Report of the Selectmen

Every year, the Town's Annual Report provides the opportunity for Town officials, board and committee members and department leaders to formally report to townspeople on the activities of the previous year, and anticipated opportunities and challenges. The report also highlights the contributions of volunteers, residents, businesses and employees to Swanzey. Citizen participation is key to our town's success, whether it be through involvement in local government, attendance at community events or support of the town's non-profits.

Our report below highlights a few of the projects or initiatives currently underway. We encourage residents to take the time to also review department, committee and board reports for additional information. Please direct your questions and comments to board members, department leaders or the contact people indicated in each report. Your input is valued.

Cobble Hill & Warmac Road bridges Following an affirmative vote at Town Meeting 2011, engineering studies were initiated for these bridge replacement projects. the close of 2011, design had been completed and wetland permits applications submitted for the Warmac Road bridge. Progress slowed at the Cobble Hill bridge site when test borings failed to locate bedrock, requiring additional investigation. In early February, the NHDOT granted preliminary approval of the bridge's design, and project managers submitted the State wetlands permit application. At this point, we anticipate construction of both

bridges to take place during the 2012 season.

Upper & Lower Wilson Pond dams
To comply with changing state regulations aimed at improving dam safety, the Town has retained Dubois and King to prepare emergency action plans for these two Town-owned dams, as well as to develop a rehabilitation plan for the Upper Wilson Pond Dam. We anticipate that it will be challenging to attain compliance with modern regulations. When the engineer's work is concluded, we will conduct public meetings to share findings and recommendations.

Ashuelot Rail Trail Officials from the Town of Swanzey, City of Keene, Town and City pathway supporters and representatives of the NH Trails Bureau participated in a ribbon cutting ceremony dedicating an improved section of trail running from Sawyers Crossing Road in Swanzey to Route 101 in Keene (where a bridge allowing safe crossing by trail users is scheduled for construction). Funded through the State's Transportation Enhancement Program and by the two communities, this project improves access for Swanzey residents to the trail network that extends through Keene and surrounding communities. Bruce Bohannon, manager of this successful project, now is assembling plans to continue rail trail improvements south toward the West Village.

<u>Scour countermeasures—Cresson Covered Bridge</u> With completion of the decade—long effort to remove the Homestead Woolen Mill Dam and completion of scour countermeasures protecting the foundation

of the Thompson Covered Bridge, the Department of Transportation and town officials turned their attention to the Cresson Bridge. Through a NHDOT collaboration, the Cresson Bridge as well as Winchester's Ashuelot Covered Bridge have been awarded federal historic bridge preservation funding to implement scour countermeasures. We anticipate implementation of these NHDOT-managed projects to take place in 2013. Swanzey's portion of the approximately \$15,000 required to support the grant application was pledged from the capital reserve fund for the Town's covered bridges.

Other community projects moving forward in 2012 include installation of a sprinkler system for the Cresson Covered Bridge, extension of Safford Drive to Route 12, improvements by NHDOT on Route 32's Martin Brook Bridge, and planning for intersection improvements at the Route 12 intersection of Lake Street and Swanzey Factory Road (in the form of a roundabout). Recognizing the importance of utilities to community development, we also are monitoring the North Swanzey Water and Fire Precinct's negotiation of a water supply agreement with the City of Keene.

Facing the challenges of current economic conditions, town officials have strived to maximize outside funding opportunities for advancing community projects. Examples of this continuing effort reflected in 2012 budget proposals include:

- Warrant Article 2, which seeks voter support for financing the Town's share of upgrades and improvements to the regional wastewater treatment plant. Approval by voters will enable the Town to take advantage of loan forgiveness (which is like a grant) offered by the State, and advance consideration of a Community Development Block Grant application for the project. Approval of the warrant article is needed to pursue other grant opportunities.
- Increased funding for the Emergency Communications Expendable Trust to provide match dollars for a grant to replace all of the police department's portable radios at once (versus over a period of three years), at a \$24,000 savings to the Town.

Current economic conditions also underscore the importance of striving for diversity in funding sources for Town services and programs. In response to repeal of the State's \$30 motor vehicle surcharge, Warrant Article 6 proposes establishment of a \$5 local motor vehicle registration fee dedicated to Town road and bridge improvements. Discontinuation of the \$30 State fee in 2011 reduced Highway Block Grant aid. With more than \$3 million dollars of work identified by the recently completed Town road network assessment, the local registration fee alone will not be sufficient. However, by spreading the financial burden of roadwork to all vehicle owners, the fee will give some relief to property owners.

The release of 2010 US Census Data confirms that our community's median age has increased five years since 2000, from 38 to 43. Swanzey's population has continued to grow, but the portion made up of those less than 18 years of age has declined from 25% to 20%. The census database's historical measurements of housing, utilities, economic conditions, education and commuting patterns describe changes occurring in our community, and will help guide future decisions regarding requirements for service.

Our town's organization is lean. We continue to meet expanding needs by tapping into the community's talent. Volunteer boards and committees like the Old Home Day Committee, Whitcomb Hall Committee, Economic Development Advisory Committee and Open Space Committee enrich our civic life in ways that would be otherwise impossible. We encourage you to become involved. If you have an interest--sports, hiking, biking, history, public safety, gardening, reading, working with children or the elderly--your town needs you! Your participation in Town meetings and public hearings, and your vote at the polls, keeps the Town on track. We wish to express our appreciation to Swanzey's volunteers, members of boards, committees and commissions, firefighters, rescue and emergency management personnel, and employees in all the Town's departments for their commitment to serve. Through everyone's effort, Swanzey remains a great place to live. *

2012 Warrant -- Town of Swanzey, NH

To the inhabitants of the Town of Swanzey in the State of New Hampshire qualified to vote in Town affairs:

FIRST SESSION You are hereby notified to meet for the First (Deliberative) Session of the annual Town Meeting, to be held at the Monadnock Regional High School/Middle School Auditorium, Swanzey, NH on Tuesday, the seventh day of February 2012 at seven in the evening (7:00 p.m.). The First Deliberative Session will consist of explanation, discussion and debate of articles and will afford those voters who are present the opportunity to propose, debate and adopt amendments to each warrant article, except election of officers and warrant articles whose wording is prescribed by state law.

SECOND SESSION You are also notified to meet for the Second Session of the annual Town Meeting on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March 2011, at the Christian Life Fellowship Church, 211 Whitcomb Road, between the hours of 8 a.m. and 7 p.m. to vote by official ballot to elect town officers, to vote by official ballot on warrant articles as they may have been amended at the First Session and to vote on those other official ballot questions whose wording is prescribed by state law.

