BELMONT TOWN WARRANT
The State of New Hampshire

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF BELMONT IN THE COUNTY OF BELKNAP, IN THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE, QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN TOWN AFFAIRS:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, first floor, in said Belmont on Tuesday, the 9th day of March at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To choose one Selectman for three years, one Trustee of the Trust Funds for three years, one Trustee of the Public Library for three years.
3. To see if the Town will vote to change the time and place for discussion of the Warrant and Budget in 1971 to the Saturday after the second Tuesday, in March (being March 13, 1971) at 1 p.m. and to be held at the Roland Kimball Auditorium at the High School.
4. To see what action the Town will take upon the Budget as recommended by the Budget Committee.
5. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current municipal year, and to issue in the name of and on the credit of the Town, negotiable notes therefor, said notes to be repaid during the current municipal year.
6. To see what the Town will vote to do with the income from the John M. Sargent Fund.
7. To see what the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to refinance and/or renew any loans which may become due during the current municipal year.
8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to convey real property acquired by the Town from the Tax Collector at such prices as the Selectmen find advisable.
9. To see if the Town will vote to impose the fees specified upon applicants for the following permits:
 - (a) Building permit - ten dollars (\$10.00)
 - (b) Sanitary facilities (septic tank) - twenty dollars (\$20.00)
 - (c) Use permit - ten dollars (\$10.00)

10. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following by-law: It shall be lawful to conduct retail sales, and for retail stores and departments therein to be opened for business, and to conduct general merchandising business, on Sundays.

11. To see if the Town will vote to require that only phosphate-free laundry products may be offered for sale in the Town of Belmont after June 1, 1971.

12. To see if the Town will vote to name the Judkins property bordering Pout Pond purchased by the Town of Belmont at March, 1967 annual town meeting for a use as a town park, article #10, to be named as Murray Park and to have known hereafter the swimming area to be developed as part of the part of the park as Judkins Beach. Also to limit the park's use to Belmont residents and the guests only.

13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a building committee, to consist of such number of voters of the town as they determine advisable, to study the needs for and make recommendations relative to improvements to the municipal offices, including the Town Hall, or such other buildings as may be needed to house the town's municipal offices.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) to be expended by the Building Committee to study the improvements of municipal offices.

15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to convey to John J. Canepa and Lucille M. Canepa a piece of land at the junction of Route 107 and Durrell Mountain Road containing 1,997 square feet of land, and being a portion of land conveyed to the Town by Eve Rogers, December 11, 1933, Book 210, Page 248, but not including any portion of land presently in use as Durrell Mountain Road.

16. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Budget Committee to hold meetings with the Board of Selectmen every three months, to go over and review the status of current expenditures and various budget categories, and to offer advice and guidance to prevent overdrafts.

17. To see if the Town will vote to accept as public roads by acceptance of a warranty deed thereto the streets shown on plans of Pleasant Valley Estates and Pine Crest Estates provided the same comply with the specifications set forth by the Selectmen, and also to accept all water pipes, mains and other facilities situated under said streets and in the subdivisions as a part of the town water system, subject to approval of the water department.

18. To see if the Town will vote to accept all of Sunray Shores Roads.

19. To see if the Town will vote to accept as a public road by acceptance of a warranty deed thereto, Witham Road, so-called.

20. To see if the Town will vote to sell its 1948 Walters truck and 1937 Ford tank truck, which are no longer needed for Town purposes for such price as the Selectmen shall deem reasonable and advisable.

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed nine thousand dollars (\$9,000.00) for the purchase of a used Gallion grader for the highway department, and to authorize the Selectmen to borrow not in excess of six thousand dollars (\$6,000.00) of such purchase price and to issue notes or bonds of the Town therefor payable over a period not to exceed three years.

22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not in excess of ten thousand eight hundred dollars (\$10,800.00) for the purchase of two trucks for the highway department.

23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand three hundred dollars (\$3,300.00) for the purpose of obtaining garbage collection throughout the town on a weekly basis, rather than as presently scheduled.

24. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) for further development of the town park, which would be, for dredging an area of mucky shore-line adjacent to the proposed swimming area to the back shore-line, an area of approximately 300 feet long and approximately 60 feet wide, to the depth of approximately 8 feet below water level, and to cover cost of contractor putting a gravel bed for equipment to set on if needed at each end of area to be dredged, not to exceed in cost of five hundred twenty-five dollars (\$525.00), the balance of the one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) to be used for continuing the clean up of back shore line of Pout Pond of particularly submerged logs and cutting of brush and hauling out of same and for further work on swimming area not to exceed four hundred seventy-five dollars (\$475.00).

