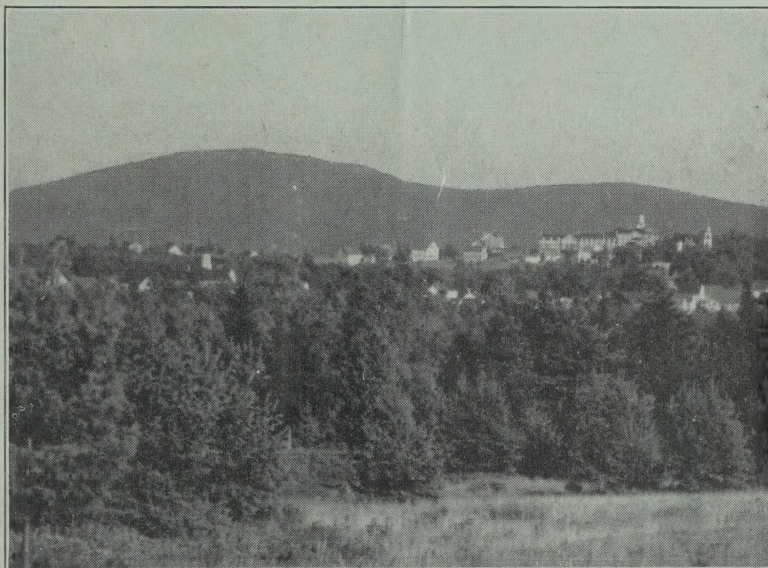

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of New London in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

L. S.

You are hereby notified to meet at Whipple Memorial Hall in said New London on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To hear reports of Agents and Committees heretofore chosen and pass vote relating thereto.
3. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$13,035.00 to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for the observance of Memorial Day.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,600.00 for the Town Library for the ensuing year.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,900.00 for street lighting for the ensuing year.
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$450.00 for cemetery purposes for the ensuing year.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,300.00 for the support of the New London Hospital for the ensuing year. This amount to include \$300.00 for care of Town Poor.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,000.00 for Summer maintenance and \$3,500.00 for Winter maintenance of highways, bridges and sidewalks for the ensuing year.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,050.00 to condition and tar Burpee Lane from the State Road at Cranchurst to the beginning of the new extension.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to continue lay out and construct the now so called Spaulding Road to Main Street.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$568.95, the State to give \$2,275.80 for Town Road Aid.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$200.00 for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, together with other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 to be used by the Kearsarge-Sunapee Development Association for the purpose of maintaining an Information Booth in New London this coming summer. It being understood that any balance at the end of the season will be turned back to the Town.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$650.00 for Hydrant service.

16. To see whether the Town will approve the action of the School Board in declaring that the use of the Colby Hill School property for school purposes has been discontinued and that no further use of said property is required for school purposes; and whether the Town will authorize the Selectmen to convey the interests of the Town in said Colby Hill School property to the heirs of Andrew Sargent.

17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any property acquired by Tax Collector's Deeds. This is to remain in force until rescinded.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the purpose of pine blister rust control.

19. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to secure the assistance of the State Tax Commission in reappraising the taxable property in the Town in order to secure greater equality as between taxpayers, and to insure the assessment of all property in the Town on the same standard of value, and to raise and appropriate money to pay for the same.

20. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

21. To see what action the Town will vote to take in regard to discount on taxes.

22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes for the ensuing year.

23. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF BUDGET COMMITTEE

February 18, 1947

To the Voters of New London:

In accordance with the Laws of New Hampshire, Chapter 52, the New London Budget Committee held three meetings: one closed and two public hearings. A very good number of voters attended these hearings and many fine suggestions were made.

The committee recommended all articles in both school and town warrants carrying specific appropriations with the exception of two—the extension of the so-called Spaulding Road and the Pine Blister Rust Control. On these two articles the committee was divided.

ANNUAL REPORTS
NEW LONDON SERVICE ORGANIZATION

The New London Service Organization, Inc., is now three years old. It was chartered by the State, as a non-profit charitable corporation. Its purpose is to HONOR and HELP World War II Veterans.

