until freeze-up. This request was turned down by the Budget Committee as it was their feeling that it would be less costly to rent a boat for the coming year and then compare rental costs to the costs of owning a boat. This solution is perfectly acceptable to the Selectmen. We do want to emphasize to the summer residents that the Police will be checking their properties but in a rented boat.

An important item for consideration in the 1970 Town Budget is purchase of the Alvah Wilson farm in the village. The property includes the fields across from the Gilford Elementary School and 2,650 feet along the Gunstock River bank. The fields across from the school contain approximately 45 acres and there is another approximate 65 acres beside and behind the school.

The Selectmen strongly recommend that the Town purchase this property. It will add to the Farmer Field property, to the school grounds, to our recreational facilities and most important will help preserve our rural village setting and green mountain backdrop. The purchase has been strongly endorsed by the Budget Committee, School Board, Recreation Commission, Planning Board, Town Planner and Conservation Commission. It will guarantee retention of the present character of the village and will provide immediate room for the school expansion now being planned.

# TOWN ENGINEER'S REPORT 1969

It is an extremely difficult task to create new municipal positions in today's world of rising costs and taxes, but, through foresight and concern for your environment, you acted to establish within your government the office of Town Engineer.

The duties of this office are very diversified, as outlined by the Selectmen in last year's "Town Report," and the need for such a department has been amply verified this past year.

Pollution control, an item of major concern throughout the Lakes Region, received the most attention. A large proportion of my time has been spent taking percolation tests, designing septic tank systems, inspecting septic tank installations and replacement systems, insuring that the installation was done according to the most up-to-date design and construction standards. This area produced substantial revenue for the Town in fees for sewer permits, percolation tests, and plans for submission to the State of New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission.

In 1970, a project will be started to test the existing subsurface disposal systems along our lakes and streams. It is hoped that within the very near future every system bordering our waters will be tested and all sources of contamination corrected.

As can be seen from the report of the Planning Board, subdivision of land has, and continues to, increase at a very rapid rate. Hence, working with this Board is a primary function of this office. Engineering advice on drainage, culvert sizing, soil potential, road geometry, site investigation, etc. is given when requested.

Much time is also devoted to assisting the Selectmen in compiling map information, field investigation of inquiries and requests from citizens, and being a liaison between them and you. This, in turn, takes some of the work load from Mrs. Lorraine Royce, Town Clerk and Administrative Assistant, whose duties have greatly increased.

This office has worked with the Recreation Commission in preparing cost estimates for future projects, designing the septic tank system for the utility building at the Village Field, and reviewing the specifications for the multi-purpose court.

A report on potential land use was prepared for the School Committee for a portion of their land. And, it is anticipated the services of this office will be requested as work on the school building addition progresses.

Perambulation of the Town lines on the Alton and Gilmanton sides, survey of a Town-owned parcel of land, testifying in court, drafting, blueprinting and dump site investigation are among other duties performed this past year.

The \$10,000 allocated for this office has gone far in supplying equipment for the Town. Along with my salary, the money purchased the following:

- 1. 1970 International Scout, four wheel drive.
- 2. Transit, tripod, steel tape (200'), plum bobs, level rod, and pipe pins (for property corners).
- 3. Clinometer (for determining road grades).
- 4. Blueprint machine and supplies.
- 5. Office supplies (file cabinet, book shelves, etc.).
- 6. Field Supplies (crow bar, shovel, etc.).
- 7. Part-time help (for percolation tests).

As anticipated by the Selectmen, a sizeable portion of the allocation was returned to the Town for services rendered. The breakdown is as follows:

The year 1970 promises an increased work load as reflected by the number of building permits, sewer permits, subdivisions and town projects which have been received or are being planned. This has necessitated the request for two part-time helpers, one to help perform percolation tests, and the other, to help test waste disposal systems along our waters and other duties as required.

At this time, I wish to thank the employees of the Town for the tremendous assistance they have given me, and to all of you, my sincere thanks for your hospitality.

In 1969, the Gilford Public Library has been a very busy place. Right after Town Meeting, work was begun to transform the basement rooms into one delightful, cheerful paneled room.

