Discussion of the Lakes Region Mental Health Center. Request that \$20,000.00 be made a part of Belknap County Budget was had and a detailed explanation of the need was given by Dr. George S. Harris, Chairman.

This Center was started in 1966. Raising money by public funds would not be done and support be obtained from committees served. Each town contributed in 1966 and 1967. The County was asked and gave \$6,900.00. Their budget has gone up considerably because the need of services has increased three-fold.

# BELKNAP COUNTY COURT HOUSE PUBLIC HEARING LACONIA, NEW HAMPSHIRE

February 19, 1968 7:30 P.M.

Public hearing was held at the Belknap County Court House for the purpose of presenting the 1968 Budget.

Vice-Chairman Foster opened the meeting by calling on Commissioner Atwood to explain the proposed budget for the County Home.

 Total Revenue
 \$362,892.96

 Total Expenditures
 776,736.56

 To be raised by taxation
 413,843.60

Capital Reserve Fund 7,728.76 plus interest \$8,070.60

There is an 87% occupancy at the County Home at this time. One wing has been approved for extensive care. Patients who are hospitalized, their rooms are kept vacant for 2 weeks.

The capital reserve fund some \$300.00 more because of interest. \$400,000.00 was borrowed in anticipation of taxes. \$350,000.00 was invested in U. S. Government Treasury Bills. Interest to be gained around \$6,000.00. The building fund of

\$1,133.79 which is part of the budget, can be spent on capital improvement. A special vote to use capital reserve fund for capital improvement is requested.

Care and supplies for court house (increase in oil and water) \$13,000.00.

Representative Urie stated that the Board and Care of children is \$40,000.00 due to change in settlement law. Increase in food surplus from \$1,654.00 to \$4,940.00 due to settlement law.

Dr. Harris explained the needs of the Lakes Region Mental Health Clinic. \$600,000.00 the first year and \$800,000.00 the second year had been asked from the State to be divided between the 15 clinics in New Hampshire. The State budget was cut \$200,000.00 in second year. 85% of this money goes for salaries. Mental Health Clinic asks \$20,000.00 for 1968. Last year 87% of the Mental Health patients were from Belknap County. The Clinic serves 14 towns outside of Belknap County and remaining money to be obtained from towns outside County. Dr. Harris stated that it costs \$4.35 per hour to see a patient in the clinic while other places the usual fee is \$20.00 per hour. Patients pay when able.

Representative deBlois commented on good reports he heard on the clinic.

Representative Urie specified that it is legal to appropriate money for this purpose. It is left to our judgment as to how much we appropriate.

Charles Smith from the 4-H Extension Service introduced Mrs. Weeks to explain the budget. There is a 1.9 increase over 1967 due to salary increase and extra home economist.

Clerk of Court Robert Tilton states only increase is because of jury pay increase from \$10 to \$15 plus filing cabinets. He recommended that a study be made of microfilming Probate and Superior Court records to avoid having to buy a new, larger vault in a few years.

Sheriff Rodney Crockett's department now on salary. \$9,000.00 and Deputy Sheriff's \$5,800.00. Insurance for riot squad and telephone increase due to telephone hook up with Mount Belknap and County jail.

Register of Deeds, Everett Wheeler stated that as of 1968 no additional money will be needed for Current Indexing. His salary is set by law \$6,500.00 plus 10% of gross received. Expenses of offices last year \$4,500.00 this year's estimate \$5,398.10. He requested insurance for errors and ommissions. Microfilm is needed for security reasons. The camera would cost \$100 a month for 6 months to film all old records. Cost for storage and material would be \$3,405.00.

Treasurer H. Max Wakeman, Jr. reported the benefit the County will receive by borrowing the full \$400,000.00 in anticipation of taxes for 10 months and received \$8,000.00 interest. The interest expense is \$11,327.12. At present capital reserve fund is \$8,070.60. Building fund balance \$1,133.79.

Commissioner Atwood spoke as a tax payer concerning the Mental Health Clinic. She feels it is the State's responsibility to assist. At the present time they are working in the schools and having good results. Since this year's budget with the \$20,000.00 for the Mental Health Clinic included is less than last year's, she recommends giving for 1968 only the request.

