## TOWN WARRANT

---

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of New London in the County of Merrimack in said State qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

[L. S.]

You are hereby notified to meet at Whipple Memorial Hall in said New London on Tuesday, the eighth of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects.

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To hear reports of Agents and Committees heretofore chosen and pass vote relating thereto.
3. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$14,150.00 to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for the observance of Memorial Day.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500.00 for the Town Library for the ensuing year.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for street lighting for the ensuing year.
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for Cemetery purposes for the ensuing year, \$150.00 of this amount to be used for Hearse hire.
8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,300.00 for the support of the New London Hospital for the ensuing year. This amount to include \$300.00 for care of Town Poor.



9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,000.00 for Summer maintenance and \$4,000.00 for Winter maintenance of highways, bridges and sidewalks for the ensuing year.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$573.87, the State to contribute \$2,295.46 for Town Road Aid.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to finish tarring Old Main Street from the Cemetery to the residence of George Graves.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, together with other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$650.00 for Hydrant service.

14. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$5,741.00 for the purpose of purchasing the Colby Hill School property; and to raise said sum by authorizing the Selectmen to borrow the same in the name of the Town by issuance of serial notes or bonds as provided in Chapter 72, Revised Laws as amended, and for this purpose to authorize the Selectmen to determine the time and place of payment and rate of interest of such notes or bonds and to provide for the sale of the same.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for continued support and maintenance of a Skating Rink.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the purpose of maintaining an Information Booth. It being understood that any balance at the end of the season will be turned back to the town.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for Band Concerts to be held each week during July and August 1949. The Selectmen to appoint a committee of three to make arrangements and have charge of said concerts.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the purpose of grading, seeding and improving the Nelson Lot, so called.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the purpose of Pine Blister Rust control.

20. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

21. To see if the Town will vote to request the State Tax Commission to make a complete reappraisal of the lands and buildings within the town, to equalize valuations in accordance with the law, and to appropriate money for this purpose.

22. To see what action the Town will vote to take in regard to discount on taxes.

23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes for the ensuing year.

24. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

## REPORT OF BUDGET COMMITTEE

February 10, 1949.

To the Voters of New London:

In accordance with the Laws of New Hampshire, Chapter 52, the New London Budget Committee held three meetings, one closed and two public hearings.

The Public hearings were well attended and considerable interest shown in the proposed articles for the warrant.

The committee unanimously approved all articles for both school and town warrants with the exception of the article pertaining to the Nelson lot (so-called). It was recommended that the sum of \$200.00 be appropriated instead of the \$500.00 as it was felt that additional work would have to be done in the future to take in the additional property on which the school now stands and that this extra work could be done at that time.

The committee also recommended that the sum of \$150.00 for hearse hire be discontinued as it was felt that this was an item that was being carried over from the time when the town owned the hearse and the amount appropriated for hearse hire whenever needed.

## Report of Clerk for 1948

On Hospital Day, the organization sponsored an old fashioned girl selling chances on a bouquet which netted the hospital \$50.00.

Once again, the National Geographic Magazine was given the Elkins School in the name of the Kneeland Parshley Fund.

The organization has continued its function of making loans to veterans.

## REPORT OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT

January 1, 1948 to December 31, 1948

The Board of Engineers are pleased to report that for the first time in several years there has been a decrease in the number of fires which the fire company was called on to extinguish during the past year.

We have been aware of a growing condition in town for some time and that is the number of home owners who are converting to oil and installing stationary burners and portable oil heaters.

Unless these burners are properly installed and the proper safety devices properly connected they represent an increasing hazard to those having them installed and also the town.

We respectfully suggest that some consideration be given to the licensing of future oil burner installations with proper inspection necessary, a permit to be given if the installation is found satisfactory. We feel sure that anyone considering the installation of oil at some future date would welcome an inspection thus being assured that whatever type burner they have selected would be installed in the proper manner.

