Report of the Selectmen

The Town's Annual Report serves as an historical document, chronicling activities within our town. It also serves as a source of information about the framework of our town's government, and previews anticipated issues and concerns of Town boards, committees and departments.

Our report to you highlights some of this past year's activities. Department, committee and board reports contain detailed information on the activities of your town's government. Your questions, concerns and feedback are always welcome.

Special mention As a chronicle of last year's activities, the Annual Report illustrates how volunteers help make Swanzev a great place to live. We thank all citizens who serve on town boards or committees, participate in the activities of our government, organize or participate in community events, and support non-profit organizations' activities. Three citizens deserve special mention. Artist Deb Crowder (and her volunteer crew of professional Swanzev sign makers) is responsible for the new "Welcome to Swanzev" sign installed this summer near Town Hall. Builder (and volunteer) Gary Phippard transformed the aged facade of the west village fire station. For years, Jim Devine has brought us together to honor veterans at Memorial Day and Veterans Day ceremonies. Each of these people recognized an important need, and each made sure the task was accomplished. Their example inspires us all.

Removal of Homestead Woolen Mill Dam From a historical perspective, the removal of the private dam im-

pounding the Ashuelot River in the west village was probably the most significant event in Swanzev in 2010. Records indicate that a dam had been at this west village location for more than 200 years, harnessing the power of the Ashuelot to serve area mills.

The process of assessing, developing, financing and implementing plans began in 1999. The project required coordination between the dam owner and project partners--including regulatory and environmental interests, engineers, and town and state transportation officials--to ensure that dam removal and river restoration protected water quality, the river environment and aquatic life, as well as the Thompson Covered Bridge. We commemorate this project, and related work aimed at securing the Thompson Covered Bridge, with an Annual Report "centerfold" of project photos.

Thompson Covered Bridge scour countermeasures Removal of the Homestead Dam required measures to protect the pier and abutments of the historic covered bridge. The project team brought together engineers with expertise in covered bridges and in hydrology, and resulted in a reinforced center pier foundation, the addition of protection for the bridge abutments, and installation of upstream rock stream barbs to direct water through the bridge's open spans. In addition, a dry fire suppression system and new deck were also installed on the Thompson Bridge during 2010. Aesthetic work to complete rehabilitation of the bridge is scheduled for the upcoming construction season.

Report of the Selectmen, cont.

Infrastructure investments The Board and department leaders continue to make careful investments in maintaining or improving the facilities, tools or equipment required to service our community. Capital reserve or expendable trust accounts serve as the source for funding or required grant match for these investments. Some of the past year's infrastructure improvements include:

Reclamation and base course paving of portions of Matthews Road and Old Richmond Road Final course paving, after the road base has settled, will be installed this year, pending voter approval of funding for the road reclamation and reconstruction fund.

Public safety vehicle improvements include the outfitting of a 2010 Mack chassis to serve as the Town's new fire tanker, replacing the vintage 1962 tanker that now is en route to the United Kingdom, where it will be displayed at premier shows of vintage trucks in its Swanzeby Fire Department livery. The 1999 Fire Department command car also was replaced. Other fire equipment upgrades include purchase of self-contained breathing apparatus and replacement of some of the pagers that call our first responders. A lease purchase authorized by voters upgraded the Town's cardiac monitoring equipment.

Community infrastructure projects in development for 2011 and future years include:

Covered bridges Installation of a dry fire suppression system at the Cresson Bridge (leveraging 80% state bridge aid with a required 20% Town match).

Extension of Safford Drive to Route 12, within the Town's Tax Increment Financing District. Plans are in the design and permitting process, and bidding is expected to occur in the spring. Construction could begin later in 2011.

Replacement bridges With approval of Article 5 by voters at Town Meeting, Town capital reserve funds will provide a portion of the match needed to leverage state bridge aid for replacing the Cobble Hill Road Bridge (crossing California Brook) and Warmac Road Bridge (crossing Perry Brook).

Improvements to the Keene Wastewater Treatment Plant to comply with upgraded environmental standards are in development. Authorization of costs for Swanzeby's "share" of the facility will likely require consideration by voters in 2012.

Route 12, Lake Street and Swanzeby Factory Road intersection safety improvements State transportation officials solicited public input earlier in the winter on various intersection improvements, tentatively scheduled for construction in 2012 or 2013. Regional planners will help assess other intersections, including Route 32 and Sawyers Crossing Road, and the intersection of Route 32 and Route 12. State transportation dollars will likely fund improvements.

Significant commercial developments completed in 2010 A new Market Basket supermarket opened on Route 10, and Keene Gas relocated its business to a historic farmhouse on Sawyers Crossing Road. The Fenton Family Dealership expanded operations. These commercial developments, along with Public Service of New Hampshire network improvements, resulted in growth of the Town's commercial and industrial tax base.

Moving forward We continue to address the service needs of Swanzeby citizens, considering the fiscal restraint required by the economic climate, reductions in state and federal revenue, and the shifting of responsibilities to local government. Selectmen recognize Town staff for their support in this challenging environment. We appreciate the extra effort of officials, employees and volunteers who must meet Swanzeby's changing and expanding service requirements within the level-funded recommended 2011 operation budget. We also wish to express our appreciation for Town voters who have supported our efforts to be effective stewards. Swanzeby's population is the largest of all towns in Cheshire County. We anticipate that the soon-to-be-released results of the 2010 US Census will help us ensure that we are developing and providing the services needed by residents and visitors to our town. ❖

2011 Warrant -- Town of Swanzezy, NH

To the inhabitants of the Town of Swanzezy in the State of New Hampshire qualified to vote in Town affairs:

FIRST SESSION You are hereby notified to meet for the First (Deliberative) Session of the annual Town Meeting, to be held at the Monadnock Regional High School/Middle School Auditorium, Swanzezy, NH on Tuesday, the eighth day of February 2011 at seven in the evening (7:00 p.m.). The First Deliberative Session will consist of explanation, discussion and debate of articles and will afford those voters who are present the opportunity to propose, debate and adopt amendments to each warrant article, except election of officers and warrant articles whose wording is prescribed by state law.

SECOND SESSION You are also notified to meet for the Second Session of the annual Town Meeting on Tuesday, the eighth day of March 2011, at the Christian Life Fellowship Church, 211 Whitcomb Road, between the hours of 8 a.m. and 7 p.m. to vote by official ballot to elect town officers, to vote by official ballot on warrant articles as they may have been amended at the First Session and to vote on those other official ballot questions whose wording is prescribed by state law.