It proposes to HONOR World War II Veterans by endorsing and aiding every worthy project, in New London, that can be of honor to our Veterans. Furthermore, it proposes to render additional Honor to these Veterans by making the Corporation itself a Living Memorial. By accepting other Trusts for charitable work towards all organizations, groups or individuals it is felt that we can by such good deeds render additional honor to our Veterans.

It proposes to HELP World War II Veterans of New London financially, with gifts and loans, either individually or as a group. To this end, the Corporation does set aside a percentage of all money received by the Veterans Fund, as a loan fund, to be used exclusively for our Veterans.

I am happy to report progress in these two aims, to HONOR and to HELP our veterans, as you will note by the following reports of our Clerk and Treasurer. We now have six separate Trust Funds totaling assets in excess of five thousand dollars.

HERBERT D. SWIFT, President.

During the year 1946, the New London Service Organization, Inc., has held eleven regular meetings with an average attendance of ten. With the exception of three resignations, all directors have been reinstated if absent from more than three consecutive meetings.

In February, the Organization in cooperation with the American Legion gave a dinner for returning servicemen and guests with an attendance of 130.

A Governor Colby ball was held in March in honor of the one-hundredth anniversary of Governor Colby's election as Governor of the State of New Hampshire. In attendance were Governor and Mrs. Dale and other high-ranking state and national officials. A profit of approximately \$50 was realized from the ball.

The policy was established of setting aside fifty percent of our assets in the veterans' fund as a revolving fund for loans or gifts to needy veterans or their families. During the year the organization was happy through its loan fund to assist a veteran in building his home. In addition to the loan, the equivalent of two weeks' salary was given to the veteran to enable him to stay at home and work on his house.

One new trust fund, the Burt Gay Fund, has been added during the year making three such funds at the present time.

During the summer a scrap paper drive netted the organization approximately \$40.

On Hospital Day, chances were sold on a pressure cooker and \$45 was realized for the hospital.

A gift of \$125 was received from the Church Newsletter Committee representing money left in its treasury after the home-coming of most of the boys made further publication of the Newsletter unnecessary.

In the name of the Kneeland Parshley Fund, a year's subscription to the National Geographic Magazine was given to the Elkins School.

A committee is now working in conjunction with the school board on plans for an athletic field at the New London Public School. A contour map was made at the expense of the Service Organization. At the present time the State Planning Board is making plans for the development of the property as a playground.

REPORT OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT

January 1, 1946 to December 31, 1946.

We were fortunate in obtaining from the War Assets Corporation a fire truck which had just been declared surplus by the U. S. Government. This piece of fire apparatus is an 120 H. P. International triple combination, pumper and hose wagon with 500 gallon Hale pump and a booster tank with a capacity of approximately 250 gallons. The actual speedometer mileage registered was 1340 miles and included whatever mileage registered by the pump.

The equipment and supplies purchased through the War Assets Corporation were obtained at considerably less than their original cost resulting in our obtaining for the department equipment and supplies that were extremely difficult to obtain during the war and at a considerable saving to the Town.

NATIONAL FIRE PREVENTION WEEK observed throughout the country on October 6-12th, was sponsored locally by the fire department. Literature appropriate for the occasion was sent to the various local organizations and clubs and distributed in our schools.

It will be necessary to make some repairs to the firehouse this year.

TRACY MEMORIAL BUILDING

The records of Tracy Memorial Building for 1946, show that this, its twentieth year, has been an exceptionally busy one in our library.

In considering the following statistics, we must remember that our building was closed for furnace repairs, during the first month of the year. Our visitors for the eleven-month period numbered 12,361. Circulation was as follows:

This makes a total of 12,739 which is the largest circulation for a similar period, since 1942.

