# State of New Hampshire

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To the inhabitants of the Town of Haverhill qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in said town on Tuesday, the 10th day of March, 1931, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following matters:

Article 1. To choose a town clerk.

Article 2. To hear the reports of the selectmen, treasurer, cemetery commissioners, and any other town officers heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 3. To choose one selectman for the term of three years, a town treasurer, one or more highway agents, one or more auditors, one library trustee for the term of three years, one cemetery commissioner for the term of five years, one trustee of trust funds for the term of three years, and all other necessary town officers.

Article 4. To raise and appropriate money for the support of the poor.  
for the maintenance of state trunk line roads.

Article 5. To raise and appropriate money for the maintenance of state trunk line roads.

Article 6. To raise and appropriate money for the construction of state aid roads.

Article 7. To raise and appropriate money for the maintenance of state aid roads.

Article 8. To raise and appropriate money for removal of snow on trunk line and state aid roads.

Article 9. To raise and appropriate money for laying out, building and repairing highways and bridges.

Article 10. To raise and appropriate money to



pay interest and principal of outstanding town notes.

Article 11. To authorize the selectmen to issue interest bearing orders or notes to provide for current year expenses in anticipation of taxes, and to see if the town will extend for another year the authority granted to the selectmen at the annual meeting of 1924 to issue notes or bonds covering the refunding of notes given in connection with rebuilding the Woodsville-Wells River bridge; and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 12. To authorize the selectmen to distribute the blank inventories at the time they examine taxable property.

Article 13. To raise and appropriate money for town libraries.

Article 14. To raise and appropriate money for Memorial Day.

Article 15. To raise and appropriate money for the cemeteries in said town, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 16. To raise and appropriate money for the support of the Cottage Hospital.

Article 17. To raise and appropriate money to exterminate white pine blister rust in said town.

Article 18. To raise and appropriate money for other town charges.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote in favor of granting permits to druggists for the sale of liquor, in said town, for medicinal, scientific and mechanical purposes, under the provisions of chapter 144 of the Public Laws.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to appoint a budget committee to supervise the appropriations of said town and to recommend to the next annual meeting the amounts to be raised for various purposes, such recommendations to be printed in the next annual report.

Article 21. To transact any other business proper to come before said meeting.

# Report of Selectmen

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To the Citizens and Taxpayers of Haverhill:

We submit our report for the year ending Jan. 31, 1931. Upon the following pages will be found the detailed statements.

During the past year we have decreased our indebtedness in the amount of \$6,891.71, regardless of the fact that both Town Highway and Town Poor appropriations were overrun. This decrease is due partly to the appropriation made of \$7,000.00 to apply on interest and debt.

Again this year we have no uncollected taxes. All our assets consist of real estate bought by the Town for the taxes, plus amounts due from the State and County.

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The Water & Light Commissioners of the Village of Woodsville beg to submit the following report:

During the past year many of the outside lines and poles have been repaired or joined with the Telephone Company so that we feel that the lines are mostly in a very good state of repair.

The Electric Light Plant help consists of a general superintendent, two men to operate the plant and two men for the outside, or linemen's work, and occasionally extra help when needed.

In the latter part of the summer it was decided to put in two new water wheels to connect and use the two generators which we had on hand. This, with repairs to the plant which were necessary, was estimated to cost from fourteen to fifteen thousand dollars. Nearly one-half has been paid at this time and the balance will be taken care of out of the 1931 receipts.

All Bonds and Interest have been paid when due.

I herewith present my first annual report as superintendent of schools.

During the year 1929-1930 the enrollment was 453; per cent of attendance, 96.25; number of cases of tardiness, 265; number of tuition pupils, 100; school visits by board members, 4; by superintendent, 298; by citizens, 702.

Elementary School: Helen A. Franklin, grade six; Mary M. Mann, grade five; Marjorie E. Deming, grade four; Muriel Ellingwood, grade three; Mildred E. Emery, grade two; Florence S. Lang, grade one.

Alice M. Brown, music; Larkin Hosford, leader of the orchestra; Lottie M. B. Underhill, school nurse; William Burbank and William Fillian, janitors.

The work of the schools is progressing in a satisfactory manner. It is a great advantage to have capable experienced teachers and to have had but few adjustments to make because of changes in the teaching staff.

I am glad to call the attention of the citizens to certain repairs and improvements recently made in the buildings namely: the electric lights in the grade building and the redecorating of part of the high school. It is to be hoped that we can finish doing over the interior of the high school and put on steel ceilings in the grade rooms as soon as possible.

It seems fitting at this time to express thanks to all those who have furnished milk and sent in food and clothing. These generous gifts have enabled Miss Underhill to do a great deal more for the comfort and welfare of the children than is often possible in the usual health inspection.