Article 1 To choose by ballot all necessary town officers including a Selectman, Trustee of the Trust Funds, 2 Zoning Board of Adjustment members, 2 Planning Board members, a Sewer Commissioner and a Library Trustee.

Article 2 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant or as amended by vote of the First Session, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling \$5,527,605. Should this article be defeated, the default budget shall be \$5,567,734, which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the town or by law; or the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only.
(RECOMMENDED BY SELECTMEN)

Article 3 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$524,500 to be placed in the following expendable trust and capital reserve accounts of the Town:

Article 4 To see if the Town will vote to authorize Selectmen to enter into a three year lease/purchase agreement in the amount of \$81,865 for the purpose of leasing and outfitting three police cruisers (replacing three police cruisers which will have, in total, more than 300,000 road miles by

summer 2011) and raise and appropriate the sum of \$28,765 for the first year's payment for that purpose, or take any action thereon. If the lease purchase agreement is authorized by voters, year 2 and year 3 lease payments will be included in the 2012 and 2013 Town operating and default budgets. (RECOMMENDED BY SELECTMEN)

Article 5 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000,000 for the purpose of replacing the Cobble Hill Road Bridge (deemed structurally deficient and susceptible to flooding) and the Warmac Road Bridge (closed in the fall of 2009 following issuance by NHDOT of a critical bridge deficiency report) and authorize the acceptance of \$1,600,000 in NHDOT Municipal Bridge Aid offsetting this appropriation, or take any action thereon. The Town's portion of this project's cost is anticipated to be funded through funds available in the capital reserve account for town bridges and fund balance.

(RECOMMENDED BY SELECTMEN)

Article 6 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$95,000 for the purpose of implementing energy efficiency improvement projects at Town facilities and authorize the issuance of not more than \$95,000 of bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act, N.H. R.S.A. 33:1 et seq., as amended; and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon as shall be in the best interest of the Town (including the use of the CDFR Municipal Energy Reduction Fund established for this purpose, if desired), and to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, obtain and accept Federal, State or other grants or aid which may be available for energy efficiency projects or take any action thereon. (RECOMMENDED BY SELECTMEN - 3/5 VOTE REQUIRED)

Article 7 To vote by ballot on the following three (3) amendments to the Town of Swanzey Zoning Ordinance:

Amendment No. 1: Are you in favor of Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for

the Town Zoning Ordinance:

Amend Section II.A. by adding the following new district:

Section II.A.11.: Village Business District II. This district is intended to provide a compact area within which commercial, industrial and business uses may function.

Amend Section II Zoning Districts and Zoning Maps by adding the following:

The zoning map of the Town of Swanzey dated September 1, 1947, as amended, is further amended to show Tax Map 72, Lot 31 (as shown on Tax Map 72 amended through April 1, 2009) as being in the Village Business District II.

Amend Section II.A.3. and Section V.A. as follows: Change "Village Business District" to read "Village Business District I."

Amend Section V. Business District Uses to read as follows: Section V. Village Business Districts I and II Uses and Business District Uses.

Amend Section V.A.1. to read as follows:

1. Change "Business District" to read "Village Business District I."

Amend Section V. by adding a new Section V.C. VILLAGE BUSINESS DISTRICT II as follows:

C. VILLAGE BUSINESS DISTRICT II.

1. USES PERMITTED. In the Village Business District II no building or premises shall be erected or used and no land shall be used for any purposes except:

- a. Club or Lodge;
- b. Education, Government or Religious Facility;
- c. Indoor Auctions;
- d. Manufacturing Facility;
- e. Professional, Business or Corporate Offices;
- f. Personal Service Shop or Service Establishments;
- g. Printing and Publishing Establishments;
- h. Recreational Facility;
- i. Research and Testing Laboratories;
- j. Retail Business Establishment;
- k. Telephone and Internet Sales;
- l. Utility Generation;

- m. Wholesale, Warehouse or Storage Facilities with office, repair and customer service areas;
 - n. Accessory uses which are clearly incidental to the uses permitted herein.
2. All lots shall be of at least one-half (1/2) acre in size with one hundred (100) feet of frontage on a Town or State maintained road. The front setback is 30 feet from the front property line and 20 feet from the side and rear property lines.

Amendment No. 2: Are you in favor of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance:

Amend Section II Zoning Districts and Zoning Maps by adding the following:

The zoning map of the Town of Swanzezy dated September 1, 1947, as amended, is further amended to show Tax Map 56, Lot 3 and Tax Map 56, Lot 4 (as shown on Tax Map 56 amended through April 1, 2009) as being in the Business District.

Amendment No. 3: Are you in favor of Amendment No. 3 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance:

Amend Section II Zoning Districts and Zoning Maps by adding the following:

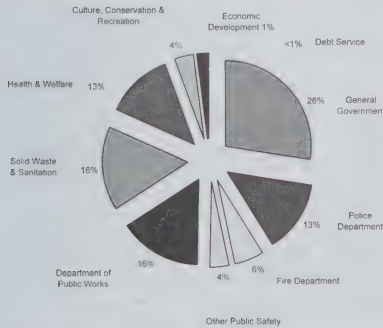

Article 8 To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting, or take any action thereon.

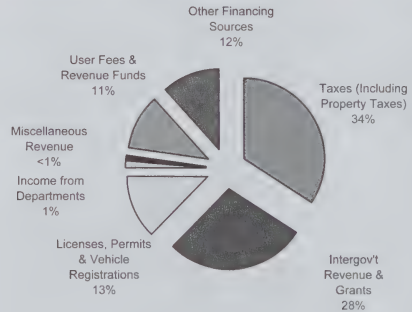

Administration

Town Hall is the hub of government for our town of 7,100 citizens. The building itself is the Town's repository for public information about properties in town, state and local regulations, and activity in the region. Work at Town Hall focuses on providing day-to-day services to residents, businesses and visitors. Conducting the "business" of the Town of Swanzey requires the hard work of numerous volunteers and board members, and more than 170 employees. Town services--public safety, public works, sanitation, health, welfare, culture, recreation, conservation and economic development--are administered from Town Hall. Town Hall staff dispenses information, and helps connect customers with Town departments or other government agencies.