Five hundred ninety-four books were added, 215 of which were by gift. These figures are the largest for more than five years. Included among donors were Mrs. Bessie Sargeant, M. Roy London, Mrs. Herbert D. Swift, Mrs. Helene Lenz, Mrs. F. W. Sladen, Rev. Harold W. Buker, Frank Cordtmeyer, J. Duane Squires, R. M. Baker, Colby Junior College Library, Mrs. E. W. Converse, Miss Gertrude Jones, Wilfred Burpee, Frederick Kerry, Fred A. Todd, the Wallace family, Mrs. Munsell, Mrs. Evarts Messer, Mrs. Eunice Blake Bohanon, Mrs. Christine Morey, Miss Mary Haddad, Miss Gertrude Bradley, Mrs. Helen P. Blake, Mrs. Helen S. Nelson, and Lennie M. Messer. We have received from Mrs. Mather Cleveland **America's Germany**, and **Lock, Stock and Barrel**, the first of a number of books presented in memory of Mrs. George D. Graves. Also in memory of Mrs. Graves are two volumes, **Our Country's National Parks**, the first of several books presented by her friends Mabel R. Jewett, Grace Darley, and Claribel Goodwin.

Among those giving magazines are Mrs. Helen Holcombe, the American Legion Auxiliary, Miss Elizabeth Waite, Miss Sallie Waite, Miss Elizabeth Nichols, Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth A. Lord, Dr. William P. Clough, Jr., and Mrs. Helen S. Nelson. Christmas brought a gift card announcing the renewal of **Fortune** as the gift of Hon. Herbert D. Swift. Added through the local school is **Scholastic** which is indexed in **Readers' Guide** and has much valuable material for reference. Mrs. Frances W. Sawyer continued the subscriptions for **American Forests** and **National Parks Magazine**, both of which are invaluable for material on these subjects. Mrs. Swift has given us her large file of **National Geographic** for clipping for the library picture files and the use of the school children. Copies of the **London Daily Mail** for 1945-1946 have been presented by Miss Julia Todd.

Much reference work has been done throughout the year. A list has been kept that we may obtain more material on those subjects for which we have constant call. The work on the pamphlet file is well on the way to completion, so that such material as we now have is filed for easy reference. Pamphlets are constantly being added and it is surprising how many subjects are covered therein. Some work has been done on the picture files, but there is much more to be done before they are really in a usable condition. There is great need for suitable cabinets for this work. We have one four-drawer steel file which is sufficient to house only the first third of the pamphlet file. The small library with less funds for book purchases, finds great help from these files, much of which is free material. The pamphlet file becomes such an absolute necessity for school reference work, that we were much surprised, when seeking advice before rebuilding ours, to find that few libraries in the state have attempted to maintain one.

Books have been loaned to Elkins School, Wilmot Flat School, New London Hospital, high school English classes, Grades III-IV, V-VI, VII-VIII in the Central School, and to Sutton. The Bookmobile continues to leave books in Elkins, and to visit us, thus supplementing our book purchases. Many books have been borrowed from Colby Junior College Library, the State Library, and its extension division. Library discards have been welcomed by the Newbury library. Many of

our less desirable discards, as well as newspapers, and waste paper have been sold to build up a fund sufficient to purchase a set of Compton's Encyclopedia which is on order and will be delivered in April. We feel that this addition will be a welcome and valuable asset, especially for the use of the schools. Some of the money has also been used to repair the old mimeograph which has lain idle for years and is now proving very useful.

Meetings at the library during the past year include Woman's Club, King's Daughters, Garden Club, Hospital Board, Supervisors of the Checklist, N. L. Service Organization, Lions' Club, Planning Board, N. L. Home Industries, Locker Plant directors, American Educational Fellowship, rug hooking groups, District School Board, as well as many committees.

In May, the Colby Junior College home management class, with Mr. London, visited the library one morning to learn more about children's books, from Mrs. Helen S. Nelson, children's librarian. During the same month, we had on exhibit at the desk, a German book, the life of Hitler, loaned to us by Corp. Edwin Roberts who found it under the floor of a German home, while he was serving as an M. P. in that country.

Mrs. Helen R. Colburn's piano recital, held in the auditorium in June, drew a large audience of parents and friends.

During the summer months we had an unusual number of visitors, among whom was Mrs. Elizabeth Gray Vining, author of many children's books, some of which we have on our shelves. Mrs. Vining was later appointed as tutor to the Japanese prince.

