WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

The State of New Hampshire

(L. S.) To the inhabitants of the Town of
Lebanon qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on the second Tuesday of March next at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

First—To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year.

Second— To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the construction and repair of highways and bridges for the ensuing year.

Third—To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the construction and repairs of sewers and sidewalks for the ensuing year.

Fourth—To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the improvement of the cemeteries of the town.

Fifth—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the proper observance of Memorial Day.

Sixth—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of six hundred dollars to provide a free bed at the Mary Hitchcock Hospital.

Seventh—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to assist in the work of the Visiting Nurse Association.

Eighth—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the benefit of the West Lebanon Library.

Ninth—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the benefit of the Lebanon Public Library.

Tenth—To see if the town will appropriate the sum of four hundred dollars to control the White Pine Blister Rust.

Eleventh—To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

Twelfth—To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on taxes, if paid before specified dates.

Thirteenth—To see if the town will continue the inspection of milk and raise money therefor.

Fourteenth—To see if the town will vote to give prescription permits from May first 1930 to May first 1931 according to Section 99, Laws of 1919, to druggists who are registered Pharmacists doing business in Lebanon, to sell liquors for medicinal, sacramental, scientific or mechanical purposes.

Fifteenth—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of fifty dollars for the benefit of a playground at West Lebanon.

Sixteenth—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of one hundred dollars to hire Rogers & Whitney Park for a playground.

Seventeenth—To see if the town will vote to employ a firm of certified public accountants to audit the accounts of the Town, for the year 1930.

Eighteenth—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$2000. for State Aid Maintenance and to receive a like amount from the State.

Nineteenth—To see if the town will vote to accept the provisions of Chapter 87, Section 1, of the Revised Statutes, on a section of the Mascoma Road, so called, and appropriate , or set aside from the amount raised for highway work the sum of \$100. for this purpose.

Twentieth—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$9,500. for Trunk Line Maintenance and to receive a like amount from the State.

Twenty-first—To see if the town will raise \$75,000. toward the construction of the Trunk Line road and authorize the Selectmen to borrow from the State (agreeably to Chapter 50, Section 5, Ses-

sion Laws of 1929) the balance necessary to complete this Trunk Line.

Twenty-second—To see what action the town will take to procure land for a new cemetery and raise money therefor.

Twenty-third—To see if the town will vote to join with the Boston and Maine Railroad in widening and improving the underpass on the Peck Hill Road, known as Scytheville Underpass in a manner satisfactory to the Selectmen and raise and appropriate the sum of \$2500.00 as part of the costs thereof.

Twenty-fourth—To see if the town will vote to increase the salary of the Clerk of the Municipal Court \$100.00 per year as provided for by Chapter 323, Section 8 of the Public Laws of New Hampshire.

Twenty-fifth—To see if the town will vote to have the police officers and Selectmen establish parking regulations for automobiles in said town.

Twenty-sixth—To see if the town will vote to build a sidewalk on the south east side of Pleasant Street, from Mascoma Street to Maple Street or act thereon.

Twenty-seventh—To see if the town will vote to raise money to repair and extend the sidewalk on Elm Street, West Lebanon from Main Street to the residence of Harry E. Braley.

Twenty-eighth—To see if the town will vote to build an extension of concrete or cement sidewalk beginning where it now leaves off at No. 103 School Street and extending along the north side of said School Street to the front walk leading to the street from the home of Jack H. Willard, No. 119 School Street.

Twenty-ninth—To see what sum of money the town will appropriate to build a sidewalk and macadam road on Farnam Avenue in West Lebanon.

Thirtieth—To see if the town will vote to lay a sewer from Bank Street a distance of approximately

one hundred yards on Highland Avenue and appropriate money for the same.

Thirty-first—To see if the town will vote to extend the sewer up Seminary Hill, so called, in the village of West Lebanon, N. H. from its present terminus approximately 1000 feet.

Thirty-second—To see if the town will vote to extend the sewer, from the school house located at Scytheville, along the Mascoma Extension to the end of the precinct, and sufficient funds to be appropriated for that purpose.

Thirty-third—Bring in your votes for five delegates to the Constitutional Convention to be holden in Concord June 4, 1930.

Thirty-fourth—To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

Thirty-fifth—To choose one Selectman for the ensuing three years, Overseer of the Poor, Collector of Taxes, Highway Agent, and all other necessary officers for the ensuing year.

Thirty-sixth—To choose a Trustee to administer the Trust Funds of the Town for three years.

Thirty-seventh—To transact any other business that may properly come before the meeting.

Comments

Receipts:

In auditing the receipts listed above, we tried first to determine the amount of money which should have been received from each class of receipts, and then compared this amount with the corresponding amount recorded in the books of the Town Treasurer and of the Selectmen.