ANNUAL REPORT  
NEW LONDON PUBLIC LIBRARY  
TRACY MEMORIAL BUILDING

The year of 1948 at the library in Tracy Memorial Building has been a year increasing in activity and service. The circulation records speak for themselves and there has been a marked increase in reference work during the past year.

This makes a total circulation of 15,145 which shows an increase over last year.

During the year of 1948 twelve thousand four hundred and seven people have visited us.

In spite of the fact that the price of books has gained in the last year, we have tried to keep up to date in our book selections and to provide for the calls for the best sellers. During the year we have added 756 new books to our library of which 195 were presented to us as gifts. Among the people giving books were: Mrs. Mary Macomber, Mrs. Edith Carlisle, Miss Lennie Messer, Mr. M. Roy London, Mrs. Fred B. Sladen, Mr. Jack Vaughan, Mr. Fred Todd, Mrs. Bessie Sargeant, Mr. William Shurtleff, Mr. Calvin Sargent, Mr. Vaughan Biggert, Mr. Guy Williams, Mr. George S. Bryan, Mrs. Velma Champion, Mr. Robert Sawyer, New London Woman's and Garden Clubs, Colby Junior College and the Woman's Baptist Missionary Society.

Our magazine table in the reading room is well provided with the current magazines by subscription and the generosity of our friends. Among our regular contributors are: Miss Betty Nichols, Mrs. Robert Sawyer, Miss Sallie and Miss Elizabeth Waite, Mrs. Kenneth Lord, Mrs. Velma Champion and Mr. and Mrs. Herbert D. Swift. All magazines, except the current issues circulate freely among our borrowers. Articles to be found in our magazine file in the upper stack are in constant demand by students for reference material, for source themes, historical work, etc.

Through the kindness of Mr. Merle Gay, who picks up and delivers them, we send books to the Elkins School as often as they wish them. We also lend books to the Central School, both high school and grade school, to Springfield and to Sutton. We have been glad to answer inter-library loans of books to the State library, Colby library, and the Extension division. On alternate months the Bookmobile calls on us to exchange and renew our books borrowed from them.

Last week, the new steel file, for which we have been waiting for nearly a year arrived at the library. This will house our pamphlet file which is constantly increasing and which is used extensively by the High School and Colby students.

During the last year the Woman's Club has held meetings twice a month in the auditorium and the Garden Club has met here once each month through the spring and summer. Many committees have used the club-room including The Farm Bureau, New London Outing Club, Hospital Board, Supervisors of the Check-List, New London Service Organization and the Stamp Club sponsored and supervised for the children by Mrs. Gladys Lovering.

From May 2 through the 10th "Atomic Energy," an exhibition prepared and loaned by Life magazine was on display in the auditorium of the library. Atomic Energy was prepared in consultation with the United States Atomic Energy Commission, which has urged nation-wide education on this subject. The thesis of the exhibit was that science is truly international, that atomic energy is not an exclusively scientific matter, but will eventually involve the entire world, politically and socially.

Mrs. Robert Daniels, genealogist for the new town history held interviews in June and August with anyone wishing to consult her in regard to their particular family record.

Under the sponsorship of Mr. Thomas Wistar, Jr., chairman for Hospital Day, Mr. George Draper arranged an exhibit of the work of fourteen artists of this area from July 31 through August 14th. On the opening day a "meet the artists" tea was held so that everyone would have an opportunity to meet these exhibitors as well as to view their handiwork. Many enthusiastic visitors attested to the popularity of this exhibit.

Mrs. Helen R. Colburn presented twelve of her pupils to relatives and friends in a piano recital on June 8th. Their performance was well received and well attended.

In August, Mrs. Dorothy Dey Howard held an exhibit of her paintings in the auditorium. Mrs. Myrtle Crockett and Mrs. Donal Lamson also had an exhibit of hooked rugs at the same time.

Many summer visitors and townspeople patronized the sale held by the World Wide Mission Handicraft center in August. This is the second successful year these women have been with us.