Open house was held on Old Home Day, in August. The Town Seal Contest entries were displayed along the walls. Also, for the occasion, Michael Wallace of the Village Store, loaned one of his original paintings. Mrs. Cynthia Kling has hung some of her work, from time to time, too. The annual book sale, run by the church women, was another huge success. Half the proceeds of this sale go to the library.

The spring meeting of the New Hampshire Library Association was held in Concord. Mrs. Eleanor Lindsay, Trustee, and the librarian attended this together.

The first meeting held in the new room was on September second. The Gilford Library was host to the Central District Advisory Council. Mr. Herbert Kimball of the State Library Commission was the speaker. Thirty-five delegates, from all over the central area of New Hampshire attended. Gilford Library is a charter member of this group. Since April 1969, the librarian has been it's chairman. This has meant many more meetings than the four regularly scheduled. It has been very rewarding.

One of the original dreams of this affiliation was a Statewide Library Card. Last spring, the central District delegates suggested to the State that we put this card into effect immediately. The tie up had been a financial one. Since almost every library in the state desired to see this project become a reality, the wheels have been turning. In June of 1970, if no more snags occur, there

will be a Statewide Borrowers Card. This is only a very small example of how the Council functions. The basic tenet of this group is "better library service for all."

Many thanks to Mrs. Emilio and Mrs. Edwards, my able assistants, to the trustees, and all other friends of the Gilford Public Library, who have made this year, past, a memorable one.

### REPORT OF THE RECREATION COMMISSION

### I. THE VILLAGE FIELD

This year saw Stage III of the matching fund program going into effect. Due to a delay in receiving the "okay" on matching federal funds, the multi-purpose court, adjacent to the tennis courts, was completed too late in the season for general use. However, next spring when the basketball standards are put in place we anticipate a great demand for this facility. In addition to the multi-purpose court, Stage III included the moving of a utility building onto the field. This building will be used for storage and will house rest room facilities. Some renovation has been done and next year's plans call for further refurbishing. Moreover, trees were planted along the road leading to the tennis courts and at the entranceway.

The Recreation Commission, along with the other citizens of Gilford, is pleased with the general use of the facilities offered at the field. With an active Little League program involving over 100 boys, and with a Babe Ruth team, the expense of cutting out a Little League diamond and the installation of a new backstop was a worthwhile investment. Anyone going by the field and seeing the cars lined up at the tennis courts from 7:30 a.m. until dark, can testify to their popularity! This year saw the first Gilford tennis tournament, which hopefully will become an annual event.

With Stages IV and V being combined in 1970, encompasing the lighting of the tennis courts and multipurpose court, the installation of bleachers and further landscaping, the 5 year plan will be completed. The Commission will welcome any suggestions involving further plans for the field.

### II. GILFORD BEACH

And the rains came . . . There is no need to elaborate on the summer weather except to say that it wasn't an ideal beach year. In spite of Mother Nature, the five lifeguards conducted sessions of swimming lessons during July and August. An extensive program of clearing out underbrush and general "sprucing up" was conducted by the beach superintendent and lifeguards prior to the beach opening. In addition a new fence was put up along the road. There were 3,924 public admissions. Total receipts for the beach (public admissions, house guests and motel guests) were \$2,605.43. Applications are now being accepted for life guards, beach superintendent and snack bar operator.

### GILFORD PLANNING BOARD

### Annual Report To The Town of Gilford

### Meetings

Growth — that is the story of Gilford in 1969 as seen by the Planning Board. The pace can be charted by the number of meetings held: from twelve meetings in 1967 and twenty-four meetings in 1968, the Board has progressed this year to fifty-two regular meetings and several special sessions.

### Zoning

More growth — A town's zoning ordinance can be viewed as a concrete plan for controlled community-wide growth. Amendments to it indicate efforts to keep the ordinance abreast of changes in the town. This year the Board considered suggestions for changes in four-teen provisions and is recommending amendments in six of these. In 1968 three amendments were proposed and adopted; in 1967 only one.

### Site Plans and Subdivisions

Even more growth — Site plans approved for commercial development have tripled. Similarly, the Board has reviewed three times as many subdivisions of land as in 1968. Part of this increase is due to new state legislation requiring any subdivision of land to be approved by the Plannng Board after a Public Hearing with abutting land owners. In the coming year the Board will be revising Gilford's Subdivision Regulations to bring them in line with new state legislation and other changes in the community.