Article 1 To choose by ballot all necessary town officers including a Moderator, Selectman, Town Clerk, Trustee of the Trust Funds, Supervisor of the Checklist, 2 Zoning Board of Adjustment members, 2 Planning Board members, a Sewer Commissioner and a Library Trustee.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of up to \$855,000 for the purpose of funding the Town's portion of capital improvements and upgrades to the regional wastewater treatment plant (serving Keene, Swanzey and Marlborough) to include engineering services, preparation of plans and specifications, construction and related costs and to authorize the issuance of not more than \$855,000 of bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (NH RSA 33:1 et seq., as amended); and to authorize the Selectmen to issue, negotiate, sell and deliver such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon and the maturity and other terms thereof as shall be in the best interests of the Town; and to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, and obtain and accept Federal, State or other aid or grants which may be available for said project, including, but not limited to, the use of the State Revolving Loan Fund (SRF) RSA 486:14 and/or USDA Office of Rural Development funding, if desired, and to comply with all laws applicable to said project; and to authorize the Selectmen to take any other action or pass any other vote related thereto.

Note: The Town of Swanzey is allocated capacity at the wastewater treatment facility of up to 280,000 gallons per day (or 4.7% of the regional facility's capacity) and through an inter-municipal agreement is obligated to fund that portion of capital improvements and upgrades to the regional wastewater treatment plant. To date, Swanzey's portion of this project has been awarded a grant not to exceed \$106,875 in the form of principal forgiveness.

(RECOMMENDED BY SELECTMEN AND SEWER COMMISSIONERS -- 3/5 VOTE REQUIRED)

Article 3 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant or as amended by vote of the First Session, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling \$5,747,885. Should this article be defeated, the default budget shall be \$5,705,757, which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the town or by law; or the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only.

(RECOMMENDED BY SELECTMEN)

Article 4 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$528,650 to be placed in the following expendable trust and capital reserve accounts of the Town:

Article 5 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$44,220 for the purchase of three (3) thermal imaging cameras and associated equipment for the Fire Department, or take any action thereon.

(RECOMMENDED BY SELECTMEN)

Article 6 Shall the Town vote, pursuant to RSA 261:153VI, to establish a municipal transportation capital reserve fund designating the Selectmen as agents to expend the fund, and vote to collect effective April 1, 2012 an additional motor vehicle registration fee of five dollars (\$5.00) per vehicle to be deposited into the fund to support improvements to the Town's transportation system, said improvements being limited to roads and bridges? In addition to being used for engineering, right of way acquisition, construction and other costs related to improving town roads and bridges, these funds may also be pledged and expended as local

match to secure state or federal funds allocated for local transportation system improvements.

(RECOMMENDED BY SELECTMEN)

Article 7 Shall the Town of Swanzey prohibit vote counting concealed from the human eye by method of computerized voting machines, tabulators or other electronic devices and require that all methods used for sorting and counting votes in all elections be publicly observable for full citizen oversight of the entire voting system? (The secrecy of vote casting shall be maintained.)

(SUBMITTED BY PETITION)

Article 8 Shall the Town of Swanzey provide two ballots to separate warrant articles from candidate races, having one ballot with only warrant articles, and one ballot with only candidate races, for a less complicated vote count?

(SUBMITTED BY PETITION)

Article 9 To vote by ballot on the following four (4) amendments to the Town of Swanzey Zoning Ordinance:

Amendment No. 1: Are you in favor of Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance:

Delete existing Section III-A and replace with new Section III-A as follows:

"SECTION III-A SWANZEY BUILDING REGULATIONS

Section III-A.1. Purpose To establish minimum regulations governing the design, construction, quality of materials, erection, installation, alteration, repair, location, relocation, replacement, addition to, use or maintenance of buildings and building systems in the Town of Swanzey; providing for the issuance of permits; collection of fees; making of inspections; and for the enforcement of this Section as provided by law.

Section III-A.2. State Regulations Where State of New Hampshire laws, codes, rules or regulations are more restrictive or preempt local authority, the state requirement shall be observed.

Section III-A.3. Administration and Enforcement The provisions of this section and its requirements will be enforced by the Building Inspector, hereinafter called the Code Enforcement Officer. In the absence of the Code Enforcement Officer, the Board of Selectmen (or their designee) shall perform his duties.

Section III-A.4. Permits A permit issued by the Code Enforcement Officer shall be required before the placement of foundations or construction, including the placement of manufactured housing. In addition, a building permit shall be required prior to the alteration, repair, removal, or demolition of a building or structure, unless exempt from permit requirements.

The Code Enforcement Officer shall not issue any permits until all applicable driveway, fire code, septic, wetland, Zoning Board of Adjustment, Planning Board or other required permits are in place.

Section III-A.5. Means of Appeal Any party who has been aggrieved by a decision of the Code Enforcement Officer may appeal from such action by filing a written appeal from said administrative decision within thirty (30) days from the date of decision, said appeal to be filed with the Zoning Board of Adjustment.

Section III-A.6. Building Code Adoption All buildings, building components, and structures constructed in Swanzey shall comply with the most recent State of New Hampshire Building Code as currently set forth in RSA 155-A, including any amendments. The Building Code shall apply to all construction, design, structure, maintenance, and use of all buildings or structures to be erected and to the alteration, renovation, rehabilitation, repair, maintenance, removal, or demolition of all buildings and structures previously erected.

If the State Building Code or portions thereof are repealed, the most recent versions of the International Residential Code, International Building Code, International Energy Conservation Code, International Mechanical Code, International Plumbing Code, National Electrical Code and State Fire Code shall apply. The regulations, provisions, conditions and terms of said code are hereby referred to and adopted and made part hereof as if fully set out in this section, with any amendments prescribed in this section as follows: Amendments:

- a. Amend Section R101.1 by inserting: The Town of Swanzey.
- b. Amend Section R102.5 by adding: Appendices C, G and J are referenced and adopted as part of this code.
- c. Delete Section R112, Board of Appeals.

III-A.7. Installation of New Septic Systems. New septic systems may not be installed until a building permit for a structure to be served by the new septic system has been issued by the Town of Swanzey.

III-A.8. Certificate of Occupancy/Completion A Certificate of Occupancy/Completion is required prior to the occupation or use of a building/structure for which a building permit has been issued. If applicable, the following must be inspected or approved before a Certificate of Occupancy/Completion will be issued.

- a. Fire Inspection A statement signed by the Fire Chief or designee regarding installation of smoke detectors at all levels; inspection of chimney clearances and height above roof; and installation of furnace, wood stoves and fireplaces, where regulated.
- b. A statement from the Swanzey Public Works Director and/or NH Department of Transportation that the driveway entrances have been completed to specifications on driveway permit(s).
- c. Operational approval for the Septic System from the State of New Hampshire.
- d. In the event that other permits were required in order to issue the building permit, sign-off from the granting agency is required.

Certificates of Occupancy/Completion will be issued by the Selectmen (or their designee).