In June the librarians began to organize a summer reading club among the children. Thirty children signed up for extra reading during the summer months. A certificate was to be awarded each child reading and reporting on ten books. On September 1st all the children were entertained at a party in the library gardens. The party included playing of games, reports of children on books read, awarding of certificates and diplomas by the librarian and refreshments of ice cream and cookies. Diplomas were given to the following children: Robert Biggert, Robert Libbey, Thelma Libbey, Thora Libbey, Mary Jane Tunis, Judith Champion and Ann Greenaway. Certificates were given to the following: John Clemons, Wanda Lull, Florence Champion, and Barbara Jean Burchmaster of Sinclair, Wyoming. We are hoping for a larger enrollment next year and that more children will finish their summer reading with the same enthusiasm.

During National Art Week an interesting display of pictures illustrating Modern Art and a copy of the Round Table discussion of Modern Art, sent to us by the editors of Life magazine was shown in the reading room.

A poster, urging parents and friends to visit schools during American Education Week, occupied a prominent position on the main desk throughout the week of November 8th to 13th.

From November 14th to 20th the annual exhibit in celebration of Children's Book Week was held in the auditorium. The theme for 1948 was "Books Tell the Story." Everyone loves a story and the place to find them is in books. When we have plenty of books around us, books of our own and books on the long shelves of libraries and schools, there can be no dull hours. We become adventurers in the past, companions in the exciting present and builders in the future. Our display included a small village, called Booktown with china figures of children on the grass and paths and their china pets around them; articles made in the children's room during the past year; a pyramid of new adult books and a sale of discarded and duplicate books. Over 126 children and adults attended our Book Week and placed reservation for their favorites.

The Children's Room under the able supervision of Mrs. Richard Lull has had a busy and happy year. Though nearly every week there has been such a large attendance as to make supervision difficult for one person, we have enjoyed their pleasure in making many beautiful things to take home. Over 400 children have attended the story hour sessions this past year.

During your librarian's vacation in August, Mrs. Vincent Lee, graduate of the Springfield Library School, acted as head librarian. Miss Frances McKenney of Dover worked as assistant through July and August.

Our lawns and gardens have been kept beautiful by the unremitting labor of our janitor, Mr. Edward Dexter. Several new shrubs and plants contributed by the Garden Club members have added to the beauty of our flower beds in the summer.

We hope this summary of the year's work at the New London Public Library in Tracy Memorial Building will bring to everyone the realization of its ever-increasing service and its valuable contribution to the community of New London.

## NEW LONDON HOSPITAL BOARD

During the year 1948 the New London Hospital has continued to serve the area with efficiency and has managed to stay out of increased debt in spite of rising prices. Total number of patient days has been 5,513. Of these, 548 adults were admitted and 67 births recorded. 208 operations were performed.

Miss Amelia J. McLeod and Mrs. Murray Sargent continue their efficient work as superintendent and business manager. A total staff of fifteen persons covered the nursing, kitchen, laundry, laboratory, and office work. Part time nurses were added when necessary.

Miss Dorothy Hale, technician, joined the staff on September 1, 1948. Since her arrival the laboratory has been much improved by a new floor, ceiling, and paint.

Dr. Ralph Miller of Hanover has joined the medical staff as pathologist.

The hospital has been re-roofed this year. New equipment received from the Summer Residents' Committee includes a tumbler for the laundry, a resuscitator, and emergency lights in case of power failure.

The annual Hospital Day was again very successful. Total receipts were \$5,900.00 plus \$2,350.00 received by the Summer Residents' Committee. During the past twelve years the Summer Residents' Committee has collected \$19,433.50. It was voted at the September meeting of the Hospital Board that we express our deep appreciation to the members of this committee for this amazing showing and we requested Mrs. Bradley Dewey, chairman, to convey these sentiments to her committee.

The Hospital Aid paid off \$700.00 on the Nurses' Home mortgage this year. They also continued to purchase and care for the hospital linen.

\$600.00 of the income from the Parlin fund was used for needy patients during the year. The George Corey gift totalled approximately \$1,600.00, the income from which will be used on the bills of needy children.