The Board is increasingly concerned with safeguards against pollution from sewage systems as more land is subdivided for residential and commercial uses. In this connection the Board has drawn heavily on advice from and inspections by the Town Engineer, Mr. Howarth. His work has been invaluable and the Board anticipates even more need for his services in 1970.

### Comprehensive Planning

And it goes on and on — To channel this growth for the benefit of the townspeople and the town, the Planning Board has continued to meet monthly with Gilford's Planning Consultant, Mr. John Atwood, to develop a Comprehensive Plan for Gilford. It is now completed and summaries are available at Town Meeting. The Planning Board intends to thoroughly discuss and explore this guideline for action with residents and taxpayers in early 1970.

In the coming year the Board and consultant will try to make the Comprehensive Plan operative via more detailed plans for town facilities, a Building Code and a new zoning ordinance. The Board wants to find ways to solicit ideas from the community in all these areas. At the 1971 Town Meeting the new zoning ordinance should be ready for the town's vote. Gilford's share in the financing of this federal-state-local 701 planning program has already been authorized in previous warrants.

### Summary

In sum, 1969 has been a full and busy year for planning activities. Foreseeing an even greater volume in all areas for 1970, the Board gratefully anticipates the assistance of some part-time administrative personnel. We welcome all suggestions and invite residents and tax-

payers to attend our meetings any Monday evening at 7:30 p. m. at the Town Library. We thank the Library Trustees for allowing us to use their spacious and pleasant room.

#### REPORT OF OVERSEER OF PUBLIC WELFARE

This last year of the 60's has well exemplified the transition from the days of mere maintenance at subsistence levels to the days of preventative and therapeutic approaches to those requesting occasional health and welfare help. Rather than wait until people become hopelessly mired in debt and depression before condescending to help, today we are seeking those who can use help at the onset of their difficulties so that by being helped over the initial problem period, they can continue to maintain themselves quite adequately and independently which is their real desire. By supporting adequate nutrition, immunization, and health maintenance programs, we are preventing tomorrow's infirmities and disabilities. By helping with the development of children from infancy through school age, the primary developmental years, sound physical and emotional health for a lifetime is promoted.

We should be further involving our community's teenagers and young adults in the helping process both in town and in the general community at large. Their awareness of today's problems may well preclude those problems being necessary a few years from now. Temporary foster situations are desperately needed for numbers of young children and handicapped persons attempting to return to communities. If we, in town, can approach our fellow neighbors in positive fashion, asking what we can do to help, rather than pointing at a terrible situation, we will all be better for it. Twenty-three families, representing 77 individuals, have received direct relief, surplus food, counseling and/or have been referred to appropriate agencies this past year. It is good to have the school, church groups, individuals, as well as our Pine Grove Park group, working so well together toward these ends. Thank you.

# GILFORD POLICE DEPARTMENT Annual Report



In 1969, your police department continued to be confronted with increased demands for police service. Criminality and traffic accidents increased as a result of the continuing increase in traffic and activity within the town, and we additionally were directly confronted with the problem of recruiting, training, and retaining competent personnel.

During the year, the department experienced a turnover of personnel which left us understaffed many times during the year, and of course, reduced our effectiveness in certain areas of responsibility during these times. The recruiting of personnel to fill these vacancies as they occurred, was extremely difficult due to the limited number of applicants able to pass the entrance examinations, and the keen competition among law enforcement agencies for them. We were able, however, to end the year fully staffed.

In order to maintain the high department standard established in previous years, the training of these personnel and the providing of adequate equipment in order that they might perform most effectively necessarily was an important part of the department activity. In addition to the basic training provided for newly appointed personnel, men attended specialized training at St. Anslem's College and Dartmouth Medical School, as well as courses instructed by the Federal Bureau of Investigation. College attendance began to become a regular activity of department personnel, and in 1969 one man received his Baccalaureate Degree while three others were continuing their college work in degree programs.