August was art exhibit month. The first was the portraits, flower studies, and decorated chests of Mrs. Louise Cable Chard, who has spent much time in New London. Mrs. Dorothy Dey Howard, a summer resident of long standing, exhibited her landscapes and studies of still life, accompanied by hand hooked rugs by Mrs. Emma Howard.

The library was closed for one day in October so that both librarians might visit the Boston Herald Book Fair as the guests of Trustee Frances W. Sawyer. Such opportunities are few and far between, and it is a real inspiration to hear the speakers and see the many new books on display. The latter part of October more than fifty people attended the illustrated talk given by Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Swan in the auditorium. The kodachrome slides were taken by Mr. Swan, who is assistant in the educational and photographic department of the Montana forestry service, where he has been located for 35 years. The lecture was sponsored by Mrs. Maud Jenkins and Mr. Harry Jenkins, long-time summer residents.

During the fall, twenty students of the junior English class, with their teacher, Miss Eleanor Parker, visited the library to learn better how to use the library card catalog.

November brought us the annual Book Week observance with the theme, "Books Are Bridges", made more impressive by a rustic bridge built for us by Mr. Kenneth A. Lord. Outstanding was the demonstration of the microfilm ceiling projector, which was later presented to the White River Junction Veterans' Facility by New London Post and Unit, American Legion. This was an excellent example of the theme, in its help to those confined to their beds in hospitals. Twenty-five pupils and their teacher from the Wilmot Flat school visited the library at this time. The trip was sponsored by Mrs. Ruth Simonds.

On December 5, Dr. Anna M. Littlefield was the guest of honor at a gathering commemorating her 87th birthday. An informal reception was held in the reading room, preceding a short program in the auditorium, where the oil portrait of Dr. Littlefield, painted by Mrs. Louise Cable Chard and previously on exhibit there, was presented to the library by Dr. Harold W. Buker, on behalf of those who donated the funds for its purchase. The painting has been hung in the clubroom.

Mrs. Oren D. Crockett presented the library with a statue of a Rogers group, which after being retouched will probably be placed in the clubroom.

The children's room under the guidance of Mrs. Helen S. Nelson, has had the regular Saturday two-hour meetings, when those present have enjoyed handwork, games, and stories. Attendance has been high, which has made it difficult but enjoyable work.

Your librarian served on the committee for District No. 8 library meeting and was later appointed Chairman for the Southern Children's Group for the state, but declined to serve as it would call for much more time and travel than her work here would permit.

Vacation assistants to Mrs. Nelson were Miss Shirly Nelson and Miss Constance Thurston.

Thanks to the continued support of the Garden Club and the excellent work of our janitor, Mr. Edward Dexter, we received many compliments on our gardens, which many visitors enjoyed.

The increasing facilities of our library will make enlarging the stackroom inevitable, as all available space is already overtaxed. This is a must, and as such should be planned for in the immediate future.

With the addition of our new encyclopedia, the increased use of our refiled pamphlets, and the prospects of pictures soon to be refiled, we believe that in 1947, we will be even better able to serve the reading public.

NEW LONDON HOSPITAL BOARD

Annual Report—January, 1947

At the last annual meeting in September, 1945, it was voted to change the fiscal year to agree with the official town year. During this period members of the New London Hospital Board have met monthly to carry on the necessary business of the hospital.

The year 1946 has been a record breaking one in many ways. In March, 1946, our hospital served the greatest number of patients in its history. This condition continued throughout the summer and created a real state of emergency. For many weeks every available bed was in use. The situation became so serious at one time that the possibility of using an auxiliary house as a convalescent home was considered. However, on investigation this proved impracticable. The cooperation of the medical staff was asked during the emergency period, and only cases needing immediate attention were brought to the hospital. Since that time we have secured a more adequate nursing staff and at present the hospital is not working under such crowded conditions.