For some residents, contact with Town Hall staff may be limited to the building's "front" offices--registering vehicles, dogs, obtaining marriage licenses, paying property taxes or utility bills. Beyond the front offices lie the planning department (building permits, code enforcement, planning and zoning), the finance office, assessing, and the office of the Town Administrator.

Some requests for help (especially those that begin, "Who do I talk to about...") may require a series of questions in response. Given the diverse functions of local government, we all have different areas of exper-

tise. A complex question may lead to conversations with several Town Hall staff members as we strive to provide the best assistance.

Most Town Hall staff members maintain an open door policy, and are available during business hours for citizens to drop in with a query. After hours, please contact us via e-mail or leave a phone message.

The Town web site, re-designed earlier this year, is an-ongoing project aimed at making Town information available around the clock. New sections of the web site--including a business section, supported by the town's Economic Development Advisory Committee--are aimed at better serving the variety of users. We welcome suggestions for additional information to include to help the site best meet our town's needs.

The contributions of citizen volunteers make Swanzey a great town. While there are many ways to get involved to benefit our community--though the schools, non-profit organizations, churches or other civic groups--your town needs you as well. No special knowledge is necessary to serve on a Town board or committee. Members learn on the job. A talent you may take for granted may be exactly what a board or committee desperately needs. A talent you would like to develop may be nurtured by a supportive group. Please get in touch to talk about the opportunities. We look forward to hearing from you. ❖

The Police Department responded to a broad variety of calls in 2010, some quite serious. Residential and commercial growth in Swanzey and Cheshire County clearly contributes to an increase in demands on our agency, as does the rising heroin problem. We had a 76% increase in burglaries and we observed an increase in violent crime.

Staffing changes & challenges 2010 again proved to be a year that a highly trained Swanzey officer left the Department to join another area agency. Officer Jason Yarosz, a three-year member of Department, was recruited and hired by the NH State Police. Officer Melissa Hetrick now is a Hancock officer. Officer Rene Doyle was hired to replace the vacancy caused by Officer Hetrick's departure. Officer Doyle is a US Army veteran, and served several years with the Fitzwilliam Police Department. Budgetary concerns prevented us from filling the vacancy caused by Officer Yarosz's departure last summer. There are no plans to fill the vacancy in 2011, in an attempt to keep the budget down.

Collaboration in emergency response Swanzey Police and other Swanzey public safety staff worked together with Cheshire County agencies and the Cheshire Fair management, as well as staff at Dillant-Hopkins Airport, to help provide a safe and secure environment for patrons and workers at both the annual Cheshire Fair and the large air show at the airport. We continue to work with these agencies to improve our preparedness in the event of an incident that affects public safety at these well attended annual events.

Serious and complex cases We continue to see effects of growing heroin use in Cheshire County. Now widespread, heroin use is at the root of many of our most serious cases. Law enforcement shares the burden of this problem with families and crime victims.

Visible policing This year's reduced staffing has diminished the Department's ability to be a visible presence on Town roads. Our proactive policing efforts, routine patrol and motor vehicle violation enforcement all have been negatively affected.

Customer service We stand behind our core values of fairness, compassion and integrity. Officers attend professional development and advanced training programs to stay on the leading edge of law enforcement technology and concepts. As confirmed team players, we focus on working harmoniously with other Town departments to improve the quality of life in Swanzey.

We look forward to another year working with the Swanzey Fire Department, the Swanzey Department of Public Works, and Swanzey Emergency Management to provide Swanzey residents with the best in emergency services. ❖

Emergency Management Department

This past year, the Department has undergone changes in personnel. Tom Barker relocated to Dalton, NH, and Dennis Carlson stepped back for personal reasons. We will miss both gentlemen and their expertise. In their place, we welcome William Morse and Brian Bohannon as radiological defense (RADEF) officers, and Mark Carrier as communicator. These are volunteer positions, and we really appreciate the interest in helping.

In 2011 the Town will be conducting some tabletop drills, and FEMA will perform a full evaluation of our Vermont Yankee nuclear power plant radiological defense plan. We have added some new radiological equipment to the Department, have been training, and will be ready for the exercises.

This past year we have been working with the State of New Hampshire on updating the State's emergency operation plan to include the radiological response plan. This new incident response plan will be tested in the spring of 2011.

In 2011 Town officials will be taking incident management classes to keep the Town in compliance with the National Incident Response Plan.

This Plan is mandated by the federal government, and qualifies the Town to apply for certain federal grants.

We have been working with other departments in Swanzezy to prepare for Narrow Band FCC licensing requirements, which will become effective January 1, 2013. Town departments using two-way radios must have radios that can meet the new FCC license requirements. The Town has been updating radios, and will update station licenses this year.

The Swanzezy Emergency Management Department continues to work with the Cheshire County Public Health Network. We anticipate changes in our point-of-dispensing site planning, and will have more news at this time next year.

Remember to update your Code Red contact information if you haven't done so recently, and if you have changed your address or added a cell phone. The Code Red telephone notification service is used to quickly advise all residents and businesses of a situation in Town--for example, a major bridge closure, or a rash of burglaries. The contact form is available at Town Hall and on the web site.

We welcome comments and questions. Please feel free to contact us. ❖

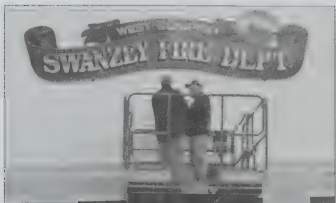

The Swanzey Fire Department provides professional emergency response to all hazards within the Town of Swanzey and the greater Mutual Aid district. The Department's fifty on-call firefighters and emergency medical technicians are assigned to three stations and nine separate engine, ladder and rescue companies strategically located in East, Center and West Swanzey. Captains and lieutenants oversee the personnel, apparatus and equipment of each station.

Training and certification Every member of the Department is required to participate in extensive training and to obtain certification. Personnel annually attend over forty-eight hours of fire and EMS continuing education. In 2010 we hired four new personnel who began their fire service careers by attending Firefighter-I certification courses. Several other members have committed to obtaining advanced training levels of certification, including Firefighter-II and Nationally Registered EMT--Intermediate.

This past year the Board of Selectmen and Fire Department adopted a revised pay grade scale that recognizes certification and rank. The Department is clarifying roles and responsibilities of paid and non-paid personnel, and has implemented a program of ongoing, occupationally-oriented physical exams.

