#### WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Tamworth in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Tamworth on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to accept special State Aid for highways and appropriate money for the same.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for bridges and appropriate money for the same.
- 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairing highways and breaking snow for the ensuing year.
- 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for repairing and building bridges.
- 7. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$300.00 for cutting bushes along the highway.
- 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Memorial Day observance.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$2,250.00 for maintenance of Trunk Line.
- 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for paying Town debt.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to use the Australian ballot system at the March town meeting.

- 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Blister Rust destruction.
- 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise in addition to the amount required by law for the support of Town library.
- 14. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks at the time they examine and appraise the taxable property.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 17. To see what action the Town will take in regard to buying snow removal equipment and appropriate money for the same.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to observe Old Home Day and appropriate money for the same.
- 19. To see if the Town will appoint a committee to investigate and report the cost of a receiving tomb.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$25.00 for the Laconia Hospital.
- 21. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.



For the months of November, December and January, the Community Nurse, Mrs. Gertrude Seiders, has made 370 calls, averaging 30 calls per week. #### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board of Tamworth:

I herewith submit my eighth annual report as superintendent of schools.

The free public school is still our grand heritage from the liberty-loving pioneers. If our democracy is to continue, our schools must train citizens for honest and wise participation in self-government. Tamworth is to be commended for so wisely supporting its schools.

As superintendent of schools, I feel an especial pride in the high school which serves so many of the boys and girls. It is doubtful if fifty per cent. of these pupils would ever go to high school if it were not for this opportunity in the home town. Principal Pearson, in addition to his class work, has done especially commendable work outside of school hours, spending time with the boys in manual training and 4-H Club work. This work has included boys in the grades as well as in high school.

The list of teachers and schools follows: Herman W. Pearson at the High School has 16 pupils. Edwin A. Blackey at the Grammar School has 25 pupils.

Mavis O. Corbett at the Primary School has 17 pupils.

Grace E. Shannon at Downs School has 19 pupils.
Edna B. Wilson at Chocorua School has 21 pupils.
Margaret E. Brown at Pequaket School has 9 pupils.
Alice A. Whiting at Bennett's Corner School has 9 pupils.

Lula M. Ball at South Tamworth School has 27 pupils. Estella M. White at Whittier School has 13 pupils.

#### Statistics

For the year ending June 30, 1930, we had an average attendance of 145, an average membership of 153 and a per cent. of attendance of 94.5. Schools having an attendance of 95 per cent. or above were as follows:

Pequaket, 99.4 per cent. Whittier, 98.5 per cent. Bennett's Corner, 97.8 per cent. South Tamworth, 95.9 per cent. Chocorua, 95.4 per cent.

#### Health Work

The health work is now being regularly cared for by a school nurse. All pupils have been examined and defects registered. We expect to have the Toxin Anti-Toxin clinic this spring, it having been postponed from last year. The State will assist in this work. A dental clinic was held last spring and we hope to have another this spring. The State also expects to conduct an eye clinic in this section to which Tamworth children will be welcome. Parents should plan to take advantage of these opportunities.

# School Property

The school board has continued its wise policy of keeping up and improving its school property. This year Whittier, the Village, Chocorua and Pequaket schoolhouses were painted inside. New adjustable curtains were installed at Pequaket and in two rooms at the Village. A slate blackboard was installed at

Whittier and Chocorua. Downs, Chocorua and Whittier were painted outside. Chemicals were installed at Downs, making conditions much more sanitary and convenient. The heating plant at the Village was reconditioned and improvements made in the basement. In all buildings the floors were oiled and the furniture varnished. The school yard was much improved at Chocorua.

I recommend that the Great Hill schoolhouse be sold as there are no children now living in that section.

For next year I recommend that special attention be given to outside painting and providing screens for windows and doors. Slate blackboards should be installed at South Tamworth and Bennett's Corner.

I would recommend that each school next year be supplied with manual training equipment and proper playground equipment.

On September 1, James N. Pringle succeeded Ernest W. Butterfield as State Commissioner of Education. Our state has met a distinct loss in the departure of Mr. Butterfield, who for ten years has guided the schools so successfully during the period of transition and growth under the new state law. worthy successor.

Mr. Pringle comes to the position of commissioner However, we are pleased that he has an entirely with a full knowledge of conditions which he, as deputy, has had a large share in developing. We are glad to welcome Mr. Pringle, believing that the school welfare in New Hampshire is under safe, conscientious, and wise direction.

In conclusion, I wish to express appreciation for cordial and able support in the school work.