25. To see if the Town will vote to hereafter have the present Belmont Recreation Committee be known as the Belmont Recreation Commission and to operate the Town Park according to the State Statutes, RSA Chapter 31, paragraphs RSA 44 through RSA 50A.

Also, to restrict any further excavation of any type for any reason in the park area without first obtaining the written consent of the Belmont Recreation Commission.

26. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue that portion of Ladd Hill Road, as formerly laid out, if the same has not been previously discontinued by vote, which is described as follows: Beginning at an

iron pin set in the ground a distance of 290 feet southerly of the southerly side of Route 3, and thence running South 23^o East a distance of 185 feet along the right of way of Ladd Hill Road as presently constructed and a stone wall to an iron hub; thence running North 65^o East along the abandoned or discontinued Ladd Hill Road a distance of 57 feet to an iron pin set in the ground; thence running North 40^o West 200 feet along land of Lowell Electronic Park Realty Trust to the point of beginning.

27. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to convey to Lowell Electronic Park Realty Trust the portion of Ladd Hill Road discontinued by Article 26.

28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seven thousand dollars (\$7,000.00) to be used toward the widening and paving of 1.3 miles of Durrell Mountain Road from Route 107 to the intersection of Hoadley Road, the remaining forty-three thousand dollars (\$43,000.00) cost of this project to be paid by the State from TRA funds.

29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sum as is needed to pave Plummer Hill Road from Route 106 to Greenlea Trailer Park.

30. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS & RECOMMENDATIONS

March 2, 1970

Belmont, New Hampshire

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the Town of Belmont for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1969, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

One of the enclosed audits must be given the Town Clerk as part of the permanent records.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Water Department, Library, Trustees of Trust Funds and Municipal Court.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets —

December 31, 1968 - December 31, 1969 (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1968 and December 31, 1969 are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Net Debt increased by \$25,776.74 in 1969.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures -
Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 & A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1969, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary, (Exhibit A-4), a revenue surplus of \$7,426.94, plus a net

unexpended balance of appropriations of \$2,196.08, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$9,623.02.

Summary Statement of Receipts & Expenditures (Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1969, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1969, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

Water Department: (Exhibit E)

A statement of the receipts and expenditures of the Water Department for 1969, is contained in Exhibit E.

Various Departmental Accounts: (Exhibits F, G-1, G-2, G-3 & H)

Statements of various departmental accounts for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1969 are included in the above Exhibits.

Statement of Long Term Indebtedness: (Exhibit I)

A statement of outstanding long term indebtedness as of December 31, 1969, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit I.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as were considered necessary in the circumstances.

Verification of uncollected and unredeemed taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records. The amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are therefore subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of the verification notices.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Current Surplus:

The current surplus, (excess of total assets over current liabilities), decreased by \$5,876.74, from \$21,673.04 to \$15,797.20 in 1969, as shown herewith:

Inasmuch as the two year period provided by law in which redemptions from tax sales may be made has expired on all of these unredeemed taxes, the tax collector should deed all of the properties represented by these unredeemed tax liens to the Town.

Municipal Court:

The clerk of the municipal court should reconcile the checking account with the docket book on a monthly basis and any differences between the complaints recorded and the money deposited into the checking account should be noted. Also, attention is called to Chapter 331, Section 502 - A:9 of the Laws of 1963 relative to the disposition of fines paid into the Municipal Court, which is quoted herewith:

“502-A:9 Payments: Payments to cities and towns shall be made monthly, on or before the fifth day of each month, and shall cover the net receipts as aforesaid of said court for the month preceding . . .”

Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 184, of the Laws of 1955, require that this report or the summary of findings and recommendations, (letter of transmittal), shall be published in the next annual report of the Town.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Belmont for their assistance during the course of the audit.

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REPORT OF THE CIVIL DEFENSE DIRECTOR

For the year ended December 31, 1970

Your Civil Defense Agency this year provided funds for purchase of a surplus generator capable of supplying emergency power sufficient to maintain radio communications and other necessary functions at the Fire Station in the event of a fire, flood, or other disaster in the community. It is presently being held in readiness at the home of one of the firemen, and it is hoped to make space for it at the fire station soon, where it will be ready for instant use.

We also purchased an FM radio receiver for the fire department frequency to complete the emergency communications for the fire department at this time.

We have acquired three hospital beds through surplus, and these are being stored in the basement of the town hall. Anyone in town who is an invalid and needs the temporary loan of one of these beds should contact us.

The Civil Defense town emergency plan has nearly been completed. Anyone interested in helping our organization by volunteering his time, is urged to get in touch with us.

