



# REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Roxbury:

I herein submit my seventh annual report as superintendent of schools.

As we face the rapidly changing conditions of vocational, business and spiritual life, we ask ourselves what is this thing we call education? We might fill this report with definitions which emphasize certain phases of education. A century ago men thought of education as a means of preserving the past. Now, we think of education as a means of improving the future. Our real gain to civilization is found in the improvement of man himself

Of the many modern viewpoints of education, Dr. John Dewey has hit the trail when he says in his book entitled Democracy and Education: "Education may be defined as a process of the continuous reconstruction of experience, with the purpose of widening and deepening the social content, while at the same time the individual gains control of the methods involved."

New Hampshire is carrying out this interpretation in its philosophy of education; (I) through its fundamental law that every child shall be offered an opportunity to have whatever talents he may possess brought to the fullest possible development, whether he lives in the city or country; (2) the child and his interests become the center of all our efforts, selection of text books, technique of methods, courses of study and selection of teachers. In fact, the child becomes the sun about which the appliances of education revolve, the center about which they are organized.

In the development of our educational scheme, we use certain methods and have certain goals. We must not confuse the

two. A method is but a means to an end. Any method that gets the desired results in an economical unit of time is a good method. Methods come and go. Goals are more lasting. They endure for centuries.

Important goals of our public school system are: (1) the acquisition of facts or universal truths through scientific reasoning, (2) the development of the skills in the elementary schools, (3) the formation of right habits of life, (4) the endowment of right attitudes toward school work, home life, church interests and community affairs.

In short, considered from a psychological view point, we wish our children to possess alert mental abilities, rich feelings and righteous judgments.

Your superintendent, teachers and school board have kept in mind the above mentioned goals in the performance of their respective duties. The degree of success we have attrained, we leave to your judgment.

#### PROMOTIONS

The following number of promotions per grade were made in June:

These promotions were made on the five point basis, viz: term rank, regularity of attendance, standard tests, judgment of teacher and judgment of superintendent.

Miss Irene Stevens taught the school during the entire year. Miss Stevens proved herself an able disciplinarian, a thorough instructor and always alert to the best interests of her pupils. She has continued her service the present year, keeping her pupils interested in their work, active in their efforts for improvement and responsive to her instruction not only in school work but also right habits of life.

George Davis, promoted from the eighth grade, entered the Keene High School in September. It is encouraging to have our pupils continuing their work through the high school. High school education today is considered as essential in the preparation of a pupil for life work as the elementary school education was a few years ago.

#### LITERARY EXERCISE

At Thanksgiving time, a pageant was given depicting the life of the Pilgrims, the Indians and the first Thanksgiving dinner. This pageant was written by Gladys Russell, a member of the eighth grade.

All the pupils took part and under the direction of Miss Stevens, assisted by natural setting, the early life of our forefathers was presented in a truly realistic fashion.

#### HEALTH ACTIVITIES

Dr. L. G. Hildreth, of Marlboro, examined 13 pupils in June and found the following number of defects:
