Article:

1. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to appoint all necessary Town Officers not elected by ballot.
2. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget made up by the Budget Committee and to raise money for the same. If not, to see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to defray town charges for the ensuing year as follows:

3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to withdraw Ten Thousand Six Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$10,650.00) in the Capital Reserve Fund for Sewer Construction or Reconstruction and apply same against the sum to be appropriated under this Article.
4. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of construction or reconstruction of the Town Hall and to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) to be placed in this fund. (Marjority Vote Required)
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four thousand dollars (\$4,000.00) to be added to the Town Hall Capital Reserve Fund previously established. (Marjority Vote Required)
6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to spend four thousand five hundred dollars (\$4,500.00) to dismantle and remove former Marchand Building from existing premises and to fill in and grade in cellar hole.
7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to spend one thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) to have the former Marchand Land Surveyed.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) for folding chairs and tables for the Town Hall. These are to be used by residents of Stewartstown for the purpose of renting the Town Hall for reunions, anniversaries, fund raising dances, etc.
9. To see if the Town will vote to direct the selectmen to suspend and cancel the perpetual leases of camp lots at Diamond Pond and replace same with forms of lease as are now used for leased lots.
10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate one thousand eight hundred seventy two dollars (\$1,872.00) to develop a Solid Waste District Management Plan as required by NH RSA 149-M. Specifically, the appropriation will be used to coordinate monthly meetings of the seven communities, to document the status of existing disposal facilities, to assess future disposal options and to prepare an implementation plan for a 15 year disposal solution. The Upper Connecticut River Valley Solid Waste District recommends this appropriation.
11. To see if the Town will vote to rescind the vote heretofore made which adopted the provisions of the Municipal Budget Law. (An affirmative vote on this Article would abolish the Budget Committee). Voting on this Article must be by written ballot with a majority vote of those present and voting being required for adoption.
12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell a parcel of land situated directly behind the old Fabie Parker lot, to the Independent Baptist Church of W. Stewartstown, at a fair market value. Said lot would be approximately 50ft. by 70ft., containing 3500 sq. ft. plus or minus.
13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize for, accept and expend such Federal, State or other governmental unit or private source of funding which becomes available during the year in accordance with RSA 31:95B.
14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to incur debts for temporary loans in anticipation of taxes of the municipal year and pay out of the tax monies when received.
15. To transact any other business that may legally be brought before this meeting.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Between July 1987 and June 1988, we experienced more fires than normal. The three leading causes of forest fires were again children, fires kindled without written permission of a Forest Fire Warden and debris burning. All causes are preventable, but only with your help.

Please help our town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. Contact your Forest Fire Warden for more information.

Enforcement of a state timber harvest regulation is the responsibility of State Forestry officials. Our state has excellent timber harvest regulations; however, your assistance is needed.

If you know of a logging operation and suspect a state timber harvest law may be violated, call your Forest Fire Warden, Concord Forest Protection Headquarters at (603) 271-2217, or local Forest Ranger.

On January 1, 1989, the Deceptive Forestry Business Practices Law (RSA 224:54) goes into effect. This law, in summary, states that a person is guilty of a misdemeanor if, in the course of buying or selling a forest product, uses a false weight or measure for falsely determining any quality or quantity of a forest product. For more information, contact one of the persons mentioned above.

NORTH COUNTRY COUNCIL

ANNUAL REPORT

North Country Council observed its sixteenth year of successful operation in 1988. The Council, chartered under NH RSA 36:45, provides non-profit local and regional planning assistance to member municipalities. The Board of Directors determined that last year's work program would focus on community planning, economic development, solid waste, transportation and housing. The Council maintains four standing committees which monitor local issues and determine Council policy. Overall, the Council's major objective is to work with North Country towns in solving local and regional problems.

In **STEWARTSTOWN**, the Council assisted the newly formed Planning Board in developing Subdivision Regulations. In addition, **Stewartstown** worked with NCC as part of the Upper Connecticut River Valley Solid Waste District and participated in the Council's tax-billing program. The Stewartstown Housing Improvement Program rehabilitated twenty-nine dwelling units since its inception in the Fall of 1987. Since 42 new applications to the program have been received, it is anticipated that the Town will be able to work on the 32 units scheduled in the new program design.

Community planning assistance continues to dominate our staff resources. New state mandates and rapid residential and commercial growth throughout the region placed an increasing burden on local planning and zoning boards in 1988. Regional workshops, technical bulletins and newsletters, ordinance review and update, as well as review of specific subdivision and site plan applications are a sampling of the myriad services performed this year for our membership. The Council also co-sponsored the popular Municipal Law Lecture Series which reviewed new case law and other specific areas of legal interest to local officials.

In addition, grant writing and grant administration continue as important components of the Council's work program. Currently, NCC staff members are working in twelve towns administering fifteen Community Development Block Grant programs. These projects include feasibility studies for local infrastructure needs, water and sewer construction projects and targeted housing rehabilitation programs for income eligible residents.

