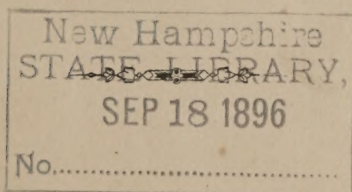

SCHOOL REPORT.

The work in our schools has been faithful, the teaching thorough, and the results highly successful. A good degree of fidelity and patience, which comes of a real love for the work, has characterized our teachers. True scientific teaching is showing the pupils, *what* to learn, *how* to learn, and *how to tell* what they have learned, and also, imparts an enthusiasm for the acquisition of knowledge. A globe, wall maps, a clock, a thermometer, a dictionary, and at least thirty-six feet of black-board should be in every school-room. It is absolute extravagance to neglect to furnish teachers with the implements of their profession, and we trust, that, in the near future, all necessary facilities for the best work will be provided. School No. 4, is practically suspended for the want of pupils, there being but *three* resident scholars in the district. Now, seems to be a good time for the parties interested to consult Gen. Laws, Chap. 86, Sec's 4, 19 and 26, and take some action according to its provisions.