An increase of \$4,000.00 to be applied to the estimated revenue for 1968, thus making the total revenue without the interest from the capital reserve fund \$366,892.96.

From the County Hospital budget, an increase of \$7,-035.50 was added due to increase of salaries.

Money in the capital reserve fund will be used for rebuilding the diet kitchen at the County Home.

A cut of \$104.00 on item 675 and a cut of \$238.75 on item 671.

An increase of the Jail budget of \$665.00.

A cut of \$12,000.00 on the Lakes Region Mental Health Clinic and a cut of \$1,500.00 on Register of Deeds (special).

Subject to any further changes made at the March 27 meeting:

Total estimated expenditures for the year 1968 Estimate income To be raised by taxes

\$768,594.31 366,892.96 \$401,701.35

A discussion about the special repairs at the Court House will be had with full delegation before determining if the \$4,000.00 will be considered.

After the meeting, coffee and brownies were served and the meeting adjourned at 9:30 P.M.

The purpose of this meeting was to act on the County Budget for the ensuing year. Report from the Executive Committee was read by Chairman Stafford.

Representative Urie, Chairman of the Executive Committee explained that the increase of \$4,000.00 to the estimated revenue by the Committee was made because of the surplus on hand at the end of 1967 and also due to medicare program.

Discussion on the recommendation of the Executive Committee to cut the Lakes Region Mental Health request from \$20,000.00 to \$8,000.00 was had and a letter was read by Oscar Prescott stating his discussion with Dr. Bramwell, Director of Mental Health concerning Mental Health Clinics. It was brought out also that one other county, Sullivan contributes to their regional clinic. The letter was placed on file.

Representative Roberts offered an amendment to reinstate the \$20,000.00 requested by the Mental Health Clinic.

The Executive Committee Chairman Urie refused to accept the amendment submitted by Representative Roberts.

Motion was made by Representative Urie and seconded by Representative Dulac that \$8,000.00 as recommended by the Executive Committee be given to the Lakes Region Mental Clinic.

Roll call requested. All present voted yes except Representative Roberts who wished an original appropriation of \$20,000.00.

Motion was made and seconded that the \$8,000.00 be foot-noted that this is the last time that the Lakes Region Mental Health Clinic request money from the Delegation. Vote unanimous.

Executive Committee recommended the cut of \$1,500.00 from the Register of Deeds budget. The Chairman of the Court House Committee had not recommended the purchase of an air conditioner.

Motion was made by Representative Urie, seconded by Representative Dulac that \$1,500.00 be cut on the Register of Deeds budget. Vote unanimous.

Motion was made by Representative Urie that the amount of \$8,070.60 in the Capital Reserve Fund to be taken out and used to re-build the diet kitchen at the Belknap County Home.

Roll call vote. All 13 members present voting yes.

The request for payment by the medical referee Dr. Mendon MacDonald be taken out of the \$800.00 estimated expenditure for autopsies in the 1968 budget. It was noted also that this bill was not submitted in time to be put into the budget or considered by the Executive Committee.

Upon recommendation of the Court House sub-committee Chairman, Representative deBlois that the \$200.00 should be added to the Registry of Probate budget to be spent for the purchase of a humidifier for the vault.

Discussion ensued and motion was made by Representative deBlois, seconded by Representative Dulac that a sum not to exceed \$200.00 be spent to put a humidifier in the vault in the Registry of Probate. Vote unanimous.

Motion was made by Representative Urie that the balance of the items set out in the 1968 budget be approved, seconded by Representative Roberts. Vote unanimous.

The Delegation appreciated the delicious dinner, opportunity to dine with the Commissioners and Department heads of the County Home and tour of the building.

Chairman of Area Commission Mr. Ide reported:

Early November snow only made the season ticket holders purchase early.

The March skiing was cut off by melting snow; therefore the profit was the same as last year.

Concerning the sewer problem at the area.

A \$114,000.00 bid was made and rejected. The Area Commissioners state that the sewer and treatment system consultants discussed with the state and they advised rejection.

Bids will now be reopened and the consultants feel the bid should be in the vicinity of \$70,000.00. State will give 40% of cost and Federal Government \$28,000.00.

