

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Milan qualified to vote in Town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at Androscoggin hall in said town on the second Tuesday of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- r. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- 2. To choose by ballot and major vote a Town Clerk.
- 3. To choose by ballot and major vote three Selectmen.
- 4. To choose by ballot and major vote a Town Treasurer.
- 5. To choose road agents and all other necessary town officers, including fish and game wardens.
- 6. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of the poor, and other necessary charges arising within the town.
- 7. To see what sums of money the town will raise for laying out, building, and repairing highways and bridges.
- 8. To see what sum of money the town will raise for breaking roads during the winter of 1902 and 1903.

- 9. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of schools.
- 10. To see if the town will vote not to distribute inventory blanks until such time as the Selectmen shall examine and appraise property to be taxed.
 - 11. To see if the town will vote not to have a liquor agent.
- 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the library.
 - 13. To choose a library trustee to serve for three years.
- 14. To see if the town will vote to exempt from taxation for ten years any saw mill or mills and the necessary machinery and plant for the sawing of logs and the manufacturing of lumber in this town if built within the next two years.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the highway starting near the house occupied by Eri Hagar, going up the Ammonoosuc River, and ending at the south-west corner of the house formerly occupied by A. A. Higgins.
- 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Memorial Day.
- 17. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

OUR SCHOOLS.

Being about to complete my three years' term on the School Board of Milan, I desire to submit a short report of the educational work covering this period. The matter of the education of the young is claiming the attention of thoughtful people all over our state and nation to an unusual degree, and it is a matter that solicits our most serious attention. During my term I have endeavored to impartially and faithfully perform my duties, and I leave it to the citizens of the town to determine the degree of my success. We have tried to equalize the schools so that all would have about the same advantages throughout the town, but in some cases have been obliged to close schools on account of non-attendance. We have found it to be of advantage to use a part of the school money to pay for the conveyance of scholars, and this has been greatly appreciated by both scholars and parents.

SCHOOL PROPERTY.

The money appropriated for the repair of school houses this year has been expended by Mr. Hebberd of the School Board, who has had the entire expenditure of the appropriation and should report thereon. The school house in West Milan village has claimed quite a share of the appropriation, but something has been done on every house. The Hodgdon Hill and Cedar Pond building are in the most need of repairs at present, and something should be done to the interior of these buildings this spring.

A large number of pictures and maps have been added to the various school rooms, and they have greatly added to the attractiveness of the rooms. Through the kindness of the Ladies' Club of Milan, a tub of running water has been placed in the house at Milan village, and in behalf of the school I wish to thank the Club for their generous gift. I regret that I have not been able to accomplish more in the way of having trees set out in the school yards. I am convinced that too much cannot be done to make our school houses and school yards attractive to the pupils. Surroundings have much to do with character-building, and well-kept, shady yards, and attractive, prettily adorned school rooms, may be a factor in forming the habits and sentiments of the children that will be felt in the years to come.

The matter of the claim of Newell K. Davis to the school house

lot in the Hamlin district was left with the School Board for adjustment. We were unable to find the original deed to the lot, but found that the deed had been given, and recorded at Lancaster, and have obtained a certified copy of same. This establishes the claim of the town to the lot, and settles the matter so far as the town is concerned. We could find none of the original school house lot deeds, so obtained certified copies of them from register of deeds.

TEXT BOOKS.

The appropriation for school books has been generously increased for the past two years, so that, at the present time, we are well supplied with up-to-date text books, a complete record having been made of same. The following new books have been introduced, and are giving the best of satisfaction, both to pupil and teacher: Wentworth's Series of Arithmetics and Algebras, Montgomery's United States History, Brand's Physiology, Tarbell's Primary Geography, a part of the Cyr Series of Readers, beside supplementary reading. I would recommend that, as soon as practicable, Frye's Complete Geography, now in use, be exchanged for Tarbell's.

Considering the good condition the books are now in, it would seem that an appropriation of about \$125.00 would be sufficient for next year.

THE TEACHERS.

We have endeavored to secure the services of the best of teachers, those who have come the most highly recommended; though in some instances we have been disappointed, yet, as a whole, we consider that our teachers and schools will compare favorably with those of other towns.

The best results are obtained in those schools in which the parents manifest the greatest interest. The parents have a greater influence in the school and its success than the teacher, inasmuch as the teacher can do but little without the support of the parents, and for this reason parents should visit the schools more, and see for themselves what is being done, and thus show the children that they are interested in their work. It is utterly impossible for pupils to make much progress in their work, be the teacher ex-

cellent or otherwise, when they attend school one day and stay away the next, thereby making them double work when they do attend; they do injury to themselves and to those who attend school regularly, by holding the whole class back when all might be making rapid progress.

Our school attendance is not as large as it should be, but it is rather a difficult matter for the school board to compel scholars to attend school when parents allow them to remain away with the most trivial excuses. A truant officer has been appointed who has accomplished a great deal in the way of attendance and has done his duty so far as he has been supported.

An effort is being made by the State Superintendent of Schools to have several towns in this vicinity unite and appoint a superintendent. I heartily approve of the idea and recommend that the district vote to this end.

I want to thank the citizens of the town for the generous support I have received from them during my term, and to assure them that I have endeavored to faithfully perform the duties devolving upon me, and to do all I could to forward the interests of the schools.