New apparatus and equipment In June the Town replaced the 1962 Mack tanker with a new Mack Granite tanker with a capacity of 3000 gallons, and a pumping rate of 1,250 gallons per minute. In October the Town purchased a replacement com-

mand vehicle for incident management support and communications. The 2010 GMC Yukon is outfitted with on-board computers, 911 mapping capability, Internet access and two-way emergency radio equipment. In 2010, voters approved the lease/purchase of two Phillips 12-lead cardiac monitor-defibrillators. Department personnel already have used the units to identify and treat several Swanzey patients with serious cardiac conditions.

Raising funds, use of funds The newly formed Swanzey Firefighters Association and non-profit organizations connected to each of the three fire stations raise funds to enhance the service response capacity of the Department through events such as the annual demolition derby and Mud Bog Boogie. In 2010 the Town accepted a donation of property valued at \$20,000 from the East Swanzey Fire Company. The much needed off-highway emergency 4x4 rescue vehicle will transport patients from remote locations to a waiting ambulance or helicopter. The Swanzey Center Fire Company donated to the Town the cab and chassis for the new Mack tanker, using an endowment fund established by the Charles Hanrahan family. Town capital reserve funds and an additional Center Fire Company donation paid for outfitting this new fire truck.

Emergency care partners The Department works closely with the Cheshire Medical Center. Through on-going review of patient care, EMS Coordinator Lt. Kelson Mulcahy oversees basic and advanced medical treatment, from the field to the hospital. We also are participating in the

A record year This past year the Department responded to a record 787 dispatched emergencies, including fires, rescue, motor vehicle accidents and medical emergencies, as well as Mutual Aid responses to neighboring communities.

Plans for 2011 Looking to the future, the Swanzey Fire Department will be studying fire protection with other Town officials, including existing and potential methods of providing water for fighting fires.

The Department will continue to enforce the State Fire Code through plan review and inspections of existing and newly constructed buildings. We also are assessing our water rescue capability. With ample water bodies within the community, we need to improve our capability to re-

spond to these types of calls.

Personnel wanted We continue to seek qualified people to fill the ranks of the Department. An annual physical ability test begins the hiring process for new call personnel. If you believe you may be an asset to the Department and community, we strongly encourage you to contact the stations for more details.

Gratitude We thank the entire community for continued support of our efforts, and especially thank those who have gone above and beyond. Gary Phippard, President of Cheshire Builders, and Tom Forest are two business owners who, along with other volunteers, have helped improve the West Fire Station over the past couple of years. We also compliment and thank our colleagues from the Swanzey Police Department, Public Works Department and Town Hall. ❖

2010 got started in a real hurry with a storm that lasted for four days. After that, winter was pretty much over once we got to March--the last time we hooked up the plows was February 27. In January and February, heavy rains caused several minor washouts around Town. We were able to get a jump on the spring cleanup and road grading, but then were hampered by a wet spring. Once spring was over, we went to a prolonged dry spell that lasted right through to winter.

Culverts and roads DPW staff replaced culverts on Hale Hill Road, Old Richmond Road, Matthews Road, Aldrich Road, and Westport Village Road, and repaired catch basins on Taft Road and Park Street. The summer paving program included reclaiming and base coat paving portions of Old Richmond Road and Matthews Road, top coat paving Aldrich Road and Taft Road, and cold mix paving Cobble Hill Road.

Covered bridges This was a light year for damage to our covered bridges. DPW staff replaced the wear deck on the Thompson Covered Bridge in the fall.

Other work DPW staff has been busy at Town facilities this year. Projects ranged from cutting dead trees at Richardson Park to make the place safer, to installing new heating oil tanks at the DPW garage, to doing the final site work at the West Swanzy Fire Station and repairing the septic system at the Police Department. In the fall, DPW staff ad-

dressed several areas in Town that were home to beavers. DPW staff was called upon to mitigate an oil spill from a truck in the Marcy Hill area. You just never know what will be next.

Cemeteries were opened on March 29, and burials--39 in 2010--started shortly thereafter. Staff cleared brush along all of the stone walls in Oak Hill Cemetery, repaired several graves, and re-set lot corner stones that were too high.

Facilities repairs The Carpenter Home's new heating system was finished in January, and floor and roof repairs were completed in 2010. Staff cleared brush in and around all the stone walls surrounding the Home.

Staff widened the Center Fire Station overhead doorways to accommodate the new tanker, and installed insulated replacement doors. A 10' x 30' addition on the rear of the West Fire Station was completed.

At Richardson Park, staff installed new windows to let in more natural light. The South Road ball field snack shack received a new metal roof, as well as a coat of paint on the interior of the cook shack. The pavilion also was painted. Staff fertilized Brown Field twice during the season, and facilitated construction of a new scorer's building by the Women's Softball Association. The cook shack now complies with fire codes, thanks to Tom Little's help with a new ventilation hood. ❖

A good year--a busy year--considering the economy. You brought in thirty tons fewer non-recyclables this year than in 2009, making this the fourth year in a row with a reduction. Congratulations to all of you!

This is also the first year in which our recycling tonnage has actually dropped. However, most of the reduction was in scrap metal and construction and demolition debris. Residential recyclables (glass, paper, plastic, aluminum, electronics) actually increased slightly. This category is more labor intensive, but also produces the most revenue. For example, we handled an additional 42,000 deposit containers this year, adding \$2,100 to our revenue stream. Our recycling-to-landfill ratio remains at 50%.

The markets for your recyclables were significantly stronger than anticipated, bringing in approximately \$70,000 in revenues--up substantially from 2009. Recycling means revenue!

We were able to end the year under budget, primarily due to less trash

and lower construction and demolition tonnage.

Don't forget: We still have free compost, wood chips, and kindling (seasonal) for the asking.

We look forward to another busy and profitable year and, as always, our staff thanks you for all that you do to make recycling (and particularly, Swanзей recycling) such a success. ❖

The Planning Board's work is divided between reviewing proposals for development, such as subdivisions and site plans, and preparing recommendations for how best to use land in Swanzey. These recommendations are formalized in the Town's zoning ordinance, subdivision regulations, and in the master plan.