Interpretation of the State water pollution boards recommendation differ according to Representative Urie and the Area Commissioners.

Balance sheet speaks for itself and we cannot give any money to County with only \$8,049.69 as of October 1, 1968.

Mr. Urie represents two towns a long way from the Area and the towns want money from Area to help keep the taxes down. Suggest Commissioners begin to think in the vein of returning some money each year. A report from Area Commissioners in County yearly report has been suggested. A written report along with financial report. The people of County should realize the advantages of the Area.

Dr. Baker stated that the Area was not set up to be a money making proposition. For 9 years not one cent of tax payers money has gone into it and there is a great increase in the equity since Commissioners first took over 9 years ago.

Mr. Ide wishes to report that they will account for every cent and not spend it foolishly and they have done what they were impowered when Commission was established by keeping the area in the black without using tax payers money along with many improvements.

Mr. Ide places his name in nomination for another term as his expires in September.

The bid was felt too high so a second bid was made and at the end of September a bid of \$104,000.00 was accepted and both Federal and State approved October 3, 1968 and October 8, 1968 and assured their 40% share. The Company doing the work is: R. E. Bean Co.

Budget for year 1968-1969 was submitted by Commissioner Noreen.

Projected Budget: The Area's share of cost of project is \$16,000.00 in 1968 and has made a print of their next years budget.

State is responsible for any interest payments on borrowed money.

40% completed November 15, 1968 payable and due 10 days thereafter.

90% completed December 15, 1968.

Completion in April 1969.

95,700.00 is cash requirement needed by December 1, 1968.

The Commissioners request borrowing power of \$95,000.00 or up until January 1, 1971 to allow any contingency which might occur delaying States payment.

First Federal money will not come in time to meet obligation of contract, it is guaranteed money however.

It was moved by Representative Urie that the Area Commissioners be authorized to borrow up to \$95,000.00. Seconded by Representative Allan. Vote unaniamously adopted.

Representative Urie stated November 8th Executive meeting will be held and on records he has seen no further meeting should be necessary in 1968, and the County is running within its budget.

Chairman Stafford expressed his appreciation for the opportunity of being Chairman of the Delegation and thanked all members for their cooperation.

# REPORT OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

To the Residents of Belknap County:

In 1968 the Commissioners met with other New Hampshire Officers and formed a State association affiliated with a National Association in order to unify and support those programs which are of particular interest to County government.

Our Welfare and County Infirmary costs continue to fluctuate because of changes in Federal and State policies. Our institution is running above capacity and we need a dormitory-type building to house ambulatory patients, leaving the hospital, which is staffed for bed patients, to those more seriously ill.

Our County Treasurer has recommended that we set aside surplus funds at years' end toward this purpose. Last year our cash surplus was \$66,873.41 which was voted by the Delegation to lower the tax rate and we presume this year's surplus of \$36,826.98 will be used for the same purpose.

The difference in cash surplus of \$30,046.43 accounts for an automatic increase in taxes this year. Added to this are the necessary increases in cost of materials, pay raises, etc., but we feel the increases are in line with inflationary times.

One of the duties of a County is to provide adequate space for the administration of justice. It is the judgment of the Commissioners that providing new space for the Sheriff will increase the room needed for consultations between lawyers and citizens as several cases are scheduled by the Court at one time and will lessen the period our citizens need wait for trials.

Our Jail and House of Correction are run in a very efficient and economical manner by the Superintendent, Deputy Jailer and aides. We use the services of the New Hampshire Department on Alchoholism, the Lakes Region Mental Health Clinic and other groups. We have received accreditation from the Federal Department of Prisons.

Our Infirmary and Hospital are well run at a cost which compares favorably with other County Institutions and the standards are above those required in State institutions. We appreciate the dedicated services of Superintendent and Matron, Mr. and Mrs. Perley Beach, Deputy Jailer Robert Gilbert and their aides. We sincerely thank them for a job well done.

Mrs. Frances Swain continues to direct Welfare and the County Surplus Food program which the State considers a model.

We have raised the rate in Foster Homes \$10.00 per month to meet higher costs.