III-A.9. Fees - The fees for permits shall be determined and set by the Board of Selectmen. Fees must be paid to the Town of Swanzey before a permit may be issued.

Professional review of plans and site inspections if required by the Code Enforcement Officer shall be at the expense of the applicant and must be paid before a Certificate of Occupancy/Completion is issued."

Amendment No. 2: Are you in favor of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance:

Amend Section XII Board of Adjustment by adding a new Section XII.D. as follows:

"Section XII.D. - Time Limits on Special Exceptions & Variances:

Section XII.D.1. Special Exception

A special exception shall expire if such use is not substantially acted upon within, or ceases for more than, two (2) years. For a use not substantially acted upon within two (2) years, a one-time, one-year extension may be granted upon application to the Zoning Board for good cause shown. Application for extension must be filed with the Land Use Office not later than thirty (30) days prior to the expiration of the original approval.

'Substantially acted upon' shall mean at least one or more of the following:

- a. Construction is commenced within two (2) years after the original approval; and/or
- b. Application is made to the Planning Board within two (2) years after the original approval; and/or
- c. As otherwise may be defined by the Zoning Board of Adjustment as part of the original approval.

Section XII.D.2. Variance

A variance shall expire if such use is not substantially acted upon within, or ceases for more than, two (2) years. For a use not substantially acted upon within two (2) years, a one-time, one-year extension may be granted upon application to the Zoning Board of

Adjustment for good cause shown. Application for extension must be filed with the Land Use Office not later than thirty (30) days prior to the expiration of the original approval.

'Substantially acted upon' shall mean at least one or more of the following:

- a. Construction is commenced within two (2) years after the original approval; and/or
- b. Application is made to the Planning Board within two (2) years after the original approval; and/or
- c. As otherwise may be defined by the Zoning Board of Adjustment as part of the original approval.

Section XII.D.3. Litigation In the event that litigation involving the special exception and/or variance occurs, the time clock for expiration of the special exception and/or variance shall commence when all applicable appeal periods have ended."

Amendment No. 3: Are you in favor of Amendment No. 3 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance:

Amend Section III-H to read as follows: "H. Indoor composting privies (toilets) may be installed in a single family dwelling within the Town; however, a state-approved septic system shall also be installed to meet minimum standards that would be required for an ordinary wastewater disposal system for a three bedroom house."

Amendment No. 4: Are you in favor of Amendment No. 4 as proposed by petition for the Town Zoning Ordinance:

"In Section VIII (Shore land Protection District) amend subsection C (Primary Building Line/Setback) to read as follows:

C. PRIMARY BUILDING LINE/SETBACK:

- a. With the exception of those properties situated on or near Wilson Pond that are subject to RSA 483-B, no primary structure as defined by RSA 483-B, shall be built, placed or erected within one hundred twenty-five feet from the reference line as defined by RSA 483-B:4, XVII as may be amended.
- b. Wilson Pond Primary Structure Setback: For pri-

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mary structures situated on or near Wilson Pond that are subject to RSA 483-B, primary structures as defined by RSA 483-B shall be set back from the reference line in accordance with RSA 483-B, as may be amended."





Administration

The hub of our town's government activity, Town Hall links citizens, town officials, departments and the Town's numerous boards and committees. While many citizens think of Town Hall as the place to register a car, license a dog or pay a tax or utility bill, our staff also provides the administrative and financial operations support necessary to the "business" of local government.

Staff transitions can be challenging in a small organization, and we have especially appreciated the patience of our customers during 2011. We extend our best wishes to longtime Tax Collector Ruth Snyder, who retired this summer, and hope she is enjoying her well-earned retirement. Working to fill the void left by Ruth's departure, remaining staff has had no shortage of learning opportunities this year. The March election of a new town clerk, along with the potential for other staff changes, means our period of transition will continue in 2012.

Town Hall's "front" office operations are primarily focused on customer service activities such as vehicle registrations, maintaining vital records, licensing dogs and paying property taxes or utility bills. Front office staff also are the frequent recipients of queries that direct customers beyond the building's double doors to its other offices, including the land use department (planning and zoning, building permits and code enforcement), finance, assessing or the office of the Town Ad-

ministrator. Town Hall staff also provides administrative support for many Town committees, including the Sewer Commission and the Recreation Committee's summer camp program. In a small organization that supports the diverse functions of local government, numerous boards, committees and departments, a "typical" day at Town Hall can require a staff member to wear several hats while assisting residents, visitors or taxpayers. Every day is different, and every day presents opportunities to interact with our community and make a difference.

Town Hall staff maintains the Town's web site, <u>www.town.swanzey.</u> <u>nh.us</u>, to make information about the activities of your town available 24/7. Users' suggestions help us ensure that the web site provides useful and relevant information. www.town.swanzey.nh.us Town news, notices, election results, minutes and more First and foremost, we recognize Chief Richard Busick's service to the Town of Swanzey. Chief Busick served in law enforcement for thirty-six years, ten of them as Swanzey's police chief. It has been a privilege and an honor to work with him.

The Police Department responded to a broad variety of calls in 2011, some quite serious. Residential and commercial growth in Swanzey and Cheshire County clearly contributes to an increase in demands on our agency. Residents and business owners should take notice that burglaries continue to increase, up 18% from 2010. Also increasing were fraudulent activities (up 68% from 2010), criminal mischief (up 12% from 2010), criminal threatening (up 93%) and residential/commercial alarms (up 7%). Heroin use is widespread in Cheshire County, and is at the root of many burglaries, as well as many of our most serious cases.

Staffing changes & challenges For the entire year we operated understaffed due to budgetary concerns. In our already-small department, working with one less officer dramatically affects our operation, and reduces our proactive policing efforts. Compounding this staffing deficiency, we were plagued by extended absences of two officers due to injuries and illness. Remaining staff picked up the slack by carrying bigger case loads and adjusting schedules; cancellation of earned time off has forced us to use overtime to cover patrol shifts. As we enter 2012, we are down an additional position due to the retirement of Chief Busick.

<u>Collaboration in emergency response</u> Swanzey Police and other Town public safety staff worked together with Cheshire County agencies and the Cheshire Fair management to help provide a safe and secure environment for patrons and workers at the annual Cheshire Fair. We continue to work with these agencies to improve our preparedness for an incident that affects public safety at this well-attended annual event.

Visible policing This year's reduced staffing diminished the Department's ability to be a visible presence on Town roads, and affected our proactive policing efforts, patrol and motor vehicle violation enforcement.

<u>Customer service</u> We continue to practice our core values of fairness, compassion and integrity. Officers attend professional development and advanced training to stay on the leading edge of law enforcement technology and concepts. Our officers take pride in working as a team with other Town departments and outside agencies to improve the quality of life in Swanzey. We are finalizing installation of Coplogic, a software program that will enable citizens to efficiently report certain types of crimes directly to the police via the Internet.