During 2010, site plan review applications (permitting new businesses in Town), as well as subdivision applications (creating new lots) decreased from prior years. It is assumed that these decreases were due to the continued downturn in the economy, as many towns in the region noted similar decreases. However, some major projects came to fruition in 2010--notably, the opening of Market Basket and Keene Gas, as well as a substantial addition to Fenton Family Dealership's Toyota dealership. Page Homestead Senior Housing (located off Route 12) also opened its doors, providing 38 units of affordable housing for senior citizens. 2010 also saw the ground-breaking for Camp Squanto's new dining hall, and the construction of a new multi-purpose building for Christian Life Fellowship Church.

During the year, the Planning Board discussed various changes to the Town's zoning ordinance. Two major conceptual changes to the zoning were discussed in depth: a substantial re-zoning of lands situated in the northwest quadrant of the Town, as well as the adoption/clarification of regulations concerning the raising and keeping of livestock, poultry and other agricultural uses. Due to the broad scope of the changes, as well as realizing that the Planning Board

needed additional time to come to consensus, the Board decided to defer the matters for further consideration in 2011. However, the Planning Board is proposing three amendments to the Zoning Ordinance to be voted upon on March 8, 2011. These items include:

1. The creation of a "Village Business District II" encompassing property shown at Tax Map 72, Lot 31 (owned by Homestead Woolen Mills) located between South Winchester Street and the Ashuelot River. This district would provide a compact area within which commercial, industrial and business uses may function;

2. A re-zoning of properties (Tax Map 56, Lots 3 and 4) situated at the southeast corner of Route 10 and Sawyer's Crossing Road. These two properties are currently zoned Rural/Agriculture and are proposed to be re-zoned to Business; and

3. A re-zoning of property (Tax Map 18, Lot 185) situated on the southerly side of Park Street, located westerly of Dunkin' Donuts on Route 12. A portion of this property is currently zoned Residence, and the zoning amendment proposes that it be rezoned to Business.

The full text of the proposed zoning amendments can be found in the Town Warrant contained in this Annual Report.

Finally, the Planning Board is in need of alternate members. If you are interested in serving your Town in the capacity of a Planning Board alternate, please contact Town Planner Sara Carbonneau for additional information. ❖

Zoning Board of Adjustment

The Zoning Board evaluates requests of property owners who want to use their land in ways that deviate from Swanzey's zoning ordinance. Examples include requests for variances or special exceptions, appeals from administrative decisions and requests for equitable waivers from dimensional requirements.

Swanzey's zoning ordinance was adopted by and is amended by the voters of the Town. When zoning amendments are proposed, the Planning Board holds public hearings to solicit input. The ZBA encourages residents to take an active role in developing the regulations that affect each and every one of you.

The powers and actions of zoning boards are strictly controlled by New Hampshire law. For example, the criteria for granting variances is established by RSA 674:33, I(b). All towns must use those criteria. If an applicant meets all the criteria, the ZBA must grant the variance.

Town Planner Sara Carbonneau is available to answer questions regarding the ZBA or the Town's zoning ordinance. In addition, the NH Office of Energy and Planning (www.nh.gov/oepl/) has on-line resources to help citizens understand the roles and responsibilities of zoning boards of adjustment. ❖

Open Space Committee

The Open Space Committee protects the rural character of Swanzey by permanently preserving important open space. The Committee promotes land conservation, and brings together landowners and land trusts.

Easements celebrated The Keene State College Camp at Wilson Pond was the setting for the annual April easement celebration. Suzie Johnson and her sons, Mike and Bob, were honored for their initiative in protecting ninety-three acres of farm and forest land on the east side of Swanzey. This conservation easement, finalized in 2009, protects land that fronts on the South Branch of the Ashuelot River and includes a rare floodplain forest, hay fields, and a pasture once occupied by Abenacki Indians.

Easements in process The Tippin Rock Farm/Hewes Hill easement should be finalized soon. The one hundred fifty-five acre parcel, owned by the Domina family, includes hiking trails, scenic vistas, sheer cliff faces, as well as the property's name-

sake, the "tippin rock" --a forty-ton boulder that moves, when pushed in the right spot.

The Open Space Committee also thanks Carroll and Elizabeth Tolman for generously donating a conservation easement to the Monadnock Conservancy. This sixty-plus acre parcel off Westbrook Court is located very close to the Tippin Rock Farm parcel.

Easements are also in the works for a large tract of land situated near the Ashuelot River, as well as other lands in Town.

Leveraging tax dollars Over the past year, the Open Space Committee and the Monadnock Conservancy have had success with several grant applications benefiting Swanzey projects. The NH Land and Community Heritage Investment Program (LCHIP), Quabbin To Cardigan Partnership and Fields Pond Foundation awarded grants totaling \$103,740 to the Tippin Rock Farm project. In addition, the Open Space Committee launched its first

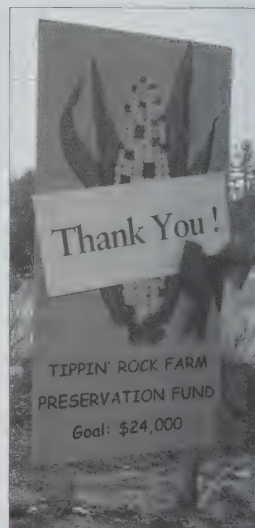

fundraising campaign, as evidenced by the cornometer in front of Town Hall. Thank you to residents, businesses and friends of Tippin Rock Farm for your generous donations totaling \$5,665!

In the near future, additional projects on the Ashuelot River in Swanzezy, as well as within the California Brook watershed area, likely will benefit from the NH Aquatic Resource Mitigation Fund (ARM Fund).

Discovering the protected lands In October, the Open Space Committee sponsored its first guided hike on the Tippin Rock Farm property. Twenty-three people took advantage of the wonderful autumn day to experience the “tippin rock” and other features of this special property. The OSC plans to offer additional hikes on other protected properties during the upcoming year.

Reaching out You can find Open Space Committee members at the Town’s Old Home Day festivities, at the Monadnock Humane Society’s Walk for Animals and at MRHS Homecoming, as well as at unique events such as the unveiling of the Tippin Rock Farm cornometer. Watch your mailbox for postcards (illustrated by Swanzezy artists) announcing completed easements.

Traditions that continue, traditions that change

In early 2010, the Open Space Committee and the Town said good-bye to the ox Buck, half of the “Ambassadors of Open Space Protection” team of Buck and Ike. Buck had been diagnosed with squamous cell carcinoma. Eventually, the cancer had become so advanced that Buck’s owner made the decision to euthanize. Buck is buried on his favorite knoll in his favorite pasture.