## REPORT OF THE HEADMASTER

---

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I offer herewith my thirteenth annual report of the Woodsville High School, for the year ending January, 23, 1931.

Registration to date has been one hundred fifty-four pupils, sixty-eight boys and eighty-six girls. Four of these pupils have withdrawn; ten members of last year did not return after the summer vacation (four of these moved from town); and only two who passed from the local eighth grade last June failed to enter high school this fall. The school is offering opportunity to all the young people in this vicinity. With improved roads and reliable bus service this High School should now become the center for an increasing number of pupils. Changes could readily be made to accommodate two hundred. It is more convenient now to drive five or ten miles by car than it used to be to go one or two miles in open sleigh or by buggy. With a larger number of pupils better student organizations can be maintained, better equipment for library and laboratory can be supplied, and more social contacts can be provided for the individual by mingling with a larger group of people.

By class groups there are twenty-four seniors, thirty-one juniors, forty-six second year, fifty-two first year, and one special. The tuition list contains seventy-eight names, and eight towns are represented.

Last June was graduated the thirty-fourth class with the following twenty-six members: Arnold R. Bone, Dorothy L. Brock, Theodore E. Darling, Idabelle Davidson, John J. Demeritt, Kenneth R. Derusha, Letizia M. Duca, Harold P. Hastings, Gwendolyn E. Hood, Pauline N. Kaiser, Virginia P. Keyser, George W. Lamarre, Shirley I. MacLeod, Arthur C. McIntire, Irene L. McIntire, W. Dean McLam, Clifford F. McLure, Mar-

garet E. McNulty, Herbert F. Norris, Mary J. O'Neil, Miriam O. Page, C. Alexander Park, George P. Roy, Vida M. Spinney, Lloyd W. Stearns, W. Dustin White, Jr. Seven of these are continuing study in colleges or schools, nine have engaged in some gainful employment, and the others are busy in the occupations of home life. Miriam Page stood first in the class in scholarship rank, and Mary O'Neil was second. To Miriam Page was awarded the Alumni Attainment Medal for general allround earnestness, presentation being made by Frank G. Woodward of the class of 1925. There are now in all five hundred and one graduates.

Public speaking was conducted in two groups on April 8 and 11. First prizes were awarded to Charles Irwin, Claude White, Luvia Spinney, and Marjorie Bailey, and second prizes to Luigi Castello, John O'Neil, Minola Derby, and Thelma Shortsleeve. Mrs. Alice E. S. Corliss of Ryegate trained the speakers.

Various pupils have participated in near-by carnivals, typing contests, essay writing, athletic meets, and patriotic parades; all these items are recorded in the local newspapers, and are preserved in the official school scrap books.

The school felt with keen sorrow the decease of Perley Klark last July. He was a graduate of 1912, and was thoroughly loyal in his devotion to the interests of the school. A master of music, he had conducted the orchestra for some time; twenty years ago he organized the first orchestra; only a month before his death he had participated in the final assembly meeting. This year Larkin Hosford is leading both orchestra and band; some thirty pupils are enjoying the excellent advantage of these musical groups.

The Cycle was recently awarded honorable mention in its class of school publications in an exhibit sponsored by the Scholastic Press association of Columbia University.

Football teams were organized last fall, equipment being generously provided by public-spirited citizens. Field hockey was maintained for the girls. With baseball and basketball continued as usual, opportunity in athletics is offered to every pupil who wishes to play.

Attention is called to the necessity of a record of 85 per cent or over in order to be granted a college entrance certificate. Such certificate cannot be given to pupils who fall below this grade, and the colleges in general do not accept candidates who fail of the school's approval. A pupil who has an acceptable record in high school is not likely to fail in college.

The kind interest of parents, alumni, and other citizens is gratefully appreciated. All concerned are trying to make this a worth while school provided under least expensive conditions.

Increasing fuel costs have been considered and a large part of our repairs have been devoted to the heating problem. A vacuum steam heating plant of the most modern variety was installed at Pike at a cost of \$1,035. We think that its extra cost will soon be paid by fuel saving. It is giving excellent satisfaction. Chamberlin Metal Weather Strips have been placed on the Academy building and the North Haverhill and Pike schools at a cost of \$625, \$150 of which is payable next year without interest. There is already a marked saving in fuel in these buildings, indicating that the saving will soon pay for the cost of the strips. Beginning last fall, soft coal has been used in the Academy, Pearson Hall and Alumni Hall at Haverhill and the North Haverhill school. The results have been so gratifying that we are quoting figures to indicate the saving. On February 1 last year we had spent \$845.76 for High School and \$1,423.75 for Elementary schools for fuel, this year we had spent \$481.31 for High School and \$664.70 for Elementary schools. The High School figures show a very real comparison as there was about an equal amount of fuel on hand on each year. In the case of the Elementary schools there was more fuel on hand last year but probably not enough to amount to more than \$400. The School Board wishes to take this opportunity to remind the taxpayers that the School District is

