ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
SCHOOL BOARD.

In presenting this annual report of the schools in the Town School District, your School Board is pleased to be able to say that they think the schools have been a success.

We think this success is largely due to the fact that we were able to retain the old teachers. Teachers who had proved their superior qualification and who had become acquainted with their pupils and knew their needs, both as to instruction and discipline. This knowledge enabled them to do more and better work than they otherwise could have done.

Our school houses are pleasantly located, and in fair condition, but, like other buildings, they frequently need repairs. The amount of money expended upon them the past year has been quite small, but another year will call for an increased amount, as some painting and shingling needs to be done. If modern seats could be introduced in the houses where the old fashioned seats are still retained, it might increase the comfort of the scholars and thereby improve the discipline of the school. Hard, uncomfortable seats make young scholars restless and noisy.

The same text books are in use as heretofore, with the exception of readers. These need more frequent change to make them interesting and profitable.

We would again suggest the advisability of more frequent visits to the schools by parents. Show teachers and scholars that you are interested in their work. It will help sustain their

interest in their work, and thereby make it more successful.

The changing of the school year, which has been made by the present Board, makes the report, which is usually enclosed in the Annual Report of Tilton and Northfield, very incomplete and we suggest that the tax payers and parents attend the Annual School Meeting, which will be called on Friday, March 16th, at 7:30 o'clock P. M., at which time full reports and propositions will be made, looking to a better plan of choosing the Board of Education.

We have, as before suggested, changed the school year and introduced a course of studies which we think, with the assistance of the parents, will be of lasting benefit to the school and village.

There has been started, by some of our public spirited citizens, with the approval of this Board, an evening school which we think should receive your careful attention.

In starting on our official year we were met with the resignation of our popular and efficient Principal, D. W. C. Durgin. Together with the other changes, which were unavoidable, we felt we had a hard year before us; but we overcame all obstacles and feel that the several schools have made good progress and we recommend the engaging of all the present teachers so far as possible.

We have made great improvements in the school buildings and grounds and think with a small outlay each year the school

buildings will be fairly good for several years to come. We have had thirty-seven weeks of school, paid our teachers monthly and kept inside of our appropriations, all of which we submit for your consideration.
