THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Tamworth in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Tamworth on Tuesday, the eleventh of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing, and a Selectman for three years.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.

3. To see if the town will vote to accept State aid for highways.

4. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,149.00, as required under Chapter 154, Laws of New Hampshire, for construction of the Tamworth, Whittier road, so-called.

5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repairing highways and breaking snow for the ensuing year.

6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repairing and building bridges.

7. To see if the town will vote to accept State aid for bridges.

8. To see if the town will vote to raise \$4,000 for maintenance of trunk lines.

9. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$3,250 for construction of Millbrook bridge (estimated amount required by State from town.)

10. To see if the town will vote to relocate the road at the foot of Cleveland Hill, to eliminate the dangerous curve which now exists.

11. To see if the town will vote to discontinue a short piece of road and accept a piece built by Mrs. Charles Peabody in the Philbrick neighborhood, so-called.

12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Memorial Day observance.

13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise in addition to the amount required by law for support of the town library.

14. To see if the town will vote to observe Old Home Day, and appropriate money for same.

15. To see if the town will vote to purchase a tractor and appropriate money for same.

16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise, the same to be expended in work for preventing the spread of white pine blister rust.

17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for purchase of curtains and necessary repairs for the stage at Town Hall.

18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the Tamworth park.

19. To bring in your votes for the election of Delegates-at-large, Alternate Delegates-at-large, Alter-

nate District Delegates to the National Conventions of the Democratic and Republican parties, to be held for the purpose of nominating party candidates for President and Vice-President of the United States.

20. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

21. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Superintendent's Report

To the Citizens of Tamworth :

I, herewith, submit my first annual written report as superintendent of schools in Tamworth. It is in line with other progressive towns to have a printed report at the time of the annual school meeting and I hope the plan will be continued.

Our school record for the last year, ending June 30, 1923, showed an average attendance of 111 pupils, an average membership of 123 and a percent of 90. The total enrollment was 143—70 boys and 73 girls.

Too large a proportion of our pupils failed of promotion. This is largely due to irregular attendance and the fact that some pupils enter at too young an age. It is the superintendent's opinion that pupils generally should not enter till they are six years of age. After entering they should attend regularly and punctually. Irregularity of attendance retards those who stay out and hinders those who are present.

There are ten teachers in the employ of the district:—

Pearl N. Bascon at Pequaket has five pupils.

Lula M. Ball at Chocorua has nineteen pupils.

Grace E. Shannon at Downs has eleven pupils.

Lillian Davis at Whittier has ten pupils.

Hazel M. MacKenzie at South Tamworth has nineteen pupils.

Abbie M. Pease at Bennett's Corner has nine pupils.

Harold B. Trask at Great Hill has twenty pupils.

Winifred Alexander at Wonalancet has one pupil.

Hazle H. Evans at Tamworth Elementary has twenty-four pupils.

Royal S. Weymouth at Tamworth Grammar and High has sixteen pupils.

SCHOOL SPIRIT

Teachers and pupils are worthy of special commendation for the manner in which they have helped to improve the schools.

South Tamworth has \$20 on hand for playground equipment and nearly enough for a clock.

Whittier raised money and bought lamps, library books and a picture.

Great Hill earned and received gifts to the amount of about \$65 for books, pictures and school improvements.

Pequaket bought screens for the windows and lumber for a sandtable.

Chocorua, with help from the Ladies' Aid, bought a victrola and some records. Through the kindness of citizens and friends a fund is already started to buy new seats and desks.

Tamworth Village bought a victrola, a fine large flag and a picture.

Downs constructed a sandtable.

Several schools have set out bulbs and lilacs bushes for flowering in the spring. One is definitely planning to have the name painted and put up over the door.

Provision should be made for playground space at Whittier and Bennett's Corner.

HIGH SCHOOL

The high school started very auspiciously. The head-

master has worked hard in a difficult position. We now hold state approval. The superintendent hopes provision may be made for extending the high school work another year. Parents should provide a way whereby pupils can attend and secure the benefits in the home town. Some of the students have been very faithful, one girl walking daily all the way from Chocorua. There will be a class of about ten who should enter next fall. One at Pequaket, two at Chocorua, one at Downs, four at Tamworth Village, one at Great Hill and three at South Tamworth are doing eighth grade work.

MEDICAL INSPECTION

The results of medical inspection, as shown by the report of Dr. Remick, are encouraging. Improvements have been secured for many cases. Other needy cases should be treated. It is to be regretted that some of the pupils are allowed to suffer from physical defects which might be corrected. We owe it to the children to give them strong, healthy bodies.

TEACHERS

Six of our teachers either attended summer school or are recent graduates of Plymouth Normal. This shows a fine spirit of progress on the part of the teaching force. In 1918, teachers in the rural schools of New Hampshire having education, training and experience were 1 to 5 as compared with those in city schools. Now the ratio is 1 to 2. In 1918, the days in the rural school were 70 to the city's 100. Now the days are 95 to 100. The rural pupil is having nearly the same opportunities for schooling as the city pupil.

COMPARATIVE TESTS

During the past year tests have been given to New Hampshire eighth grades which were given in Springfield, Mass., in 1846. The arithmetic was given in exact form. The spelling words were replaced with words of equal difficulty found in our lists of today. In Springfield in 1846 pupils to whom they were given averaged 15 years and six months. In New Hampshire, the pupils averaged 13 years and six months.

Results were as follows:

Arithmetic in Springfield averaged 29.41%.

Arithmetic in New Hampshire averaged 49.26%.

Spelling in Springfield averaged 40.65%.

Spelling in New Hampshire averaged 67.24%.

It would seem that schools today do teach more effectively than the best schools in 1846.

REPAIRS

Fine work has been done the past summer in improving school property.

At Great Hill a new toilet was built and the schoolhouse painted inside and out. A generous neighbor donated a playground and other friends have partially graded it. It is hoped the school district will appropriate a sum of money to complete the work. Downs schoolhouse was painted outside. The Village building was painted outside and a cement step placed in front. Twelve new adjustable chairs and desks were bought for the schoolroom. South Tamworth schoolhouse was covered with steel roofing and new chemical toilets installed, making a sanitary and much needed improvement. At Bennett's Corner a new toilet was

built and the building painted. Special attention should be given next year to the Village building. A proper heating plant and sanitary toilets should be installed. The large number of pupils here makes this action very urgent.

The following pupils had perfect attendance for the year ending June 30, 1923: Walter Wadleigh, Whittier; Carroll Fortier, Chocorua; David Fortier, Chocorua; Geraldine Long, Chocorua.

In conclusion, I wish to thank school board, citizens, teachers and pupils for kindly cooperation. Let us boost the schools.