REPORT OF BELMONT PLANNING BOARD

During the past year the Planning Board has been involved in a number of significant projects. A great deal of time has been spent considering the study made by Hans Klunder Associates. This study includes a view of Belmont's present and potential resources such as land, buildings, streets and highways, community facilities, population, etc. The Planning Board has worked closely with the consultants using this study to develop a comprehensive plan for the town. The final plan has now been approved and will soon be available in published form.

On July 1, 1970, Land Subdivision Regulations were implemented by the Board in an effort to give Belmont a workable formula for guiding development in the town. These regulations were implemented only after several months of careful consideration following the passage of the enabling legislation at the 1970 Town Meeting.

The fall and winter months have seen the Board working to develop a basic zoning ordinance which they feel is necessary to provide protection of individual and community rights and properties in this fast growing town.

Three new members joined the Planning Board in 1970. They are Stanley Nawoj, Alfred Sawicki, and Royal Smith, Jr. They replace retiring members Russell Cushing, Maurice Hueber, and Thomas Edwards, Jr. Selectman Mark Mooney was appointed as an ex-officio member.

REPORT OF THE BELMONT POLICE DEPARTMENT FOR THE YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 1970

The 1970 U.S. Census for Belmont showed that our town is continuing to grow at a rate greater than the U.S. as a whole, the State of New Hampshire, or Belknap County. The Division of Resources and Economic Development predicts that, with the largest undeveloped land area in the county and an excellent highway system, we will have a population of over 10,000 within the next 19 years.

All local government services must look ahead to keep pace with this growth. Your Police Department, which has always tried to maintain a progressive attitude, recently completed a study which should assist in planning our growth over the next five years, and this study was made available to your Budget Committee this year. We hope that we can provide an adequate level of law enforcement for our community and still operate on one of the lowest budgets for a full-time department in the County.

During the past year, we were sorry indeed to lose the services of Andre "Bib" Pacuette, our first full-time night patrolman, who resigned to go with the Sheriff's Department. We were fortunate to attract Walter R. Newcomb, a veteran of two years with the Laconia Police Department, who purchased a home and moved here, and whose infant son, Patrick Michael, was born after the family moved to Belmont.

During 1970, we received cash grants of \$2,892 from the Federal Highway Safety Agency to purchase a new cruiser and keep the old vehicle as a spare, and \$660 from the Governor's Commission on Crime and Delinquency to finance a radio remote for the Town Hall, and a fingerprint camera. Your Chief was named as law enforcement delegate from N.H. to the New England Conference on Criminal Delinquency.

A series of burglaries in two states was solved and over \$3,000 in stolen articles recovered with the arrest of two local youths who were sentenced to terms at the House of Correction. A safe burglary at Palmer Plumbing Supply in Winnisquam was solved with the arrest of two Concord men who were also implicated in breaks in Moultonborough and Alton. Breaks at Belmont High School, the Fenwick Hosiery Mill, and private residences in town were cleared with the apprehension of five juveniles, while four different juveniles were apprehended for malicious damage to construction equipment in the Durrell Mountain Road area. The impending armed robbery of a bank was forestalled with the arrest of a Loudon man for a series of forgeries and conspiracy. Two felons wanted in other states were picked up, one of whom was working for the Town Highway Department at the time. Two officers fortunately escaped injury and only light damage was done to the 1968 cruiser in a high-speed chase involving

police officers from three towns, in which the driver was subsequently arrested for drunken driving and hit and run.

An investigating committee appointed at the last Town Meeting spent many hours and took testimony from numerous persons looking into the operations of the Police Department, and came up with a report giving us a clean bill of health. We are grateful for the time and effort they put into the project.

A central phone and radio dispatching system at the County level was inaugurated this year, providing a guarantee of 24-hour communications and added protection to cruiser officers working alone at night. Although it provides more rapid service in emergencies, the new system sometimes makes us more inaccessible to the public calling on routine business, and one of our present problems is how to retain this rapid emergency service and still provide proper handling of routine matters.

Other problems within the department include lack of decent facilities at our Town Hall office, working conditions which provide inadequate relief time to permit our officers to lead normal private lives, and a pay scale which includes a base which has not increased since 1968, despite an almost 21% jump in the cost of living since that time.

We are proud of our town, and of the co-operation we have received over the years from the Budget Committee, Planning Board, heads of other municipal departments, most of the town officials, and from each and every resident of Belmont. We hope that you, in turn, are proud of your police department and that, working together, we can look forward to a happy and prosperous future for our growing community.

REPORT OF BELMONT FIRE DEPARTMENT

Year Ending December 31, 1970

The year 1970 was a busy one for Belmont Fire Department. Records show that it was busier than in any past years.

The men of the department attended fire schools in Fitzwilliams for two days and Lily Pond Training School for two days. They also had four fire training classes (15 hours each) at the fire station, plus their regular monthly fire drill.