The Hospital received a gift of \$500.00 from the estate of John Morgan to be used for maintenance.

Because of increased fire protection equipment at the hospital the board of underwriters was able to lower the insurance rate this year.

Chairman, Summer Residents' Committee

The Future Plans Committee has been very active this year and presented a comprehensive report at the September meeting which is reprinted here for your information.

"Due to present unstable economic conditions it would not seem wise, at this time to go ahead with a financial campaign to raise money as suggested by the Tamblin and Brown Report. This, of course, will put off any actual construction until the time comes when money is not as tight, building and labor costs may be somewhat lower, and the board feels that it would be expedient to start such a program. Your committee feels, however, that there are certain things that should be done at this time which are essential to our plans for the future.

1. That a committee be appointed by the President to work on plans for hospital expansion. These plans to be a part of a master plan which would eventually replace the entire present unit. This would have to be done prior to a money raising campaign and it seems feasible that such plans might be completed by the beginning of another summer in case such a campaign were instituted in 1949. This committee should include members of the Hospital Board and medical staff.

2. That a committee be appointed to investigate the possibility of Federal funds and present a detailed report to the Board at the February meeting on the amounts expended in New Hampshire in 1948, our position on the list at that time, and the exact procedure required for us to make application. This would have to be done if we consider a campaign in 1949 and should be valuable information for future reference.

3. That a building fund be established. This fund to be used for major hospital expansion only.

4. That the money received from the sale of the Shepard property be used to start the Building Fund along with the \$5,000.00 set aside by the Summer Residents' Committee.

5. That a publicity committee be appointed whose duties would be to keep residents of New London and surrounding communities informed as to hospital news. This might be a squib or column in the local area papers under such a heading as "Your New London Hospital."

6. That a card or pamphlet be prepared which might be inserted in hospital correspondence and bills telling of the services rendered by the New London Hospital during the prior year.

Your committee feels that if these things can be accomplished we will take another step toward a better hospital and the continuance of friendly public relations.

## REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN

---

Your local organization to prevent and extinguish brush and woods fires is glad to report a good year of forest protection in 1948. In spite of danger conditions nearly equalling at times those of 1947 when great losses were suffered in New Hampshire and New England, fire damage and loss this year have been gratifyingly low.

With the continuing cooperation of all the people, we can hope to have another successful year in 1949. Let us remember that in any year, over 90% of all fires are caused by carelessness and that all of these man-caused fires are preventable.

Today, we have more slash and uncut grassland than for many years in the past. Smokers, campers and tourists who use our outdoors are also more numerous than ever before. We must therefore be ready for fires which might occur but, above all, prevention by everyone is the greatest need.

A few simple precautions taken by every citizen will help, as follows:

(1) Always get a written permit from the warden before kindling a fire outdoors when the ground is not covered with snow.

(2) If you smoke, always extinguish matches and tobacco before dropping or throwing them down. In automobiles, always use the ash trays.

(3) Report fires and smokes to the warden without delay.

The observance of these and other simple rules will go far to insure safety from fire damage and your cooperation in this way is earnestly solicited.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

---

To the New London School Board :

I herewith submit my first annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

### Enrollment

The enrollment this year is 209. This is broken down as follows :

Central School :

Grades 1-8	110
Grades 9-12	84

Elkins School :

Grades 1-8	15
------------	----

We are fortunate in having 23 tuition pupils in the High School. Without them it is most likely that we would be forced to eliminate certain courses because of the small number of pupils interested. As it is, most classes are relatively small which makes more individual attention possible. Moreover, the competition caused by a larger group is stimulating for the New London students. There are also eleven elementary tuition pupils enrolled.

The tuition rate for 1949-50 will be :

Elementary	\$100.00
High School	150.00

This year for the first time the annual school census included an enumeration of children from birth to 5 years as well as those from 5-16. The census findings from this pre-school group will aid considerably in estimating the size of our first grade classes for the next few years.