We look forward to another year working with the Swanzey Fire Department, the Swanzey Department of Public Works, and Swanzey Emergency Management, to provide Swanzey residents with the best in emergency services.

Emergency Management Department

The Emergency Management Department continues to stay active in All Hazards Public Health Planning and disaster preparation. We continue to upgrade and update technical equipment to ensure the most effective communication. All Town departments are in compliance with the new FCC Narrow Band licensing requirements.

In the latest edition of the Town newsletter, Swanzey Uncovered, the Emergency Management office published an emergency community resource survey to help identify and locate the resources Swanzey citizens might be willing to make available in a disaster, and to identify the skills of those who are willing to volunteer. Also published in Swanzey Uncovered was a form for anyone who might need specialized assistance in the event of a disaster. Both the resource survey and specialized assistance forms are available at Town Hall and at the Police Station, and can be filled out at any time during the year.

Remember to update your Code Red contact information if you change an address or add a cell phone. Code Red is a telephone notification service that rapidly contacts residents and businesses in Swanzey when there is a situation in town (for example, a major bridge closure, or a rash of burglaries). If you would like to be contacted, you may sign up on the Town's web site (see sidebar) or at Town Hall.

When your electric service fails, we encourage you to report the problem to Public Service of NH (1-800-662-7764), or to confirm that PSNH is aware of the outtage. When the Swanzey Emergency Operations Center is open during a significant event, you can also call the office, where an information line will be available.

You may contact us by phone or e-mail (see sidebar). We will be happy to set up an appointment or meet with you to talk about any concerns or questions you may have. ••

Vermont Yankee Emergency Planning Zone

Areas in southwest Swanzey are in the Vermont Yankee Nuclear Power Plant 10-mile emergency planning zone. Maps of the zone are posted at the West Swanzey Post Office, Town Hall, the three fire stations, and both libraries. If you are unsure of the boundaries of the ten-mile planning zone, contact us and we will check your address location.

Calendars containing emer-

gency planning information are mailed to residents of the zone. Calendars also are available at the Emergency Management office.

A siren along Route 10 (south) is tested monthly at 12:30 p.m. on the first Saturday. Residents of the 10-mile zone who are not within audible range of the siren may ask for a tone-alert radio from the Emergency Management office.

Swanzey Fire Department

Protect your family this year by taking the following measures. Your efforts may save lives.

Identify your home with your street address, on the street side of the house. Numbers on the mail box are difficult to find, especially at night. If you have a long driveway, also display your address on a post at the end of the driveway.

Install smoke detectors throughout your home. Injuries and fatalities from fire are directly linked to the absence of early detection of smoke and fire. Detectors powered by house current are better, but battery operated detectors are adequate. Change batteries twice a year.

Dial 911 to contact Fire and EMS. This is the fastest and best method for contacting emergency services. Do not call the local fire stations or dispatch centers directly. Trained call takers at 911 have the technology to identify your address from your phone call, as well as life-saving instructions for coaching you through the emergency.

Get out and stay out! When you detect a fire in your home, leave immediately! Call 911, and then wait outside at the street to meet and advise firefighters. Firefighters are best equipped and trained to mitigate the emergency.

During the past twelve months, the Swanzey Fire Department responded to over 870 fire and EMS emergencies, and an additional 50 mutual aid calls. On an average day, the Department answers at least two emergency calls, and it is not unusual, on some days, to answer as many as eight emergencies (sometimes several of these concurrently) in a twenty-four hour period. The name of the organization is the Swanzey Fire Department; however, our mission is broad and includes an all-hazards approach to medical emergencies, motor vehicle accidents, hazardous materials incidents, water rescue emergencies, natural and man-made disasters. The Department's on-call firefighters and emergency medical technicians are assigned to three stations and nine separate engine, ladder and rescue companies strategically located in East, Center and West Swanzey. Captains and lieutenants oversee the personnel, apparatus and equipment of each station.

Emergency preparedness Working closely with the Swanzey Police Department and local office of emergency management, the Town of Swanzey is poised to assist residents through emergency planning and response to almost any emergency. This past August, Hurricane Irene hit the East Coast. Swanzey emergency responders were prepared, and braced for the emergency by opening the Town's emergency operations center and staffing the Town's three fire stations for a twelve hour period. Although the destructive part of the storm veered to the west, causing little damage to Swanzey, we were well prepared and demonstrated the

ability to quickly respond to unusual circumstances that have the potential to harm our community.



September 6, 2011 accident involving a rolled tractor trailer closed Route 12 for eight hours.

Training To ensure Department preparedness, protect the safety of personnel, and to provide the highest possible levels of service, Swanzey firefighters average forty-eight hours of scheduled Department training every year. Training topics include emergency medical procedures, advanced medical procedures, rescue techniques and a broad range of challenging drills. Firefighters and EMS providers are encouraged to attend outside training opportunities as well, often leading to advanced certifications through the New Hampshire Fire Standards and Training Council and the National Registry of Emergency Medical Technicians. This year's State certification course attendees include Josh Murray (Firefighter Level I), Richard Symonds (Firefighter Level II), and Rebecca Romaneck (Firefighter Level II). Currently, Mitchell LaChapelle, Andrea Fisher and Richard Symonds are training to obtain certification as Emergency Medical Technicians.

Fire prevention continues to be the prime focus of the Swanzey Fire De-

partment. Inspectors from the Department conduct the inspections required by local ordinances and State laws, and issue a wide range of permits. Each year, the Department issues over five hundred fire permits to residents. Following a one-time Department inspection and issuance of a camp fire permit, residents may burn a small camp fire during the evening hours on almost any day of the year (excluding times of high fire danger). A daily permit, required to burn larger brush piles, follows inspection to ensure that these fires meet specific criteria for size and types of material, location of the pile, and the day's weather concerns. Prior to holding a fireworks display, Swanzey requires property owners to obtain a permit to discharge NH-permissible fireworks. Fireworks permits require a site inspection, and payment of a \$25 fee. Applicants must be 21 years of age or older, and must provide specific information about the products being used and the location of the fireworks display. Department inspectors also review site plans and building plans, and inspect fire alarm systems, sprinkler systems, smoke detectors, propane storage and propane devices, oil burning devices, chimneys, and solid fuel burning devices such as wood and pellet stoves. Call the administrative phone line (358-6455) to request an inspection. A department inspector will be assigned to assist you.