Our able office assistant, Mrs. Marie Jordan, left us in August for a better position and we consider ourselves fortunate to secure the services of Mr. James Pringle.

Our faithful Custodian of many years, Mr. George Copp, retired in August, too, and Mr. Edwin Harvey is efficiently carrying on those duties.

As usual we thank all the organizations and persons who have contributed to the comfort of our charges. We have continued to enjoy the pleasant associations and cooperation of all County Departments as well as City and Town officials.

The Delegation Executive Committee has checked our Budget throughout the year and the members of the Advisory Committees have been helpful. We thank them all.

Visitors are welcome at the Court House from 9:00 to 4:00 five days a week, and at the County Home up to 8:00 p.m.

#### SHERIFF'S REPORT

### To The Honorable Board of Commissioners of Belknap County:

Upon completion of my fourteenth year as Sheriff of Belknap County, I submit my report for the year 1968.

The following activities were investigated by the Sheriff's Department in the year 1968: two Suicides, five Untimely Deaths, seventeen charges of Assault, one hundred and twenty-seven charges of Burglary, fifty-five charges of Larceny, seventeen charges of Malicious Damage, nine Narcotics investigations, seven charges of Robbery, four Arson investigations, one hundred and thirty-eight complaints investigated, three AWOL subjects apprehended and held for the Military, five charges of Auto Theft, twenty-eight persons transported to New Hampshire State Prison and/or New Hampshire State Hospital, three runaways returned, five escapees returned, attended five fire alarms, nine Motor Vehicle accidents investigated, eleven Motor Vehicle arrests or summons served, approximately fifty Capiases were served and were involved in one hundred and forty assists to other departments.

Approximately ten thousand dollars worth of stolen property was recovered by this Department and fifty-one thousand miles were logged by our cruisers with reference to our investigations.

My sincere appreciation to Willard G. Martin, County Attorney, and to all law enforcement officers for their continued assistance and cooperation.

## REPORT OF CHAPLAINS Report of the Protestant Chaplain

To the Commissioners of Belknap County:

I am happy to present my report for 1968.

Sunday Worship. Religious services have been held weekly on Sunday afternoons. These have been open to all who wished to attend. It has seemed best to have these cared for by other than the Chaplain; ministers, some lay leaders, and sometimes groups participated. This has been a very satisfactory arrangement, giving opportunity for volunteers who wish to perform such service.

There is considerable interest by the public, who provide some activities for the happiness and well-being of these at

the Home (and Hospital, inclusive.)

The Chaplain's own service is carried on mainly through visitation. He regularly goes to the Home on two afternoons each week. He tries to cover the entire field with a personal call each week. The ministry is a spiritual ministry, an effort to serve the spiritual needs of the "parish." The care given at the Home is the physical mainly, but of very fine and complete character. Other needs of patients — the aged and infirm, the sick and troubled may have need of comfort and cheer. There may be discouragement and depression of spirit, the weariness and weakness of prolonged illness or infirmity. The person may be afraid, worried, and lonely for his own. Religious faith might be dwindling. The Chaplain can help much, though not of himself only. In his faith he has great resources to apply. The Great Physician can be reached, and the Chaplain in his call can direct attention to Him. The Chaplain may be able to help a soul that has a thirst for God. "O that I knew where I might find Him." Job 23:3. God is near, but the vision of him may be obscured.

The Chaplain visits, converses with persons, presents at times a message from the Scriptures, offers a prayer. It seems very simple but this, in brief, is what he is seeking to do, seeking to help spiritual needs through visitation, a person to person contact. There has been some, though not large, contact with the Jail, House of Correction, and hospitalized

beyond the Belknap County Home & Hospital.

Thank you, Staff and workers, Superintendent, Commissioners, for giving the opportunity for this work, and a sympathetic cooperation.

#### REPORT OF BELKNAP COUNTY PHYSICIAN

To the Commissioners of Belknap County:

The allocation of the north wing of the County Infirmary by you and your Superintendent as "Intensive Nursing Care Unit" has done much to improve the nursing for patients on that wing. Most of the patients in this area are either bed patients or those more or less confined to their rooms, hence require considerable nursing care.