In addition to providing the opportunity for training, it was necessary to give some attention to obtaining adequate equipment needed for the carrying out of the police function. A very significant step was taken in this area with the installation of a teletype in March. This piece of equipment connects us into the Law Enforcement Teletype System (LETS) and with every other department in the country with similar equipment. Already it has proven its worth many times over in criminal investigations and the general information available through it. In the nine months of its operation in 1969, 1346 messages were initiated by this department and countless others were received. Also obtained by the department this past year was a snow traveling vehicle. Although obtained late in the year, it has already been extremely useful in checking island property and will continue to be used for this purpose as well as emergency rescue work.

Although busy with recruiting, training, and equipping personnel and the department, we also provided a

great deal of service and protection during the year. This can be most readily reflected in the 3585 calls for service that were answered. This is an increase of 18 percent over 1968 or 544 additional calls.

Criminal activity and investigation continued to require a great deal of time even though the increase in this area was slight. 432 criminal investigations were conducted involving \$25,824.62 in stolen property as well as other types of offenses. This is only an increase of 18 offenses over 1968 which we believe is due in part, to the prevention measures that we have taken. Efforts in this area resulted in fines, savings, and recoveries amounting to \$28,173.50 being returned to the taxpayers during the year.

Traffic law enforcement which always reflects a great portion of the department workload continued to increase due to a substantial increase in traffic on the nearly 100 miles of Gilford roads and highways. During the year, we were called upon to investigate 168 automobile accidents, 25 of which involved personal injury. We continued to utilize the department radar unit in accident prone areas in an effort to curtail the rise in accidents. This resulted in 22,833 vehicles being checked through radar of which, 196 were issued warnings and 90 were summonsed into court. Other traffic enforcement activity included the issuance of 212 defective equipment tags and 634 warnings for other motor vehicle violations.

General patrol, crime and accident prevention, and assistance to the general public continued to be a primary responsibility of the department, and in these areas 284 doors to businesses were secured, 317 motorists were assisted, 576 checkups made, 118 parking tags issued, 1234 private residences checked either regularly or periodically, and 287 lights reported on or off. In order to accomplish these tasks, the cruisers traveled 115,603 miles and private mileage totaled 9695.

Throughout the year, we have attempted to provide you with the service and type of law enforcement that you expect and deserve, and at the same time make improvements that we felt necessary to insure the continuance of effective and efficient service and law enforcement in the future. This, as you can see, is being accomplished by securing the equipment necessary to perform the job properly, and by making college and other appropriate training available for all personnel. This, we are sure, will result in true professional police service by a professional police department. This goal can only be reached however, through your continued support and assistance which you have so abundantly provided in the past, and for which we are most appreciative.

## REPORT OF THE GILFORD FIRE DEPARTMENT 1969



Your Fire Department responded to 88 requests for help this year as follows:

21 House

26 Miscellaneous

17 Wood and Grass

1 Call for Mutual Aid

11 Cars

12 Answered Mutual Aid

Compared with recent years, Gilford's 1969 dollar fire loss was very low. We are grateful to our residents and visitors who are responsible for this good record. Your full-time and volunteer firefighters also feel that they are partly responsible. Because of a well-trained force of men who have a high morale and interest in doing the job right, they are able to respond quickly and knock down fires in a minimum of time.

Chief Thompson has stepped up the program for home inspections of fire hazards and pre-fire planning in homes

and businesses. Our full-time men are now taking advantage of training in modern firefighting techniques at the Laconia Department at no cost to the town.

This year Mrs. Edith Gardner sponsored and assisted us in getting the State Legislature to pass a Bill renaming the Training Center on Rt. 11-C. It is now known as the Almond "Red" Watson Civil Defense Training Center and is a fitting memorial to our beloved friend and former Fire Chief.

Improvements to our department during the past 12 months include: installation of a Flex-Alarm System a monitor at the village station will immediately signal trouble when connected with a fire or smoke detection device installed in a building; purchase of a foam eductor for fighting airplane mishaps and large flammable liquid fires; adding tool compartments and collapsible bag to our Forestry truck which is now completely outfitted for woods fires; and getting the "bugs" out of our new 1,500 gallon pumper-tanker which now appears to be in top running condition. Also a Dry Hydrant has been installed on Varney Point Road near Fay's Boat yard; this gives us an unlimited supply of water for Varney Point and Vicinity. We have made plans for future additional dry hydrant sites with the help of the County Soil Conservation Service.

