


The trustees of the Public Library, in presenting this their sixth annual report to the town, feel that they need not call the attention of the voters to the value of the library as a means of education; the fact is too self evident to require proof. The average number of books withdrawn each library day is somewhat over seventy. This makes a total during the year of over seven thousand books. As a fair proportion of these are books upon especial subjects, the result is distinctly educational. We have, during the year, purchased books to the extent of \$307.66. Of this sum \$6.30 were expended for historical works; that amount, therefore, was refunded from the sum appropriated for historical purposes. As soon as the new books are catalogued they will be placed upon the shelves and be ready for the public. During the year a fine crayon portrait of Mr. Willard Hammond, a former member of the board of trustees, has been presented to the library.

TO THE SELECTMEN.—The Board of Health would most respectfully report that the sanitary condition of the town has been good during the year. There has been a manifest disposition on the part of all our citizens to promptly respond to all our suggestions, and to carry out all our orders with as little delay as possible. An epidemic of measles, wide spread, but mild in character, has prevailed during the months of Dec. '97, Jan. and Feb. '98. No deaths have occurred as a result.

We feel that a move was made in the right direction towards improving the sanitary condition of school house No. 3 by increasing the water supply for the water closets, and we most urgently recommend that the water closets, in the basement of the building, be entirely reconstructed.

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall, in said Winchester, on the 8th day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To receive the reports of the town treasurer and other town officers, including agents and committees as printed, and act thereon.

ART. 2. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

ART. 3. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for ordinary town charges for the ensuing year.

ART. 4. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to keep the roads in repair the ensuing year.

ART. 5. To see how much money the town will vote

to raise for the support of the fire department for the ensuing year.

ART. 6. To see if the town will vote to pay the firemen anything in addition to what is allowed them by law, or act thereon.

ART. 7. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for decorating soldiers' graves.

ART. 8. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the care of Evergreen cemetery for the ensuing year.

ART. 9. To see what method the town will vote to take for the support of the poor the ensuing year, raise money therefor or act thereon.

ART. 10. To see if the town will vote to raise money sufficient to pay the interest on the Conant library bonds for the ensuing year.

ART. 11. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the support of the town library the ensuing year, or act thereon.

ART. 12. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the care of the public library building and grounds for the ensuing year, or act thereon.

ART. 13. To see what action the town will vote to take in regard to lighting the streets of the center village of Winchester and upper and lower Ashuelot, raise and appropriate money therefor, or act thereon.

ART. 14. To see if the town will vote to build a new town hall, raise or borrow money therefor, or act anything thereon.

ART. 15. To see if the town will vote to build a

sidewalk on the west side of Mechanic street, commencing at the southeast corner of land belonging to the Henry Gould estate and running northerly to southeast corner of land belonging to the A. M. Howard estate, raise money therefor, or act thereon.

ART. 16. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to pay on the town debt the ensuing year, or act thereon.

ART. 17. To see if the town will vote to build a sidewalk on the west side of Main street, commencing at the north end of the middle bridge, so called, and running northerly to, or near, the big pine trees standing on the bank of the river, raise money therefor, or act thereon.

ART. 18. To see if the town will vote to open a reading room in the Conant library building, or act thereon.

ART. 19. To see if the town will vote to buy papers and magazines to be used in the reading room, raise money therefor, or act thereon.

ART. 20. To see if the town will vote to throw up the last layout in the new part of Evergreen cemetery and adopt the layout made by the late Nathan P. Burbank, or act thereon.

ART. 21. To see if the town of Winchester will vote to unite with the town of Hinsdale for the purpose of employing a superintendent of the public schools in said towns, agreeably to an act passed by the legislature at the session of 1895, or act anything thereon.

ART. 22. To see if the town will vote to appoint a liquor agent, or in any way restrict the sale of intoxicating liquors, or act anything thereon.

ART. 23. To see if the town will vote to buy the snow plow sent here on trial, and raise money therefor, or act thereon.
