# Warrant for Annual Meeting

---

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Temple, in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Temple on Tuesday, the 10th day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.
3. To choose one member of the board of trustees of Trust funds of the town to serve three years.
4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Highways and Bridges.
5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to rebuild a bridge or bridges with Aid of State.
6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for State Aid Maintenance, the State to give \$150.00.
7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for Trunk Line Maintenance, the State to give \$3000.00
8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appro-

priate the sum of \$459.00 for State Aid Construction, the State to give \$275.40.

9. To see what sum of money the town will raise for support of Library.

10. To see what sum of money the town will raise for Memorial Day.

11. To see what sum of money the town will raise for painting the outside of Town Hall.

12. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

13. To see what charges for rent of hall that the selectmen shall receive.

14. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to purchase a road scraper.

15. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

---

To the School Board and Citizens of Temple:

I submit my second report as Superintendent of Schools:

### School Organization

With the resignations of Miss Brown and Miss Wells who had served as your teachers for two years faithfully and efficiently, we were obliged to secure new teachers last summer. We were fortunate in getting two graduates of the Keene Normal School, Miss Marguerite A. Hawkins and Miss Mabel E. Pingree, who began their duties in September and under whose care the school is doing very good work. The arrangement of grades is the same as last year, Miss Hawkins having grades four, five, six and seven and Miss Pingree, grades one, two and three. The enrollment is about the same as last year and the attendance is, so far, rather better than for the same period last year.

### Supervision

The chief function of the Superintendent of Schools is of course to supervise the work of the teachers, and this is accomplished chiefly in two ways: by visits to the teachers at work, and by means of standard tests. The statistical report which follows shows a total of 44 supervisory visits during the school year, or 22 visits per teacher. It would be desirable if this average could be increased but a large proportion of the Superintendent's time is necessarily taken up with administrative duties. During the past school year about 42% of my time was devoted to school visiting; about 38% to office work which included the study of standard tests referred to above; about 13% to other administrative du-

ties within the Supervisory Union; and about 7 % to administrative duties that took me away from the Union.

The same standard tests have been used this year as last year, and cover the subjects of arithmetic, reading, spelling, writing and language. Detailed study of the results enables the supervisor to know with considerable accuracy the quality of teaching being done, and enables him to make suggestions to the teachers on the basis of definite facts.

### Medical Inspection

The annual medical inspection was carried out in October by Dr. Pease with the assistance of the new school nurse, Miss Grace Lucas. They examined 38 pupils and reported the following defects:

The report of the school nurse will follow this report.

### Repairs

The plastering in the hallway and in the school rooms was repaired last summer and the rooms repainted where necessary. The building appears to be in good condition at the present time except that the wood finish should be oiled and the cement steps are badly worn and rough. Probably the best way to repair the steps would be to have them cut down and special treads cemented to them. This would greatly improve the appearance of the hallway and would reduce the wear and tear on the children's shoes, which must be a rather serious item at the present time.

### Graduation

Last June a class of five pupils were graduated from the eighth grade with appropriate and pleasing exercises at the hall. Four of these entered the High School at Wilton in the Fall. There is no eighth grade this year and only one in the seventh grade so that the number of pupils attending high school, for whom Temple must pay tuition, will not be increased next year.

I have no special recommendation to make at this time. I believe the present organization is producing very good results and that it should be continued.

In closing, I wish to express my appreciation of the faithful and efficient work of the teachers, the helpful support and cooperation of the School Board and the interest of the people of Temple in the work of the schools.

I herein submit my report for the first four months as school nurse in the Town of Temple.

Class room inspections have been made twice a month when possible in the school for infections and skin diseases, pediculosis, uncleanliness, defective teeth and poor posture.

Health talks have been given whenever schools have been visited, on correct posture, the care of the body and hair, the prevention of colds and other diseases, the importance of good food habits, fresh air, exercise and the care of teeth and mouth.

The Junior Red Cross has been organized in the school and I hope the pupils, parents and teachers will be interested in it so as to make it a success in the school, as I feel that it creates a very fine school spirit as well as having a very good health program connected with it.

I think that most of the people of Temple are much interested in the health of their children and will make every effort to keep their children's blood red, their muscles hard, their sleep sound, their digestion good, their posture erect, their step elastic, their endurance lasting and their nerves steady so they will have so many more resources in life. Physical vigor and soundness contribute to happiness, to accomplishment and to service to society and to their community.
