## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

### TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Sullivan in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Sullivan on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see what sums of money the Town will raise in addition to that required by law for building and repairing highways and bridges, or take any action relating thereto.

4. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$259.50 and set same aside until after the present war, then to apply for State Aid Construction of Class II road known as the Sullivan Center Road.

5. To see if the Town will vote to accept Town Road Aid and raise \$259.50 and appropriate same.

6. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate any sum of money for Old Age Assistance or take any action relating thereto.

7. To see if the Town will vote to pay for digging graves and going with the town hearse for residents.

8. To see what sum of money the town will raise in addition to that required by law for the support of the public library.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise money for Memorial Day, or take any action relating thereto.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise or appropriate money for Old Home Day, or take any action relating thereto.

11. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to borrow money on the credit of the Town in anticipation of taxes.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise or appropriate the sum of \$17.00 for the Monadnock Region Association, or take any action relating thereto.

13. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for the removal of snow from the highways.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money to purchase fire fighting equipment, or take any action relating thereto.

15. To see if the Town will vote to support United States membership in a general system of international cooperation, such as that proposed at the Dumbarton Oaks Conference, having police power to maintain the peace of the world.

16. To hear reports of agents, auditors or committees heretofore chosen, or take any action thereon.

17. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

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To the School Board and Citizens of Sullivan:

I herein submit my second annual report as superintendent of schools.

The issues that confront the American school system in general have become much more acute since my last report. The teacher shortage, the scarcity of materials, the run down condition of schools due to the depression and the lack of home supervision of pupils because of the total war effort are now serious problems. Despite these shortages the Sullivan district has been able to provide for the welfare of its pupils according to traditional standards.

The classrooms in the two schools have been considerably improved by fresh paint. The special appropriation of \$100.00 made at the last regular meeting would have been too small for this purpose if interested parents and citizens had not given so generously of their time and labor. This contribution to the welfare of the pupils and teachers has resulted in improved work and better general morale. Due to the present shortage of material and labor careful maintenance is now more essential than ever.

The increase which will be noticed in the Estimated Budget and School Board Recommendation for the school year beginning July 1, 1945 is due primarily to five specific reasons. They are; increased salaries for teachers, higher transportation rates, increased general costs of supplies, the present deficit and the necessity of avoiding another deficit appropriation in March 1946. For several years the Sullivan district has been able to obtain teachers and transportation for pupils at low cost. This condition no longer exists. The proposed minimum salary laws for teachers and difficulties in obtaining transportation must be anticipated. Strict economy is emphasized in the use of supplies by teachers and pupils.

The Sullivan schools have the best attendance record in this Supervisory Union and qualify for the State Honor Roll having surpassed the ninety-five percent of attendance goal.

Both schools have cooperated in every way with the war effort and made an outstanding contribution to the milkweed pod collection campaign. Over a million bushels of this vital material, which is used for the manufacture of life preservers, were collected last fall by the school children of America.

The Parent Teachers Association has a constructive program and is to be commended for its contribution to the welfare of the schools.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the teachers, parents, citizens and school officials for that cooperation which is so essential in public education.

## **ANOTHER ENEMY TO CONQUER**

**Here is a home front fight that everyone can get into. Last year in this State 558 brush and forest fires burned over 4,648 acres of land, of which 2,788 acres were valuable timber and young growth. With available manpower the lowest of any year since the war started, you can help to keep this loss down by preventing these fires from starting.**

**Keep in mind these simple rules:**

- 1. Always get a permit from your forest fire warden before starting any fires in the open. Burning under certain conditions is permitted.**
- 2. Never burn unless you have enough help to control your fire—a permit does not excuse you of negligence in case it gets away.**
- 3. Always report any uncontrolled fire promptly to your forest fire warden. Minutes lost are acres lost.**
- 4. Be especially careful with cigarettes, matches and pipes. Smokers caused most of our fires.**
- 5. Never leave a fire unless it is dead out. You can't feel safe while there is a spark left.**