In view of the over-crowding it was decided that a study should be made for the future development of the hospital. During the summer of 1946 Mr. Paul Richter a public relations specialist, was retained to survey the situation and to make recommendations for the future. Mr. Richter's excellent and comprehensive report will be the ground work for future development of the hospital. Late in 1946, however, the Board decided that in view of the currently high cost of construction, our upset national economy, and many other factors, we should not consider a large scale campaign for raising funds this year. At present we believe that a program of education should be undertaken immediately with the surrounding towns in order to show the large measure of service given to them as illustrated by the Richter report and to secure adequate support for the hospital from these towns.

Since the last annual meeting the following doctors have been appointed to the active list on the medical staff: Dr. Francis H. Nolin, Dr. Herbert B. Messinger, and Dr. Alfred E. Sears.

Miss Rachel Sargent has been made business manager and is doing an excellent job.

Gifts since September, 1945, have included the following: \$15,000.00 from the Albert N. Parlin Fund to endow a free bed; the Summer Residents' Committee has purchased equipment for the hospital amounting to approximately four thousand dollars, including partial payment of the X-Ray machine and complete payment of the new dictaphone equipment; and \$1528.28 from the Marcia Putney Estate. A complete set of dishes, many pieces of furniture, and a kitchen ventilator plus money gifts too numerous to list here were received from many friends of the hospital. In addition to the above mentioned equipment, the Summer Residents' Committee also financed one half the expense of the survey by Mr. Richter. The Hospital Aid presented a check for \$1393.00 in December, 1945, which completed the payment on the mortgage. This organization has continued to take care of the hospital linen and, in addition, this year they have accomplished a great deal in redecorating the Nurses' Home and the apartment there which our superintendent is now occupying. Sincere thanks are due to this loyal group who have done so much to keep our hospital running throughout the years.

Improvements and new equipment placed at the hospital during the past year include: additional fire extinguishers, nozzles, and hoses on all four floors, making for greater fire protection; the new X-Ray machine and a ward portable X-Ray; a circulating pump in the heating system; inlaid linoleum in the diet ward and kitchen; and the new dictaphone equipment.

Receipts from Hospital Day in August, 1946, broke all records. The total figure of Hospital Day receipts was \$4,783.64, and \$2,403.00 more was collected by the Summer Residents' Committee.

Because of the general economic condition it became necessary to increase the hospital rates and the salary scale on July 1, 1946.

From October 1, 1945 to December 31, 1946

During the past year all-day meetings have been held at the homes of the members, with an average attendance of 26. At these meetings the hospital mending has been done, with others doing work on linens and fancy articles for the sale on the annual Tag Day.

The money-raising activities were the Rummage Sale, membership drive, sale of pillows at the movies and at the Barn Playhouse, the sale of a hooked rug donated by Mrs. Frank Butler, donation day contributions, and the sale of greeting cards.

During the summer Mrs. J. K. Blake took charge of the hospital mending.

Supplies have been purchased for the hospital. The hospital debt of \$1,393 was paid in full. At the January meeting a special ceremony was observed, at which time the mortgage of \$6,000 was burned. The mortgage was dated December, 1935.

At the meeting in October, 1946, the members voted to redecorate the nurses' home as the main project of the year.

The Association is continuing the sponsorship of the community Blue Cross hospitalization group.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

The organization of the Forest Fire Warden and his appointed deputies as set up by the New Hampshire Forestry Department affords each Town in the State of New Hampshire one of the best perfected organizations that can operate with the maximum of efficiency in any branch of the Forest Fire service, such as the prevention of forest fires and their extinction.

Prevention is one of the most important phases of all fire effort. The careless smoker fails to properly extinguish his cigar, cigarette or pipe ashes or thoughtlessly throws them from the car window, thus starting a fire beside the road such as happened here in New London last summer when it became necessary to call out several men to extinguish the fire.

Last spring through the cooperation of the members of the New London Fire Company several acres of grass land were burnt over which were considered very serious fire hazards and which we were glad to eliminate.

There is but short time in the spring that this kind of burning can be accomplished without any serious injury to property.

The Warden, Deputies, Chief and members of the New London Fire Company are very willing to give their time and effort to help eliminate these fire hazards.