Over the past twelve months we have seen an 11% increase in demand for our response to emergencies of all types, including an increase in structural fires and fires resulting from wood stove installations (please consult sidebar). The Town of Swanzey is growing, and demands for service logically are increasing as well. Residents can be confident that the Swanzey Fire Department stands ready to respond when you need us. ❖

Once again, this year brought extremes in the weather. During January and February, we treated the roads constantly. We were on the road so much in January that we had to ask, for the first time since 2005, for an increase in our budget. The winter weather kept us busy all the way through February, when it shut down again just as quickly as it had begun. March came in like a lion with wind, rain and a lot of snow on the ground, causing water issues that kept us busy for several days. We spent several weeks cleaning up branches from the year's wind storms. Thankfully, mud season was short. By late spring we were catching up on road maintenance. We made it through Hurricane Irene with only minor tree damage, feeling fortunate compared to our Vermont neighbors who received the brunt of the storm. When we got twenty inches of snow on October 29th, we thought we were in for an early and hard winter, but the snow melted and we were able to complete several more projects on our list.

Culverts and roads This year DPW staff replaced culverts on Atkinson Hill Road, Cram Hill Road, Railroad Street and Eaton Road, and repaired several catch basins in town. Staff upgraded 700 feet of storm drain, repaired catch basins and installed one additional catch basin on Eaton Road. To stretch our paving dollars, we installed "FiberMat" on sections on Old Richmond Road and Matthews Road that we reclaimed. Along with Railroad Street, we reclaimed an original section of Eaton

Road. We have kept up our chip sealing program to prevent roads from declining into more costly repairs.

Other work Once again, beaver activity kept staff busy throughout the year. We started working with a consultant to satisfy DES requirements for the two Wilson Pond dams.

Cemeteries opened on April 21. We completed spring clean-up in early May, and final preparations were done prior by Memorial Day. The rainy summer kept us mowing right up until the leaves stared to fall, and fallen tree limbs required our attention. We cleared brush along the stone walls in Oak Hill, Homestead, and Mt. Caesar cemeteries, and repaired several graves that had settled. Fourteen full burial lots and three cremation lots were sold. Of the year's fifty-two burials, twenty-seven were full burials and twenty-five were cremations.

Facilities At the Carpenter Home, we completed the roof repair begun in 2010, re-constructed the handicap ramp, cut brush, buried telephone lines, and re-painted and repaired two residents' rooms. At Town Hall, a new boiler and new section of roof were installed. Richardson Park waterlines were improved, and a new pump installed. We repaired the exterior of the South Road ball field garage, and and replaced the overhead door. At Brown Field, we rebuilt one of the concession stand windows to prevent future break-ins, replaced the roof, and cleaned up the numerous tree limbs that fell during the Halloween snow storm. ❖

Swanzey Recycling Center

Has the tide turned? After four years of fairly stable volumes of tonnage, volume is up. Recycled tonnage is up by 131 tons (8%)--mostly construction materials, but also paper, plastic and electronics. Non-recyclables have also increased by 40 tons (4%), raising your recycling rate to 51%, a slight increase over 2010.

Despite the "gloomy" economy, markets for your recyclables remained surprisingly strong through most of this past year. Sales of recyclables topped \$90,000, and \$39,000 in income from drop-off fees set a new record. While markets are expected to be somewhat lower in 2012, industry forecasts, our increased totals, and seeing how much "Santa" brought you this year combine to give us the sense that the economy may be turning at long last. By this time next year, we will let you know for sure.

Things you may have noticed at the Center We repositioned and elevated our glass crusher, enabling us to save both machine time and labor hours for the 100 tons of crushed glass that we process each year. (This figure excludes the 20 tons of "deposit" glass that we also process). Our knotweed eradication program has finally taken off, with about 25% eradicated, and reduced growth in other areas. Please remember: Knotweed must go into the burn pits, and not into the compost.

Sounds of the Swanzey Recycling Center heard round the nation For those of you who saw Ken Burns's latest film, "Prohibition," on PBS last fall, did you know that the glass you heard being broken was broken at the Swanzey Recycling Center? At Evan Barlow's recommendation, a Florentine Films sound crew came down from Walpole and spent several hours taping the sound of (hundreds of) single bottles containing varying amounts of liquid breaking on different surfaces. We are still waiting for a call from Hollywood, but nothing yet.

Take something home from the Recycling Center Please remember that free compost, wood chips and kindling are available for the taking. Weather permitting, we can help you by bucket-loading during selected hours on Saturday.

As always, thank you for another successful year, and for your continuing support. •

The Planning Board's work is divided between reviewing proposals for development, such as subdivisions and site plans, and preparing recommendations for how best to use land in Swanzey. These recommendations are formalized in the Town's zoning ordinance, subdivision regulations, and in the master plan.

During 2011, site plan review applications (permitting new businesses in Town), as well as subdivision applications (creating new lots) decreased from prior years. It is assumed that these decreases were due to the continued downturn in the economy, as many towns in the region noted similar decreases. However, re-use and adaptation of existing properties for new businesses continues in town. Examples include a tractor dealership on Route 10, a window/door distributor on Flat Roof Mill Road, and a household furnishings consignment shop on Route 32. Proposed new construction includes a sign manufacturer, the expansion of an existing shopping plaza, and additional selfstorage units, all along Route 10.

Voters will find three proposed zoning amendments on the ballot on March 13. Proposed Amendment #1 simplifies existing Section III-A (Swanzey Building Regulations); establishes the authority of the Board of Selectmen to establish fees; adopts design criteria established by the International Code Council; and streamlines the Certificate of Occupancy/Completion process. Proposed Amendment #2 establishes time limits on Special Exceptions and Variances if not substantially acted upon within two years, or if action ceases

for more than two years, and provides for a one-time, one-year extension. Proposed Amendment #3 clarifies the regulations regarding indoor composting toilets. The full text of the proposed zoning amendments can be found in the Town Warrant contained in this Annual Report.

In addition to the zoning amendments proposed by the Planning Board, there is also one proposed amendment submitted by petition. This proposed amendment seeks to change the primary structure setback from the reference line for properties on or near Wilson Pond to 50 feet. The State defines the reference line as the surface elevation of Wilson Pond at 476 feet. The Town's current setback requirement is 125 feet from the reference line. The Planning Board held a public hearing on the petitioned zoning amendment on January 5. At that meeting, the Board voted to not to support the proposed amendment. By state law, the petitioned amendment must be placed on the ballot, with the Planning Board's approval or disapproval noted. The full text of the petition zoning amendment can be found in the Town Warrant contained in this Annual Report.

Finally, the Planning Board is in need of alternate members. If you are interested in serving your Town in the capacity of a Planning Board alternate, please contact Town Planner Sara Carbonneau for additional information.

Zoning Board of Adjustment

The Zoning Board evaluates requests of property owners who want to use their land in ways that deviate from Swanzey's zoning ordinance. Examples include requests for variances or special exceptions, appeals from administrative decisions and requests for equitable waivers from dimensional requirements.

Swanzey's zoning ordinance was adopted by and is amended by the voters of the Town. When zoning amendments are proposed, the Planning Board holds public hearings to solicit input. The ZBA encourages residents to take an active role in developing the regulations that affect each and every one of you.

