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

Add to this amount, \$1860 56, our local School Fund. \$400, it makes \$2260 56, which leaves the debt March 1, 1881, \$239 44 less than when the town was organized.

Of the local School Fund \$100 00 is loaned to Geo. W. Kendall, \$160 00 to L. G. Huntress and the balance of \$140 is in the Treasury.

The foregoing is presented as a true statement of cash received and expended for the past year on all orders given up to March 1, 1881. The Selectmen have been in session since then and it is probable that more orders have been given but have not come under our observation. If this be so our debt would be increased according to their amount.

REPORT

OF THE SUPERINTENDING SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

Another year has passed and with it all the joys and expectations, all the trials and disappointments, of school life. We have been very highly favored with good teachers; no serious trouble has arisen to mar the progress of our schools. Although in some instances one could wish it otherwise, yet as a whole we have enjoyed rather a prosperous year in school interests. The progress of our schools depends mostly with the parents, by using every possible means to press upon their children's minds the importance of acquiring an education which will be useful to them as they are called to fill places of trust and honor.

As our schools have been for the past year, may they still continue, to advance step by step until we shall have schools worthy of imitation by others.

In compliance with the Statute of the State I now return the trust committed to my care one year ago with a brief review of the several schools in the several districts. We herewith submit the following:

Inue raloure DISTRICT NO. 11.900 goid borrow ob of bu

Summer term was taught by Miss Clara M. Hayes; length, 8 weeks; wages per month including board, \$17.40. This was what may be called an exemplary school. Order good, recitations excellent and good improvement made throughout the entire school. The school commenced well, continued well and ended well. The teacher's example in school and out of school are worthy of imitation by all. The best wishes go with the teacher in her future labors. Winter term was taught by Miss Florence M. Young; length 12 weeks; wages per month including board. \$21.40. Miss Young was very thorough in her explanations and labored earnestly for the progress of the school, (opinions of some parents to the contrary notwithstanding.) One fault noticeable, lack of order, owing no doubt to the fact that as the teacher did not enforce it some of the scholars took the liberty to trespass upon her kindness. The recitations were good, those in arithmetic deserving particular mention, and the blackboard exercises were unequalled in town. This school closed with very appropriate exercises in the evening, consisting of singing. declamations, dialogues and select readings, all of which were well learned and beautifully spoken.

DISTRICT NO. 2.

Only one term during the year which was taught by Miss Amanda S. Atwood; length 13 weeks; wages per month including board, \$26.00. Miss Atwood is an experienced teacher and doubtless did her best in this school as in former ones. The order was good and the recitations were truly commendable to all. The classes in Algebra and Grammar were exceeded by none in .Town.

DISTRICT NO. 3.

Summer term was taught by Miss Phoebe P. Whitcher; length 8 weeks; wages per month including board, \$16.00. This being Miss Whitcher's first experience as a teacher she evidently intended to do something creditable and she did it. Scholars small and few in number, there being no grammar and only one studying geography, yet the teacher had nearly as many classes as any one in town. This could and should be remedied by the parents providing their children with books of one series which would be adapted to their respective ages. The school was quiet and the scholars were interested in their studies, making good improvement for so short a term.

Fall term was taught by Miss Blanche G. Clark; length 7 weeks; wages per month including board, \$16.00. Not being notified of its close in time I did not visit this school but once, therefore am not prepared to state the improvement made, yet on my first visit the order was good and doubtless the improvement was satisfactory.