Help your Forest Fire Warden prevent forest fires—His efforts are only as effective as is the cooperation you give him.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

I herewith submit my thirteenth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

The practical arts courses in the high school have now been established. For the domestic arts department all equipment has been installed. The cost of outfitting the domestic arts room to date (January 4, 1947) is as follows:

These figures include dishes for serving hot lunches to pupils at noon. The federal government reimbursed us half the cost of the dishes and refrigerator. We expect they will do the same for the electric range and mixer.

The shop has been partially equipped. Orders were placed last spring for tools, machines, and supplies but it has not been possible to obtain all items on account of the scarcity of materials. The boys under the leadership of their instructor, Mr. Robert Gilman, have transformed an empty space into an active shop. They painted the walls and built benches, cupboards, and lumber racks, besides doing minor repair jobs about the building.

This year woodworking is given to both high school classes. The fact that 39 boys elected shop work proves that the course fills a real need. Seventh and eighth grade boys take shop work two days a week, while the girls take cooking and sewing.

Hot Lunches

The federal government is now assisting schools to provide hot lunches for those pupils who remain over the noon hour. Half the cost of necessary equipment is paid by the government and for each lunch served to a pupil the government contributes six cents for the type of meal served in New London. We have purchased dishes and equipment amounting to \$958.75. About 120 pupils are enjoying a hot lunch daily, consisting of a hot dish, milk, bread and butter, vegetable or fruit. This project is too large to be handled entirely by the home economics department, although the teacher plans the menus and has general charge. We hire a cook to prepare the meals. Pupils help serve and clean up. The charge per meal is twenty cents, which, with the government contribution of six cents per meal, we expect will make the service self-supporting.

Teachers' Salaries

Throughout the entire country we are experiencing a real crisis in the matter of school teachers. Thousands have left the profession and very few are preparing to become teachers. In this school union (Newport, New London, Sunapee, and Springfield) 67 teachers have left us during the past three years (1943-46). Of this number eight resigned on account of marriage, 33 went to other teaching positions, 23 left the profession, and three were dismissed. It would seem therefore that most of those teachers found their positions here rather unattractive.

The country has rather suddenly awakened to a realization that teachers, to whom parents entrust the development of their children, are very poorly paid. The teachers themselves have known this right along. Now, many of them are taking more remunerative positions. As a result there are not enough qualified teachers to operate our schools. We have had to place in classrooms almost anybody, regardless of preparation or experience. In some cases this is unfortunate for the pupils. In some cases schools were closed. Unless the teaching profession is made more attractive, many positions will be unfilled, or, perhaps even worse, poorly filled.

As to the sources of our teacher supply, a study of the past three years in this school union shows that we secured 25 from other schools in New Hampshire, 12 from our two teachers colleges, four from New Hampshire University, 14 from other states, five certified teachers returning to service, and 10 with permits. The largest group comes from neighboring schools and a substantial group comes from out of state. These are experienced teachers and will expect more than beginners' salaries. Beginning teachers are now asking—and getting—higher salaries than our present maximum!

In our teachers' colleges this year only about two dozen girls will be graduated as elementary teachers. Normally this state has about 150 elementary vacancies. Our crying need is not merely increased salaries for those now in our schools, but a standard of working conditions which will induce young people to enter our schools as teachers just as soon as possible.

Heidelberg Prize Speaking

The annual Heidelberg Prize Speaking Contest was held in the school auditorium May 27, 1946. The awards were as follows: First, Ronald Cleveland reciting "Criminal Memoirs of Napoleon" by Steven Seacock; Second, Janis Heald, "Dark Victory" by George Brewer, Jr., and Bertram Block; Third, Mary Sue Barton, "A True Story Haunted Him" by Anthony Abbott.

New Equipment

During the year the school has acquired a liquid process duplicator, a sound movie projector, and a combination radio-phonograph. The purchase of the moving picture projector was initiated by the American Education Fellowship, which gave a substantial contribution toward the cost of this valuable piece of equipment. We also wish to express appreciation to the Lions Club for helping the Athletic Association secure bleachers for the gymnasium.

I want to express my personal appreciation to the teachers who have faithfully stood by to keep the schools in operation and to all others who have supported our educational program.