About the same time an Advisory Committee of Doctors was formed to consult with and advise the Superintendent and Nursing Service in regard to medical policies within the

institution. This committee consists of:

Dr. Charles Wilder Dr. Harry Trapp Dr. John Eckels

The above committee of physicians is augmented by the Chief Nurse, Mrs. Marilyn Lamere and by our Pharmacy Consultant, Mr. John O. Richards. This committee meets on the first Tuesday of each month in the office of the

Superintendent.

A transportable emergency kit of drugs and equipment has been developed in order that the emergency medical treatment of a patient may be carried out efficiently. In addition the Home is equipped with a modern oxygen tent which has been used on numerous occasions. We also keep on hand a modest supply of standard intravenous and subcutaneous fluids which may be given if a patient cannot take fluids by mouth.

In a previous report I mentioned that because of good nursing care, we rarely have a bed patient who develops a pressure sore on his back or hip. To aid in this prevention the Home has a couple of air mattresses and a couple of lambskin pads, which add greatly to the comfort of the

patients confined to bed.

Jail and House of Correction

There have been no serious accidents or illnesses among the inmates during the past year. I have made 42 visits to the jail to see members of this group during the year and, on numerous occasions, have been in telephone consultations with the staff regarding the inmates.

In closing, I wish to compliment Mrs. Lamere for her well organized Nursing Service which has given excellent nursing care to the patients during this year and to Mr. Beach go my compliments for always holding the welfare

of the patients first and foremost in mind.

# REPORT OF BELKNAP COUNTY COOPERATIVE EXTENSION SERVICE

1968

To the Commissioners of Belknap County:

#### Agriculture

Agent Horace Ballard is on Sabbatic leave from the Cooperative Extension Service from October 1, 1968 to September 30, 1969, doing Extension-type work in Ghana, Africa. During this time, his work is being handled by Area Agents, State Specialists and Agricultural Agents in adjacent counties. A summary of his work completed from January 1 - September 30, 1968 shows:

125 studies of problems and opportunities

355 consultations to aid individuals and families 151 consultations to aid organizations and agencies

80 meetings held

20 news stories submitted to newspapers

763 publications distributed 3,004 pieces of mail distributed

A brief narrative of some of this work follows:

Important resource development work was done in New Hampton where six homes and an industrial plant lacked water supplies. A preliminary survey to more clearly define the nature and severity of the problem was completed. A special study and report for the Belknap Mt. Recreation Area was also completed.

Due to increased interest in grape growing, a feasibility study was made, grape strategy work involving the Commissioner of Agriculture was conducted, a Conference with University Specialists was held, and meetings and tours to trial vineyards were scheduled. The organizing of the N. H. Association of Grape Growers resulted fom this work.

Information in Insects and Pesticides Law, Pesticide Safety, Migratory labor, and grass control was provided at the Annual blueberry growers meeting. Imitation and filled milk and their effect on milk incomes were discussed at an area Dairy meeting. A Milk Marketing Workshop series was held. Individual dairymen were assisted with problems in food rot, severe mastitus, and pigeon control in free stall barns.

Other work included: special tours for vegetable growers, small fruit growers, N. H. Bankers and dairymen; illustrated talks to several groups on "Farmers contribution to America's Prosperity"; a Pesticide Dealers School; and hosting the Central N. H. Poultry Meeting. The agent also cooperated with the Belknap Committee on Beautification, the Soil Conservation Service, the Agricultural Stabilization and Control Committee, the Farmers Home Administration, the 4-H Youth Program, and the Governor's Conference on Natural Resources.

#### Home Economics

Responsibilities of the family are greater than ever in this increasingly complex world. The kind of environment must be provided in the home and community that is conducive to the maximum development of children and young people, and to the adjustment of adults to society.

In answer to these changing needs, home economics extension education has conducted meetings and/or workshops to help homemakers:

- increase knowledge in areas of nutrition, food purchasing and preparation.
- gain insight into family life in Switzerland.
- increase knowledge of drugs and their abuses.
- as prospective home buyer or builder, be knowledgeable about site, soil, drainage and finishing of interior concrete walls.
- to apply art principles in relation to clothing and become more aware of good grooming practices.
- to learn how to make minor repairs to furniture finishes.
- understand principles of design as applied when combining old and new furnishings.