Ike continues to support the work of the OSC, and is mentoring Star and Bright in the ways of open space protection. Meg and Beth, a pair of adorable goats--and new open space ambassadors--will share the spotlight with the bovine trio at Town events during the upcoming year.

What’s in store During 2011, be on the lookout for OSC-sponsored activities featuring farms, forests and friends, with activities geared to all age groups and showcasing properties already protected or in the process of being protected in Town. Look on the Town’s website and at Town Hall for trail maps currently being developed, and come celebrate at the fourth annual easement celebration scheduled for Wednesday, April 20, 2011. ❖

The Swanzey Conservation Commission (SCC) works to maintain or improve the quality of the air, soil, water, plants animals and other natural resources of Swanzey.

Annual roadside cleanup The SCC sponsored the sixth annual roadside clean-up on April 24th. The thirty-seven volunteers who participated cleaned up trash and recyclables along twenty-two miles of Swanzey roads. Continued support from residents helps keep Swanzey beautiful.

Annual Ashuelot River paddling trip SCC members guided participants in a casual paddle down the Ashuelot River in May. This annual trip begins near the Keene border, and travels under the Cresson Covered Bridge and past other locations of historic and ecologic importance. Information on the 2011 trip will be announced shortly.

Ashuelot River & South Branch water quality testing Several members participated in water quality training and testing of our cherished rivers.

Maintaining and improving conservation lands The SCC continued to develop and blaze a loop trail on Mount Cresson. The goal is for the completion of the trail in 2011, and we welcome volunteers to help with the final work.

Conservation camp The SCC offers two scholarships to Swanzey residents of ages ten to fifteen to attend the Barry Conservation Camp in the White Mountains. In 2010, the UNH-administered 4-H camp was closed for renovations, but the SCC sponsored two young Swanzey

residents to attend a similar camp in Vermont for hunter education and environmental exploration. The Barry Conservation Camp will re-open in 2011. Students interested in applying for this scholarship should express the reasons for their interest in a letter sent to the Conservation Commission, in care of Town Hall.

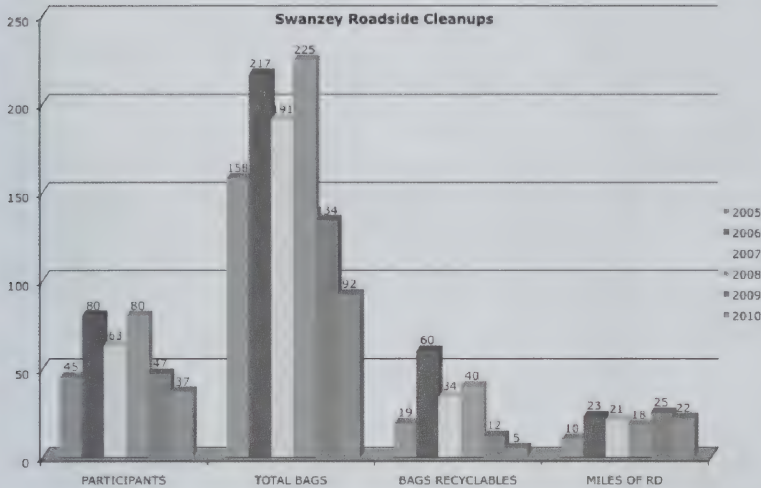

EDAC business questionnaire

Swanzey business owners who have not yet submitted a response are invited to download a PDF version of the questionnaire from the "Business" tab of the Town web site.

During the past year, members of the EDAC have worked to enhance and improve the economic climate within the Town of Swanzey. While we are constrained by the national economy, we have strived for improvements on a local level. Towards this end, we have

- Met with the NH Department of Resources and Economic Development
- Participated in meetings regarding re-zoning of a portion of the Route 10 corridor, including certain Yale Forest properties
- Attended an open house for the expanded showroom at Toyota of Keene
- Supported the Town's web site redesign, which now features a separate "Business" section
- Initiated a survey of existing businesses located in Swanzey.

In addition to collecting contact information and other basic data about Swanzey businesses, the recently completed survey also invited businesses to provide subjective feedback to EDAC about doing business in the town. Comments on the topic of "helping businesses prosper" included such things as improving the planning and zoning process, reducing property taxes and promoting existing businesses. A second question was geared towards helping Swanzey attract new businesses. Responses included promoting Swanzey's proximity to Keene along with ease of access (Rt 10 and 12), and encouraging Swanzey residents' support of local companies.

In 2011, the Committee will look to further develop the survey results in order to promote a healthy business community for Swanzey. ❖

The Economic Development Advisory Committee is charged by the Board of Selectmen to accomplish the following:

To provide input and advice on matters relating to the Town's economic development opportunities and to develop strategies and recommendations of initiatives to promote the Town as a place to start or grow a business.

To inventory existing businesses in the community surveying those businesses seeking ways the town can support and encourage existing businesses to grow, and recommend strategies to attract additional business and economic activity.

To inventory available properties and opportunities for economic development and develop recommendations on how to promote those properties and our town to attract desired businesses and employment opportunities.

To support initiatives to develop Swanzey's community brand and strengthen our town's identity in the region and state.

To survey Town residents to determine businesses they wish to have locate in town.

Swanzey Revenue Development District

Following an assessment of development in the District, the Swanzey Revenue Development District Advisory Board recommended to Selectmen advancing District plans to develop a road network connecting Routes 32 and 12, as well as extending sewer infrastructure and plans to accommodate water service in the future. Additional increment resulting from completion of the Moore Nanotechnology Systems facility in 2009, along with decreasing debt service attributable to the development's Phase I infrastructure, supported an assessment that it was appropriate to advance development of District infrastructure plans.

