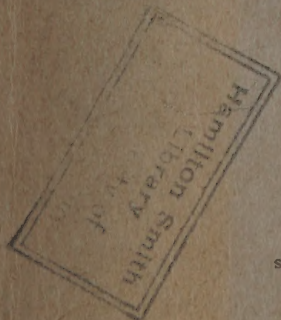

TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Sullivan in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Sullivan on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see what sums of money the town will raise in addition to that required by law for building and repairing highways and bridges, or take any action relating thereto.

4. To see if the town will vote to accept Town Road Aid if available and raise \$280.50 and appropriate what is required by the State.

5. To see if the town will vote to pay for digging graves and going with the town hearse for residents.

6. To see what sum of money the town will raise in addition to that required by law for the support of the public library.

7. To see if the town will vote to raise money for Memorial Day, or take any action relating thereto.

8. To see if the town will vote to raise or appropriate money for Old Home Day, or take any action relating thereto.

9. To see if the town will vote to raise or appropriate a sum of money to provide for civilian defense due to the war.

10. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to borrow money on the credit of the town in anticipation of taxes.

11. To see if the town will vote to raise or appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the payment of Snow plow note.

12. To see if the town will vote to raise or appropriate the sum of \$18.00 for the Monadnock Region Association, or take any action relating thereto.

13. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00 to help stamp out the white pine blister disease.

14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the removal of snow from the highways.

15. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to sell any property acquired by Tax Collector's deed.

16. To hear reports of agents, auditors or committees heretofore chosen, or take any action thereon.

17. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Sullivan :

I herein submit my nineteenth annual report as superintendent of schools.

From a discussion on education after the war, I wish to quote from a report made by the Conservative Party, viz. "Of all the State's activities, education is the basic activity, because it conditions the future character of the entire community." "In war time, the maintenance of these services at a level of high efficiency should have maximum priority."

To meet the ideals of above quotations, I offer a few of the several objectives toward which we are aiming: (1) to maintain the purity of the English language, (2) to give greater emphasis on fundamentals, especially in mathematics, (3) to offer a total interpretation of history, geography, and economics, (4) to imbue our pupils with a better understanding of the vital principles of our Constitution and the American Way of life. For the accomplishment of these goals we ask the cooperation of teachers, parents and citizens.

CALL FOR TEACHERS

Due to the call of war service, defense work and office work, many teachers have given up the teaching profession. As a result I have had to resort to commercial advertising in order to keep open some of the rural schools.

As conditions may be worse next year, I suggest that former teachers take advantage of the opportunity of attending the Summer School at Keene and thus place themselves in position to qualify with the regulations of the State Board of Education. I believe this to be a patriotic gesture.