In summary, it is important to understand that the North Country Council is organized and administered for the benefit of its constituents, local town governments. Our future success is, in large part, contingent upon your participation in Council activities. We rely on and appreciate involvement of town officials and residents and look forward to assisting your town this coming year.

Landon Placey made the motion that the reports of the officers, agents, auditors and committees of the Stewartstown School District, as set forth in the annual report of the district, be accepted and placed on file. Deborah Lynch seconded. Perley Davis explained what the reports were and on which pages they could be found to answer Jesse Carney's question. The motion carried in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 3. Larry Ladd moved that the school board be authorized to include in the S A U #7 budget the position of Coordinator of Special Services and Secretary, per RSA 189:47-A; to be effective July 1, 1989. Norma Burns seconded.

Mr. Allen explained why this warrant article and Article 4 were included.

Vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 4. Iola Boire moved that the school board be authorized to include in the S A U #7 budget the position of school psychologist, per RSA 189:47-A; to be effective July 1, 1989. Motion was seconded by Barry Grover and carried in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 5. Landon Placey moved that the school district raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000 (twenty five thousand dollars) to purchase a new school bus and to authorize the withdrawal of \$16,000 (sixteen thousand dollars) from the capital reserve fund created for that purpose. The balance of \$9,000 (nine thousand dollars) to be raised by taxes; and to designate the school board as agent to expend. Larry Ladd seconded.

Questions raised by Jesse Carney, Phillip Caron and Hazen Burns were answered by Iola Boire and Landon Placey.

Vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 6. Larry Ladd moved that the district vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 198:20-b to authorize the school board to apply for, accept, and expend, without further action by the school district meeting, money from any source which becomes available during the fiscal year; provided further that:

- I. Such money shall be used for legal purposes for which a school district may appropriate money,
- II. The school board shall be required to hold a prior public meeting on any action to be taken regarding expenditures of such money,
- III. Such action shall not require the expenditure of other school district funds, and shall
- IV. Be exempt from all provisions of RSA 32 relative to limitation expenditure of school district moneys.

Iola Boire seconded. Perley Davis explained that this article had to be in the warrant for the board to be able to spend any of the excess Sweepstakes money from the State of New Hampshire.

Vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 7. Iola Boire made the motion to authorize the school board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the district, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and/or the United States. Larry Ladd seconded the motion and it carried in the affirmative without discussion.

ARTICLE 8. Landon Placey moved that the district raise and appropriate the sum of \$665,315.00 which includes Article 5 for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district and authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be raised from state equalization and building aid funds, together with other income, the balance to be raised by taxation. Iola Boire seconded.

Mr. Davis reviewed the budget and explained the large increases for this year. Vote was in the affirmative.

Motion made by Barry Grover and seconded by Phillip Caron at 8:30 pm to adjourn the meeting. Vote was in the affirmative.

Locks installed on classroom doors at the West Side School. Problems have arisen in the past years over security in the classrooms.

5. **Carpets in Library & Stairwells** \$ 616.00
Carpet on stairwells and library floor at West Side School. This was changed because of odor and condition.

6. **Tuition** **\$ 2,180.00**
State pupil average high school rate under estimated in March by \$62.00 per pupil.

7. **Bus Repair** **\$ 1,500.00**
Unanticipated repair to the two school buses to bring them up to State standards to pass state inspection.

This will allow \$33,288.63 of the foundation aid to reduce taxes.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

During the past year a community survey was completed to give the school board an idea of how citizens feel pertaining to the necessity for upgrading the schools. From those who responded, it appears that a new school combining both sides of the District is favored. This will continue to be explored if the voters choose to hire an architect.

Though building improvement is a necessity, progress has been made in improving educational programs.

In the budget building process, teachers at the West Side School and Hollow School have worked together to ensure that programs are similar at both schools. An entire new mathematics program has been established for both schools. Curriculum development continues to be a priority for school staff.

Board members, teachers, and administrators working together have documented policies and operating procedures so the schools are functioning better and students know what the expectations are.

We are fortunate to have a teaching staff that works very well in multi-graded classes. Also, we had no teacher turn-over as we opened the 1988-89 school year.

The Pittsburg School District created an art teacher position and the Stewartstown School Board agreed to purchase one day of service weekly, so students in both schools receive a half-day of art weekly from a certified art teacher.

School district transportation has been significantly improved with the purchase of a new 66 passenger bus, thereby reducing expensive repair costs.

The school board, school personnel, and citizens of the community must work together to establish the future direction of public education in Stewartstown and improve school facilities.

It seems that new issues are always on the horizon in the education domain. Three come to mind that the State Board of Education and the Department of Education want us to address: AIDS prevention education, character/values education, and drop-out prevention programs.

We are well aware that funding is limited, not only for education, but also for the necessary community projects such as sewer, landfill, road maintenance, etc..... . As a new session of the legislature begins, it is important to stay informed and be sure that our legislators are acting in our interests in assuring that mandated programs and projects are fully funded. I believe most of us can and should do a better job in communicating with our area legislators.

