John Bolens requested that the Selectmen not charge the Stewartstown residents dumping fees when their sewage has to be dumped in the town lagoons and put the necessary funds in next year's budget. This will be further discussed at a future selectmen's meeting.

Stewartstown Police Department 2000 Annual Report

In 2000 the Stewartstown Police Department investigated a total of 511 cases. The following list is a breakdown of those cases:

As you can see, the department's caseload went up substantially this past year. The biggest increase was in motor vehicle violation. We were also called upon to assist other agencies on thirteen (13) different occasions.

As a reminder, April is K-9 month. All dogs that are 4 months and older must be licensed with the town clerk. Rabies Certificates must be presented to the clerk before your family pet can be licensed. Failing to follow the law can cost you civil penalties and or court action.

All officers within the department went above and beyond the training requirements to maintain their certification. This does not include the eight (8) hours of weapons qualification, which is mandated by Police Standards and Training Council each year. This past year, new standards were imposed by PSTC that each individual officer must qualify twice consecutive with their assigned duty weapon to receive a passing score and to become certified.

The department is putting the final touches on its policies and procedures for the department. The selectmen will be asked to officially adopt the one hundred and ten (110) policies in the upcoming months. These polices will be up for review every two years.

A six (6) page inventory list of all police equipment is near completion as well. A copy of the inventory list will remain in the selectmen's office and one in the police department. As updates occur, new copies will be in print.

After the March town meeting, a six-member committee was formed to gather bids on a four wheel drive police cruiser. After several meeting and many phone calls, a Ford Expedition was purchased through Lewis Ford. The police cruiser arrived in May.

2000 Annual Report:

The police department purchased four (4) new Kenwood Portable Radios this past year. This was a concern at the March town meeting and it was decided by the voters that the police needed to be able to communicate with each other and the dispatch center when away from the cruiser.

The department received a generous donation from the federal government this year. The US Customs Agency donated a radio base station and three (3) Motorola Portable Radios to our department. Customs is/has upgraded their communications to digital. We thank Customs for their generous contribution.

This past year, the department also received another generous donation from our neighbors across the river at the Beecher Falls Factory. Ethan Allen donated a computer desk for our office computer. We would also like to take this opportunity to thank them for their kindness.

The department went through a few changes this past year when Officer Caron left and went to work in Colebrook. In August, Officer Thibeault came aboard and completed his required training in November. In December, Officer Ward left the department after serving the North County for many years.

Finally, I would like to thank other local, state and federal agencies that have responded to the Town of Stewartstown when called, as we were not able to be there to answer those call. I appreciate your assistance and cooperation. I would also like to thank the Officers of the department, the Selectman and the people of Stewartstown for their support of the department throughout the past year.

Our goal is to ensure that this technology is available for use by first-time users as well as those who are familiar with using the Internet. Our librarian has taken several library courses this year that will help her continue to make the best use of the space and the resources that we have.

Markosoft Computers has been very generous in donating services whenever we need help with the computers. We sincerely appreciate the assistance we receive from Mark and Pat Jameson.

In the October 20, 2000 issue, **The Colebrook Chronicle** included a "What's New" article on the **Dennis Joos Memorial Library**, including two pictures. We hope that people read the well-written article with interest and learned more about what our library has to offer.

When Dennis Joos' mother passed away in 2000, family members and friends gave contributions in her memory to the **Dennis Joos Memorial Fund**. People who met Dennis' mother at the Friends of Dennis Evening will remember her as a very gracious lady. Each contribution to Dennis' fund is meaningful to us and we extend a sincere thank you to everyone who participates.

We have had a number of videos, very nice hard-covered books, and a selection of country music CDs donated during the year. We also have a handmade wooden model of piled cord wood that is a special contribution.

Our history video collection now includes videos of all of the major conflicts the United States has been involved in. These include the Revolutionary War, the Civil War, World War I, World War II, the Korean War, the Vietnam War and the Persian Gulf War. TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER REPORT

There are 2,200 Forest Fire Wardens and Deputy Forest Fire Wardens throughout the state. Each town has a Forest Fire Warden and several Deputy Wardens who assist the Forest Rangers with forest fire suppression, prevention, and law enforcement. The number of fires reported during the 2000 fire season was below average as referenced in the statistics below. Despite this, our network of fire towers and detection patrols were still quite busy with the fire towers being first to report over 135 fires. These fires were quickly and accurately reported to the local fire department for their prompt and effective suppression efforts. Wildland fires occurring in areas where homes are situated in the woodlands are a serious concern for both landowners and firefighters. Homeowners can help protect their homes by maintaining adequate green space around them and making sure that houses are properly identified with street numbers. Please contact the Forest Protection Bureau to request a brochure to assist you in assessing fire safety around your home and woodlands.