The powers and actions of zoning boards are strictly controlled by New Hampshire law. For example, the criteria for granting variances is established by RSA 674:33,I(b). All towns must use those criteria. If an applicant meets all the criteria, the ZBA must grant the variance.

Town Planner Sara Carbonneau is available to answer questions regarding the ZBA or the Town's zoning ordinance. 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Open Space Committee

The Open Space Committee protects the rural character of Swanzey by permanently preserving important open space. The Committee promotes land conservation, and brings together landowners and land trusts.

Committee members look back on 2011 with gratitude and appreciation for a town that treasures its rural character. Since 2004 the OSC has been helping Swanzey landowners through the process of protecting land with conservation easements.

Easements celebrated Keene State College Camp on Wilson Pond was the setting for the annual April easement celebration. The Bob and Lois Domina family was honored for protecting 155 acres, with the generous help of Swanzey residents. The Domina's special place features the hiking trails, beautiful views and sheer cliff faces of Hewes Hill, as well as Tippin Rock, the property's namesake, a forty-ton boulder that moves when pushed in just the right spot.

Elizabeth and Carroll Tolman donated an easement on over sixty acres located close to the Hewes Hill/Tippin Rock Farm parcel. Carroll's Hill features a magical brook, ledges and caves, and at least one 200-year-old oak. At the summit, hikers are rewarded with a view of Mt. Monad-

nock and all of east Swanzey. To share news of the families' generosity, Swanzey residents received a postcard featuring scenes from the two parcels painted by local artists Jeanne M. Thieme and Deb Crowder. <u>Public access to conserved land</u> To help hikers enjoy protected lands in Swanzey, the OSC has created trail maps for Tippin Rock and Honey Hill, with a third map in the works for Carroll's Hill. Map boxes--made by an OSC volunteer--mark the beginnings of the trails.

<u>Easements in process</u> A conservation easement on a large tract of land along the Ashuelot River in West Swanzey presently is in process. More information will be forthcoming in 2012 as details unfold.

Ambassadors of open space protection

At our spring celebration at the Potash Bowl in May, the cattle Ike, Star and Bright introduced Meg and Beth--two friendly young goats--as Swanzey's newest ambassadors of open space protection. Party guests received a beautiful new OSC button bearing Deb Crowder's portrait of the five animals. The MRHS Agricultural Club staffed a booth at the celebration, and shared dairy product information and samples.

Along with our animal ambassadors and a host of flag-waving children and parents, OSC members marched in the Old Home Day parade on July 16. A highlight at our Old Home Day booth was a map of Swanzey. Visitors selected and

You're invited to take part in hikes showcasing properties already protected, or in the process of being protected.

The OSC currently is collaborating on a pilot project with the Monadnock Conservancy--our local land trust--and students of the Monadnock regional school district. The Swanzey Conservation Commission (SCC) works to maintain or improve the quality of the air, soil, water, plants animals and other natural resources of Swanzey.

Seventh annual roadside cleanup Although the weather was not as pleasant on April 23 as previous years, many dedicated citizens again walked along Swanzey's roads and picked up trash. The SCC thanks all volunteers who continually strive to keep Swanzey clean and beautiful.

Annual Ashuelot River paddling trip Every May, the SCC sponsors a canoe/kayak trip down the Ashuelot River. Members of the SCC led a small group down the River, taking time to explore historical and ecological points of interest.

Ashuelot River & South Branch water quality testing The SCC continues to participate in and sponsor the testing of water quality of the Ashuelot River and the South Branch. In 2011, the SCC also tested further upstream in the South Branch to pinpoint possible pollution.

Maintaining and improving conservation lands Endeavoring to make the Mount Cresson Conservation Area more accessible, for several years SCC members have been working to establish a summit loop trail that begins and ends in a small parking lot off Matthews Road. Led by Stephen Stepenuck, members have cleared debris, marked the trail and erected signs along the route. We expect to complete a trail map and lead a hike in the summer of 2012.

Coordination with other committees
We continue to work closely with the
Swanzey Open Space Committee.
We also attend meetings and hearings of the Planning Board, Zoning
Board of Adjustment, and Board of
Selectmen when environmental matters are involved. Members serve on
the SWRPC Natural Resources Advisory Committee and the Ashuelot
River Local Advisory Committee.

Permits/projects Permit applications for work in wetlands come before the Commission each year, and the state Department of Environmental Services expects our input. The SCC also is expected to review all new proposals and ongoing projects with respect to their environmental impacts. Both kinds of investigations frequently involve site walks. We strive to make recommendations that will minimize environmental damage associated with development proposals, but which are reasonable.

Complaints/inquiries The SCC investigates complaints of alleged environmental violations and, where appropriate, reports to town and state officials. This function can require hundreds of hours per year. Illegal dumping of trash, appliances, and tires along unpaved Town roads continues to be a problem. We also answer various environment-related questions and concerns from citizens throughout the year: Please feel free to ask. ❖

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Our business survey has been completed, and the results tallied. Your response rate was exceptionally high, and your comments about the Swanzey business climate and the Town's support of the business community were constructive and quite favorable. The survey has given our Committee some good focus on our future efforts to foster the advancement of a vibrant economic community in Swanzey.

Seeking to broaden our outreach, during this past year we have met with organizations including the New Hampshire Finance Authority, Fast Roads, and the Hannah Grimes Center. Here at home, our reputation as an advocate for Town businesses continues to grow. We have been able to help find solutions to business problems--ranging from electrical power interruptions to real estate

matters--for a number of businesses in the community. We welcome more opportunities to fulfill this part of the Committee's mission.

Our 2012 work programs include:

- Hosting several "meet and greets" at local businesses.
- Sponsoring guest speakers from inside and outside our community.
- Creating brochures promoting economic development in Swanzey.
- Developing a program to celebrate and welcome new and expanding Swanzey businesses.

Remember, EDAC is your committee. Everyone inside and outside of our business community is cordially invite to attend our monthly meetings. Your opinions and thoughts are strongly encouraged. Expansion of a vibrant economic community is up to us all. •

The Economic Development Advisory Committee is charged by the Board of Selectmen to accomplish the following:

To provide input and advice on matters relating to the Town's economic development opportunities and to develop strategies and recommendations of initiatives to promote the Town as a place to start or grow a business.

To inventory existing businesses in the community surveying those businesses seeking ways the town can support and encourage existing businesses to grow, and recommend strategies to attract additional business and economic activity.

To inventory available properties and opportunities for economic development and develop recommendations on how to promote those properties and our town to attract desired businesses and employment opportunities.

<u>To support initiatives</u> to develop Swanzey's community brand and strengthen our town's identity in the region and state.

To survey Town residents to determine businesses they wish to have locate in town.