The department was called upon for assistance a total of 260 times. This is an increase of 115 over 1969. Breakdown of calls are as follows:

Report of the Forest Fire Warden and District Chief

The 1970 forest fire season was a quiet one in this area, quiet in part because of your continued cooperation and favorable weather conditions.

Fires that did occur were, for the most part, caused by debris burning, children and smokers.

The elimination of these three causes of forest fires would drastically change this picture - to bring about this change we make the following suggestions:

1. When the ground is not covered with snow a permit to burn must be obtained from the Forest Fire Warden. This permit covers waste burning, even if in an incinerator, grass burning, as well as garden trash and brush burning such burning is restricted by regulation to prior to 9:00 a.m. and after 5:00 p.m. with the following exceptions:

Commercial or industrial burning is permissible at any time under normal conditions but only with the approval of the District Chief and a written permit from the Forest Fire Warden.

2. Fires caused by children can be prevented only with the complete cooperation of parents in the supervision of their children, keep matches out of reach of children, this action will help to prevent fires and may save a life, the life of your child. Try to explain this to your child, won't you?

3. Forest fires caused by smokers can be reduced in number by the exercise of more care in the discarding of matches and smoking material whether from a vehicle or by a hiker. In all cases, make sure that the butt or match you discard is out, dead out. Smokey says, "Thanks for your help", and invites you to join with him in setting a good example for others in the prevention of fires and the protection of our environment.

Chairman Earl Sweeney informed the meeting that the Belmont School was going to accept twenty-four students from the town of Canterbury on an experimental basis. He noted that the tuition from these students would amount to around \$19,000 and the cost for an extra teacher and rent for a possible added "mobile room" would be more than met by the tuition fees.

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Belmont School District for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1970, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the District. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board, School District Treasurer and the School Lunch account.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of June 30, 1969 and June 30, 1970 are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein, the Net Debt of the District decreased by \$34,653,68, from \$173,697.46 to \$139,043.78 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1970.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

At the close of the 1969-70 school year five staff members left the Belmont School System. This is a 14.7% faculty turnover. In addition to replacing these staff members, the faculty was increased by adding a teacher for girls physical education. This permits the offering of physical education to all students from grade one through twelve. A new teacher was also added due to the acceptance of grade nine students from Canterbury. The music and art teachers were changed from part-time to full-time positions. These staff additions were significant steps toward accreditation for our school system.

Constantly increasing enrollments are now causing a serious housing problem for students. Following are our September enrollments for the past five years:

September, 1966	603
September, 1967	597
September, 1968	611
September, 1969	643
September, 1970	689

In January, 1971, we had two first grade classes of thirty-three each, grade three has a class of thirty-three and a class of twenty-seven, grade four a class of thirty-five and a class of thirty-six. Since there is no available space to subdivide these classes, efforts to give any significant individual help is considerably hampered. The solution to maintaining and improving education for our Belmont students lays in the building program study. The work of the School Board and the Building Committee in studying Belmonts needs as well as a Cooperative School Plan with Canterbury provides two possible solutions to this housing problem.

A new service to Belmont High School students which has been inaugurated this year is the Vocational Rehabilitation Program. This program which operates from the Supervisory Union Office is staffed with Donald Frost as counselor. The V.R. Unit attempts to provide work-study programs for high school students who are not benefiting from the regular academic programs of the school. The goal of the program is to keep students in school while providing them with skills which will make them employable after graduation. Funds for this program are provided by the Federal Government.

In October, a Supervisory Union No. 18 Workshop on Environmental Education was held. Belmont teachers participated at Franklin High School with the other Supervisory Union No. 18 teachers in the

morning sessions and at Belmont High School during the afternoon sessions. The afternoon program was directed by Mrs. Suzanne Roberts. Mrs. Roberts completed a course in Water Pollution during the summer at Tilton School. As the result of the summer program, the Workshop Program as well as several science class projects were carried out.

During the past year a notable improvement has been made in the upkeep of our buildings. This has been accomplished by our present custodial staff with some part-time help.

The septic tank system continued to cause a serious problem. During the year, additional holding capacity was installed to alleviate the problem.

In the past, painting of our building has been minimal due to budget increases. However, more funds are needed in this area and have been requested in the 1971-72 budget.

The roof at the Memorial School and the Junior-Senior High School are in need of attention. Funds have been requested in the 1971-72 budget to make the necessary repairs.

A thorough inspection by Chief Robert Bourdeau of the Belmont Fire Department and representatives of the State Fire Marshalls Office required some immediate attention. With the excellent cooperation of Chief Bourdeau, these problems have been handled to the satisfaction of all concerned.

Again I would like to express my thanks to the Citizens, School Board and School Personnel for their efforts on behalf of education in Belmont.