paying for heating two halls at Haverhill out of these amounts. Alumni Hall is used very much of the time for school purposes and is charged to High School costs. The Masonic apartments in Pearson Hall are heated when required, probably averaging about four times a month, and this is charged to elementary costs. There is some income derived from Alumni Hall rent and eventually the District will receive \$25.00 a month rent for the Masonic apartments. During the past summer the village water was connected with the North Haverhill school which will cause a considerable saving annually as the old system was very expensive to operate.

Our repair bills have exceeded our estimate in last year's budget but by careful supervision of expenses in other accounts we expect to close the year with sufficient funds to pay the final installment of the note for repairs on Pearson Hall and have a small balance besides.

In the Town Report of 1929 attention of the voters was called to the fact that the Biennial Report of Education showed that Haverhill had the highest tax cost per \$1,000. of valuation (\$8.60 for elementary schools) of any District in the State. We are pleased to quote from the Biennial Report just issued covering the two years period ending June 30, 1930 that this cost has been reduced to \$7.14 per \$1,000. The High School tax cost is reduced from \$6.15 to \$5.98 per \$1,000.

The School Board has taken note of the propaganda that usually appears about this season of the year relative to the closing of Haverhill Academy. We believe from a comparison with other schools of its size and advantages that its cost is not excessive and that the graduates of the school are a credit to the town. We are pleased to be able to quote from a letter received from Commissioner Butterfield shortly before his resignation. "I visited Haverhill Academy last fall and was pleased with the spirit and progress of the



school. It has at all times been an institution of good merit."

The attention of the voters is called to the budget for the fiscal year from July 1, 1931 to June 30, 1932. The retiring member of the board is Mr. Daniel Carr.

To the School Board and Citizens of the Haverhill School District:

I herewith present my first annual report as superintendent of schools.

During the year 1929-1930 the total enrollment was 411; the per cent of attendance, 93.68; number of cases of tardiness 768; school visits made by board members, 27; by superintendent, 324, by citizens, 589.

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### REPORT OF HEADMASTER

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To the Superintendent of Schools:

I submit herewith my seventh annual report of Haverhill Academy and High School for the year ending Jan. 31, 1931.

The total enrollment for the year is seventy-five. There are ten seniors, fourteen juniors, twenty-three sophomores and twenty-eight freshmen. The enrollment for last year was seventy-seven. There are eight tuition pupils.

Fifteen pupils graduated in June as follows: Helen Brown, Dorothy Brunelle, Lauria Brunelle, Maurice Church, Arthur Foss, Ivan Grimes, John Kelley, Francis Millette, James Morrill, Alice Perkins, Eunice Rogers, Maynard Sawyer, Neil Smith, Pauline Smith, Sarah Wright.

First, second, third and fourth honors were won by Sarah Wright, Maurice Church, Pauline Smith and Francis Millette respectively.

Six of the June graduates are attending post-secondary or special training schools.

The Mary Carbee Latin Prize and the Scholarship, Loyalty and Achievement Medal both were won by Sarah Wright.

The per cent of attendance for the year was 97.29, which was the best we have attained and nearly equal to any school in the state.

The Latin and Algebra teams which competed in the state meet held at Plymouth made a creditable showing.

The usual athletic activities have been maintained. About half of the school either play in the regular scheduled games or are on the squads.

The band and glee club as well as the newly organized orchestra have appeared on several local programs.

Intelligence and Achievement tests have been given regularly and the results indicate standard achievement for the school as a whole.

The three curricula program of studies is as follows:

Latin curriculum:— First year, English, algebra, history of civilization, Latin; second year, English, geometry, French, Caesar; third year, English, Virgil, French, physics; fourth year, English, Cicero, U. S. history, French or chemistry or advance mathematics.

English curriculum:— First year, English, algebra, history of civilization, biology; second year, English, geometry, French, modern history; third year, English, economics and sociology, French, physics; fourth year, English, French or advance mathematics, U. S. history, chemistry.

Domestic Arts curriculum:— First year, English, algebra, history of civilization, textile and clothing; second year, English, foods and nutrition, French or geometry, modern history; third year, English, economics and sociology, French, the home, its care and management; fourth year, English, French or advance

mathematics, U. S. history, The Family and its Members.

Detailed information as to the advantages and merits of each of the above curricula will be gladly furnished upon request.

The cooperation of parents and community as a whole in both our curricula and extra-curricula activities have been greatly appreciated.

The public is not only welcome but urged to visit our regular school sessions.
