



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**SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT**

To the School Board and Citizens of Warren:

It is with pleasure that I submit the following report.

All of the six teachers now employed in this district attended the Plymouth Summer School the past summer and I feel that much was gained in this way. Two of the teachers are new to this district but both are teachers of experience and are doing good work in their schools. I feel that the teaching as a whole is better than it has been during the previous years that I have been connected with the schools of this district.

During the past few years considerable in the way of new equipment, up-to-date supplies and text books have been purchased. These with standardized tests and exercises enable the teachers to do more efficient work and assist us in the proper grading and promotion of pupils.

The attendance for the past year averaged 90% of the membership, which was 5% better than for the previous year. This year the attendance as a whole has been good, though there has been considerable sickness during the past few weeks, and I am confident that the average for the year will be better than for last year.

The school buildings as a whole are in good condition. The worst condition is at the village; the toilets being very unsatisfactory for so large a number of pupils. There is practically no playground at Ore Hill or Glencliff except the public highway. At East Warren there is a chance for a playground but it needs grading.

Improvement of schools can not be brought about by a revolution or too radical changes, but by striving each successive year for better teaching, better attendance, better buildings, and higher standards of scholarship. *Good Schools are Everybody's Business.* I wish more parents would visit the schools. I assure you the teachers will welcome you and be glad to discuss your children's work with you.
