Warrant for Annual Town Meeting, 1915.

(L. S.)

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Wolfeboro qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Brewster Memorial Hall in said Town, on the second Tuesday of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects :

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Town Clerk, three Selectmen, two Auditors, Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, and Prosecuting Liquor Agent for the ensuing year, and one Library Trustee for the ensuing three years.

ARTICLE 2. To elect one or more, not exceeding three, highway agents; or instruct the Selectmen to appoint one expert highway agent.

ARTICLE 3. To choose all other necessary Town officers and agents.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of money necessary to secure State Aid for the permanent improvement of highways under the law passed at the January Session of the General Court, 1905.

ARTICLE 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairs of highways, bridges and sidewalks, in addition to that required by law.

ARTICLE 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay on its indebtedness.

ARTICLE 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to pay each Fireman, legally returned, for the year 1915, in addition to that required by law. ARTICLE 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Town Public Library, in addition to that required by law.

ARTICLE 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay James R. Newell Post, G. A. R., to defray expenses of Memorial Day, May 30, 1915.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to aid and assist the Huggins Hospital, and to see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the same.

ARTICLE II. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for town expenses for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 12. * To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selecmen to hire a sum of money, not to exceed the Highway appropriations, to build and repair highways in said town, in anticipation of the assessment of 1915, by note or otherwise.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars, to secure a like amount from the State for maintenance of the State Road in said Town.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to construct a State Highway of suitable width from Pickering's Corner in said town, to Ossipee or Brookfield, and raise and appropriate a sum sufficient to carry said vote into effect, agreeable to a petition signed by William J. Britton and others.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, by bond or otherwise, a sum of money sufficient to pay its part, but in no case to exceed \$10,000.00, in conjunction with the State, in constructing a highway, agreeable to legislation, that may be enacted at the present session of the Legislature, relative to the Winnipesaukee Lake Road, agreeable to a petition signed by H. L. Miles and others.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to cut the pines now growing on the Old Town House Lot, so-called, near Wolfeboro Center, agreeable to a petition signed by Arthur S. Moody and others.

ARTICLE 17. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate in aid of free public band concerts for ensuing year.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to extend its water system from the termination of the main pipe on the road from South Wolfeboro to New Durham, to a point on said road opposite house of Charles S. Chase. Agreeable to a petition signed by Charles W. Hicks and others.

ARTICLE 19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for concrete gutters on North Main Street.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money sufficient to oil all macadam roads now constructed in said town.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money sufficient to build a permanent sidewalk on South side of Pleasant Street.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to meter the balance of its water system, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to build an oil bound macadam road from the bridge, to connect with State Road on North Main Street, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to extend the water system to Pleasant Valley, beginning near the house of G. \pounds . Brewster and running to house of John W. Edgerly, at Brackett's Corner, so-called, with not less than a four-inch pipe, and raise and appropriate money for the same, agreeable to a petition signed by Charles P. Moore and others.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to relay its water pipe from the cottage of Walter C. Mitchell to the Navy Yard, so-called, below the frost line, so as to insure winter service, and to raise and appropriate money for the same.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount of 5% from the taxes of those who settle their taxes on or before the first day of August, a discount of 4% from those who settle on or before the first day of September, a discount of 3% from those who settle on or before the first day of October, a discount of 2% from those who settle on or before the first day of November, a discount of 1% from those who settle on or before the first day of December, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

ARTICLE 27. To hear the report of any Committee, and take action thereon.

ARTICLE 28. To transact any business that may legally come before said meeting.

Report State Tax Commission, 1914

No power has constituted the members of the tax commission guardians of the public in respect to expenditures for the support of government, and they have no disposition to assume that role. Nevertheless, "economy being a most essential virtue in all states," and it being "the duty of legislators and magistrates * to countenance and inculcate the principles of * * economy," all as set forth in the constitution of this state, the commissioners believe themselves to be amply justified in urging, as they have so often urged before, the importance of this subject upon the voters of the state. The public revenue, state and municipal, is the voters' business and they are responsible, directly or indirectly, for every extravagance affecting it from the inception to the termination of the fund.

Every compulsory contribution levied by public authority upon people or property is in the broad sense of the term a tax, nor is it made less obnoxious or burdensome if called a fee or a fine. In the figures that follow therefore, all fees, fines, and other exactions, if any, are included with the taxes upon polls and estates. To illustrate the comparative importance of the two classes, it may be said that the taxes upon polls and estates represent about 95 per cent. and all other income about 5 per cent. of the total revenue of the state, and of the counties, cities, towns, districts and precincts therein.