## Teachers

The problem of obtaining and keeping competent teachers continues to be the most important one in our schools today. Fortunately the supply of secondary teachers, except in certain specialized fields, is much greater. However, the small number of elementary teachers available creates the real problem, especially when the elementary enrollment continues to rise. The two state teachers colleges which naturally should furnish the bulk of the replacements necessary, will have less than 25 elementary graduates this June. Normally there is an elementary turnover in this state of between 150-200. Thus it can be seen that the demand in this field will far exceed the supply.

There were six replacements this year in the staff at the Central School—2 in the grades and 4 in the high school. This was more than a normal turnover and the number should not be as large another year.

## Course of Study

Several new courses have been added to the high school curriculum. A half-year course in Commercial Law will be offered the second semester, where Salesmanship was offered the first semester. Junior-Senior Shop has been set up on a two-year basis to cover the work in Auto Mechanics and Electricity. Both of these subjects will be taught concurrently to allow greater use of the equipment rather than to teach one subject one year and the other the next.

These changes have been made in an attempt to better meet the needs of pupils and provide them with an education that is practical as well as theoretical.

## School Lunch Program

The lunch program has become an important part of the school program. The lunch program operated last year for 154 days with an average of 122 lunches served each day. The federal government continues to reimburse at the rate of nine cents per meal.

### Repairs

During the summer the classrooms and corridor on the first floor were painted. Pastel shades were used in keeping with the modern trend in school house decorating. The gymnasium walls, nurse's room and kitchen were also painted. The gymnasium floor was treated with floor seal, much improving its appearance and also providing a better playing surface.

## New Equipment

A number of items of shop equipment were purchased in order to set up the courses in Auto Mechanics and Electricity. It will be necessary to build up this equipment over the years as obviously this expensive equipment could not be purchased in one year.

New venetian blinds replaced the curtains in the first floor windows. Dark curtains and stage scenery were obtained for the auditorium. The P. T. A. has agreed to contribute to both of these projects. We are certainly grateful for this assistance.

There are new steel moveable desks in the 7th and 8th grade room. Eighteen additional tablet arm chairs were secured for the high school and an additional filing cabinet for the Headmaster's office. Five new tables were obtained for the hot lunch program.

A floor waxer and polisher has been purchased. This machine will aid greatly in keeping the floor of the building in proper condition.

The following items were received during the year from the federal government as surplus property: 1 Pressure grease gun, 12 Engineer Wrenches, 1 Socket wrench handle, 1 Rectifier, 1 Receiver, 1 Transmitter, 1 Antenna, 2 Transformers, 6 Racks for receivers, 5 Transmitter Control Boxes, 32 Electrical Connectors, 4 Rubber Gaskets, 2, 6-line Portable Field Type Telephone Switchboards, 1 Test Set, 1 Fan assembly, 2 Drawing Pens, 1 Remote Control Unit, 2 Hand Telephone Sets, 1 15" Cooking Fork, 1 Stock Pot, 4 Roasting Pans.

## Workshop-Extension Course

A three-day workshop for elementary teachers was held November 29-December 1. This institute was conducted by Dr. Gertrude Lewis, Director of Elementary Education, State Board of Education. The work in Social Studies for Grades 1-8 was considered and the teachers had an opportunity to work out a co-ordinated course in this area of work.



In keeping with the state-wide program in in-service training for teachers, we expect to offer an extension course in Mental Hygiene later in the year. This course will be conducted by Dr. Anna Philbrook who is recognized as an authority in this field.

### **Debt Payment**

At the close of this school year, the indebtedness on the Central School Building will be \$48,000. Including this year's payment, \$32,000.00 will have been retired on the original issue of \$80,000.00. The district is fortunate in having secured the low interest rate of 1  $\frac{3}{4}$ % on the bond issue.

### **Conclusion**

The schools—like other business—have felt the effects of higher costs and rising prices. School budgets must be increased if we are to continue to provide as good a school program.

I wish to express my appreciation for the cooperation received during the past year from the school staff, together with the loyal support of the School Board, and the continued interest of the other citizens in the welfare of the New London schools.
