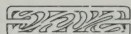
Vital Statistics 1919

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**REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD**

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To the Parents and Citizens of Brookfield:

In view of the changes which have occurred in our school system during the current year, it is well, in advance, to say that the report will differ in part from those of preceding years in that the progress of Fall and Winter terms are omitted.

May we call your attention, Parents and Citizens, to the following fact. In two of our three schools, during the Spring term, there were repeated absences week after week. The progress of learning was grievously hindered by these repeated absences of the pupils. A school, as an institution of learning, is a success only when the parents teach the child that school is the serious business of their youth, and upon their success in this business of learning, depends their standing among citizens in after years. Let us so bear this in mind that during the future we may aid in eliminating this evil of irregular attendance from our schools.

During April the Brookfield Corner school was dissolved and the Hackett and Churchill schools were reinstated.

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**Stoneham School**

Spring term—Teacher, Beatrice Whitlock; number of weeks, 13; pupils, 11; average attendance 8.43.

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**Hackett School**

Spring term—Teacher, Mary Whitham; number of weeks, 13; pupils, 8; average attendance 7.77.

**Churchill School**

Spring term—Teacher, Agnes Bolduc; number of weeks, 13; pupils, 9; average attendance 6.73.

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With the Fall term beginning September 1, 1919, our schools came under State supervision. The yearly report of 1920 will contain a complete resume of the work done in our schools from September 1, 1919 to August 31, 1920.

The following report is given by our District Superintendent, Fred W. Dudley. He is doing splendid work in behalf of the State Board of Education, and the School Board of Brookfield for the improvement of our schools.

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**Superintendent's Report.**

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To the School Board of Brookfield.

Gentlemen,

I presume that your report to the citizens of Brookfield at this time will deal mainly with the period prior to Sept. 1, 1919. My official connection with your school system began upon that date. It is not my intention to give any detailed report upon the condition of the schools at this time, for such a report in the middle of the year would be of little real value. At the end of the school year I shall cover the work of the whole year in my annual report. However, since it will be necessary for you to explain-

to the citizens some steps which you have already taken during the current year and to discuss others yet to be taken, for which provision should be made at the annual meeting, I think that it may well for me to submit a brief statement to be included in your report.

Probably no other subject has caused so much discussion in your community as the alterations in the school-houses which a careful survey showed to be necessary. I will, therefore, take up this matter first.

The new Education Law, passed by the last legislature, was designed to give to the children of the small towns educational opportunities equal to those enjoyed by the larger communities. Since health is one of the first essential requirements for a happy and successful life, the State Board of Education decided that the school-houses of the state must be made healthful and sanitary. Hence, after careful consideration, certain minimum requirements were drafted and placed in the hands of all school boards.

All the school-houses of Brookfield were found to be deficient in light. In one instance less than one-half the required amount was provided. The only remedy for this defect is more windows. Accordingly additional windows have already been inserted in the school-house at Stoneham and arrangements are being made to do the same at the Hackett and Churchill schools.

The toilets at all the schools were found to be unfit for use. A new toilet has been built at the Stoneham school and it is proposed to build new ones at the Hackett and Churchill schools.

The interiors of all these buildings also need re-painting and some minor repairs.

I understand that at the last annual meeting it was decided to purchase a new stove for the Stoneham school. Anticipating that we may be required to provide some type of ventilating heaters next year, I advised that we make the old stove serve our purpose this year and put in a jacketed stove next year.

At your meeting last year generous provision was made for teachers' salaries. However, on account of a general shortage of teachers it has been impossible to open all the schools in New Hampshire this year, and we have suffered to some extent because of this shortage. The Stoneham school was closed for five weeks after Christmas because it was impossible to find any teacher. It is now open under the charge of a student from Plymouth Normal School, but she will be able to remain with us only during the month of February. The shortage of teachers throughout the United States is likely to be fully as great next year.

I found your schools insufficiently supplied with books and equipment. This deficiency was especially marked in the case of supplementary reading matter. Considerable new matter of this kind has been provided, but much more is needed before the end of the year.

It is true that the expense of putting your school-houses into proper condition is considerable for a small town. It is not, however, so great as some citizens seem to suppose. Nothing unreasonable has been asked or will be asked for by the state officials. And every dollar expended will be for the benefit of the children of Brookfield.

In the maintenance and support of the schools we shall be assisted by the state after we have provided the proper working conditions. But not one dollar of state money will be available unless we have made provision to meet all minimum requirements.

In closing I wish to thank the School Board for the support and assistance which they have given me in working out some of the school problems of Brookfield.