COORDINATOR OF SPECIAL SERVICES

During the 1987-88 school year, there were approximately 100 students within the S A U #7 needing Special Education Services. These services have been offered through regular and special education classrooms except in a few cases where the severity of the handicap or an order of the court has necessitated out-of-district placement.

The overall quality of services in the seven special educational settings has been good and, in some instances, exceptional. In particular, Ms. Norma Chenevert, the previous Coordinator of Special Services, has become Head Teacher as well as Resource Room Teacher at the West Side School in Stewartstown. Her dedication and knowledge of the field of special education have made a profound difference on the students in that school.

We have been fortunate in being able to provide quality services in the related areas of Speech/Language, Occupational Therapy & School Psychology through contracts with local professionals. Physical Therapy, Vision and Diagnostic Services have also been provided through various local and regional agencies.

We have continued to see the benefit of providing services for preschool handicapped children. Early identification and intervention appear to be ameliorating problems in many of these children prior to entering first grade.

Tutorial programs for vocationally disadvantaged students provided benefits for high school students in Pittsburg and Colebrook.

Two staff members continue to pursue Special Education Certification through the Pool Expansion Program (PEP). This program is administered by the State Department of Education to attract teaching professionals into the field of Special Education.

There has been an emphasis to coordinate curriculum and student objectives among the various Special Education classrooms in the S A U.

Parents, teachers, school boards, and administrators continue to provide the support necessary to enable our programs to be responsive to student needs.

SCHOOL HEALTH REPORT

Prevention, through education and various services, is the prime objective of the Health Services Program in school. Our goal is to allow children to develop an understanding of the importance of protecting their health and to obtain knowledge of the ways in which it can be maintained.

We continue to make use of all the service agencies, both local and state, that we have had access to in the past. Our usual screening procedures (ie, vision, hearing, etc....) were also conducted on every student.

Two new state laws have been recently passed that affect the school. The first law, condensed from RSA 193, 141, and 200, has made the following changes in our immunization program: "All parents or legal guardians shall have their children who are residing in this state immunized against certain diseases. These diseases shall include, but not be limited to, diphtheria, mumps, pertussis, poliomyelitis, rubella, rubeola, and tetanus." Measles (rubeola), rubella, and mumps must have all been received after one year of age. If the child has already had one of the above diseases, doctor documented proof or a titre must be on file at the school. All children in the preschool program must have an up-to-date immunization record. This law was passed in January, 1988, and went into effect in September, 1988.

The second law was passed in July, 1988, and deals with the health education program. It is listed under RSA 21, 186, and 189. This law sets minimum standards for N H Public Elementary Schools in regard to health education. All schools are in the process of expanding their health curriculum. A grant was written last year to purchase the "Here's Looking At You, 2000" drug and alcohol education program for grades K-4 for use in all the S A U #7 schools. Education is the key to prevention.

To enrich our drug and alcohol education program, we were fortunate to have a presentation from Sgt. Lowe, a police detective with expertise in drug enforcement. We also had a presentation from the N H Safety Council on Seat Belts. Dr. Gifford came in to assist us with our AIDS education program. We would like to thank him for his assistance and concern in this area.

Dr. Goodman presented a workshop dealing with Pediatric Updates. The school nurse attended the series. We would like to thank him for his assistance with our school health program during his tenure as our school physician.

Please feel free to contact your school nurse in regard to any health matter that concerns you.

CHAPTER I

Chapter I is a federally funded program which provides special help for school children who have been identified as needing individualized assistance to bring their skills up to standardized levels. Students are selected to participate by tests results, teacher referral and/or parental request.

In the past, this program was completely federally funded, but during the last couple of years, the Stewartstown School District has contributed local funds to keep the very worthwhile program operating.

Betty Raymond continued as Chapter I teacher servicing all three schools in Stewartstown. Two students from the Hollow, eight from St. Albert, and nine from West Side School participated in the program. Time is limited to one hour per week per child because Mrs. Raymond works only three days a week.

This year, Pittsburg contributed to our program by having a trailer placed at St. Albert School so the students (Stewartstown * Clarksville * Pittsburg) who attend that school and are in need of services can be served near the school. Federal law doesn't permit Chapter I staff to teach in a parochial school. Now the children can be served very close to the school building, therefore, making travel time less as well as much safer.

The students in Grades 2 - 6 are served only in reading in the Stewartstown project. Due to the individualized assistance which Mrs. Raymond is able to give them, the students make more strides in their reading ability. Each year we are able to discharge students who have brought their reading level up to standard and make room in the program to help other children. The earlier we can help a child, the quicker he/she can bring their reading up to level. All studies are easier if the student can read well.

We wish to thank everyone who has helped to make our program a success. Without the additional support of the Administration, Staff, School Board, and Taxpayers, we would not be able to have a Chapter I program as we do now.