- acquire decision making knowledge in family financing.
- learn specific construction skills for making clothing from basic beginners through more advanced sewing.
- as prospective parents, understand physical and mental changes to themselves and their family life.
- develop potential leadership abilities.

From the above plus educational bulletins, individual help, newsletters, newspaper columns and radio, Extension fulfills an important function.

Through special monthly meetings, surplus foods cooking classes, special newsletters, home visits and cooperation with Welfare Agencies, our work with disadvantaged families has slowly increased. However, it is slow and discouraging.

#### 4-H Youth Development

"Learn by Doing" is the motto of more than 500 boys and girls from 8 - 18 who live in every town and city in Belknap County. They are learning citizenship, leadership, and developing skills through 4-H - the largest co-educational youth organization in the country. Your County 4-H Youth Development Agent is charged with the administration and coordination of this 4-H program.

1968 saw a continuing trend toward fewer farm 4-H members - 120; and a larger percent from rural non-farm homes - 287; 107 members lived in urban aeas.

4-H workers have always felt that the program should be flexible and adapt to the needs of youth in a changing society. Many 4-H projects have been developed which are related to Agriculture and Home Economics and these become more popular each year. This year 384 members enrolled in these related projects: Crafts-271, Citizenship-87, Horsemanship-53, Safety-45, Dog training-42; 245 took part in Home Economics projects like Foods-151, Clothing-117, and Child Care-49; and 118 signed up for Agricultural projects including Gardening-74, small livestock-29, Dairy-25, and Poultry-15 members. Many 4-H'ers also took part in special activities as follows: Fairs-340, Camp-81, Demonstrations-75, Dress Revue-49, and Judging-19 members.

One of the greatest strengths of the program is local

volunteer leadership. The following 4-H leaders received special recognition for service completed: Ten years - Mr. George Mohle of Belmont and Mrs. Carl Richardson of Gilford; twenty years - Mrs. Olin Joslyn of Sanbornton.

#### Forestry

Woodlands are more expensive than ever before. Even before land prices started a sharp upward trend the costs involved in woodland management were beyond the means of small operators and farm owners. In recognition of the need for improved forests and the lack of money to get improvement work done, the Cooperative Extension Service came into being. This service provides free technical assistance and the Agricultural Conservation Program assists in funding work suggested by the County Forester, the Cooperative Extension Service representative. These two basic services are available to any woodland owner in Belknap County.

It would seem that a special irony exists in connection with the Cooperative Extension Service. The primary reason for starting the program is being accomplished, because much of the standing timber on over 200,000 acres of woodland within the county has received treatment, but the rising land costs, inflation, and decreasing number of woods workers are some factors that have reduced wood uses and output. Tree planting, improvement work and time keep adding to the stock of our renewable wood resource while less is being ulitized. Wood and wood products can be brought into the county cheaper than they can be produced here and this gap is ever widening. Large woodland ownerships and big wood producing companies are able to cut costs and effectively increase production while small concerns within the county find the profit squeeze getting tighter as they try to compete. The special irony suggested is that while we have improved the standing timber we should be at a disadvantage with a surplus of wood because wood use and output has decreased. Instead the efforts and money expended are showing greater dividends than ever expected and for reasons not foreseen at the time the program started. Belknap County with its lakes, hills, and mountains is a mecca centrally located for recreation and suburban living that currently is being extensively sought by more and more people. Wooded hills and scenic vistas are mod. The change in land use is providing a bonanza to the county economy, even though failure of orginal intent. Is that not some kind of irony?