Underwood Engineers has been retained to develop plans and obtain required environmental permits to take the next phase of District infrastructure development to bid. As plan details develop, meetings will continue to be held to keep Town and District property owners informed. To date, discussions regarding design of Safford Drive's intersection with Route 12 have focused on accommodating adjacent existing commercial uses,

the types of traffic expected to be generated by development within the District, local traffic and traffic associated with large events occurring at the Cheshire Fairgrounds. Modification to existing agreements between the North Swanzey Water and Fire Precinct and its water supplier, the City of Keene, may be necessary to allow for expansion and connection of utilities to areas outside of the District. Selectmen, Sewer Commissioners, North Swanzey Water and Fire Precinct officials, Town department leaders and planners, Keene officials, Economic Develop Advisory Committee members, and District property owners will be called upon to help fulfill the District's development plan, a plan that will expand opportunities for additional commercial and industrial development in Swanzey. Our Town, region and its residents will benefit from this positive economic activity through local employment and, in the future, this development will provide needed financial support for education, county and Town services. ❖

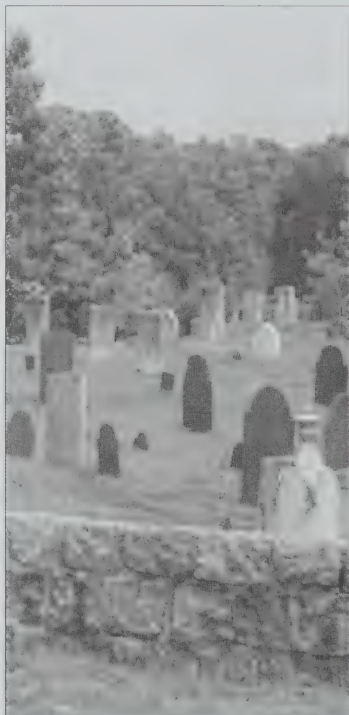

The Trustees of Trust Funds administer all funds held in trust for the benefit of Town capital projects, Town cemeteries and, in the case of Swanzey, the comparable funds for the Monadnock Regional School District. Such funds include the Capital Reserve and Expendable Trusts, funded by public appropriation at the respective annual Town and District Meetings, as well as non-restricted trust accounts funded by private donations, bequests, memorials, and scholarships. By “ad-

minister,” trustees oversee the orderly withdrawal of funds from trust accounts for stipulated projects, as well as the investment of funds to assure sufficient liquidity, offset inflation, and comply with all relevant statutes (notably, RSA 31, 32 and others). Trustee responsibility is a fiduciary one: all activities are reported annually to the NH Attorney General Office of Charitable Trusts, and audited annually. Funds currently in Town and District Trusts exceed seven million dollars. ❖

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Swanzey Sewer Commission

2010 has been a year to plan for the future. The Town of Swanzey owns 4.7% of the Keene Wastewater Treatment Plant capacity and, by inter-municipal agreement, is responsible for 4.7% of upgrade costs. To comply with the EPA's permitting requirements, the City must upgrade the Treatment Plant to lower phosphorous levels. Final cost estimates for this upgrade are not yet available, but preliminary estimates are in the nine to ten million dollar range.

The City has proposed multi-year projects that include capital improvements aimed at improving operations and attaining compliance with EPA discharge requirements for the twenty-five year old Plant. To gauge the potential cost impact of these projects on Swanzey, the Sewer Commission has contracted with Under-

wood Engineers to conduct a rate study of various scenarios. In addition, Underwood Engineers will look into other funding sources and grant programs that may be available, such as community development block grants (utilized as a funding source for the 2005 North Swanzey project). The Commission has also applied for--and been awarded--a \$200,000 grant from the State revolving fund.

The West Swanzey Wastewater Treatment Plant also is required by EPA permit to treat for phosphorous. This permit expires in 2011. Since the inception of the permit we have been able to meet the phosphorous level set by the EPA thanks to our plant operator, Scott Self, who developed an in-house treatment process.

The systematic cleaning of sewer lines in West Swanzey is ongoing. ❖

This past year the Precinct hired Frank Lucius Construction to replace main line valves in the area of Swanzey Factory Road, Route 12, and Lake Street.

During the excavation of the water main, we discovered that the Swanzey Factory Road water main was not connected to the Route 12 main, and had not been for at least the last twenty years. We made the connection, replacing four hundred feet of the old 6" line with 8" ductile iron. Water quality and service improved immediately.

Purchases included a replacement oil tank at the Precinct building, a replacement hydrant on Rust Way, and a trench box for our workers' safety while working below grade. In 2010 we adopted a back flow prevention policy. We look forward to finalizing our interim water agreement with the City of Keene.

We continue working to keep costs down, while providing safe, quality water. Maintenance of the mains, hydrants and valves continues with the cooperation with town staff and the Department of Public Works. ❖

Ashuelot River Local Advisory Committee

Major projects were completed on the River this year! Removal of the Homestead Woolen Mill Dam and reinforcement of the Thompson Covered Bridge were completed Oct. 1. Many stopped to watch the construction over the 6-week process, and more continue to stop and view the transformed free-flowing river. In Keene, the clean-up of coal tar derivatives from Mill Creek was completed, but the return of high river flows deferred removal from the mainstem until low water of 2011.

Land conservation successes supported by ARLAC included purchase by the Society for the Protection of NH Forests of 1,750 acres in the headwaters, and the use of NH Aquatic Resource Mitigation Funds towards the purchase of an easement on shorelands in Swanzey.

The volunteer Ashuelot River water quality monitoring program, in conjunction with the Department of Environmental Services Volunteer River Assessment Program, continued for its tenth season. A spring training program prepared members and community volunteers for five months of water sampling. Twelve sites were sampled along the Ashuelot River's 64-mile length, as well as at two sites along the South Branch. Samples were analyzed for temperature, pH, total phosphorus, dissolved oxygen, turbidity, chloride, and conductivity. Conservation commissions along the River donated funding to support lab costs. A review of ten years of data indicates that total

phosphorus levels in Swanzey and downstream appear to be on the decline. *E.coli* values continue to fluctuate, with some concerns on the South Branch, the sources of contamination yet to be determined. Declining pH values throughout the River's course indicate a trend of increasing acidity.

Review and comment on state permit applications to conduct work within the River corridor This year we submitted comments on projects proposed in Washington, Marlow, Keene, Swanzey, and Winchester. On-going discussions of projects of significant impact include a proposed biomass plant in Winchester and a proposal by the City of Keene to exempt certain shorelands from the Comprehensive Shoreland Protection Act. ARLAC members promoted small boat access at the proposed Route 10 Bridge replacement, and followed NH legislation and rulemaking, advocating for river corridor protection.

ARLAC Corridor Management Implementation Plan Heeding Model Forest Policy Program research, ARLAC included climate change impact as a guiding principle in plan implementation. ARLAC members also began working with The Nature Conservancy to locate and implement a model culvert restoration project in the watershed.