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Ranger, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required before doing <u>ALL</u> outside burning. Fire permits are required for any open burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow where the burning will be done. Violations of RSA 227-L:17, the fire permit law and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

There are eleven Forest Rangers who work for the New Hampshire Division of Forests and Lands, Forest Protection Bureau. Forest Rangers have investigated numerous complaints regarding violations of the timber harvest and forest fire laws, and taken enforcement action to ensure compliance. If you have any questions regarding forest fire or timber harvest laws, please call our office at 271-2217, or for general information visit our website at www.dred.state.nh.us.

The State of New Hampshire operates 15 fire towers, 2 mobile patrols and 3 contract aircraft patrols. This early detection system and reports from citizens aid in the quick response from local fire departments. These factors are critical in controlling the size of wildland fires, keeping the loss of property and suppression costs as low as possible. Due to permitting and fire safety concerns, please contact your local fire department **BEFORE** using portable outdoor fire places and vessels, including those constructed of clay, concrete or wire mesh.

Please contact your local fire department before doing <u>ANY</u> outside burning.

- 1. To determine the salaries of the School Board and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.
- 2. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 3. To see if the school district will vote to create an expendable trust fund under the provisions of RSA 198:20-c, to be known as the Tuition Expendable Trust Fund for the purpose of tuition. SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT STEWARTSTOWN

The nation is faced with a growing teacher shortage, as half of the current teaching force will be eligible for retirement over the next seven years. This creates an acute problem in the North Country, where we already have a shortage in many subjects and are not getting the number of applicants we could once expect for any vacancy. We are fortunate that we have people living in the area who have experience in other career fields that are applicable to our school needs and who are willing to pursue alternative certification paths to become certified teachers. We must try to keep the staff resources that we currently have, and also develop teachers from our communities, people who have an investment in the area and could provide continuity for our schools.

We are in the process of developing plans for a playground and ballfield, with work planned to start this spring. We need to coordinate the development of these two areas so that they can be used safely at the same time. Prior to starting work on the area, we have had the area reviewed for wetlands impact and are developing a site plan to address the restrictions. We must have our plan approved by the Wetlands Board prior to beginning work on the site. The PTO has been raising funds to purchase playground equipment, and volunteers and donations could reduce the cost of the project. The children need a safe place to play, and with the efforts of the PTO, volunteers, and some financial support from the district we can make that possible.

We have been seeking additional bus drivers this year, but have had limited success. We have had some response from people who can drive occasionally, but we are still looking for drivers who can drive on a regular basis. A good economy and nearly full employment has limited the number of potential applicants for school bus drivers. We are not alone in this problem, as many larger districts are also lacking a sufficient number of drivers and have offered signed bonuses to help recruitment. We are fortunate to have some drivers that we can depend on, but on days that we only have two drivers it creates an added burden for them, and makes a longer ride for the students. We are always happy to receive bus driver applications if anyone is interested.

Special Education Report School Year Ending June 30, 2000

Once again, the Special Services secretary's position became vacant. Gail Coletti went to a new position for higher pay. The Special Services Department continues to function with one Coordinator and one School Psychologist at the SAU #7 office. There are six special education teachers, one Speech Pathologist and assistant at Colebrook. Stewartstown and Pittsburg share a speech pathologist who has given her resignation and will not be continuing in the 2000-2001 school year. There is one Occupational Therapist, part-time, at SAU #7. Outside consultants for vision and hearing impaired students are utilized as needed.

The State Department of Education is considering a change in the way money is allotted to fund special education.

Under the new formula, the entitlement monies to be distributed to the local school district has three parts. The first is the **BASE PAYMENT**, which will be calculated by the child count of 12-01-98. These amounts are to remain constant in subsequent years, unless the formula in the statute is changed.

After deducting the amount needed to make the base payments, any remaining funds must be allocated to the school districts according to a formula that considers both the population and poverty factors. Specifically, 85% of the remaining funds must be allocated on the basis of the numbers of all children enrolled in <u>public and private</u> elementary and secondary schools within the school district's jurisdiction. The remaining 15% must be allocated on the basis of the numbers of children within the district who are living in poverty.

Poverty figures will be established by using the enrollment and Free and Reduced Lunch Count.

Academic programs and specials were taught by certified and/or qualified staff members from our local area.