Developing plans and obtaining required environmental permits for the District's connector road has been the focus of the Revenue Development District in 2011. The road will connect Route 32 (south of Wilson Pond) with Route 12 (in the vicinity of the Cheshire Fairgrounds). More effort than anticipated has been required to develop a Route 12 curb cut and intersection plan that will meet State requirements and the diverse needs of current and future road users. Once this portion of the plan is finalized, development of the project's construction schedule can move ahead.

In the short term, it is anticipated that a favorable construction climate and low financing rates will help advance the goals of the district development plan. With the retirement of Phase I debt service comes an increased ability for the District to finance the development of infrastructure through generated tax increment.

The North Swanzey Water and Fire Precinct and City of Keene are currently negotiating a water agreement needed to provide opportunity for new users to connect to municipal water, as well as the extension of water service within the tax increment district.

To advance our community goal of increasing opportunity for ecodevelopment, Selectmen, Sewer Commissioners, North Swanzev Water and Fire Precinct officials, Town department leaders and planners, Keene officials, Economic Develop Advisory Committee members, and District property owners will be called upon to help fulfill the District's development plan. The residents of our Town and region will benefit from this positive economic activity through local employment. Future development in the Swanzey Revenue Development District will support education, county and Town services. *

The Trustees of Trust Funds maintain custody of all trust funds held by the Town of Swanzey and Monadnock Regional School District. Such funds include Capital Reserve and Expendable Trusts funded by public appropriations at the respective Town and District Meetings, and non-restricted trust accounts funded by private bequests, donations, scholarships, and memorials. The Cemetery Fund is a perpetual trust. Trustees oversee the investment of the trust funds, as well as the orderly disbursements therefrom. Trustee responsibilities are fiduciary, in compliance with NH statutes (notably RSA 31 & 32), and are subject to annual audit and submission to the Charitable Trust Unit of the NH Department of Justice.

As all investment managers are reporting, 2011 was a challenging year, characterized by volatility in the equity markets, and punishingly low returns in the fixed income markets. Rates of return in the NH Public Deposit Investment Pool, the default repository for public funds, remained at a small fraction of one percent all year, making meaningful returns a virtual impossibility. Trustees have had some success with select bank certificates of deposit, but the FDIC insurance ceiling (\$250,000) imposes practical limitations to this strategy.

Trustees lost a valued member with the passing of Bob Beauregard in June 2011. We join other Town entities to record our appreciation of his long and faithful service to Swanzey. Selectmen appointed Steven D. Bittel in September to finish out Bob's three-year term.

The current year also marks the retirement of Mary Faulkner as

bookkeeper to the Trustees of Trust Funds, completing thirty-two years of managing the many accounts, keeping meticulous books in painstaking detail, all while adapting to the spreadsheet requirements of a computerized world. We record with gratitude our debt, and that of the Town, to Mary's scrupulous--and good-natured--attention to detail.

Major disbursements this year included \$293,373 from the Monadnock Regional School District School Building Capital Reserve Fund, and \$14,100 from the Town Covered Bridge Fund for safety measures at the Thompson Bridge. Charter revisions were approved for the Susan Sciuto Family Scholarships so that scholarship awards may now be sustained over four years of college, rather than being one-time events at Commencement. Please see Trustee financial reports for fund activity and current balances. •

Swanzey Sewer Commission

In 2011 the Sewer Commission began implementation of a plan to fund Swanzey's portion of EPA-required upgrades of the Keene Regional Wastewater Treatment Plant. Keene has established a capital improvement plan that runs through 2018 that will meet the EPA permit requirements. Swanzey owns 4.7% of the treatment facility and Marlborough owns a similar portion. Keene administers the operation of the facility

To fund Swanzey's portion of the required upgrade, the Commission applied for and has been awarded a \$855,000 low interest loan from the State Revolving Loan Fund. To access these funds, the Town will seek

bonding authority from the voters in 2012.

The Commission also conducted an income survey in North Swanzey that qualified the Town to compete for a Community Development Block Grant of up to \$200,000. In addition, the Commission is looking into the USDA Rural Development Grant Program and other funding sources.

We anticipate no changes in West Swanzey this year. We are, however, beginning the planning process for the removal and disposal of sludge from the lagoons. That operation is one to two years down the road.

Manhole maintenance and line cleaning programs are ongoing. •

Superintendent William Snyder and Supervisor of the Checklist Ruth Snyder were also in attendance. Commissioner Fred R. Pitcher was recovering from surgery and was unable to attend.

Article 2. The Precinct voted to raise and appropri-

ate the sum of \$ 317,990 to defray expenses incidental to the business of the Precinct.

Article 6. There was a short discussion on general matters concerning the Precinct.

Ashuelot River Local Advisory Committee

Ashuelot River Local Advisory Committee

Major projects were completed on the River this year! Removal of the Homestead Woolen Mill Dam and reinforcement of the Thompson Covered Bridge were completed Oct. 1. Many stopped to watch the construction over the six-week process, and more continue to stop and view the transformed free-flowing river. In Keene, the clean-up of coal tar derivatives from Mill Creek was completed, but the return of high river flows deferred removal from the mainstem until low water of 2011.

Land conservation successes supported by ARLAC included purchase by the Society for the Protection NH Forests of 1,750 acres in the headwaters, and the use of NH Aquatic Resource Mitigation Funds towards the purchase of an easement on shorelands in Swanzey.

The volunteer Ashuelot River water quality monitoring program, in conjunction with the Department of Environmental Services Volunteer River Assessment Program, continued for its tenth season. A spring training program prepared members and community volunteers for five months of water sampling. Twelve sites were sampled along the Ashuelot River's 64-mile length, as well as at two sites along the South Branch. Samples were analyzed for temperature, pH, total phosphorus, dissolved oxygen, turbidity, chloride, and conductivity. Conservation commissions along the River donated funding to support lab costs. A review of ten years of data indicates that total phosphorus levels in Swanzey and

downstream appear to be on the decline. *E.coli* values continue to fluctuate, with some concerns on the South Branch, the sources of contamination yet to be determined. Declining pH values throughout the River's course indicate a trend of increasing acidity.

Review and comment on state permit applications to conduct work within the River corridor This year we submitted comments on projects proposed in Washington, Marlow, Keene, Swanzey, and Winchester. On-going discussions of projects of significant impact include a proposed biomass plant in Winchester and a proposal by the City of Keene to exempt certain shorelands from the Shoreland Water Quality Protection Act. AR-LAC members promoted small boat access at the proposed Route 10 Bridge replacement in Winchester, and followed NH legislation and rulemaking, advocating for river corridor protection.

ARLAC Corridor Management Implementation Plan Heeding Model Forest Policy Program research, ARLAC included climate change impact as a guiding principle in plan implementation. ARLAC members also began working with The Nature Conservancy to locate and implement a model culvert restoration project in the watershed.

