

TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Sullivan in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Sullivan on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see what sums of money the town will raise in addition to that required by law for building and repairing highways and bridges, or take any action relating thereto.

4. To see if the town will accept state-aid construction of Class II road known as the Sullivan Center Road and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$258.00 or will accept state-aid for construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$258.00.

5. To see if the town will vote to discontinue or throw-up the following roads in the town of Sullivan, or take any action relating thereto:

a. Boyce Road from fork of road north of the buildings of the Ezra Brown farm so called to the site of the Boyce buildings.

b. From the State Aid Road by the Town Hall to the site of the Charles Locke place now owned by Winfred J. White. c. Kendall Lane, from the Old Stoddard Road to the site of the Old Rugg place.

d. Old Hubbard Road from State-aid Road by the Mason Nims place to the Hubbard farm now owned by Mrs. Alice Mc-Cushing.

e. From the Old Cemetery to the site of the buildings on Hubbard Hill.

f. From State-Aid Road by Frank Carpenter's to the Osgood Farm now owned by Sidney Nims.

6. To see if the town will vote to pay for digging graves and going with the town hearse for residents.

7. To see what sum of money the town will raise in addition to that required by law for the support of the public library.

8. To see if the town will vote to raise money for Memorial Day or take any action relating thereto.

9. To see if the town will vote to raise or appropriate Money for Old Home Day, or take any action relating thereto.

10. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to borrow money on the credit of the town in anticipation of taxes.

11. To see if the town will vote to raise or appropriate \$500 for the payment of the Snow-plow note, or take any action thereto.

12. To see if the town will vote to raise or appropriate the sum of \$20 for the Monadnock Region Association, or take any action relating thereto.

13. To see if the town will vote to help stamp out the white pine blister disease and raise money for the same, or take any action relating thereto.

14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for removal of snow from the highways.

15. To see if the town will vote to purchase some snow fence and raise money for the same.

16. To see if the town will vote to petition the state tax commission to have an audit made by the municipal accounting division and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

17 To see if the town will vote to have the Town Hall wired for electricity and to raise or appropriate money for the same, or take any action relating thereto.

18. To see if the town will vote to have street lights and to raise or appropriate money for the same, or take any action relating thereto.

19. To hear the reports of agents, auditors or committees heretofore chosen, or take any action thereon.

20. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Sullivan :

I herein submit my eighteenth annual report as superintendent of schools.

Education today faces a crisis in history and civilization. If we are to maintain the ideals of democracy, we must not forget the boys and girls in our public schools who are soon to be the men and women that have to carry on in a changed world. They will have to cope against far reaching questions and pay enormous debts.

Therefore, it is fitting that we serutinize carefully our objectives and clarify our methods of procedure. Indeed, in our final analysis, we must regard our boys and girls in the public schools as our first and last line of defense.

All isms and philosophies that are poisonous to democracy and the American Way of life must be banished from public schools and colleges.

We believe our methods of procedure must follow along three lines of thought, viz. (1) An invigorated drill and practice in fundamentals, the efficiency of the "Three R's" can not be overlooked, the purity of the English language must be maintained, the intellectual activity and vision of life extended. (2) The pupils must be imbued with a deeper feeling for, sense of appreciation of, and a higher respect for the home, the school and the community. (3) Every child must be brought into contact with some situation of life that may give him control of himself, give him the power of decision between right and wrong.

The boys and girls of today are looking not only onward but also upward. Let our training be such that they will see more above them than airplanes but will grasp the fundamental ideas of a Divinity that rules the Universe.

With the coordination and correlation of the above mentioned lines of thought, we may be able to reach our objective, viz. the true Christian American citizen, to whom we may delegate with safety the welfare of the American Way of life, the Constitution and the highest ideals of democracy.

At the beginning of the present school year, the enrollment at East, No. 1 school was thirty-five. This condition called for the purchase of six additional desks and an increase in cost of text books and scholars' supplies.

For health activities consult the report of Miss Harris, R. N., district nurse.