The annual River clean-up scheduled for Oct. 2 was cancelled due to high water. However, volunteers in Swanzey and Keene picked up debris throughout the month on portions of the River and Beaver Brook. ❖

2010 was a good year for the Library. Gains in readership and library use continued to hold steady. The public access computers have been in regular use, and this year saw a sharp increase in patrons taking advantage of the wireless service and using their own laptops. The Summer Reading Program was a success, and several other programs were held.

One hundred sixty-three new patrons signed up in 2010. The computers were used 1,186 times, with many patrons using their own devices with the wireless service. The library was visited 11,100 times, and 22,864 materials were checked out.

The Friends of the Library put on several fun parties with water themes, including an outdoor party with water balloons, buckets and a pool incorporated into some very splashing activities. In other programming, the Library hosted the Red Cross's presentation on disaster and flood preparedness, the Keene Amateur Astronomers Group's talk about the moon, and the Hourglass Readers's lively reading of Shakespeare's *A Comedy of Errors*. The Friends of the Library purchased a public performance movie license and have been holding monthly movie nights for children, culminating in a holiday party/movie night that included cookies, cocoa, and the local Brownie group leading carols. Thanks to new Friends of the Library, we have a beautiful new Christmas tree, which we adorned with donated scarves, gloves and hats for area needy.

Unfortunately, 2010 did not bring the hoped-for statewide open-source circulation system that the state librarian has been working on. For now, we continue to cross our fingers and hope that 2011 brings progress.

We sincerely thank all the people who gave of their time, funds and energy to us in this past year. We do what we do for you, and we can't do it without you. Thank you! ♦

Homestead Woolen Mill Dam &

After twelve years of planning, the Homestead Woolen Mill dam was removed in the fall of 2010. Within a few short weeks, twenty miles of Ashuelot River was once again flowing freely. Historians believe that a dam existed near the project location since 1732.

The Homestead Woolen Mill dam was located immediately downstream from the Thompson Covered Bridge. In conjunction with the dam removal, the center pier of the Thompson bridge was stabilized to protect it from washing out, and flow-altering stone barbs were installed upstream of the abutments. Stone vanes in the riverbed will help fish navigate upstream. These projects were linked to ensure that the covered bridge suffered no adverse consequences of the restored freely-flowing river. ❖

Many partners participated in the complicated process of evaluating the feasibility of dam removal and its alternatives, as well as securing permits and developing final plans.

Bridge repairs were funded with an 80/20 match from the National Historic Covered Bridge Program, \$300,000 of Federal ARRA-related funding, and State Bridge Aid in a 80/20 match. The Town capital reserve and a 2006 special appropriation funded Swanzey's 20% contribution.

Minutes of Deliberative Session

To the inhabitants of the Town of Swanzezy in the State of New Hampshire qualified to vote in Town affairs:

Moderator Gus Lerandeau called the meeting to order at 7:00 PM introducing town officials and Assistant Moderator Pat Haselton who would be assisting with articles considered at this evening's deliberative session. Boy Scouts Carl Thompsen and David Schnyer led participants in the Pledge of Allegiance. Moderator Gus Lerandeau and Assistant Moderator Pat Haselton read the warrant as follows:

FIRST SESSION You are hereby notified to meet for the First (Deliberative) Session of the annual Town Meeting, to be held at the Monadnock Regional High School/Middle School Auditorium, Swanzezy, NH on Tuesday, the second day of February 2010 at seven in the evening (7:00 p.m.). The First Deliberative Session will consist of explanation, discussion, debate of articles and will afford those voters who are present the opportunity to propose, debate and adopt amendments to each warrant article, except election of officers and those whose wording is prescribed by state law.

Article 1 To choose by ballot all necessary town officers including a Moderator, Selectman, a Supervisor of the Checklist, Trustee of the Trust Funds, Sewer Commissioner, Zoning Board of Adjustment member, 3 Planning Board members and a Library Trustee.

Article 2 Shall the town vote to raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant or as amended by vote of the first session, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling \$5,539,810? Should this article be defeated, the default budget shall be \$5,483,630, which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the town or by law; or the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only. (RECOMMENDED BY SELECTMEN)

After lengthy discussion, it was voted in favor of this article on the official ballot in question for as written.

SECOND SESSION You are also notified to meet for the Second Session of the annual Town Meeting on Tuesday, the ninth day of March 2010, at the Christian Life Fellowship Church, 211 Whitcomb Road, between the hours of 8 a.m. and 7 p.m. to vote by official ballot to elect town officers, to vote by official ballot on warrant articles as they may have been amended at the First Session and those other official ballot questions whose wording is prescribed by state law.

Article 3 Shall the town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 456,850 to be placed in the following expendable trust and capital reserve accounts of the Town:

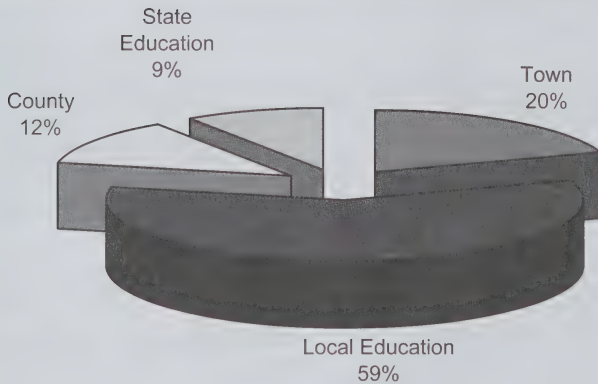

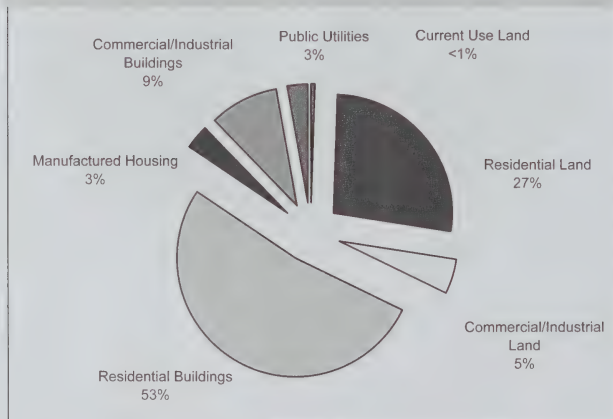