A specific example of unexpected benefit can be shown by examining one of the practices carried out under the A.C.P. plans: the forest access road. It is a means of forest protection in time of fire or other disaster. And what has happened? In addition to providing the designed service it also serves winter and summer recreation. In winter, it provides skiing, snowshoeing, tobogganing, and snowmobiling. In summer, such uses as nature trails, hiking trails, bridal paths, and game management openings are common. New landowners who have little experience in woodland management, but who are intensely aware that improvement is progress, and who do not quibble over markets for a wood product have found new ways to use the Extension Service. Other landowners are catching on quickly, too, You all are welcome (within the limits of time and funds available). Just call me at Laconia 524-1737. Here are some statistics from the past year:

#### REPORT OF THE BELKNAP AREA COMMISSION

February 12, 1969

It has been nine years since the formation of the Belknap County Recreational Area Commission, so the Commissioners felt that a short summary of the accomplishments and the expansion would be in order, this being the first time its activities have appeared in the County Annual Report.

In September, 1959, when the Commission came into existence, the "Area," as we all know it, consisted of land with the right of access to Rte. 11-A which started just Northwest of Fletcher Hale slope, along the top of Mt. Rowe with a single chair lift - which is, incidentally, the second oldest chair lift in the United States - then along the ridge to the top of Tiger, down Stone Bar to what is now the top of Phelps and Smith. From there, the line ran up to the end of the new parking space and then parallel to the winter entrance road out to Rte. 11-A again. This gave a large area for camping and summer activities but a relatively small area for skiing.

Our first task was to improve the existing facilities and then to provide for further expansion. To the accomplishment of the former, we, in 1960, revamped and improved the single chair lift and that summer and fall put in the first new T-bar on Smith and Phelps and cut trees, bulldozed and grassed so that we then had two excellent, wide, open, novice slopes. To the accomplishment of the latter, we were finally able to track down the owner of the abutting line which included the peak of Gunstock Mountain, an area of approximately 300 acres, and this was obtained for \$2,500. Besides more than doubling our potential ski area, this land increased the vertical elevation from 700 to 1400 feet.

Having acquired this new land, the Area was in a position for a major expansion and bring Gunstock (the name was changed because of the new mountain) to its rightful position as a big ski area. With the excellent cooperation of the Belknap County Delegation, we were able to float a bond issue of \$325,000. which enabled us to cut, clear, bulldoze

and grass four trails from the top of Gunstock and install a mile and a quarter double chair lift, all of which were opened in 1962. In 1964, another bond issue, this time of \$240,000., allowed us to widen the new lift line to accommodate a second mile and a quarter double chair lift; two new trails were made from the top of the mountain and a bypass of one of the lower trails. In addition, an L-shaped 25 meter x 25 yards swimming pool with bath houses was built, again with the help and cooperation of the County Delegation. Finally, in 1966, the old "Tiger T-bar" was replaced with one similar to our original Dopplemayr on Smith and Phelps but twice as long as it.

To keep the trails and slopes in good condition requires special equipment. We have bought four snowcats which cost \$12,000 a piece when new and a vehicle called a Thiokol at a similar price. For the summer and fall programs, the swimming pool was installed, over 200 picnic tables have been purchased, new campgrounds, new fireplaces, new hiking trails - the blueberries on the top of Gunstock are plentiful and delicious - and new play areas have been built.

During the past summer and fall, work was started on a sewage disposal system which has been remodeled and the capacity doubled. This project which will be finished next spring will cost approximately \$125,000, 40% of which is being paid for by the United States Government, 40% by the State of New Hampshire and the remaining 20% out of the current income of the Area.

All of the acquisitions, construction and expansion have been done for the owners of the Area; namely, the residents and taxpayers of Belknap County at no cost to the County taxpayer. The payments have been derived wholly from income received from the facilities of the Area; in other words, the Area is completely self-supporting; and, incidentally, over 2,000 people this year have taken advantage of the season passes which are \$45 for adults and \$35 for children as the best ski bargain in the United States.

For the future, there are great plans afoot. Approximately two years ago, one of the commissioners learned that we were eligible under certain conditions for matching funds for capital improvements under the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation. This requires a long range planning program and this has been accomplished and is documented if anyone is interested in seeing the plans. Snow making, remodeling the base building, a new garage, landscaping, a T-bar to

replace the Phelps rope tow( which should be ready next fall), new trails (skiing and hiking) new camping facilities and the possibility of a new double chair to the upper Gunsmoke-Recoil area - these and many more are for the future.

Gunstock belongs to the residents and taxpayers of Belknap County. We hope you will use and enjoy it to your and its full extent.