Taxes as defined above have increased by leaps and bounds in recent years. In 1903 the sum of all the taxes assessed by and within the state of New Hampshire was \$5,-373,420.22; in 1913 it was \$8,765,039.07, an increase of \$3,-391.618.85, or 63 per cent., in ten years. But these figures do not adequately represent the velocity the upward movement has now attained. To show that it is necessary to divide the ten-year period: The levy in 1908 was \$924,388.79, or 17 per cent. greater than in 1903, while that in 1913 was \$2,467,230.06, or 39 per cent. greater than in 1908. By so much did the advance in the last half of said period exceed that in the first half. These figures will be the more alarming if it is remembered that while taxes already sufficiently heavy were advancing 63 per cent., the population of the state increased only about 41/2 per cent., and while the one was advancing 39 per cent., the other increased only about $2\frac{1}{4}$ per cent.

It is instructive to study the subject from another angle. In the ten years from 1904 to 1914, both inclusive, the annual increase in all taxes defined and limited as above was as follows:

The average yearly increase for the whole period was \$336,561.85. The upward trend is more plainly shown, however, by dividing, as before, the ten-year period in the middle and considering the halves separately. For the first five years the average annual increase was \$184,877.76; for the last five years it was \$493,446.01. It is surely pertinent to consider how long the little state of New Hampshire, almost

stationary in wealth, can sustain a tax already burdensome and increasing at the rate of practically half a million dollars a year without crippling her industries nd impoverishing her people. Plainly it is a condition not calculated to attract capital from without the state or to encourage business within the same.

From the *per capita* standpoint the situation is not less disturbing. In 1903 there were assessed \$12.88 in taxes for each man, woman and child in the state. Five years later there were assessed \$14.75 for each individual, and in five vears more \$20.09. If in 1913 taxes had been equally distributed among all the people it would have meant a burden of \$100 for each family of five members. Though in reality there was little such equality in the assessment there was much in the payment. The fact is that those who occupy, use or consume property, no matter who owns it, are those who in the last analysis pay most, if not all, of the taxes thereon. If the wage earner or the man of limited means understood he was in reality paying something like \$100 a year in state and municipal and half as much more in federal taxes for the government of himself, his wife and three children his influence and his vote would more frequently make for economy in appropriations and expenditures than heretofore.

No statistics for the year 1914 appear in the above paragraphs for the reason that they are not yet at hand except in part.

I desire at this time to extend my thanks for the courteous treatment the Selectmen have at all times extended to me, and their helpful counsel and advice has been duly appreciated. I wish also to thank the citizens for the kind help they have extended to me in my endeavors to improve the highways of Wolfeboro. I have tried to do as much work along a permanent line as circumstances and money at hand would allow.

There has been 3300 linear feet of road base put in from the Morgan and Kimball pits at a cost of about \$1500.00; there has been 700 feet of cast iron culvert pipe used at a cost for pipe and labor of \$1200.00. Several of the wooden bridges have been covered with oak plank; 30 stone culverts have been taken up and relaid at an approximate cost of \$200.00. The cattle pass near Thomas Bickford's place has been deepened and relaid at a cost of \$100.00, so you see about \$3000.00 has been expended for work along a permanent line.

REPORT OF LIBRARIAN

GENTLEMEN:-

The ninth annual report of the librarian, showing the work of the library for the year just ended, is herewith presented.

The possibilities of usefulness for a library are ever increasing, the work ever growing. At no time has this been more apparent than during the past year. In March and August more than 1,500 books were loaned, the highest record made until January, when the number reached 1,646.

During the year, 294 books were added to the shelves. Of these 71 were contributed. The increase in the number of gifts has been specially gratifying.

The circulation for the year has been 15,418 of these classes: fiction, 7.958; non-fiction, 2,879; children's books, 4,571. This is an increase of 1,332 over the preceding year.

Sixty-one dollars and ninety-six cents have been taken in at the desk for fines and books lost or damaged. This money has been used for library supplies and for new books. The balance on hand at this date is \$5.12

Books have been sent to South Wolfeboro for distribution as usual. The appreciation shown by the readers there more than repays us for the extra work involved.

For the first time, books have been sent in lots of 25 each to our local hospital.

We are anxious to establish stations for the loan of books at North and East Wolfeboro, but as yet no one in these villages has volunteered to take the work.

The reading room has received its usual patronage, and the children have been happy in selecting and reading their own class of books.

The reference department promises to be one of the strongest features in the library work. We are hoping that more and more the people will come to use the reference shelves. An interesting 1 urchase in this department has been Baedeker's Guide-book to the United States. This is specially good in maps.

We hope soon to publish a catalogue of the books in the library. This demand is a frequent one at the desk, and no one thing would so much increase the usefulness of the library in the outlying districts of the town and among those patrons who must send for their books.

Special thanks are due Mrs. Newell for the loan and arrangement of pictures bearing on matters of current interest; and for placing in the reading room a cabinet of choice specimens from her large collection gathered in foreign lands; also to Mrs. Graves and Miss Horne, for their work in circulating the books sent to South Wolfeboro; also to Mr. Daniel Morgan for his free transportation of books to and from the Huggins Hospital.

We would also express our appreciation of the assistants in the library room, who are carrying on the work during the winter months.

In conclusion, the librarian extends thanks to the Trustees for their efficient service, and to the many who are giving her encouragement in her work.