Chief Thompson has joined with several other N. H. Fire Chiefs to form a Council to attempt an updating of the State Fire Laws (some of which are very archaic). The Laws cover towns which do not have local fire ordinances and codes.

The Departments' hose-laying team, which includes volunteer and full-time firefighters, took part in several contests this past summer and brought back 5 first, 2 second, and one third place trophy. The team set an all-time record for this area with a 15.1 second  $2\frac{1}{2}$  inch hose lay at Gilmanton Iron Works.

We continue to feel that as our town grows, our Fire Department must grow with it. We appreciate the support that the townspeople have given us in the past to improve, and hope that you will carefully consider our requests for growth in the future. We solicit your ideas and suggestions by telephone, letter, or in person — the door to our Central Station is always open.

## REPORT OF THE FOREST WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

The 1969 fire season was a quiet one in this area. Frequent rains kept the danger to a minimum and there were few violations. Your Forest Fire Warden's job would be easier if everyone understood the State laws that govern the kindling of outdoor fires. A synopsis of these laws follow:

#### **Fire Permit**

A fire permit is needed for all outdoor fires in or near woodland anytime the ground is not covered with snow. This includes household waste burning, even if in an incinerator, grass burning, garden trash as well as brush burning. Such burning is restricted by regulation to be prior to  $9:00\ a.\ m.\ and\ after\ 5:00\ p.\ m.$ 

#### **Penalties**

- 1. For kindling a fire without a permit. Maximum of \$200.00 fine; or imprisonment for not more than 60 days.
- 2. For kindling a fire by any means wilfully or recklessly that shall endanger woodlands the maximum fine is \$500.00 or one year imprisonment.
- 3. For failure to totally extinguish a camp or cooking fire before leaving it the same penalties as in (1) above.
- 4. For dropping inflammable material in or near woodland maximum fine of \$25.00.

Fire prevention is a personal matter and a good habit. Keep our town free from smokes in 1970.

## GILFORD CONSERVATION COMMISSION ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1969

The Gilford Conservation Commission was created by vote of the town in 1965 under an enabling act of the state legislature adopted in 1963. In 1969 the number of its members was increased from five to seven.

Until recently the chief activity of the commission has been the gathering of information necessary to perform its duties. Its purposes are the promotion and development of the natural resources and the protection of the watershed resources of the town; and during the last year it has examined the town's publicly owned lands and some of the wet lands within its bounds, and has acquired in map form the data for an index of all open marshlands, swamps, and other wet lands. It has also sought out technical advice on how to understand our conservation problems and bring them before the people, so that they may make wise decisions in guiding the town's development in such ways that its natural resources may best be conserved for the benefit and enjoyment of all.

It is now common knowledge that many results of unregulated growth, such as water and air pollution, are not only offensive and unhealthy. but also hurt business and raise taxes. Their avoidance is good business and good economy. We have met with the Planning Board in consideration of the comprehensive plan that they are preparing, and shall be seeking to cooperate with them and other agencies in the coming year; and we are presently engaged in organizing methods to reach and consult with all interested townspeople also.

During the year we hope to present to you specific ways by which the town may acquire, by gift, or purchase in some instances, easements or other rights that will insure the preservation and purity of our streams and the attractiveness of our growing community, and to make known the possible tax advantages to the owners of the lands involved. For these purposes the commission is asking for an appropriation to create a Conservation Fund, and in the name of the town may accept gifts of real and personal property with the approval of the selectmen.

### REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Members of the School Board, Parents, Voters: Following is my fourth and final report to you as your Superintendent of Schools. Contained herein will be a review of the progress of education in Gilford during the past year as well as some thoughts concerning the future.