For example, the amount turned in from tax collections was verified by a detailed analysis of the Tax Collector's record of collections, taking into account the date of all collections and the consequent discounts which should have been allowed. Similarly, funds received from the State and County were verified by direct correspondence with the State Treasurer, and County Commissioner, while receipts from other departments, such as those of the Town Clerk and the Municipal Court, were verified by means of an audit of the records of each department.

Disbursements:

Proper vouchers, in the form of cancelled checks and purchase invoices, were examined to determine support of disbursements listed above. Further, we assured ourselves that in all cases disbursements of funds had been properly authorized and correctly distributed in the books of record.

General:

No consideration has been given in the foregoing Balance Sheet to Plant and Fixed Assets, such as buildings, bridges, sewer system, and the like for the following reasons:

- (1) There was no reliable information pro-

curable with regard to the original cost or the present depreciated value of these items.

(2) It appears to have become the prevailing judgment of authorities on Municipal Accounts that such Assets constitute the property of the People as distinct from the Town, the Town acting only as the Agent of the People in acquiring these Assets for the People through the funds provided by the People.

This amount was verified in each case by direct correspondence with the holder.

This amount was verified by examination of the orders drawn and approved by the Selectmen at the time of our audit.

The receipts reported above were found to agree with the amounts drawn from the various library funds and with the amount of money voted by the Town for the benefit of the Library and paid to the Library Trustees for this purpose.

We investigated all the disbursements made and found them supported by proper vouchers.

The status of the funds on January 31, 1930, as set forth above, was verified by means of direct correspondence with the depository banks.

REPORT OF OVERSEER OF POOR

This department has furnished aid to 17 individuals and 45 families. Assistance was given for the following reasons:

Careful investigation in each case has been made.

Occasionally I find mismanagement the cause for destitution. In such cases I have no sympathy for the adults, but the children who were innocent sufferers cannot be left in want, and it is for their welfare that assistance is granted.

Those who have sponged on this department for a number of years have been culled out. These worthless men have been given the choice of supporting their families or going to jail. I have only had to jail one man. Suspended sentences have been given in each case where the man has shown willingness to care for his family.

In desertion cases no expense has been spared to bring the individual back to his family. The court has given me every aid in this difficult and sometimes disagreeable task.

There is a small group of wage earners who are up against it when employment ceases. The high

cost of living and the small amount of credit extended brings to us families who are worthy of temporary aid. I find in these cases that there must be constant employment for the head of the family to keep the family from actual destitution. I give reasonable aid to these people and use every effort to secure employment.

This class ought not to be pauperized, and I hope Lebanon will soon have an Associated Charities through which such worthy families may be able to secure temporary aid.

The biggest problem is the bootlegger's family. When this type of individual is sent to jail this department must take complete charge of the family and give all the support needed. This expense is enormous. This item alone is large and without it our expenditures would be much lower than the average town of the size of Lebanon.

I have now established a rule that those who have cats, dogs, automobiles and other luxuries cannot expect to be assisted from the Poor Department.

With its many perplexing problems I have tried to discharge my duties as head of this department with tact, judgment, careful consideration for those who seek aid and always bearing in mind I am spending the tax payer's money.

REPORT OF MILK INSPECTION

The reports received from the State Laboratory of Hygiene on samples of milk taken from the Lebanon producers the past year showed well above the statutory limits as regards solids and fats.

The Bacteria count and B. Coli have been low in most of the samples showing sanitary and proper technique by producers and dealers. One case of Undulant Fever reported in town last year which is making a good recovery at this date.

The annual report for the Town of Lebanon for the past year shows that the town has been very free of serious communicable diseases. Three cases of Small Pox the first we have had for over 15 years. A few case of Scarlet Fever but all in mild form.

Monthly reports of water analysis shows the water from the Lebanon supply good bacterially, while the West Lebanon supply shows an excess amount of vegetable matter.

New Hampshire Child Health Conference

Child Health Conference for the preschool children of Lebanon was conducted by the Division of Maternity, Infancy and Child Hygiene of the State Board of Health September 24th, when fifty-five babies and preschool children were weighed and measured, and given a complete physical examination by physicians.

Twenty-five of the children had defects.

Forty-three defects were found.

Thirteen were placed under treatment.

Eleven demonstrations were made at the Conference.

The local Board of Health, District Nursing Association, Lions and Woman's Club as well as the School Department sponsored the Conference.

The State Board of Health, Division of Maternity Infancy and Child Hygiene, in cooperation with the Red Cross, Grange, Fortnightly Club and Kings Daughters, conducted a Child Health Conference in West Lebanon, June 20th for the preschool children.

Thirty-nine babies and preschool children were given a physical examination by a physician, and weighed and measured.