The annual River clean-up scheduled for Oct. 2 was cancelled due to high water. However, volunteers in Swanzey and Keene picked up debris throughout the month on portions of the River and Beaver Brook.❖

2011 tax forms are available at Mount Caesar Union Library. Mount Caesar Union Library underwent big changes in 2011, both visible and invisible. We gained new services, replaced failed systems, and hosted new gatherings. This summer was one of the busiest on record, with well over one hundred people using the Library on some days.

Swanzey joined the NH Downloadable Books Consortium, allowing patrons to download audio- and e-books. If you have a Mount Caesar Union Library card in good standing, we can issue you the additional card necessary for the downloadables.

Our circulation system finally failed completely, but luckily, it did so after we had spent several months researching and comparing replacement systems. Alexandria, the new system we ultimately purchased, offers modern services for patrons and the Library alike. Patrons now can access the Library catalog and their own account on-line, allowing them to search, renew, and reserve books from home.

We refurbished the interior of the building, and purchased new publicaccess patron computers to replace the outdated, donated ones. We now have two PCs and one Mac. During the summer, the old septic system failed, and a new tank and leach field were installed. Thank you to all who helped with these improvements.

Miss Katy (Music and Movement for Toddlers) and the Summer Reading Program kept Swanzey children busy. New offerings for adults included Edie Clark's talk, "Monadnock Tales," the HBO documentary "Hacking Democracy," Adrienne Naylor's presentation on the longlost Civil War diary of Swanzey resident Mary (Whitcomb) Parsons, and a monthly lunchtime book group. Other activities included a knitting circle, a library visit by area Cub Scouts, monthly movie nights and Summer Reading Program parties put on by the Friends of the Library, and the 4th of July ringing of the library bell, accompanied by a recital of Patrick Henry's "Give Me Liberty, or Give Me Death" by Trustee Meg Kupiec. The new Town band has been rehearsing in the Library meeting room. For the second year, a holiday "giving tree" in the fover collected items for area homeless.

In the fall, a NH legislator questioned the federally-granted interlibrary loan van system, sending the library community into an uproar. This service expands our collective holdings and is extremely cost-effective: Through Mount Caesar Union Library, you may borrow almost any book held by a public library in the state. Many of our patrons signed a petition asking that these funds remain allocated. As the issue wends its way through the State House, we will post updates when available.

Assistant Librarian Theone Wallace left us this year to become a children's librarian in Vermont. We send Theone a big thank you for her time with us. In addition to our regular volunteers, two wonderful Monadnock students have been helping out each week.

Mount Caesar Union Library sends a huge thank you to these folks, and to all in the community who have done so much this year to support and help us be here for you.

Stratton Free Library

Patronage at our library has remained steady. We are glad to see that this is so because some libraries have seen a downward trend. Circulation of materials has increased which is always pleasing.

In May, our library joined the NH Downloadable Books Consortium. Our patrons can now download audio books and e-books from the NH State Library. This is available to residents of Swanzey who have a borrower's card for our library.

The Summer Reading Program-One World-Many Stories--was successful, with twelve children earning gift certificates for the Toadstool Bookshop and free ice cream from Twinkle Town.

We have not had a major book sale but we do have a small on-going sale in the library all through the year.

Our long-time Trustee, Ruth Pratt, passed away on December 10, 2011. Over the years Ruth also worked here as an Assistant Librarian. Ruth had been Director of Gilford Public Library, so her experience was very much appreciated at our library and we will miss her.

The Museum was open most days during the summer after the end of the school year, with the exception of a few Saturdays.

We have begun archiving the contents of three "memory" albums donated to the Museum. These scrapbook collections of Swanzey news, activities and photographs--including high school graduation portraits-date from the mid 1940s. We finished copying to acid-free paper the newspaper articles and other print materials from one of the albums, and have enclosed those pages in sleeves. There still are two more albums to do.

We have started cleaning and going through items that have been in storage in the attic. This project will take some time to finish.

During the summer, we received a collection of clothing worn by the ladies of the Page family from North Swanzey. The garments have been cleaned and boxed for temporary storage in the attic. We also received a donation of a digital picture frame. We are compiling a collection of scanned pictures that visitors can view as a slide show on the digital frame. So far we have only a few scanned pictures of Swanzey and covered bridges, but we will scan more as time permits.

This summer the Cheshire County Historical Society plans a publication and exhibit showing water powered mills from various towns in Cheshire County. The Swanzey Historical Museum will participate in the project. In conjunction with the Society's exhibit, we also will have an exhibit of our own, showing the locations of former water-powered mills in Swanzey. Our goal is to have the exhibit installed for the Museum's opening in June.

The Museum is staffed and run entirely by volunteers, and we always need more people. If you are interested in helping, please contact either Jo Gregory or Mary Faulkner. *

Minutes of 2011 Deliberative Session

Moderator Gus Lerandeau and Assistant Moderator Pat Haselton were both present for this meeting. The meeting opened with Police Chief Richard Busick leading those assembled in the Pledge of Allegiance. Moderator Lerandeau and Assistant Moderator Haselton read the warrant as follows.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Swanzey in the State of New Hampshire qualified to vote in Town affairs:

FIRST SESSION You are hereby notified to meet for the First (Deliberative) Session of the annual Town Meeting, to be held at the Monadnock Regional High School/Middle School Auditorium, Swanzey, NH on Tuesday, the eighth day of February 2011 at seven in the evening (7:00 p.m.). The First Deliberative Session will consist of explanation, discussion, debate of articles and will afford those voters who are present the opportunity to propose, debate and adopt amendments to each warrant article, except election of officers and those whose wording is prescribed by state law.

SECOND SESSION You are also notified to meet for the Second Session of the annual Town Meeting on Tuesday, the eighth day of March 2011, at the Christian Life Fellowship Church, 211 Whitcomb Road, between the hours of 8 a.m. and 7 p.m. to vote by official ballot to elect town officers, to vote by official ballot on warrant articles as they may have been amended at the First Session and those other official ballot questions whose wording is prescribed by state law.

Article 1 To choose by ballot all necessary town officers including a Selectman, Trustee of the Trust Funds, 2 Zoning Board of Adjustment members, 2 Planning Board members, a Sewer Commissioner and a Library Trustee.

Article 2 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant or as amended by vote of the First Session, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling \$5,527,605. Should this article be defeated, the default budget shall be \$5,567,734, which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the town or by law; or the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only. 


Tax Rate 2011

Restoration of Involuntarily Merged Lots

In accordance with NH RSA 674:39-aa, any owner of lots merged by municipal action for zoning, assessing or taxation purposes prior to September 18, 2010 and without the consent of the owner may request that the lots be restored to their pre-merger status. Such request MUST be submitted to the Swanzey Board of Selectmen prior to December 31, 2016. Instructions, general information and application forms for restoration of involuntarily merged lots can be obtained on the Town's web site (www.town.swanzev.nh.us) or from Swanzey Town Hall.