### **Enrollment:**

During the past two years, the elementary enrollment has increased between 50 and 70 pupils with every indication that there will continue to be increased numbers at the elementary level in need of education in the future. It is no secret that Gilford is one of the fastest growing communities in the state. With these facts in mind, the Building Committee has visited nine different schools in New Hampshire, Massachusetts and New York to obtain ideas for additional space at the elementary level. Eight architects have been interviewed with a final selection having recently been made. Mr. William Warner of Providence, Rhode Island, the designer of the Bancroft School in Andover, Mass., was the choice of the School Board. The excellent reputation which he enjoys as an architect plus the unusual features in functional design as evidenced in the Andover school influenced their decision. It would appear that during the next year or two Gilford will have additional educational space to meet the growing needs with modern concepts of teaching in evidence as a result of structural design and renovation.

### Staff Additions and Renovations:

Included in staff additions is David Hopkinson who is employed as a full time Physical Education Instructor. Each class has two Physical Education periods per week with the work being geared to the particular grade involved. Intramural programs for both boys and girls in soccer, basketball, softball and gymnastics have all proven to be most worthwhile. Additional and replacement teachers new to the school this year include Mrs. Mary DeMarco who teaches kindergarten on a part time basis, Joy Nelson and Janet Miller both first grade teachers and Shirley Walker at the third grade level. The employment of Miss Nelson has permitted the transfer of Mrs. Jean Landroche to the 6th grade where an additional class was needed. We are pleased to have Mrs. Markot return as a third grade teacher. We are also pleased to welcome back Mrs. Elizabeth Elwell as a remedial reading teacher. A final addition to the staff was that of Mrs. Barbara Reed who now spends two days per week in speech therapy. Mrs. Helen Bellavance, the school nurse, now is available four days each week rather than two days as in the past.

The conversion of the stage to a kindergarten classroom proved to be most effective and functional for the purpose. The stage provides a well lighted, spacious area for the morning kindergarten class to meet. The librarian, Mrs. Purington, has had her time increased from ½ time to full time this past year providing the opportunity for two periods per week of library participation and study for each group who wishes to take advantage of it. Many of the older pupils are being trained in the use of the audio visual aids which have been purchased by the School Department. This assistance is of help to the teachers who make use of this new equipment. The fact that 500 to 600 books each week are issued to pupils is an indication that there has been an increase in reading interest. This is a most desirable trend and it is hoped that this will continue.

### Summer School:

A very successful summer school was in operation over a five week period during the past year with three teachers as instructors. A total of 72 pupils took advantage of the reading and mathematics programs. Plans are to increase the staff for next summer to four teachers permitting more students to take advantage of this fine program.

### **Teaching Materials:**

The adoption of a new Science program has provided a discovery type approach with multi texts available. This approach permits pupils to do much of their own experimenting. This is used in all of the grades with the material adjusted to each particular grade level. A new Language Arts program is also being used for the first time in grades 1, 3 and 5. This too uses a multi text approach. If the program proves successful, it is planned to adopt it for the entire six grades for the coming year.

### **Teachers Salaries:**

The Board of Education has adopted a farsighted approach concerning teacher's salaries. The scale for the next school year, while not having as high a maximum as many other towns, does offer a higher minimum. This will serve to attract qualified teachers and should be sufficient to retain those who are at the maximum. No teaching device can take the place of a well qualified, competent teacher. This must always be of prime importance when additional space is provided for the need of additional teaching staff and replacement of those who for various reasons find it necessary to resign.

# **Education at the Secondary Level:**

It is evident with the increase in the population in Gilford that numbers needing secondary education will likewise increase. If this trend continues at its present pace, it is very possible that the town may wish to provide facilities of its own at this level. This will mean an adequate site with a minimum of 20 acres. I would urge

the voters of Gilford to seriously consider the acquisition of such a site at this time since land is now available and well may not be when it is urgently needed.

I wish to express my appreciation for the cooperation of the Gilford School Board members, namely; the Chairman, Mrs. Esther Nighswander, Mr. John O. Richards and Dr. Leo B. Sanfacon, I also wish to commend the School Principal, Mr. Alexander Blastos for his farsighted and modernistic approach in the adoption of a new school program and its implementation. Gilford is fortunate to have many citizens who are conscious of the needs of modern education and are anixous to provide the best for their children. It is hoped that this trend will continue. A good education in this day and age is more important than ever before for the youth of a community. It can only be obtained with the support of the people who believe in the importance of providing it. I extend my best wishes for continued growth and improvement in education for Gilford.
